

## GREETINGS

In the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! We the Pastor, officers and members are honored by this privilege of entertaining the members and friends of the Ninety-Second Session of our Delaware Annual Conference. Your last visit with us was in 1933 when the late Rev. J. E. A. Johns was pastor and the late Dr. Charles A. Tindley stirred the hearts of those who heard him preach from the subject "For the Battle is the Lords." We here at Janes are witnesses along with you that the battle is the Lords and are rejoicing in being a part of His Army.

As you no doubt know, Janes Memorial Methodist Church was organized in the year 1872. A group of loyal Methodists from the Eastern Shore of Maryland came to Germantown and found here no church of their faith. They set about to establish one. The late Rev. Wesley Parker, who was pastor of Zoar Methodist Church and a few of his officials came to their rescue, and organized them and called the church, Janes Methodist Episcopal Church—a memorial to Bishop Edward S. Janes, one of the great leaders of our church. These sixteen members purchased a little frame building which was originally a School House.

This little church grew spiritually and financially, and over a span of twenty years, its membership increased from sixteen to two hundred. Some of the pastors in the early days of the church were: Rev. George H. Waters, Rev. Perry W. Pipes, Rev. Joshua Brinkley, Rev. A. R. Shockley, Rev. Berry W. Allen, Rev. J. H. Pierce, Rev. L. Y. Cox, Rev. Hooper Jolly, Rev. King J. Still; Rev. Arthur Hamilton, Rev. J. H. Riddicks, Rev. J. W. Lankford, Rev. Solomon Hammond, Rev. E. H. Webb, Rev. W. C. Jason and Rev. A. P. Camphor, who later became Bishop Camphor and went to Africa as a missionary accompanied by his wife, and Rev. Willis C. Dickerson. In 1898 under the pastorate of Rev. J. F. Molock, the frame church was torn down and a stone structure was erected at the corner of Belfield Avenue and Haines Street, costing \$7,375.00; following him was Rev. W. F. Cotton.

In 1905 the Rev. J. R. Waters was assigned to the church and during his stay a parsonage was purchased on East Haines Street and a new pipe organ installed. Rev. J. T. Fletcher came in 1912 and served seven years. He and his loyal congregation labored well and succeeded in paying off an indebtedness of \$3,700.00. Church membership increased to three hundred and sixty-eight (368). With a view toward building a new and larger church, a piece of ground was purchased on Haines Street near Germantown Avenue. This was made possible through the influence of Mr. W. S. Pilling, a member of the First Methodist Church and a life-long friend of Janes.

In April, 1919, Rev. J. E. A. Johns became the pastor, the membership grew and the spiritual life of the church developed and the financial gains were notable. Rev. Johns was made District Superintendent of the Salisbury District in 1923. Rev. J. H. Scott was sent to succeed Rev. Johns and raised a large sum of money for the proposed new church. Rev. Scott spent three years as pastor. In 1926, Rev. D. W. Henry came and we set out to carry out the plans of our new church.

## GREETINGS (Continued)

The second church building was sold to be used as a Catholic Church for \$22,500.00 and in February, 1927, work began on the new structure. During this period, church services were held at the YWCA. The doors of Bethel A.M.E. Church were open to us for special services, funerals, etc.

In 1929, Rev. Henry was promoted to the District Superintendency of the Salisbury District, but he left a church, resplendent with Gothic Arches spanning its ceilings, beautiful stained glass windows, a pipe organ and a united sacrificing people. This church, one of the most beautiful in the Central Jurisdiction or shall we say Methodism, is a monument to this great leader who has since been called to his reward. To this new, not quite completed Janes, received Rev. J. E. A. Johns for the second time.

In June, 1929, with a song of triumph on their lips and a prayer of praise in their hearts, the membership marched into their new Cathedral. This building was dedicated in March, 1930, by the late Bishop E. C. Richardson.

Rev. F. H. Butler served as pastor of Janes from 1937 to 1941 and it was in these days of an economic depression when churches were being threatened with foreclosures that both pastor and people were put to the test, for it was only by their sacrifices and good management that Janes was able to carry on while meeting the obligations of the Conference and General Church, meanwhile bearing the burden of her debt.

In the passing of Rev. Butler, Methodism lost a great leader. Rev. H. R. Coleman came to Janes in 1941. He was not only a preacher, but a man of vision. During his stay, a new parsonage was bought and furnished. The pews and carpets were put in at an approximate cost of \$6,000.00. The church debt was reduced to \$15,400.00. The church membership was about six hundred (600).

Rev. Coleman, like three of his predecessors, was promoted to the District Superintendent and was sent to serve on the Wilmington District in April, 1947. The Conference sent Rev. Henry H. Nichols to serve as pastor, who being about the youngest member of the Conference, was endowed with courage to accept the challenge.

It became his task to complete the payments on the pews and to pay the twenty-year old mortgage. On the third Sunday in June, 1950, we burned the mortgage and are now debt free. During these seven years \$157,915.00 has been raised, all indebtedness liquidated, world services and Conference Benevolence increased over one third, all salaries increased and many improvements made.

The church is serving the community seven days a week. All organizations actively participating in the total life of the church and Community. During the Summer months, we employ a Director of Christian Education. We have two young men preparing for the Ministry, one youth serving as a Missionary in Puerto Rico and several preparing for full time Christian Service.

Our Church has given to the Ministry: Rev. M. O. Ballard, Superintendent of Dover District, Rev. C. C. Thomas, Rev. J. O. Griffin, Rev. W. A. Hubbard, Rev. L. W. Molock, Rev. Thomas Cole and Rev. N. W. Moore, Jr., pastor of Tindley Temple.

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
## APPRECIATION

# Reports of District Superintendents

## DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

All praise and honor be to our redeeming Lord for His grace and mercy and for His love. For it is He who has sustained us and brought us to this holy place where we give an account of our labors for the conference year which now comes to a close. It is with deep and abiding gratitude to Him who has been with us all the way that we present this report of the Ministers and Laymen of the Dover District. We have toiled together sometimes against heavy obstacles and discouraging odds to make possible the report which is presented here today.

The superintendent has sought to exercise love, kindness and forbearance in his leadership, but always pressing with unceasing firmness toward the goals which have been set before us by the Church. We have endeavored to emphasize the total program of the church and have not been placid and lackadaisical with any phase of the work committed to us.

### Marriages

We have often read, "What is home without a Mother?" We may paraphrase and say, "What is a parsonage without a wife?" Well, two of our ministers, C. B. White and A. J. Dredden, asked this question and decided that, just as a home was poor indeed without a mother to grace it, so was a parsonage. The results? Each one took unto himself a bride during the year, and each now avers that, "The Charge has taken on new life since the pastor has taken unto himself a wife."

### Deaths

We have been happily blessed with marriages, but we have also been smitten by the hand of death. Early in the year, M. J. Pettyjohn, a retired supply pastor, passed on from labor to reward. Then, W. W. Brown and M. C. Anderson, both of them active pastors, were severed from the service here and mustered into the service above. Appropriate funeral services were held for each of our fallen comrades.

### Changes in Appointments

The deaths of W. W. Brown and M. C. Anderson made necessary some changes in appointments. C. W. Bagwell was transferred from the Greensboro charge, of the Easton District, to the Laurel charge, of the Dover District; A. P. Jenkins was transferred from the Newark charge, Dover District, to the Greensboro charge, Easton District. Edward Derrickson was appointed to supply the Clarksville charge and James A. Conway was appointed to supply the Newark charge. The members of the charge involved in these transfers are to be commended for their steadfast loyalty and excellent cooperation in vigorously continuing the work of the charge during this transitional period.

### District Meetings

Our district meetings have all continued to be goodly sources of fellowship and inspiration. The following meetings have contributed immeasurably to the progress of our work and the spiritual uplift and outlook of those attending: The monthly preacher's meeting, the District Stewards meeting, the District Youth Assembly, quarterly meetings of the Woman's Society, the District Youth Rally, the Youth Emphasis Program and the Efficiency Conference. It should also be noted that many youth from the Dover District participated in the Christian Mission and the Conference Youth Assembly.

### The Ministers' Wives

To the ministers' wives, as usual, very high praise is due for the unselfish spirit in which they have labored for the cause of our conference claimants. They have striven earnestly and effectively to help lift the load and ease the burden and thus bring peace, comfort and cheer to the heart of those who now are in the retired relation. The work which they constantly do is worthy of our highest esteem. And our prayer is that at least all our ministers will recognize the merit of the cause for which they labor and support them to the fullest extent. This is the least that any minister should do.

### Reports of the Charges

Bridgeville, C. E. Kiah, pastor, maintains a steady growth under the leadership of its capable pastor. Conversions 3, accessions 4. All interests have been cared for, a Hammond Organ purchased, youth and young adults well organized. An increase in pastor's salary was granted. Improvements have been made in church and parsonage. Total amount raised, \$5,965.00.

Bridgeville Circuit, H. T. Moody, pastor. This is one of our outstanding circuits which, with capable leadership, annually works wonders. Conversions 9, accessions 9. Every single obligation has been fully met. One church is now in the process of being completely remodeled and the second church is soon to undergo repairs and modernization. The pastor closes his ninth year with brilliant success. Total raised, \$8,262.00.

Chestertown, C. H. Molock, Pastor, has witnessed another very successful year. Conversions 12, accessions 13. All appointments have been fully met, an increase in salary granted. New appliances have been purchased for the parsonage and a new touch added to the exterior beauty of the church and parsonage. A new Hammond Organ has been purchased. Total amount raised, \$9,847.

Cheswold, R. A. Bolden, Pastor, has had 4 conversions. The parsonage has undergone new interior decorations and also some exterior improvements made. The pastor has striven earnestly to meet all responsibilities, but a parsimonious spirit seems to have invaded the congregation and this has impeded its progress. Total raised, \$3,000.00.

Clarksville, Edward Derrickson, Pastor. An excellent year's work has been done, notwithstanding the death of the pastor appointed at the beginning of the year. After the death of W. W. Brown, Brother Derrickson finished out the year very acceptably. Conversions 1, accessions 1. A new parsonage is planned for the ensuing year and a fund has also been created for erecting a new church. Total raised \$3,465.00.

Coleman, Roland Grant, pastor. A good year's work has been done. Improvements have been made in the parsonage. Conversions 4, accessions 3. The salary has been increased. A spirit of optimism prevails and the cooperation needed for success is present. Total raised, \$5,063.

Crumpton, C. R. Bryant, pastor, reports a very successful year. Conversions 34, accessions 23. Extensive improvements have been made on the interior and exterior of each church and new furnishings have been purchased. The pastor gives progressive leadership to a charge which, in some respects, has presented a problem. Total raised, \$7,021.00.

Delmar, F. R. Richardson, pastor. The pastor is conscientious and untiring in his efforts to succeed, but a non-cooperative spirit has prevented the realization of his expectations. Total raised, \$2,048.00.

Dover, W. E. Marks, pastor, is annually a good example in achievement. The good work continues this year. Conversions 15, accessions 15. All apportionments are fully met, the church is well organized and directed. The pastor has given good leadership and the response has been gratifying. Total raised, \$10,398.00.

Fairlee, Mrs. Grace Watts, pastor. Conversions 1, accessions 1. All apportionments are paid in full. Improvements have been made on the exterior of the church and community center. A new Hammond Organ previously purchased, has been paid for. Another church will be added to this charge for the ensuing year. Total raised, \$3,235.

Galena, Mrs. Rachel Brown, Pastor, is a small charge which does well for its numerical strength. Conversions 2. The interior of one church has been completely renovated. Another church is to be added to the charge, thus providing a more adequate ministerial support. Total raised, \$3,963.00.

Harrington, Thaddeus Hackett, pastor, enjoys continuous success. This small membership far exceeds the achievements of many parishes boasting larger numbers. Conversions 3. New appliances have been purchased for the parsonage. The pastor continues to grow in the esteem of his people. Total raised, \$3,524.

Laurel, C. W. Bagwell, pastor. M. C. Anderson began the year at Laurel with signal success. Following his death, the present pastor continued the good work which had been begun. An excellent year's work has been accomplished. Conversions 2, accessions 2. All apportionments have been fully met, the pastor's salary increased. Total raised, \$6,856.00.

Lewes, Ethelbert Maddox, pastor, has exceeded its accomplishments of the previous year. Conversions 7, accessions 4. A new heating system has been installed in one church and new furnishings for the second. The pastor received an increase in salary. Total raised, \$5,765.00.

Lincoln, J. O. Lockman, pastor, has rounded out its twenty-fourth year under the capable leadership of its present pastor. The pastor has done a great work in building a loyal and forward-looking congregation. His long term as pastor here has paid large dividends and the results of his leadership have been far-reaching. Conversions 7, accessions 6. The parsonage has been repaired and a new bath installed. All apportionments are fully paid. Total raised, \$8,093.00.

Mardella, R. L. Jones, pastor, again makes a commendable report. Conversions 3, accessions 6. The financial report exceeds that of the previous year. Extensive repairs have been made on the parsonage and the community building at one church has been remodeled. Total amount raised, \$5,304.00.

Melitota: J. C. Purnell was assigned here and the year began well, but complications later developed which rendered a successful year's work impossible of attainment. The pastor finally relinquished his charge, with very little accomplished. The people continued to work with the superintendent supervising the administrative affairs of the charge and Brother Casper Brown supplying the pulpit. Total raised, \$2,516.00.

Milford, Randolph Fisher, Pastor, has exceeded its achievements of former years. The pastor succeeds in leading his people to greater performances each year. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Extensive repairs were made on parsonage and church. Total raised, \$6,123.00.

Millington, C. B. White, pastor has excelled its work of the previous year. Conversions 17, accessions 22. The pastor's salary was increased, improvements were made in the parsonage and church. Total raised \$4,738.

Millsboro, C. W. D. Browne, pastor, has begun to rise and assert itself, and this year's report far exceeds that of a year ago. Conversions 24, accessions 8. One church was completely destroyed by fire, but a special collection has already produced \$1,000 toward rebuilding. The pastor's salary was increased and his return is eagerly sought. Total raised, \$4,738.00.

Nassau, J. O. Griffin, pastor, makes a highly favorable report. Conversions 15, Accessions 20. New furnishings purchased for the parsonage, all apportionments fully paid and the pastor's salary increased and more than \$1,300 paid on old indebtedness. The pastor has given excellent leadership. Total raised, \$8,500.00.

Newark: This was one of the charges involved in the mid-year transfers. Following the transfer of A. P. Jenkins, J. A. Conway finished the year here. Several factors did intervene to retard the work of the year somewhat, but still much good work was done. Total raised, \$2,251.00.

North Berlin, W. G. Brown, Pastor, has surpassed the record of the previous year. A new Hammond Organ was purchased, the sanctuary beautifully renovated and an increase in pastor's salary voted. Conversions 4, accessions 4, total raised, \$7,930.00.

Pomona, C. C. Thomas, pastor, has exceeded its work of the previous year. Conversions 3, accessions 5. New appliances have been installed in the church hall, contributions to benevolences have increased and the pastor's salary also increased. Total raised, \$6,000.00.

Port Deposit, E. W. Dean, pastor. This charge represents one of our small but loyal membership groups. It is set far away in the hills of Maryland but always gives a good account of its stewardship. Repairs have been made on one church, and the parsonage. Total amount raised, \$2,924.00.

Rock Hall, M. V. Hyland, pastor, succeeds in presenting a good report. The pastor has worked faithfully and good results have followed. Conversions 9, accessions 5. Repairs have been made on one church, the pastor's salary has been increased. Total raised, \$12,106.00.

Sassafras, Mrs. Ophelia James, pastor, does a repeat performance in fully raising its apportionment. An increase in ministerial support has been granted. Conversions 2, accessions 2. New furnishings have been added to the parsonage. Here a good leader receives wonderful cooperation and success is the result. Total raised, \$3,447.00.

Seaford, A. J. Dredden, pastor, has worked well during the year. Conversions 15, accessions 8. This charge has engaged in an extensive project of renovating the parsonage with a new bath installed, new appliances, new interior decorations and furnishings. The pastor has received an increase in salary. Total raised, \$5,591.00.

Seaford Circuit, David Lewis, pastor. This is a small circuit with latent possibilities. One church gives excellent cooperation but the other is somewhat retarded by a non-cooperative spirit. Conversions 7, accessions 7. Total raised \$2,400.00.

Sharptown, D. S. Quillen, pastor, repeats another good performance. Conversions 12, accessions 12. All apportionments are paid in full, the pastor's salary increased and a general spirit of cooperation prevails. This charge boasts one of our most outstanding young adult organizations. The congregation has voted to build a new parsonage. Total raised, \$6,127.00.

Smyrna, J. J. Webster, pastor. Accessions 1. Improvements have been made on the interior of the church and parsonage. All apportionments are reported fully met, the pastor's salary increased. The people have indeed done well. Total raised, \$2,519.

South Berlin, C. P. Spencer, pastor. The charge has made progress during the year. Conversions 2, accessions 5. Two extra rooms have been added to the parsonage and new furnishings have been installed. The pastor's salary has been increased. Total raised, \$4,831.00.

Still Pond: G. B. Wilson, pastor. The pastor is a faithful worker and has striven hard to make a good report. There is an advance of wide proportions over the work of the previous year. Conversions 1, accessions 15. The parsonage has been renovated on the interior and extensive repairs made on the exterior. Total raised, \$6,083.00.

Townsend, W. C. Thomas, pastor. The charge has made progress during the year. Conversions 3, accessions 2. The financial report is an improvement over that of the preceding year. Total raised \$4,679.00.

Our program of visitation evangelism helped greatly in winning souls for Christ and reactivating inactive members. It also helped many local church commissions on evangelism to have a clearer understanding of the work committed to them. According to reports submitted by our pastors, there were 210 conversions and 193 accessions.

One observation must now be made. The Delmarva Peninsula, a part of which forms the Dover District, has for years been our stronghold of Methodism. But we must now beware, lest we lose some of our advantages. The invasion of this territory by certain of our small sects with strong and narrow doctrinal concepts is causing defections among our people. Enough of these have already occurred to cause us to drop any aloofness or easy-going attitude which we may have developed over the years. So our ministers are challenged to preach and teach the doctrines of the Methodist Church, to hold membership classes and to instruct our people at every opportunity in the basic truths of Methodism.

#### Conclusion

We have endeavored to set forth briefly some of the work done by the faithful ministers and laymen of the Dover District. Time permits but a scant indication to be made of all that has been achieved. We have labored for a common cause together and the Lord has blessed us with some small measure of success. We have not done all we had hoped to do and certainly not all we should have done.

It is our sincere hope and prayer that God will grant us the grace and strength to accomplish more in the future than in the past. With God's help we hope to attain to a higher standard of efficiency and a greater degree of loyalty in the noble work which remains before us. Our attitude toward what remains to be done is summed up in these lines of poetry:

Let me die working,  
Still tackling plans unfinished, tasks undone!  
Clean to its end, swift may my race be run.  
No laggard steps, no faltering, no shirking!  
Let me die working!

## District Activities

The District Stewards' Meeting, held at Royal Oak, May 12, did not have the zest of previous years.

The Youth Assembly, held at Centreville, in June, was largely attended, and a great deal of enthusiasm manifested.

Thirty-seven youth attended the Conference Youth Assembly at Morgan State College. Two youth participated in the successful Christian Witness Mission at Wilmington.

Our District Conference at Oxford was a huge affair. The proceedings were elaborate and the entertainment excellent.

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### SALISBURY DISTRICT

Bishop Love and Brethren:

With humble gratitude to God for his abundant grace and guidance, we submit our sixth and final report.

To be both brief and comprehensive requires a degree of fidelity to records rather than rhetoric. There are certain facts back of the services and sacrifices of the ministry and laity of the district which must be omitted for lack of time and space. Suffice to say that for the most part the District has remained loyal to leadership, although that leadership is not without its shortcomings.

The amount of service rendered by small groups of faithful members of waning local congregations is so notable that it tends to obscure the incalculable losses which the Christian cause suffers through the neglect of the many. Many folks simply do not take their church vows and responsibilities seriously. They have the idea they are doing the pastor and someone a favor. I am convinced that the methods used to raise funds are as vital as anything else in religion; and that Christian Stewardship, the responsibility administration of whatever is held in trust is the only ultimate answer to the maintenance of work of the Kingdom.

People do not overlook the want of character in a leader, whether he be minister or layman. A Christian is absolutely simple and sincere in his manner of life. While some may take advantage of goodwill, the fact remains that we are building moods, tempers, and temples unto God; love and love alone can sustain the Church as God's agency for the salvation of men.

I am not ashamed of the way I have spent my days on the district, and I find my devotion to the ideal, matches many modest people who make up the mind of the Salisbury District. As my wife and I take leave of the 5,000 folk making up the fellowship of service of this district, we do so with hearts freighted with the tokens of devotion and service across the years.

There has been some serious illness but no deaths among the pastors and their families. Mrs. Thompson underwent surgery last September, but has recovered; with the lift of the prayers and sympathies of all who knew her throughout the Conference. Our Ministry is a wondrous fraternity born of the spirit of God.

The Baltimore Messenger has rendered such valuable service in publicity for our District and Conference, that I do not see the need of trying to review the events of the year carried on, mostly in concert with the Conference and the Area.

Our emphasis upon Evangelism was a Year-around matter. As in Christian Education the sub-district groups centered around Salisbury,

Pocomoke, and Wattsville, respectively. The results have been striking, with over 300 persons received into the membership of our churches. 232 of these are adults; and none were under twelve years of age. Salisbury has a functioning interdenominational Minister's Union, which carried out much of the religious census. The Crisfield group, and the entire Virginia group conducted real community surveys, under the Council of Churches.

#### The Charges

At our last district meeting, Evangelism was emphasized throughout.

**COTTAGE GROVE** (S. E. Armstrong, Pastor). This charge declines to advance. Raised for all causes \$1,658.00.

**CRISFIELD-SHILOH** (R. L. Parker, Pastor). The pastor has completed his first year in our Conference, carrying the charge forward in leaps and bounds. Salary advanced \$200.00; New members 0; Raised for all causes: \$7,594.

**DAMES QUARTER** (M. S. Collins). The two churches have done their best work in six years, and with the same pastor. They wish to build a parsonage. New members 24; raised for all purposes \$3,200.00.

**DEAL ISLAND**, with H. W. Spencer, pastor, makes the best report in years. The church and church hall have been renovated fully. New members 2; For benevolences \$253; Trustees \$.....; Total \$.....

**FRUITLAND**. For the fifth year, S. E. Parker makes a full report on all askings. On improvements \$400.00; total \$5600.00. New Members 12.

**GIRDLETREE** (L. H. Purnell, Pastor). This charge delights to follow the faithful leader. All askings raised in full. New members 2; total for all purposes \$6,600. Renovation of the three churches goes on.

**GREENWOOD** (I. H. White). The charge continues to decline. New members 2. Total raised \$2800.00.

**HOPEWELL** (G. N. Jones). Here is loyal response to a liberal leader. New members 3. A full financial report, total \$3775.00.

**HORNTOWN** (E. H. White). The interior of St. Marks church is painted; plaster board walls for Dee's Chapel; parsonage shingled. The pastor is invited to return for the seventeenth year. Total raised \$4,100.00; new members 15.

**KELLAR-EXMORE** (L. C. Waters). Kellar is on the way to recovery, raised \$1600.00. Exmore Mission by full agreement of all concerned, is now a separate appointment, with Mrs. Jessye Hickmon, Pastor, as of February 1954. She has eighty children enrolled, with over fifty in regular attendance. The interdenominational religious census, taken in January denotes our church in Exmore as the religious center for our folk there. Mrs. Hickmon has the musical ability and technique for carrying on a cultural program of Christian Education.

**HUTT MEMORIAL-SHILOH** (L. H. Jones, Pastor). The pastor was unable to complete the last few weeks because of serious illness. His devoted wife has received the full support of the charge in her effort to finish

the year. Near-by pastors have preached. Raised for benevolences \$150.00; Ministerial support \$1747.00; total \$1952.00. New members 2.

MANOKIN (J. W. Hayman). This charge centennial is one-hundred-per-cent, with 170 members, continues its decline in meeting conference askings, despite the zeal of the pastor. New members 7; total raised \$—.

MARION STATION (G. W. Taylor). New members received 3; raised for all purposes \$7,700.00. The pastor has done well.

MARUMSCO-KINGSTON (Alexander Reid). This charge urgently requests the return of the pastor. Raised for all purposes, \$4,123.00. New members 10.

MT. VERNON (R. A. F. Graham). The charge registers a new low in giving. Raised for all purposes \$2,397.00.

NANTICOKE (G. O. Commodore). This charge advances. Raised on renovation of the church, \$1400.00; oil heating installed. New members 3. Total \$5,809.00.

OAKVILLE (Clarence Handy). The pastor had six months in which to bring up arrears, snatching victory from apparent defeat. His return is urged. A small but valiant membership. Total raised, \$2,100.00.

ORIOLE and VENTON (Rev. G. V. Bell). The work is greatly revived under the new pastor. Better ministerial support is needed here. New members 16. Raised on debt and improvement, \$595.00; Total raised here \$4,400.00.

PARSONSBURG (R. W. Dennis, Pastor). Has done it again with ease. All claims are fully met; total raised \$4,580; including \$300.00 World Service, \$225.00 for Promotion and advance, and ministerial support in full.

POCOMOKE (S. P. Sanders). A new pastor, new plans, new achievements. The church has been given a new look with new furnishings and renovation of the interior. Total improvements \$1,228.00, new members, 1. Raised for all causes \$4,200.00.

PRINCESS ANNE (C. D. Gerald). The charge is determined to lead in spiritual and financial, as well as educational work. World Service \$320.00 an increase; Ministerial support, \$3,100.00; improvements \$807.00; New members 16. Total \$6,200.00.

QUANTICO (J. W. PRUITT). With 360 members on roll, this charge remains quite indifferent to the growing demand for an adequate local church budget. Mt. Zion would like to become a station, and is worth considering. Total raised, for all causes, \$5,571.

SALISBURY-J. WESLEY (C. A. Elder). All askings have been fully met for six years. The mortgage for \$—, was burned recently. New members 19. The work prospers. Raised for all purposes \$6,600.00.

SALISBURY-WHITE TEMPLE (H. D. Davis). A well planned year-around program is maintained. The basement of the church has been beautifully renovated; and a new heating system installed. Raised for all purposes \$5,507.

SNOW HILL (G. T. Jackson, Pastor). This charge has undertaken extensive repairs on the church. The work is highly creditable. The cost of \$5,000. A capable wife renders invaluable service in music and worship. The Jacksons are an asset to the district. Raised for all purposes, \$7,120.00; New members 10.

STOCKTON (Adah W. Coffey, Pastor). Stockton does well; but the benevolences are not met. The pastor is invited to return. Total raised \$3,392.

UNION ASBURY AND LIBERIA (Ernest J. Johnson). The pastor true to his trust, but the charge has declined sharply on the askings. Total for improvements \$1042; for all purposes \$4,000.00. New members 2.

UNIONVILLE (Charles E. Cannon). The pastor preaches with great acceptability. He is about to graduate from The Maryland State College. New Members 44. Both churches have shown much activity. Raised for all purposes, \$3,827.

UPPER HILL (Amos Wilson, pastor). For the past two years this charge has worked under the handicap of suspended pastorates. In 1952 on account of death of the pastor; in 1953, by release. The part-time service of Brother Wilson has been very creditable. The ministerial support and the other askings have fallen short of last year. New members 4. Total raised, \$3,091.

WACHAPREAGUE (Omar C. Jones). This charge leaped forward under the inspiring leadership of a man who is tireless. In a rally for the church renovation at Grace, \$832 was raised in one month. New members 28. With more experience the pastor will do better with the Conference askings.

WATTSVILLE (E. A. Hughes). Renovation of church properties continues. Despite the endeavors of the pastor, conference askings fall short. New members 9. Total raised, \$4879.00.

WETIPQUIN (W. A. Nichols). The pastor in a few weeks got Jester-ville busy on the engagement of the church; releasing a trust fund of \$1500. tied up for several years. World Service raised in full, \$250.; Promotion and advance \$150.00; all met in full. The salary is advanced from \$1600.00 to \$1800.00, with \$200 additional for travel expense. New members 31. Total raised \$8,360. The re-building will cost \$5,000., with nearly \$4,000.00 raised.

WHITE HAVEN (A. L. Boggs). This charge welcomed the pastor and gave promise of doing well. Both churches are engaged in renovation; but do not see the importance of taking care of the total claims upon them as a charge. Total benevolences \$102.00; total for improvements \$894.00; for all purposes \$2950. New members, 4.

WITHAMS (R. T. Croswell, Pastor). The pastor assures us that all askings are being met in full. Improvements \$2024; Grand total \$9,000.00.

We have tried to look upon our brothers of the Annual Conference, not as those with whom we are to compete, but with whom we may cooperate. "We are workers together with God."

I shall always look back upon my work with the District as a period of six years crowded with enriching experiences, confronting me ever with opportunities for service, here and there, far beyond my poor power to meet.

Knowing that one day I would cease to be in the saddle, my desire has been to feel my brothers care; avoiding anything which would cause any to be afraid because of my apparent attitude.

Life is all a matter of levels; Let us take the highway, "thrown up in the wildness" of contemporary terrors and tragedies.

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#### WILMINGTON DISTRICT

It is a privilege and great honor to be your servant and to have the opportunity of submitting to you an accounting of my stewardship for the Conference year 1953-1954. I assure you that my report will be as brief and factual as is possible for me to make.

This has been an unusual and difficult year for me. Shortly after the new Conference year, I became very sick, which limited my ability to carry out the functions of my office in all its relations or aspects. Now, I am feeling better than I have ever and am equal to the task of performing my duties as superintendent. I want to thank the Ministers, Laymen, and friends who shared in any way in helping to carry on while I was ill.

#### Sickness

Most of the Ministers and their families have enjoyed good health. Reverends B. A. Arnold and Horace Fisher were physically impaired. Mesdames S. L. Jones, W. L. D. Lyght, and Daniel Williams were sick during the year, but all are way on the road to good health now.

#### Deaths

We did not escape visits from the "grim reaper," death. Mesdames Lewis Deakins, H. R. Coleman, Ella Bailey, our District Lay-Leader, and Dr. F. J. Handy, answered the great call, as many others before have done.

#### District Meetings

There were held on the district the Monthly Preachers' Meetings. The Ministers' wives did much to inspire and make the meetings worthwhile. At the District Stewards' Meeting, the forward program of the district was

adopted. The Sub-District Groups were re-organized and the fellowship did much to bring about a greater union between ministers and laymen. Two Vacation Church School Institutes were conducted. The Laymen's Retreat, Missionary Institute, Youth Missionary Rally, Youth Emphasis Meeting, Church School Superintendents', Observation School, and Quarterly Meetings of the Women's Society of Christian Service were all well planned, carried out, and attended. The Efficiency Conference was one of the highlights on the district. Every pastor was present and reported.

Our District Christian Education Staff came at "every beck and call." Each one gave himself or herself unreservedly to make the program of the district run smoothly. Mrs. Emma Wilson Strother, District Director of Children's Work; Rev. S. L. Jones, District Director of Youth Work; and Rev. J. U. Watson, District Director of Adult Work carried out the program of Christian Education in a fine manner.

Mrs. Edith Prideaux, the newly elected District President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, started out in an excellent way. We predict marks of improvement under her leadership.

The following charges have paid all askings in full: Asbury, Hamilton, Burlington, Fordville, Grace, Siloam, St. Daniel's, Darby, (Delaware City), New Castle, Port Norris, St. George's and Kirkwood, Coleman, Memorial, Ezion, Mt. Joy, and Mt. Carmel.

Marks of improvement have been shown at Bridgeton, Ferry Avenue, Cape May and Swainton, Delair, Elkton, Lawnside, Merchantville, Middletown, Mt. Holly, New Port, Odessa and Port Penn, Pleasantville and Ocean City, Salem, Quinton, Haven, and Delaware City.

As to Buttonwood, Eighth Street, Grenloch and Rhodes, and Woodbury Jericho, possibilities are great.

Improvements on church properties have been done on a majority of the charges. Mentioning some outstanding accomplishments. At Burlington, where Horace Fisher is pastor, the church has been renovated very beautifully. St. Daniel's, F. D. Jones is pastor, the basement and rest rooms were renovated at a cost of \$8,556.85. Darby, W. C. Strother, Jr., pastor, the outside of the new church was stuccoed and the vestibule, nave, and chancel walls completed. Fordsville, William Tasco is pastor, the church has been greatly enlarged. Mt. Holly, Paul Jackson is pastor, the church redecorated. Pleasantville, C. A. Perry is pastor, the inside and outside of church re-finished. Port Norris, J. E. Bishop is pastor, the congregation will move into a new church building this summer. As soon as the title is cleared as to the property at Coleman Memorial, a church will be built under the leadership of Daniel Williams.

There were two hundred and eighty-five accessions and four-hundred and fifty-eight conversions. The debts on all charges have been greatly reduced.

A majority of the charges conducted the Week of Dedication. Our district does not fail to recognize and stress the evangelistic appeal as one of the strongest elements for holding men to the church.

Evidences of our faith in God, our church, and its program have caused us to come to the seat of this conference saying, "THE STATE OF OUR DISTRICT IS VERY GOOD."

## REPORT OF THE AREA SECRETARY

I accepted this appointment sixteen months ago without misgivings. I knew the man with whom I was to work. I knew the breadth of his vision, the height of his spiritual stature, and the depth of consecration of his life to the ministry of Jesus Christ. I knew the intense humanity of the man.

After a year and four months of working with him, my personal regard for him has increased a hundred-fold. Bishop Edgar Amos Love is by all standards of judgement, a man.

My work, briefly defined, is that of administrative assistant to Bishop Love. Our offices in the Sharp Street Church Community House in Baltimore are on opposite sides of the building, yet our work is, by its very nature, inseparably related. It is my responsibility to help him in promoting the program of Methodism in the four annual conferences of the Baltimore Area—the Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington Conferences.

I have given service in all four conferences on many occasions. I have been privileged to serve in each of the eighteen districts which comprise these four conferences, taking the program of the church and of the Baltimore Area to districts representing approximately 90,000 Methodists.

In addition, following the line of my special interest, I have conducted institutes for choirs and seminars on worship for pastors on district or conference or larger city levels in each of the conferences.

Of course, I have filled numerous speaking engagements and attended many meetings of local, area, and national interest, either as proxy for Bishop Love, or in response to personal invitations and in the line of official duty.

Our office cooperated with the bishop's office and the Washington Conference Committee on Promotion and Advance in the promotion of the recent campaign in that conference for \$100,000 for church extension within its own boundaries.

As sort of an extra-curricular activity, several months ago, I organized from among the Baltimore City churches a choir, whose radio and television ministry is dedicated to interpreting the message of the great hymns of the Christian Faith to church people. The ministry of this group in a short period of time has been miraculously helpful among our many listeners.

Of course, our chief promotional adventure is the publication of THE BALTIMORE AREA MESSENGER, for which we again solicit your support. I want here to express my personal appreciation to Bishop Love for the Confidence he has imposed in me by entrusting to me full editorial responsibility for this journal. The Messenger should be read in every Baltimore Area home. We call upon pastors to help us achieve this goal.

I wish to thank all of you—ministers and laymen of the Delaware Conference—my fellow laborers, for any part you may have played in the support of our area program, and I assure you of our readiness to serve you when possible on your call.

Likewise, on nomination of the cabinet, district directors of Stewardship will be elected.

These persons will be briefed on the program of Stewardship at such times as may be determined by the area director of Stewardship, who has received the basic training at the two coaching conferences held at Buck Hill Falls, Pa., in January 1953, and in Detroit, Mich., in January, 1954.

During the course of the year, each local charge will elect a charge director of Stewardship, and seminars on Stewardship will be held under direction of the district directors.

It will be the responsibility of these persons to cultivate the Stewardship of Possessions program, stressing tithing as a means of grace, and calling our people to rededication of their total lives to the Will and Purpose of our Lord Jesus Christ, "Who gave Himself for us."

The response given to the many programs and projects sponsored by our Conference Board of Education is indeed gratifying. In the hope of reaching more children, youth and adults with better teaching, this year we sponsored Youth Emphasis Programs and many Leadership Education enterprises. More individuals were reached, we are sure, as a result of such efforts; but aside from being reached, individuals need more than anything else leaders and teachers who are making their own lives a true offering to Christ. They need a visual demonstration of spiritual greatness.

Today, as we stand at the threshold of a new conference year, we challenge each of you to rededicate yourself to the Christ way of life; and strive to improve the quality of your work. It is then and only then, that our program of Christian Education can be far-reaching and effective in developing Christian character.

Again, I thank you. With best wishes for your christian endeavors.

## Report of the Executive Secretary

Bishop Love, Members of the Conference and Fellow Workers on the Staff of the Board of Education. I am happy to have the privilege to make this my eleventh annual report to this body.

May I assure you of my deep appreciation of your loyal support to, and active participation in, the program which you have entrusted to us and which we have sought to promote throughout the conference. We have enjoyed the counsel, guidance and ever present support of Bishop Love and the District Superintendents at every turn. Likewise the creative planning and wholehearted cooperation on the part of the conference and district staffs have been a great source of inspiration. The conference age group directors, as heads of their respective staffs, have done an excellent job in promoting their share of the total programs. Their reports will speak for themselves.

**In Memory of Dr. F. J. Handy**

As one reflects over the work of Christian Education in our Conference, he comes aware of the contributions made by those who labored in the early days of our struggle. Outstanding in this regard is the contribution made by our first full-time Executive Secretary, the late Dr. F. J. Handy who labored in this office for six years. Those of us who enjoy the opportunity to serve the church in this field today are the benefactors of his sacrifices and devotion. May we pause a moment in memory of this pioneer in the field of Christian Education.

**Children's Work**

When I came into this office eleven years ago, Mrs. Maude S. Clark was the very efficient Director of Children's work of the Salisbury District. Upon the passing of Mrs. Caddie Ridout, Mrs. Clark became the Conference Director of Children's Work. In this office she has given outstanding service for the past four years. It is with regret that we accept the resignation of Mrs. Clark as Conference Director, which resignation comes as the result of her physician's advice. While she feels unable to carry the responsibilities of the Directorship, Mrs. Clark would have me to assure the Board that she stands ready to help in the field of Children's Work wherever she may be able to serve. In fact she has consented to serve as a consultant in Children's Work.

We have been greatly encouraged this year in our new program with the Children's Workers consultants. This is a program on each district where the district Director is assisted by persons selected, because of special training and interest, to work with her. The specific project promoted this year was the Observation Schools. The schools are conducted on the laboratory principle. They constitute an actual situation of "Learning to do by doing." Such schools have been on each district on the sub-district basis as follows: Dover District, at Milford, Delaware and Still Pond, Md. Mrs. Elizabeth Shockley Director; Easton District, at Easton, Md.; Mrs. Elsie G. Earle Director; Philadelphia District at Newark; Mrs. Anna M. Elzey Director; Salisbury District at John Wesley Church, Salisbury and Withams, Va., Mrs. C. A. Elder, Director; the Wilmington District at Ezion Church, Wilmington, Del., Mrs. Emma Strother, Director.

The Vocation Church School reports have been very encouraging, with a number of new schools being reported. The following is the report of the number of schools by districts: Dover 13, Easton 9, Philadelphia 23, Salisbury 14 and Wilmington 27. Thus giving a total of 86 which is the largest number of schools reported in any year, and which represents an increase of 11 over the report of last year when 75 schools were reported.

**Youth Work**

The Conference Director's report gives in detail a picture of the outstanding work done in the youth field. We merely call attention here to the challenge which the needs of our youth present to every person who has an interest in the welfare of our young people. We urge the fullest possible

support of every phase of the youth Emphasis program on what ever level it may be promoted, but we especially appeal to every adult to make the youth emphasis in the local church not just another program, but a real means of meeting the needs of our youth. Details of promotion are being sent from many sources, among them "Concern", the national youth publication; "The Informer", our Conference paper; the office of The Conference Director of Youth Work, the office of the District Superintendent; the Conference Committee on the Youth Emphasis, and the regular Youth Church School material; to mention only a few. See the Directors report for account of progress and future plans for the Emphasis.

**Financial Support of Youth Work.** We urge fuller support of youth work through larger giving to Youth Conference Support and to the Methodist Youth Fund. The proposed budget of the Board also suggest a means of larger support of the Program of Christian Education on the districts including youth work.

The report of the scholarship committee will give a picture of the interest in the education of our youth on the part of our youth organization in the conference. Students have received awards from the Interboard Scholarship during the year.

#### **Adult Work**

While we feel that our Conference Young Adult Fellowship is doing a most excellent piece of work, we find that there is much to be desired in our sub-district and local church work. The current emphasis is on the development of our sub-district activities. With the help of the District Superintendents we are making headway with subdistrict organizations.

We have great concern with reference to the building of strong and significant Youth Adult Fellowship in the local churches. In some situations fine work is being done. Our goal is to have active young adults as well as adult classes in the church school of every church.

In the report of the Conference President of the Young Adult Fellowship, progress and plans of the young adults work are given.

#### **Recreation**

Here is a field in which we have not made progress as we should in order to meet the needs of persons in the area of Christian fellowship. However, with the increasing number of opportunities which are now becoming available for training leadership in this field, we should soon be able to build an effective program of recreation in the Conference.

The crying need for wholesome recreation which is evident in every community where our churches are located presents to us a challenge which cannot be ignored.

We will call upon all of our conference organizations as well as some local churches to send selected persons to a Recreation Laboratory held at Pennington School for Boys, Pennington, N. J., June 6-11, 1954. This will be a most unusual opportunity for training persons for leadership in this field. It is in our plans to have some type of training for recreation workers within our Conference in the not too distant future.

### General Church School Work

This is the first year of the promotion of General Church School work under the direction of our District Director. The outstanding event in this field was the one-day meeting of church school workers held on each district. Rev. Ernest T. Dixon of the Department of General Church School Work of the General Board of Education served as our Resource Person. A most hearty response was given to this program on every district. The report is as follows:

### General Church School Work

From the reports that have come in to us as a result of these meetings we have reason to believe that they were most helpful to all who participated.

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### LEADERSHIP EDUCATION

We still operate on the principle that much of the progress in Christian Education depends upon trained leadership. We therefore seek to offer as many opportunities in this field as possible. Many of the enterprises already reported might well be classified under this caption of leadership education, however, we are speaking here of those enterprises which are especially designed to train leaders. Foremost among them are the sub-district Christian Workers' Schools. It will be necessary to make a detailed report on these schools later as they are still being held. There are 15 being held as follows: 4 on the Dover District, 3 on the Easton, 3 on the Salisbury and 4 on the Wilmington. The enrollment this year has been high. (See report of the Schools).

The 14 Deans and approximately 85 instructors are, as usual, doing a most effective piece of work, which is most certain to bear fruit in terms of better work in the local churches.

We are happy to report that our churches in the Chester Group cooperated with churches of the Philadelphia Conference in that area in holding their Christian Workers School. The results were most gratifying. Our church at Dover also participated in an inter-denominational and interracial leadership school. This was also a most successful venture across racial lines.

Our conference was well represented in the Central Jurisdictional Leadership School which was held at Gulfside Assembly, Waveland, Miss., in July. Those attending were Mrs. Emma W. Strother who was the Director of the Laboratory section of the school; Rev. Henry Nichols and Rev. F. D.

Arnold; from our youth staff; Mrs. Elizabeth H. Shockley from our Children's Staff; Rev. E. H. Holmes of our Adult Staff; Rev. N. W. Moore, Jr., a pastor and the Executive Secretary who also served as the Dean of the School.

There is now being planned a Baltimore Area School of Leadership Training to be held at Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C., June 30-July 17, 1954. We have a quota of 35 persons from our conference. Promotional material for this school will be sent out from the office of the Bishop and our Board of Education. (See forward program for other leadership enterprises to be offered during the coming year.)

#### Cooperation With Other Boards

Recognizing that we are only one agency in the field of guiding Christian growth, we count it a privilege to have opportunity to work with other boards and agencies. Most outstanding in this area this year has been the cooperation with the Board of Evangelism in the promotion of the Christian Witness Mission held in Wilmington, Delaware. The Youth Director's report makes a detailed statement concerning this enterprise. We likewise cooperated with the Board of Lay Activities in the area of Boys work; with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in the area of Leadership Education; with the Commission on Christian Vocations in guiding youth in vocational choices and with the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications in the Training supply of Supply Pastors.

The Board Chairman, Rev. J. R. Shockley, Rev. Henry H. Nichols, Rev. R. C. Hughes, Mr. Wayne Cuff and the Executive Secretary attended the National Conference held in Cincinnati, Ohio, in November. The conference was most helpful in terms of giving guidance to us in promoting the work of Christian Education in the Conference.

#### Conclusion

I thank our Heavenly Father for health and strength to travel some 30,000 miles by auto and train to make numerous engagements at district conference, sub-district and local churches. For spiritual refreshment which comes from the fellowship of service with others who serve in this great cause, I am indeed grateful. To Bishop Love, the District Superintendent and Pastors for their most loyal support and encouragement, I am grateful. Finally, I shall ever be grateful, to my wife who serves so faithfully as office secretary and general assistant.

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#### REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Bishop Love and members of the Conference. The Conference Commission on Christian Vocations is greatly concerned about the whole matter of recruiting of young men and young women in the service of the church. A recent report from the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations regarding recruits for the Christian Ministry, is a typical expression of our concern in the total field of Church vocations in particular and Christian

vocations in general. "The Methodist Church is not yet producing enough trained ministers to meet the demands of its program. The gulf between demand and supply has been greatly reduced but we must continue to bend our efforts to challenge a still larger number of able and consecrated young men to enter the Methodist Ministry until a rate of 1500 per year is achieved." If this statement is true of the whole church, we have reason to believe that it is even more true of our Conference. We are happy to report that the commission during the past year has been doing something about the situation. In our annual meeting last fall, we had a training period under the leadership of Dr. Foster J. Williams, of Buffalo, N. Y. Dr. Williams was sent to us by the General Interboard Committee at Nashville, Tenn. In this meeting plans were made to increase our efforts to enlist more youth in church vocations. Summer assemblies, both districts and conference, Christian Witness Missions, Boards and agencies of the conference and any other group which has a responsibility and concern for youth, are sources for recruiting.

Through these contacts we are able to report the following number of youth who have made the commitments to the vocations listed below.

The Christian Ministry .....	20
Christian Education .....	6
Nursing .....	11
Missions (General) .....	4
Missions (Medical) .....	6
Social work .....	3
Church Music .....	5
Church Secretarial work .....	5

It is our purpose to keep in touch with these young people and to give them guidance as they prepare for their chosen life's work. In this we seek the cooperation of all pastors, parents and others who work with youth.

We are most appreciative for the very fine response which has come from District Superintendents, Pastors and other persons, in response to our efforts to secure the names of the youths who have made a commitment to church vocations. We are aware that we are just beginning in this approach to this important task. We look forward to greater results as we improve the methods and procedures of our work.

#### Recommendations:

1. That every local church organize a committee on Christian Vocations.
2. That each district set-up a committee on Christian Vocations.
3. That there be a conference on Church Vocations held in the early part of 1955.
4. That the local churches, where possible, hold vocational meetings with their youth.

## CONFERENCE LAY LEADER REPORT—1954

It is again my privilege and pleasure to report some of the highlights of our work to the 92nd Session of the Annual Conference.

**Lay Leadership**

1. This is our most concern we find in many churches, that we have not stressed Lay Leadership. Our official families are weak. We have not been as careful in nominating our officers as we should. Our Official Board is no stronger than its weakest member.

We must seek men and women for these jobs, and not men and women seeking these Offices. We must take time to study our membership and make proper selections for the task. I think our big job is selecting our nominating committee in the local church. Our local church must be strengthened; strong leadership is the only way to do it. We can do this by training small lay groups in each local church on the work of each mission.

**Organization of the Local Church**

Too many of our local churches are organized on paper. We have found in our reports of our Lay Leaders of our local churches that these four commissions are not functioning. If the impact of our Christian influence is to be felt in the life of our community, these commissions must be an active working force in the local church.

A. If we are to win men and women for Christ, the Commission on Evangelism must be active. If we are to be informed by planned methods, the commission on education must be alert. If we are to have a mission-minded church, the Commission on mission must be at work and if we are to teach men and women to share with others their possessions, the commission on finance must study the financial needs of the local church and make possible that need by setting up a budget and personally contacting every member of the church to secure their financial aid. Every church regardless of its size can work this plan if they only have fifteen members and fifteen persons committed to Christ, can do the work of a local church with a dynamic pastor. We strive more than we have ever before with our pastors to that end as laymen.

Our church realizes that the local church is weak and it must be strengthened. The only way it can be done is to study more careful our membership and seek out our leaders for the contribution we believe they can make. Our church can not do what is expected of her until the local church is strengthened. We should carefully elect our nominating committee. They recommend our official family in the local church. We must use men and women that can best do the task that is needed to be done. The Lay Leaders and the Chairman of our four Commissions should be the best in the local church. These Commissions are the arms of the local church. The nominating Committee will do well to carefully screen the membership and prayerfully nominate persons to our official family.

**Lay Speakers Bureau**

Lay Speakers Bureau is something that we have been talking about a long time, but our last General Conference made it a disciplinary measure. We are to have at least one Lay Speaker in each local charge. This would

mean at least one hundred men and women trained in every phase of our church life. This alone will help to strengthen our local church. We shall this year do our best to build this Bureau second to none.

#### Good Literature in the Local Church

This Committee is one of our must committees this year. We can not hope to be informed unless we read and study the program of our Methodist Church. St. Paul said, "Study to Approve thyself." A workman needs not be ashamed.

#### Men's and Boys' Work

We have during the last four years done a fine job in this field of our endeavor. Ninety-two chartered men's groups have been set up. Our big job now is to get them active. I would recommend that each organization subscribe for the Methodist Laymen in a group. Have the number you need sent to one mailing address. This is being done in many groups. Let us have for our Slogan this year, a "Christian Father in every home." Not only a slogan, but a goal. Our retreat for men and boys last year was a great inspiration. We hope it will grow bigger until each man and boy in our local church will be inspired to live the Christian way of life.

#### The Lay Annual Conference

This Conference has been a great inspiration to those who have attended, both ministers and laymen. This meeting has been the talk of our Conference and of our Methodist Church. It is educational and very highly spiritual. Every minister and layman who attended is desirous to attend again. We study each phase of our church life that is being stressed during the quadrennial. Some of our leading ministers and laymen in the Conference and Methodist Church participate on the program. This meeting will be held in Philadelphia this year.

The purpose of our Conference Board of Lay Activities is to undergird every phase of our church life. May I thank our beloved Bishop, untiring District Superintendents, and our hard working Pastors, for their cooperation to make possible another successful banner year. This is a cooperative task between Bishop, District Superintendents, Ministers and Laymen. All working together for the building of God's Kingdom on earth.

**WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE**

I want to take this opportunity to thank the Bishop, the Cabinet, and program committee for giving the Woman's Society of Christian Service a place in the program, whereby we might be privileged to represent our Christian Stewardship during the four years I have been honored as well as given the privilege to serve as president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Delaware Conference.

"The future I may face; now I have proved the past." These words are those of Robert Browning, but the thought expressed is that of many thousands of leaders in the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Women in the Conference, Districts and Local Societies have labored unceasingly and have achieved what I would consider a grand success.

As Methodist women work, they experience a fellowship unequaled by that of any other group, they are working together to develop and maintain christian work at home and abroad; to cultivate christian family life, to assist in the promotion of a missionary spirit throughout the church, to cooperate with the local church in its responsibilities, and to seek fellowship with christian women of this and other lands in establishing a christian social order around the world.

The Woman's Society has proved the "Past". Three quadrenniums may be too short a period to be termed a "Past"; yet, in these twelve years women of Methodism, nurtured and trained for leadership in different organizations and branches of the church, have achieved a oneness of purpose and a closeness of fellowship, in the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. We have started on the fourth Quadrennium; the Theme "That THE KINGDOM MAY BE REALIZED." Beginning first in me, is what each member is saying.

Methodist women know more about their world than they ever have known before; each summer has seen a larger attendance at Summer Schools, most of the women coming at personal sacrifice of time and money.

The Methodist Woman is a wife, she is the queen of the home, she teaches in the public schools, works in the mill, store, and factory; she is the secretary, and the nurse, without her life would falter, perhaps stop. She has as her slogan, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Since she has adopted that slogan, all of life goes more easily.

The work of the Conference has improved over the last four years, for which we are grateful; the first year we gave the purpose of the organization, and its functions, the second year, we gave the reason why every woman should belong to the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Presidents gave some of the highlights from their activities on the Districts; the third year we attempted to show that the women are depending on a higher power for guidance and directions than themselves.

All phases of the work is progressing, which will be seen as the District Presidents speak.

**A Brief Report From Districts**

**DOVER DISTRICT:** Mrs. Mildred E. White, President. This district is continuing their good work under their new president. The Quarterly Meeting is a must. The first quarter, Officers Training Day; the second

quarter, the Study Courses presented, the third quarter, the District Secretaries presented their work in form of skits and playlets. The fourth quarter, the Vice President presented the Federation of Methodist Women. We have had an increase in attendance each quarter. The Annual District contest was a great success. The fellowship is lovely, we are still all working together for one purpose, to know Christ and to make Him known to others.

**EASTON DISTRICT:** Mrs. Thelma Alfred, President. This district also has a new president, who is a hard worker. They have their quarterly meetings regularly, all secretaries are working to promote their work, each meeting regularly, is carefully planned and carried out; giving many an opportunity to participate on the program.

**PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT:** Mrs. Margaret L. Trader, President. This district begins their year's work with a planning day in June, in order to begin the program on time. The meeting in September is the Educational Seminar, this program is a challenge to the local women to go home and begin their program on time. The second quarter, we had an invitation from the Philadelphia Conference to hold our December meeting at the 7th Street Methodist Church; 7th & Norris Streets, with the presidents of the Philadelphia and Delaware Conferences on the program. Unity in Philadelphia was the subject for the afternoon, Miss Hazel Horner, speaker. The third quarter the Federation of Methodist Women was the highlight meeting; our guest speaker was Mrs. Carl Searing, the Vice President of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. The attendance at the district meetings is increasing in members and interest. One new Woman's Society of Christian Service, and one Wesleyan Service Guild have been organized. The local societies are reporting that surveys are being made in the communities, forums, Inter-Denominational and Inter-racial meetings; working with youth during the year of Evangelism, presenting programs to make missions more impressive in the local church. Foreign students are invited to speak, worship and fellowship in many of our churches, especially among our youth groups.

**SALISBURY DISTRICT:** Mrs. Lenora D. Robins, President. We are happy to report the Salisbury District Woman's Society of Christian Service. Our district meetings are well attended. We are certainly improving along all lines. Each quarter at least two secretaries are given opportunities to present their work. At the lunch hour, the district secretary dines with the local secretaries; here, they can get acquainted and also time for a question period. We have consolidated some of the smaller societies into one single society with two or more circles, which has reduced the number of societies on the district, but we are getting better results. Our Annual District Talent Program is one of the highlights; all money given over to district cultivation fund. Our district is divided in sub-districts, and we feel there is closer cooperation along all lines. All in all we are truly beginning to carry forward the work.

**WILMINGTON DISTRICT:** Mrs. Edith Prideaux, President. We have had two sub-district Officers Training Day. One of them we invited two

Conference Officers, Mrs. W. A. Hudson and Miss Adalyne Brown. We celebrated Human Rights Day, December 13, sponsored by the Christian Social Relations Committee, guest speaker, Dr. George D. Kelsey of Drew University. We are widening our fellowship by inviting other races to share our programs. The district quarterly meetings are very well attended. Mrs. Prideaux is one of our new presidents, and is doing a wonderful job.

**WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD:** Miss Wilma Gaines, Secretary. The Philadelphia District has had its Annual Supply Day, where over \$1500.00 worth of goods was on display. Cash supplies \$236. Camphor, Darby, Haven, Jamaica, and Salisbury have held their Anniversaries, and reports show they had a grand success. It is thrilling to work with these units and officers, marking the growth of each. Many things are in the making and we look forward to your participation in them with us.

At this final report, I want to thank the societies, ministers, laymen and everybody that helped in any way to make our four years a success.

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 REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

As we make our report to this Conference all of us are well aware that the battle to make the drinking of alcohol beverages more wide-spread is continuing with unabated intensity; and to this end, the various forms of advertising are pressed into service.

While the consumption of alcohol beverage is far more reaching in its evil effects, the traffic in other narcotic drugs is causing deep concern among Christian people. It is a challenge not only to the church but also to the State Legislatures and other authorities to exert themselves in what ever way possible to counteract its ravages.

Gambling in one form or another is claiming the patronage of too great a segment of our people. In view of the economic loss and its demoralizing influence upon our citizenry, we urge our members to encourage positive influence and activities that will promote good citizenship and obedience to the law of the land.

Your Board makes the following recommendations:

1. Each pastor promote a vigorous Program of Temperance Education in his church.
2. The Organization of a Temperance Committee in each church in the Conference.
3. Observance of World Temperance Sunday.
4. Observance of Commitment Sunday.
5. Circulation of the "Voice", official organ of the Board of Temperance.
6. Cooperation with the General Board.

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### 13TH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE 1954-55

Bishop Edgar A. Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Conference:

We, the Commission on World Service and Finance, Joyfully and hopefully greet you as we present to you our 13th Annual Report.

The Commission held its Pre-Conference meeting March 2nd, at Tindley Temple, Philadelphia, Pa., for the purpose of reviewing our Conference giving up to that time and to accept the Budget Askings for the ensuing year. We attempted adjustment which we deemed advisable for the year 1954-55. A second meeting was held March 17th at the Ezlon Church, Wilmington, Del., for the benefit of persons who had not been notified of the first meeting.

After the closing of the year of 1953, proper notices of the desire of the Conference for audit of all Treasurer's books, in keeping with Disciplinary Regulations were sent out. All Treasurers responded as requested. These examinations were made in the most careful manner, and in the opinion of the Auditing Committee, said accounts are accurate and satisfactory.

Several Pre-Conferences with Bishop Love proved of great help, and the Commission feels that matters of importance have been given an accelerating pace that shall terminate in efficiency and pleasing dispatch. Thus, we shall make strides in our work of Christian Kingdom building.

The Commission received with great regret the resignation of the Rev. C. L. Trader from the office of Treasurer of the Delaware Conference.

In addition to serving as Treasurer, he has served as member, and Chairman of the Commission. We wish for him much success in his future undertakings.

#### Recommendations

ONE. We recommend that a Manual of Finance be mimeographed by the Commission on World Service and Finance to aid the Pastors and Laymen in gaining better understanding of the financial operations of the Conference and the general program of Methodism. The contents of the Manual

being: I. A FOREWORD. II. CONFERENCE BUDGET. III. CONFERENCE FINANCIAL PROGRAM (a) How the Budget is determined. (b) How apportioned to the charges. (c) How money is handled. IV. YOUR DOLLARS AT WORK. V. ADDITIONAL FINANCE ACTIVITIES. We suggest that copies be distributed to official members and used for study and discussion in Committees and Boards of the Local Churches.

TWO. The Commission recommends that the Golden Cross Society and Hospitals and Homes be combined and granted a \$600 operating budget, with the permission to solicit individual gifts in addition to the budget.

THREE. The Commission recommends that the Treasurer or some representative of that office visit each District Stewards Meeting and give explanations to Pastors and District Superintendents in making first payments to the General Promotional and Cultivation Fund, and to receive money for the District Superintendents' Fund.

FOUR. We recommend that Conference Minute Money be apportioned to the churches by Districts.

FIVE. The Commission recommends that a fund of \$250 be appropriated for Conference Budget Promotional work, to be done by the Commission, and that \$50 of same be apportioned to each District; the work being done in close co-operation with the Treasurer and Superintendents.

SIX. The Commission recommends that all Boards and Commissions that do not have their books audited by a Certified Public Accountant, and who receive money from the Conference Treasurer, send in their reports, of such audits duly signed by the auditors who do their auditing.

SEVEN. The Commission recommends that late reports coming to the Treasurer be so printed in the minutes, and that at the discretion of the Treasurer, monies may be accepted at the seat of the Conference in session, but the delayed reports be not included in the Treasurer's Annual Report to the Conference in session.

EIGHT. That a Certified Public Accountant be secured to audit the books of the Treasurer of the Conference, and all other Treasurers.

NINE. We recommend that the Minimum Salaries be (a) Married Pastors, \$1700, and (b) Single Pastors \$1400 per year, and distributions be made of the Minimum Salary Fund as in previous years.

TEN. That all suggested Rally Day amounts be sent in among the first payments to the Treasurer, or not later than Rally Day Week.

ELEVEN. That all money requested from the Promotional Fund be done in writing, even though verbal explanations may be made concerning such asking.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Trustees be, and they hereby are authorized, directed and empowered, for and on behalf of the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, a corporation of the State of Delaware, to sign, seal, execute and deliver to the said Board of Home Missions and Church Extension of the Methodist Church, a Note or Bond in the sum of 20,000 dollars, and further to execute to the said Board a mortgage in the sum of 20,000 dollars secured upon all of the property of said church. And further, the trustees are authorized and empowered to sign, execute and deliver any other papers that may be necessary to properly effect the above loan: and to designate such officers as they may see fit, to act for and on their behalf and for and on the behalf of the church.

I hereby certify that the above is a true and correct copy of resolution passed at a meeting of the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, a corporation of the State of Delaware, held on the 24th day of April 1954, said meeting having been called in accordance with the laws of the said Church, and of the State of Delaware. And I further certify that there were present and voting at said meeting a quorum of the members, and that a majority of the members of the Annual Conference concurred.

BE IT RESOLVED, that if additional funds are needed, the trustees be empowered to borrow up to \$10,000 additional.

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RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the General Conference of 1952 passed an enabling act which would permit churches and conferences of the Central Jurisdiction to transfer to other jurisdictions within their bounds through certain procedures defined by the General Conference; and

WHEREAS, we believe that we should as Christians and as Methodists, work toward the ideal of brotherhood through Jesus Christ, our Lord, with whom there is neither "Greek nor Jew, circumcision, Barbarian, Scythian, bond nor free."

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Delaware Conference approve the transfer of any of its churches which may be invited to join an annual Conference within the bounds of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, after the church itself shall have so voted.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Delaware Conference hereby vote to consider prayerfully such an invitation should it come to the Conference as a whole by the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

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**OBITUARY**
**William Walter Brown**

William Walter Brown, son of the late Benjamin and Mary Brown, was born in Calvert County, Maryland. His death occurred on August 22, 1953 at Clarksville, Delaware, where he was serving his 14th Year as Pastor.

His early life was spent in his native county. He attended the public schools of the county in which he was born. A course in law was also pursued.

The early days of his ministry were spent in the Washington Conference. In 1920 he joined the Delaware Conference and served the following charges: Wetipquin 3 years; Wachapreague 4 years; Liberia 7 years; Port Deposit 1 year; Newark 5 years; Clarksville 13 years and 4 months.

In addition to his duties as a pastor, Brother Brown displayed a wide interest in civic matters. He was a kind and helpful person who took upon himself the problems of the community in which he lived. He was affiliated with the following fraternal organizations: The Masonic Order of Berlin, Md., and the Eastern Star of Clarkville, Del.

Perhaps the greatest tribute that might be paid William Brown would be to say that he was a truly good and remarkable pastor. He was un-

pretentious but very thorough in his work, and he served his people with loyalty and devotion. And the people loved him because he so willingly served them, giving the best that he had.

Perhaps the crowning work of his ministry was the erection of the new Selbyville Church on the Clarksville Charge. The church was built during the period of the second World War. And it was completely paid for when the work was done. This accomplishment was due almost solely to the wise planning and leadership of Brother Brown.

Doubtless he was aware for sometime of the shadows of death which were closing in upon him, but in these moments his life was characterized by the same cheerfulness and patience that was so evident through his entire ministry. In illness as in the days of his good health, he was cheerful.

He is survived by his wife, Emma; a brother, Hezekiah, a sister, Ruth; five nieces and eight nephews and many friends.

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#### Maurice Clifford Anderson

Maurice Clifford Anderson, son of Henry K. Anderson and the late Annie Pollitt Anderson, was born at Fruitland, Wicomico County, Maryland, October 22, 1893 and departed this life Saturday, September 5, 1953 at Laurel, Delaware.

At an early age, he acknowledged Christ as his Saviour and began to mold his life as a servant of God.

He attended the public school at Fruitland and completed his high school work at Princess Anne Academy in 1917.

At this time his educational development was interrupted by World War I. He served in the Infantry at home and Over-Seas. Among his comrades was the late Rogers Gunby, the first World-War casualty from this section.

He bore himself well as a soldier and helped to lift the moral and spiritual standards of his fellow troopers.

This was quite a severe shock to the father, but he was consoled by the fact that his son met death while serving and helping others.\*)

Maurice entered the traveling ministry in 1921, being admitted to the Delaware Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He served with

honor and distinction the following charges: Ossining, N. Y., Federalsburg, Md., Girdletree; Sharptown; Nanticoke; Union Asbury and Liberia, all in Maryland, and at the time of his passing, was pastor of Mount Zion Methodist Church, Laurel, Delaware.

On December 17, 1949, he was joined in Holy Wedlock to Miss Ruth Goodwin of Kennett Square, Pennsylvania. This marriage was a happy one. His wife shared his confidence and his work. This year she had resigned from her position as a teacher in the public school system of Maryland in order that she might best help "Hon" in his labors for Christ and His Church.

Maurice C. Anderson, as a loving and unselfish father, urged his children to "Hitch your wagon to a Star", and encouraged them to obtain educations that would fit them for fields of service.

His first appointment upon completing school was professor of Latin and Greek at Morgan College, Baltimore, Md. He also taught in later years at Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia. His last work was the writing of the History of the Delaware Annual Conference.

In addition to his wife, Mrs. Eliza C., Dr. Handy is survived by eight children of a previous marriage to the late Rose Handy: Fred, Milton, Algernon, Alfonso, Marion, Eulalia, Viola, and Rose; two step-children, John H. 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## Rules of Order

### OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion, or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and is sustained by a two-third vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

## BY-LAWS OF THE BALTIMORE AREA OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

## ARTICLE I

## NAME

This organization shall be called the Baltimore Area of The Methodist Church

## ARTICLE II

## OBJECT

Object of the Baltimore Area shall be to provide administrative oversight for the four Annual Conferences comprising the Area: Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington. This shall be a non-profit organization.

## ARTICLE III

## MEMBERSHIP

The voting members shall be the Bishop of the Baltimore Area, Area Secretary, District Superintendents of the several Annual Conferences, and the following officers of each Annual Conference: the Conference lay leader, the Conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Conference executive Secretary of Christian Education, the Conference president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism; one pastor from each District in each of the Conferences elected by the District; presidents of colleges and Wesley Foundations within the bounds of the Area

Non-Voting members—any pastor or layman in attendance has the privilege of the floor

## ARTICLE IV

## OFFICERS

The officers of the Baltimore Area shall be: President, the presiding Bishop of the Area; two Vice Presidents, one of whom shall be a woman; a recording secretary and a treasurer. These officers other than the president shall be elected quadrennially and shall hold office until their successors are elected. All elective officers shall be chosen by ballot.

Duties of officers shall be those commonly associated with office. The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the meetings and circulate them in mimeographed form to the members. The treasurer shall receive all monies for the expense of the Area and pay all bills incident to meetings and make an itemized report to the presiding bishop after each meeting and deposit such balance as may be in hand with the Area office.

ARTICLE V

COMMITTEES

Executive Committee: The District Superintendents of the several Conferences shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Baltimore Area and function for it ad interim.

Committees: Standing Committees of the Baltimore Area shall be: Education, Missions, Finance, Membership and Evangelism, Credentials, Courtesy and Program, and such other committees as may be found necessary. All others shall be appointed by the Resident Bishop, subject to approval by the Baltimore Area.

ARTICLE VI

MEETING

The Baltimore Area shall meet at least twice during a quadrennium, such meetings to be known as the Baltimore Area Council, the first meeting being within the fiscal year following the General Conference of The Methodist Church, subsequent meetings to be determined by the Resident Bishop.

ARTICLE VII

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The budget for the support of the Baltimore Area shall be determined by the Bishop and submitted proportionately to the several Annual Conferences, subject to their approval.

ARTICLE VIII

THE AREA PAPER

There shall be published monthly an Area journal to be called the Baltimore Area Messenger, edited by the Area Secretary and such associates as he may select.

ARTICLE IX

LOCATION

The offices of the Baltimore Area shall be in the City of Baltimore, Md.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Baltimore Area by two-thirds majority of those present and voting; provided, however, that such amendments be submitted in duplicate at least two days before being acted upon.
