Roll Call: A. E. Martin called the roll of ministers followed by the roll of lay members.

The Bar of the Conference: The legal limit of the Conference was set to include the first fourteen seats across the three center aisles.

Transfer: Bishop Love announced the transfer of Joshua O. Ingram from the East Tennessee Conference effective as of September 15, 1955.

Election of Secretary: The election of Conference Secretary was called for. A. E. Martin stated that he did not desire to be considered for reelection to the office and nominated Fred D. Arnold for said office. Henry H. Nichols nominated Joshua E. Licorish. Elected for the new quadrennium to serve as Conference Secretary was J. E. Licorish.

On motion of Daniel L. Ridout, A. E. Martin, retiring Secretary, was elected to serve with J. E. Licorish for this session of the Conference in order to give the new secretary time to be orientated to procedures.

It was adopted.

District Superintendent's Report: M. O. Ballard of the Dover District was called and made his report after the passage of his character. Following his report the pastors of the Dover District stood and their character was passed.

Report of Commission on Education: John R. Shockley, chairman of the Conference Board of Education, presented the Executive Secretary, Howard A. Bailey, who read excerpts from the published report of the Board. Recommendations of the Board were stressed by J. R. Shockley. On motion of J. R. Committee on Publicity: Named by the Cabinet were F. D. Arnold, C. Edgar Jordan, W. G. Brown, W. C. Jason, D. L. Ridout, and A. E. Martin to take charge of publicity.

Noontide Message: C. Anderson Davis of the East Tennessee Conference delivered the message.

VI. The Reports

A: The District Superintendents

DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Minister and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

"Grace be unto you, and peace, from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, Amen."

Once more we stand in the presence of our brethren and under the discerning judgment of Almighty God to give a brief account of our stewardship for the year which has now come to a close.

Notes on Items of Our Concern

Adding to the membership of the church and the population of the nation, the Rev. and Mrs. C. E. Kiah, of Bridgeville, Delaware, had a little son born to them early in the conference year.

The Rev. D. S. Quillen, weary and lonely from living alone, took unto himself a wife and now lives happily.

The following persons have suffered from illness during the year: the Rev. W. E. Marks, the Rev. J. O. Griffen, Mrs. T. L. Ross and Mrs. C. P. Spencer. Miss Reader Bryant, a daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. C. R. Bryant has been hospitalized and confined to her home over a long period of time. All, except Miss Bryant and Mrs. Ross, have happily recovered and resumed their normal activities. And we pray God for the recovery and complete restoration of health for those who yet remain confined.

There have been no deaths from among the ranks of the ministry itself, but the following ministers and their wives have sustained the loss of members of their families: the Rev. and Mrs. Roland Grant, a brother and mother, respectively; Mrs. R. L. Jones, a mother; Mrs. Randolph Fisher, a grandmother. We share with them in their bereavement.

District Activities

In district and sub-district meetings a full and vigorous promotion of all phases of the church program has been maintained, and the importance of the charges meeting all their responsibilities has been stressed. Consistently both ministers and laymen have been reminded that there is no place in the organizational structure of the church for the official who would obstruct and furnish opposition to the program of the church. The district superintendent, the pastor and each official in the local church, upon the acceptance of his office, assumes with that acceptance the responsibility for the promotion of the entire program of the church.

We have continued our work in Christian stewardship, the youth emphasis, evangelism, Christian vocations and Christian education. Much progress has been made in all these emphases. Our Christian vocations program has yielded excellent results.

The Charges

BRIDGEVILLE, C. E. Kiah, pastor, maintains progress in good works. Conversions 4, accessions 4. An excellent church school is maintained—World Service and conference benevolences are met in full—new and substantial improvements made in the church and parsonage. Total raised, \$6.249.00.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT, H. T. Moody, pastor, is a good charge which achieves its goals consistently. Conversions 10, accessions 10. All obligations are fully met—an increase in salary granted—the interior of Bethel church completely renovated, and modern pews and other furnishings installed and paid for. A new Hammond organ purchased and paid for at the Trinity church.

CHESTERTOWN, C. H. Molock, pastor, continues its good record. Conversions 6, accessions 10. All regular apportionments are met in full. The church has received exterior renovation—the parsonage, new furnishings and new interior decorations. Total raised, \$11,583.00.

CHESWOLD, David Nickerson, pastor. Conversions 6, accessions 2. The charge has undergone a measure of transformation in some respects. At points Ephraim seems to be pulling away from his idol, but he is not fully free as yet. World Service and conference benevolences are fully met and all other items are in advance of the previous year. The progress made here is fully appreciated. The pastor is to be commended for his work. Total raised, \$2,726.

CLARKSVILLE, T. L. Ross was assigned here, but because of the health of his wife deemed it necessary to move to another location. Brother Edward Derrickson, a local preacher of the South Berlin charge, supplied the charge following the departure of Brother Ross. Conversions 5, accessions 5. World Service and conference benevolences are met in full. Other items are advanced. Brother Derrickson and the people are to be commended for the work done. Total raised, \$3,000,00.

COLEMAN, Roland Grant, pastor seems to be unable to apply its full potential to the task at hand. The result is a very meager report. When co-operation between pastor and people is not present, successful work cannot be done. Perhaps both pastor and people need to re-evaluate their responsibilities. Total raised, \$3,967.00.

CRUMPTON, C. R. Bryant, pastor. The pastor has given good leadership and good results have followed. Conversions 11, accessions 6. All causes have been faithfully presented. Improvement is noted in the work. A new room was added to the parsonage and a new community building purchased. Total raised, \$4,974.

DELMAR, M. V. Hyland, pastor, reports 9 conversions, 10 accessions. The interior of the church has been redecorated—the parsonage equipped with new modern conveniences. World Service and conference benevolences are fully met. Total raised, \$8,743.

DOVER, W. E. Marks, Pastor, continues to maintain a good record. Conversions 3, accessions 12. All regular apportionments are met in full. The church school continues to be an outstanding feature of the work of this charge. Total raised, \$13,156.

FAIRLEE, Phillip A. Henry, pastor. Accessions 2. All regular apportionments are met in full. An increase in salary was voted. The people have responded well. Total raised, \$4,258.

GALENA, Mrs. Rachel Brown, pastor, has done creditable work. The pastor was unable to assume her full responsibilities at the beginning of the year, but progress was not halted. A small membership has done well. Total raised \$2,926.00.

HARRINGTON, Thaddeus Hackett, pastor, continues to improve upon the caliber of its work. World Service giving has increased. The members are few in number but they are always willing to do their best. Total raised, \$4,290.00.

LAUREL, C. W. Bagwell, pastor. Conversions 3, accessions 6. World Service and all regular apportionments met in full. A new Hammond organ has been purchased—new equipment for the church. The charge continues to make progress. Total raised, \$8,155.00.

LEWES, Ethelbert Maddox, pastor, has fully met all its obligations. Conversions 40, accessions 15. An increase in salary has been granted. The people have responded well to a dynamic leadership. Total raised, \$6,004.00.

LINCOLN, J. O. Lockman, pastor. Brother Lockman completes his twenty-sixth year and continues a marvelous record of accomplishments. All budgetary items are fully met. Conversions 10, accessions 10. A salary increase has been granted. The charge is in an excellent state of spiritual health. Total raised, \$8,103.00.

MARDELA, L. R. Jones, pastor. Conversions 9, accessions 9. The pastor has diligently striven to advance the work of the charge, but progress has been somewhat retarded by losses from the membership at one of the churches. Plans are being made to renovate one of the churches. Total raised, \$5,105.00.

MILFORD, Randolph Fisher, pastor. Conversions 1, accessions 1. World Service and conference benevolences are fully met. All causes have been advanced—attendance at the church has increased—a completely new heating system installed in the church and parsonage. Total raised, \$6.513.00.

MILLINGTON, C. B. White, pastor. Contributions for World Service and other items have been increased above that of the previous year, but changed attitudes toward benevolences are much needed before the charge can realize its full possibilities. Total raised, \$4,543.00.

MILLSBORO, C. W. D. Browne, pastor. The charge again meets all its budgetary items in full. Conversions 1, accessions 1. A new social hall and new interior decorations have been added to the Friendship church. Total raised, \$7,361.00.

NASSAU, J. O. Griffen, pastor. Conversions 20, accessions 15. The pastor retires at this conference with highest honors. All regular apportionments have been fully met—new heating equipment installed in one church—each of the churches redecorated on the interior. The pastor is deserving of a sincere, "Well done." Total raised, \$10,796.00.

NEWARK, J. W. Mickle, pastor. Accessions 7. World Service and conference benevolences paid in full. Other causes have been advanced. The

magnitude of this report denotes the willingness of the Cedar Chapel church to go far beyond its requirements and carry a part of the work which the second church of the charge fails to do. Total raised, \$4,593.00.

NORTH BERLIN, G. W. Brown, pastor, reports a very successful year. The people have responded well to good leadership; presents a report with all items fully paid. Conversions 4, accessions 8. The parsonage has had one room completely renovated—improvements in other parts of the house—new house furnishing acquired—a new heating system installed in the church school building. Total raised, \$7,342.00.

POMONA, C. C. Thomas, pastor. Conversions 4, accessions 4. World Services and conference benevolences are fully met. Total raised, \$7,444.00.

PORT DEPOSIT, E. W. Dean, pastor, does its best under somewhat inhibiting conditions. The will to do is present, but how to perform that which they would seem to be wanting. Success commensurate with the human and financial resources is not an impossibility here. Total raised, \$2,383.

ROCK HALL, G. B. Wilson, pastor, is a charge which depends upon the seasonable occupation of the oyster industry for its financial success. The industry was a failure this year, and the result is reflected in their report, which is somewhat below that of the previous year. Conversions 7, accessions 10. A new heating system has been installed in one church—a new bath and study made in the parsonage. Total raised, \$6,568.

SASSAFRAS, Mrs. Ophelia James, pastor, continues to make a good record of meeting substantially all its apportionments. Conversions 1, accessions 3. One church has been renovated on the interior. Total raised, \$4.293.00.

SEAFORD, A. J. Dredden, pastor. Conversions 10, accessions 10. Improvements have been made in the parsonage. An increase in salary was granted. A reiterations of last year's evaluation of the work here is still in order: the need now is for a fuller response to the benevolent program of the church. Total raised, \$6,652.00.

SEAFORD CIRCUIT, A. J. Conway, pastor. The report is an improvement over that of the previous year. Conversions 9, accessions 9. All apportionments have witnessed increased giving. An increase in salary has been granted. Total raised, \$3,360.

SHARPTOWN, D. S. Quillen, pastor. Conversions 12, accessions 12. World Service and conference benevolences are paid in full and other causes well supported. The church has been renovated on the exterior and some improvements made on the interior. Total raised, \$5,742.00.

SMYRNA, J. J. Webster, pastor, is our very smallest appointment in numbers, but a good work is reported. Improvements are to be noted in all phases of the work. Conversions 1, accessions 1. Total raised, \$3,072.00.

SOUTH BERLIN, C. P. Spencer, pastor. Conversions 11, accessions 26. Improvements are noted in the response of the charge to the total program of the church. The church at Berlin has been renovated on the interior and a new Hammond organ installed. The church at Sinepuxent has also received exterior improvements. Total raised, \$8,183.00.

STILL POND, Paul Hilton, pastor, has improved upon its report of last year. Conversions 10, accessions 6. Improvements are to be seen in many aspects of the work in the charge. Total raised \$5,854,00.

TOWNSEND, W. C. R. Mills, pastor. The work here has been improved. Conversions 6, accessions 1. All causes have been advanced. New furnishings have been bought for the parsonage. Total raised \$4,267.00.

Bishop and brethren, this brief summary of our work by no means tells the whole story concerning our labors, for many, many more good things have been done than we have recounted here.

You will note that some of our charges have been credited with meeting in full all their financial obligations. This is no small achievement for these charges making this contribution to Methodism. And the pastors and charges reaching this worthy goal merit our sincere gratitude and appreciation for their endeavors. Other pastors and charges, while failing to meet their full apportionment on the reserve pension fund, have succeeded in realizing the sums apportioned for all other budgetary items. These charges we have classified as meeting all their regular apportionments, but they failed to collect all the required sum for the reserve pension fund. These too we wish to commend for their faithfulness and for the service rendered, and we pray that in the year which lies ahead the joy of meeting the full requirements will be shared by them also. And to others who in varying degrees fell short of expectations and requirements, we trust that another year holds brighter prospects for the fulfillment of the things which will be required of them.

Some of our charges have registered outstanding gains in conversions and accessions, and the evangelistic efforts of our youth emphasis has played no small part in bringing this about. Souls have been reclaimed, the youth fellowship has gained in numbers and the church has been undergirded and strengthened by the ever widening outreach of our evangelistic teams.

We are deeply grateful to the ministers and their wives and other laymen of the district who have served with unwavering loyalty and devotion in varied ways and numerous activities; some of whom have at their own personal expense accepted major responsibilities for the good of the cause. Such consecration as has been expressed in their labors of love has been an inspiration and a delight to the superintendent and, we believe, a great service to God and humanity.

We must now turn our faces and attention to another year and new tasks and new duties. If it be the pleasure of God and resident bishop so for us to return, we hope to go forth with renewed zeal and a firmer determination to do the task assigned to our hands.

May we remember the words of Tennyson as he said in his Ulysses,

Come, my friends,
'Tis not too late to seek a newer world.

Push off, and setting well in order smite
The sounding furrows; for my purpose holds
To sail beyond the sunset and the baths
Of all the western stars, until I die.

It may that the gulfs will wash us down;
It may be that we shall touch the happy Isles,
And see the great Achilles, whom we knew.
Tho' much is taken, much abides; and tho'

EASTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers, and Laymen:

We humbly present our second Annual Report to the Ninety-Fourth session of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church. In our sick and tottering civilization, individual and social salvation must be based on three things: (1) strengthening a vital faith in God through prayer, Bible reading, worship and Christian education in the home and church, and practical evangelism; (2) searching for truth to make us free; and (3) establishing local, national, and international relations on love. We must love our way into the hearts of all who need our Saviour. This spiritual insight and motivation which come from God have undergirded and fortified us in the midst of diverse social, economic, political, educational, and religious situations.

Our hearts are full and radiant with profound gratitude to our Heavenly Father for his providential care and the achievements of the people and thirty-four pastoral charges on the Easton District.

Sickness and Death

Physical illness reduced the strength and activity of the following ministers and ministers' wives during the conference year: Reverends Howard E. Anderson, Samuel E. Armstrong, Isaac B. Bivens, Emmons N. Foster, Edward Jackson, Amos P. Jenkins, Albert Slacum, Robert Townsend, Charles I. Young, and Isaac Wallace; Mesdames H. E. Anderson, I. B. Bivens, Frank Farrare, A. P. Jenkins, I. Wallace, R. C. Whittington, J. R. Williams.

Mrs. Emmons N. Foster departed this life on January 18, 1956; and on February 14, 1956, the Reverend William H. Staten, treasurer of the Easton district board of trustees, passed from labor to his reward.

Mid-Year Changes

On July 25, 1955, a vacancy was created in the pulpit of the Oxford charge by the voluntary transfer of the Reverend G. M. Phelps, Jr., to the Southern California-Arizona Conference. On September 29th the mid-year changes in appointments were announced to become effective on Sunday, October 9, 1955. Rev. John E. McBride was moved from Ridgely to Oxford. After fourteen years of pastoral leadership in Aireys, Maryland, Rev. Van B. Wright was appointed to supply the Ridgely charge. He was succeeded at Aireys by the Reverend Claude Edmonds.

District Activities

The major activities of the Easton district may be summarized under five headings:

1. Evangelism

Believing that salvation is the greatest human need and that the primary task of the Christian church is redemptive and evangelistic, we have given evangelism priority in our district program. The Board of Lay Activities selected "Practical Evangelism in the Church and Community" as the theme of the Laymen's Retreat which was held in Union Church, Chester, Maryland. Both ministers and laymen acquired a better understanding of the various approved methods of Evangelism and the six-point plan of assimilating converts or new members into the warm-hearted fellowship of the church. The first major evangelistic enterprise was spearheaded with six sub-district youth Christian Witness Missions conducted in Easton, St. Michaels, Centreville, Ridgely, Preston, and Cambridge. One hundred two commitments were made. Ten days later ministers and laymen in thirty-three charges participated in the District Evangelistic Crusade that revived the spirit and power in many churches and communities. Memberships increased and church attendance improved. The Easton district is spiritually alive.

2. Missionary Activities

We have endeavored to develop the missionary spirit more fully, to spread missionary information, and to acquaint the churches with the causes, plans, literature, and program of the Board of Missions. The study book, South of the Himalayas by James K. Mathews was discussed at our Institute held in St. Paul Church, Royal Oak, Md.

We have urged the Commission on Missions in the local churches "to help promote the Kingdom of God throughout the world by enlisting the active support of every member of the church in a study of the needs of the world, in definite missionary service, and in regular contributions to the cause of missions and church extension." Despite some economic reverses, our district has given larger support to the benevolent program of the Methodist Church this year. Eighteen charges paid the World Service and Conference Benevolences in full.

8. Education

Advances have been made in the area of Christian education. In addition to the District Youth Assembly and the Christian Workers' Schools, we have established the Easton District School of Religion to help both laymen and ministers to teach with clarity, with persuasiveness, and with power, and to make Christian education a continuous process in the experience of all persons. There were 218 registered students in the School of Religion during the first semester. The interest was high to the end of the second term. It is evident that Christian education has put strength into the muscles of our district. One day a layman said, "The Easton District School of Religion has helped me to do a better job as instructor of juniors. I used to go to class without any special preparation; but now I spend at

least six days preparing to teach my class on Sunday. We have better attendance and greater interest. The school has helped us." One of our most successful pastors said, "I have preached my best sermon since I attended the Easton School of Religion." This is our special educational project.

Twenty-two charges conducted vacation church schools. This was an increase of 13 over last year's report. We have urged all Commissions on Education to discharge the church's responsibility for instructing and guiding its entire constituency in Christian faith and living.

4. Finance

We have labored to organize and activate the Commission on Finance in every local church... with a central treasurer and a financial secretary who will keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements. Members of the churches are very cooperative, and the "money raising" methods and practices are more firmly established in the spirit of Christian Stewardship. Just before the District Conference, the Ministers' Wives sponsored the pastors in a popularity rally for the purpose of local church budgets and benevolences. They reported more than \$8,000.00. During the Coronation Contest, the thirty-four charges reported \$10,446.00 raised and paid for district and conference askings. The churches, on a whole, have given more this year to help advance the Kingdom of God.

5. District Parsonage

The district trustees and parsonage committee took great pride in having the concrete pavement completed, twenty-three aluminum storm windows and door installed, the interior of the parsonage repainted, and the superintendent's office modernized with new equipment. We commend the ministers and laymen for their hearty support in every effort to keep up and improve the district property.

Survey of Charges

AIREYS continues to make progress with unity of purpose and coordinated action. The new pastor, Rev. Claude Edmonds, and the members have enjoyed seven months of continuous service in the four churches. Because of his efficient and effective leadership, the pastor's return has been requested. The charge reports 2 conversions, 2 accessions, and a grand total of \$3,828.00 raised for all purposes.

BECKWITH, in her weakness, has found Christ to be her strength. This has been their banner year. The charge reports improvements in the parsonage, one accession, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and a total of \$2,780.00 raised for all purposes. Rev. R. C. Whittington is the faithful pastor.

CAMBRIDGE maintains her respected and expected high standard in Christian stewardship. Under the dynamic leadership of the new pastor, Rev. Sercy L. Jones, and the Commission on Evangelism the parish has been lifted spiritually. Waugh church had two revivals, 60 conversions and 34 accessions. A sum of \$3,500.00 was allocated and spent to give the

parsonage a "new look." The house was repainted and shingled. Storm windows and a central, automatic oil-burner heating system were also installed. Other physical improvements include the laying of a floor in the new parish hall. All conference and district askings were paid in full, and a total of \$14,622.00 was raised for all purposes. The pastor's support for the ensuing year was increased to \$3,900.00.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT is one of the most promising charges on the Easton district. The proficient and conscientious pastor, Rev. Noble Henry, was stricken down by a sudden affliction early in the conference year. He requests retirement because of physical disability. Mrs. Henry, his wife, should be commended for her fidelity and courageous ministry during her husband's confinement. The charge reports 15 conversions, 5 accessions, and \$5,125.00 raised for all purposes. The interior of each church was repainted.

CARMICHAELS has closed another good year under the wise leadership of its pastor, Rev. Robert S. Caldwell. The parish hall of John Wesley has been renovated and the Bryans church has been repainted. The charge reports 4 conversions; 9 accessions, and a total of \$5,098.00 raised for all purposes. Bryans church has increased the pastor's salary \$260.00 for the ensuing year. This church is always ready to advance, while the leaders of John Wesley church insist upon keeping the status quo.

CENTREVILLE has made progress under the effective leadership of the qualified youthful minister, Rev. John R. Williams. New toilets have been installed in the church; the parsonage has been furnished with a new gas range, oil burner, and a refrigerator. The charge reports three conversions, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and a total of \$5,313.00 raised for all purposes.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT has a "few faithful and true witnesses" who have wrought well to support all causes of the church. Yet there is a dire need for stewardship cultivation among the laity. The Gouldtown church has erected a parish hall. Improving the parsonage should be a major project next year. The charge reports 2 conversions, 2 accessions, and a total of \$3,089.00 raised. Rev. Isaac Wallace is the untiring pastor.

CHAPEL maintains her high standard in church activities. She was the winner of the Crown Contest, with the largest per capita report. The spirit of unity prevails among the members of both churches. The charge reports 3 conversions, 4 accessions, World Service and Conference Benevolences raised in full, and \$3,551.00 raised for the total budget. Rev. Milton D. Brooks is the dependable, dynamic pastor.

CHURCH CREEK reports 3 conversions, 3 accessions, and \$2,697.00 raised for all purposes. This was a better year for the charge. Rev. Samuel E. Armstrong is the pastor.

CHURCH HILL is a three point circuit. The pastor, Rev. Edward Jackson, and the people work peacefully and happily together. They report 4 conversions, 2 accessions, and \$5,980.00 raised for all causes. The members request the return of their beloved pastor.

CORDOVA has taken on new life under the leadership of her new pastor, Rev. Harvey Chase. His herculean ability and pertinacity have become very evident during his first year in the pastoral ministry. This was the first charge on the Easton district to pay all district and conference askings in full, including the Reserve Pension Fund. Methodist Men Clubs have been organized and chartered in both churches. A youth choir has been organized at New Zion church, and 17 new choir gowns have been purchased for them. The parsonage has been improved and equipped with new furniture. The charge reports 5 conversions, 17 accessions, and a total of \$4,220.00 raised for all purposes. The pastor's salary for the ensuing year has been increased \$200.00.

CRAPO and GOLDEN HILL is a hundred per cent charge in everything except the Reserve Pension Fund—on which it has paid \$50.00. Because the members and friends work harmoniously together under the good leadership of their cheerful pastor, Rev. Mrs. Hester Opher, this has been a banner year for the charge. Two converts were received and a total of \$2,541.00 was raised for all causes.

DENTON had another successful year under the effective pastoral leadership of Rev. C. Martin Stafford. Among other things the charge reports physical improvements, such as, the construction of new sanitary rest rooms at John Wesley church, the painting of Mt. Zion, and the redecorating of the parsonage. The charge also reports two conversions, two accessions, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and \$6,108.00 raised for all purposes.

EAST NEW MARKET. The pastor, Rev. Robert S. Townsend, thought it was not wise for him to be alone; therefore, he took unto himself a wife. They promoted the work of the charge. He over-taxed himself, was stricken and hospitalized. He is now recuperating. Mt. Zion and the Thompsontown church demonstrated a high degree of proficiency while their pastor was unable to assume the full responsibility of leadership. The charge reports 6 conversions, and \$4,909.00 raised for all causes.

EASTON gave the new pastor of Asbury church and his family a warm reception. Rev. Howard E. Anderson is an alert pastor and community leader who believes in careful planning, promotion, and progress. The charge reports 5 conversions and 8 accessions; World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and a grand total of \$7,391.00.

EASTON CIRCUIT began the year with some misgivings and anxiety. But the members prayed and found strength to be good stewards of God and faithful supporters of the church. The charge reports one conversion, one accession, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and \$5,647.00 raised for all purposes. Rev. Frank Farrare is the sincere pastor.

FEDERALSBURG advanced under the leadership of its new pastor, Rev. Seldon G. Dix. The charge reports 16 conversions, 20 accessions, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and \$6,500.00 raised for all causes. The parsonage was shingled and the pastor's salary for the ensuing year was increased \$800.00.

GREENSBORO and GOLDSBORO makes a good report despite the minor set-back due to the pastor's illness. The charge reports 3 conversions, 3 accessions, and \$5,160.00 raised. Mrs. Ella M. Moaney and Howard M. Smith were licensed to preach. Rev. Amos P. Jenkins is the capable pastor.

HURLOCK is one of our strongest three-point circuits. The charge takes pride in making progress, and in reporting 11 conversions, 13 accessions, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and a grand total of \$8,385.00 raised. Rev. Walter J. Mills is the noble minister.

LINKWOOD. The pastor, Rev. C. H. Cottingham, and members have wrought well and some progress has been made. The interior of Mt. Pleasant church has been repainted. St. Paul church has been reroofed, repainted, and electrified. The charge reports 6 conversions, and a total of \$3,807.00 for all purposes.

MARYDEL, as usual, gives a good account of its stewardship. The charge reports 2 conversions, 2 accessions, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and a grand total of \$3,395.00 raised. With tenacity of purpose the Rev. Charles I. Young has completed 8½ consecutive years of dynamic pastoral leadership in the Marydel Charge. His return has been requested.

McDANIEL'S pastor pulled a surprise on his superintendent when he said, "Meet my madam." Rev. Albert Slacum and his new bride have worked faithfully to advance the churches. The charge reports 2 conversions, 2 accessions, and \$2,837.00 raised for all purposes.

MILES RIVER reports another very good year: conversions 3, accessions 14, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, \$4,575.00 raised for all purposes. Other achievements include the repainting of the McGee church, construction of a parish hall at the Deshield church, and installation of an automatic hot water heater in the parsonage. Rev. Theasdar M. Murray is the efficient and unfaltering pastor.

OXFORD brings another good report to the Conference. During the pulpit vacancy, this charge received four converts and raised more money for benevolences per capita than any other charge on the district. These are great people who realize that they are not serving "the preacher, but God." The pastor, Rev. John E. McBride, has given the charge effective leadership. The Waters church has laid a new floor, installed an electrically lighted bulletin board, liquidated its mortgage on the parish hall; paid the World Service and Conference Benevolences in full, and raised \$5,557.00 for all purposes.

PRESTON has not done her best this year. The pastor, Rev. Emmons N. Foster, has labored under a strain due to illness, the death of his wife, and the social and administrative tension within the parish. This charge has a most promising group of children and youth. The report includes 15 conversions, 5 accessions, \$5,182.00 raised for all causes.

RIDGELY was interrupted when the pastor who had served them commendably for a period of four years was moved to Oxford. Some leaders of Ridgely said, "Since a change was inevitable, we are glad you sent us Rev. Van B. Wright to be our pastor." Already there are signs of progress. In addition to six conversions and seven accessions, the outstanding feature of the charge was the installation of a modern plumbing system and a bath in the parsonage. The charge raised a total of \$6,126.00.

ROYAL OAK and BELLEVUE had a revival and a great spiritual awakening among the members. There were ten accessions. Rev. Joseph I. Williams is the faithful pastor who plans and works tenaciously with a Christian motive. Physical improvements have been made, such as, the painting of the interior of the parsonage and St. Luke church, and the construction of a kitchen in the parish hall. The charge reports all World

Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and a total of \$8,567.00 raised for all purposes.

ST. MICHAELS continues to make progress under the pastoral leadership of Rev. Harry R. Snead who is meticulous in planning and adroit in the promotion of the program of the Methodist Church. The entire community has felt the spiritual vibrations of the revival and evangelistic services of the church. The charge reports 9 conversions, 9 accessions, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, and \$7,132.00 raised for the total budget. The pastor's support for the ensuing year has been increased \$300.00.

STEVENSVILLE advanced under the competent leadership of Rev. C. Edgar Jordan. The charge reports 2 conversions, 13 accessions, and \$5,319.00 raised for all purposes, plus \$4,000.00 received from the insurance company for the loss the charge sustained in the destruction of the parish hall in Chester by fire. The highlights of the charge include the installation of a new Hammond Organ in the Union Church... and a new bride in the parsonage.

TAYLORS ISLAND gave the new pastor, Rev. George L. Stanley, and his family a hearty welcome. Despite the great distance between Hoopersville and the other three churches, the pastor promises to ally himself vigorously to revive the St. John's church as a vital, integral part of the Taylors Island charge. The charge reports 5 conversions, 3 accessions, and a total of \$4,700.00 raised for all purposes.

TRAPPE has enormous potential strength in its children, youth, and unevangelized people of the community. Rev. Harvey T. Hall is the strong, affable and effective pastor. Under his leadership the congregation has grown cohesively and extensively. This charge is 100% in everything except the Reserve Pension Fund—on which it has paid \$335.00. Other achievements include 3 conversions, 7 accessions, installation of a new heating system in the church, and a total of \$6,717.00 raised for the budget. The pastor's support for the ensuing year was increased \$150.00.

VIENNA and REIDS GROVE reports another successful year's work. The outstanding achievements include 12 conversions, 13 accessions, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, the renovation of John Wesley church, and a total of \$4,679.00 raised for all purposes. This charge has untapped spiritual resources. There are many children, youth, and gainfully employed adults within the parish who have not committed themselves to Christ and His Church. Rev. Abraham A. McDowell is the genuine Christian minister who has just ended his 22nd consecutive year as pastor of this charge.

WILLISTON is a three point circuit with only thirty-eight active and inactive members. Rev. N. C. Stanley is the successful pastor. He planned well to raise the conference askings in full, but the hurricanes last summer damaged the farm crops and left some people of this area unemployed. The charge reports 6 conversions, 6 accessions, and \$1,980.00 raised for all purposes.

WITTMAN and SHERWOOD had a set-back this year. The pastor, Rev. Isaac B. Bivens, requests retirement at this session of the Conference. The charge reports 6 conversions, 6 accessions, and \$2,540.00 raised for all

causes. This parish needs an active, dynamic minister, more planned activities among the laymen, and an effective program of Christian education to strengthen the stewardship life of the two churches.

Conclusion

The 228 conversions, 223 accessions, and a grand total of \$180,060.00 raised for all purposes are evidences of progress. We are grateful to our Heavenly Father, to Bishop Love, and the ministers, laymen, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Ministers' Wives, the Youth Fellowship, and others who helped in any way to make this report of achievements on the Easton district possible. With the motivation of divine love in our hearts, we shall go forth from this Annual Conference in the Name of Jesus to strengthen the churches and advance the Kingdom of God.

"Now to him who is able to keep you from falling and to present you without blemish before the presence of his glory with rejoicing, to the only God, our Saviour through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, dominion. and authority, before all time and now and forever. Amen."

SALISBURY DISTRICT

Bishop Love, members and friends of the Delaware Annual Conference, with humility of spirit and gratitude to Almighty God, I beg to give an account of my stewardship.

Space and time will not permit me to say of the ministers and laymen all that should be said of their very fine cooperation in making this report possible. Many charges have worked against circumstances which looked as though their report to the Conference would have been a total defeat, but through the providence of an all-wise God and planning their work and working their plans, the district will show an advance over last year in all of the Conference work.

This has been an unusually difficult year economically for the Salisbury District, but perhaps no more so than for the other districts of the rural areas. Many of the places of employment were closed and others were part time. In the face of these trying experiences the minister accepted his responsibility of leadership and went about his work with confidence that he would win if he did not lose faith. In the midst of the circumstances mentioned above, several of the charges are making a full report to this annual conference. This speaks well for the leadership in these charges.

At the beginning of this conference year one of the ministers became homesick and decided that he would go back home. He therefore surrendered his credentials and withdrew from the Conference. On the twenty six of June, nineteen hundred and fifty five, Rev. Joseph Hayman was mortally wounded in an automobile accident. These two incidents, coming so early in the conference year, gave an extra responsibility to the District Superintendent. Each charge had to be supplied until September. I want to thank the officials of Shiloh Methodist Church of Crisfield, Maryland for being so understanding and cooperating so very well with the District Superintendent during this period of transition. Keller and Manokin Charges were likewise affected by changes in the mid-year. The people of these charges are to be highly commended for their loyal spirit to the work of the church. January twenty ninth of this calendar year, Rev. Jesse W. Pruitt suddenly went to be with the Lord. Suitable obituaries for our sainted brothers will be published in the conference journal.

District Activities

The district shows a remarkable increase in growth over last year in all of its activities. The District Staff on Christian Education held its staff meeting April 4th to arrange for the district educational program. May 12th the District Stewards meeting was held. May 24th and 25th the Vacation Church School Institutes were held at Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Maryland and John Wesley Methodist Church, Salisbury, Maryland. These institutes were under the guidance of Mrs. C. A. Elder. The Youth Assembly was held at Maryland State College, July 12th to 14th. The Observation School was held at Kingston, Maryland October 30th. The Youth Missionary Rally was held at Ebenezer Methodist Church, Snow Hill, Maryland. One hundred and thirty one youth responded to the call of Rev. Frederick Arnold who is the youth director of the district. The District Conference was at White Temple Methodist Church, Salisbury, Maryland. At this conference Bishop and Mrs. Edgar A. Love were the

honored guests. They electrified the district by messages of hope and love. The Pre-Conference Rally was held at Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Maryland and the Missionary Institute at Calvary Methodist Church, Fruitland, Maryland under the direction of Rev. Samuel E. Parker, the District Missionary Secretary. Our speaker for this occasion was Dr. S. B. Tewarson, Principal of the Parker Intermediate College of Moradabad, India. We saw, as a district, how little we sacrifice as a people for missions. Vacation Church Schools on the district: there were thirty one such schools this year with an enrollment of eleven hundred and thirty one pupils. were five short of having one school in every charge of the district, which is the goal of the children's worker, Mrs. C. A. Elder. She is to be highly commended for her untiring efforts in bringing about this remarkable achievement. The District Secretary of Evangelism, Rev. George T. Jackson, has done and is doing a remarkable task in evangelizing the district. Churches and charges are being revived and men are being saved into the Kingdom of God. The Woman's Society of Christian Service is continuing to increase in its spiritual power, in its financial strength, and in its social outlook in both local church and on the district. Mrs. Lenora D. Robins is the untiring president.

The lay activities is continuing to hold a very definite place in the life of the district through its leadership. There has been an increase in the Methodist Men's organizations. The goal is one active Methodist Men's organization in every charge of the district. The Lay Leader, W. H. Hayman and his associates, Andrew Evans, Roy Pinkett, Lorie Taylor and B. T. Hall have done much to bring about the realization of this goal.

The ministers' wives are to be commended for their willingness to cooperate with the Conference Board of Pensions in the new method of raising that fund this year. They responded to the plan and their report will show that they cooperated fully. This is truly a loyal group of women, and they deserve the love of every member of the conference.

Report of the Charges

COTTAGE GROVE (R. T. Wallace, pastor). This pastor, true to his motto, "Get things done," has done it again. In the midst of muddy roads, churches having to be closed at times, he reports an increase over last year. Raised for all purposes \$3,238. His return is requested.

CRISFIELD: SHILOH (D. W. Briddell, Pastor). In June of this conference year the pastor, Rev. R. L. Parker, withdrew from the conference. The charge was without a pastor until the first of September. At that time the present pastor took over. Too much praise cannot be given to the people of this charge for their loyalty between the withdrawal and the arrival of pastors. Briddell came on the scene and took command like an experienced general. The transition was such that no time was lost in the work of the charge. Conversions 4, accessions 11. Raised for all causes \$7,470.93.

CRISFIELD: UNION ASBURY & LIBERIA (Ernest J. Johnson, Pastor). This charge has had its uphill journey. Liberia church decided that they did not want the pastor on his arrival the very first year, so they took the do nothing attitude and that has prevailed. A good pastor and a hard

worker. Conversions 1, accessions 3. The basement of the church has been renovated. Raised for all causes \$4,200.

DAMES QUARTER (I. H. White, Pastor). This charge has not come up to the report of last year. There is a "buried hatchet" and they seem to know where to find it when wanted. The pastor has striven to lead with results very meager. Conversions 5, accessions 12. Raised for all purposes \$3.940.

DEAL ISLAND (W. C. Thomas, Pastor). This pastor has worked under handicaps, but the work is in advance of last year. Conversions 5, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$3,547. The pastor is asking for retirement at this conference.

FRUITLAND (S. E. Parker, Pastor). This pastor brings another full year's work to this conference. His help-meet has been under the care of the physician for more than a year. Nevertheless he gives a good account of his stewardship. Conversions 30, accessions 28. Raised for all purposes \$6,427. The people increased the salary and requested his return.

GIRDLETREE (L. H. Purnell, Pastor). This is one of our best organized three point charges, with the largest Sunday Schools. This pastor makes sure what the program of the district and the conference is, and never lets it go until a one hundred percent work is done. For eight years he has done this. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Raised for all causes \$6,113. They ask for his return.

GREENWOOD (R. A. F. Graham, Pastor). This charge is in a rural area and has been affected by the shortage of crops. The charge is spiritually alive, organizations functioning very well. Brother Graham has done his best to have a good report. Conversions 6, accessions 6. Raised for all purposes \$2,213.

HOPEWELL (G. N. Jones, Pastor). Loyal pastor, loyal people, a very, very commendable year's work has been done. Conversions 6, accessions 10. Raised for all purposes \$4,700.

HORNTOWN (Carroll Scott, Pastor). A new pastor in a new place. At the coming of this new pastor the people took on new life, and the charge has made history. Brother Scott planned his work well. He has real concern for all people. Conversions 4, accessions 8. Raised for all causes \$6,752. His return is requested.

KELLER (Jeremiah Lee, Pastor). This is a very small charge with limited means. Fifty four members in two churches. Brother Lee was sent to this charge in the middle of the year. He organized his force of fifty four members and began to raise the conference askings. He has done a very commendable job. Conversions 2, accession 5. Raised for all causes \$1,645.19. His return is requested.

LEEMONT (S. P. Sanders, Pastor). This is one of our very strong charges capable of doing great work. The new pastor has advanced the work beyond that of last year. Conversions 4, accessions 4. Raised for all causes \$5,581. They are asking for his return.

MANOKIN (Joshua Ingram, Pastor). Brother Ingram came to us in September from the East Tennessee Conference. He became adjusted to his new work and began to raise the askings. This is a three point charge. Centennial Church is very small in numbers, but likes to do big things. Samuel Wesley and St. Paul specialize in doing small things. The report is in advance of last year's. Conversions 1, accessions 15. Raised for all causes \$2,109.03. They are asking that he remain.

MARION STATION (G. W. Taylor, Pastor). This could be a leading charge on the Salisbury District if a majority of the people would follow the leadership of their pastor. The thunderstorm has developed into a violent tropical cyclonic storm. The pastor has carried on well amid the storm, and makes a commendable report. Conversions 5, accessions 16. Raised for all causes \$6.518.

MARUMSCO and KINGSTON (Alexander Reid, Pastor). Pastor and people have worked well together this conference year. Spiritual and educational emphasis has been the major objective of the great leader. Conversions 4, accessions 20. Raised for all causes \$4,325.

MOUNT VERNON (Edward Lee, Pastor). At the coming of this new pastor this charge has taken on new life. He organized the work of the charge at the beginning of the year. As a result the charge has excelled its previous year's work by a hundred percent. Conversions 1, accessions 0. Raised for all purposes \$4,575.

NANTICOKE (G. O. Commodore, Pastor). This is one of the best charges of the district. It has not measured up to its possibilities. The conference askings have fallen below last year's. This charge is able to do far better work than this report indicates. Conversions 3, accessions 0. Raised for all purposes \$4,826.

OAKVILLE (Clarence Handy, Pastor). This charge continues to grow under the leadership of a very progressive pastor. The church continues to grow in numbers and the spiritual life is very rich. Conversions 4, accessions 10. Raised for all causes \$5,491. They are asking that Handy stay around.

ORIOLE and VENTON (D. T. Lewis, Pastor). Pastor Lewis has done a very remarkable task this year at this charge. All collections increased over last year, and the people are following his leadership. The exterior of Venton church has been painted, windows screened, hymn books and choir robes purchased, parsonage painted, new frigidaire and new oil burner installed. Conversions 7, accessions 5. Raised for all causes \$4,850.

PARSONSBURG (R. W. Dennis, Pastor). Pastor and people together work their plans, hence another full year's work has been done. This man makes every effort to do all that the conference and district ask of his charge. Conversions 2, accessions 4. Raised for all purposes \$5,934. He is asked to return for the eighth year.

POCOMOKE (James F. Henry, Pastor). Pastor Henry brought new life to this charge at the beginning of the year. By October he had just about completed the year's work. New furniture and two new oil burners were installed in the parsonage and the entire parsonage was papered and painted. Brother Henry was out of his pulpit more than a month because of a serious illness. We are thankful to God for his recovery. Conversions 10, accessions 0. Raised for all causes \$6,175.

PRINCESS ANNE (C. D. Gerald, Pastor). Metropolitan church has a good team in pastor and wife. The work is well planned, goals set, and

a good year's work done. Mid-week prayer service has been restored. Church and parsonage are being renovated. The youth work is very active. Conversions 11, accessions 13. Raised for all causes \$8,167.

QUANTICO (H. W. Spencer, Pastor). A most remarkable year's work has been done in this charge. Pastor Spencer brings to this conference a full report. Peace has prevailed and the people have cooperated in the total program because he was careful in his planning. Conversions 8, accessions 8. Raised for all purposes \$5,960. His return is requested.

SALISBURY, JOHN WESLEY (C. A. Elder, Pastor). This charge continues to advance in spite of itself. Pastor Elder has a very unique way in promoting the work of the Kingdom. All old debts paid, and the exterior of the church painted. Another full year's work done. Conversions 7, accessions 10. Raised for all purposes \$8,085.

SALISBURY, WHITE TEMPLE (F. D. Arnold, Pastor). Another good year's work has been done in this charge. The pastor plans well his work and makes every effort to carry out those plans. Often times misunderstood his main object is to promote the full program of the church. An altar set has been purchased, the interior of the church painted and carpet put down. Conversions 5, accessions 7. Raised for all causes \$7,657.

SHILOH and HUTTS CHAPEL (J. S. Collins, Pastor). This pastor was hospitalized at the very time the people needed him most. He makes a report in advance of last year. Pastor Collins gets his work done. Conversions 1, accessions 3. Raised for all purposes \$4,448. His return is requested.

SNOW HILL (G. T. Jackson, Pastor). "Progressiveness" is the "motto" of this pastor and people. They have progressed along all lines. He has organized a prayer vigil which has done much to quicken the spiritual life of the church and community. Church attendance is on the increase. Conversions 6, accessions 11. Raised for all causes \$8,099. The people want to keep Jackson.

EXMORE, SPENCE CHAPEL (Mrs. Jessica Hickman, Pastor). This is the baby charge of the district, and it seems that this baby has not the vitality for growth. Pastor Hickman is doing all that she can to promote the work, but with not too much success. Conversions 1, accessions 8. Total full members 15. Raised for all causes \$447.75.

STOCKTON (Mrs. A. W. Coffey, Pastor). Stockton has been hard hit by unemployment, yet they have done a very fair year's work. The pastor has worked hard to have a full report, but has not quite made it. She makes a commendable report. Conversions 2, accessions 5. Raised for all causes \$4,937.

UNIONVILLE (C. W. Cannon, Pastor). This pastor brings another good report to this conference. A hard working young man, deeply concerned about the work of the conference. The two churches have a mind to carry out the whole program of the church. Brother Cannon leads well. Conversions 18, accessions 3. Raised for all causes \$5,117.

UPPER HILL (J. W. Pruitt, the late pastor). This charge like Manokin lost its pastor during the year, but the report is in advance of last year. A Hammond Organ was installed and paid for. This has been a very loyal

people and are willing to carry out the conference program. Conversions 1, accessions 0. Raised for all purposes \$4,122.

WACHAPREAGUE (Omar C. Jones, Pastor). Another good leader has led his people to another successful year's work. Pastor Jones has so endeared himself to his people, they respond to his call without question. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$3,071.

WATTSVILLE (E. A. Hughes, Pastor). Pastor Hughes is one of our hard working pastors. He gets things done even when the odds are against him. He has worked hard to come up to the previous years, but did not quite reach the goal. A good year's work has been done. Conversions 3, accessions 1. Raised for all causes \$6,455.

WETIPQUIN (W. A. Nichols, Pastor). A hard working pastor has been hit hard by the economic conditions in his community. He believes in a full report, but he has fallen back somewhat this year. This is a very commendable report to this conference. Conversions 17, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$5,150.

WHITE HAVEN (Alexander Boggs, Pastor). This pastor has worked hard to bring up the work of this charge, but not too much success. Having to move to Philadelphia early in the fall made it difficult for him to render much service to the people. Pastor Boggs has been a very faithful pastor. Conversions 1, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$2,423.

WITHAMS (R. T. Croswell, Pastor). Pastor Croswell believes in doing things in a big way, but old man "unemployment" kept him from flying too high this year. Although he has wrought well and has made a good report, he has not fully achieved his goal. He makes every effort to do all that is asked of him in his pastoral work. Conversions 14, accessions 6. Raised for all purposes \$6,586.

Summary

Accessions, 225—Methodist Youth Fellowships, 26—Methodist Men's Groups, 28—Woman's Societies of Christian Service, 58. 11 charges increased the salaries of their pastors, and 29 are giving allowance for travel. World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$7,297, an average of \$1.31 per member. The following 15 charges paid in full: Salisbury: John Wesley and White Temple; Quantico, Princess Anne, Parsonsburg, Oakville, Mount Vernon, Horntown, Hopewell, Girdletree, Fruitland, Leemont, Pocomoke, Wachapreague and Shiloh, Crisfield.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Rev. Howard A. Bailey for his untiring work of the educational ministry of the district, in cooperation with our district staff. My sincere thanks go to pastors, laymen—all devoted workers for Christ, the self sacrificing ministers' wives, and all of those who have helped make this report possible.

I come to the close of this conference year with the consciousness that my highest ambition has been to promote the Kingdom in all its interests. To some degree this has been done. For this we give the praise and glory to Almighty God.

May I thank you, Bishop Love and your able administrative assistant, the Rev. Daniel L. Ridout, for the encouragement and support of the

episcopal office in these hours of labor. May God give you wisdom, faith, and physical strength as you enter upon your task of service in the new quadrennium.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of this Conference. With gratitude to God for His guidance and with profound appreciation to the Ministers and Laymen, for their cordial hospitality and perpetual cooperation, I present this my Initial Annual Report.

Sick

During the year the following were on the sick list: Brothers B. A. Arnold, J. I. Peaco, J. N. C. Davis, I. H. Thompson, Horace Fisher and Mrs. Edwin Effis.

Translations

Rev. J. L. Taylor, Mrs. Wm. Tasco and Mrs. John E. Bishop have joined the church triumphant.

Suitable memorials will appear in the Conference Journal.

District Activities

The District Stewards Meeting, The Youth Assembly, The District Conference, The Missionary Institute, The Youth Rallies, The Commission on Town and Country Work, The Christian Workers Schools, The Woman's Society of Christian Service, The Young Adult Fellowship and the District Staff on Christian Education were all held, and were well attended.

The Christian Witness Mission

The Christian Witness Mission sponsored by the Washington and Delaware Conferences was held July 10th-17th, '55 in Wilmington, Del. The purpose of this Mission was to train Youth to Witness for Christ, by telling their experiences to others, for the purpose of leading them to Christ and the Christian way of living.

Thirty six Youth went forth two by two, with smiles on their faces, songs on their lips and prayers in their hearts. They visited 316 homes and held 446 interviews in Wilmington, New Port and Dunleith. There were 66 professions of faith, 12 new members and 4 transfers for the M. Y. F. 70 unchurched methodist and 24 prospects were found. This Mission was a terrific success.

Integration

In 1954, just before the Supreme Court Decision, the Board of Education of Wilmington, Del. began to integrate all Elementary schools. In 1955 all 7th grade Junior High Schools were integrated. In 1956 the Board voted unanimously to eliminate segregation in all schools forever. It is significant to observe that the only negro member of the Board made this motion.

We have approximately 800 negro children integrated in schools that were formerly all white. We have about 14 negro teachers teaching in formerly all white schools. Negro children are now in all of the Elementary schools and in all of the High schools, taking courses that are not offered to them, in the negro High schools. Negroes will attend the school that is nearest to them. White children are attending schools that were formerly all negro. Five white students are now attending the Bancroft school. Wilmington, Del. has had successful integration without incident.

District Parsonage

The District Parsonage has been painted outside and improved. It is free of debt.

The Report by Charges

ASBURY, Atlantic City. This Charge continues her good record of raising all askings in full. Beautiful improvements have been made in the Parsonage, but a new Parsonage is much needed. A Building Fund Campaign is on to erect the same. The Pastor and People are happy to report improvements \$3,000.00, and raised for all purposes \$23,546.00. 100% Charge. Rev. O. H. Spence, Pastor.

HAMILTON MEMORIAL is happy to report advances in giving for all causes. A Parish House has been built and furnished. Improvements have been made in the Church and Parsonage to the amount of \$3,340. Raised for all purposes \$10,000, Conversions 12, Accessions 20. Rev. H. D. Davis, Pastor.

BRIDGETON has made some improvements over last year. Conversions 10; Accessions 10. Raised for improvement on Church \$300.00; Parsonage

\$200.00. Raised for all purposes \$6,500. Great possibilities lurk in this

Charge. Rev. M. C. Blakely, Pastor.

BURLINGTON has excelled her last years record. The people get joy out of working for the church. Conversions —; Accessions 5. Paid on improvements \$500.00. Raised for all causes \$4,000. Rev. Horace Fisher, Pastor.

BUTTONWOOD AND CHRISTIANA continue to make temporal and spiritual progress. Plans are being made to erect a Parsonage so the Pastor can live on the charge. Conversions 2; Accessions 2. Paid for improvements \$700.00. All causes have been raised in full to the amount of \$4,500. 100% Charge. Rev. S. L. Wilkins, Pastor.

CAMDEN EIGHTH STREET. The Pastor and people were inspired by the challenge that was given to them by the Board of Missions. They were asked to raise \$3,000.00 of their \$8,520.49 mortgage in 12 months. Then they would be given \$2,840 from the Board of Missions and \$2,680.00 from the Conference. The church accepted the challenge by raising \$1,109.00. They are endeavoring to raise the balance before the end of the year. Conversions 4; Accessions 10. Raised for all causes \$3,500. Rev. G. A. Sherman, Pastor.

FERRY AVENUE has enlarged her vision and increased her zeal. The Pastor and People are endeavoring to tap the resources, and bring to pass a greater Church. A new roof has been put on the Church and the interior decorated. Conversions 3; Accessions 3. Paid on improvements \$2,010.00. Raised for all causes \$8,000.00. Rev. G. E. Geddis, Pastor.

CAPE MAY and SWAINTON. The Pastor has served his seventh year on this Charge. The report shows some gains over last year. Conversions 4; Accessions 3. Improvements on Church \$300.00. Paid on Mortgage \$400.00. Raised for all causes \$3,000.00. Rev. S. G. Fullman, Pastor.

GRACE-CHESTER. This Charge needs a Church and Parsonage. The Pastor and people are working hard to start the erection of a Church this year. The possibilities are great here. Conversions 4; Accessions 15. Paid for improvements \$153.00. Raised for all causes \$6,000.00. Rev. A. L. Black, Pastor.

SILOAM-CHESTER. Notwithstanding the illness of the Pastor, who has completely recovered, this Charge has been greeted by success. Conversions 15; Accessions 14. Paid for improvements \$1,000.00. All Conference askings have been paid in full to the amount of \$14,000.00. 100% Charge. Rev. J. N. C. Davis, Pastor.

CHESTER-ST. DANIELS. Success again greets this Charge. A Church Community Center is in the process of construction. Improvements on Church and Parsonage \$18,000.00. Conversions 61; Accessions 21. All askings have been paid in full to the amount of \$25,286.00. 100% Charge. Rev. F. D. Jones, Pastor.

DARBY has surpassed all previous records. The ceiling in the Church has been completed. Mortgage payments are up to date. Conversions 4; Accessions 28. As usual all askings have been raised in full. Raised for all causes \$11,313.00. This includes the \$500.00 received from the Advance Fund. 100% Charge. Rev. W. C. Strother, Pastor.

DELAIR was the first Charge on the District to raise all of its W. S. Apportionment in full. The Pastor saw that it was not good to be alone, so he "took unto himself a Wife." Conversions 5; Accessions 4. Paid for improvements \$2,000.00. Raised for all causes \$8,000.00. Rev. T. H. Pendleton. Pastor.

ELKTON has paid off its \$2,500.00 mortgage. The Pastor and People have labored diligently, and are happy to report 5 Conversions; 5 Accessions. Paid for improvements \$800.00. Raised for all causes \$4,000.00. Rev. J. H. Russum. Pastor.

FORDVILLE. This Charge leads the District in the number of tithers. 33 members bring all of their tithes to the Church every Sunday. A new floor was laid in the Church. A new heater unit and new furniture was placed in the Parsonage. Conversions 11; Accessions 3. Paid on improvements \$3,700.00. Raised for all causes \$10,000.00. Rev. Wm. Tasco, Pastor.

GRENLOCK and RHODES. Here we have a beautiful example of what can be done with a three point circuit. The Pastor and People are happy to report substantial increases for all askings. Renovations have been made to the amount of \$500.00. Raised for all purposes \$4,100. Rev. G. Wayne Cuff, Pastor.

LAWNSIDE. This Pastor has developed the fine art of getting along with people. Fruitful gains may be observed along all lines. Conversions 4; Accessions 4. Paid for improvements \$300.00. Raised for all causes \$6,000.00. Rev. E. V. Wimberly, Pastor.

MERCHANTVILLE. This Charge continues to grow, go, and glow, while the Pastor and People are eager to make it so. A new heater was installed. A new roof was put on the Church. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

Bishop, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference.

It is again my pleasure to report to this ninety-fourth session of the Annual Conference, our Stewardship of the Conference Board of Lay Activities.

Our Mid-year session was held at Dover, Delaware. We reviewed the work of the four Commissions of the Local Church. Each Commission's discussion was led by a District Superintendent and a resource person. They tried to lift up the detailed work of each Commission. We had approximately three hundred and fifty persons in attendance for two days.

Those present were divided into groups and the leaders of the groups rotated from one group to another. Plus the study groups we had a real spiritual treat.

District Board

Each District Board had an Annual one day meeting. They discussed many things that they felt could be improved. (1) Lay Member of the Annual Conference, (2) Participation by men in the Local Church, (3) Training of an Official Board.

Christian Stewardship

We are planning for the ensuing year to develop Christian Stewardship through our Conference. We did not carry out our Stewardship emphasis last year only through our Church School and Women Society of Christian Service. Our Conference had one meeting, with the area director.

Many of our Churches had an every member canvass at the beginning or close of the Conference Year.

Methodist Men

The Methodist Men work is growing rapidly. We have one hundred and twenty six chartered groups and several groups that are not charter. We hope to have them all chartered in the very near future. Our plan during this year is to have all Methodist Men groups actively engaged in some project. We are recommending all groups to subscribe for the Methodist Laymen and use for their guide the monthly program outlined.

We also suggest that the Methodist Men Group work very closely with the pastor in what ever program the official board adopts. We hope this coming year the men will take on other projects outside the local church or conference.

Lay Speaking

We are glad to say, we have been successful in securing lay speakers in most all of our churches. We hope, that since there are so many phases of our church life to be discussed that we will use them at every opportunity.

Training Leaders in Local Church

We will continue to lay stress on training leaders in the local church, especially Lay members of the Annual Conference, Commission Chairmen and other official Board members. We feel that can be done very effectively in the local churches as well as in our work shops on the district level.

Lay Activities

The Lay work is the training and deepening the spiritual lives of laymen until they become an active working force in the local church. This can only be accomplished when ministers and laymen work together for one common cause; the building of a strong Christian church life, in the hearts of the people in their community and around the world.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE PRESIDENT WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Bishop Love, members of the Conference:

It is with gratitude to our heavenly Father and to the good women of the Delaware Conference that I make this, my second report to the ninetyfourth session of the Delaware Annual Conference.

We are closing this quadrennium with pride, for much has been accomplished. Yet, we have not done all of the things we wanted to do, or should have done, but thanks be to God for that which has been accomplished. We have, in all sincerety accepted the price of Discipleship. Our report can be termed, "Fruits of our Discipleship."

The District presidents have cooperated beautifully with the program. Seminars were held at the beginning of the year on all five districts. The quarterly meetings have been most inspiring, emphasizing different departments of the work, especially in those departments that needed cultivation the most.

Our Wesleyan Service Guild, under the fine leadership of its secretary, Miss Lena Dendy, are doing an excellent job. In July 1955, the Guild and the Woman's Society of Christian Service, joined hands in the Summer School of Missions, at Cheyney State Teachers College. The Guild began on Friday afternoon, using the conference officers as teachers. They closed on Sunday afternoon, at which time the Woman's Society began. It was a wonderful fellowship, an experience we will never forget. Our attendance was much larger. All of this is as it should be. We are looking forward to the same fine fellowship this Summer, Where Love dwells, hate and malice can not abide.

The important feature of our years work was the purchase of a new building for our "Friendship House." STATEMENT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Bishop Love and members of the Conference:

The Board of Education is happy to submit the summary of its year's work.

The program and policies of the board have been executed in a marvelous manner through the very efficient leadership of our Executive Secretary, the Reverend Howard A. Bailey, and the support of his loyal, hard working staff. As board Chairman, I wish to extend to these and all others who have helped to make this report possible, my most sincere congratulations for a job well done.

The achievements of the year indicate that the program of Christian Education in our conference is expanding both in scope and effectiveness. May I cite just two areas in which we have made progress:

1—Camping: We are negotiating for the purchase of a campsite.
2—Youth work: We have employed a salaried part-time director Youth work.

These, we feel will do much to enhance the growth and effectiveness of our work.

Great honor has come to us during the year through our Executive Secretary, who was elected last November to the Presidency of the Methodist Conference on Christian Education. Congratulations are in order. But, can you think of a better way to sincerely felicitate Howard A. Bailey, than through greater support of the Conference Program of Christian Education?

We are losing two of our very able staff members at this time. They are the Reverends Henry H. Nichols, Conference Director of Youth Work and Royal C. Hughes, Conference Director of Adult Work. These men have labored long and hard to help our cause. The conference board is deeply indebted to them.

We welcome their successors, Reverend Edward H. Holmes, Director of Adult Work, Mr. Herman Brown, Director of Older Adult work, and Mr. C. Leonard Miller, Director of Youth Work; in the hope that even greater good may be accomplished in the Master's name.

Now, may I call your attention to the Anniversary Program of the Board to be presented on Friday evening at 7:30 o'clock. The emphasis this year will be on Children's Work. The Council of Children's Work under the direction of Mrs. Emma Wilson Strother will be in charge. It is important that you witness this program. For one of the greatest challenges facing us as parents and teachers is in the area of Children's Work. There is an increasing number of children coming into the world each year; and larger numbers should be enrolled in nursery and kindergarten classes. Therefore, more consideration must be given to reaching and serving the spiritual needs of this ever increasing group.

In concluding, may I thank all of you for the support given the cause of Christian teaching in the churches; and urge you to give even more of your time, talents and possessions that more people may be given Christian guidance in their growth and development.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference, it is with a real sense of gratitude to God and to you my fellow laborers, that I submit this my thirteenth annual report of my stewardship. The labor of the past year, like the others which have gone before, has been a labor enjoyed. To be privileged to serve in a task which one enjoys and in which one feels that some progress is being made in the development of Christ-like persons, is indeed a cause for thanksgiving.

The Conference Staff: During the years in which I have served as your Executive Secretary it has been my very good fortune to have been sup-

ported by a most excellent conference staff. Two members of the present staff, Rev. R. C. Hughes and Rev. Henry H. Nichols, were serving as Director of Adult Work and Director of Youth Work, respectively when I entered this office. The services which these two veterans in Christian education have rendered has been most valuable. Under their leadership a countless number of adults and youth have found the joy of a satisfying Christian growth. The Board of Education, and indeed the Delaware Conference, are greatly indebted to them for the long years of unselfish and devoted service they have given. We pause to call attention to their outstanding contributions especially at this time, because of the pressure of cther duties, both of them have requested to be relieved of their directorship responsibilities. Being unable to prevail upon either of them to continue, we have reluctantly sought to find their successors. In this, both of these retiring directors have given most helpful counsel and their fullest cooperation. I have not been privileged to work with associates who were more loyal to a cause or who were more willing to make any sacrifice for its success. A fitting testimonial in recognition of and appreciation for their services will be tendered them at this conference.

Children's Work has made strides again this year under the leadership of Mrs. Emma Wilson Strother with the support of the District Directors and their consultants. Especially noteworthy has been the very great increase in the number of vacation church schools. Mrs. Strother's report reveals that one district, the Wilmington, has almost one hundred percent in the number of charges having vacation church schools; there being only one charge which did not have a school.

The Program of Recreation is making steady progress under the leadership of our Conference Director, Mr. James C. Hardcastle. There is an ever increasing number of persons who are becoming trained through enterprises which are designed to help in the area of recreation. Our churches have a very great need in this area. Progress is being made but there is much yet to be done.

District Staffs: We were privileged again to meet with the District Superintendents and their staffs just before the close of the conference year. In these meetings programs of the district were considered. The loyal district directors, under the leadership of their District Superintendents, have been of very great help to the local churches in their church school work. Much of this assistance has been given through subdistrict and district meetings, as well as through quarterly conferences and other local church contacts.

During the summer, Mrs. Elizabeth Shockley, because of ill health, was forced to give up her work as director of Children's Work of the Dover District. Mrs. Shockley was one of those loyal workers whom I found when I came to this office. It would be very fitting if this body would send her a word of cheer, letting her know that we have not forgotten her fellowship of service which we enjoyed so many years.

The Local Churches are more and more showing the effects of the continued efforts on the part of our Conference Board to make Christian education a vital part of the church program and a real experience in the lives of persons. It is my observation that a larger number of church schools are becoming reorganized. More workers' Conferences are being held. More demands are being made upon members of our staff for leadership and resources.

For all of this we are most grateful for we are only too well aware that unless something happens in the local church nothing of importance

has really happened any where.

Leadership Education, as in former years, has been one of the chief goals of our work. Unless we are able to enlist and train leaders our churches cannot accomplish what they would like. We are happy to report that in all of our leadership enterprises there has been fine participation.

General Church School Work, under the leadership of the district directors of general church school work, has been very well promoted on the Philadelphia District, where two most successful meetings of church school workers were held during the year. The total attendance of the two meetings was nearly two hundred. While the other districts have made progress in this area no district-wide meetings were held specifically for this purpose as in former years.

Cooperation with other Conference Boards and Agencies has been a most helpful experience. Our participation with the Board of Evangelism in the promotion of the Christian Witness Mission was most rewarding. Rev. Henry H. Nichols, the Director of the mission, led the youth and adults to challenge the unchurched with the Christian message.

With the Commission on Christian Vocations and the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, we have worked with the youth who have expressed a desire to give themselves to full time service to the church. Outstanding in this regard was the dinner meeting with the young men entering the Christian Ministry, held at Ezion Church, Wilmington, Delaware, during the Christmas holidays. Of the thirty eight young men invited, twenty four attended and were led by Bishop Love and others who appeared on the program.

We have enjoyed the usual fine fellowship with the Woman's Society of Christian Service on the conference, district and local church levels. This co-operation is becoming more a reality all of the time. This is especially true in the areas of Children's Work and Youth Work.

Participation with Agencies beyond the Conference constitutes a very important part of our work. In the fall I spent two days with other executives representing the denominations which make up the Maryland and Delaware Council of Churches. In the quietness and seclusion of Claggett Center, near Frederick, Maryland, we sought to work out a program that would advance the united causes of Christian education in Maryland and Delaware. In April similar meetings were held in Dover, Delaware for the purpose of planning a program of action in Christian education in Delaware and on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. I likewise spent a number of hours with the committees, etc. of the Philadelphia Council of Churches. Here we seek to help the churches in that city to work together in Christian education.

Last summer was the second in which we have participated in the United Christian Youth Movement (UCYM) training conference at Camp Pe-Co-Meth, near Centreville, Maryland. We welcome this as one of the significant steps toward integration on the Peninsula.

We gave the usual fine support to the Baltimore Area Leadership School held at Bennett College. Our conference provided 36 in attendance with three members of the faculty; Revs. Henry H. Nichols, Howard A. Bailey and Mr. James C. Hardcastle from our conference, were on the staff of leaders.

We also participated in the Recreation Workshop held at Pennington, N. J. in June and the Laboratory School held at Pennington in July. Mrs. Emma Wilson Strother served as one of the instructors in this school.

The Conference Directors of Childrens Work, Youth Work and the Executive Secretary, attended the National Conference on Christian Education held in Cincinnati, Ohio in November.

Integration is coming slowly but surely in the church. We welcome the opportunities for such fellowship as are indicated by the activities listed above. We hold, however, that we have a real contribution to make in this larger fellowship and that our future plans must take into account both the opportunities and responsibilities inherent in a truly integrated program of Christian Education. Just now plans are being developed which will provide for larger cooperation with other conferences whose territory overlaps our own.

Areas to Which We Give Attention

Camping seems now to become a real possibility as a part of our program. For a long time we have been in search of a campsite. We seem to have at last found one. Thanks to the foresight on the part of the leadership of our youth, we are able to purchase it. We must now give attention to: (1) Training leadership in camping and (2) organize a plan for campsite development. During last month we sent four of our leaders to be trained in camping procedures. They spent a week at Sky Lake Camp, Windser, N. Y. We need just now to think in terms of the needs of Juniors and Intermediates especially in this connection. To meet the coming need of these groups will require a long term plan, a large number of devoted workers and financial resources.

Older Adult Work must also get our serious consideration. Last July, we sent Mr. Herman D. Brown to attend an Older Adult Workshop, held at Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Ill. Mr. Brown is ready to help us get started in this important ministry to those of mature years.

Christian Family Life emphasis must be continued and intensified. We had good results following the National Conference on Family Life held in Cleveland in 1954. We are now planning to send a delegate to attend a Seminar on Christian Family Life which will be held at Boston University in June 1956.

Methodist Student Work represents one of the neglected areas of our program. We must seek to be of greater help to the Methodist Students who attend the colleges in our area and especially those students attending schools within the bounds of our conference.

We have recently been invited to share in the work of the newly organized Inter-Conference Commission of The Methodist Student Movement of the Chesapeake Area. This commission is to be composed of student workers of the Baltimore, Delaware, Peninsula and Washington Conferences.

Here is a real opportunity to serve our students in terms of helping to keep Christ as a real influence in campus life.

Enlarging Our Conference Staff. It is clear that with the enlarged program which these areas of need suggest, we will need to enlarge our staff. I am therefore suggesting that we add to our staff a part-time director of Youth Work and a volunteer associate director of Adult Work whose responsibility will be in the area of older adult work.

We need also to think in terms of creating more standing committees and to increase the responsibility of the present ones so that they may help to plan and promote the work in such areas as camping, student work, etc.

It is likewise clear that we must enlarge our giving to the causes which we seek to promote. It will not be possible for us to minister, to the needs of those whom we serve unless we can somehow lay upon the hearts of our people a sense of responsibility to give more largely to the total program of Christian education in the local church as well as on all other levels.

Personal Appreciation

I would not close this report without a word of appreciation for those persons who have been so largely responsible for whatever has been achieved. Bishop Love has made our work easier by his continued interest and ever present encouragement. He leaves no doubt about his confidence in the Christian Education approach to the work of the church.

Our Board Chairman, Rev. J. R. Shockley, has been a most cooperative and understanding fellow worker. The District Superintendents have given us the privilege of serving on their districts to the extent of our ability to be of service. Our conference and district staff workers have been a most wonderful team with whom to be associated. The pastors and lay workers have been most responsive in seeking to carry on their church school work. - 6. That we give special attention to the training of leaders for summer camping with a view to starting our camping program in the summer 1957.
- That we continue our cooperation with other conference Boards and agencies, especially in the area of Evangelism, Missions, Christian Vocations and Scholarships.
- That every local church shall have an organized and functioning Commission on Education.
- 9. That we develop our work in Christian Education to the highest efficiency as we share the privilege and responsibility of fuller integration within our church.
- 10. That in view of our expanding and more intensive program of Christian Education, we shall use every means available to correspondingly increase the financial support of the program to the end that every charge shall contribute to the Church School Rally Day offering and observe the Fourth Sunday in each month as World Service Sunday and that each church shall likewise raise in full the items in the budget for which the Board of Education is responsible.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference, one of the most rewarding experiences that some of us have had during the past year have been those opportunities of working with our youth in the field of Christian Vocations. Our youth have given many evidences of seeking guidance in the whole

matter of finding a life work in which they can make a real contribution to the needs of people both at home and around the world.

In order to better serve these youth the Commission held its Annual meeting in June and adopted its program for the year. As a result of our planning the following enterprises were conducted.

The districts have set up District Committees on Christian Vocations. The committees have worked with local churches in the matter of recruitment. The Dover District held a district-wide meeting in March when some 200 youth were challenged to give themselves in some form of Christian vocation. We can never estimate the value of this meeting in terms of its effect in directing these youth to commitments to lives of service. At the district youth assemblies youth were also given guidance in choosing vocations.

Christian Workers' Schools emphasized Christian Vocations on the Dover and Wilmington Districts in all nine subdistrict Schools, a night was given to a special emphasis on Christian Vocations. A number of local churches have likewise held meetings in which vocations have been brought to the attention of youth and guidance given to them.

In December our commission, in cooperation with the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, sponsored a Dinner meeting for the young men who have made commitments to the Christian Ministry. The meeting was held at Ezion Church, Wilmington with Bishop Love and the District Superintendents being among those who gave leadership on the program. Of the thirty eight young men invited twenty four were present. Following the dinner a fellowship was organized among those present.

A Conference on Church Vocations was held at Morgan State College in February in cooperation with the commission of the Washington Conference. Those young people whose names are listed on our files were invited to attend and to receive guidance in their chosen church vocations. The weekend was most profitable in terms of fellowship and specific assistance to those enrolled.

From these and other activities our files are continually increasing with the names of those choosing vocations within the church.

The following is our record to date:

Nursing	12

Missions (Medical)	4

Church Secretarial Work	4

We keep in touch with these young people and make available to them such resources as will help them prepare for their life work. It has been a real source of joy to note that a number whom we have had on our list are now actively engaged in their vocations.

On behalf of the commission, may I express our thanks to our Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors, Church School Teachers, Parents and others who have worked with us as we have sought to serve in this important phase of youth work. There are many things which are to be done to make our work more effective. To this end we seek the help of all who are endeavoring to give our young people every encouragement in finding a vocation which will be meaningful to them and helpful to humanity. In this we are sure we are about the Father's Business.

We offer the following recommendations-

- That there be organized in every local church a committee on Christian Vocations.
- 2. That in each local church there be held a vocations meeting with youth at least once a year.
- 3. That each district hold at least one vocations conference a year.
- 4. That at district and sub-district meetings of youth, opportunities be given for commitment to church vocations.
- That special emphasis be given to church vocations at the Conference M. Y. F. Assembly.
- That names of all youth who make commitments to church vocations through any of the above enterprises, be sent to the Conference Commission.
- That the Conference Commission continue its cooperation with other conference boards and agencies in helping our youth to accept the challenge of committed Christian living.

In the above pronouncement, there is a challenge to every Church in Methodism.

The Churches of the Delaware Conference can meet this challenge by putting on the Educational Program and using the strategies suggested by the General Board of Temperance.

We commend the Board for the distribution of literature in which is found information for the Local Church Committee on Temperance.

We further commend the Board in bringing forward the Temperance Film "Far from Alone."

Recommendations

- Each pastor, in cooperation with the Temperance Committee promote a vigorous program of Alcohol Education.
- 2. The organization of a Temperance Committee in each church in the Conference.
- 3. Observance of World Temperance Sunday.
- 4. Observance of Commitment Sunday.
- 5. Each pastor preach a Sermon on Temperance.
- 6. Circulation of the "Voice" periodical of the Board of Temperance.
- 7. Cooperation with the General Board.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Bishop Edgar Love and Brethren:

Evangelism is a perennial activity of the living church. Men are lost. Christ is the Savior. Its motives and messages are ever the same. But the methods must be ever changing to meet changing conditions. We need constantly to find new ways to confront men with the message of the Gospel.

The objectives of evangelism is to reach people for Christ and bring them into fellowship with the Church. The time-tested method is the one which Jesus trained His disciples—VISITATION EVANGELISM. If members of the church today will follow this example and go out to witness for Him in teams of two, they will return, like the disciples of old, rejoicing, in victory.

Some Important Statistics

The Rev. Albert Hoover, Methodist Church Statistician, reports that the Methodist Church receives into full membership annually:

340,710 from preparatory membership 97,163 on profession of faith, and other denomination

Total 437,873

After removals by death and other causes we have left 90,216, a net gain of 20% or a ratio of 4 to 1. Which means that in the overall picture, we must win five to gain one.

According to the Conference Journal 1954-55, of the 171 charges of the Delaware Conference, 30 charges had no Conversions or Accessions—Barren charges—Our task is before us.

A primary concern of our evangelist outreach today is that of prospects for membership. Through several years of intensive visitation—evangelism

in many communities, we have won most of the adults who evidence an interest in the Church. Now we must move out to confront the unchurched, the indifferent, and the non-preference with the Gospel challenge. We must enlarge our prospect lists to include every person who knows not Christ.

These persons will be difficult to win. This means that we must develop a CORPS of DISCIPLINED, THOROUGHLY TRAINED and DEEPLY CONSECRATED visitors. They must be grounded in the great teachings of our Faith. They must be led into the great sources of Spiritual power.

Furthermore, those who are won should be CAREFULLY TRAINED and prepared for membership in the Church. Many of them will have no Church or religious background. If they are to become mature Christians and effective churchmen, they must be prepared.

Recommendations for 1956-57

1. That under the direction of the Bishop and Cabinet, a series of District one-day "Schools of instruction," set up to cover the whole conference. To these schools invite from the churches of each district, the pastor, the chairman of the Official Board, and the chairmen of the four Commissions. No more, no less, no other.

Christian Ambassadors

This program is beamed at the barren churches in a District or a Conference. Teams of ministers and laymen spend one day of visiting and preaching evangelism in each barren church, securing commitments for Christ.

"Four Nights for God"

This is a program of two-by-two visitation-evangelism to be carried out simultaneously by an Annual Conference or a District.

1957 Year of Prayer

A great World-Wide Prayer Movement is now in evidence. There are tens of thousands of prayer groups around the earth. Thousands in America, India, and other nations are finding great power in continuous prayer vigils and prayer fellowships.

The year 1957 offers to us the greatest opportunity yet in the 20th Century to encourage, enlarge, and inspire the most comprehensive and farreaching effort in united prayer the world has ever known. This World-Wide Prayer Movement will be entirely voluntary endeavor, which is based on most intelligent concepts of prayer known to man.

We believe that God can and will, through daily prayer around the world, turn the tides of civilization toward peace and creative brotherhood for all people. All people and all praying people are invited to participate in the way or ways in which they feel led by God to make their finest contribution in this "World-changing prayer movement."

We recommend that the Annual Conference endorse the World-Wide Prayer Movement for 1957 and call on every church to participate in the ways they feel led through enlisting as many people as possible to pray through Prayer Vigils or Prayer Groups, Prayer Fellowship, or daily devotions.

Community Evangelism

Evangelism on the community level using all of the available methods of evangelism is one of the needs of the day. To include:

One week of Visitation Evangelism.

One week of Spiritual life Evangelism in each of the participating churches for the strengthening of total membership.

One week of public Evangelism, visiting in institutions of the community, schools, etc.

One week of Mass Evangelism at a central spot. Materials for implementing this are in preparation.

This type of Community Evangelism can be of two types:

- 1. In communities of sufficient size, where there are several Methodist Churches, it can be a definite Methodist program. Other Denominations could participate if they desire, following the general plan.
- 2. In smaller communities, the Methodist Church could ask other denominations to cooperate in sponsoring such a program, but using the basic plan as suggested above.

"Christians for Christ"

This program is an emphasis on making Christmas a Christian festival. It is to be promoted by the Conference through local churches.

World Wide Church Attendance Movement

We recommend that each Annual Conference endorse and recommend to each District, Charge and Local Church that they participate in the World Wide Church Attendance Movement "The Answer is God," January through Easter 1957. Increased Church attendance will pay rich dividends in reaching persons for Christ and supporting Kingdom interest.

Bible Emphasis

This for an undergirding of the Bible Emphasis, in each District throughout the Church.

Mission to America

The General Board of Evangelism asks that each Annual Conference will pray for the Mission to America, that this movement in mass evangelism to reach the "out of church," "out of fellowship" persons, may reach thousands of persons for Christ and lead to a revival of mass evangelism in America.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD PEACE

Bishop Love and Members of the Ninety-Fourth Session of the Delaware Conference:

We the members of the Commission On World Peace are happy to present to you this report of our work during the year.

We met and discussed problems which are considered vital to world peace. Several pieces of literature sent us from the Board of World Peace of the General Church have been distributed. The Commission has sought to have representation to all assemblies of the Conference and local levels.

We concur with the statements in the Methodist Peace Courier, Vol. 2, No. 5 January 1956, which reads as follows:

Since Action should accompany resolution, we suggest that Methodists throughout the boundary of the Delaware Conference continue to (1) support policies looking toward increased relaxation between the East and West; (2) Patiently pursue courses which make for international understanding between peoples; (3) Give witness to the ecumenical fellowship which transcends artificially created personal barriers and those of economic systems, political orders or governments. This witness holds that the reality of God and the Spirit of Christ are, in all of their implications, for all peoples, irrespective of language, nationality, race, sex, color or class.

We therefore recommend:

- That the Church be articulate in its message which applies to both ourselves and our foes.
- 2. That the Conference Commission through its District officers seek to promote an educational program in the local church.
- 3. That the Church become more active in its study of the program of the U. N. and its objectives.
- 4. That the Conference Commission on World Peace give encouragement to local churches to visit the U. N.

We further recommend: District World Peace Workshops along one of the following lines:

- 1. Workshop for World Peace
- 2. Workshop for Disarmament
- 3. Workshop for Social Causes
- 4. Workshop on the United Nations
- That such Workshops be established during the coming twelve months of the Conference Year.

THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Bishop Love, and Members of the Delaware Conference:

- To have a better Church and world we must have Christian homes and communities to rear our families.
- 7. Churches must be more missionary minded to share at home and abroad.
- All churches must promote World Peace and better understanding among People.
- Evangelistic awakening is needed and a new sense of values pertaining to living.

Whatever the need, and whatever our particular niche, it is true for each of us, that, "The Church for you doth wait, Her strength unequal to her task; rise up, O Men of God and make her Great."

THE STATE OF THE COUNTRY

Our nation is confronted with an infinity of problems that must be faced realistically and must be solved individually as well as collectively. Scientific mastery of our environment hasn't solved our problems or brought us tranquility, but rather unrest and new fears.

Many sensational score stories have been printed about the effects of the A-bomb tests in Nevada. They tell of poisoned atomic clouds floating across the country contaminating people and vegetation, causing possible deformities among babies yet unborn; and the Soviet Union has charged that A-bombs exploded in the United States have upset the weather in Russia. Even though scientific data proves these stories erroneous, fear still grips the hearts of many people.

During the decade, 1940-1950, the population grew twice as fast as in the previous decade. With the rapid increase in population there has been a corresponding increase in the number of homes built in America. As a result of these new communities that have been and are being established throughout America, the church faces an acute problem of establishing new churches and recruiting young people for Christian vocations, especially for the Christian ministry.

A continued hardening of opposition toward the U. S. Supreme Courts decision against school segregation was apparent throughout the year.

Seventeen southern and border states appeared to be moving into an era of litigation and legislation over the school racial questions and court rulings increased in number and as legislative bodies met in most cases to strengthen pro-segregation devices.

The use of "interposition" and a "manifesto" as weapons in the fight against enforced racial integration in the public schools received the endorsement of many southern congressmen.

Unfortunately all Americans have not as yet realized the inevitability of integration in all phases of American life.

Crime in the United States has reached alarming proportions, and most alarming is the fact that so many of the criminals are young people. One out of every 18 youths from the age of 15 to 16 has been classified by the F. B. I. as "delinquent." Fifty-one per cent of all persons arrested for auto theft, 30 per cent of those arrested for robbery, 11 per cent of those arrested for homicide and assault are 20 years of age or younger.

The principal cause of juvenile delinquency, in the final analysis is delinquent parents in the home. Bad behaviour is due less to outside environmental factors than in the temper and quality of the household in which the child lives. Preservation of the home requires the restoration of God.

More and more Americans are coming to the realization that they need a rebirth of the Spirit of God, if they are going to successfully solve their problems and help build a better world.

Recommendations

 That the christian church strongly advocate the use of nuclear energy for the service and not the destruction of mankind.

 That the church cooperate with other community agencies in initiating steps that will make the environments conducive to the wholesome development of the youth in America; thus helping to eliminate juvenile delinquency in our communities.

3. That every local church will initiate or sponsor inter-racial activities that

will help to improve human relations in America.

4. That every local church cooperate with the board of education in their program of recruiting young people for Christian vocations in order to meet the needs for replacements and expanding opportunities.

THE DIRECTRESS OF THE GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

Bishop Love, Members of the Conference and Visiting friends GREETINGS:

I have found already this subject of Conference "Golden Cross" responsibilities a very interesting and Challenging one. One finds it has many implications with no easy answers as one begins to realize what could be done in this great area of Christian Social Relation. Permit me to state first two personal convictions about this work, first, that as members of the Annual Conference, we need to be reminded again and again that we have a definite responsibility—financially and spiritually—to our Conference, (This can be verified by our historic background—Wesley's Social Service concern, and our church Discipline.)

Secondly, as members of the Delaware Conference we need to see more clearly the many ways we can work together and help each other, as we endeavor to meet the overwhelming needs of our people.

Today, more than ever, the church must be United in the Christian social welfare program, because of the National and World-Wide trend to provide better welfare for all people.

Whenever possible I attend all meetings of the District and Conference. That I may answer questions or give advice, as to the work of the Golden Cross Society. During the past year, I attended three District Stewards meetings, and the five District Directors and left with them 100,000 Golden Cross Buttons each, receipt books, applications, and enrollment envelopes for each pastor on their district, and asked for a Golden Cross Committee in each church.

The second Sunday in November of each year is to be observed by all churches of the Conference as Golden Cross Day, enrollment fee each year is \$1.00 per member. Letters were sent to each pastor preceding the enrollment day, asking them to kindly observe same.

It was my privilege to attend the Annual meeting of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, held in St. Louis, Mo. as the guest of the General Board, on February 8th and 9th, 1956. This was a most successful and challenging meeting. Dr. Karl P. Meister for 12 years Executive Secretary of the Board, a loyal and devoted servant of the Methodist Church, announced that he will retire from his present post on May 1st, 1956. There were many speakers of note on "Getting the Conference behind the Home." "Are we Meeting our challenge," etc. 750 persons attended the meeting. Statistics show that there are 204 hospitals and homes related to the General Board, among this number are 70 hospitals and 77 homes for the aged. 48 childrens homes and several homes for youth. Total persons served in our agencies last year were 1,255,198. Assets of Methodists Hospitals and Homes reached an all time high of \$325,950,586. All Conferences are by the Board to resume the responsibility of a hospital or a Home for the Here in the Delaware Conference our objective is a Home for the aged. aged.

"We have started Golden Cross in our Conference," was the subject chosen by Mrs. Garret Rawlings of the Washington Conference; related this story—"A woman who had passed her 80th birthday was found to be too feeble to care for herself. A long time Methodist, she had been a very active member of one of the churches in Washington, D. C. She lived alone, no one to care for her needs. She was soon comfortable in the N. M. Carroll Home for the aged, Baltimore, Md. The Golden Cross Society helped to make her happy."

The number of people seeking assistance is steadily increasing, as one looks about his local church or community, or beyond his own area, he discovers many people whose lives could be made happier and healthier. The shift of population to the north these days, bring multitudes our way, who live on the borderline of poverty. This often created a responsibility for the Methodist Church to render Christian service, to those in actual need of such care.

Since November is GOLDEN CROSS MONTH, and the churches' opportunity to expand its saving ministry toward the Home for the aged of our Conference, as Methodists we are urged to grow more liberal toward this worthy cause.

Are you, and you, and you satisfied with the contribution you made this year to the Golden Cross? If not we are going to give you an opportunity today to become a member through your contribution.

For your interest in this worthy service, and for the gifts you make through your church, or individually, we wish to express our appreciation.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

Bishop Love, and Members of the Conference:

PUBLISH GLAD TIDINGS—Tidings of Jesus, Redemption and release!

The central purpose of the Methodist Church is to make known the redemptive mission of God through Jesus Christ. This unfinished responsibility is universal in scope for the world is still our parish. Of course, our world-wide task does not minimize our domestic work. As Methodists, we accept our home and foreign obligations to God and man.

The Delaware Conference through its missionary personnel seeks to assume its share of responsibility in the promotional work of missions. We cannot fail in helping to meet the denominational and interdenominational demands upon the Christian Church.

A word of commendation must be made regarding the sincere and self-sacrificing service of the Chairman of the Board of Missions. He has devoted much of his time and talents to this cause.

Activities

On May 12th a Planning Conference on Missions for the Delaware Conference was held in Wilmington, Delaware. Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. W. G. Brown and Rev. O. H. Spence were in attendance with the conference missionary secretary. At this meeting we projected the program on missions as approved by the Annual Conference. We stressed the creation of Sub-district Missionary Councils made up of one layman, one laywoman and a pastor whose purpose would be to promote and cultivate the missionary

emphasis of the church. We endeavored to improve the District Missionary Institutes and to encourage the itinerating of missionaries on each district. District Missionary Institutes were planned for November 15, Wilmington District at Coleman Memorial Methodist Church; February 14, Dover District at Dover, Delaware; Philadelphia District, February 14, Philadelphia and February 23, Northern End; March 8, Easton District at Royal Oak, Md.; March 16, Salisbury District at Fruitland, Maryland. Rev. W. G. Brown and Rev. J. I. Williams accepted the opportunity to attend the Silver Bay Conference on Christian Missions, July 13-20, 1955.

In June the Conference Missionary Secretary served as instructor at the Baltimore Area Pastors' Training School, Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C. The subject taught was Methodist History.

From July 13-20, Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. W. G. Brown and J. E. Licorish attended the Silver Bay Conference on the Christian World Mission sponsored by the Division of Home Missions, Division of Foreign Missions, General Department of United Church Women, and Joint Commission on Missionary Education of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A., Lake George, New York. Studies pursued were: Missionary Education in the Local Church, The Philosophy of Christian Missions, The Use of Hymns in Missionary Education, Seminar For Leaders of Young People, The Christian Mission in a Revolutionary World and Indian Americans. Other interesting, intellectual and spiritual adventures were shared in the Interpretative Addresses on Home and Foreign Missions, the Denominational Workshop (Methodist), and the Missionary Fellowship Hour daily. New Missionary films were shown each afternoon and evening.

The Joint Conference on Missions was held at Morgan State College, Baltimore, Md., August 9th through 12th. Joshua E. Licorish served as Dean. This project which was sponsored by the Division of National Missions of the Methodist Church was very well attended by members of the Delaware and Washington Conferences. Subjects studied were: Some Economic Factors Affecting the Church, Specialized Ministries for Town and Country Parish, The Church in the Age of Revolution (Its Role), and The Church and Community Agencies.

The Conference Missionary Secretary of the Delaware Annual Conference was elected chairman of the Committee on Missions at the Baltimore Area Council, held in Roanoke, Virginia, September 13th to 15th. The most far reaching resolution was: "That in each Annual Conference, the Bishop, Conference Missionary Secretary, the District Superintendents and District Missionary Secretaries plan for District-wide Missionary Rallies in cooperation with the Annual Conference Board of Missions. This program should be planned and executed in 1957."

I served on the Easton District, September 20-22, in a series of group conferences on a sub-district basis at which I presented and discussed the program of Missions and World Service in the Methodist Church. The sessions were convened at Easton, Cambridge, and Centreville, Maryland under the sponsorship of the Superintendent of the Easton District. The District Missionary Secretary was host. The meetings were very well attended.

On November 15th, I attended the eighth Annual Missionary Institute of the Wilmington District held at Coleman Memorial Methodist Church and assisted in the presentation of the Seminar: Theme—Missions: South of the Himalayas.

March 11th, I presented the program of Missions and World Service at a meeting of Lay Leaders and other laity, chairmen of Commissions on Missions of the northern part of the Philadelphia District at Clair Methodist

Church, Jersey City, N. J.

April 10th, attended the meeting of the Commission on Town and Country Work at the Mt. Joy Methodist Church, Wilmington, Del. Purpose: to hear reports of the National Conference on Town and Country Work and plan for projecting a forward program in this area of interest.

April 27th, attended a Workshop on Missions at Haven Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa. Spoke on the subject: "Our Obligations in a

World-wide Church."

Recommendations

We recommend:

 (a) That during 1957, the Bishop, District Superintendents, Conference Missionary Secretary, Chairman of the Board of missions and the District Missionary Secretaries plan for and promote a Conferencewide Week of Missions; allowing one day for each district.

(b) Qualified personnel on the work and program of missions be engaged

to give leadership for this week.

(c) The missionary concern of the Methodist Church and the Delaware Conference for the next quadrennium be projected and explained at these rallies.

(d) The Woman's Society of Christian Service be invited to share in the

planning and promotion of the Week of Missions.

II. Because of the increasing demands for Negro personnel on the foreign fields, especially in Angola, Liberia, Mozambique, and Korea, and because of our sincere interest in the spreading of the Gospel and the extension of the services of the Methodist Church abroad: That the Board of Missions cooperate with the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations and the Woman's Society of Christian Service in promoting a special effort to assist the General Church in securing full time Christian workers needed for the foreign field. Be it further recommended that this effort be launched in conjunction with the Conference-wide Week of Missions.

III. That the Delaware Conference whole heartedly endorse and support the FORWARD MISSIONS PROGRAM 1956-1960, which purpose is a renewal emphasis on evangelism in the four areas of Northern Borneo, Bolivia, Korea and the Belgian Congo. We further recommend that the Conference shall actively and financially assist this program through its sundry organizations and local churches, by sending at least one qualified person, a member of the Delaware Conference, into the areas mentioned to participate in the FOR-

WARD MISSION PROGRAM, 1956-1960.

- IV. That all local churches shall seek to earnestly settle their debts with the Board of Missions and that each church carry extended coverage insurance.
- v. That each District Missionary Secretary under the guidance of the District Superintendent shall make special effort to get more local churches to support conference initiated specials and Advance Specials.
- VI. That each local church give particular emphasis to the raising of World Service Askings one hundred per cent.
- VII. That members of the conference attend the Conference on Missions,
 August 7 through 10, at Morgan State College, Baltimore, Md. and
 that all missionary personnel, district and conference, be in full
 attendance.
- VIII. That the area of work being projected at the new School of International Service, American University, Washington, D. C., be discussed at each District Conference and that sincere efforts be made to encourage some of our youth to qualify themselves for admission into this field of leadership and service.
- IX. That local congregations invite overseas delegates attending the Ninth Meeting of the World Methodist Council, to preach and to fellowship. This meeting will be held at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, September 1-12. Methodist leaders from England, Europe, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand will be available for service through Dr. Karl Quinby, 150 Fifth Ave., New York 11, N. Y. We further recommend that the churches of the Delaware Conference extend invitations to the leaders of the Methodist Churches overseas who will be engaged in "Mission to America" evangelistic preaching mission in 1958.
- X. Because dollars held in your World Service Treasury do not help the world, we recommend that all local churches be urged to send World Service funds to the Conference Treasurer before May 31st of each year that these funds might be forwarded into the World Parish.

This act is important because the amount of money that the Board of Missions and other World Services can spend in 1956-57 can be no greater than the year's income on hand May 31st, 1956.

THE REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Bishop Love, Officers and Members of the Conference:

The Commission on Town and Country Work of the Delaware Methodist Annual Conference, represented you at the National Methodist Town and Country Conference at Bloomington, Indiana, July 22-25, 1955, in the persons of Superintendent C. W. Derrickson of the Salisbury District, G. O. Commodore, H. R. Snoad, R. Fisher, W. G. Brown and Augustus Chancy.

After that Conference, the Commission held a meeting at the Mt. Joy Methodist church, Wilmington, Del., April 10, 1956.

At this meeting, many questions concerning the work of the Commission were discussed. Conclusions reached at this time are set forth in specific phases of this report.

Between 1940 and 1950, 188 counties in areas covered by the Methodist Church lost 20% or more of their population to the ever increasing Urban life of our nation. As a result, Methodist churches sustained heavy decreases in their memberships, as well as in their leadership personnel.

It was emphasized at the Bloomington Conference that many counties that reported gains, did so because County seats attracted enough people from declining areas to offset the losses in adjacent and distant Counties. Boiling the facts down, the conclusion is that Half of All Methodist Churches are Struggling with Problems Growing Out Of a Declining Rural Population.

The Larger Parish Plan, A Federation of churches, a Mutual Exchange of Churches by Denominations, have helped some, but there is an ever-increasing demand for greater concern on the part of the affected local communities. Much more research needs to be done, in an effort to discover more effective techniques for solving the problems.

The Technical Consultants of the Department of Researches and Surveys have already begun formulating programs whereby more research will be done in this area before the next National Methodist Town and Country.

Conference.

In a connectional church like ours, large and small city churches can ill-afford to allow their interest in the struggling rural churches to lag. The initiative and resources must come from somewhere. Why not from the leaders and members of the more prosperous churches, in the towns and cities to which the migrating population is attracted? Even here, in this Conference we are face to face with the challenge of opportunity and duty to start the wheels of victory turning in the right direction. While some Conferences have invested from FIVE to FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS in the work annually (supplied by the Commission on World Service and finance, Various Conference Boards, and interested Laymen), we can surely make an enthusiastic beginning!

In addition to an endeavor to have studious representatives attending the Interconference Meeting on Missions, at Morgan College, August 7-9 this year, your Commission has dedicated itself to the task of a more effective job of distributing literature on this work, to Conference members of the commission, and to those representing the work on the various Districts.

RECOMMENDATIONS: 1. The Commission asks this Conference to go on record as approving a Conference-wide Seminar or the like, on Town and Country Work, with a Resource Person from the Department of Town and Country Work, Division of National Missions, of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church.

2. That such meeting be held under the direction and guidance of our Bishop and his Cabinet, with the co-operation of the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Fellow Ministers and Laymen of the Board of Conference Claimants of the Delaware Annual Conference, The Methodist Church.

It is with gratitude to Almighty God and appreciation to you that \mathbf{f} am privileged to make my seventh annual report to the Board of Conference Claimants.

I know not how to begin this report, as God has been so good to us in so many ways. However, we must emphasize over and over again that our Lord's life was sacrificial. He exacted in the beginning, and He still does, a sacrificial life of every man who seeks to be His follower. As it was said of Him, it must be said of those who represent Him today: "He saved others, himself he cannot save." Every man who enters our ministry does so with the definite understanding that he is to receive only such support as they among whom he labors are able to give him. The word "salary" is not a Methodist word. We do not in a real sense pay salaries; we afford support, and a mere support does not involve any thought of a surplus, which may be drawn on in the days of retirement from active service, and so a grateful Church assumes the responsibility of taking care of its ministry in their old age. To fail to do so involves moral turpitude.

This whole pension movement involves the spiritual integrity of the ministers themselves. Their motives must be wholly unalloyed with a plan for financial gain. The true minister must be assured by his own consciousness that he has no ulterior motive. He must see that his task is so delicate and valuable that nothing short of the divine approval and the sweet commendation of his conscience can adequately repay him. The vital spark of spirituality will die out of the minister when he comes to think that he is to receive salary sufficient to keep him in luxury in his active years and to be able to lay aside for the days of old age and retirement. The element of sacrifice and the spirit of trustful confidence in God to care for him, through the kindly offices of a grateful Church, will give spiritual fervor to his own spiritual life and mighty power to his message.

The Church which makes this wise provision for the old age of its ministers will find that such a course will react on the spiritual life of the Church membership; when once the Church rises to meet this obligation it will receive in return spiritual blessings as God has promised to those who "devise liberal things."

Well and good but, there is a double call to the ministry of the Methodist Church: human and divine. Every minister is supposed to be called of God to the work. Upon this we have laid great emphasis in all our history. But we must not overlook the equally important fact that there is a human call to the Methodist ministry. The clergy of our Church are called and commissioned by the laymen. No man has an ecclesiastical right to exercise the offices of the ministry except by the authority of the lay members.

The agreement entered between the ministry and the laity imposes certain restrictions upon the ministers as parties of the first part. The minister gives up his right to say what they will do and covenant to devote their whole time to the work of the ministry; they give up the right of residential choice and place themselves and their families at the disposal of the appointing authorities. They place in the hands of the Church their right to place value upon their services and the amount of "salary" is determined by an estimating committee of laymen; they make over to the Church their legal right of the collection, by process of law, of that which they have earned; they abandon the privilege of saying how long they will stay and work in any given field; and, the Methodist minister gives to the

Church the right to say when he must cease from active service. No man carries with him into the Methodist ministry these common rights and

privileges.

The laymen, as parties of the second part to the covenant, agree to provide a support for the ministry. In the early days, our ministry being organized on a missionary basis, the preacher shared the poverty of the people. In our time of increasing prosperity, the Church realizes its responsibility for the maintenance in old age of those who have worn themselves out in her ministry.

The time has come when we must do more. If you will but study the Reserve Pension Fund Plan, you will see the new day. Yes, the Church has been slow to recognize the fact that when the preacher comes to the last mile she should not treat him as a pauper but as a pensioner. The dawning of this new day for the Conference Claimant has been long delayed, but the sun is now up and hastening toward the meridian.

The Delaware Conference during the last few years is beginning to realize a bit of the vision of the Fathers of the Conference.

In 1926 the Annuity rate was \$10.00. Raised by Churches \$8,520.00. Total for the year—\$12,449.94. The highest individual claim was \$500.00.

In 1951 the Annuity rate was \$18.00. Raised by the Churches \$25,-841.00. Total for the year \$48,561.82. The highest individual claim was \$918.00. With over \$100,000.00 in the Permanent Fund.

In 1955 the Annuity rate was \$28.00. Raised by Churches \$29,632.00. Total for the year \$61,404.41. The highest individual claim \$1,378.00. With over \$135,000.00 in the Permanent Fund.

Yes, the Delaware Conference paid an Annuity Rate of \$28.00 this conference year. We must pay \$29.00 next year. We are urging every charge to pay the Conference Claim in full—the 12%—and every charge get behind the Pension Reserve Fund. We must provide for the Veterans.

I attended all of the District Conferences and the Efficiency Conferences. Spoke on the cause of the Board of Conference Claimants.

WHAT FUND WILL DO

RESERVE PENSION

- 1—Why is it necessary to raise \$318,000.00? The amount to be raised must equal the total conference salary when the conference voted to enter the fund.
- 2-What will the \$318,000.00 do?
 - a—It will add \$2.00 for each approved year of the retired minister. Example: Our present annuity rate is \$28.00. If we were now eligible for the fund, this rate would be increased by \$2.00 and would be \$30.00.
 - b—It would insure every widow at least \$600.00 a year or \$150.00 per quarter.
 - i. At the present only 18 widows receive \$600.00 or more.
 - ii. 48 widows are receiving less than \$600.00.
 - iii. 25 widows are receiving less than \$75.00 per quarter.
 - c—There are no children dependents now, but the fund will insure any minor dependent at least \$150.00.
 - d—A member under 65 years may be put on the disability list and receive up to 1/3 of the conference average salary. At the present this would be 1/3 of \$2,800.00 or \$933.00.
- 3—Each minister will be required to pay 3% of the conference average salary. He will be sent a bill from Chicago for ¼ of this four times a year. The 1½% will be discontinued. Each minister's contribution will be invested for him. At retirement he will receive an income annuity based on his contribution plus whatever interest has been earned.
 - a-He will be entitled to two annuities at retirement:
 - i. Service annuity.
 - ii. Income annuity.
- 4—This is the only campaign to raise funds.
- 5—The question has been asked, "Why not use the permanent fund money?"

 If that is used for this purpose, it will deprive the distribution account of about \$5,000.00 annually. This would penalize the minister who has already been retired or is about to retire. It would also create a hard-ship upon widows of deceased ministers.

JAMES H. C. KELLY, Executive Secretary Reserve Pension Fund Campaign

THE NEED FOR THE RESERVE PENSION FUND

There are many advantages of the Reserve Pension Fund. I shall deal with two of them.

There are at the present 66 widows of deceased ministers. Only 18 of these get as much as \$600.00 a year or \$50.00 per month. There are 26 widows who get less than \$25.00 per month. Under the Reserve Pension Plan every widow will receive at least \$600.00 a year or \$50.00 a month.

I received from Chicago a copy of a letter sent to a widow, the mother of two children. The letter stated that she would receive \$54.25 per year for each of the children. This amounts to about \$4.40 per month or \$1.12 per week. Under the Reserve Pension Plan this mother would receive at least \$150.00 per year for each child or nearly 3 times what they now receive.

I am deeply interested in the retired minister, the widow of the deceased minister and the disabled preacher. I do not think we give them enough. Even the guarantees made by the Reserve Pension Fund are to my mind insufficient. My chief interest, however, is in the child of the deceased minister. Children are our hope for the future. They are our responsibility.

A noted statesman, seeing his nation struggling for its very life, agreed that the nation could win, but said it would, "Cost blood, sweat and tears." I would paraphrase that statement and say, "We can save all our youth—the good, the bad, the rich, the poor, ministers' children and others, but it will cost blood, prayers and money."

A word about prayer. Most of us pray that a problem be removed so that it will trouble us no more. Generally that is not the Master's way. He has promised, "To cause no more to come upon us then we have strength to bear." If we accept the responsibility and deal with a problem, it will cost us money. He will supply this, too. He has said, "Whatever ye ask in prayer, if you believe, it shall be done."

If we accept children as our problem, there is sure to be a way to solve it. Let us give them a fair chance. We should be concerned about all children, but the children of deceased ministers are our immediate concern. We can begin our attack upon this problem by giving the Reserve Pension Campaign our strong financial support.

15TH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE 1956-57

Bishop Edgar A. Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Conference:

The Commission on World Service and Finance is happy to present its final report for the Quadrenium. We are thankful to our Bishop Love, for the forceful letters and stirring speeches made at various meetings in relation to items of the Budget. He has been most helpful. We also sincerely thank the Pastor's and loyal Laymen who have stood by during the years.

The Commission held its regular meeting at Whatcoat Methodist Church, Dover, Delaware, March 7th, 1956 for the purpose of building the Budget. Because of the absence of several of our members a second meeting was called to complete our work. After careful consideration of all askings in the light of the expressed needs and our past performances in giving we make the recommendations as follows:

Recommendations

- 1. We Recommend that a summary of the activities of all Boards and Agéncies sharing in the budget, be submitted to the Commission On World Service and Finance. This summary is to cover their work for the year. This report is to be in the hands of the Commission by the end of January, preceding the date of the Annual Conference. (See Par. 793 Discipline.)
- 2. We recommend that in support of the \$10,000 Reserve Fund, that the churches remit to the Conference Treasurer within fifteen days following the Annual Conference the amounts as follows:

Charges paying salaries from \$1,000-\$2,000 send \$20.00

Charges paying salaries from \$2,100-\$3,000 send \$30.00

Charges paying salaries from \$3,100 and up send \$40.00

- 3. That no askings in Finance shall be permitted to be discussed on the Conference floor if same has not been presented to the Commission.
- 4. That in harmony with the request coming from the Delaware Conference W. S. C. S. and the Board of Friendship House, that the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance be a sit-in member of said Board.
- That the Treasurer send monthly remittance reports to the Bishop.
 Dist. Supts., Pastors, Finance Commission, and Finance Commission of Local Churches.
- 6. That all checks sent to the Treasurer which have not been cleared by the Commission shall be given over to the cabinet by the Treasurer, and that such checks be put into the hands of the District Supt. of said church.
- 7. We Recommend that the Treasurer or some representative of the Commission visit each District Stewards meeting to give explanations to Pastors and Laymen in making first payments to the Total Budget and to receive money for the District Superintendent's Fund.
- 8. We recommend that Conference minute money be apportioned to the churches by Districts.
- 9. We recommend that a fund of \$250 be appropriated for the Conference Budget work, to be done by the Commission. Fifty Dollars of the same

to be used for each District. This work is to be done in close co-operation with the Treasurer and District Superintendents.

- 10. We recommend that all Boards and Commissions that do not have their books audited by a certified Public Accountant employed by the Commission and who receive money from the Conference Treasurer, will send reports of such audition duly signed by the persons who do their auditing.
- 11. We recommend that late reports coming to the Treasurer be so printed in the Minutes, and that at the discretion of the Treasurer, moneys may be accepted at the seat of the Conference in session, but the delayed reports be not included in the Treasurer's Annual Report to the Conference then in session.
- 12. We recommend that the Minimum salaries be: (a) Married Pastors \$1800. Single Pastors \$1600. (b) And that distribution from the Minimum Salary Fund continue as in previous years.
- 13. We recommend that all suggested Rally Day amounts be sent in among the first payments to the Treasurer, or not later than Rally Day Week.
- 14. That all money requested from the Promotional Fund be made in writing even though verbal explanations may be made concerning such askings.
- 15. That no Board or Agency receive more than the regular percentages indicate of moneys sent in, with the exception of the Publicity Fund and the District Superintendent's Salary and expense Fund. These are to have priority and are to be paid in full.
- 16. We recommend that the Treasurer's signature only shall be required on all checks.
- 17. The Commission recommends that late reports coming to the Treasurer be so printed in the Minutes, and that at the discretion of the Treasurer, money may be accepted at the seat of the Annual Conference, but the delayed reports be not included in the Treasurer's Annual Report to the conference then in session.
- 18. The Commission recommends that the Board of Hospitals and Homes be allotted \$4000.00 a year for the quadrennium, \$1000.00 of which may be used for operational expenses; we also recommend that Golden Cross Day be observed in all local churches of the conference.
- 19. The Commission recommends that 5 per cent of the gross income of the conference be set aside to begin the necessary Reserve Fund to undergird the expense items affecting the processing of the Treasurer's work in relationship to the several boards and agencies and the District Superintendent's salary. This practice is to continue indefinitely. The recommendation affecting the \$10,000.00 Reserve Fund is to discontinue at the end of the conference year 1956-1957. The Methodist Youth Fund is exempted from the 5 per cent reserve.
- 20. The Commission recommends that the Boards of Lay Activities be permitted to solicit funds throughout the conference in the interest of securing financial support for sending a layman to the Lay Congress which is to convene in India in September 1956. This asking not to exceed \$3000.00. The Commission recommends the same privilege on behalf of the ministerial representative to the Centennial Celebration of Christian Missions in Japan.

(An Obituary)

Largely through his influence, during his ministry in Camden, a closer relationship was effected between the church of the Delaware and New Jersey Conferences. He was one of the first colored ministers to preach in the churches of the New Jersey Conference in the Camden metropolitan area.

He was enjoying a happy ministry in Orange when he was compelled to relinquish his duties last summer because of illness. He confidently hoped to return to his work the first of this month, but God had provided "something better" for him. He died in full triumph of the faith.

He is survived by his sons, Dr. James Edwin Fassett of Cambridge, Maryland, and Anthony Van Pelt Fassett of Washington, D. C.; a sister Miss Josephine Fassett of Philadelphia; two grandsons, and more distant relatives, and countless friends.

JOHN LINWOOD TAYLOR

John Linwood Taylor, son of the late Joshua and Mary Taylor, was born December 25, 1879, in Quantico, Wicomico County, Maryland.

His father and mother were devout Christians who dedicated their children to God while in their infancy, established a family altar in the home and commanded the family to keep the ways of the Lord. Their son, John L., was converted and joined the Methodist Church in Quantico when a lad of eleven years and received his call to the ministry when but a young man while reading his Bible during the noon hour at the foot of a haystack.

He attended the public school in Quantico. A few years later he came to Philadelphia, Pa., sought employment, attended evening school at Broad and Green Streets and completed his high school training. He attended many ministerial training institutes in order to better prepare himself for his great task; studied many books of higher learning and as a result acquired an extensive library.

While in Philadelphia he joined the Bainbridge Street Church and became a class leader, Sunday School teacher, trustee and a local preacher. He was among those who marched in the procession to their new site, the Calvary Methodist Episcopal Church, Broad and Fitzwater Streets.

On June 26, 1907 he was joined in holy wedlock to Nora Lee Hall, of Bridgeville, Delaware, by the late Rev. J. W. Fenderson. This marriage was a happy one and the two worked zealously together with God for the advancement of kingdom building.

Under the inspirational guidance and Christian leadership of the late Rev. Charles A. Tindley, he joined the Delaware Conference in 1911 and became a full time minister of the gospel. He was a fervent gospel preacher for God had given him a real call, a gift of the Holy Ghost and blessed him with a marvelous singing voice. As a result, he led many successful, soulstirring revivals on the charges he served so faithfully and well, during his thirty-seven years of active service. He loved people, was especially interested in the children and youth of the community and was always assisting others who were less fortunate than himself.

In June, 1947 Brother Taylor was stricken but was able to continue his work until the conference session in 1948 at which time he was granted retirement, because of disability. Following the conference session he moved to his home in Pennsauken, N. J. and resided here until his death, May 9, 1955. During the summer of 1948 he was hospitalized for seven weeks and experienced a wonderful recovery.

In his retirement, his relatives and many of his friends of long standing came to give comfort and cheer and helped to make the declining years of his life pleasant. He was able to attend church services regularly at the Asbury Methodist Church, Merchantville, New Jersey where he pastored fourteen years. He often told us of his firm faith in Almighty God and his determination to trust Him always.

He leaves to mourn his passing, one daughter, one brother, a motherin-law, three brothers-in-law, one aunt-in-law, numerous nieces and nephews and a host of friends.

In loving memory we quote one of his favorite hymns:

The Lord our God is clothed with might. The winds obey His will: He speaks, and in His heavenly height The rolling sun stands still. X. Miscellaneous GENERAL CONFERENCE REPORT

Mr. Chairman, Fathers and Brethren:

We are very grateful to you for electing us as your delegates to the 1956 General Conference. We counted it an honor and a privilege to serve.

The General Conference, as you know, was held in the historic city of Minneapolis, Minnesota, the metropolitan center of a vast inland empire of industrial and economic facilities.

The Conference opened Wednesday evening, April 25th, with the Sacrament of The Holy Communion in the Hennepin Methodist Church. Bishop Ivan Lee Holt presided. The service was, in the words of Bishop Ledden, "The opening of an assembly that crosses not only the continents of the world, but that crosses over the centuries of the world". The Communion Service was preceded by a very colorful procession of the bishops of the church, led by the Boston University Singers.

Under the inspiration and the impact of the Communion Service, the delegates arose and went forth to the business of the Conference, which was destined to be the greatest historic session, perhaps, since the Uniting Session of 1939. The Conference assembled at eleven o'clock, Bishop Clare Purcell, presiding. The Conference stood as a message was read from the President of The United States. We were, also honored by the presence of the Governor who extended greetings. Fitting response was given.

Lud Estes, long-time Secretary of the General Conference, tendered his resignation to become effective January, 1957. Leon T. Moore, Philadelphia Conference, was elected in his stead.

The highlight of the General Conference is the Episcopal Address. It sets the tone, not only for the sessions of the Conference, but for the quadrennium. The address is a policy making one, defining and declaring Methodists stand upon great issues of the world. The address, also, points up the quadrennial program toward which the church shall labor in the four years ahead. The message was read by Bishop Fred Pierce Corson, Philadelphia Area.

The historic position and message of the church was reemphasized: "Let it be said and made clear through the General Conference that there has been no equivocation about our message. Let us reestablish the landmarks of the Kingdom of God in plain sight for this questing and moving age, proclaiming the right of private judgment and the freedom of individual conscience. We must exercise them in our fellowship and fight for their preservation in the world."

Speaking of man's spiritual nature, "We must have the language of revealed truth, granting men the power to decide; the church must open the Book which Protestants hold as a rule and guide to man's faith and practice".

The major emphasis in the address, to be included in the Quadrennial Program, was the local church and higher education. This program was

later adopted in its entirety with few adjustments.

Everyone in the great Conference waited breathlessly for the word coming out of the address having to do with Brotherhood and Human Relations, particularly segregation in The Methodist -Church. In the bishop's words, "The Methodist position has been stated repeatedly. Ours is a world church. As such, its responsibility is to unite in one fellowship men and women of all races and nations. As Christians, we confess ourselves to be children of God, brothers and sisters of Jesus. There is no place in The Methodist Church for racial discrimination and segregation." Out of this emphasis came the recommendation for a Study Commission to study the entire Jurisdictional structure of the church.

The daily newspapers termed the statement of the bishops as being too conservative and too general, especially when we consider the times and trends that call for action in the area of Human Relations. The newspapers did much, no doubt, through scathing criticism, to bring about the steps which will be taken to voluntarily eliminate discrimination from the structure of The Methodist Church.

There were other emphases in the address to which I briefly refer: World Peace, Christian Economy, Human Welfare, Moral Reform. These were all reliterated and written into the Social Creed.

Definite General Conference Actions:

- 1. Women were granted full clergy rights.
- 2. Two magazines displacing the Pastor's Journal and the Weekly Christian Advocate are to be published.
 - a. Together, which is a new family magazine.
- b. New Christian Advocate, digest size, a journal for pastors and church officials. Both magazines are to be monthly.
- 3. The adopting of a forty-eight million dollar World Service Program for the quadrennium. This calls for the raising of one million dollars monthly during the quadrennium . . . approximately \$1.31 per member.
 - 4. Regarding Abolition of the Central Jurisdiction:
- a. The report adopted provided for the transfer of a local church from one annual conference to another upon the approval of a % vote of the following:
 - 1. A Quarterly Conference of a local church
 - 2. Church Conference of a local church
 - 3. Each of the annual conferences involved
 - b. The annual conference may transfer to another Jurisdiction
 - 1. Upon the approval of a % vote of the annual conference involved
- 2. % vote of the Jurisdictional Conference to which the transfer is made

- 3. When 25% of the members of the Central Jurisdiction have been transferred to another jurisdiction or jurisdictions, the bishop from the Area from which the largest number have been transferred shall be transferred to the Jurisdiction which has received the largest number.
- c. The Central Jurisdiction shall be abolished when all the Annual Conferences now composing the Central Jurisdiction have been transferred to and accepted by another Jurisdiction in accordance with the voluntary procedure of Article 5 of the report.

The report was adopted and the great Conference of delegates arose and gave thunderous applause.

- Planned Parenthood was endorsed by the church when practiced with Christian conscience.
- 6. Accepted Supply Pastors are granted a voice and vote in the annual conference on all matters with the exception of those dealing with the ministry. Their vote is the same as a Lay Delegate's.
- 7. Local churches having associate pastors or Directors of Christian Education who are members of the Annual Conference may also have an additional Lay Delegate.
- 8. J. Ernest Wilkins, member of St. Marks Church, Chicago, was reelected upon the first ballot to the Judiciary. He was, also, elected to the presidency of this great body which is the Supreme Court of Methodism.
- 9. Our delegate, Mrs. Helen Waters, gave a very wonderful message on Temperance in support of the amendment which she offered to the Temperance Report.

We take this opportunity to congratulate all of the delegates of our Conference who served well on the various committees to which they were appointed. And, we, again, express our sincere thanks to this Conference for your confidence in electing us.

BY-LAWS OF THE BALTIMORE AREA OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

ARTICLE I

NAME .

This organization shall be called the Baltimore Area of The Methodist Church.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

Object of the Baltimore Area shall be to provide administrative oversight for the four Annual Conferences comprising the Area: Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington. This shall be a non-profit organization.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

The voting members shall be the Bishop of the Baltimore Area, Area Secretary, District Superintendents of the several Annual Conferences, and the following officers of each Annual Conference: the Conference lay leader, the Conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Conference executive Secretary of Christian Education, the Conference president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism; one pastor from each District in each of the Conferences elected by the District; presidents of colleges and Wesley Foundations within the bounds of the Area.

Non-Voting members—any pastor or layman in attendance has the privilege of the floor.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Baltimore Area shall be: President, the presiding Bishop of the Area; two Vice Presidents, one of whom shall be a woman; a recording secretary and a treasurer. These officers other than the president shall be elected quadrennially and shall hold office until their successors are elected. All elective officers shall be chosen by ballot.

Duties of officers shall be those commonly associated with office. The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the meetings and circulate them in mimeographed form to the members. The treasurer shall receive all monies for the expense of the Area and pay all bills incident to meetings and make an itemized report to the presiding bishop after each meeting and deposit such balance as may be in hand with the Area office.

ARTICLE V

COMMITTEES

Executive Committee: The District Superintendents of the several Conferences shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Baltimore Area and function for it ad interim.

Committees: Standing Committees of the Baltimore Area shall be: Education, Missions, Finance, Membership and Evangelism, Credentials, Courtesy and Program, and such other committees as may be found necessary. All others shall be appointed by the Resident Bishop, subject to approval by the Baltimore Area.

ARTICLE VI

MEETING

The Baltimore Area shall meet at least twice during a quadrennium, such meetings to be known as the Baltimore Area Council, the first meeting being within the fiscal year following the General Conference of The Methodist Church, subsequent meetings to be determined by the Resident Bishop.

ARTICLE VII

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The budget for the support of the Baltimore Area shall be determined by the Bishop and submitted proportionately to the several Annual Conferences, subject to their approval.

ARTICLE VIII

THE AREA PAPER

There shall be published monthly an Area journal to be called the Baltimore Area Messenger, edited by the Area Secretary and such associates as he may select.

ARTICLE IX

LOCATION

The offices of the Baltimore Area shall be in the City of Baltimore, Md.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Baltimore Area by two-thirds majority of those present and voting; provided, however, that such amendments be submitted in duplicate at least two days before being acted upon.

RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised 1956

RULE I.—Decisions

The President shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie vote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The Bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III .- Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the Presiding Officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the Presiding Officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV .- Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V.-Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.—Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Ses-

sions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the District Superintendent to the Conference Secretary.

RULE VII.-Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote who is not within the legal limits at the time the vote is taken. A member must vote on all questions before the Conference, unless otherwise excused by the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X .- Non-Debatable Questions

- To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn the Conference finally.
- 2. To suspend the rule.
- 3. To lay on the table, providing a representative of the Committee shall have the right to speak.
- 4. To take from the table.
- 5. To call for a previous question.
- 6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
- 7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
- 8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.—Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

- To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment, or may be laid on the table).
- 2. To adjourn.
- 3. To take recess.
- 4. To order a previous question.
- 5. To lay on the table.
- 6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
- 7. To postpone to a given time.
- 8. To commit or refer.
- To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
- 10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.-Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

- 1. When a member has the floor.
- When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
- When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
- When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
- 5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV .- The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of Conference relations.

RULE XV.-Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the Presiding Officer or Secretary.

RULE XVI.—Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if its subject to such division as he indicates. If there is no such, the Chairman may put the question to a vote without waiting for a second.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.—Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.-Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION

RULE XXI.—Admitted on Trial

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age.

RULE XXIII.—Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.—Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and Associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.-Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.—Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for Conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, the lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the host District Superintendent, the host Pastor, the Conference Lay Leader and the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII. Ordination Service

The Ordination Service shall be planned, including the selection of the Ordination speaker, by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training, or a Committee selected by it. The program must be approved by the Resident Bishop.

RULE XXIX. Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX .- Pictures in the Journal
