Conference Convened: The ninety-eighth session of the Delaware Annual Conference was called to order by Bishop Love.

Roll Call of ministerial and lay members was taken by card registration. Present for roll call were 155 ministerial members and 119 lay members. Excused ministerial members were: J. B. Redmond, A. L. Scriber, F. R. Richardson, W. A. Harewood.

Organization: The area of the Conference was set to include the first eleven rows of seats across the three center sections.

Bishop Love presented Hampton T. Johnson and William A. Hubbard as answering their seventy-first and sixtieth roll calls, respectively.

Resolution of Welcome was read by Augustus Chancy and adopted. (See Resolution 1.)

On motion of W. L. D. Lyght, the printed conference program was adopted as the official program, with necessary changes.

Election of Officers for Quadrennium, 1960-1964: Nomination for secretary made by D. R. Fletcher: Joshua E. Licorish. Nominations closed. Elected. Nomination for statistician made by W. L. D. Lyght. Nominations closed on Samuel E. Parker. Elected. The Secretary named the following assistants: F. D. Arnold, DePriest W. Whye, E. A. Hughes, C. W. Perry, Mrs. Helen H. Dobson, Mrs. Harrilese D. Miles, Mrs. Matilda M. Jackson, Herbert A. Wise

and Randolph Fisher. Statistician named the following assistants: C. A. Edmonds, E. L. Ellis, W. E. Marks, E. T. Hawkins, Mrs. Helen C. Waters, W. R. Mayberry, L. C. Brown, Hyland Frisby, D. W. Resolution to Reconsider election of full-time treasurer and director of stewardship at \$8,000 a year was read by H. H. Nichols. H. H. Nichols moved that the Conference defer election of treasurer until action is taken on resolution. (See Resolution 2.) Election was deferred. Bishop Love requested that the resolution be mimeographed and distributed to all members of the Conference for study.

Resolution to Purchase Property was presented by W. R. Hazzard. Resolution was adopted after suspension of Rule 8. (See Resolution 3.) The Annual Conference becomes responsible now for \$10,000, Board of Missions will loan \$30,000 and donate \$10,000 for the purchase of Tioga Methodist Church, Philadelphia at the cost of \$50,000. Conference Trustees will hold title to the property. Conference becomes responsible for \$30,000 mortgage.

Conference Trustees requested to meet after morning session by Milton T. Young, chairman, to process papers for purchase of new church.

Election Continued: On nomination of D. L. Ridout, Mrs. C. B. Miles was elected as organist and pianist for the Conference. W. H. Johns was elected postmaster and R. B. Thompson, precenter.

Business Session was called to order by Bishop Love.

Order of the day announced by Bishop Love to be the Composite Report of the District Superintendents.

Central Christian Advocate Representative, The Reverend John R. Washington, District Superintendent of the East Tennessee Conference, brought greetings to the Conference and presented the Bishop a check for \$3,069.12 which represented the Delaware Conference share of appropriation from The Methodist Publishing House for conference claimants. On motion of D. R.

Fletcher, this check was to be endorsed and turned over to the Board of Pensions.

Excused: D. L. Ridout was excused with congratulations to receive an honorary degree, Doctor of Music, from Allen University, Columbia, S. C., on Thursday, May 26.

Representatives to the Tenth World Methodist Conference at Oslo, Norway, August 17-25, 1961, appointed by the Bishop are Walter R. Hazzard, minister and Miss Florence Wilson, layman. Appointments were confirmed.

Representatives to the Greater Philadelphia Council of Churches appointed by the Bishop are Henry H. Nichols and Joshua E. Licorish. Appointments were confirmed.

Ministers passed on the characters of the District Superintendents.

Order of the Day: Composite report of the District Superintendents was read by C. W. Derrickson. (See Reports, VI-A.)

Baltimore Area Messenger: Bishop Love urged members of the Conference to subscribe to the Area Messenger, \$1.00 per year.

Adjournment: Afternoon session was adjourned with Benediction pronounced by Bishop Love.

EVENING SESSION, 7 P.M.

Evangelistic Service: W. R. Mayberry, presiding. The sermon was delivered by H. R. Snead. The subject, "The Might of God's Minority," text, Judges 7:4.

Anniversary of Hospitals and Homes: C. B. Miles, presiding. Panel Discussion: "General Conference Legislation on Health and Welfare." E. A. Hughes, Moderator. Speakers were W. R. Hazzard and Hally P. Johns. They impressed upon us that The Methodist Church has a commission not only to preach the gospel, but to heal the sick. The philosophy which undergirds the health and welfare program is based on the teachings of Jesus. It was also noted that the new legislation provides that one of the elected stewards should be designated as steward for hospitals and homes.

Columbus, Ohio, February 16-18 were reported by C. B. Miles and Mrs. L. Beatrice Dorsey.

Mrs. Dorsey, director of the Golden Cross Society, was presented by an orchid by Mrs. Grace Carrington, member of Church of The Annunciation, 12th and Diamond Streets.

Anniversary of the Board of Lay Activities: A skit, "An Every Member Canvass," was presented.

Music was furnished by the choir of John Wesley Methodist Church, Philadelphia.

Benediction was pronounced by G. T. Jackson.

THURSDAY, MAY 26, 1960-MORNING SESSION, 9 A.M.

Lay Delegates' Meeting at the First Colored Wesley Methodist Church was called to order and devotions were led by Mrs. Helen C. Waters. Miss Florence G. Wilson presided during the business session. Mrs. Helen C. Waters presented information on new legislation from the General Conference, 1960. W. C. Jason referred to Report of World Service and Finance Commission, pages four and six of Pre-Conference Reports, and 1959 Conference Journal, pages 35 and 36. A question and answer period followed. Miss Florence Wilson announced the Laymen's Mid-Year Conference would convene at Delaware State College, August 4-6. She also informed the meeting of the distinctive award given Hally P. Johns at the General Conference. He was named as "Mr. Methodist Man of the Year" for the Central Jurisdiction.

Executive Session: Devotions were led by William P. Johnson.

Board of Ministerial Training Report was presented by D. R. Fletcher and adopted. (See IV. The Disciplinary Questions, Part II, 21-34.)

Motion by H. H. Nichols that the approved supply pastors become voting

members of the session was approved.

D. R. Fletcher gave information on new legislation relative to local preachers. Local preachers desiring to serve outside of the local church must get consent from the district superintendent.

Bishop Love, in answer to question of T. C. Jones concerning certified lay speakers, stated that lay speakers are under the supervision of the district superintendent, but can speak with the permission of the pastor-in-charge.

D. R. Fletcher pointed out that too many local deacons are being ordained

who have no intention of entering the full-time ministry.

H. H. Nichols called attention to the resolution which excludes an applicant from the Area Pastor's School who is not on the approved supply pastor's list.

Years of service for J. I. Peaco approved as thirty-four instead of thirty-two.

Motion of W. C. Strother that retired ministers of the Conference serving as supply pastors not be assessed the 1½% beginning with the Conference year 1960-61 was approved.

J. I. Peaco requested the Bishop's interpretation of paragraph 1630.16, 1956 Discipline.

Committee on Conference Relations report was adopted. (See IV, 34-44 and VI-B-1.)

H. H. Nichols requested the Bishop's interpretation of paragraph 432.16, 1956 Discipline.

Bishop Love exhorted the ministers about pulpit dress and manners.

Conference Session: R. B. Thompson led in singing the hymn, "Joy Is the Fruit."

Report of the Board of Education: J. R. Shockley, chairman, stated that the report would not be read as it had been printed and distributed to the delegates. (See Report B-5.) H. A. Bailey presented Edwin L. Ellis, director of the Wesley Foundation, Morgan State College, who stated that the Foundation is certified and has on roll approximately two hundred Methodist students who have been meeting since October, 1959. Leonard Miller, director of youth work, spoke on the proposed camping program for the conference.

On motion of J. R. Shockley, recommendations were adopted.

H. A. Bailey spoke about the conference director of music, Daniel L. Ridout, and announced the Regional Church Music Institute, August 15-20 at Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pa. The director, D. L. Ridout, recommends that our church musicians become members of the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians.

J. R. Shockley spoke of Mrs. Helen C. Waters retiring from the position of secretary of the Board after twenty-four years of service.

Report of the Commission on Christian Vocations was read by Miss Florence Wilson. (See Report VI. B-7.) Adopted.

Commission on Christian Higher Education: N. W. Moore, chairman, read portions of the report. (See Report B-6.) (See recommendation 1, Report B-6.) Changed to read: We recommend that the board shall constitute a committee on Christian higher education to be composed of not less than eight of its members selected in consultation with the bishop and the cabinet. This committee shall have specific responsibility for developing knowledge of and support for the schools, colleges, universities, theological schools and Wesley Foundations related to The Methodist Church and particularly those related to the Conference.

All recommendations adopted except two and three which have been referred to the Commission for further study.

On motion of N. W. Moore, letters of sympathy were to be sent to family of the late Bishop Robert E. Jones and to Rev. and Mrs. C. L. Carrington upon death of Mrs. Carrington's mother.

Bishop Love called for motion to extend time for Town and Country Report. Time extended on motion of D. R. Fletcher.

Town and Country Commission report was presented by Augustus Chancy and W. H. Greene. W. H. Greene urged the rural pastor to study the program of town and country work. Dr. Wilson, representative from Board of National Missions, enumerated the problems facing the Easton, Dover and Salisbury Districts. He stated that the survey of these districts was conducted in two parts: first, dealt with what the ministers had to say and second, dealt with what the laymen had to say.

Recommendations were adopted. (See Report B. 4-b.)

Motion of C. L. Carrington, amended by D. W. Briddell, that the Town and Country Commission further its study of the territory covered by giving

opportunity to all concerned to present their views at stated open hearings and bring to the session of the Annual Conference in 1961, specific suggestions designed to implement the recommendations of the Survey Report, was adopted.

Recommendations of Town and Country Commission were adopted. (See Report B. 4-a.)

Committee on Courtesy presented the following visitors: The Reverends Edward D. McGowan, James D. Foy, Wm. E. Bishop, F. F. King, Kelley L. Jackson, Caleb E. Queen, J. H. Peters, and laymen, George Lisby and Attorney T. L. Dodson of the Washington Conference; the Reverends William James, Irvin C. Lockman, New York Conference; Rev. G. E. Davis, Harrisburg, Pa.; Rev. C. T. Washington, Philadelphia; Rev. J. E. Gregory, Brooklyn, N. Y. The Reverend Kelly L. Jacksop brought greetings for the group.

Announcements.

Solo by Rev. John E. Gregory, blind singer.

Noon Address was delivered by Bishop Amstutz on the Christian Church in South East Asia.

Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Amtutz.

AFTERNOON SESSION, 2:30 P.M.

Missions Presentation: Devotions were led by H. D. Davis, assisted by O. H. Spence, D. L. Williams and W. H. Greene. The speaker was H. H. Nichols who visited Methodist Mission work last year in Liberia, Ghana, Belgian Congo, Southern Rhodesia, and South Africa on the tour sponsored by the Board of Missions; as well as other countries of Africa. He stated that Africa is questioning why we don't present the positive side of Africa and why there are not more Negro missionaries. He informed us that Africans hold comparable positions to any we hold in America. He feels that Africa shows the fruits of the years of work the missionaries have given.

An offering of \$227.70 was given for Africa.

Rev. Gregory, blind evangelist, sang "How Great Thou Art." An offering of \$138.65 was given for him.

Emancipation Centennial Observance: Report made by E. W. Dean. (See Report B.)

General Conference Reports were made by the delegates as follows: Noah W. Moors, Jr., Jurisdictional Structure and Legislation; Walter R. Hazzard, Missions; Mrs. Helen C. Waters, Evangelism; and Hally P. Johns, Local Church.

Privilege was granted Miss Florence Wilson to present a gift of appreciation from the laymen of the Conference to Hally P. Johns who was chosen by the General Board of Lay Activities as "Mr. Methodist Man of the Year" for the Central Jurisdiction.

Bishop Love announced that all treasurers have been bonded as of May 31, 1960.

Conference Centennial: Resolution by D. R. Fletcher relative to the Centennial celebration of the Delaware Annual Conference was adopted. (See Resolution 4.) This observance to be planned with Historical Committee.

Resolution on Conference Treasurer: Rule 8 suspended in order to vote on

said resolution immediately. Resolution discussed and rejected in favor of resolution passed in 1959.

Order of the Day, Friday morning, report of Commission on World Service and Finance.

Announcements:

Bishop Love announced that he would be available for consultation by individuals and committees between 6 and 7 P.M. in the Study.

Benediction pronounced by W. L. D. Lyght.

EVENING SESSION, 7 P.M.

Evangelistic Service, George T. Jackson, presiding. The sermon was delivered by John E. McBride whose subject was "Evangelism." Reverend Mrs. Clarissa D. Walker also assisted in the service.

W. R. Mayberry, chairman of the Board of Evangelism, presented a plaque to George T. Jackson from the Board for his untiring service as he retires as Conference Secretary of Evangelism. Rev. Jackson expressed his deep devotion and appreciation to the members of the Conference for their consideration.

Anniversary of Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Carrie W. Henry, presiding. Mrs. Henry gave brief remarks of appreciation for the cooperation in furthering the work of the Society. Mrs. John Pierce, Chairman of Foreign Service of the Woman's Division of Christian Service, spoke from the subject, "You Are There." She talked about the work of missions in Korea, India, Pakistan, Borneo, Sarawak, Nepal, Japan, Burma and other countries in which she has traveled. Conference Session was called to order by Bishop Love.

C. W. Derrickson, nominated by W. R. Mayberry, was elected as the new Conference Secretary of Evangelism. Report of Board of Evangelism was read and adopted. (See Report VI. B-8.)

Motion by W. H. Nichols that all business be suspended at 11:55 for the

Noon address of Bishop Hobart B. Amstutz was adopted.

Motion was passed to sing "Hanny Birthday" to the Conference

Motion was passed to sing "Happy Birthday" to the Conference Secretary as today, May 27, is his birthday.

N. W. Moore requested that a letter be sent to Dr. and Mrs. Elmer P. Gibson expressing sympathy on the death of Mrs. Gibson's father.

Committee on Journal reported the minutes of the previous day had been read and found correct.

Order of the Day for Saturday, 10 A.M. to be "Reception of Classes."

Report on World Service and Finance made by F. D. Jones, chairman. (See Report B-2.) On item 18, C. B. Miles requested that amount for Hospitals, Homes and Golden Cross be raised to \$8,000. After much discussion, it was referred to the Commission on World Service. Request was not granted because a well formulated plan from the Board was not presented with the request. Amendment was defeated.

Motion by H. H. Nichols that due to the action of last year concerning the director of stewardship and treasurer's salary of \$8,000, this item should be added to the listing in item 3 under recommendations giving priority to salaries was adopted.

Question on Procedure: H. H. Nichols asked to be permitted to read the report of the Committee on Conference Entertainment due to its relationship to item 8 under Non-ratio Askings. Permission granted. After much discussion, a vote was taken on the report with 99 in favor of having the 1961 conference session at Maryland State College and 116 against. After further discussion on item 8, Non-ratio Askings, it was referred to the Commission for further study.

AFTERNOON SESSION, 2:30 P.M.

Devotions were led by R. B. Thompson. Meditation was given by H. E. Anderson from the words, "Where thieves will break through and steal." Text from Matthew 6:40.

Conference Session was called to order by Bishop Edgar A. Love.

Privilege was granted H. H. Nichols to present Mr. Lewis Carter of the Urban League. Dr. James A. Batts, General Chairman of Membership Drive, after being presented by Mr. Carter, urged membership and support for the Urban League.

Dr. Norman Trott, president of the Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C., spoke briefly of the need for adequately trained ministers.

Report of Board of Pensions: W. C. Strother, chairman, presented James H. C. Kelly, secretary, who made the report. (See Reports B-11 and 12.) Mr. Kelly reported the Pension Reserve Fund Campaign to be \$100,000 short of the \$318,000 goal.

Certificates were presented to conference members who had paid pledges to Reserve Pension Fund in full. (See Reserve Pension Campaign Report, VI. B-12.)

Motion was adopted that the Reserve Pension Campaign be extended for two years for churches not having paid apportionments in full. Bromley Oxnam in the recent radio attacks against them by Commentator Fulton Lewis, Jr., read by Henri N. Deas. Moved suspension of rule 8 in order to adopt resolution. (See Resolution 5.) Resolution adopted.

Treasurer's Report adopted. (See Statistical Tables.)

World Service and Finance report, continued. Motion by H. H. Nichols that item 31, Group Insurance, of non-ratio askings be referred to Commission and World Service and Finance and the Board of Pensions in order that they may provide us with an exact statement of contract between the Insurance Company and the Conference.

Question by D. R. Fletcher if the CPA report will include disbursements as well as receipts or will it be as the statement shown in the Pre-Conference booklet was answered by F. D. Jones, chairman. CPA statement will include both disbursements and receipts.

Motion by D. R. Fletcher that a general heading of Board of Missions be used listing all items for which the board is responsible was passed. Motion was referred to Commission on World Service for execution. Bishop Love requested Roy Cordery, Board of Missions chairman, to meet with the Commission on this matter.

Motion was approved that the World Service Report be adopted item by item.

Report of Commission was adopted with following changes: "Week of Dedication" becomes "One Great Hour of Sharing" and Methodist Television Ministry replaces Radio and TV.

Motion by J. R. Shockley that the apportionment for the Delaware State Council of Churches be included in the World Service and Finance budget was approved.

On motion of H. H. Nichols, the World Service and Finance Commission was given a rising vote of thanks for four years of splendid work.

J. E. Dunn was nominated by F. D. Jones and elected conference treasurer and director of stewardship.

5. RESOLUTION CONDEMNING ATTACKS UPON CHURCHES AND CHURCHMEN AND SUPPORTING THE STAND OF BISHOP EDGAR A. LOVE AND BISHOP G. BROMLEY OXNAM IN THE RECENT RADIO ATTACKS AGAINST THEM BY COMMENTATOR FULTON LEWIS, JR.

We express deep concern that during the past year, attempts have been made by individuals and organizations endeavoring to silence the voice of the Church and the voices of individual churchmen to strive to bring Christian ideals to bear upon controversial social, economic and political issues.

We wish to go on record in completely endorsing the following statement of the 1960 Episcopal Address: "We register vigorous protest against viciously false statements that have been made, and are being made, concerning prominent Protestant churchmen—men of unimpeachable character, patriotism, and loyalty to Christ. These assaults are also being made upon the World Council of Churches, the National Council of Churches of Christ and other agencies of cooperation among Protestant and Orthodox churches. It is even more regrettable that, at a time when there was never greater need to emphasize the

essential unity of the Christian Church, some of these baseless charges emanate from individuals and groups who bear the name of Christ. We commend the officials of the Air Force for the prompt apology given to the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. for the incredible blunder of allowing some of these slanderous charges to be included in a training manual. This incident is but another indication of the subtle and alarming growth of a procedure by which an American citizen whose name has been brought into question by irresponsible, and, at times, malicious rumor, must prove himself innocent of disloyalty and subversion—and that before an agency of the government which has no judicial authority and whose methods of prosecution are devoid of the safeguards which are constitutionally guaranteed to the individual citizen. This is a frightening reversal of an inalienable heritage, dear to every American. The preservation of this inherent freedom is worthy of the most dedicated and determined effort of all our citizens, churchmen and non-churchmen alike."

We deplore the fact that any Methodist contribute either money or leadership to such organizations as the "Circuit Riders" and "White Citizens' Councils" which utilize methods of terror and intimidation of Negroes in the rightful exercise of their constitutional rights and which seek to carry out their invidious purposes by reason of "guilt by association" and "fellow traveler" approaches in stirring up unfounded suspicion and fears toward our respected Negro leaders while ignoring the basic struggle of American

citizens to achieve their fundamental rights and privileges.

This Conference wishes to go on record as completely endorsing and affirming the stand of its Resident Bishop, Edgar A. Love, and Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam in the recent vilifying and malicious attacks of one radio commentator known as Fulton Lewis, Jr., over a nationwide series of broadcasts. We deeply resent and hereby condemn these attacks upon Bishop Love, Bishop Oxnam and other respected leaders of the Church.

A. The District Superintendents' Reports

COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

The district superintendents are pleased to make their second composite report on some phases of achievements of the five districts. This account of our stewardship constitutes only a parital report of the work that has been done by the laymen and ministers of these five districts. A more detailed account will be given by each individual superintendent as he evaluates the work of each pastor and charge.

It is not expected that a report of this nature should cover all areas of concerns that your Conference has to deal with during the year. Time and space would not permit such a coverage. It is sufficient to call attention to some of the vital concerns that are so important in these times of insecurity. As superintendents, we have sought diligently to gather all information possible touching the areas of concerns for which the Conference is responsible, and report to you. This report is a combined effort on the part of the five superintendents.

You will discover that the work of the Board of Lay Activities and the Woman's Society of Christian Service is not directly included in this report. It should be said that these two groups have been dynamic factors in all of the successful events of the total program of the church. In fact, it is quite true, had it not been for these organizations, many of the local churches could not have succeeded and many of the accomplishments that are being reported to this Conference, would have never taken place. It was in the confines of these organizations that evangelism, missions, education, and stewardship had a chance to be most effective in their areas of work.

Evangelism

Evangelism remains a major concern among consecrated ministers and laymen throughout the Delaware Conference. They have joined hearts and hands in an effort to promote this all important cause that Christ's kingdom may come on earth. There are those who ask, have these labors been fruitful? Where are tangible results to be seen?

During the past year we have emphasized total enlistment of every member of the local church in some definite type of Christian activity. We attempted to enlist the unenlisted people and we tried to inspire our church members to make a complete dedication of self to Christian ideals and Christian living.

We do not have in hand full reports of total enlistment at the moment. Statistics have a way of presenting cold facts and figures which seldom tell the whole story. Indications are leading us to say that progress has been made. Keener interest has been stimulated, signs of spiritual growth have been seen in local churches all over the Conference. Our program of Evangelism has not been promoted in vain. Persons have been challenged to become more

actively engaged in church work. Unenlisted persons have been won. Here and there people have dedicated themselves, their time, talents, possessions and their all to the Christian way of life.

We have not stopped because of gains made in total enlistment. While we rejoice to see the spiritual development which has rewarded our feeble efforts, we did not call a halt nor beat a retreat. Rather, upon each district preparatory steps have been taken, not only to retain the advances made, but to heighten, broaden, and deepen our assets. We plan to accomplish this by joining the great procession which from 1960-1970 shall march from the lowlands of nominal Christianity and take our rightful place with those who have violently shaken off the spirit of complacency in order to enter the "Decade of Dynamic Discipleship."

Among other tangible results have been Christian Witnessing. An increasing number of laymen are seeing the need of witnessing members. Perhaps the most striking results have come from our youth. Several of our youth, after participating in Conference Christian Witness Missions, have returned to their districts, sub-districts, and local churches fired with new zeal to witness for Christ. Not only have their own spiritual lives been strengthened by Christian teaching and witnessing, but they in turn have been sources of inspiration leading to the enrichment of the lives of other youth reached by sub-district and local church Christian Witness Missions. We have seen youth lead youth to unite with our churches.

Almost constant indications of spiritual awakenings are being seen. Personal evangelism is slowly gaining momentum. More individual pastors and laymen dare to speak, to act, to communicate the Gospel as they believe, to others. More pastors are conducting membership training classes through which both youth and adults are being won to Christ. Pastors and Commissions on Membership and Evangelism are cooperating in making the "Reception" or "Confirmation" of these classes one of the most significant days of the church calendar.

Visitation Evangelism, Preaching Missions, Convocations, and Revivals or Mass Evangelism are other methods widely used. People of all age levels and of all walks of life are being confronted with the Gospel, commitments are being made, spirits are quickened and patterns of lives are changing for good. Lest we become satisfied with the remarkable gains made, let us remember that a tremendous unfinished task remains to challenge us. What more may we do?

We can set our feet on lofty places and catch a vision of God's plan for the redemption of the world. We can create an evangelistic climate in our local churches, we can accept evangelism as a part of the regular work of our church and therefore build a three hundred and sixty-five day program of evangelism instead of limiting it to Easter, Four Nights for God, or two weeks of fiery evangelistic effort to be followed with a twelve month cooling off period. We can impress upon the minds of laymen that they are just as responsible for winning souls as the pastors, and that God eagerly waits for the moment when pastors and laymen witness that Christ redeems, that Christ alone transforms lives that the living Master waits to impart that something within which brings newness of life.

Christian Education

The quadrennium in which education in the local church was stressed has ended. We are aware of the fact that historically education has been one of the vital concerns of Methodism. Let us take a serious look at what we as a conference have done along the lines of Christian education. A close examination will reveal that we have struggled to preserve and to pass on those standards of value, ideals, customs, skills, and traditions treasured by generations of yesteryears to our present generation. We have sought to stir up and develop the potential powers, to kindle the imagination and to challenge and guide pupils to the end that they might attain worthy and noble goals in life.

We believe that a measure of success has attended our efforts. The several districts have been able to promote local church education, in over 265 church schools, staffed with approximately 2,300 officers and teachers. The total enrollment is around 2,500 and the average attendance approaches 11,000. Hundreds of these pupils have united with the church on profession of faith. They have contributed something like \$7,000 through their Fourth Sunday

offerings for World Service and Conference Benevolences.

More than 3,200 persons have attended the expanded sessions of the Church School and the Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship. Some 10,000 pupils were reached and enrolled in our Vacation Church Schools. These schools were conducted by a noble band of volunteer teachers and workers who did a splendid job of promoting a program of Christian education on an intensive scale.

The districts offered leadership training opportunities as follows: accredited Christian Workers Schools, in which courses were offered according to the needs of the respective districts. Vacation Church School Institutes were held at strategic points on the districts for the training of suitable personnel to operate the schools. Missionary Rallies were held on each district mainly for the purpose of missionary education for youth and leaders of youth. District Youth Assemblies were held in an effort to train youth to be more effective leaders in the local church Methodist Youth Fellowships. Missionary Institutes were promoted that our leaders might know the mission of the Church to the world in which we live. District Seminars were held so that all pastors might receive vital information regarding pre-marital counseling. The districts enrolled Christian education staffs in the Area Leadership Training School at Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C. and encouraged teachers and workers to take advantage of fine leadership training offered by communities where different denominations cooperated in such enterprises.

Retreats, Workshops, Officer Training Days, and Quarterly Meetings were held. These meetings were designed to give in-service training to local church leaders in such areas as General Church School Work, Lay Activities, Methodist Men, Young Adult Work, W.S.C.S., the Commissions, and such other

instruction as the respective districts needed.

Through the prodigious efforts of our Conference Executive Secretary, Rev. Howard A. Bailey, assisted by district staffs, significant developments have taken place in the local churches, however, we are fully aware of the fact that we have just scratched the surface. Higher goals must be set and attained if we are to meet the new challenges of this new day, and effectively serve the present age.

Christian Higher Education has been emphasized for the last four years. The quadrennium is ended. We failed to climb very high in regards to Christian Higher Education. Because of Methodism's traditional zeal for the enlightened mind we can feel reasonably sure that the cause of Christian Higher Education will be one of our abiding concerns for a long time to come.

If Christianity is to be kept alive, the church related college must keep its doors open so that students may enter and find the stimulation toward Christian character and loftiness of vision as no other institution of learning can give. Our Conference has stepped up its tempo of support. But our giving is so often "too little and too late." Our Conference approved \$1.50 per member as our goal. We have set aside Layman's Day, Student Recognition Day, Race Relations Sunday, and College Day as the special days upon which to raise our \$1.50 per member per year. Our church related colleges must of necessity maintain high standards. They are in competition with state supported schools. They must measure up or close their doors.

We call upon the members of the great Delaware Conference to rethink our concern for Christian higher education, then make a determined effort to reach our goal of \$1.50 per member in every local church in our conference. Christian higher education needs to be one of the great concerns of every member of the Delaware Conference.

Missions

Our primary concern is missions. No other trait is more characteristic of Methodism throughout its history than the Christian missionary impulse. Ever since John Wesley said, "The world is my parish," the missionary outlook and zeal have been integral parts of the Methodist movement.

A more effective missionary emphasis is evident in our churches. However, we still need eye openers because some officials get so immersed in the work of the local church that they do not lift their eyes to see where the General Church is going. Some others get into traditional grooves of promoting the "missions" of the church and fail to fully understand the relevance of "missions" to human redemption and salvation. To strengthen this area of our work, we have endeavored to promote a stimulating and enlightening program of missionary education on local church, district, and conference levels.

Through Christian teaching "Africa" has been laid upon the minds of church school scholars, "Luke's Portrait of Christ" has inspired the hearts of many, and the spirit of Christ has been manifested in the fellowship of the churches. In addition to supporting district or conference projects, some local churches are giving direct substantial support to missions in Africa and Asia. We know there is no basic distinction between national missions and world missions. It is all equally the practice of the Christian ethic of love in a world where hatred, and strife, sectionalism and division, pride and prejudice are too often the order of the day.

"The supreme aim of missions is to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all people in all lands as their divine Saviour, to persuade them to become his disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian churches; to enlist them in the building of the kingdom of God, to cooperate with these churches; to promote world Christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Christ." The Church has not missed her supreme aim.

However, the critical reader of present-day Methodist memorials and legislation will be impressed by two things. He will find ministers and laymen at variance on the issue of race and the jurisdictional structure of the Church. He will also note that there is neither a certain solution to this basic problem nor enough courageous efforts to implement the New Testament principles in race relations throughout the whole Church. But if he is fair-minded, he will be not less impressed by the evidences that they refuse to draw iron curtains that shut off discussion, they continue to express themselves to each other's arguments, and they often express the hope of ultimate agreement and unity under the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

The honest and pious seeker of Christian fellowship without regard to race, color or class may be denounced as a traitor to sectional or denominational tradition. Nevertheless, the day of march has come when people who are called Christians must stand up and live like sons of God and bring to

bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Christ.

The ecumenical spirit of our time, the power of the gospel, and the universal struggle for freedom, justice, and human dignity not only facilitate the revolutionary changes in our society, but they also challenge the whole Church to make new steps in missions to hasten the day of universal brotherhood under the Fatherhood of God.

The following achievements are evidences of progress in the area of missions:

 The new Community Church in West Philadelphia was established on Sunday, September 27, 1959.

The new St. Matthews Church in Trevose was consecrated for services on Sunday, February 14, 1960.

3. The Conference is in the process of purchasing the Tioga Methodist Church on the corner of 18th and Tioga Streets in North Philadelphia.

 Brooks Memorial Church in Jamaica, N. Y., is constructing a new parsonage at an approximate cost of \$33,000.00.

 Plans of Tindley Temple Church have been approved for the building of an educational center at the approximate cost of \$150,000.00.

 A new church in Clarksville, Delaware, is under construction. Also, a new Parker Church is under construction on the Marydel Charge.

 Eight churches have liquidated their mortagages, John Wesley, Port Norris; St. Matthews, Darby; St. Johns, Newark; St. Matthews, Ossining; Ebenezer, Snow Hill; Handy Memorial, Marion Station; Metropolitan, Princess Anne; and John Wesley, Carmichaels.

8. The Delaware Conference has five representatives on the "Commission to Study the Metropolitan Area of Greater New York City" and nine on the "Joint Committee to Study Problems of Ministering to People in

the City of Philadelphia."

 A larger number of local churches have membership in Councils of Churches.

Under the direction of the Commission on Town and Country Work, a comprehensive survey of the Dover, Easton, and Salisbury Districts was made to discover ways to strengthen rural churches to meet their missionary challenge in this new day. Apart from the findings of this Commission, we reiterate the suggestions that were in the last Composite Report of the district superintendents:

- 1. Small churches within a three mile radius may be merged.
- 2. Several churches or circuits may be combined to form a larger parish.
- 3. A group ministry or larger parish or sub-district unit may stimulate and help members and ministers of the churches involved.
- 4. Christian teaching and Christian stewardship practices must be stressed.
- 5. Members who are best qualified in body, mind, heart, and spirit should be given opportunities to lead.
- An extensive and thorough survey and study of each pastoral charge should be made to determine the social, economic, and religious strength or weakness of each church.
- 7. Leaders and other members of the church must be ready and willing to work even under pressure and against out-moded traditional patterns to meet the challenge of our new day and to extend the Kingdom of God in human society.

Some alert laymen see the wisdom of merging churches that are in proximity and the advantage of a group ministry. They also see the need for more full-time, well equipped pastors who love the country and who will live within the parish. This problem will face us until more rural churches provide adequate ministerial support, systematic methods of planning and raising the total budget, and a comfortable parsonage for the pastor. These facts should challenge us to make the future bright not only for the minister, but also for the church.

We urge every church to be diligent in its endeavor to report the apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences and Promotion-Advance in full; observe the special days for the promotion of missionary interests, and pray that God's will shall be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Stewardship

In spite of economic reverses due to labor strikes, crop failures, and limited employment in certain areas, some churches continue to advance in stewardship because the spirit of love permeates the fellowship, effective pastors provide excellent leadership, and the faithful officials accept the responsibility of making proper and more adequate provisions for the financial needs of the church without resorting to lottery, raffle, or other games of chance to raise money.

Other churches are struggling to keep the status quo, not because the budget is too heavy, but because too many members are "treading where they have always trod in stewardship." About fifty per cent of the full members contribute nothing to the support of the church, fifteen per cent and irregular, and the average systematic giving is less than fifty cents per capita per week. Too many churches depend upon camp meetings, big dinners, rummage sales, mock weddings, pageants, etc., to meet the financial needs of the church. A good churchman said, "The modern church cannot meet the challenge of this 'rocket age' with a horse- and buggy-day budget." Pastor and people should increase their support to the church because giving is a reasonable expression of gratitude to God; it provides funds to meet human needs; and it improves the spiritual atmosphere of the congregation.

We have emphasized the following objectives in the past and we recommend them for the ensuing year: 1. The pastor and laymen in each church shall practice stewardship as the Christian way of life and systematic, proportionate giving of time, abilities, and material possessions based on the conviction that these are a trust from God, to be used in His service for the benefit of all mankind in grateful ac-

knowledgement of Christ's redeeming love.

2. The every member canvass shall be carefully planned and conducted in every parish because it develops a better understanding not only of the needs of the church but also of Christian stewardship; it increases the number of contributions and assures the church additional revenue for the budget; it lifts the financial program of the local church to a Christian and business-like level; and it deepens one's spiritual life.

3. Every pastoral charge shall work systematically throughout the conference year to meet all financial obligations not only because this is the best business procedure; but also because it provides the necessary financial under-

girding for the total ministry of the church when it is needed.

4. Stewardship shall be promoted in each charge by providing appropriate literature to enlist Methodist people as tithers or proportionate givers by conducting seminars or workshops on Christian stewardship, by preaching the gospel, by keeping the congregation informed of the needs of the church, and

by practicing Christian stewardship daily.

The results of stewardship education and practices are evident throughout the conference where ministers and laymen have acquired a deeper faith in God and a better understanding of their Christian responsibility in a changing social order. During the last quadrennium the total budget of the conference was increased from \$1,327,368 to \$1,563,034. This is an increase of \$235,666 in four years. In 1956 we raised \$41,250 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, but in 1959 the total was \$53,472, an increase of \$12,222. During the same period we neglected the Promotion-Advance Fund which is necessary to create and support new churches. With the support of a full-time treasurer and director of stewardship the people called Methodists throughout the bounds of the conference should be motivated to give more generously of their time, abilities, and possessions to strengthen the church and extend the kingdom of God.

By the grace of God through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, the church will grow stronger and stronger if you:

"Do all the good you can,
By all the means you can,
In all the ways you can,
In all the places you can,
At all the times you can,
To all the people you can,
As long as ever you can."

Worship

Christian worship in the church is spiritual communication with God and man. In public worship, the place, the ritual and the ceremony are important aids.

The function of the Commission on Worship is to cultivate beauty, dignity, and meaning in the worship experience of the church. During the last quadrennium much has been done to improve the quality of worship services in the churches. In some of our churches the optional commission on worship has been organized. It is gratifying to report that there are evidences of a growing understanding of the meaning of worship in our churches and a definite improvement. The Methodist Book of Worship and the Hymnal are being used to prepare the worship services. Many of our churches are supplying the congregation with hymnals so all can share in the worship together. The choirs are robed and many of the pastors are wearing robes.

While there are improvements being made in the quality and effectiveness of our worship service, there are some features that need correction badly. Perhaps the most annoying is the long list of announcements read by the church clerk. This often changes the spiritual climate and detracts from the effectiveness of the service. This could be corrected by making better use of the church bulletin, the press, and the radio. It would also help greatly if more officials and members of church organizations would attend their meetings. The worship service is for worship.

Another feature is the time element, some of our churches lack punctuality. At the beginning of the order of our worship service is this admonition: "Let the service of worship begin at the time appointed and let the people kneel or bow in silent prayer upon entering the sanctuary." The pastor as the leader of the worship will have much to do with the tone and effectiveness. His spiritual preparation, pulpit decorum, and dress will have an effect upon the service.

While The Methodist Church is not a liturgical church in the fullest meaning of the term, it is expected that all pastors will use the orders of worship. Each pastor has an obligation faithfully to observe the Methodist Ritual, and to use only ordained persons in the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. We believe that the more beautiful meaningful, and helpful the worship service is in our churches, the more the people will attend to receive its benefits.

Christian Social Concerns

The three major social concerns of The Methodist Church are temperance, world peace, and social and economic relations.

We are deeply concerned over the growing practice of permitting the sale of alcoholic beverages through drug and grocery stores in a deliberate attempt to win the housewife as a customer because this practice encourages social drinking in the family and it also makes these beverages more accessible to minors. We are deeply disturbed because an increasing number of women and youth imbibe beer, wine, and whisky; and alcoholism is a growing major disease which baffles the minds of medics. We deplore the fear and timidity of Methodists who lack the courage and Christian audacity to protest the establishment of a tavern or liquor store in the community.

Our church must be militant in opposition to the liquor traffic because "the drinking of alcoholic beverages is increasingly responsible for the disintegration of the home as witnessed by social service records and those of divorce proceedings. It is a major cause of public disorder, disaster, and traffic

injuries and fatalities. It causes poverty and produces economic waste in industry and commerce. It is a corrupting influence upon the conduct of

public affairs. It is a most formidable obstacle to the good life."

We are concerned about world peace not because war is inevitable but because the development of increasing horrible weapons of mass destruction has brought man to the threshold of possible extinction; the most influential people have not pursued the Master's way of peace; and society is being taught to rely upon power and might in a day when the mandate of the Lord should be heeded: "They that take the sword shall perish with the sword." A continued program of competitive armaments by major hostile nations might incidently trigger off a nuclear war between the East and the West that could bring disaster and human annihilation on earth.

Should the church be complacent in a troubled world where millions, scattered everywhere, are struggling for freedom and security? There can be but one correct answer. If the church should face-up to this tremendous challenge, Christians around the world ought to be strong and courageous in the application of the principles of Jesus to the personal and social problems of our day. They should be dedicated to the task of rapidly eliminating (a) "racial and class distinction; (b) economic conditions which cause hunger, disease, and ignorance for large segments of the human race; and (c) the political sup-

pression of human rights."

In this new day of tremendous emerging social change, we commend the students who participated in the sit-in demonstrations and picketing at lunch counters for the dignified, non-violent manner in which they conducted themselves in demanding civil liberties which the government should guarantee to all men alike. "To discriminate against a person solely upon the basis of his race is both unfair and unchristian. Every child of God is entitled to that place in society which he has won by his industry and his character. To deny him that position of honor because of the accident of his birth is neither honest democracy nor good religion." We further commend civil authorities and professional police forces whose skillful performances prevented chaos in those cities where the demonstrations have occurred.

This moral and spiritual struggle for basic human rights, freedom, and security should challenge both the church and the community to accept Negroes and all other persons on terms of dignity. It is gratifying to report that more of our churches have organized and activated the Commission on Christian Social Relations to spur complacent members out of their sluggish inactivity in the area of integration and to motivate the Church to follow Christ in bringing the whole of life, with its activities, possessions, and relationships, into conformity with the will of God.

Ministerial Support

The Christian Ministry

The highlight of the report, made to the General Conference of 1960, in a quadrennial study of the Christian ministry was that The Methodist Church needs at least 8,000 new ministers, during the next four years.

These ministers are needed to serve new churches, that will result from expansion, and to replace ministers who will retire, die, or be lost from the service for other reasons.

The report said that supply pastors, who do not expect to qualify for Conference membership, and become full fledged ministers, are to be replaced during the 1960-64 quadrennium, and that nearly 5,000 additional ministers are needed during the next four years. The Methodist Church has slightly less than 28,000 ministers.

The responsibility for recruiting ministers rests primarily with local churches. Every study of the influences leading men to respond to the call of the ministry, shows the pre-eminent importance of the local pastor and the home in the vocational decision.

The Methodist ministry is becoming better educated. In 1959 about 62% of the ministers in full connection had graduated from seminary, while in 1956, less than 49% had graduated. More than 82% of those admitted in full connection in 1959 were seminary graduates.

About 75% of the pastors serve churches, or charges, with less than 500 members. Nearly 65% of the pastors were living in communities of less than 10,000 population when they were licensed to preach.

In 1959, 222 women were approved as supply pastors. Fifty-six women were received on trial as ministerial members of annual conferences, 39 were received into full connection. In the Delaware Conference there are 11 women, who are approved supply pastors, and one retired. It is reported that one woman in the Central Jurisdiction has been admitted on trial, in an annual conference.

In the help wanted column of a newspaper there recently appeared, all except one of the following advertisements:

Plumber, expert wanted, salary	\$120.00	a	week
Novelty Joke salesman, start			
Clerk Trainees	\$60.00-\$85.00	a	week
Janitor, good Apt. bldg	\$75.71	a	week
(Minister, 7 yrs. of College & Seminary			

The last ad, certainly is the one that did not appear. All churches in our land, would be ashamed to run such an ad. But there are thousands that do not seem to be ashamed to pay their ministers, \$70, and much less a week. In a recent nation-wide survey, the most frequently reported ministerial salary was \$3,600 a year. Many pastors in rural areas get even less. The average salary reported was \$4,436.00, or \$85.30 a week. The average salary reported by the General Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church in 1959 for the Ministers of the Delaware Conference was \$3,285. The annuity rate for retired ministers was \$31.00 for each service year. The annuity rate for widows was \$21.70, while the annuity rate for children was \$7.75, for each service year.

This is not enough to pay a man who may have spent seven university years preparing for this high calling. This is not enough salary to pay a man who works 60-80 hours a week, on every conceivable church and community problem, and is on call 24 hours a day just as a doctor. Surely a man who hears the unhappiest problems life has to offer—alcoholism, domestic battles and tragedies, poverty, incurable illness and death, deserves much better treatment.

The whole matter is vividly pointed up in a study of 500 ministers, made by the National Council of Churches. Some of the figures are shameful enough to help to jar many a congregation out of its complacency. Two thirds of the responding ministers said that they are in substantial debt. Of these, nearly one fourth reported their debts increasing. Nearly one half reported that they were unable to reduce their debts. Many ministers' wives have been forced to go to work to meet the rising cost of living. This is doubly hard on them because they still are expected to do a great deal of church work. A number of ministers reported that they were forced to cash in their life insurance in order to educate their children.

One minister reported that his car expenses last year came to \$600.00, for church work only, and that had to be taken out of his \$3,300.00 salary. Like more than one third of the ministers, he receives no car allowance. The average travel allowance reported was \$300.00, which does not even pay for the gas used in the performance of church duties. In our Conference 16% of the ministers received no travel allowance last year. The average travel allowance was \$225.00. One pastor, received only \$12.00 for travel expenses.

A house is provided for most ministers, and this should be figured as part of their income, but the housing is often far from a blessing. Many parsonages seem to be domestic horrors with bad plumbing, worse heating, and second-hand furniture.

The increase in the minister's salary has not kept pace with the rising cost of living. During the last 36 years the cost of living rose 56.5%, while ministers' salaries rose only 44%. Last year the salaries in this Conference were increased 5%. This year they are increased approximately 6%.

It is a rare privilege to do God's work, but there are other noble ways for one to serve mankind, and rear his family in decency too: medicine, teaching, social welfare, to name a few. We may very well be inviting the disaster of having none but the timid, the inept, and the fanatic to preach in our pulpits.

The way out is to cure the basic trouble, for if we want good religious leadership, we must be willing to pay for it. We must practice Christian stewardship in all of our lives.

The campaign to raise \$320,000.00 for the Reserve Pension Fund has not been completed. More than \$200,000.00 was raised, but we need at least \$100,000.00 more to reach our goal. Some charges are 100% in this cause, some have done well, some fair, and some are still near the starting point.

The raising of the Reserve Pension Fund is still a must. If we want to do this job we will find a way to do it. We only aspire to the heights that we think we can accomplish.

For their loyal cooperation and colossal work in helping to raise the conference claimants, and other askings for the Conference, great praise should be given to the ministers' wives. Year after year, they render faithful and untiring service as they carry out the program of the church. Each district is thoroughly organized. Monthly meetings are held, which give time for fellowship and sharing. The programs that are given by the ministers' wives are financially supported by our loyal and cooperative laymen.

Christian Vocations

During this past quadrennium the conscience of many of our leaders in the local church throughout the five districts has been awakened to the great need of Christian vocations. The Conference Commission on Christian Vocations, led by Rev. Howard A. Bailey has been the responsible force for this awakening. The flame that was started at the beginning of this quadrennium has been kept alive and burning to the present time. Constant cultivation of the vines that were planted at the beginning of the past four years are beginning to produce fruit. With a great deal of elation we can count in numbers the young men and women who have made commitments to the Christian ministry, or some phase of the missionary work. Being more specific, we can point with pride to thirty young women who show promise for the field of missions and have made commitment to the missionary enterprise. It is quite evident that by continued cultivation, the Delaware Conference will take its rightful place in the missionary field. To this end, the local churches, individuals, and the conference as a whole, must provide more scholarships in order that these worthy young women might complete their preparation for this ministry. The Woman's Society is giving splendid cooperation in the field of recruitment, also it is giving guidance to young women who are interested in church related vocations.

There are evidences that the missionary emphasis is on the upward grade. The Commissions on Missions should continue emphasizing this work on each fourth Sunday not only to promote financial strength, but also to give moral support to the missionary enterprise.

There is an acute shortage of ministers. To meet this challenge, the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations, in cooperation with the Board of Ministerial Training, has recruited several young men for the Christian ministry. The joint boards and commissions, with the cooperation of our resident Bishop, have held two dinner meetings during the Christmas season for the purpose of challenging, informing, and stimulating these young people to meet this need, and sending them out with a burning passion to win this world for Christ and His Church. We are happy to report that thirty-one young men have made their commitments to the Christian ministry.

Nursing is essential to good health, and health is necessary for service. The church has awakened to the fact that nursing is one of the vocations that must be cultivated and lifted to the level of other Christian Vocations. To this end, through the guidance of the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations, nineteen young people have committed themselves to the cause of nursing. This gives great promise to the time when Christian hands shall administer to the fevered brow and give comfort to the dying. The educational status of these young people is high school and college. The need in this field is tremendous.

Christian education is essential to the growth of the church and the building of the kingdom of God. Recruitment in this vocation is perhaps slower than in some of the others. The need is just as vital and the cause as necessary. There are four young people who have committed themselves to Christian education.

Church music is rather a new field in our church related vocations. It is one, if given the proper cultivation, will bring a new day in many of our churches. Too few of our churches have any knowledge of real church music. Any type of hymns, or even the rock and roll is sufficient so long as they are able to use their mouths and feet. The great Wesley hymns are an unknown quantity in too many of our churches. The Conference Commission is deeply concerned about the need in this field, and is endeavoring to meet this need,

though recruitment is slow. There are two young people who have committed

themselves to this area of concern.

Social work is one of our most lucrative vocations, but too few are finding their way into it. The conference through its Commission on Vocations is impressing upon the young people the dignity and the call of God that is involved in this phase of work. We are happy to report that eleven of our young people have accepted the challenge, and have committed themselves to this field of service. There is a line of William Pierson Merrill's hymn that is very appropriate here, as we face the needs in these fields of services:

"Rise up, O men of God!
The Church for you doth wait,
Her strength unequal to her task
Rise up, and make her great."

Church Property

In order to meet the spiritual and moral needs of our people who are moving into the metropolitan areas of our Conference, it is necessary to build new churches and start new outpost church schools. We must remodel our old churches and renovate others in order to meet the growing need of our population. Our church extension program has lagged far behind in raising funds for church building programs. We must reach these people who have no home church, though they are passive Christians, but our larger concern should be for those who do not know Christ and His way of life, bringing them into the fellowship, in order that they might be under the protection of the "One Shepherd." One new church building has been purchased during this conference year, with the hope that a new congregation will be housed therein. Several congregations have burned mortgages during this conference year. With these mortgages out of the way, the churches have an opportunity to beautify the buildings and renovate to meet the needs of their evangelistic and educational work.

Conclusion

This has been a year filled with many difficulties in the life of the church. The achievements that have been reported were accomplished by a few sacrificing, hard working, and consecrated Christians. So today we can report that substantial gains have been made in the areas of education, evangelism, stewardship, and missions. There must be continued advancement of these causes if the church is to hold the light by which the world is to walk.

We strongly urge our ministers to lift up their voices against the desecration of the Holy Sabbath. This is the one day set apart whereby mankind will have an opportunity for spiritual and physical refreshment, and enrichment

of life.

It is our conviction that the boys and girls of the 20th Century can be saved from the vices that are so prevalent in our society. Therefore we urge closer cooperation on the part of the minister and the teacher, the church and the school. The teacher, preacher, church, and school must provide the atmosphere which will be conducive to good character. We call upon all homes to establish and maintain the family altar,

We cannot pause for one brief moment, there are new challenges appearing constantly, urgent demands, and additional requirements pressing upon us. As Moses was commanded to speak to the people, so must we—"Speak to the people that they go forward," "Ye have compassed this mountain long enough."

"He is coming like the glory of the morning on the wave, He is wisdom to the mighty, he is honor to the brave, So the world shall be his footstool, and the soul of wrong his slave,

Our God is marching on!"

CHESTERTOWN has had another very good year under the efficient leadership of its fine pastor, Rev. C. H. Molock.

The youth program is well taken care of through the Sunday School, Vacation Church School, and Christian Workers School. This is a 100% charge; all benevolence in full. Raised for building and improvement \$2,750. Grand total \$9,482.

CHESWOLD: This charge is growing. The people are thinking of enlarging their very beautiful Church. World Service paid in full, other Conference asking increased. The Pastor's salary raised \$200. Pastor and people are happy. Grand total raised \$3,890, Rev. W. C. Thomas, Pastor.

CLARKSVILLE: This charge under the able leadership of its pastor, Rev. G. W. Taylor is doing a marvelous job. It reports 22 conversions, 21 accessions and 3 youth have been inspired to prepare for the Christian ministry. Raised all conference apportionments in full. New pews and Liturgical set installed

in the Zoar Church at a cost of \$1,922 and paid for. The fine loyal laymen have a mind to work. Grand total raised \$8,054.

COLEMAN: This charge has not realized near its full potential, but there is some improvement over the previous year. Conversions 6, accessions 2. Paid on World Service \$90.00, for Trustees \$574. Grand total \$4,616. Rev. C. R. Mills, Pastor.

CRUMPTON: This charge brings up a good report under the leadership of its pastor, Rev. I. W. Wallace. The Pastor has not had good health, but has carried on the work well. Conversions 7, accessions 7. World Service and Conference Claimants paid in full. Church School in good condition. A new bulletin board has been placed on the lawn of Mt. Pleasant Church. Raised for all causes \$2,823.

DELMAR: This charge has a small membership, but has completed a fair year's work. Accessions 2. World Service \$34.00. Other causes advanced over last year. The pastor has been ill and out of the pulpit during the year. Raised for all causes \$5,531.

DOVER: This is one of our 100% charges, Rev. D. M. Collins, the pastor was strickened with serious illness and was out of the pulpit for two months, but the loyal laymen carried on. A splendid year's work has been accomplished under dynamic leadership of their new pastor. Conversions 5. Accessions 3. The Church School continues to grow. Mrs. Collins, wife of the pastor has done a fine job with the church choir. The parsonage has been beautifully renovated. \$2,407 paid on the same; pastor's salary raised \$200. Grand total \$18,530.

World Service and Conference Claimants paid in full. The Mt. Pisgah Church has been beautifully renovated and almost paid for. Grand total raised \$4,085.

GALENA: This little charge has done surprisingly well under the fine leadership of its pastor, Rev. Mrs. Rachel Brown. Conversion 1. Accession 1. World Service \$68.00.

HARRINGTON: This charge has a small membership, but does well under its faithful pastor, Rev. Thaddeus Hackett. Conversions 4. Accession 1. World Service \$30.00. Conference Claimants \$240. The Reserve Pension Fund paid out. Grand total \$4,444.

LAUREL: This charge makes a good report. Conversions 3. Accessions 12. A fine class of young people was received into church Easter Sunday. World Service and Conference Claimants paid in full, other causes advanced. Pastor's salary raised \$200 for the next year. Grand total \$7,071.00. Rev. C. W. Bagwell is the faithful pastor.

LEWES reports an excellent years work under the leadership of its inspiring, vigorous, young pastor, Rev. Quincy Cooper. Conversions 8. World Service \$200, \$189 for Reserve Pension Fund. All other causes advanced; new sidewalk in front of the St. Paul Church; modern conveniences installed in the parsonage, new pews and new floor installed in Israel Church and paid for. Return of the pastor was requested.

LINCOLN: This is another 100% charge. It gave \$25.00 to another charge

to help it pay out its Reserve Pension Fund. The Church is fully organized and excells in many ways. The attendance at the Sunday Worship Service increases. Peace and harmony prevails. Grand total raised \$8,468, Rev. J. O. Lockman is the beloved pastor.

MARDELA: Under the leadership of its hard working, earnest pastor makes a good report. The pastor received a large class of young people into the church on Easter Sunday. Conversions 22. Accessions 22. World Service \$200, Conference Claimants \$240 in full, other causes advanced. Grand total raised \$5,378. Rev. Lewis Jones, Pastor.

MILFORD: Under the dedicated and dynamic leadership of its pastor has had a good year. There is need, however, for more unity among the people and greater dedication as Christians. The pastor has worked hard. Conversions 3. Accessions 14. World Service paid \$271.00. Conference Claimants \$124.00. Other causes looked after. Grand total for all purposes \$8,364.

MILLINGTON: This charge has failed this year. Pastor has been unable to get very much accomplished. A much better year's work could have been accomplished if the pastor had given better leadership and the people been more loyal. The John Wesley Church has not cooperated or supported the church program. The Asbury Church has done much better. We trust under new leadership, the charge will be blessed with a needed revival. Conversions 2. Accessions 4. Grand total raised for all purposes \$3,617. Rev. J. C. Williams, Pastor.

MILLSBORO has had another good year. Pastor and people work well together. A new Sunday School has been organized at The Friendship Church. The Parish House at the Friendship Church has been renovated. Paid for World Service \$200. Conference Claimants \$192. Grand total \$6,150. Rev. C. W. D. Browne, Pastor.

NASSAU: This charge makes a good report under the leadership of its hard working pastor, Rev. G. B. Wilson. The Mt. Pleasant Church has been renovated at a cost of \$1,200 and paid for. The parsonage is being beautifully renovated. Conversions 4. Accessions 16. World Service \$230.00. Conference Claimants in full. Other causes looked after. Grand total raised \$9,542.

NEWARK makes a good report of its stewardship. A Junior Choir has been organized at Cedar Chapel. The M. Y. F. and Young Adults are working well. The mortgage debt has been reduced. Conversions 4. Accessions 7. Raised for World Service \$180. Conference Claimants \$100. Grand total \$3,537.

NORTH BERLIN has completed another excellent year's work. This is 100% charge. The Causes of Christian Education and Evangelism flourish. The Sunday School is outstanding. Pastor and people are happy. Conversions 39. Accessions 7. Raised for building and improvement \$2,176. Paid off mortgage of \$831.00. Grand total raised for all causes \$10,591. Rev. A. J. Dredden is the successful pastor.

POMONA makes the following report under the leadership of its fine pastor, Rev. C. R. Bryant. Conversions 2. Accessions 2. World Service \$150.00. Conference Claimants \$264.00. Building and improvement \$1,300. Grand total for all causes \$6,349.

PORT DEPOSIT: This charge has a small membership, but does well. World Service \$170. Conference Claimants \$211.00. Raised for building and

improvement \$1,270. Grand total for all causes \$2,467. Rev. Clayton Hammond is the pastor.

ROCK HALL, E. C. Hackshaw, pastor. This charge has done a good years work under the leadership of its new pastor. The pastor shows great promise as a leader. Conversions 3. Accessions 4. Paid on World Service \$225. Conference Claimants \$200 and other causes advanced over last year. The parsonage has been beautifully renovated with new bathroom and other modern conveniences. Grand total raised for all causes \$8,133.

SASSAFRAS, Rev. Mrs. Ophelia James, pastor. Mrs. James sustained a great loss in the death of her husband, but she has led her people in the accomplishment of a good year's work. Conversions 7, Accessions 7. Pension fund paid out, World Service and Conference Claimants paid in full, other causes taken care of. This pastor is beloved by her people. Her salary was increased \$400 for next year. Grand total \$3,350.

SEAFORD, Rev. C. D. Gerald, pastor, makes the following report. Conversions 4. Accessions 4. Paid on World Service \$140. Conference Claimants \$312. Building and improvement \$652.00. Pastor and people are happy. Grand total raised for all causes \$5,189.

SEAFORD CT., Rev. D. S. Quillen, pastor. This is a very small charge, but has done well under the inspiring leadership of the pastor. Conversions 2. Accessions 3. Paid on World Service \$47.00, other causes taken care of. Paid on old debt \$100, grand total \$2,032.

SHARPTOWN, LeRoy L. Hamilton, pastor. Conversion 1. An increase in attendance. The Sunday School continues to improve. World Service and Conference Benevolences raised in full. All salaries paid in full and \$110 on the Reserve Pension Fund. A good year's work has been accomplished under the leadership of this fine pastor and his wife. Grand total raised for all causes \$6,904.

SMYRNA: W. E. Marks, pastor. This charge has done fairly well considering its small membership. Conversions 3. Accessions 3. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$55.00. Other askings about the same as a year ago. Improvements were made on the parsonage including a new bath room. The faithful pastor who is taking retired relations this year has worked hard to make this report possible. We wish for him good health, continued Christian service and happiness.

Conversions 2. Accession 1. Paid on World Service and Conference Benevolence \$75.00, paid on mortgage debt \$400.00 Raised for improvements \$1,700. Grand total raised for all causes \$4,608.

TOWNSEND, Rev. Clifford Laudrum, pastor makes the following report.

Conversion 1. Paid on World Service \$111. Other benevolence looked after. Raised for building and improvement \$1,779, grand total raised for all causes \$7,221. The pastor has done well along some lines.

Summary of Statistics

Conversions 188. Accessions 168. Raised for World Service \$7,269, for Conference Claimants \$6,975, for building and improvement \$32,112 and a

grand total of \$209,141.00.

Translations

September 26, 1959, Rev. William Chandler West, a retired minister at Cambridge, Md., was called from labor to his eternal reward.

December 21, 1959, Mrs. Lillie Blanch Adams Jolley, widow of the late Rev. E. H. Jolley, received her final summons, after a period of illness at her home in Cambridge, Md.

Sickness

Sickness invaded many of the parsonages of the District. Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. A. P. Jenkins, Rev. S. E. Armstrong, Rev. A. H. Slacum, and Rev. C. M. Stafford were hospitalized.

Many other residents of our parsonages experienced illness with less serious results.

Change of Appointment

Rev. Elemit A. Brooks, pastor at Preston, Md., was succeeded by Rev. W. A. Nichols, retired supply pastor, who was appointed to the Preston Charge, November 29, 1959.

District Activities

The District activities include: The District Stewards Meeting at Saint Luke, Cambridge, Md., Methodist Youth Assembly at Denton, Md., Annual Fellowship Meeting and dinner for ministers and wives, at the district parsonage; Workshop for Certified Lay Speakers at Asbury, Easton, Md., Conference on Family Life at Easton; District Conference at Mt. Pleasant Church, Preston, Md.; Christian Worker's Schools at Centreville, Easton, and Cambridge; Youth Missionary Rally, Zion Church, Federalsburg; Christian Higher Education Institute, John Wesley Church, Denton, Md.; Annual Christmas Party for ministers and wives, Replanted Zion, Ridgely, Md., Annual Choir Festival, Asbury, Easton; Annual Round-up of Young Adults, John Wesley Church, Wittman; Missionary Institute, Waugh, Cambridge; Annual Program by Minister's Wives and Roll Call on Conference Appointments, Replanted Zion Church, Ridgely; Pre-Conference Rally, Saint Michaels; and a Vacation Church School Institute, at Easton.

Other activities consisted of Quarterly Meetings of Woman's Society of Christian Service, Board of Lay Activities, District Council, Prayer Retreats, various sub-district meetings, and Monthly Preacher's Meetings where the

Superintendent gave promotional messages.

Town and Country

The Rev. E. A. Hughes was elected to represent the District at the Fourth National Methodist Town and Country Conference, Wichita, Kansas, July 21-24, 1959. The District Superintendent and Mrs. Margaret Trader also attended. The theme was "Emerging Patterns in Town and Country Methodism."

Mr. Dewey Townsend and others represented the District at the Town

and Country Conference at the University of Md., July 6-8.

August 10-21, Rev. Trevor C. Jones, Rev. Harvey Chase and Rev. C. Martin Stafford, accompanied their District Superintendent to Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia, where they attended Summer School for Rural and Urban Pastors.

The results of the above mentioned activities have been gratifying. Seminars, discussions, and study courses have been held on district, subdistrict and local church levels. Rev. E. A. Hughes has been in great demand as a teacher. Positive results have been seen in the local churches served by pastors attending the schools. New insights are being gained by pastors and laymen as they take a closer look at the challenge of our church in town and country.

Survey of Charges

AIREYS: This is a large field with great potentialities. Peace and harmony prevails. The ardent leadership and labors of the pastor have been fruitful. A large membership training class was confirmed around Easter. The charge continues to advance in all areas of concern. Cooperation and understanding prevails. Raised for all causes, \$5,000. Rev. E. P. Cooke, Pastor.

BECKWITH continues to be one of the wonders of the District. The pastor, his wife, and the people of this little circuit think great thoughts and do what would otherwise be impossible. Through the loyalty of the people and the faith and perseverance of their leaders this charge has reported all causes in full. Their theme song seems to be "where He leads me I will follow." Raised for all causes \$4,000. Rev. Frank Farrare, Pastor.

CAMBRIDGE maintains its coveted place of leadership as its unassuming effective, dynamic pastor, seeks to translate his noble ideals into realities. He is a great pastor, a wonderful preacher, and an effective teacher. One of the prominent leaders of Waugh has well said that people from every walk and station of life come Sunday after Sunday and hear him gladly. The total program of The Methodist Church is projected and the loyal and consecrated laymen enthusiastically respond. One financial effort last fall brought in more than \$3,000. A highly successful Every Member Canvass was conducted early in the conference year. The pastor is master of all that he surveys. A most dramatic plea was made for his return at the fourth Quarterly Conference. Raised for all causes \$15,000. Sercy L. Jones, Pastor.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT: For a brief season this charge experienced a slight misunderstanding, but peace and good will were achieved. Pastor and people are happy. The people appreciate the fine leadership of their wide awake pastor. The parsonage has been improved with a new roof, a new gas range and the installation of a modern bath and running water. St. Luke Church has been made beautiful with new windows and mahogany exterior doors. Christ Rock Church has been improved and its foundation enclosed with cinder blocks. Capable leaders are being found among young people and a great job is being done on this charge. Raised for all causes \$6,372. Thesdar M. Murray, Pastor.

CARMICHAELS: This rural charge has achieved another year's work with distinction. The pastor in his quiet, humble and patient manner completes his twelfth year. Untiring and optimistic in his views, he has won victory after victory. The indebtedness on the community hall at John Wesley Church has been liquidated. Bryan's Church School and youth activities rank with the finest on the District. The roof of the parsonage has been painted. Bryan's Church had a deep well dug at a cost of \$455 which was paid in full. Raised for all causes \$5,000. Robert S. Caldwell, Pastor.

CENTREVILLE-GOULDTOWN has experienced a trying year, which has required sacrifice and understanding. The pastor has made great sacrifices and endured privations. He has won the confidence and respect of both races, and sought to lift the high ideals of the Christian Church among his people. Being lonely in the parsonage, he took unto himself a wife a few weeks ago. She instantly won the admiration of many of the members and chances are that she will lend strength and influence to the sincere leadership of this conscientious pastor. We anticipate for this charge a bright new day. Raised for all causes \$5,200. C. Edgar Jordan, Pastor.

CHAPEL has continued to move backward for another year. Lack of sympathetic understanding and cooperation between pastor and people has greatly retarded the work, though the pastor has struggled to see the church move on. The movement has been a retreat. Chapel has not done what it could. The pastor's health has failed. He has been hospitalized three times since Christmas. He is seriously ill. His doctor recommends that he cease all activity. He requests retirement at this session. Raised for all causes \$1,900. Samuel E. Armstrong, Pastor.

CHURCH CREEK has remained handicapped. The pastor has been physically unable to serve for two years; while his dear wife has attempted

to promote the work, nursing her ill husband and a sick brother at a great distance from the charge has been too much strain. The faithful few members of the charge have exhibited unusual concern for their pastor. They have been loyal and willing, but instruction, direction and encouragement is needed. Both John Wesley and St. Paul churches have been painted and new chairs purchased. Raised for all causes \$2,210. Rev. I. B. Bivens, Pastor.

CHURCH HILL still grows in good works. The faithful, consecrated pastor has never lost the habit of smiling even in the face of difficulties. He has smiled and the charge smiles with him. His labors have been fruitful. Though modest in his manner he gets things accomplished. The churches are organized and functioning. An attractive vestibule has been erected at the Mt. Hope Church. Mt. Vernon Church got down to business and raised the amount of money required to meet the Board of Mission's terms for a donation and loan toward building a beautiful church to replace the one lost by fire. Raised for all purposes \$5,000. Edward H. Jackson, Pastor.

CORDOVA-EARLES CHAPEL: Earles Chapel was united with the Cordova Circuit at our last Annual Conference. This enlarged circuit can really be called "a glorified circuit." The merger has been a great success. Everybody is happy. The people have "a mind to work." New hope, new determination and new life is evident throughout the circuit. The thoughtful, energetic pastor works hard, plans wisely, shows concern for the total program of the church, speaks the language of rural people and holds the respect of all from children to those in the mature years. This circuit is our pilot project in our Rural Development Plan for the Easton District. The people cry "let Chase stay and we will show the Conference what the rural church can be." New Zion Church has purchased a public school building to be used as a community center. Earles Chapel put new rugs in the church at a cost of \$500. The parsonage has been improved with new windows, oil heater, and deep freeze unit. Raised for all purposes \$8,663. Harvey Chase, Pastor.

CRAPO-GOLDEN HILL has had a fair year. This charge is now being served by a student pastor who can be with them only on week ends. He is enthusiastic and labors earnestly to promote the program. John Wesley Church has been made beautiful with new shingles covering its exterior, put on by the Methodist Men. Two acres of land have been purchased for a cemetery. Raised for all purposes \$2,500. Eric George, Pastor.

DENTON-WILLISTON continues to make strides towards higher planes of churchmanship. The pastor and his wife are developing into an ideal team, consecrated to the Christian ministry. Where they lead the people follow. Advances in organizational structure, church finance and evangelism are evident. The people take great pride in their pastor's stirring gospel messages, administrative ability, concern, participation in community organizations and his winsome personality. He and his wife attended the conference at Buck Hill Falls in the Spring and have become an inspiration to young adults throughout the District. The interior of the parsonage has been renovated at a cost of \$1,250, done on a pay as you go basis. New oil heaters have been installed and paid for. A new roof was put on Mt. Zion Church. The pastor's return has been eagerly sought. Raised for all purposes \$7,489. Claude Edmonds, Pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET advances beyond last year's mark in several areas, The pastor endeavors to promote the interests of the kingdom and an increasing number of members follow his leadership. Raised for all purposes \$5,567. Nelson C. Stanley, Pastor.

EASTON has done a great work this year. Harmony and understanding prevail. The pastor has put great stress in the areas of Christian education, efficient organization, and human relations. The members have been loyal and responsive, and have gone all out to promote the highest interests of the church and the kingdom. They have manifested joy in doing a good job in cooperation with their fine pastor and his gracious wife. The parsonage which ranks with the finest has been improved with a new bedroom suite, new porch furniture, and a new office chair. The salary has been advanced by \$200 for the coming conference year. With one voice the members have expressed a strong desire for the return of the pastor. Raised for all causes \$9,258. Trevor C. Jones, Pastor.

EASTON CIRCUIT: This charge has some members who have been prejudiced against a woman pastor from the time that I became superintendent of the District. These persons have dedicated themselves to the task of keeping an undercurrent of unrest in ceaseless motion. Their plea which has been quite vocal is "send us a man." In spite of all opposition the energetic pastor has courageously toiled to advance the work of the charge. She has advanced the work beyond last year's attainment and deserves great credit for a job well done. Running water has been installed. The parsonage has been papered, and the community hall renovated. The pastor has won the admiration and respect of many persons beyond her parish, through morning devotions on the radio, her sermons in the county jail and her services to migrants. Raised for all causes \$2,660. Mrs. Hester Opher, Pastor.

FEDERALSBURG has fallen below her record of last year. While the youth and young adults have cooperated with the pastor in a remarkable manner, mounting reaction has been evidenced among the older adults. The spiritual climate is not conducive to the development of an effective church. We believe that this charge is capable of doing a better work. The pastor has not received the wholehearted cooperation of the church. The gulf of misunderstanding existing between pastor and people has not been bridged, therefore the program has suffered. The pastor is requesting to be placed on the retired list at this session of the Annual Conference. Raised for all causes \$4,364. S. G. Dix, Pastor.

GREENSBORO has had a successful year considering the circumstances under which it has worked. The pastor was stricken in the pulpit the first Sunday in the Conference year. He spent several weeks in Philadelphia where he was hospitalized. Though he has been physically unable to assume his pastoral duties for the most of the conference year, the work of the charge has been done by the faithful local preachers and lay leaders under the pastor's direction. Modern rest rooms have been built at Union Church at a cost of over \$2,000. A new cinder block garage has been erected at the parsonage. Raised for all causes \$7,811. Amos P. Jenkins, Pastor.

HURLOCK is a good rural charge consisting of three churches. A spirit of unity exists, the people are happy and pleased with the leadership of their

fine pastor. Interest has been shown in the total program of the church. Success has attended their efforts and all phases of the work have advanced. Nine years of service have not diminished their enthusiasm for their hard working pastor. Washington church has remodeled its Social Hall, built a new kitchen, installed an electric pump and water heater. Union Grove, has built concrete steps. The parsonage has been painted, a new dining room suite and new rug added. The pastor's return is requested. Raised for all causes \$10,993. Walter J. Mills, Pastor.

LINKWOOD has not quite reached last year's record. The Mt. Pleasant congregation is still unable to meet the terms of the Board of National Missions for the donation and loan for a new church building to replace the one lost by fire. The pastor is faithful and does his best, but a lag continues. Raised for all causes \$3,287. Charles H. Cottingham, Pastor.

MARYDEL has experienced one of its most fruitful years. The pastor, a man of vision, faith and undaunted courage, has led his flock to victory. Parker's Church, destroyed by fire two years ago, has been rebuilt. Through the utilization of the perfect foundation of a school building which once stood on their newly acquired site, much volunteer labor and the constant vigilence of the pastor, a new church has been constructed of cinder blocks for just about \$10,000 and is free of debt. All causes have been supported as usual. Due to health conditions the pastor requests that he will be left without appointment this year. Raised for all causes \$9,758. Charles I. Young, Pastor.

McDANIEL has had a fair year. The pastor was hospitalized and suffered some illness this year. He did his best to maintain his previous record, but did not get full response. There is a slight decline in achievements for the year. Raised for all causes \$2.999. Albert H. Slacum, Pastor.

MILES RIVER trails below the standard it set last year. Forces of opposition have put on their strength and set out to rule or ruin. A resident pastor is needed on this charge. The pastor has done well in spite of hinderances. The faithful few in his flock and wealthy white people who have been impressed with his leadership have enabled him to make a fair report. He and his wife became the proud parents of a new born baby girl this year. Raised for all causes \$______ Emmons N. Foster, Pastor.

OXFORD presents an excellent report as usual. In spite of limitations in this charge, due to its peculiar location and the employment situation, the charge gives a good account of its stewardship. The pastor is gifted in many respects and is ever on the alert to see that his church measures up. He is president of the Talbot County Interracial Ministers Association and the Talbot County Branch of the NAACP. He has distinguished himself as a teacher and discussion leader on the subject of the Church in Town and Country. The longer he serves the people at Oxford, the more insistent they are that he shall not be moved. Raised for all purposes \$7,312. Edward A. Hughes, Pastor.

PRESTON is a charge which has great potentialities. Though it has exceeded the work of the previous year in some respects, it missed the golden opportunity of its history. The stage was set for a tremendous thrust forward, but self interest and poor judgment retarded the project. Pastor Elemit A.

Brooks chose to terminate his relationship with the charge, October 22, 1959. The District Superintendent assumed oversight over the charge until after the District Conference was entertained at Mt. Pleasant Church. Rev. W. A. Nichols was called out of retirement to supply the charge until conference and he did a good job. Alterations were made on the community hall. Sanitary rest rooms were built, running water was installed and a Hammond Organ purchased. This represented about three fifths of the approved original project. It has been regrettable to see what are considered intelligent, respectable people dictate themselves to the task of influencing the masses against the highest interests of the church and God's kingdom. Raised for all caused \$9,836. W. A. Nichols, Pastor.

RIDGELY: Though the shepherd of this charge continues to experience poor health, his loyal laymen have made every effort to keep the good work in progress. Sanitary rest rooms have been erected, running water installed and a concrete walk has been made from the front steps out to the parking area. A credible year's work has been done. The people feel that they have the right man. Raised for all causes \$5,163. Van B. Wright, Pastor.

ROYAL OAK and BELLEVUE have marched on to success. Peace, harmony and goodwill abound. The pastor, a diligent workman for the Lord, gets things done. The pastor had to be rushed to the hospital for surgery, but the laymen stepped in and the work proceeded courageously. Bellevue has almost completed its new parish hall, modern rest rooms are in, the new heating plant is in operation, their apportionments are paid in full. Royal Oak has liquidated the debt on the new heating plant installed last year. The pastor's return is requested. Raised for all causes \$9,105. J. I. Williams, Pastor.

ST. MICHAELS has beat its fine record of last year. The pastor has graciously led his people from victory to victory. This church was host to the Pre-Conference Rally and entertained it in its characteristic way. His leadership is consistently effective. Raised for all causes \$8,269. H. R. Snead, Pastor.

STEVENSVILLE: Marvelous things continue to happen in this charge. The flame of enthusiasm is not diminished with the passing of time. The pastor attended the School on Rural Church Work at Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia, last summer. His sights were lifted. He returned and told his people the vision he had seen of the rural church. Many of them caught the vision. The charge is being revolutionized. A new carpet has been purchased at a cost of \$502 at Ezion. A new heating unit has been installed at Union at the cost of \$556 and a \$500 roofing job has been done on the parsonage. Raised for all causes \$7,984. C. Martin Stafford, Pastor.

TAYLOR'S ISLAND has not quite maintained her previous year's record. The charge has done fair under the circumstances. This stalwart pastor and wife have toiled long and hard and have made great sacrifices to enhance the work of this large circuit. Too many of the members are perfectly satisfied. This leaves too great a burden on those who desire progress. A deep well has been drilled at the Madison Church supplying water for the whole community. Raised for all causes \$5,829. George L. Stanley, Pastor.

TRAPPE is one of the most active churches on the District. Its doors are almost always open. Here we have a smiling pastor and a happy people. His winsome ways and pleasing manner are rewarded with the high esteem of

his congregation and community. More than \$1,299 has been spent on renovation of the parsonage. A grand reception was given the pastor and his wife just a few days ago. The members are requesting the pastor's return. Raised for all causes \$6,585. Harvey T. Hall, Pastor.

VIENNA and REID'S GROVE have completed a fair year's work. There are unexplored resources in this field. This charge has the potentials to become one of our leading circuits. The pastor and wife are loyal to the District and work hard to achieve success. The work has made a slight advance over last year. Raised for all causes \$5,904. A. A. McDowell, Pastor.

WITTMAN and SHERWOOD have experienced a slight set back this year, partly because of an absentee pastor who does not have time to give the leadership that this charge needs. He has been too busy to attend preacher's meetings and other district and sub-district activities, therefore the charge has not kept pace with what is going on. This charge is blessed to have several intelligent and dedicated young adults, but they need the direction and guidance of a resident pastor. Raised for all causes \$4,715. C. C. Thomas, Pastor.

Conclusion

Our report now comes to an end, but the whole story of the wonderful things which have happened on the Easton District cannot be expressed in words printed on paper. If one would learn the full story it would require firsthand experience gained in local churches, parsonages, homes, fields, factories, and places where our people live, labor and worship. One would have to behold the sacrificial services, unselfish devotion, dauntless courage, boundless generosity, and the undying love exhibited by pastors, their wives and the many good lay people whose very life blood have made this report possible.

Nowhere in the bounds of the Delaware Conference can be found pastors and laymen more loyal and faithful than those of the Easton District. It has been a delightful privilege to labor with them. I am grateful to you, Bishop Love, for granting me the opportunity of serving them. God bless you; God bless them; May Good bless and sustain us all.

Bishop Love, Ministers, and Laymen:

The quintessence of human diction is inadequate to express our profound gratitude to God, our Merciful Father, for his providential guidance and care. We are grateful to Bishop Love, the pastors, and laymen who helped the thirty-four pastoral charges of the Philadelphia District to achieve success.

This has been a difficult year for some churches because of rising cost of living, labor strikes, unemployment, sickness, death, vacant pulpits, and other conditions. On a few occasions this Pauline dictum might have been apropos: "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, to show that the transcendent power belongs to God and not to us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed." II Cor. 4:7-9.

We have worked more prodigiously than ever across the district to

strengthen the churches, to fill vacant pulpits, to start new missions, and "to follow Christ in bringing the whole of life with its activities, possessions, and relationships, into conformity with the will of God." These have been days of rewarding experiences and spiritual growth. The ministers and laymen in every parish have been most hospitable and cooperative.

Sickness and Death

Although we do not have a complete list of lay persons whose activities were reduced by sickness, we have remembered them in our prayers. The following ministers and ministers' wives were hospitalized during the year: Rev. F. D. Arnold, Rev. and Mrs. T. M. Booth, Mrs. Charles Golden, Rev. W. A. Harewood, Mrs. Henry H. Nichols, and Rev. Martin Riley. The Rev. Archie L. Scriber has not fully recovered from his serious illness.

Since the last session of our Conference, two ministers and a minister's widow have departed this life: Rev. A. E. Martin, Rev. Irving R. Elzey, and Mrs. Sallie G. Perry. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord henceforth."

Survey of Charges

BETHEL (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has not only advanced unvacillatingly with singleness of purpose to maintain her 100% financial record, but she has also excelled in evangelism and Christian education. The number of conversions equals 33% of the present membership and the accessions exceed 19%. The average church school attendance is better than 80% of the total enrollment. The church reports 22 conversions, 12 accessions, 66 full members, 25 church school scholars, \$144 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$2,892 raised for all purposes. Under the excellent pastoral leadership of the Rev. Mrs. Amy Redfield, Bethel will continue to grow in size, strength, and influence.

GRACE MISSION (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has made but little progress because of insufficient funds, inadequate facilities, and ineffective leadership. The friendly and faithful minister who leads worship services in a rented store-front building receives no salary or remuneration. Soon or later the Conference must decide either to give ample support to provide more effective leadership and better facilities or discontinue this mission. The church reports 10 conversions, 15 accessions, 60 full members, 53 church school scholars, \$35 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$906 raised for all causes. Rev. Mrs. Mary R. Slade is the pastor.

JOHN WESLEY (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has not only been revitalized, endowed with fresh life and power, but it has also forged ahead in stewardship. Some members have increased their offerings, others have become more regular in their financial support. The church kitchen was renovated and furnished with modern equipment. The report includes 50 conversions, 25 accessions, 595 full members, 474 church school scholars, \$900 paid in full for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$25,158 raised for all purposes. The successful pastor is the Rev. O'Connell Milbourne.

NEWMAN MEMORIAL (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has completed one of its most glorious years with an expanding horizon and a growing community interest. The church reports 14 conversions, 31 accessions, 1,042 full members, \$1,074

paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$39,143 raised for all purposes. The charge contributed \$500 to the N.A.A.C.P. for Life Membership, vigorously promoted evangelism to increase attendance and participation in the regular services of the church, stimulated a growing interest in religious education and Christian social concerns, and excelled its previous record in stewardship. The erudite, dynamic, effective pastor is the Rev. Henri M. Deas.

REDEEMER (Brooklyn, N. Y.) was shocked by the sudden death of the pastor, Rev. A. E. Martin, on January 6, 1960. In spite of this untimely incident, the church reports 22 conversions, 1 accession, 257 full members, 164 church school scholars, \$200 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$8,120 raised for all purposes. The members, local ministers, visiting pastors, and the district superintendent gave excellent cooperation and unprecedented support. Redeemer needs not only a good preacher of the gospel, but also a good pastor who will "visit from house to house" and do the work of an evangelist, a good administrator, and a good public relations man.

BROOKS MEMORIAL (Jamaica, N. Y.) is completing and furnishing its new parsonage at an estimated cost of \$40,000. The housewarming is scheduled for June 5, 1960. Although 49 members were removed by necessity from the roll, the membership now stands at an all-time high of 1,114. The church reports 42 conversions, 102 preparatory members, 42 accessions, 1,340 church school scholars, \$700 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$58,882 raised for all purposes. The proficient minister who leads his people ardently with great acuity and fecundity of thought is the Rev. Charles L. Carrington. Revs. McQuay Kiah and Edward Washington are the able associate pastors.

CLAIR MEMORIAL (Jersey City, N. J.) has made strides of progress in evangelism, Christian education, missions, stewardship, social concerns, and worship. The church has progressed with rejuvenescent power and spiritual vigor. The report includes 3 conversions, 6 accessions, 346 full members, 213 church school scholars, \$400 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$14,006 raised for all causes. The competent, dynamic pastor is the Rev. W. G. Brown.

ST. MARK'S CHURCH (Montclair, N. J.) is a beautiful church that is well pointed for service in an established community. In spite of its progress, this church has hardly begun to develop its tremendous potential strength. Because of a prolonged illness the pastor, Rev. W. A. Harewood, was granted a three month's leave of absence (December 6 to March 14) to visit his home in Barbados. He returned with improved health and determination to lead his people to triumphant success. The church reports 1 conversion, 25 accessions, 853 full members, 365 church school scholars, \$900 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$31,492 raised for all purposes.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH (Newark, N. J.) has many committed and consecrated members who are determined to do their best to keep the church united, strong, and progressive. This year's achievements include the liquidation of the mortgage, completion of new floors in the assembly room of the basement and three other rooms, 21 conversions, 27 accessions, 914 full members, 304 church school scholars, \$1,400 paid for World Service and

Conference Benevolences, and \$22,954 raised for all causes. The well trained, experienced, qualified pastor is the Rev. C. B. Miles.

ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH (Newark, N. J.) has ended another banner year with a very high esprit de corps. The common devotion of the members and unmatchable leadership of the Rev. Wm. R. Mayberry enabled the church to quadruple a payment on its mortgage, repaint the church inside, increase ministerial support, and strengthen every area of the church. The church reports 3 conversions, 20 accessions, 236 full members, 131 church school scholars, \$225 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$9,380 raised for all purposes.

ST. LUKE'S CHURCH (New Rochelle, N. Y.) reports 1 conversion, 5 accessions, 174 full members, 37 church school scholars, \$190 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$6,371 raised for all purposes. The church moved forward with a resurgence of enthusiasm; however, there is still need for more adequate ministerial support, a parsonage, a full-time resident pastor, and an invigorated laity whose witness and work will converge in every area of Christian concern. The Rev. Lester V. Baker is the astute pastor; and the Rev. John W. Handy, Jr., is the able Associate.

BUTLER MEMORIAL (New York, N. Y.) has seen marvelous results from its greater prayerful and productive efforts. The membership and attendance have increased in the church and church school. The income has exceeded that of last year; and the plans have been set for the construction of a new church at an estimated cost of \$165,000. The report includes 24 conversions, 32 accessions, 212 full members, 227 church school scholars, \$450 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$16,022 raised for all purposes. The affable, efficient pastor is the Rev. Wm. P. Johnson.

SHAW CHAPEL (New York, N. Y.) has a faithful few who work vigorously with Christian integrity to strengthen the church. There is need for a larger church school, more active members, a continuous program of visitation evangelism, and a more extensive community outreach. The church reports 1 conversion, 1 accession, 18 full members, 18 church school scholars, \$60 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$1,250 raised for all purposes. The loyal, conscientious pastor is Rev. S. A. Bellamy.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH (Orange, N. J.) has ended another banner year because the pastor and people had a mind to work prayerfully together to achieve certain goals. The youth choir was organized and twenty-five robes were purchased. The floors of the church were refinished and the interior was painted at a cost of \$1,400.00 cash. A new bulletin board was secured; an oil burner was installed in the parsonage; new living room suite, 50 chairs, 3 dining-room tables for the church, and other equipment should be added to the list of achievements. The church reports 2 conversions, 3 accessions, 227 full members, 108 church school scholars, \$650 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$11,940 raised for all purposes. The Rev. C. A. Elder is the wise and capable pastor.

ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH (Ossining, N. Y.) welcomed their new pastor, Rev. Randolph Fisher, and his wife. The outstanding achievements include the liquidation of the mortgage, promotion of a very successful every member canvass, increased church attendance, installation of new bulletin board and a new Garland Range in the church, and the purchase of an A. B. Dick duplicator. The church reports 5 conversions, 6 accessions, 252 full members, 135 church school scholars, \$470 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$11,846 raised for all purposes.

BETHSAIDA (Phila., Pa.) is faced with the challenge of a changing community. Old houses have been razed, and a new housing project has been established in proximity to this parish. Bethsaida needs a full-time resident pastor who knows the art of counseling, visitation evangelism and "door-bell-ringing." It also needs more versatile, vigorous, loyal laymen to witness and work with Christian audacity to meet the ever present challenge. The church reports 1 conversion, 2 accessions, 119 full members, 65 church school scholars, \$30 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$8,159 raised for all purposes. Bethsaida had a set-back because of the prolonged illness and inactivity of the pastor, Rev. Archie L. Scriber.

CAMPHOR MEMORIAL (Phila., Pa.) completed the payment of the \$6,000 debt on the organ, advanced the pastor's salary from \$4,300 to \$5,000, and made considerable improvements in the parsonage. The church reports 10 conversions, 58 accessions, 934 full members, 714 church school scholars, \$925 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$28,637 raised for all purposes. Camphor not only welcomed the new pastor, Rev. M. O. Ballard, and his wife, but they have also requested their return.

CHRIST MISSION (Phila., Pa.) has struggled throughout this year to maintain a rented building at 1621 Bainbridge Street for worship. The church reports 4 conversions, 8 accessions, 54 full members, 45 church school scholars, \$5 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$3,740 raised for all causes. The Rev. E. T. Randolph is the pastor.

COMMUNITY CHURCH (Phila., Pa.) had its embryonic beginning in the district parsonage until it emerged as an organized church on Sunday, September 27th, and consecrated the building at 5861 Cedar Avenue for worship. The new church reports 5 conversions, 50 accessions, 50 full members, 45 church school scholars, \$25 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$1,583 raised for all purposes. The conference apportionments were over-paid by 12%. The new pastor, Rev. DePriest Whye, and his family have established their residence within the parish.

TRINITY (E. Germantown) has an amazing concentration of leadership ability which needs to be galvanized into a united, prodigious effort to expand or relocate the church, to strengthen the organic structure for service, and to meet the emerging challenge of a growing residential community. The church reports 2 conversions, 3 accessions, 108 full members, 178 church school scholars, \$180 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$4,853 raised for all purposes. The Rev. J. E. Dunn is the wise, friendly pastor.

EMMANUEL (Phila., Pa.) has ended its finest year of outstanding achievements with administrative concinnity and unusual facility. Loyal members gave 230 hours of labor to renovate the basement and restore the sidewalk. The mortgage was refinanced and the principal was decreased from \$26,901 to \$16,600; the budget was increased by more than \$2,500 cash this year; and the life of faith and stewardship is becoming more and more evident in the fellowship of the church. The church also reports the inauguration of a Sunday

nursery, week-day classes for children, a \$680 increase in ministerial support, 17 conversions, 42 accessions, 263 full members, 209 church school scholars, \$225 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$15,012 raised for all purposes. The Rev. David W. Briddell is the proficient, effective, community-minded pastor. Emmanuel was a most gracious host to the last regular session of the Philadelphia District Conference.

ST. THOMAS (Frankford) purchased new chairs for the church school and choir at a cost of \$198, erected a modern bulletin board with automatic timing device at a cost of \$355, installed a new worship center in the sanctuary at a cost of \$200, and put new plumbing in the men's room at a cost of \$155. The church is not only coming alive in every respect, but it also reports 3 conversions, 2 accessions, 61 full members, 99 church school scholars, \$100 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$5,862 raised for all causes. This banner year was ended under the effective pastoral leadership of the Rev. Robert L. Harris.

JANES (Germantown) continues to grow as a missionary-minded church. A total of \$1,340 has been given as Advance Specials this year: \$690 to Africa, and \$650 to Japan. The church reports the liquidation of the mortgage and payment of all indebtedness, \$1,375 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$39,261 raised for all purposes; 20 conversions, 34 accessions, 912 full members, and 559 church school scholars. Somebody said, "All is well at Janes. The gospel is preached and souls are being saved." The astute, dynamic pastor and world-traveler is the Rev. Henry H. Nichols.

HAVEN (Phila., Pa.) has high aims, but she will not achieve her goals without the strength that comes from unity of purpose and Christian propinquity. The church reports \$6,000 in bank for expansion work, a \$500 increase in the pastor's salary, an average attendance of 500 on Sunday mornings, 10 conversions, 42 accessions, 1,253 full members, 750 church school scholars, \$1,750 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$35,051 raised for all purposes. The Rev. Earl H. Crampton is the dignified, efficient pastor.

JOHN WESLEY (Phila., Pa.) was so thoroughly organized and motivated that it continued to advance with astonishing celerity after the sudden death of the beloved pastor, Rev. Irving R. Elzey, whose affable spirit and herculean ability were always evident in the Lord's work. The church reports 11 conversions, 27 accessions, 1,041 full members, 430 church school scholars, \$1,275 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$35,400 raised for all purposes.

MT. ZION (Phila., Pa.) has been open seven days per week with the regular services and an intensive educational program conducted in the community center under the supervision of the Methodist Deaconesses of the Philadelphia Conference. After June of 1960, Mt. Zion must face the challenges of the changing community without the aid of the Deaconesses. With expected alacrity the church should accept this responsibility. Mt. Zion reports 31 conversions, 26 accessions, 911 full members, 275 church school scholars, \$800 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$18,087 raised for all causes. The Rev. Ralph B. Thompson is the versatile and effective pastor.

PENIEL (Phila., Pa.) reports an increase of \$500 in the pastor's salary,

\$100 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$10,222 raised for all purposes, 12 conversions, 12 accessions, 281 full members and 128 church school scholars. The beloved pastor who leads his people perspicaciously with acuteness of wisdom and understanding is the Rev. J. W. Elbert.

ST. BARNABAS (Phila., Pa.) reports 20% increase in church school enrollment, 14 conversions, 14 accessions, 373 full members, 120 church school scholars, \$420 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$13,777 raised for all purposes. The trustees raised \$2,800 for improvements. The good-natured pastor who leads with amity and goodwill is the Rev. J. O. Stanley.

TINDLEY TEMPLE (Phila., Pa.) is big both in size and in purpose. The church reports the resettlement of a family from the Dutch Indies, the purchase of a large parking lot for a cash price of \$56,500 as a part of the expansion program, 40 conversions, 58 accessions, 5,640 full members, 1,202 church school scholars, \$2,990 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$115,375 raised for all purposes. The efficient, strong, dynamic pastor is the Rev. Noah W. Moore, Jr. The able associate is the Rev. G. H. Outen.

ZOAR (Phila., Pa.) gives a good account of herself as the mother church. The church was renovated at a cost of \$18,000. New hymnals were purchased and a church library was dedicated in memory of Levi T. Carroll. The church reports an Advance Special of \$1,600 to missions in Japan and Liberia, \$1,500 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$41,162 raised for all purposes; 15 conversions, 12 accessions, 965 full members, and 698 church school scholars. There are evidences of vivaciousness and strength in every department of the church. The Rev. J. E. Licorish is the capable, influential pastor who returned from his mission to Japan with new information, inspiration, and power.

ST. JOHN'S, the Friendly Church in Spring Lake, made progress last summer under the effective pastoral leadership of the Rev. Martin U. Riley. The church reports 73 constituent members, \$5 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$500 for ministerial support, and \$857 raised for all causes.

ASBURY (Trenton, N. J.) has made remarkable progress this year because Christian teaching undergirds the total program of the church and the people have a mind to work. The church has activated the intermediate fellowship, established a library, installed a loud-speaking system and a water cooler in the church, replaced the parsonage roof, employed a part-time secretary, and increased the pastor's salary \$900. The report includes 6 conversions, 12 accessions, 402 full members, 241 church school scholars, \$650 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences and \$20,566 raised for all purposes. The Rev. F. D. Arnold is the sagacious pastor who leads his congregation pertinaciously with tenacity of purpose and spiritual profundity.

ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH (Trevose, Pa.) is strategically located to serve the whole community. The outstanding achievements include the completion of the new beautiful brick church structure, which is equipped for various church activities. The church reports 17 conversions, 28 accessions, 53 full members, 79 church school scholars, \$30 paid for World Service and Conference

Benevolences, and \$4,394 raised for all purposes. This new edifice which cost approximately \$45,000 was made possible by the donation of \$8,000 from the Delaware Conference, a donation of \$10,000 and a loan of \$25,000 from the National Board of Missions, and the contributions of members and friends. The church was consecrated for service on Sunday, February 14, 1960. The Rev. James L. McClendon has ended his second successful year of potent pastoral leadership in this parish.

TRINITY (White Plains, N. Y.) is an interracial church which makes a tremendous impact upon the community. It voted unanimously in the church conference, official board, and quarterly conference to transfer to the New York Annual Conference. The church reports 14 conversions, 22 accessions, 339 full members, 121 church school scholars, \$600 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$13,585 raised for all purposes. The Rev. T. M. Booth is the efficient pastor.

Plans for a New Church in North Philadelphia

Formulated plans for establishing a new Methodist congregation in the Tioga-Nicetown area have been approved by the District Board on Church Location and Building, the Conference Board of Missions, and the Cabinet because the densely populated community is a real challenge to the Methodist Christians of Philadelphia. In our endeavor to establish a congregation, which we hope will be an inclusive redemptive fellowship, arrangements have been made to purchase the real estate of the Tioga Methodist Church of the Philadelphia Conference, located at 18th and Tioga Streets, for a price of \$50,000.

We are requesting the Delaware Conference to authorize its trustees to take title to this property immediately in order that the large potential membership may congregate in the church for their initial worship service on Sunday, June 5, 1960.

The Philadelphia District has pledged a total of \$3,000 to support the three new projects: St. Matthew's Church in Trevose, Pa., Community Church in West Philadelphia, and Tioga Church in North Philadelphia.

Summary of Statistics

Because of the blessings of our Heavenly Father and the unprecedented prodigious efforts of our faithful ministers and loyal laymen, the Philadelphia district gives the following account of her stewardship:

Although the number of conversions dropped 7% below last year's record, the reports show a net gain of 287 full members and 599 church school scholars—with a slight increase in average attendance. It is evident that churches are assimilating more newcomers.

Pastors' salaries have been increased \$14,748, and a total of \$1,560 has been added to the pastors' expense fund. Twelve of our churches will pay \$5,000 or more for ministerial support during the ensuing year. The grand total raised for all purposes represents an increase of \$49,364 more than the

amount reported last year.

The following churches paid the full apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences: Bethel, Grace, John Wesley (Brooklyn), Newman, Newark: St. John's and St. Matthew's, Butler, St. John's in Orange, Camphor, Community, Emmanuel, James, Haven, John Wesley (Phila.), St. Barnabas, Tindley Temple, Zoar, St. John's in Spring Lake, Asbury, and Trinity in White Plains. We are pleased with these 100% reports. It is to be regretted that some of our strongest churches, lead by some of the best and most influential pastors in Christendom, did less than their best to support the World Service and Benevolent Program of The Methodist Church. At a time when the missionary needs of the church are greatest, our district gave \$193 less than the total reported for this cause last year.

Conclusion

This has been a most joyous year for the superintendent, not because the burdens have been lighter, but because ministers and lay persons in local churches, in subdistrict and district groups, and on a conference level have willingly shared the responsibility of planning and promoting the work.

Although our progress is outstanding, we must continue advancing to meet pressing human needs. Some churches are pleased to know that their membership is growing, their church attendance has increased, the church school is more effective, and the stewardship life of the church has been improved. Some members have doubled their financial support to the current and benevolent budgets of the church.

Money is necessary to meet certain obligations; however, if the church should become an inclusive Christian community, a universal redemptive fellowship, members must go deeper and deeper in faith and Christian stewardship. We are confident that the good members of the Philadelphia district will continue to follow Christ in bringing the whole of life, with its activities, possessions, and relationships, into conformity with the will of God.

unexpected adverse circumstances that occurred.

The ministers and laymen alike were cooperative in the work of the district, and some tangible achievements are evident because of their continued support and interest. Some of the ministers and laymen had sickness and death in their families. The following ministers lost their mothers, Rev. H. J. Lambert, Rev. L. H. Purnell, and Rev. S. P. Sanders. Rev. E. J. Johnson and Rev. H. E. Anderson were in the hospital and had to have surgery. Mrs. Sarah Jolly lost her father. Rev. C. B. White, pastor at Wattsville, Virginia died January 2, 1960.

District Activities

The activities of the district began with the Stewards Meeting, held at John Wesley Church, Salisbury. At this meeting the program of the year was introduced. Laymen and ministers approved and adopted the program and began to execute the same.

Thirty-six Vacation Church Schools were held on the district. Observation Schools were held in strategic areas. District activities included, The Missionary Rally, Missionary Institute, Leadership Schools, and the Annual Youth Assembly. These were well attended by youth and adults.

The Pre-Conference Rally was the final district meeting. It was said both by laymen and ministers that this meeting was among the best they

had ever witnessed.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to grow under the leadership of its President, Mrs. G. T. Jackson. The District Lay Leader, T. Waldo Kiah, has rendered untiring service in promoting the lay activities. Mrs. Carolyn Dorman, General Church School Superintendent of the district continues to give effective leadership to the church schools.

The Ministers' Wives continue to give effective leadership in their local churches and also on the district. They count it a privilege and joy to work for Conference Claimants, and for six consecutive years have sent their Presi-

dent, Mrs. Nancy B. Derrickson, to Conference with the full report.

Report of Charges

COTTAGE GROVE (I. H. White, pastor). This charge under the leadership of its pastor has worked against odds in order to make this report. There are some loyal people who want to do great things for the kingdom of God. Conversions 10, Accessions 10, Raised for all causes \$3,267.00.

CRISFIELD: SHILOH (S. P. Sanders, pastor). This is a well-organized church with great possibilities. The working conditions have prevented this charge from keeping up its past good record. The pastor and people have en-

deavored to carry their full share of the district program. They have fallen short of last year. Conversions 2, Accessions 2. Raised for all purposes \$5,592.00.

CRISFIELD: UNION ASBURY-LIBERIA (Absentee pastor). This charge has done well under the circumstances. The people had to be relieved of the pastor in July because it was impossible for him to pastor in Crisfield and live in Wilmington, Delaware. They wanted a pastor who would live on the charge. The District Superintendent gave guidance to this charge from August until the close of the conference year. Conversions 2, Accession 1. Raised for all purposes \$2,249.00.

DAMES QUARTER (Kenneth Jackson, pastor). This is one charge that has great possibilities and could do splendid work for kingdom building if there were vision and Godly concern on the part of the pastor and the people. The pastor began the year well, but soon lost his effectiveness, thus, the work has suffered. Conversions 11, accessions 11. Raised for all causes \$3,029.00.

DEAL ISLAND (Grover N. Jones, pastor). Pastor Jones, one of our aggressive veterans, brings to this conference a good report. This pastor does not take "no" for an answer. He gives good leadership. Conversions 6, accessions 6. Raised for all causes \$3,737.00. They request his return.

FRUITLAND (J. E. McBride, pastor). True to her former record, Fruitland reports another good year's work. Pastor McBride can get things done. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for all purposes \$5,862.00.

GIRDLETREE (L. H. Purnell, pastor). After twelve years the pastor continues to be sought after by his people. They are saying "don't take him away from us." Only a few pastors are able to produce as L. H. Purnell. The charge reports the best year's work in its history. Central heat has been installed in two churches, class room and choir gallery in Mt. Wesley Church, and choir gallery in Coolspring Church. Storm windows and doors have been put on the parsonage. This work is paid in full. The charge is debt free. Conversions 3, accessions 3. Raised for all causes \$13,734.00.

GREENWOOD (E. J. Johnson, pastor). This has been an unusually hard year on this rural charge. The pastor was hospitalized for some time, thus made it impossible for him to direct the work. This year's work is to be commended. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Raised for all causes \$3,344.00.

HOPEWELL (Jeremiah Lee, pastor). This charge is capable of doing better than this report reflects. The pastor has striven to give good leadership and in a measure he has been successful. The charge makes a better report this year than last. Conversions 3, accessions 3. Raised for all causes \$4,900.00.

HORNTOWN (H. J. Lambert, pastor). A new pastor in a new place. This charge makes some gains over last year's work. More could have been done if there had been a better understanding between the pastor and the people. The charge is capable of producing. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$5,214.00.

KELLER-EXMORE (Jessica Hickman, pastor). The Keller-Exmore charge has had rough sailing for several years. This roughness is beginning to wear off and under the leadership of Pastor Hickman some good work is being done. The report is, conversions 12, accessions 12. Raised for all purposes \$3,033.

LEMONT (W. H. Greene, pastor). This charge has a good team in its leadership, the pastor and his wife. They lead, the people follow. Great possibilities are in this charge. It advances over last year. Conversions 23, accessions 23. Raised for all causes \$11,245.

MANOKIN (Howard F. Barkley, pastor). Pastor Barkley continues to keep his record, "A new broom sweeps clean." This charge has advanced two-thirds beyond its record of last year. The pastor has given good leadership. Conversions 18, accessions 18. Raised for all causes \$2,905.00.

MARION STATION (J. W. Mickle, pastor). This pastor and these people believe in the saying, "where there is a will, there is a way." They had the will to try to liquidate a long standing mortgage. To this end, they laid plans. In seven months they raised sufficient funds to pay off their mortgage and keep up their conference askings in a very creditable way. In face of the most difficult year, the charge advances over last year. Conversions 8, accessions 8. Raised for all purposes \$6,212.77.

MARUMSCO-KINGSTON (Omar C. Jones, pastor). The people and pastor are happy for another good year's work. New flooring has been put in the churches and other improvements have been made on each church. The two churches are well organized and they have large attendance each Sunday. The pastor works well. Conversions 12, accessions 12. Raised for all purposes \$6,185.50.

MOUNT VERNON (Edward L. Lee, Pastor). Mount Vernon charge is a two-point charge with possibilities for doing good work. The pastor and some of the leaders have worked hard to make a full report, but did not quite reach their goal. Accession 1. Raised for all purposes \$4,815.00.

OAKVILLE (Clarence E. Handy, pastor). Pastor Handy has brought the charge from the side line of inactivity to a growing active church. A marvelous transformation has taken place under Handy's leadership. Membership has increased each year and the members take pride in giving to the Conference askings. Conversions 18, accesssions 18. Raised for all purposes \$5,178.

ORIOLE-VENTON (David T. Lewis, pastor). The pastor is one who believes in doing his full share of the conference work. Some "who would be leaders" refuse to follow his leadership. The conference askings are not where they should be, not that they did not have the money, but refused to let him send it to the Conference Treasurer. Conversions 7, accessions 7. Raised for all causes \$4,861.00.

POCOMOKE (S. C. Parker, pastor). This charge continues to grow under the wise leadership of Pastor Parker. All causes of the church have been faithfully looked after with good results. There has been some advancement this year over last year. Conversions 10, accessions 10. Raised for all causes \$8,068.00.

PRINCESS ANNE (Edwin L. Ellis, pastor). Pastor Ellis is one of our more aggressive young ministers who can get things done. The mortgage that once stood in the way of a progressive program has now been liquidated. Thanks to the wise guidance of Pastor Ellis, the educational, evangelistic, and missionary emphases have been energetically promoted. Conversions 27, accessions 27. Raised for all causes \$10,168. The college and church cooperate fully.

QUANTICO (H. W. Spencer, pastor). There are great possibilities, but for some reason there are those leaders who are not willing to face up to the opportunities that are before them. If only they could become spiritually awake, Quantico would be among the leading charges of the district. This report does not truly represent the strength of these people. Pastor Spencer has worked hard and deserves better cooperation from the home church. Conversion 1, accession 1. Raised for all causes \$5,967.

NANTICOKE (G. O. Commodore, pastor). This is one of our fine charges and the pastor has striven hard to help keep it that way. He has given good leadership and another good year's work has been done. Physical improvements have been made both in the church and the parsonage. A new living room suit has been purchased for the parsonage, and a new piano for the church. Also, the pastor has taken unto himself a wife. The church is well-organized. Conversions 6, accessions 6. The total raised for all purposes \$5,031.00.

SALISBURY-JOHN WESLEY (H. E. Anderson, pastor). Pastor Anderson is a hard worker and usually accomplishes whatever he attempts to do. He comes to the end of the year with another good report. Conversions 0, accessions 4. Raised for all purposes \$7,751.00.

SALISBURY-WHITE TEMPLE (S. Winston C. Crosse, pastor). White Temple under the leadership of Pastor Crosse is reporting another good year's work. This charge has the potential of a great charge, but misunderstanding has prevented them from doing their best. Pastor Crosse is a hard worker and deserves full cooperation. Conversions 18, accessions 18. Raised for all causes \$9,242.00.

SHILOH-HUTTS MEMORIAL (Emerson Jolly, pastor). This is a small three-point charge with people who have a mind to work. Pastor Jolly and his wife are giving fine leadership. The pastor reports another good year's work. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Raised for all purposes \$2,883.00.

SNOW HILL (G. T. Jackson, pastor). Pastor Jackson has the know-how when it comes to getting things done. He plans his work, sets goals, and gets things done. This is one of the charges where the public school teachers delight in teaching in the church school. The church is well-organized. If you want to hear good singing, Jackson says, "Come to Ebenezer Church, Snow Hill." Conversions 3, accessions 3. Raised for all causes \$8,632.50.

UNIONVILLE (C. W. Cannon, pastor). Pastor Cannon has given a good account of himself each year. He has broken all former records this year. The church continues to grow in all areas. Evangelism is his specialty and he keeps the altar fires burning. He never misses having a mass revival during the year. When the battle is hard, he uses his "cannons." Conversions 20, accessions 20. Raised for all purposes \$6,593.00.

UPPER HILL-FAIRMOUNT (Alexander Reid, pastor). Pastor Reid is one of the veterans who has given leadership to the armies of the Lord for a long time, and is still just as eager to give leadership as ever. He is respected for his ability to get things done. This charge has had one of its best years. All debts of the charge are paid off, and money is in the bank for repairs. Pastor Reid gives good leadership. Conversions 10, accessions 10. Raised for all purposes \$4.771.00.

WACHAPREAGUE (Frank Robinson, pastor). On the twenty-third of December, very early in the morning, this pastor had the experience of having his parsonage and all its contents to go up in smoke. Only by God's mercy did he and his wife escape with their lives. The good people have rebuilt the parsonage and furnished it. This charge has done well with their local work, but failed in their benevolent work. They report no World Service funds raised this year, and the other benevolent causes are very meager. The pastor could not get them to see the needs for the larger concerns of the church. This young man graduates from Maryland State College in May of this year. When we consider the facts, he has done well. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$7,840.00.

WATTSVILLE. The Rev. C. B. White was assigned to this charge at the beginning of the year. He planned his work well, and up to January 2, 1960, he worked his plans. He was leading up to one of the best year's work of his ministry. But on the above date, he laid down the leadership of Wattsville Charge, to be forever with the Lord. The people requested that his widow be given the opportunity of completing the work that he had begun. This request was granted. Without any break, she carried the work on to completion. She gives the best report that has been given by this charge for several years. I have not had better response given to any leader than has been given to Mrs. C. B. White. Conversions 9, accessions 9. Raised for all causes \$7,971.75.

WITHAMS (R. T. Croswell, pastor). After eleven years, the people of Withams are still willing to accept the leadership of Pastor Croswell. This leader knows how to get things done. The churches are well-organized and the work is going well. His choirs are up on the church music, and graciously use the Hymnal of The Methodist Church. Pastor Croswell believes in cooperating with the leaders of the district. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$8,263.00.

WETIPQUIN (Carol Scott, pastor). Wetipquin took on new life under the leadership of Pastor Scott. Knowing how to do things, the pastor regrouped his forces at the beginning of the year, and began to work. The people say that Scott is the pastor for them. The work has grown this year and the future is very bright. Conversions 6, accessions 6. Raised for all purposes \$5,467.75.

WHALEYVILLE (R. W. Dennis, pastor). Pastor Dennis believes in getting things done. He gives the commands, and if it doesn't come, he goes out and gets it. He plans his work, and works his plans. There is continued growth in the charge. This report is above last years. Conversions 3, accessions 2. Raised for all purposes \$8,300.00.

WHITE HAVEN (R. T. Wallace, pastor). This is a hard-working minister whose ambition is to promote fully the program of The Methodist Church. There are some very fine people in White Haven charge who want the program of the church to succeed, but there are not enough of them. The pastor did his best to make things succeed, and to some degree was successful, but odds were against him. There were too many in the charge who wanted to do nothing. In spite of head winds a good report is being made this year. Conversions 12, accessions 10. Raised for all purposes \$3,319.00.

STOCKTON (Rev. Mrs. Adah Coffey, pastor). Pastor Coffey has given

good account of her stewardship. The World Service and Conference Benevolences have been cared for, and the educational work has been promoted. This is a very small charge with very loyal people. Conversions 7, accessions 7. Raised for all purposes \$3,002.00.

Summary

It has been a real privilege to share in the activities of the Salisbury District and to help in promoting the work of evangelism, education, missions, and stewardship. I have been able to witness growth in each of these areas.

The resume of the charges could never give a true picture of the work done in these several charges. On a whole, the ministers did all that was possible to promote the program of the Church. Some were more successful than others. Each major emphasis had the special attention of the ministers. There were two charges that had no additions to their memberships. This should never be said of any church.

The youth work of the district, and the Methodist Student Work at Maryland State College is continuing to grow under their dynamic leader, Rev. Edwin L. Ellis. On all occasions where youth are involved, they assemble in large numbers.

The missionary work is of a very high order. Rev. W. Hayward Greene sees to it that this phase of the work is not over-looked. His ambition is that in every charge, there will be a school of missions.

There were thirty-six Vacation Church Schools this year, two short of the previous year. Miss Sallye Derrickson never missed an opportunity to call attention to the importance of Vacation Church Schools. She did a splendid job of promoting this work.

I want to express my appreciation to the district Lay Leader and his associates, T. Waldo Kiah, Roy Pinkett, Andrew Evans, and Benjamin Waters, for their cooperation in the lay work. Because of you, the district has gone forward.

To Rev. H. A. Bailey, and C. Leonard Miller, I say "thank you" for the leadership given in the field of education. This district has made rapid strides in the field of Christian education in the past few years.

The ladies of the parsonages will ever be held dear because of their loyalty and devotion to the ministry. Many of the retired ministers and their widows would not be enjoying their retirement, but for the way you reported to the cause of Conference Claimants. Many of you are thoughtful and concerned for others. God bless you and your families.

May I call upon the laymen of these lower districts to begin now planning for the consolidation of many of the smaller churches. If our churches are going to have an effective ministry in these rural areas, we must combine our forces, and pay salaries at least equal to the highest paid laymen in the individual charges. Otherwise, you will have to employ leaders who cannot command the respect of your own members. The majority of our laymen are ready and willing to promote the program of the church, but they need good leadership. Our laymen are loyal and many are making real sacrifices in order for these charges to make the type of reports that are being presented to this conference. To the laymen, I say "thank you, and may God's blessings ever remain with you."

Bishop Love, at the beginning of my term as a district superintendent, I pledged to you my whole-hearted support in the total program of the church. As I retire from this high office, I thank you for your kind consideration and understanding. You are a Bishop of high standing. You have no peers, a few equals. You came to the high office of the Episcopacy "for such a time as this." I trust that your health will permit you to continue to carry on in the office.

Your administrative secretary is truly called to his work. He is never too busy to hear any and all problems, and is always ready to help solve the same. May God's blessings rest upon you and Mrs. Love, and may He keep you in his kind care.

The Commission on World Service and Finance of the Delaware Conference humbly submits this its nineteenth annual report. We are grateful to God for His loving care over us, and to our Bishop, ministers and loyal laymen, whose wonderful spirit of cooperation has made this report possible.

General Items

The Conference Treasurer for the quadrennium is The Rev. J. E. Dunn, 4715 Duffield Street, Philadelphia 24, Pa. He is bonded for \$50,000. The depository for our conference funds is The Girard Trust Corn Exchange Bank of Philadelphia, Pa. Rev. Dunn is the treasurer for the Board of Missions. He also serves as treasurer for the Board of Pensions. The depository for this fund is the Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa. (Discipline 1956 Par. 792 and 803)

The treasurers of all Conference boards and agencies have not been bonded in companies approved by the Commission. The books of all Conference boards

and agencies have not been properly audited for the past fiscal year. (Discipline 1956 Par. 807)

The Conference Treasurer's books have been audited by Certified Public Accountants, Walter P. Harris and Robert Bonner, Jr., and a satisfactory audited report has been filed with the Commission. This is the audited report filed with the Commission for the past fiscal year.

Duties: Director of Stewardship and Treasurer

- To receive and disburse, in accordance with budgets, percentages and terms approved by the Annual Conference, all funds as directed by the proper authorities.
- 2. To give complete financial report to the chairman of the Commission, bishop and district superintendents by the 15th of each month. This report should

show receipts, charge by charge, on each district as well as funds from other sources. Said report should indicate distribution to all agencies,

boards, etc., along with any outstanding unpaid obligations.

3. To be diligent in attending meetings of such boards as Pensions, Missions, etc., where the conference treasurer is likewise treasurer of the respective boards. The treasurer shall keep these boards informed of their financial status and pay bills upon proper authorization of said boards.

- 4. To keep every board and agency of the Conference informed as to the financial condition or distribute monies belonging to such boards and agen-

cies monthly.

5. To attend District and Efficiency Conferences, Laymen's Retreats and such other meetings as requested and be prepared to answer questions relating to

our Conference finances.

- 6. To report to the Commission within 90 days following the 1960 session of the Annual Conference the book-keeping system recommended by the public accountant. After that period, the treasurer shall be responsible for keeping the books, presenting a balance sheet and quarterly report from auditor to the Commission.
- 7. To promote and cultivate a program of stewardship on conference, district and sub-district levels through seminars, workshops, addresses, discussions, institutes, retreats, etc.

8. To make himself available to teach or preach in local churches as may re-

quest these services.

9. To make quarterly reports to the Commission on World Service and Finance giving in detail the promotion and cultivation that has been done, giving dates, places and type of service rendered in order that the Commission may determine the effectiveness of and justification for this combined office.

10. The certified public accountant shall make a report to the Commission annually.

3. BOARD OF MISSIONS

Chairman

I am again happy to give this foreword to the report of our Secretaries.

These men have traveled far and given of their time and energy, without compensation, that the mission story may be told, and our people kept aware of their obligations in this field.

We are happy for the churches that have burned their mortgages this year. For every burned mortgage, another needy sanctuary may be helped. For this we are grateful and remind ourselves that we must not relax in our accomplishments, but be ever alert to our obligations to the National Board.

In closing this foreword to our reports, rest assured that your board has been aware of its task and increased responsibilities, and with God's help we shall carry on.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

I am grateful for the opportunity to report to you some of the activities engaged in during the conference year.

Your Conference Missionary Secretary has been actively engaged in church extension and missionary promotion during the conference year. I am glad to report that the churches of our conference have, in most cases, done a commendable job in raising the World Service Apportionments and in the field of missionary education, promotion and cultivation, on the local church and district levels. We thank God for the missionary concern of the majority of the laymen and pastors of the Delaware Conference. It is needless to say, however, that there are many who have not as yet been won to the cause of missions and our connectional obligations. But to be a good Methodist "the world must be our parish."

The peoples of the world are in revolution. More than a billion persons have changed their political status in the past twelve years. Millions have won political freedom and other millions are on the threshold of freedom. Along with new rulers many people are choosing new gods. It has been said, "Their choice of political rulers will change; but their choice of gods will last." The Discipline states that, "Our basic aim is to carry out the Great Commission: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Our supreme objective is to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples in all lands as their Divine Saviour, to persuade them to become His disciples and to gather their disciples into Christian churches, to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God, to cooperate with these churches; to promote world Christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Jesus Christ."

Therefore it is our sacred responsibility to join forces with the general church, in the light of the opportunities that are ours in the field of World Missions and to declare to all people that the Lord is God and beside Him there is no other.

This is an hour of decision also in the field of National Missions. With our present population increasing at the rate of 7,200 persons per day or 2,628,000 per year, it is etsimated that by 1970 our national population will rise to a startling 210,000,000. This will represent an increase of nearly 40,000,000. This great increase in population plus the shifting of population from rural areas to urban and industrial areas, poses a real challenge to the church in both the dwindling rural areas as well as densely populated urban areas.

The Delaware Conference itself is confronted with many of the problems which are so evident in our national life. There are no cities of refuge. These

problems reach into every district and into every local congregation of our conference. The city itself is a severe challenge with its changing pattern, its economic and racial pressures, its violence and growing crime rate. On the other hand, the Delaware Conference is confronted with a decreasing rural population on the majority of its districts, which creates a difficult problem of adequate leadership and service by the church in these areas. Some are saying, "consolidate the weaker churches" while others are saying, "abandon them." The choice of either has its perils and must be pursued only after much prayer and deliberation.

Across the nation and within the bounds of the conference, our people are deeply depressed by intense racial and economic struggle. The equality of men, and the right to pursue a livelihood, which are fundamental Christian tenets, are being challenged. Not only are the aforementioned a menace, but the witness of the church and Christianity is also challenged by the surging tides of secularism. This is therefore, the time for every local church in our conference to move aggressively forward. The churches of our conference have never faced a graver challenge or greater opportunity than we are facing today. Very little can be accomplished by a hold-the-line action. The problems and needs are demanding immediate attention. We must supply more and better leadership and service, particularly in rural areas. We must continue to increase our World Service giving in order that the needs of both national and world missions might be met.

Recommendations

 We recommend that every local church in the conference strive to set up and maintain a functioning Commission on Missions.

2. We recommend every church to conduct a School of Missions which will

include classes for all age groups of the congregation.

We recommend every minister and lay member of our churches assume personal responsibility for the recruitment of new personnel for the ministry at home and the world mission fields.

4. We recommend that a campaign be made to increase attendance and

interest in the district missionary institutes.

5. We further recommend:

(a) That a self-study and analysis of each local congregation be systematically and diligently executed. And that where necessary, the newly appointed Committee on Research and Survey be employed to make further study and recommendations.

(b) That churches particularly in relocated urban areas and new developments might set up outpost Sunday Schools after adequate study and consultation with the District Superintendent have been

made.

(c) That churches in farm and seasonal areas become more concerned

in our ministry to the migratory and seasonal laborers.

We are grateful to our conference board chairman, Mr. Roy L. Cordery, to the District Missionary Secretaries: Rev. O. H. Spence, Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. W. H. Greene, Rev. R. B. Thompson and Rev. W. R. C. Mills, and to the District Superintendents. Without the assistance of these brethren, the promo-

tion of missions in our conference could not be carried out successfully. It is because of their untiring efforts that the MISSIONARY STORY has been told on each district.

4. (a) TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

In spite of the shift of our national population to the cities, the Methodist Church membership is still a Town and Country membership by 59.27%. 84.70% of our congregations live in town and country. 67% of our 22,000 min-

isters serve town and country charges.

The fourth National Town and Country Conference, composed of 1,200 delegates, held at Wichita, Kansas, July 21-24, 1959, devoted major portions of its time and efforts to the task of raising the educational standards of our ministry. Their welfare and that of the total membership of the church highlighted all the activities of the Conference.

Bishop E. A. Love did an outstanding job for Higher Education. Bishop Love entertained the delegation of the Central Jurisdiction. The main feature of the program was Higher Education. The leaders of the colleges and schools who attended were deeply impressed with Bishop Love's leadership in this field. Attending from the Delaware Conference were Superintendent C. L. Trader and wife, W. H. Greene, E. A. Hughes, and A. Chancy.

It was interesting to learn that, since 1950, the membership of the Delaware Conference advanced in their giving to all causes per annum, per capita, from \$22.67 to \$32.40; for Benevolences, from .84 to \$1.08, and to the support

of the ministry, from \$7.12 to \$8.64.

The Survey

Our District Superintendents in spite of their heavy loads, have given

much support to the survey.

The Easton District. Survey questionnaires were sent to pastors through the superintendents. This pattern was followed on other Districts. Easton District returned 58 from the pastors, as of March 16.

The Salisbury District returned 56 pastoral questionnaires and The Dover

District returned 44 pastoral questionnaires.

Activities

Easton District has two active Town and Country members, the Rev. E. A. Hughes and Bro. Dewey Townsend. Superintendent C. L. Trader serves on the Administrative Committee of the Maryland Council of Churches. He and three ministers attended the Pastors' Summer School at Gammon Theological Seminary last August. E. A. Hughes conducted a special Town and Country course at a District Town and Country Leadership Training School. Several W.S.C.S.'s conducted Town and Country courses, Bro. Hughes serving as resource person. He is President of the Tolbot County Ministerial Association, serves on the Del-Mar-Va Migrant Ministry Committee, and has helped to purchase a set of slides on the "Group Ministry." The "Lord's Acre" slides are rented and used. A Town and Country Conference and a School of Missions have been held.

The Salisbury District. W. H. Greene and O. C. Jones attended the Pastor's

Summer School at Gammon Theological Seminary. Bro. Greene is President of the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance of Accomac and Northampton Counties, Va., and chairman of the Migrant Ministers Committee of that area. This District, along with other Town and Country activities, held a Town and Country Conference and a Missionary Institute.

The Dover District has shown its interest in the Town and Country work mainly through Superintendent W. E. Stanley. He is a student of the work,

and shows his interest by lending every effort to our meetings.

The Wilmington District. Superintendent W. L. D. Lyght's District is not being surveyed, but he has made valuable contributions to the work, especially at our first meeting at Dover last June. Augustus Chancy and Wm. Tasco attended Rural Ministers' Classes as Rutgers University in June of 1959, and Chancy attended the Pastors' Summer School at Gammon Theological Seminary in August.

Recommendations

- 1. That all the churches of the Delaware Conference observe Rural Life Sunday.
- 2. That all the churches of the Deleware Conference observe or hold a Harvest Festival in connection with Thanksgiving.
- 3. That all the Town and Country churches of our conference organize Farm and Home Committees.
- 4. That, in Missionary Institutes and Schools of Missions, on the Districts and in local churches, "The Group Ministry" and "The Lord's Acre Plan" be studied as regular courses.
- 5. That the Board of Missions, Board of Education, Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, Board of Lay Activities, Board of Evangelism, and Conference Youth Fellowship choose a representative each to work with the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work, and send their names and addresses to the Chairman of the Town and Country Commission, immediately following the close of the Annual Conference. (Par. 1231 1956 Discipline).
- 6. That all the churches, agencies and boards of our Conference concerned put into execution as early as possible the recommendations of the Research and Survey Department, resulting from the survey of the Dover, Easton and Salisbury Districts.

4. (b) METHODISM IN THE DOVER, EASTON AND SALISBURY DISTRICTS OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE—1960

The Delaware Conference requested the Department of Research and Survey to conduct a study of the Dover, Easton and Salisbury Districts. The Commission on Town and Country Work served as the study committee and assisted in preparing the questionnaires and directing the survey. The superintendents of the three districts distributed and collected the schedules. The pastors and laymen of the churches involved, provided the data on each local church. The Town and Country Commission prepared the section of recommendations.

The study consisted of two parts. The first was a questionnaire which gathered data on each local church. These questionnaires in the main, were filled out by the pastor and a committee of laymen. A second questionnaire was mailed to each lay delegate and reserve delegate to the annual conference. They were returned directly to the Department of Research and Survey.

The writer wishes to express his appreciation to the Chairman and members of the Town and Country Commission who helped prepare the questionnaires, to the district superintendents who distributed and collected the church schedules, to the pastors and laymen who provided the data and to Miss Marilyn Grolman, Miss Sonja Hallgreen and Mrs. Nancy Johnson who prepared the report. (See complete Report.)

Recommendations

After a careful evaluation of the data presented in this report and in consultation with the Department of Research and Survey, the Town and Country Commission makes the following recommendations to the Delaware Annual Conference:

(1) The data very definitely indicate that many of our most pressing problems grow out of the large number of churches with small memberships. These are unable to provide a graded program of Christian nurture for our youth. Their finances are quite largely consumed in meeting their own minimum financial obligations. Consequently, we recommend that the Conference enter upon a concerted long-time effort to strengthen the local churches. This program will include:

(a) A more aggressive evangelistic effort to win the unchurched to a commitment to Christ and His Church. Buses might be used in some instances. Increased effort in evangelism must be made by the local Commission on Membership and Evangelism and also by the Conference Board of Evangelism. The Conference Board should increase its efforts to assist and counsel with the local

commissions in every way possible.

(b) It is also apparent that some of our churches are so located that they should give careful consideration to merging. We believe there are some situations where a small membership size church and a nearby larger church should consider uniting their resources so as to make a greater impact upon the community.

(c) It is also recommended that the District Boards of Church Location study the situations within their own jurisdictions and do everything possible to assist in any mergers deemed advisable. Close cooperation should be maintained with the Conference Board of Missions in such matters as the recommendation for

the purchase of church sites.

- (2) We believe that many of our ministers do not receive an adequate salary. Many of our churches do not have the full-time service of a well-trained and qualified minister; therefore, we recommend that the number of charges be reduced. A more adequate work-load and salary could be provided for a full-time minister. This objective can be accomplished by increasing the number of churches on charges, especially in the case of attaching weaker churches to a town station church. We believe that many of our sub-districts should expand their activities so that the strength of the larger group will not only encourage, but will assist all the charges. Such things as leadership training and schools of missions could be provided on a sub-district basis.
- (3) We believe that if the Conference enters upon a long-time plan to strengthen the charges, the pastors in turn should exert every effort to become more efficient ministers of our Lord. Consequently, we recommend and urge that the ministers participate in every opportunity for inservice training, such as attending pastors' schools, short term rural pastors' schools, and the like. The primary responsibility for encouraging ministers to participate in these inservice training programs belongs to the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and we urge it to do everything possible in this respect.

(4) We believe that the laymen of the Conference have a great responsibility as well as opportunity to strengthen our local churches. Therefore, we recommend that the Conference Board of Lay Activities

enter upon a strenuous stewardship program. By this, we do not mean a campaign to raise money. We do mean an educational program to get our people to accept their stewardship responsibility before God. The General Board of Lay Activities has many helps and offers assistance; we suggest these be secured and followed. A study of the giving of our churches indicates that many churches give far more than others which are equally able. This ought not be. Every member of our churches should be challenged to accept his stewardship responsibility.

(5) The Department of Research and Survey recommends to the Town and Country Commission that they recognize their Interboard composition. It will be noted that all the boards and agencies of the Conference (including the cabinet) have representation on this Commission. It seems that the Commission is in a position to help co-ordinate the activities of these boards and agencies in efforts to strengthen local churches. If, for example, the Commission concludes as it studies the Conference that in a particular situation there is need for the acceptance of a greater stewardship responsibility on the part of the members of a church, the Town and Country Commission should recommend to the Board of Lay Activities that they assist the pastor and people in every way possible. This Commission is in a position to make recommendations to other boards and agencies as the situation may demand. Unless some plan for co-ordinating the activities of the boards and agencies is worked out, the maximum results may not be secured.

Membership in the National Methodist Rural Fellowship should be promoted so as to enlarge the fellowship circle of our people. This will help them to realize that many others are working to build the Kingdom in Town and Country.

5. BOARD OF EDUCATION

Executive Secretary

It is always a privilege to report some of the activities which have taken place in the area of Christian education as promoted by our staff, charged with the responsibility for the execution of the program in the conference.

For the past two years we have made a more creative approach in our board meeting. Through a subdivision of the membership on the basis of committees, we have profited by the contribution of each member in setting up our goals for the year's program. For those of us on the conference staff, this has been a real help. We are confident that this procedure has helped to identify each member with our program. We are certain that it has made for a better program because it has grown out of the creative thinking and the deep concern of each member.

In keeping with this determination to keep the program and activities of

our work as close to the needs of those whom we serve as possible, our conference councils are setting up procedures to re-evaluate their work on all levels. Study groups have been set up and surveys are being made. One and two day retreats are being planned by the Adult and Youth Councils to make their programs more effective. The Children's Council has sponsored a conference-wide meeting to help make the work with children on the local scene more effective.

STUDENT WORK: One of the major concerns of our program has to do with work with our students. We share this responsibility with the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education and the Commission on Christian Vocations. Because of the relationship of our students to the ongoing program of the local church we still have a large area in which to work apart from the above named commissions.

We are very pleased to report that good work is being done on the campus of Maryland State College, Princess Anne, Maryland, by Rev. Edwin Ellis who is giving leadership to 200 Methodist students. It is our hope that the funds to support this work will be forth coming in the desired amount. We look toward the day when we shall have an accredited Wesley Foundation at Maryland State College.

We have been requested to share more largely in the Methodist Student Movement of New Jersey, New York and the Chesapeake Area. We are also in the process of working with the students at Lincoln University, Oxford, Pa. If we are to safeguard the leadership of our church we must minister to the needs of the students in our institutions of higher learning. We are pleased with the reports which came from the colleges where our students are enrolled. to the effect that they are outstanding in the students' religious life on the campuses.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION THROUGH CAMPING: Camping is now regarded as one of the very important phases of Christian education. There are values in the process of Christian growth which can best be gained in the out of doors. In fact no conference has a well rounded program of Christian education that does not include a program of camping.

We have made the first and important step of purchasing a camp site of 50 acres of ground, well suited to meet our camping needs. There now remains the next step which is development of the site. The third step will be the setting up and carrying on a camping program. We will present a plan of financing our camp development. We shall also propose the time and circumstance under which we hope to launch our camping program.

CHURCH MUSIC: Another area in which we are engaged is church music as it relates to Christian education. During the year Rev. D. L. Ridout has been appointed as Conference Director of Church Music. Associated with him is Mr. Dennis McNeill and persons selected from the various districts.

The foregoing are some of the new fields in which your staff on Christian education is engaged. Because they are new and vital to the total ministry of Christian education, I have presented them at some length.

Progress has been made in the areas in which we labor year after year as reported by our age group directors. In addition, may I call attention to the following:

CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE:

Pastor's Seminars on Preparation For Marriage. The pastors of our con-

ference participated in a series of one-day district seminars on preparation for marriage, led by Dr. Theodore Pavlidis of Reading, Pa., assisted by pastors on each district. A total of 105 pastors and 43 laymen were present at these seminars.

LEADERSHIP EDUCATION: The usual response has been given to our efforts in Leadership education. The subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools have been well attended. We have maintained our usual attendance at the Baltimore Area Leadership School at Bennett College with an enrollment from our conference of 36 representing all age group workers.

Perhaps the most significant progress in the leadership training field is the ever increasing number of local church schools. Members of our staff have participated in a number of the local enterprises. They meet a real need in terms of helping workers in the art of teaching and administration.

Service Beyond The Conference: The Executive Secretary is called upon from time to time to serve beyond the bounds of the conference. Among these services during the past year were: a week-end meeting of Church School Superintendents of the Peninsula Conference; leadership in the Middle Atlantic Adult Convocation; Committee Chairmanship at the Methodist Conference on Christian Education; Committee responsibility in the following: Council of Churches of Philadelphia, Maryland-Delaware Council of Churches; Chespeake Area Methodist Student Movement and Dean of the Baltimore Area Leadership School.

Mission To Japan: We are confident you will be pleased to know that the Church building at Miki City, Japan has been completed. The little congregation entered to worship in September, 1959. Our local churches which have contributed to the building fund have helped make this wonderful achievement possible. The amount given by local churches and groups of our conference is \$443.26. The most recent donation was \$41.36 given by the Conference Young Adult Fellowship at the Annual Y.A.F. Conference.

APPRECIATION: I am grateful for the support of the Conference and District Directors in this fellowship of service. The District Superintendents and their staffs and members in the churches have been all that one could hope for as co-laborers. Bishop Love has, as always, given every possible encouragement and support to all that we have endeavored to do.

God has been as always our source of strength. His grace has been ever with us in all of our undertaking. To him be thanks now and for ever.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- That we work with the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education as this commission plans for future responsibilities.
- That we conduct a financial campaign for the purpose of camp development.
- 3. That we have the experimental Junior High Camp under the leadership of the General Board of Education in the summer of 1961.
- That we give our support to helping all churches meet in full all of the benevolent causes.
- 5. That we continue our efforts in the field of Music education and seek to get some of our directors to become certified directors of music.
- 6. That we seek to secure larger financial support for the Methodist stu-

dent work conducted on the campuses within the territory of our conference.

HOWARD A. BAILEY

Director of Youth Work

Reporting time gives us the opportunity to evaluate what we have done in the light of needs as we have seen them and to render an account of our stewardship. If reports are seen in that light then you know we boast not of accomplishments and increases, nor do we minimize our shortcomings; rather

we state the facts and offer suggestions for improvements.

Some factors that have had a noticeable effect upon youth are the payola of national musical figures, the continuing pattern of broken homes, the increasing evidence of civic depravity and the contradiction between what we as Christians say and what we do as evidenced by the struggle for racial equality and human rights. Programs that do not speak to youth in the language that they speak and understand are doomed. Doomed to failure are programs that do not come to grips with basic issues and that do not confront them with the Gospel and show its relevancy for today.

The new insights in human relations, human behavior, developmental tasks, and teaching need to become a part of our ongoing program of Christian education of youth. These factors have been the undergirding principles of our work this year. In so far as possible, we have sought to deal with basic beliefs of our Christian faith in study courses and to have these beliefs translated into

action in workshops.

Local Church—All action is local and we agree with this principle. We believe that there is a need for a receptive climate in our churches so that when youth return from meetings they can put into practice the skills learned. Experience has taught us that wherever we have strong adult workers with youth, we tend to develop far more effective Youth Fellowships. Toward the end of strengthening local churches have been the visits of youth officers and district leaders. I have worked with twenty-five churches on four districts.

Sub-districts—This is one of our weak links. There are twenty-six sub-districts in the field of education. We have seven active groups. Three years ago we had one. We are in the process of preparing a list of adults to act as provisional convenors to be submitted to the district superintendents and district directors for consideration.

Districts—The summer of 1959 saw a youth activity on each district. I visited four and cooperated in the planning of the fifth. This represents an increase of one. Projected for 1960 is a joint assembly for the Easton and Salisbury Districts, making three groups who now meet in a setting more conducive for study and counseling.

Missions—Two courses were offered at the assembly on the themes, "Town and Country, U.S.A." and "Africa." All districts held a Missionary Rally and over 1,000 persons were present. Thus far we have raised \$1,800.00 of our \$2,500.00 goal for the Methodist Youth Fund. A fine relationship exists between the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and us. The director serves on the executive committee of the Society in order that our planning may be cooperative.

Conferences—Two hundred thirteen persons were present at the assembly held at Delaware State College where we worked together under the theme: "A Faith to Live By." Twenty-two persons including a staff of four made 853 calls and found 154 prospects in the North Jersey Christian Witness Mission. A growing number of persons have taken advantage of the opportunties afforded them to gain training on a beyond the local church level at the Northeastern Region Youth Workshop held last July at Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pennsylvania. Fannette Thomas was a member of the planning committee and the director served as Dean of Men. The largest group ever attended the National Condvocation at Purdue University. Sixteen persons from our Conference were there and came away thrilled at the experience of being with 5,000 youth and 1,000 adults. Vernon Staten, our new President, and I were delegates to the National Conference of Methodist Youth in its final session. The new pattern on the national level will not include students.

Regularly courses selected by the Youth Council and approved by boards of managers are offered in the Christian Workers Schools for youth and their adult workers, which we believe are meaningful. A vote of thanks is due those who serve as instructors without pay and who go through the process of certification.

The work of the Youth Council constantly renews one's faith in the ability of young people to plan creatively and to participate deeply in a program. Vernon Staten gives excellent leadership.

A Strategy Conference held in February, 1960 showed us a sense of direction as we examined existing programs, looked at trends, searched records and developed a strategy to help us meet the demands of our time. About thirty-five persons were involved from across the Conference in this meeting.

Our relationship with other groups continues to grow. We planned and shared in a Social Concerns Week-End with the Philadelphia Conference where our major focus was alcohol. More work is needed in this area. Conversations are started with the New Jersey Conference relative to some joint project.

In April we held our third Older Youth Conference at John Wesley Church, Brooklyn, New York, where we studied, "Isaiah Speaks." Working with this age group is an exhilarating experience and a high privilege.

We shall hold in May a weekend Fellowship Team Training enterprise for the purpose of helping our youth to be prepared to aid local churches and subdistricts better develop programs.

The Christian Witness program for the summer of 1960 is to take on a new look which will involve more youth as missioners, more clinical churches, and, we pray, more souls for Christ and His Church. Each visit to a local church, subdistrict or district meeting means more contacts and more correspondence as a result. When you consider that we visit at least twenty-five local churches a year in addition to everything else, you get an idea of the magnitude of the task.

No report is complete without a discussion of finances. Last year we raised \$2,000.00 on our \$2,480.00 youth budget. We must strive to reach at least \$3,000.00 in order that the present level service can continue. No new asking is contemplated and we are grateful to those who gave regularly through Conference Support and some went the second mile on Youth Loyalty Sunday held in January.

We serve on the Commission on Christian Vocations and thereby are a part of the Conference on the Ministry and Missions. The report of the Commission will reveal the extent of our labors. Increasingly, we find ourselves spending much time in committees on every level, to plan, to consult, and to serve as a resource person. These opportunities, like those we have in local churches we prize highly.

We close with a deep sense of gratitude to Bishop Love and the Cabinet, co-workers in the conference office, pastors, youth, and adult workers who make this report possible. A special word of commendation to Estelle B. Armstead, Lillian Brown, Edwin Ellis, C. H. Parker, C. E. Jordan and C. E. Kiah who

serve long hours in many ways.

Recommendations

1. That we raise our M. Y. F. giving of \$2,500.00.

2. That we seek to raise our level of giving to three fourths of the potential for youth conference support.

3. That we seek to organize at least ten more sub-districts.

4. That we rethink our summer program in the light of new trends.

Proposed Financial Campaign for Development of the Delaware Conference Camp Site Historical Statement

In 1956 we purchased 13 acres of land from Mr. Emory Kirby for the purpose of providing a camp site for Christian Education program. Upon the advice of the General Board of Education we purchased an additional 37 acres from Mrs. Rosa Cheers in 1958. We now have 50 acres which borders on Route 213 about 5 miles north of Centerville, Maryland.

With funds saved by the Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship and an appropriation from the Annual Conference a total of \$5,000.00 was paid for this

camp site. The Board of Trustees of our Conference holds the deed.

Under the leadership of the General Board of Education we have conducted a development workshop on the site. Dr. L. B. Sharp and Miss Elizabeth Brown spent three days with our camping committee during this workshop held in April, 1959.

As a result of this workshop a master plan is being completed which will give us guidance as we go from step to step in our development. We are in a position to give an estimated cost of some of the basic items of development. These are listed below.

The Campaign

The Board of Education is recommending to the Commission on World Service and Finances the following procedure for raising the \$30,000.00 necessary for the camp development.

- I. The period in which the \$30,000.00 is to be raised is three years, beginning with the conference year 1960-61.
 - 1. This will mean raising \$10,000.00 each year for three years.
 - 2. It is hoped that the total amount will be raised by May, 1963.
- II. How the money is to be raised.
 - 1. One half or \$15,000.00 to be raised as follows:
 - (a) Contributions from organizations within the conference.
 - (b) Individual donations from persons solicited by members of the committee authorized to solicit.
 - 2. One half, \$15,000.00 (or \$5,000.00 per year) to be given by local churches. This is not to be an apportionment to the charges, but each charge will be asked to take a free will offering on a day designated as "Camp Development Day." The suggested date is the second Sunday in March of the three year period. The first day to be observed, Sunday, March 12, 1961.

Our hope is that on this day we will raise at least \$5,000.00 each year.

Note: Through these two provisions we hope to raise \$10,000.00 per year, a total of \$30,000.00 for the three year period.

All funds which are raised through contributions from conference organizations, individuals donations, as well as the offerings from the local churches, must be sent to the conference treasurer clearly designated "Camp Development Fund."

The Conference Treasurer will remit these funds to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Education, who will deposit them in the savings account of

the Board of Education for camp development.

Organization of Campaign

Conference Level-

The Conference Committee on Camp Development shall be the responsible agency on the conference level. It is a committee within the Board of Education having some co-opted members.

District Level-

The District Committee is made of the district representatives on the Conference Committee.

The District Age Group Director.

The district president of the M.Y.F. and at least 3 other youth.

Other key persons both lay and ministerial.

Promotion-

1. The District Committee will have as a part of its responsibility the making of contacts and securing of donations from interested persons in their area as well as the overall promotion in local churches. Also the lifting up of this cause at meetings of groups beyond the local church. All of this is to be done in accord with the procedure outlined above under the heading "The Campaign."

The youth members of the committee plus other selected youth will make up a visitation team to speak on the value of camping. Show slides and

films and generally present the cause.

3. The Board of Education is to prepare a booklet setting forth an interpretation of the camping program, giving its purposes, its values, and its place in the program of Christian Education.

4. A film strip is to be prepared of our site showing location, natural beauty spots, people in camps as well as types of shelters. Other visual aids such as maps and posters will be prepared for use at meetings and in local churches.

5. Aids will be prepared to assist local churches prepare for and receive offerings on Camp Development Day, the second Sunday in March, such

as listed above, as well as a special Sunday Bulletin.

Note: This statement has been prepared on the basis of suggestions made by the Committee on Camp Development of the Conference Roard of Education, after consultation with Bishop Love and the District Superintendents.

6. CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

We are more convinced than ever that we must seek to minister in a larger way to our students and our institutions of higher education. We are reminded by the very trend of our times, that the church must not give up its responsibility in the field of higher education. With this conviction we faced the present conference year in the hope of fulfilling our commitments to our colleges and our students as far as possible.

Our church related Negro schools and colleges have reached the cross-

roads. We must either "Come up or close up."

The deadline for accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools is December 31, 1961. I think, however, while things look serious, yet, in view of the able administrative leadership at the head of these institutions, together with the renewed church wide interest to increase funds for Negro education, there need not be cause for alarm. There is cause for the Negro constituency of the church to triple their efforts for our Negro

schools. It is very certain that, if even one of our Negro church related colleges is closed, a number of our Negro boys and girls will be denied the opportunity of an education.

Our Promotion: In our meeting in February, 1959, we agreed to request that Annual Conference allow us to promote a special campaign for Morristown College. We were pleased that the Board of Lay Activities agreed to cooperate with us in observing Layman's Day as an occasion to request each local church to receive an offering for Morristown College. The statement from the Conference Treasurer reveals that the response has not been as good as it was last year. We are, however, grateful for the amount which has been raised. We are likewise confident that additional reports will be made by a number of the local churches.

District Meetings On Higher Education: A great deal of interest has been shown in this cause at the district meetings held during the year. The following is a report of the attendance upon these meetings.

Serving as resource persons in these meetings were: Dr. N. W. Moore, Jr., Rev. George Outen, the Director and selected ministers and laymen from each district. We are confident that the objective of these meetings, which was to assist the local churches in promoting the cause of Christian Higher education, was largely realized.

The Director served on the Philadelphia District in two group quarterly conferences, presenting the needs of our colleges and our students, through the use of visual aids. Thus, on every district, special efforts have been made to advance this cause to which we are committed.

In addition to the above, the Director has appeared in a number of local churches, district youth meetings, subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools and on many other occasions in the interest of higher education.

Work On College Campuses: We are pleased to report that there is the prospect of having an accredited Wesley Foundation on the campus of Maryland State College, Princess Anne, Maryland, where Rev. Edwin Ellis is giving excellent leadership to the Methodist Committee on Student Work.

Mrs. Matilda Wynn, of Asbury Church, Trenton, N. J., is our representative in the New Jersey Methodist Student Movement. Rev. J. R. Shockley is treasurer of the Chesapeake Area Methodist Student Movement and is also carrying some responsibility for our relationship to Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C. We have been invited to work with the Methodist Students at Lincoln University, Oxford, Penna.

Dr. Elmer Gibson has been marvelously received as President of Morristown by the Trustees of the college, the community, and the Methodist Board of Education. He has launched a program that, with the proper cooperation

and support, will bring about full accreditation for Morristown well within the time limit. But, Dr. Gibson, of our Delaware Conference, must have the full support of his Conference. He was quite proud that the first donation which he received came from his Conference. It was small in comparison with what we had promised. He was proud of it, however, because it convinced him, the trustees, the area, and other conferences that we are giving support to the college, that his own conference was back of him and his program 100%.

We are grateful to our resident bishop and cabinet for spearheading the movement throughout our Conference and Area. We wish to thank the Board

of Education and each local church for your splendid cooperation.

There are great challenges ahead. "There is yet much land to be possessed" in this area of service. With the help of our Master and the loyal support of our fellow workers, we cannot fail.

Recommendations

- That, pending the action of the General Conference in this regard, we merge
 the Conference Commission on Higher Education with the Conference Board
 of Education, and that a committee of higher education of the Board be
 created.
- That the continuation of the \$1.50 per member . . . \$1.00 for schools and colleges, and 30¢ for Wesley Foundation, and 20¢ for Administration Expenses, be approved.
- 3. That a minimum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) provided for in recommendation above be given to the Board of Education treasury for administration expenses of the cause of Christian Higher Education. This amount is based upon 13.33% of the \$1.50 member raised by the charges.

4. That we continue our special campaign for Morristown College in an effort to complete the goal of \$15,000.00 which we began in 1959-60.

5. That we contribute, on a percentage basis, to the following schools and foundations after major support has been given to Morristown College: Bennett College, Wesley Theological Seminary, Gammon Theological Seminary, and the Wesley Foundations at Maryland State College, Howard University, Bluefield College and Morgan Christian Center.

That we promote the following special days in the interest of Higher Education: Laymen's Day, Student Recognition Day and National College Day.

7. CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The future leadership of the church and the need of many of our youth to have a sense of fulfillment of their lives in Christian service, demands that we strengthen our efforts in the area of Christian Vocations. Much leadership of the church is lost due to the lack of an organized approach in our challenge to youth to commit themselves to church vocations. Likewise many persons come to adulthood without a feeling of having found their life work. All of this suggest the greatness of our task, whether we work on the local, district or conference level, in guiding youth and young adults in vocational choices.

As this is the end of the quadrennium, it gives cause to review the work

of the commission over the past four years.

The interest in this phase of our work has greatly increased on the part of pastors, local church workers and youth. This interest has not always shown itself in terms of large numbers of persons concerned, but rather in seeking specific information and guidance. We are confident that there is by far a greater appreciation of the work of our commission than there was four years ago.

Constant cultivation has begun to show fruits in two areas particularly; the Ministry and Missions. For example, we have nine young men enrolled in seminaries this year. Seven of these are in Methodist Seminaries. It is possible that there are others of whom we have no record. This is by far the

largest seminary enrollment from our conference for many years.

In the field of missions we have a few young women who show great promise of going on to complete their preparation to serve under the Board of Missions. We are in touch with Scarritt College for Christian Workers in Nashville, Tenn., in an attempt to get some of our youth enrolled in that institution. There are scholarships available to students who qualify. Some of our youth have been recommended for these scholarships.

We are getting splendid cooperation from the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, where a Committee on Recruitment has been recently organized. Through this committee persons who are recommended from this commission will receive guidance in taking the proper steps to prepare to enter

the ministry.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is also organizing for more effective work in recruiting and guiding young women who are interested in church related vocations.

Our local churches are likewise becoming more active in this area. There remains yet much to be done in organizing committees, etc. on the local level.

After careful consideration of our committee on promotion on the conference level, in cooperation with the committee of the conference on The Ministry and Missions (Christmas Dinner), it was decided that we would not hold a conference on church vocations during the past conference year. The Conference on the Christian Ministry and Missions, held December 30, 1959, in Wilmington, Delaware was, as in former years, well attended and we think helpful to those who attended.

Permit us to express our joy in having the privilege of serving with you for the past four years. I feel that we have been working together with God as we have sought to challenge our youth and young adults with the call of Christ and His church. Our commission is merely a service agency seeking to help local churches, districts, boards and agencies, and other groups, as they en-

deavor to promote this phase of our church program.

We now have on our files the following commitments: The Pastoral Ministry, 29; Missions, 30; Nursing, 19; Christian Education, 4; Church Music, 2; Social Work, 11; total—95.

It will be noted that we are turning over to the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications 11 more names. Last year we submitted nine. Thus 20 have been sent to that Board in the past two years.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- That we offer courses in our Christian Workers Schools which will help
 those who have the responsibility for recruiting youth and young adults
 for church related vocations.
- 2. That we have a conference-wide meeting which will give guidance to youth who have made commitments to church related vocations.

3. That each district shall hold at least one conference on Christian Vocations during the year.

4. That the challenge to youth in the interest of church related vocations be made at all district and subdistrict youth meetings.

5. That every local church organize the committee on Christian vocations as provided for in the *Discipline* paragraph 145.9.

8. BOARD OF EVANGELISM

We are happy to make this report of our stewardship during the past year. As we review the recommendations of last year, we are conscious of the fact that we have not measured up to our anticipation. However, some noteworthy things have been accomplished. This having been the year of total enlistment, each district has been working toward this end. Even though there has not been a conference wide emphasis, as such, yet when we consider the reports of the districts, we see a unified effort of total enlistment of every member of the local church in some form of Christian activity through training sessions in church membership and personal visitation-evangelism. In each church where revivals have been held, the membership has increased and there is a marked improvement in regular church attendance; above all, there is a great spiritual awakening.

We are suggesting that we go on record as accepting the plan of the General Board of Evangelism in the "Decade of Dynamic Discipline" (1960-1970). Methodism has had times of greatness and we believe the next ten years should be among the greatest that the Church has known.

We believe that greater opportunities for the gospel lie ahead. Mankind is still searching for meaning in life, longing for wholesomeness of life, desiring security and experiencing anxious concern lest man's very existence on this planet be extinguished.

A noted churchman has said, "If every layman would bring only one other person into the Church each year, all the people in the United States would belong to a church in less than three years." It is estimated that the population of the world will be increased 50% between 1960 and 1975 and in the United States by 65% in the same years. The opportunity and challenge for evangelism become staggering; hence, we recommend the following:

- That each district have a full day's retreat for ministers and invite the laymen for a Mass Meeting, stressing the attendance of the members of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism.
- That at least two Mass Meetings or revivals be held on each charge during the year to spiritually strengthen the members in the local church and for the winning of souls for Christ and His Church.
- 3. That each church should have a "Holy Twelve Club" for continuous visitation and prayer in homes.
- 4. That each church have a "Fisherman's Club" for weekly visitation to win people for Christ and His Church.

9. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

The Methodist Church has always believed that the Church has a right to speak out on social issues. Bishop Nolan B. Harmon, speaking at the recent Methodist Conference on Human Relations at Dallas said, "I think the Church should set the highest sort of pattern for society and I believe that it has the right and duty to go into politics, if a clear-cut moral issue is involved." Today when so many of our Christian principles are at stake, clergy and laity alike must ever remember that the Church should be the conscience of society.

Statement of Concern

We, as followers of Christ, are concerned with the moral aspects of world peace, housing, the city church, nuclear weapons, gambling, temperance, Christian standards, employment, and civil rights. It is obvious that within the narrow scope of this report we cannot touch on all areas of concern that should be presented to our Conference. We must, therefore, be content to call attention to a few observations:

1. The agency in The Methodist Church charged with leadership in this responsibility is the Annual Conference Board of Christian Social Relations. We again urge as was recommended last year, that a Commission on Christian

Social Relations be made mandatory for the local church.

- 2. We must not only talk about the issues, we must do something about them. Every effort should be made to secure civil rights NOW denied. The violence of the mobs in recent outbreaks focused national attention anew on the almost unbelievable restrictions of the rights of Negroes to participate in the choice of public officials in Southern States. We commend the Negro youth, students, and white sympathizers staging lunch room sit-downs in the South for the dignified, non-violent and courageous manner in which they have conducted themselves. In reference to this issue, Dr. Buell G. Gallagher, President of the City College of New York, told the White House Conference on Youth, "From their example, their elders may well take courage and address themselves with new vigor and new understanding to the heroic task of desegregation."
- 3. In the South, the focus of race relations is on schools and voting. In the North, however, the race relations focus is on housing and property exclusiveness. We confess with sorrow that we Methodists, as a denomination, have failed to live up to our pronouncements. In no section of our fair land have we carried out the teachings of our Lord with respect to race relations.

4. It is doubtful whether we can preserve our way of life and make our contribution to world peace without coming to grips effectively with our prob-

lems of race.

5. If the present trends of urban redevelopment continue, it will be impossible in a few years for people from across the tracks in race or social

status to have meaningful associations with each other.

6. We cannot say that the Church does not know the principles which must be followed. We are timid about putting them into action. The Bible affirms that it is the purpose of God to unite all men in Christ and the Church. The Church is the instrument of God's purpose. The Church belongs to God, not the people. It is ours only as stewards under His lordship.

Social Concern in the Local Churches

Attention is called to "CONTACT," the monthly periodical combining services of the General Boards of Social Relations, World Peace and Temperance of The Methodist Church. Every pastor and member of the local church commission on social relations should read and study this periodical. We have found in the past year that our work is severely handicapped and social concerns neglected because in most local churches there is no layman or group of laymen with whom we can correspond.

We, therefore, earnestly seek the approval of the Annual Conference: That every local church which does not already have some group

That every local church which does not already have some group functioning in the area of social concerns, be requested to organize a Commission on Christian Social Relations, as provided in the 1956 Discipline (Par. 219, Par. 244), and that the District Superintendents be asked to urge this action upon local churches.

10. BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

I am thankful to God that it is my privilege to report to this annual conference another successful year of Lay Activities. We have tried to lift up that which we felt was helpful to our Lay work.

We were privileged last year, at our conference anniversary, to have the executive secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, who gave to us firsthand planning of the General Board. We must continue to stress the need for Methodist Men Clubs in every local church. If America is to grow stronger she must have strong Christian men. An active club in every church will deepen the spiritual life of its men. The club can undergird every program of the local church.

Lay activities takes in every program of the local church. Its principle job is to teach Christian Stewardship which embodies the total activities of life. There is no phase of our everyday living that the Church should not be interested in. In July of last year, our Board held three workshops at Delaware State College: Every Member Canvass, Missions, and Social and Christian Relations. We had some of our key leaders to direct these workshops. Everyone who attended went away with a greater zeal to give of themselves in Christian service.

We shall have three other workshops this year in August from 4th to 6th at Delaware State College: Evangelism, Christian and Social Relations and Every Member Canvass. We feel that the Church must make its impact upon every phase of everyday living. We shall endeavor to emphasize these different phases annually.

Potential Leadership

So often I am told by pastors, and officials of the Church that they cannot get sufficient laymen to participate in the different activities of the local church. I would like to share this experience with you which I had this year. I worked with a local church that held an Every Member Canvass. It was really fun as we met and went into the total program of the local church. Each commission met one evening and studied its needs and then made its recommendations to the Commission on Christian Stewardship and Finance, and recommended what its needs should be for the coming year. Those who studied the needs of the local church, their eyes were opened to the real work the church should be doing, and they were able to go and tell other members of the church what the program should be in the local church and solicit their support. This local church reached out and brought in potential leaders and exposed them to the

program of the church. Members of the local church will work and give as they understand. The program of Every Member Canvass is to acquaint every member with the program of the church in order that he might know what he is supporting with time, talent and money. It is not a money raising plan but an educational plan of the local church.

Christian and Social Relations

The time is now and really always has been when people should learn how to live together. The church should stress its importance. Today this is one of our major concerns the world over. The purpose of Jesus' coming was to teach all men how to dwell together.

Evangelism

Decade of Dynamic Discipleship will be one of our great concerns in the sixties. If we are to go further we must go deeper in our Christian daily living. The Church must lead if we are to succeed. There would be no conflict of races such as we see today if the spirit of Christ was in control of our daily living. The Church of Christ has a great challenge and all things are possible with God.

I want to thank our Bishop, District Superintendents, ministers and laymen for their untiring support in making possible a successful year.

11. BOARD OF PENSIONS

It is with gratitude to Almighty God that I make my eleventh annual report to the Board of Pensions.

In my first report, you may recall that I stated that The Methodist Church was the first institution of any kind to establish a pension aid for its veterans. This significant achievement, recorded by the late Bishop Henry W. Warren, should be cherished by every Methodist. The pioneer work done by Bishop Francis Asbury and the General Conference of 1796 in establishing the Chartered Fund, though little more than a dole, laid the foundation for our present church pension system, and paved the way for the various pension systems universally used in modern industry today.

With the principle of retirement compensation thus established, the next step was to turn pension aid from a mere gesture of good will and act of charity to adequate support based upon justice in the payment of deferred salary.

Today, nearly all pensions are treated as "deferred salary" actually earned during service, but withheld in order to provide humanely for old age. Such a system imparts a sense of dignity and self-respect to the recipient, and completely removes ministerial pensions from a charity basis.

Sometime ago I read an article written by the Reverend W. H. Thomas entitled, "Some Advantages of Growing Old." As I reread the article, I felt that it was taken from a current issue of one of our popular magazines. It read like this: Just now it is the fashion to be young. The crowds on the streets appear to be young, and the profusely advertised lotions, treatments and devices to keep one looking young indicates that it is the fashion.

A little while ago it was the fashion for one to appear old. "Tonsorial artists" of the eighteenth century frosted every head with silver. They did not then with evil pride seek to conceal old age. The people did not so much pretend to be young as to look old. Only white heads of hair were in style and could be admitted to court. I mention this to disarm young people's prejudice in favor of youth by calling to mind that age can be fashionable, and so perhaps persuade them to consent to grow old; at least to look kindly on the old, old fashion, ever new, of growing old.

A bishop of London stated, "Men judge more wisely of what is essential and what is indifferent in the quiet sunset of life than in the heat and burden

of the day."

Richter says, "Like a morning dream, life becomes more and more bright the longer we live, the reason for everything appears to be clear. What has puzzled us before seems less mysterious and crooked paths look straight as we approach the end."

It is to this end that your Pension Board is geared, to provide for the veterans of the Cross, so they may enjoy some of the advantages of growing old. Let us join hands and hearts to give our veterans the opportunity to grow old without worry for the needs of the day. How can we do this? Let us rededicate our lives anew to the total pension program of our Conference.

We are beginning to realize the vision of the fathers of our Conference. The Delaware Conference pays an annuity rate of \$31.00 this conference year. What will it be next year? We are urging every charge to pay Conference Claimants the 12% in full, and get behind the Reserve Pension Fund and push it over the top.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you for your fine cooperation in this field of service. I feel that we have a new zeal and spirit in our Conference toward

the work of the Board of Pensions.

14. GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

Old age is not an achievement of the privileged few these days, but the destiny of most of us. If you were born in the early years of this century, the chances are you will live to be possibly 70 to 80 years of age. If you were born in 1960, many authorities give you excellent odds on living to be 90 or 100 years of age, barring accidents and disaster. Aging is a constant universal process. It goes on minute after minute, regardless to world events, legislation, or your own personal feelings.

Aging is something you can neither ignore, nor escape, but it is something

that can provide you with many basic satisfactions. The process itself is beyond your control, but HOW it affects you is something you can largely determine.

The Discipline of The Methodist Church describes the Golden Cross Society, "which shall promote the Hospitals and Homes, and shall work under the Board of Hospitals and Homes and afford other material assistance toward our project. A Home for the Aged.

The enrollment of the Golden Cross Society shall be held annually in order to secure interest in the support of the project before us, a Home for the Aged

of the Delaware Conference, at Dover, Delaware.

The primary interest facing the aged today is how to maintain a decent standard of living on a sharply reduced income. Most wage earners are retired from active labor force at the age of 65 or earlier. Only a few have been able to make provision for their retirement through savings. The only income available to a majority of workers who have reached the age of 65 is Social Security payments, which are inadequate to maintain the elderly at even a subsistence level.

Consequently many elderly people can no longer live in their own homes.

There has always been room in the world for men of vision. They appear with their ideas and dreams and soon they walk beyond the crowd. A little more than a year ago, one such man had a dream that Methodism should find a program of help for elderly people. In his will, Mr. Harry R. Kendel of Chicago, Ill., requested special projects in health and welfare known as the Kendel Hospital and Home Fund, to provide for the training of leaders for charitable service in hospitals and homes, and scholarships for young people.

We urge each local church to organize a committee on Golden Cross, whose duty it will be through the advisement of the pastor, to have charge of the annual Golden Cross enrollment. The second Sunday in November is set aside and

a fee of one dollar (\$1.00) per member a year is asked.

Our plea is that Christian men and women must give largely to build and maintain our goal. It seems that self-sacrifice and unselfish love for others is a most priceless reward.

We further express gratitude to the leaders of the Conference and District

Directors for the service rendered for the cause for others.

My thanks to all who have in any way contributed to our cause.

15. TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

Approximately 49,000,000 television sets and an inestimable number of radios throughout the country provide doors through which the message of Christ can be carried into the homes of America. It is our business to make effectual this message through the media of mass communications.

The following is a record of our work during the past year:

 Promoted the first series of Talk Back in the Philadelphia Area. We shared in the production and provided panelists from our churches for the thirteen-week series.

2. Assisted in the planning and production of radio and television pro-

grams in the Philadelphia Council of Churches.

3. The chairman provided devotional messages for two radio programs and

one television program.

4. Publicized national network programs such as "Lamp Unto My Feet."
In the conference that concerned itself with the work and message of
The Methodist Church.

5. Distributed the tape and film of our resident bishop's message on the

General Conference to local groups.

 The chairman participated in a seminar of General TRAFCO to initiate a long-range program for radio, television and audio-visuals in The Methodist Church.

As we plan ahead for the next quadrennium, some of the things that our Conference TRAFCO should consider as their program are:

- 1. Training programs for the effective use of audio-visuals in the local
- 2. The establishment and the listing of a filmstrip library for use by local churches.
- 3. Wider use of clergy and laymen of the Delaware Conference in all areas of the conference to participate in the production of religious programs for radio and T.V.
- 4. A plan to provide audio-visual equipment for each district so that each church will have access to a movie projector, filmstrip projector, etc. Our ultimate hope is that we will have a wider use of audio-visuals in our local programs of Christian education and general churchmanship.

5. Providing assistance to local churches or groups of churches in the

placement of radio and television programs.

Production of programs and materials for placement with stations in connection with conference meetings, such as the Annual Conference.

The possibilities for our work are tremendous. They are practical and attainable. This we can do and much more. "The eye hath not seen nor ear heard what is possible for the church in the world of radio-television if there is persistence in the pursuit."

Finally we land the efforts of General TRAFCO, Nashville, Tennessee for its excellent work throughout the nation in mass communications. We recommend that every local church support the work of our agency by a special offering for the Television Ministry Fund on the second Sunday of September.

- 1. The conservation and preservation of the family.
- 2. Poverty, unemployment, and unfavorable labor practices.
- 3. Prevention and treatment of crime and juvenile delinquency.
- Discrimination or enforced segregation of peoples because of race or color.
- 5. Politics and World Order.

2. AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

Instead of attempting to give a review of my activities of the past year, I am submitting to the Annual Conferences of the Area for their approval our financial report covering the years 1957 and 1958, with a few announcements of area-wide meetings for 1960. These reports were given at the Area Council in Bluefield, W. Va., last October.

Inasmuch as the Annual Conferences provide the major support for operation of the Area office, I think it is important that they should be given the privilege of reviewing our finances. The Area Council, not being a legislative body, can only hear reports and pass recommendations involving financial matters to the Annual Conferences for action. The report for 1959 will be presented first at the next Area Council, and then to the Annual Conferences in 1961.

I wish to make the following announcements:

- 1. The third annual Ministers' Wives Retreat will be held at Morgan State College, Baltimore, September 1, 2, and 3. We anticipate another excellent program and fine fellowship for the wives of our pastors.
- The Area Council will be held at Ebenezer Church, Washington, on November 8, 9, and 10. Pastoral delegates should be chosen as soon after the Annual Conferences as practiceable.

We should mention, however, the fine response which has been given to the group insurance plan which was presented at the last Annual Conference sessions. The Delaware, North Carolina and Washington Conferences were able to qualify; thus the full-time pastors and several full-time lay employees of these conferences are covered under the plan. We urge pastors to pay their premiums promptly. We do not think it is necessary to argue the value of this type of insurance, and we invite discussion on the matter so far as time will allow. We expect the East Tennessee Conference to qualify this year.

I am in the eighth year of serving in my present office, and wish to express my deep appreciation for the fine continuing relations with Bishop Love, our Area staff and cabinet and the pastors and laymen of our churches.

After many years of faithful service in the ministry of The Methodist Church, he departed this life on September 26, 1959 at his residence in Cambridge, Md.

He was one of eight children in his family none of which could read or write. Having a burning thirst for knowledge he attended the public school in

Laurel, Delaware, Princess Anne Academy and Morgan College.

November 5, 1905, he was happily united in Holy Wedlock with Martha Matilda Marine. This union was blessed with one daughter, Beatrice West. His

beloved companion preceded him to her eternal reward in 1943.

At the Fortieth Session of the Delaware Conference held at Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Md., in 1903, Rev. West, having heard the call to preach, joined the Conference. He grew up on the farm and was a lover of "The good earth." Upon the death of his father he worked hard in order that an inheritance of land might remain in the family. His love for the soil helped fit him for a life of dedicated service to rural churches.

Trinity, Delaware, a three point Circuit, was his first charge. He had only his feet to transport himself from church to church. Through his thrift, he saved one hundred dollars, paid cash for a fine horse, became a circuit rider and a preacher-teacher, won the respect and love of his people and through the years called them "Very fine churchmen." Retirement did not end the activities of this servant of God, who "walked before he rode." With his greatly treasured pin, awarded him, upon his retirement, adorning the lapel of his coat, he gladly answered the call to go serve Beckwith, Md., as a retired supply pastor. Completing four years of joyous service here, he then became a member of the Quarterly Conference at Waugh, Cambridge, Md. Here he remained a most faithful, loyal and devoted member until his earthly pilgrimage ended. He had been taught from his youthful days, the dignity of work, the importance of accepting responsibility and the virture of obedience. He never forgot his lessons.

RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised 1956

RULE I .- Decisions

The President shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie yote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The Bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III.—Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the Presiding Officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the Presiding Officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV .- Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V.—Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.-Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Sessions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the District Superintendent to the Conference Secretary.

RULE VII .-- Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote who is not within the legal limits at the time the vote is taken. A member must vote on all questions before the Conference, unless otherwise excused by the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X.-Non-Debatable Questions

- To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn to the Conference finally.
- 2. To suspend the rule.
- 3. To lay on the table, providing a representative of the Committee shall have the right to speak.
- 4. To take from the table.
- 5. To call for a previous question.
- 6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
- 7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
- 8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.-Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

- 1. To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment, or may be laid on the table).
- 2. To adjourn.
- 3. To take recess.
- 4. To order a previous question.
- 5. To lay on the table.
- 6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
- 7. To postpone to a given time.
- 8. To commit or refer.
- 9. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
- 10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.-Motion to Adjourn

A motion to odjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

- 1. When a member has the floor.
- 2. When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
- 3. When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
- 4. When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
- 5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non-debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV .- The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motions are pending, the mover shall indicate to what he intended the motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of Conference relations.

RULE XV.-Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the Presiding Officer or Secretary.

RULE XVI.-Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if its subject to such division as he indicates. If there is no such, the Chairman may put the question to a vote without waiting for a second.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.-Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.-Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION

RULE XXI.—Admitted on Trial

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In

cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age.

RULE XXIII.-Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.—Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and Associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.-Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.—Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for Conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, the lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the District Superintendents, the host pastor, the Conference Lay Leader and the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII.—Ordination Service

The Ordination Service shall be planned, including the selection of the Ordination speaker, by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training, or a Committee selected by it. The program must be approved by the Resident Bishop.

RULE XXIX.—Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX.-Pictures in the Journal

Pictures in the Conference Journal shall be limited to: Deceased ministers, newly appointed district superintendents, host pastor and the Presiding Bishop.

RULE XXXI.—Memorial Service

The Memorial Service shall be planned, including the selection of the Memorial Service speaker, by the Conference Board of Pensions, or a committee selected by it. The program and the speaker must be approved by the Resident Bishop.




