

BUSINESS SESSION, Bishop Love presiding. After calling the Conference to order, Bishop Love called for the report of the Committee on Journal. H. D. Brown reported that the Journal for Wednesday, Thursday and Friday had been examined and found correct.

- D. L. RIDOUT moved that delegates to the Annual Conference be elected for four years. Bishop Love explained that if delegates had been elected previously they must be re-elected or others elected for the remainder of of the Quadrennium. Motion adopted.
- F. D. JONES, reporting for the Commission on World Service and Finance, asked for adoption of a \$350.00 budget for the Committee on Hospitals and Homes. Budget approved.

DIRECTOR GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY. C. B. Miles, Chairman of the Committee on Hospitals and Homes introduced Mrs. Beatrice Dorsey to the Conference as the newly elected Director of the Golden Cross Society. Bishop Love requested Mrs. Dorsey to visit as many district meetings as possible and seek to organize District Units of the Golden Cross.

The Bishop also requested that ministers and laymen attending this session of the conference meet with Mrs. Dorsey and set up the Charter Organization for the Conference.

ACTION RESCINDING the recommendation of last year, page 117, Conference Journal 1952, regarding purchase of property near Norristown, Pa., was moved and carried. The Committee was authorized to continue looking for a suitable site.

GOLDEN CROSS SUNDAY. Sunday November 15th was set aside as Golden Cross Sunday in the Delaware Conference.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM COMMITTEE ON ENTERTAINMENT. J. R. Webb raised the question of who are to be considered legitimate delegates or other persons to be entertained by the Host Church where Conference is held. The Bishop clarified the issue by explaining that only those duly elected as Lay Delegates are entitled to entertainment, plus the Conference Lay Leader, as Laymen. Those who are not Official Delegates are to pay for entertainment. The District Superintendents will be required to certify list of Official Delegates to the Annual Conference. COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING AND DISTRIBUTING Conference Journal was named consisting of Clarissa Walker, H. D. Brown, C. L. Trader, W. E. Stanley, and A. E. Martin.

ON MOTION Secretary Martin 4000 copies of the 1953 Conference Journal was ordered printed and distributed in the same proportion the apportionments for Journals were made. The deadline for materials to be in the hands of the Secretary was fixed at the 9th of May, with certain exceptions. The Secretary promised to make every effort possible to have material ready for printer by May 15th.

Reports of District Superintendents

DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

"Grace, mercy and peace, from God the Father and Jesus Christ our Lord."

Appointed to assume the responsibilities of the district superintendency of the Dover District near the end of the conference year, it is with humble gratitude to almighty God for his care and keeping and to Bishop Love for intrusting to me the leadership of this district that I submit this my first report as a district superintendent

Every courtesy and help that one could desire to be extended by one's predecessor, on entering into a new field of labor, was accorded me by Brother D. L. Ridout, the retiring district superintendent. And I hereby acknowledge, with appreciation, the many helpful suggestions and information made available to me by him at the time of my assumption of this office.

I am also deeply grateful for the gracious and brotherly manner in which the ministers and laymen received the newly appointed district superintendent; the reception was both heartening and inspiring. And from the moment of my entrance upon the duties of the district superintendency there has continually been in evidence a bond of deepening friendship and fellowship. I am sincerely thankful to all these good people for all the kindnesses shown to me in the few months that we have spent together.

DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

The Work of the Ministers Wives

The people of the district have given vigorous and unqualified support to the program of the Ministers Wives' Association in their efforts to help the cause of conference claimants. The support given to this phase of our work has been most encouraging indeed. Neither long distances nor inclement weather have dampened the spirits or cooled the ardor of these gracious ladies of the parsonage. Even the parsonage babies have contributed their share to the work accomplished by these faithful women. We can only say of them, they have done what they could. God bless them; they are a wonderful lot.

Perhaps the best way to characterize the spirit of our district is to say. "We have fellowship one with another..." Our meetings are fruitful periods of fellowship in the life of the district which we all love to see occur and regret to see come to a close.

The District Stewards meeting was held at Milford on May 10th. The attendance was large and the ministers and laymen were spiritually enriched and fortified for the year's work.

The District Youth Assembly was held at Seaford June 24-26. The program was splendidly arranged under the direction of C. E. Kiah and the

youth council. This meeting was very impressive, with a very large number of young people in attendance.

The first annual church school superintendents institute was held at Bridgeville October 1st. This was a most helpful meeting for church school superintendents and workers. A permanent organization of this group has been formed.

Dover, with its usual grace and style, entertained the District conference, October 28-30.

Our district Woman's Society of Christian Service is a great organization which meets quarterly and proves to be a powerful stimulus to the work of our various charges. These meetings are always well attended and furnish much helpful information to all who attend.

Sickness and Death

We are thankful to our heavenly Father that there is little to report in this respect. Mrs. C. R. Bryant, the wife of our pastor at Crumpton, was ill for a considerable period of time. Brother C. B. White, of the Millington charge fell ill during the closing days of the conference year and required hospitalization and a minor operation. He is now almost fully recovered.

The following losses by death have been reported: Mrs. C. E. Kiah, the wife of our pastor at Bridgeville, sustained the loss of her mother. The Rev. W. O. Turner, for many years a pastor on the Dover District, passed to his reward from the Easton District in January. Funeral service was held at the Crumpton charge on the Dover District.

Survey of Charges

Bridgeville, C. E. Kiah, pastor. Conversions 11. accessions 11. The interior of the church has been beautifully decorated, new heating and water system installed in the parsonage. All claims are met in full. The pastor's total salary was increased to \$2600. The charge has recognized in the constructive work of its pastor the benefits to be derived from a long term pastorate and desires to retain its pastor for the 7th year. Total raised for all causes \$5,520.

Bridgeville Circuit, H. T. Moody, Pastor, represents one of our strongest circuits, and the pastor, as usual, gives a good account of his stewardship. Conversions 12, accessions 12. \$1,394 paid on old debt, new furnishings for the parsonage and church. All claims are fully met. The people eagerly await the pastor's return. Raised for all purposes \$7,485.

Chestertown, C. H. Molock, pastor, makes its usual good report. New heating plant and new carpet purchased for the churches, the parsonage has undergone both exterior and interior renovation. All apportionments have been fully paid. The pastor's salary increased to \$2,600. Total for all purposes \$9,578.

Cheswold, R. A. Bolden, pastor. Accessions 6. The pastor has worked faithfully and has been loyal to the church. The church has a new basement, the parsonage a new exterior look, benevolent giving has increased. A new spirit of co-operation is on the rise, and a little more enthusiasm for connectional causes will bring complete success. Total raised \$2,917.

Clarksville, W. W. Brown, pastor. Conversions 5, accessions 7. The pastor has served successfully his 13th year. One new church has previously been completed and paid for, a second church is now being erected. The pastor proves himself to be a successful builder and leader. Raised for all causes \$3,890.

Coleman, J.W.Mickle, pastor. The pastor has worked earnestly to achieve results, but the outcome has not equaled his expectation. The charge has a greater potential than has been realized. With greater effort and better co-operation the desired results could easily be obtained. Total amount raised \$3,746.

Crumpton, C. R. Bryant, pastor. Accessions 23. An excellent year's work accomplished. This is an unbelievably revived charge. All claims are fully met, a new community building purchased, many new improvements made on churches and parsonage, and new equipment for the parsonage. The pastor's total salary was increased to \$2,150.

Delmar, F. R. Richardson, pastor. Conversions 14, accessions 14. The pastor is to be commended for faithful and conscientious service. Benevolences have been advanced beyond the goal reached the previous year, improvements have been made on the church property. Total raised \$2,656.

Dover, G. S. Shockley, pastor, repeats its usual excellent performance. Conversions 6, accessions 28. All claims are fully paid, the total salary for the pastor advanced to \$2,900, improvements have been made on the church and parsonage, church school enrolment has increased, also church attendance. The pastor has made a profound impression on this entire capital community. Total raised \$10,318.

Fairlee, Mrs. Grace Watts, pastor. Accession 1. A very creditable year's work has been done. All apportionments are fully met, the church school greatly improved, the church exterior beautifully renovated. Total for all purposes \$4,585.

Galena, Mrs. Rachel Brown, pastor. Accessions 1. With a membership of only thirty nine, good work has been done. One church has a completely renovated interior and the second church is now undergoing extensive repairs. Connectional causes have been advanced. Total raised \$3,320.

Harrington, Thaddeus Hackett, pastor, has done good work with a small membership. The pastor gives splendid leadership and the people respond with local co-operation. The church at Harrington has had its interior beautified. Connectional interests have been advanced. Total raised \$3,721.

Laurel, F. S. Walker, pastor. Conversions 5, accessions 15. The pastor and people are to be commended for faithful service. The interior of the church has been renovated, the parsonage has received new furnishings and new interior decorations. Raised for all causes \$3,337.

Lewes, A. J Dredden, pastor, has enjoyed a very successful year. Conversions 8, accessions 8. \$500 has been spent for improvements on one church, all conference apportionments have been fully met, the pastor has

received an increase in salary. Perhaps he will soon receive a new wife to make the parsonage complete. Total for all purposes \$4,718.

Lincoln, J. O. Lockman, pastor. Conversions 6, accessions 6. A good rural charge whose pastor has completed his twenty-third year and this is one of the most fruitful, proving that a long term pastorate can be highly successful in a rural community. All claims are fully paid, one church completely and beautifully renovated at a cost of \$10,000. Total contributions \$7,304.

Mardela, L. R. Jones, pastor, sends a creditable report. Conversions 15, accessions 11. Parsonage has been electrified, new furnishings purchased for the same and a new community building completed. Raised for all causes \$4,675.

Melitota, Mrs. Marie F. Gibbs, pastor The pastor has decided to relinquish her pastoral duties at the end of the conference year. She has worked very well to achieve results out of some obstinate conditions. Paid for all causes \$4,721.

Milford, Randolph Fisher, pastor, has experienced a year of significant achievements. Conversions 5, accessions 5. All apportionments met in full, the exterior of the parsonage greatly improved, the pastor total salary increased to \$2,200. The pastor counts this his most successful year. Total raised \$5,225.

Millington, C. B. White, pastor. The pastor has sought earnestly to meet the total responsibilities accepted by the charge. Accessions 7. New pews have been installed. An increase in salary is promised for another year. Because of the pastor's illness at the close of the year, complete information was not available. Total raised \$1,836.

Millsboro, C. W. D. Browne, pastor. Conversions 14, accessions 19. The pastor works faithfully to promote all causes of the church. An increased willingness to help in the total program of the church is the result. Pastor's salary increased to \$1,600, a sign of progress. Total paid \$3,215.

Nassau, M. C. Blakely, pastor, sends a good report. All claims are fully paid. Accessions 30. This is a promising field in which the pastor has succeeded well. An increase in ministerial support, which could be met without any actual strain, is all that is needed to make this one of the district's foremost appointments. Total for all causes \$3.183.

Newark, A. P. Jenkins, pastor. Conversions 13, accessions 13. A good report with all apportionments fully paid, the Cedar Chapel church completely rebuilt, a new heating system installed in St. Peter's church, new interior decorations in the parsonage. Great credit is due for these achievements. Total raised \$8,779.

North Berlin, W. G. Brown, pastor, is one of the stronger charges of the district, in a community devoid of denominational competition, and with a large number of young people, the potential here is great and challenging. Conversions 9, accessions 9. Some improvements made on the church interior, Total raised \$5,416.

Pomona, C. C. Thomas, pastor. Conversions 3, accessions 2. This is potentially one of the strongest charges. Generally a good report is presented. Insufficient data prevents the listing of improvements. World service fully met. Total raised \$4,100.

Port Deposit, E. W. Dean, pastor. Accessions 2. The pastor has worked well and the people are satisfied with his ministry. Total for all purposes \$2,340.

Rock Hall, M. V. Hyland, pastor. Conversions 7, accessions 10. Benevolent apportionments have been met. New over all improvements have have been made in the churches. A donor who wishes to remain anonymous has contributed \$9,000 toward the complete rebuilding of the Sandy Bottom church. The charge has to its credit a total of \$17,934 contributed for all causes.

Sassafras, Mrs. Ophelia James, pastor. Conversions 5, accessions 5. All apportionments have been paid in full, new heating units installed in churches and new carpet purchased, new furnishings provided for the parsonage. Total for all causes \$3,911.

Seaford, Roland Grant, pastor. Conversions 2, accessions 3. This is Seaford's second year as a station. The experiment is succeeding very well. All causes have received attention. Given for all purposes \$4,745.

Seaford Circuit, David Lewis, pastor, gives an excellent account of its two-year existence. All causes are fully paid. There is need for a parsonage here. The pastor has given satisfactory leadership. Total contributions \$2,421.

Sharptown, D. S. Quillen, pastor. Conversions 5, accessions 4. Here is a large membership and each Sunday brings a good attendance. The pastor gives good leadership and the result is a year of successful accomplishments. All connectional causes are fully paid. Raised for all purposes \$5,274.

Smyrna, E. L. Maddox, pastor. Conversions 1, accessions 3. Here is a small congregation in a town with keen denominational competition, but the pastor measures up to the responsibilities. The church interior beautifully redecorated, and new carpet laid. All interests are cared for. Total paid \$3,241.

South Berlin, S. P. Sanders, pastor. Conversions 7, accessions 5. A strong charge with great possibilities. The pastor has given intelligent and efficient leadership. Apportionments are almost fully met. Total for all purposes \$5,415.

Still Pond, G.B.Wilson, pastor. Conversions 2, accessions 11. Another year of success for this charge. All apportionments are raised in full, the pastor granted an increase in salary, making the total \$2,000. The church at Lynch is now undergoing complete modernization with new chancel and new heating system. New improvements are planned for the other two churches. Total paid \$6,442.

Townsend. Accessions 15. The financial report surpasses that of the previous year and the spiritual achievements have been steadily on the rise. Paid for all causes \$3,537.

Conclusion

We have in a very brief way, attempted to review the accomplishments which the ministers and laymen of the Dover District have wrought. If this report were an attempt to tell the whole story it would be a grave injustice indeed to those loyal ministers and laymen who have striven so earnestly to meet benevolent apportionments, retire long standing debts, construct new church buildings and lift the moral and spiritual sights of the community. The story is only reported here in part. For a report of this nature can never reveal or recount the broken spirits healed, the lost hopes revived and the deep and abiding spiritual values opened up to all through the ministry of the church. As Ezekiel pictured himself standing in a valley surrounded by the dry and bleaching bones of his people Israel -the dry bones a symbol of the demoralized spiritual condition of the people—and then saw them mightily revived so that hope and faith were restored, so have I seen evidences of demoralized and decadent congregations revived and strengthened by good pastoral leadership. Such achievements are not always revealed by statistics.

We do not seek to convey the impression that our work has been completely done. This very report would be a denial of that. Many of us have shown hesitancy and ineptness in the face of situations pregnant with great possibilities. But our work may be likened to a cross country race in which there are many entrants, but only a few complete the race and reach the desired goal. Those who fail in the race try just as those who succeed but stamina is insufficient and energy is lacking and experience is not wide enough to provide the push which would make the goal possible. This may well describe the circumstances surrounding those of us who have been unable to do all that was expected of us.

We shall return to our tasks to begin anew where we left off; we shall go with fervent hopes that we shall consummate that which thus far we have begun, restore that which needs restoration and revive that which now lies dormant, waiting the touch of our hands to be renewed and revived. "And He said unto me, Son of man, can these bones live? and I answered, O Lord, Thou knowest...." We go forth with God's help to find the answer.

"We go with thee to claim and build A city unto God."

District Activities

WILLISTON has done well. The charge is very small, but the pastor is a tireless worker and gets things done. No conversions; no accessions. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$85, in full. Promotional-Advance, \$65, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$1,545. N. C. Stanley, pastor.

WITTMAN. This charge has awakened out of her slumber and is making a better report than last year. Salary increase \$100. Conversions, 5; accessions, 5. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$75. Promotional-Advance, \$34. Raised for all purposes, \$3,526. I. B. Bivens, pastor.

Evangelism

Having had some difficulty in getting some of the pastors to realize that there is no excuse for their not having a substantial increase in membership when there are boys and girls, young people and adults in their churches who are not members, we purchased thirty-one sets each of the Membership Manuals of the Methodist Church for Boys and Girls, Teen-Agers, Young People and Adults, and Pastors. We studied them at our Christian Workers' Schools.

Most of the ministers now have the conviction of the author, viz., "The pastor shall organize into classes the children of the church when they have reached the age of twelve or under, to instruct and prepare them for total christian living and commitment to Christ."

At every step of the way the pastor is named the responsible person. He has every boy and girl, every youth, every adult prospect under his pastoral care. The enlistment, commitment, and training belong to his pastoral

care. These matters are not simply a major responsibility of the pastor. They are his great opportunity.

We suggest that the other methods of Evangelism be used, for all are potent: Pastoral, Personal, Mass and Visitation. We firmly believe that a more vigorous employment of these methods plus a threefold purpose of the mission of Evangelism will bring glowing results.

We shall participate in the World Convocation of Evangelism at Philadelphia, June 26-28.

Everything possible will be done to procure our quota of youth for the Christian Witness Mission to be held in Wilmington, July 27-August 3.

The Commissions

Beginning with the monthly Preachers' Meeting in September an intensive study of the Four Commissions was begun, lasting until the January Meeting which immediately preceded the fourth quarterly conference. It was clearly understood that the four Commissions were to be set up in each local church regardless of its size. We are happy to state that they have been set up in 76 of our 77 churches on the district; the lone church has only two members.

The Advance

Despite the fact that this has been a short year, 18 charges have paid World Service and Conference Benevolence in full. Total, \$6,059. 15 paid Promotional-Advance in full. Total, \$3,030. Conversions, 224; accessions, 226. 33 charges contributed \$527 to the Coleman Memorial Church. Raised for all purposes, \$154,532.

Three Workers with Children were sent to the Laboratory School at Glassboro, N. J.

We are indeed grateful to the Conference Secretary, the Reverend H. A. Bailey, and his staff, our district staff, Mrs. Elsie G. Earle, F. D. Arnold and J. R. Shockley, for the splendid job in helping us to further the promotion of Christian Education.

District Parsonage

A large frigidaire and another bedroom suite have been purchased for the district parsonage. Other minor repairs have been made.

Conclusion

We have not been able to achieve what we expected. We have fallen short of our goal which was to raise every thing in full, and to have a substantial increase in our membership. Yet the ministers and laymen have wrought well.

We shall not hesitate to say that our hearts go out to the loyal ministers' wives who work so assiduously and faithfully to raise money for Conference Claimants. I should like the conference to know that these good sisters work independently of their husbands. In other words, they do not "rob Peter to pay Paul."

Bishop Love, we have discovered that you are Christ-like, just, brotherly, kind and sympathetic. These fine qualities that you possess will be instrumental in helping to lift the Delaware Conference to a higher and more glorious plane.

May God's richest blessing rest upon you and your family.

Sickness and Deaths

We think reverently of our honored and revered dead. The Reverends John W. Jefferson and John W. Parker. Mrs. C. B. Miles and the son of Rev. & Mrs. L. E. Wise. A number of outstanding laymen have passed this year. Men and women that have rendered service in Kingdom building—we do not have time or space to call their names.

We have had a number of pastors and their wives sick. Rev. Carson J. Williams and Mrs. Williams—Mrs. Henry H. Nichols, Mrs. I. R. Elzey, Mrs. O. W. Jones, Mrs. Sydney M. Emptage and others not so serious.

A number of laymen have been sick. We are happy to report most of them are improving.

Adult Organizations

The following adult organizations are well organized in the district and are rendering outstanding service. The Woman's Society of Christian Service, 30 in number, led by Mrs. C. L. Trader, The Methodist Men are advancing. There are 20 chartered Men's groups. The district Lay Leader is Brother Roy L. Cordery and he is ably assisted by Brothers Alphonso Shockley, Otho James, Edward Gale & Robert Simpson.

The District Stewards at their annual meeting outlined a very fine constructive program for the year. They pledged to support the Benevolent Program 100%. They also helped with the program of Christian Stewardship. They put special emphasis on Stewardship and Tithing.

Young People's Organizations

Each church is setting up a fund for the necessary expenses of the pastor in doing his pastoral work.

Ministers' Wives

The Ministers' wives have worked unselfishly with their husbands. They are greatly loved and adored by the laymen. They always stand ready to give a helping hand when asked. They have worked hard this year to increase their offering for the Board of Conference Claimants. You will hear from them later in the session.

It is impossible to say all that might be said about the Charges—time and space will not permit. I'll do my best.

ST. JOHNS, NEWARK (I. R. Elzey)—This charge is constantly increasing in efficiency. The total program of the church is advancing in every department. The congregation is growing. SALISBURY DISTRICT

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

For the fifth time we make our report to this Conference for the Salisbury District. With gratitude to God for his divine favor we present this brief survey of the sacrificial services of the ministers and laymen.

We join with our Conference and with our area in a sincere welcome to our new Bishop.

During the year the "Angel Reaper" has taken from our ranks two worthy pastors: Reverends George W. Johnson, and Frederick C. Kershaw. Many laymen also have passed "to be forever with the Lord."

Joy came to the home of The Rev. and Mrs. G. H. McMurray in the birth of a fourth child, a son named Derrie—born Feb. 25th, 1953.

While we seek to promote the program of our Church in Evangelism Education, Missions, and Finance, we find it expedient to give some scope to individual initiative. The rural pastor is quite on his own in finding ways and means to meet the demands of our expanding program.

History shows no instance of any civilization surviving long without a religion, a something higher than the desire to satisfy material needs and comforts. "Religion" is the supreme example of that frame of mind in which a person subordinates his personal interests and himself to something outside him, whose superior claim he recognizes. It is this sense of mission in men called to preach the Gospel which needs matching with the means to bring their aims to worthy attainments. The church must hasten to give adequate support to its ministry.

Thirty-five pastors, and the 5,000 members of the district have responded nobly to the years work.

FRUITLAND (S. E. Parker). Maintains all askings in full, for the fourth year, with masterful leadership. Accessions 6. Extensive renovation at Calvary Church. Allen carries her full share. Grand total \$5,700.

GIRDLETREE (L. H. Purnell). The parsonage now has all modern equipment at a cost of \$600. Three churches work as one. Total raised \$6.700.

GREENWOOD (I. H. White). St Luke is closed; the reason, no members. Tindley carries more than her share. The pastor is faithful. Total \$2,600.

HOPEWELL (G.N.Jones). Another 100% report. Raised for all purposes \$3,200.

HORNTOWN (Elisha White). After 15 years the return of the pastor is requested. Salary advanced from \$1,660 to \$1,850. For improvements \$977. For all purposes \$3,400. Accessions 1.

KELLER-EXMORE (H. W. Spencer). After much sacrifice the pastor desires a change. He has done well. There is no parsonage. Total raised \$1,690.

LEEMONT (H. E. Anderson). Salary advanced \$100; total \$2,500. The charge is poised for advancement. They are loyal. Raised for Trustees \$1,466; for all purposes \$5,600. Accessions 10.

MANOKIN (J. W. Hayman). Accustomed to making a full report, the pastor has advanced this charge in the first year. All departments alive. Raised for all askings \$3,007.

MARION STATION (G. W. Taylor). Mid stormy days the pilot brings the ship into port with a good cargo. Paid on old debt \$1,200. Accessions 2. Total \$6,900.

MARUMSCO-KINGSTON (Alexander Reid). For the seventh year the pastor leads on. New members 6. Total collections \$3,600.

MT. VERNON (R. A. F. Graham) First returns are only moderate. Both churches have been renovated. A gas stove in the parsonage; a heating plant installed in one church. Total raised \$2,900.

NANTICOKE (T. L. Ross). A better attitude toward Benevolences is needed. The pastor is capable, zealous, untiring. Salary advanced \$200, now \$1.800. Grand total \$3.500.

OAKVILLE (Floyd Waters). The late Rev. George Johnson returned for the third year, but was unable to go to his pulpit even the first Sunday. The people were very kind. In September he was relieved of his work because of ill-health. He died January 5, 1953 at Edgewood Sanatarium, Wilmington, Delaware. Brother Floyd Waters supplied the work until this Conference. His return is requested. He has done well with the youth. Total raised \$2,750.

ORIOLE (Alexander Boggs). After 5 years together pastor and people agree to part. They have done well. Total for all causes \$2,389.

PARSONSBURG (R. W. Dennis). Total benevolences \$600. Grand total \$5,082. New members 6. Pastor is invited to return for the fifth year.

POCOMOKE CITY (G. H. McMurray). Fifteen new members. A diligent pastor and a good preacher finds a loyal response. Church renovated, for trustees \$1,200; for benevolences \$400; salary advanced \$100; Total \$4,360.

PRINCESS ANNE (C. D. Gerald). New members 19. The church has excelled its own fine record. Salary \$2700; all collections in full. Evening services are restored, the Youth meet at 6.00 P. M. with the Pastor's wife. For trustees \$1,400. All purposes \$5375, including \$526 benevolences.

QUANTICO (J. T. Pruitt). The church is able but unwilling to advance. The salary was \$1,800, is now \$2,000. The pastor believes he can, and he does. Total raised \$4,700.

SALISBURY-JOHN WESLEY (C. A. Elder). This church has completed the payment of the mortgage of \$17,000 in 4 years. A ten-days drive just before Conference netted \$8,000. The church leads the district, with a total of \$9,424. Accessions 12.

SALISBURY-WHITE TEMPLE (H. D. Davis). The people respond to a progressive leader. All departments active. Services well attended. Committments from Visitation Evangelism 27; accessions 11. Raised for benevolences \$532; for all purposes \$5300.

SNOW HILL (G. T. Jackson). The Jacksons are a good team, extending their joint services to church and community. Salary advanced \$400; now \$2,600. Parsonage renovated. New members 22. Raised for all purposes \$5,782.

HUTT'S MEMORIAL-SHILOH (L. H. Jones). Loving kindness wins. A good work has been done. Friendship gladly returns to the circuit. Total \$2,200.

STOCKTON (A. W. Coffey). Appreciation for an amiable pastor grows. St. Paul has paid on church and parsonage \$1,496. Benevolences taken. St. Marks a mission point of 14 members raised \$500. Total \$3,800.

UNION ASBURY and LIBERIA (M. C. Anderson). A small membership carries on bravely. Raised for trustees \$125; improvements \$548; benevolences \$300; total \$3,300.

· UNIONVILLE (G. O. Commodore). One church is much stronger than the other, so a 50-50 basis of support is not expedient. The pastor graduates from the Maryland State College with class of 1953. He has been diligent. Raised for all causes \$3,298.

UPPER HILL (F. C. Kershaw). If sympathy and support could have given health to the pastor, he would be alive today. His able sermons, his zeal for the work, his planning won the hearty response of the people. But having been in ill health for several years, he declined, and passed on October 27, 1852. The remaining six months was led by two local preachers, Otto Maddox, and John Waters. The district superintendent gave special supervision and service. Raised for all causes \$2,750.

WACHAPREAGUE (E. J. Johnson). The pastor has labored earnestly for five years. He is invited to return. Raised for all purposes \$2,340.

WATTSVILLE (E. A. Hughes). The pastor has for five years led in civic as well as in the religious life of the community. For improvements \$1,200; Benevolences \$400; for all purposes \$4,291. New members 5.

WETIPQUIN (C. H. Cottingham). The pastor has done well for 4 years. He is "a good man and full of the Holy Spirit." For trustees \$1,546; for ministerial support \$1,800; total \$4,568. Accessions 3.

WHITE HAVEN (Roy S. Ennis). One church by withholding funds raised for various causes has prevented the charge from reporting in full. Total collections \$2,600; accessions 4.

WITHAMS (R. T. Crosswell). The pastor is invited to return for the 6th year. World service in full; total benevolences \$564; for trustees \$2,952; Total \$6,400. Pastor's salary advanced to \$2,200.

Summation

It seems best to allow the usual statistics to be brought out in the reports of the Treasurer and Statistician of the Conference.

There are 210 new members reported this year; last year 226. As we go on to establish reliable membership records, decreases are found here and there, but these are being balanced by increases in membership. A larger number of churches are conducting regular study groups for preparatory members, with excellent results.

Our pastors continue to attend the annual Ministers Institute held at the College.

Our annual Youth Assembly will again be held at Maryland State College, June 15-16-17.

Concerts given by college choirs, and by choirs from churches are tending to transcend the so-called Gospel-singers. The best costs no more than the second-best. The cultural interests of our people are determined by what is available in leadership both lay and pastoral, and in cooperation with agencies of a civic, social or religious type which are doing a work similar to our own.

Mrs. Emma Wilson Strother, District Director of Children's Work, carried on the work with children in a fine way. Our district reported the highest number of vacation church schools in the conference. Rev. Sercy L. Jones, District Director of Youth Work, conducted a very successful assembly and the spirit was high. Rev. J. U. ST. GEORGE. Jacob Caulk is a very conscientious pastor. He is leading this charge in an excellent way. Pastor and people are exultingly happy. A dining hall built costing \$1,000 and there is no debt on the same. Two conversions and three accessions. Benevolences and other apportionments paid in full. Raised for all purposes \$2,400.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE.

In the year 1951 the people of the United States spent \$9,150,000,000 for intoxicating liquors; in the same year, the alcoholic beverage industry spent \$225,000,000 in the way of advertisements.

It has been estimated that there are 67,000,000 drinkers in the United States.

Alcoholism is in our midst and is a disease of vast social importance; a destroyer of minds and bodies; a prime cause of vice and crime; a major factor in violence and deaths.

The wide-spread use of other narcotics has reached alarming proportions.

Certainly the Church cannot stand by indifferently when the security of the home is threatened.

The recent General Conference of the Church, conscious of the foregoing situation went on record, stating, that during this Quadrennium, Temperance will be made a principal emphasis; this carries with it the idea, that the Churches of Methodism will give the cause of Temperance a prominent place in their program.

Your Conference Board makes the following recommendations:

- 1. Holding a District Temperance Institute.
- 2. Temperance Committee in each Church.
- 3. Yearly observance of Commitment Sunday during Quadrennium.
- 4. Observance of World Temperance Sunday.
- 5. Conference Wide Circulation of the "Voice" Official Organ of the Board of Temperance.
 - 6. Cooperation with Organizations having worthy Temperance objectives.
- 7. Cooperation between Negro and White Annual Conferences in joint enterprises in promotion of Temperance in Areas.
 - 8. Cooperation with our General Board of Temperance.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Bishop Love and members of the Delaware Conference Assembled:

We, as members of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension are happy to bring a report of our stewardship for the past year.

We are becoming increasingly aware that Methodist Church extension strategy in our day will have a very marked influence upon the future usefulness of our church.

We have always been aware of the importance of Church Extension as the life line of the church. Wherever men have gone the church has followed.

The charter of the Board of Church Extension says that it is organized to assist in extending and establishing the institutions of Christianity and wherever necessary to secure available houses of religious worship and such other property as may promote the general design.

Organized church extension has aided in the erection of over forty-five thousand churches.

This fact caused one of our bishops one day to exclaim "God does not dwell among a people that does not make him a sanctuary."

So your board has tried to catch this spirit. It is our job to see to it that every sanctuary stays open and that new sanctuaries are created wherever men go.

During the past quadrennium, our General Board of Missions has granted \$4,413,778.18 in donation grants to 2344 projects and \$7,640,208.07 in loan grants to 876 projects. In other words 3220 extension projects were assisted with the imposing total of \$12,053,986.25.

Your conference has had its share of this, in gifts and loans.

May I say: to those of our churches who have shared in these loans, will you not make extra efforts to meet your obligations to the Board? Our record here is not enviable. In the proportion to which we meet the terms of our notes in like proportion the Board can assist some other needy sanctuary. Would it help if I should say to you that there are over 700 Methodist congregations worshiping in garages, basements, store fronts, right now needing help to build sanctuaries.

May I close this statement with a word of appreciation for the responsibility which you placed on me for the past four years and for the splendid men and women who have worked with me and accepted my chairmanship of the Board.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The aim of evangelism is to bring all men into living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ and divine Saviour and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit; to gather them into the fellowship of the Church; to lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every area of human life that the Kingdom of God may be realized. (Discipline 1464)

Our Conference Board of Evangelism is fully committed to put into practice this aim set forth by the General Conference.

Our Board has proposed plans whereby this aim will be carried out, not only on the Conference level, but on the District and Sub-district level as well; until each layman in even the most remote segment of our Conference will have been informed of this program.

Evangelism was stressed at each District Conference with special emphasis on Visitation Evangelism.

Representatives from the Boards and Agencies of the Conference met at the old Historic Barratt's Chapel south of Dover, November 12, 1952, in a Prayer Retreat. We came fasting and praying. It was an highly Spiritual day, highlighted with addresses on Prayer by the Dr. R. B. Thompson, District Superintendent of the Salisbury District and Dr. Grant S. Shockley, pastor of Whatcoat Methodist Church, Dover, Delaware.

Our Conference Board of Evangelism is cooperating fully with the General Board of Evangelism in the World Methodist Convocation to be held in Philadelphia, Pa. June 26-28th.

According to "CONCERN" of March 1953, there are 19,000,000 young people in America who are not touched by any church.

Our Board is working with the Conference Board of Education and the Conference MYF in sponsoring a "Christian Witness Mission" (formerly the Youth Work Camp) at Wilmington, Delaware, July 27 to Aug. 3rd, 1953. We have accepted the request from the Washington Conference for their youth to participate in this MISSION. The places of operation to be:

South Wilmington and the Dunleigh Estate (Where the proposed Coleman Memorial Church is to be built).

THE BOARD RECOMMENDS:

- Meeting of Conference Secretary of Evangelism and the five Dist. Secty's and the Dist. Supts. to plan definite goals for 1953, which will include—
 - A-District prayer and Preparation Retreats patterned after the Conference Wide Retreat. Inviting
 - (a) The president of each local church, Commission on Evangelism and the pastor.
- (1) Discuss work of the Commission.
- (2) The Report blank and the Conference and District goals.
 - B. —Sub-district Meetings of the entire local church Commission on Evangelism.
 - (1) To further study the work of the Commission.
 - (2) Plan Sub-District prayer Retreats, etc.
- 2.—In view of the report from the General Conference of the staggering figure of 18,000,000 homes in America where there is not a single person who is a member of any church;
 - We recommend that time be allowed at the District Stewards' Meetings, each Preachers' Meeting and all other gatherings (where possible) for the Evangelistic Emphasis.

We further suggest that in view of all the free literature that our General Board supplies and other literature that can be obtained at a nominal fee,—

That each pastor and good literature secretary will keep on display for the use of the members a plentiful supply of this Evangelistic literature, and especially the "SHEPHERDS" magazine which should be in the hands of each member of the Commission on Evangelism.

We further recommend that the goal for the Delaware Conference for the quadrennium be 20% increase in membership.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Whereas; there has been an ever increasing interest in the health and welfare needs of the people of the nation and whereas, there has been a steady and continuing growth of population beyond the age of 65.

Whereas; there has been a deepened concern in our Conference and conscience has been aroused to promote a Christian program of care especially for the aged.

Therefore be it resolved;

- (1) that a Golden Cross Society be organized in the Delaware Annual Conference in accordance with Par. 1569 of the 1952 discipline and that a Conference and District Director of Golden Cross be appointed.
- (2) that a committee on Hospital and Homes be organized and that a Golden Cross Director be appointed in each local church. This committee shall cooperate with the pastor and church lay leader in the promotion of the total program of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes.
- (3) that there be an Annual Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday observed in every local church, date to be designated by the Bishop and Cabinet.
- (4) that we strongly recommend that the local church make full use of the literature of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes.
- (5) We recommend that our Board be authorized to rescind the action taken in the resolution passed by Conference last year as printed on page 117 of 1952 Journal and release the owner of the option, reason being Trustees, the General Board and Cabinet does not approve location of property.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Program of the Conference Board of Education is based on the belief that Christian education includes every experience of persons through which they grow in their commitment to Christ. We further expect this commitment to be expressed in terms of Christian attitudes and ideas which are the real product of their Christian faith. Unless our program causes changes in the lives of children, youth and adults in the direction of Christian growth, then it cannot be called a program of Christian education.

In a real effort to bring about this change in the lives of persons within our conference, the Board of Education has been expanding its program rapidly. We are also confident that our organizations are growing increasingly more effective We are giving herewith a brief summary of our activities.

I-Children's Work

Our teaching of children must be simple and effective. Superficial teaching will not meet the demands which the present day makes upon the Christian Education of children. We must find ways to bring little children and growing boys and girls into a real fellowship with God. Only God can give them the kind of strength and insight which they need as they grow toward maturity in these days of unrest.

The leaders of our conference and districts and other volunteer workers with children have been a source of inestimable help to the local church school workers who look to them for assistance.

One of the means of helping these workers improve their skill was the Laboratory School for Children's Workers held at Teacher's College, Glass-

boro, N. J. Seventeen persons from our conference were enrolled. Christian Workers' Schools have also been a source of help for the many local church workers who enrolled in the classes for children's workers.

Vacation Church Schools are growing in effectiveness and in numbers. There was a total of 75 schools held during the summer with an enrollment of 5,337 pupils.

In the days that lie ahead we shall put forth every effort to reach more children with Christian teaching; strengthen the Christian family life; and seek to make the community where the child must grow and develop, more conducive to Christian growth.

II-Youth Work

One of the most important responsibilities in youth work is to work with youth and the leaders of youth in developing a program emphasis, training experiences and giving guidance to the ongoing program of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. We have not overlooked the importance of enlisting and training adults who work with youth on the district and in the local churches.

DISTRICT ASSEMBLIES: We are grateful for the significant work which is being done with youth on the districts. The attendance, interest and program of each assembly were very encouraging. There can be no doubt that the interest of our youth is taken into account in the total planning of our district work. There is, however, a need for planning our summer program so that we will not duplicate the work which we are carrying on at the Conference Assembly held at Morgan State College. Steps in this direction have been taken and results will be seen perhaps this summer (1953).

As in the past, there are large numbers of intermediates present at these district gatherings. We must plan to meet their needs as well as those of seniors and older youth. Our districts are striving to meet this need and they are to be commended on their efforts thus far. More and more we are convinced that we must institute a camping program within the conference for your youth, especially for the senior high age.

It is gratifying to note the growing interest on the part of our pastors and adults who work with youth at the various district youth meetings. We are mindful that without the local support of these consecrated workers our attempts to meet the needs of youth will fail.

THE CONFERENCE ASSEMBLY: The summer assembly which serves our seniors and older youth was held at Morgan State College. The program was planned to meet the needs of our local churches. The local Methodist Youth Fellowship was at the center of every program featured. As in the past few years, adults who work with youth were invited and received training in their fields.

Fraternal delegates from conferences of the South Eastern Jurisdiction were present. Their sharing in the fellowship and total program resulted in an experience which was mutually helpful. The Pastors who were in attendance at the School of Methods shared some of our evening program and otherwise contributed to the total experience of the Assembly. The enrollment was fifty per cent increase over the previous year. The total enrollment was 148 youth and 9 adults who work with youth.

NATIONAL PLANNING CONFERENCE: We were privileged to have our Conference Director to participate in the National Planning Conference for Methodist Youth held at Purdue University, W. Lafayette, Ind. It was at this conference that about 200 youth and adults set about the task of building a program which would meet the needs of our youth in these days of tension. Out of this sharing and prayerful planning grew what is known as the "Youth Emphasis". Our conference program for the coming year will be built in accord with the general provision found in this emphasis.

MISSIONARY RALLIES AND METHODIST YOUTH FUND: Our Missionary Rallies are rapidly becoming some of our most outstanding projects. They are not only opportunities for effective guidance in missionary education of our youth, but they are also becoming one of the chief sources for raising our Methodist Youth Fund. All five districts conducted their rallies on the Friday after Thanksgiving. A total of 544 youth and adults participated in this project.

FORWARD PROGRAM: In cooperation with the Boards of Evangelism, Education and the Youth Council we are planning a Christian Witness Mission, formerly called, Work Camp of Evangelism. This project will be held in Wilmington, Del. July 26 to August 2, 1953. We are anticipating a real spiritual awaking of our youth who are privileged to share in this effort to bring others to Christ.

As we seek to build and promote the youth program in the days that lie ahead we are thrilled with the challenge of the adventure in seeking to lead our youth to more vital Christian living.

Adult Work

We are convinced that all adults must be taught the Christian way of life. We must seek to discover the needs of our adults and plan a study program which is in keeping with these needs. Of course adults must have a part in the determining of this program. To this end our Adult Council has sought to increase the number of adult classes in the church schools.

YOUNG ADULTS: While we have encouraged the promotion of work among all adults, our major effort has been in the area of young adult work. We have sought to help the local churches to carry on their young adult program through conducting adult workshops on all of the districts. These workshops have proven to be of utmost importance in stimulating young adult fellowships throughout the conference.

The Convocation for Adults held at Buck Hill Falls, Pa. served as a most helpful experience to those twenty two persons who attended from our conference. The delegates at the Convocation agreed to return to Buck Hill Falls on March 10-13, 1955. Our council is considering the possibility of holding a convocation within the conference some time during 1954. Such a meeting would make it possible for us to bring the best in adult leadership and other resources in the reach of all of our churches.

Training Opportunities: In addition to the convocation and the workshops referred to above there were other opportunities for our leaders to be trained for their task. Mr. Joseph Bedford, Director of the Dover District, was invited to attend a nation-wide meeting of adult workshops held in Nashville, Tenn. in Feb. 23-27, 1953.

Mr. Wayne Cuff, Conference President of the Young Adult Fellowship, has also given leadership to local churches on a number of occasions during the year. We are grateful for the cooperation of the conference and district workers, who in turn, were supported by the pastors and others in the local churches in the interest of more effective work among adults of all ages.

IV-General Church School work.

CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENTS FELLOWSHIPS. One of the most significant pieces of work done in the year was the holding of a series of meetings of Church School Superintendents on all of the districts. Dr. John A. Green of the General Board of Education and Rev. Levi B. Miller Executive Secretary of the Washington Conference, were our resource leaders. At each meeting an organization was set up in order to promote a larger fellowship of the Church School workers on the districts. 332 Superintendents and other workers attended these meetings.

CHURCH SCHOOL ENROLLMENT. We are happy to report that the church school enrollment is still on the increase. The report to the conference of 1952 showed an over-all increase of 625 as compared with the previous year.

PROMOTION OF SPECIAL DAYS. We are confident that an ever increasing number of churches are observing the special days in the church schools both with an appropriate program, and where required, a special offering. The fourth Sunday Offering for World Service is well supported. Rally Day Offering shows a steady increase each year. Race Relations Day Offering and Methodist Student Day Offering show slight increases. See the report of the Conference Treasurer for the amounts reported for the year.

We are aware of having our schools do more in the way of reaching the unreached and of maintaining higher average attendance. We would also urge the Pastors to make full use of the church school as a field for evangelism. We will keep in mind that more than fifty percent of the church membership increase comes from the church schools of our conference.

V-Leadership Education.

"The church that exerts the greatest influences on the cause of human affairs in the present and future will be the church that develops a leadership equal to the demands of our times". Operating on this general principle, we seek to promote such leadership activities as will help our churches improve their leadership. Our Christian Worker's Schools have been our chief means of assisting the workers in the local churches. We held 16 subdistrict schools with a total enrollment of 1462 pupils.

We are grateful to the District Superintendents, the Pastors, the 16 Deans and 76 Instructors who promoted and conducted these schools. To date we have on file the names of 40 certified deans and 102 certified instructors. We do not have a more faithful group of workers than this staff which gives leadership to our education program.

Appreciation

The results of our year's work which are indicated in this report were made possible through the fine support, cooperation and Christian fellowship of the Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors and over 200 volunteer Workers representing members of our Conference, districts and subdistrict staffs, as well as the many loyal workers in the local churches. This has been a year of Christian growth for us as individuals and as an organization of Christian workers. We face the future with confidence and hope.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

If our youth are to have opportunities to express their Christian convictions through vocations, then the church has a responsibility to provide such opportunities. As the General Church faced this situation in 1948 the General Conference set up the Interboard Committee on Church Vocations. Provision was also made for the annual conference to organize the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations.

Our commission has been set up and has been at work for the past three years. Through the local churches, district assemblies, the conference youth assembly and a conference on church vocations we have been able to recruit a number of young people for vocations within the church.

To date we have on file the names of our youth who have made the following commitments:

REPORT OF CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY 1952-58

The responsibility of serving the Delaware Annual Conference as Conference Missionary Secretary is appreciated. The privilege of working with the laymen and fellow clergymen has been an enriching experience. May I express my sincere thanks to my predecessor, W. H. Mears, for his orientation, advice, and encouragement.

I am sure that you are aware that the basic sustenance of the Conference work will be maintained through the missionary phase of our Christian endeavor, especially as it is effected in the areas of promotion, cultivation and education. If the Delaware Conference is to successfully and adequately meet the increasing and changing challenges of our Urban and Rural situations we must of necessity bring to bear deeper concern in the aforementioned phases of the missionary enterprise.

THE LOCAL CHURCH, Promotion, Cultivation and Education have not always been at the heart of the missionary program within the local church. Rather, we have given our energies to the raising of funds for the support of the work of the church without being particular about the form or manner or content, which encompassed our fund raising. Although we recognize the magnitude of the local obstacles which many pastors must face in bringing to life the missionary program within the local parish, we must be cautious less expediency rob us of the long range benefits of a positive and creative program of nurture. The local church is the nurturing chamber for the missionary program and life of the church. The local congregation must be fed the kind of food which contains the kind of nutrients that will prove to be strengthening and fruitful with the years. Christian stewardship must undergird our total program.

The Commission on Missions is a must in every local church. Every Pastor has the responsibility to see that this commission is at work in his local church—not purely as a fund raising agency—but also as an agency of promotion, cultivation and education in the missionary areas of work. Let us not lose sight of the duties of this commission. It must, (1) Inform the People, (2) Plan an Annual School of Missions, (3) Promote World Service, (4) Secure Missionary Specials, (5) Circulate the World Outlook, (6) Recruit (for) Full-time Christian Workers.

LEADERSHIP EDUCATION FOR MISSIONS. The district missionary secretary is the resource person for his district. Working with his district superintendent he should always be ready to make adequate and wise suggestions in keeping with the program of the general church. In order that the district missionary secretary might be properly prepared to carry out his work it is necessary for him to attend the regional leadership training conference on missionary education. This investment will be an increasing asset to his district. It is not enough to follow the traditional patterns—rather his task is to call to the attention of all concerned the most recent techniques, methods and programs for the promotion, cultivation and education of his district in the area of missions.

In keeping with this policy, the conference missionary secretary, the district missionary secretaries of the Philadelphia and Wilmington districts and the chairman of the conference board of missions attended the missionary training conference at Silver Bay, on Lake George, New York. It is our hope that every district of the Delaware Conference will be represented at Silver Bay this summer.

Among the courses available for study last summer were the following: "Missionary Education in the Local Church", "Churches' Stake in World Orders," "Visual Education Workshop," "The Bible and Christian Missions", "Christian Stewardship and Our World Missions", "The Philosophy of Christian Missions"; Seminar and Workshop for workers with Youth and Children, respectively. Among the special features were: Denominational Workshops, Missionary Fellowship Hour; Interpretive Addresses in the areas of Home and Foreign Missions.

YOUTH AND MISSIONS. Much progress has been made in this area. The annual missionary rallies for youth are held on the Friday following Thanksgiving on every district in our conference. A versatile program of education, cultivation, promotion and inspiration is carried out. The district directors of youth work, district secretaries of youth work (W.S.C.S.), the district superintendents, the conference director of youth work and the executive secretary of christian education form the responsible teams for this work.

It is our hope that each local church through its youth division in cooperation with the secretary of youth work (W.S.C.S.) and the pastor that stress and encouragement will be made regarding the making of personal pledges by each youth to the cause of missions through the Methodist. Youth Fund.

EVENTS AROUND WHICH THE MISSIONARY MOVEMENT IN THE LOCAL CHURCH MIGHT BE ENRICHED:

June, July, August: Each local church send representatives to missionary training conferences. Plan year's work in advance.

September: Labor Sunday; emphasize migrant work, Christianity and labor.

October: Worldwide Communion Sunday (1st Sunday).

November: Emphasis on World Peace; Thanksgiving, Church-wide membership canvas.

December: Universal Bible Sunday (2nd Sunday); Christmas.

January: Missionary Study Unit: Youth Week in the Local Church (Last Sunday).

February: Race Relations Day: Brotherhood Week.

The Season of Lent: Special missionary series, etc.

Fourth Sunday each month: World Service Sunday—emphasize the work need of the agencies of the church.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY COMMITTEE REPORT.

Here in America we are beset by a deep longing for security. We want security against poverty, sickness, unemployment, old age and war. Are we seeking security through the wrong methods? Can it be obtained through the building of more tanks, air-craft carriers and atomic bombs?

Many Americans believe that as a result of the death of Stalin, and the elevation of Malenkov as leader of Russia, plus Russia's present attitude toward peace; here lies a possible solution to the word's problems.

There are individuals in America who think the President of the United States holds the key to the solution of the World's ills.

We do not believe that the present conditions in America or the world can be remedied by Men's ingenuity, alone, but through men working with Christ.

There is no longer room in America for an external form of Christianity, America is entering upon a period of Catastrophe and Crisis, where we are being forced to take sides, and in which a higher and more mature kind of spiritual life will be demanded of all Christians.

1953

Bishop and members of the Delaware Conference, it is again my privilege to report to you the stewardship of our Lay Activities.

MEN'S WORK:

It is gratifying to know that our men on a whole are becoming more eager to be informed of our Church program. Our untiring efforts have paid great dividends. Our Ministers and Lay Leaders have done a splendid job among men. We will not stop until we have a chartered active men's group in each local church. You can learn much from others when you are chartered.

This year we want to stress boys work among our men's groups. We want to have our kick off meeting in August when we hope to have (500) five hundred men and boys in attendance.

LAY LEADERSHIP:

We feel proud of the progress made the past year among our laymen. Both women and men seem to have taken on new life. They are eager to know more about their church. I am told that in many conferences laymen are not ready for our revised program of our church. I am glad to say the Delaware Conference is ready. I predict that we will under this new program go forward with leaps and bounds. I know the ministers will give more praise to laymen at the close of next conference year.

The purpose of our Lay Board is to deepen the spiritual lives of laymen until they become an active working force in the local church. Pastors will help laymen by telling them when they do a nice job. You know everybody likes to be told of well doing.

TRAINING OF OFFICIAL BOARDS:

The training of an official board is the key note of success in the local church. Our greatest drawback is uninformed officials in our local church. Official members may not know the work when elected, but they can study and learn together. It will pay in the end if you dare to train laymen. A local church is no stronger than its Official Board.

LAY SPEAKING AND PREACHING:

Our Methodist Church was started by laymen. There were about seven or eight young men who felt that they should do something about the conditions of their day, and so, they banded themselves together to study how they could change the every day living of folks around them. This group was called the 'Holy Group'. This story should encourage every layman to want to do something about serving his day and generation. Every layman should read Bishop Charles C. Selecman's book, "THE METHODIST PRIMER", that will give you a brief history of your church.

YOUNG ADULTS:

This is one of our weaknesses in our lay work. We are studying how to win young men and women in their early twenties and thirties; they are our future officials. We want our speakers bureau to be built around them.

This has been a banner year in lay evangelism. Laymen have rejoiced in winning their fellow men and women to Christ. We can truly say we have an evangelistic church. Many of our Churches observe the evangelistic effort in February. This is not new, using laymen to win persons to Christ. Jesus did it when he was on earth. John Wesley did it when he started the Methodist Church. We must do it if we are to meet the challenge of today. We hope that the commission on membership and Evangelism will have for their ongoing program, the winning of souls.

OUR LAY ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

This was one of the best conferences in history. It was two days of studying together. Some of our best Church men, both ministers and laymen were leading in the study of our four commissions which are the basic structure of our official board in the local church. This to my mind was the finest demonstration of ministers and laymen working together. I feel that every person that attended this meeting was enriched and encouraged to go back to his church and work. We had on Sunday morning an old time class meeting when all present rejoiced in the Lord.

We closed our Conference with a preacher of all times, the Rev. Richard Johnson, District Superintendent of the Washington Conference of Washington, D. C. Our annual conference is both inspirational. spiritual and educational. Every layman who can should make the sacrifice to attend.

MY GRATITUDE:

I have not words to express my gratitude to my co-workers. The ministers and laymen. My District and Associate District Lay Leaders. They are due the credit for the great success that we have had this year. May God ever enrich and deepen their spiritual lives until this world shall be the kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ through their service to Him.

OUR BELOVED BISHOP:

I could not close this report without paying tribute to Bishop Edgar A. Love and his lovely wife. He has been a great inspiration to us. He is princely and alert. Bishop knows where he is going and we are willing to follow. It is a great pleasure and privilege to serve. May I be worthy of this privilege.

BY-LAWS OF THE BALTIMORE AREA OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be called the Baltimore Area of The Methodist Church

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

Object of the Baltimore Area shall be to provide administrative oversight for the four Annual Conferences comprising the Area: Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington. This shall be a non-profit organization.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

The voting members shall be the Bishop of the Baltimore Area, Area Secretary, District Superintendents of the several Annual Conferences, and the following officers of each Annual Conference: the Conference lay leader, the Conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Conference executive Secretary of Christian Education, the Conference president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism; one pastor from each District in each of the Conferences elected by the District; presidents of colleges and Wesley Foundations within the bounds of the Area

Non-Voting members—any pastor or layman in attendance has the privilege of the floor

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Baltimore Area shall be: President, the presiding Bishop of the Area; two Vice Presidents, one of whom shall be a woman; a recording secretary and a treasurer. These officers other than the president shall be elected quadrennially and shall hold office until their successors are elected. All elective officers shall be chosen by ballot.

Duties of officers shall be those commonly associated with office. The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the meetings and circulate them in mimeographed form to the members. The treasurer shall receive all monies for the expense of the Area and pay all bills incident to meetings and make an itemized report to the presiding bishop after each meeting and deposit such balance as may be in hand with the Area office.

ARTICLE V

COMMITTEES

Executive Committee: The District Superintendents of the several Conferences shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Baltimore Area and function for it ad interim.

Committees: Standing Committees of the Baltimore Area shall be: Education, Missions, Finance, Membership and Evangelism, Credentials, Courtesy and Program, and such other committees as may be found necessary. All others shall be appointed by the Resident Bishop, subject to approval by the Baltimore Area.

ARTICLE VI

MEETING

The Baltimore Area shall meet at least twice during a quadrennium, such meetings to be known as the Baltimore Area Council, the first meeting being within the fiscal year following the General Conference of The Methodist Church, subsequent meetings to be determined by the Resident Bishop.

ARTICLE VII

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The budget for the support of the Baltimore Area shall be determined by the Bishop and submitted proportionately to the several Annual Conferences, subject to their approval.

ARTICLE VIII

THE AREA PAPER

There shall be published monthly an Area journal to be called the Baltimore Area Messenger, edited by the Area Secretary and such associates as he may select.

ARTICLE IX LOCATION

The offices of the Baltimore Area shall be in the City of Baltimore, Md.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Baltimore Area by two-thirds majority of those present and voting; provided, however, that such amendments be submitted in duplicate at least two days before being acted upon.

12th ANNUAL REPORT of the DELAWARE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE (Revised)

1953-54

Bishop Edgr A. Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Conference:

We, the Commission on World Service and Finance, greet the Conference in this our 12th Annual Report, with joy and hope.

The Commission held its Pre-Conference meeting March 11, at Tindley Temple, Philadelphia, Pa. The purpose of the meeting was to review Conference giving up to that time and accept the Budget Askings for the ensuing year, making whatever adjustments deemed advisable for the year of 1953-54.

After the closing of the year of 1952, proper notices of the desire of the Conference for audit of all Treasurers' books in keeping with Disciplinary regulations were sent out. All Treasurers responded as requested. The examinations were made in the most careful manner, and in the opinion of the Auditing Committee, said accounts are accurate and satisfactory.

The Episcopal Committee's selection of Dr. Edgar A. Love to be our Resident Bishop was accepted with appreciation and enthusiasm by the members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, Conferences with Bishop Love have been most helpful, and we feel that they have promoted efficiency and dispatch. This service was so willingly and wisely given by Bishop Love that we assume our services with him in high hope and great expectation, in advancing the work of the Kingdom of Christ.

RECOMMENDATIONS

ONE. We recommend that a Manual of Finance be mimeographed by the Commission on World Service and Finance to aid the Pastors and Laymen in gaining better understanding of the financial operations of the Conference and the General Program of Methodism. The contents of the Manual being I. FOREWORD. II. CONFERENCE BUDGET. III. CONFERENCE FINANCIAL PROGRAM. (a) How the budget is determined. (b) How apportioned to the charges. (c) How money is handled. IV. YOUR DOLLAR AT WORK. V. ADDITIONAL FINANCE ACTIVITIES. We suggest that

copies be distributed to official members and used for study and discussion in Committees and Boards of the Local Churches.

TWO. The Commission recommends that the Superintendents' salaries be placed in a Special Fund and paid out by the Conference Treasurer on a monthly basis.

THREE. The Commission recommends that the Treasurer visit each District Steward's Meeting to give explanation to Pastors and District Superintendents in making first payments to the General or Promotional and Cultivation Fund.

FOUR. We recommend that Minute money be apportioned to the churches by Districts.

FIVE. That a Chairman, preferably a woman, be appointed Director of the Golden Cross.

SIX. The Commission recommends that all Boards and Commissions that do not have their books audited by the Commission, and who receive money from the Conference Treasurer, send in their reports of such audit duly signed by the auditors who do the auditing.

SEVEN. The Commission recommends that late reports coming to the Treasurer be so printed in the minutes, and that at the discretion of the Treasurer, monies may be accepted at the seat of the Conference in session, but that the delayed reports not be included in the Treasurer's Annual Report to the Conference in session.

EIGHT. That a certified Public Accountant be secured to audit the books of the Treasurer, and all other Treasurers.

Wherever he went he radiated a beautiful Christian influence that becomes an apostle of God, known and read of all men. His mind moved always on a high plane serene and noble, and his vision extended to all problems of the Kingdom of God.

His Christian piety was as unostentatious as it was sincere. Regular in the performance of his spiritual duties, he was truly an example of all that he preached and taught.

By means of preaching the gospel and teaching the Jesus way of life by precept and example, he helped to lift the moral and spiritual standard of the communities in which he served. Although his physical stature will be missed, his moral influence will be felt by those who survive.

His first marriage was to Miss Bertha Holmes who preceded him in death during his pastorate Dames Quarter, Md. He is survived by Mrs. Ella Shockley Price, whom he met and married during his pastorate at Fruitland, Md., one adopted daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Dennis, of Philadelphia, one brother, Mr. Lewis Price also of Philadelphia, and five grandchildren.

Annie Eliza King Nutter

Annie Eliza King Nutter, daughter of the late Levin and Priscilla King, born at Allen, Wicomico County, Maryland, on September 28, 1859, and departed this life on Monday, May 26, 1952, at her home in Pocomoke City. Maryland. She would have been 93 years of age next September 28th.

On March 25, 1880, she was united in wedlock to the late Rev. John

Henry Nutter, then a teacher in the Mount Vernon District, Somerset Co., Md. To this union ten children were born, four boys and six girls. On March 25, 1949, Dr. and Mrs. Nutter celebrated their 69th wedding anniversary—the longest marriage union in the history of the Delaware Conference, and one of the longest in Methodist history.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP AND THE FINE ARTS

Motion (of Daniel Lyman Ridout)

That a Conference Commission on Worship and the Fine Arts be elected by the Conference, on recommendation of the General Commission on Worship and the Fine Arts; said commission to consist of one minister and one layman from each District; the Conference member of the commission to be an ex-officio member, or a member-at-large.

Duties of the Conference Commission on Worship and the Fine Arts will be:

1. To prepare and direct the conduct of worship services at all official Annual Conference sessions, subject to approval of or change by the Annual Conference program committee.

- 2. On the District level, to plan and direct the conduct of worship services at District meetings, subject to the approval of the District Superintendent and such program committees as he may choose for his several meetings.
- 3. To sponsor Seminars on Worship and the Fine Arts on District and Conference-wide levels, where practicable.
- 4. To prepare and perfect resources in the field of Ritual and Orders of Worship and to disseminate as widely as possible information and aids on Worship and the Fine Arts, as a means of leading our people to more meaningful worship experiences and a higher appreciation of the Fine Arts.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; And lean not unto thine own understanding, In all thy ways acknowledge Him And He shall direct thy paths." Prov. 3: 5-6

These majestic words from the book of Proverbs, contain one of the greatest spiritual promises which has been claimed by Methodist women in every age. The Woman's Society of Christian Service has moved through these history making years, depending upon a higher power for guidance and direction. Such dependence is a part of the heritage which came to the society when we were united 12 years ago, and one which must be perpetuated through all time.

"They looked unto Him and were lightened; and their faces were not ashamed." Pa 34: 5. How lovely are the faces of Women who talk with God—Lit with an inner asureness of the path their feet have trod. In days such as these, we need to spend much time in His presence, asking for an inner peace and tranquility of spirit, that those we meet upon the busy way may catch the Christ glow reflected in our service and know that we have been with Him.

During the year we have been actors on the stage of the Delaware Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. Some of us have leading roles, all of us have had important parts with different lines. Some lines have spoken of finance, some of promotion, some of the needs of groups in the local church, others of children, youth and student work. It takes a true artist to play whatever role God assigns to her through the years. To play these parts will require discipline, which comes through hard work and sacrifice. We need to play our part with ears keen for the promoters words. If you listen to the inner voice to give our cues, the right words and actions will come naturally.

To my mind there is absolutely no field, in which our christian service counts for so much, as that of the local church, for upon the strength of the local church, the strength of every other enterprise depends.

The first object, therefore, of every Methodist woman is to be sure that the local to which she belongs receives the very cream of her time, talents, and service, that it may be strongly and firmly established with the Woman's Society of Christian Service or the Wesleyan Service Guild. For the rank and file of professing christians, the local church is the field the rank and file of professing christians, the local church of Service. Only a few can serve in administrative capacities, on Conferons

ence committees, or Jurisdiction of Division boards; only a few go to the Missions Field. Most of us stay at home and work in our local church. But our field there can be as large or as small in its scope as our breadth of vision and devotion indicates. Our service depends on what we see in our task.

Fidelity to Christ clearly involves a continuous loyalty to his church. The church is the mother of our souls, through her service and influence we first learn of God. At her service we worship and find inspiration and strength. By sharing in her world-wide service we build a Christian world.

Knowing that the Woman's Society of Christian Service is a part of the Methodist Church, and that as such it has a place in the total program of the church; I trust all pastors are making full use of the Woman's Society. As we are going into these special weeks of Evangelistic emphasis, the Secretary of Spiritual Life should be an active part of your commission on membership and evangelism, and the chairman of the committee on membership is interested in new people, in visiting and contacting people for the church.

The Woman's Society is the most important organization in the church. And in order to know their work the minister must have some knowledge of their magazines, such as the Methodist Woman and the World Outlook, the study courses and the program material.

A review of the past quadrenniums indicates much for which we are all sincerely grateful; increases along all lines of endeavors, more members, more study classes, more prayer groups, more magazines, more missionaries, more money. We pass quickly from achievements to the challenge of the future; all fields at home and abroad are wide open for the messengers and message. The call has gone for "An immensely larger and more effective witness to the gospel and the christian way of life against the background of the world's present need." Rarely has such a challenge been made to an organized body of christian women. It will require the best which each individual member can give. Our members in the church and in the society will become more meaningful as we throw every talent and ability into the evangelistic campaign.

The theme for the Quadrennium "That the Kingdom of God may be realized". This will require increased promotion and education that more women may share in its enriching experience. It will require more workers on every front. It will require more money and above all, it will require increased spiritual insight to match the opportunity of the years ahead.

We are happy to have the districts speak through the pages of the minutes. It is hoped as we are made aware of the accomplishments in various districts a new district pride and consciousness may be awakened, so that we shall strive more diligently to meet the goals set for us and as a result our conference may make a worthy contribution to the total program of the Woman's Division. It is a mighty chain, this Woman's Society of Christian Service, yet the chain is no stronger than its weakest link.

A BRIEF REPORT FROM DISTRICTS

DOVER—We are grateful to Almighty God for the work accomplished during the year on the district; despite the illness of many, and through the

cooperation of our loyal women we have been able to carry on. New and increased interest has been aroused. This is evident by the splendid attendance at all our district meetings. Many new members have joined our ranks. We are happy to report that there is an active society on every charge except one.

Together with the ministers' wives, ministers and laymen we tendered our former District Superintendent and his wife, a banquet at the William Henry High School, Dover, Del., upon their leaving for another field of labor. A baby contest on district level was very successful. Officers Training Day was held. Most of the societies have had study courses. Also World Day of Prayer was observed in most of the churches. The attendance at the School of Missions last year was the best yet from the district. Many attended at their own expense. One of the highlights this year was the visit to the district by Miss Mildred Drescher, field worker for the Woman's Division, a returned missionary from India. She brought us inspiration and help. She spoke in two churches and three schools and at each point a crowded house. The adults and children alike were favorably impressed, that during her visit to the William C. Jason High School, Georgetown, Del., one of the teachers (a young woman) has almost decided to go in training for full time Christian Service.

The fellowship has been wonderful and we have gone from each meeting with the feeling of the Disciple who said, "Did not our hearts burn while He tarried with us by the way?" We shall continue to proclaim the good news.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion, or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:
(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn.
(3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and is sustained by a two-third vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.
