Recommendation to suspend the rule that pastors over 52 are not placed on approved list was approved to accept Leslie W. Coltrane, 56, who has completed the course of study and has been on approved supply pastor lists of the Washington and North Carolina Conferences for ten years. Roland W. Dennis and Kenneth H. Greene were added to student approved supply list. Orenzo Milbourne is dropped, Clarence Guy has withdrawn, Floyd E. Waters was approved for the Wilmington District.

Committee on Conference Relations: Report, read by C. E. Kiah, was adopted. (See IV., 34-43 and VI. B-1.)

Special Privilege: J. I. Peaco asked for annuity for twenty-four additional years of service previously overlooked due to error of 2 years in his service record. Request was not granted. W. C. Order of the Day: Consideration of Proposed Amendment XII. Amendment was read from 1960 Discipline and explained by the Bishop. After discussion, vote was taken, 129 against and 97 for. Amendment not adopted.

Motion by H. H. Nichols that business session be extended to 12:15 in order to complete the report of Board of Christian Social Concerns was adopted.

Report of the Commission on Christian Social Concerns was read by C. L. Carrington. (See VI. B-13.) Resolution to Merge the Baltimore Area with the Northeastern Jurisdiction was read by W. R. Hazzard. (See Resolution 3 and VI. B-13.)

On motion of W. C. Jason the Conference would consider Area and Jurisdictional changes separately as the first order of the day on Friday, May 26, immediately following devotions.

On motion of E. H. Crampton, rule eight was suspended so that a resolution concerning the Freedom Riders could be read by H. M. Deas. Resolution was adopted. (See Resolution 4.)

Motions by H. H. Nichols that copies of the resolution be sent to the governors of Alabama and Mississippi and that an offering be given at the Conference as well as in the local churches were adopted.

Recommendations two and three of the report were adopted. 1 and 4 to be considered after the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance. (See VI. B-13.)

Freedom Riders offering taken in the amount of \$183.55.

Whereas, the four hundred preachers of Philadelphia and vicinity have been amazingly successful in opening doors of employment opportunity in such companies as Tasty Baking Company, Bond Bread Baking Company, Friehofer Baking Company, Coca-Cola Bottling Company, Pepsi Cola Bottling Company, Seven-Up Bottling Company, Gulf Refining Company, Atlantic Refining Company, Esso Standard Oil Company, Mobil Oil Company, City Service Oil Company, and

Whereas, four hundred Colored Preachers of Philadelphia and vicinity, are engaged in a Selective Patronage Program currently against the Sun Oil Company, makers of Sunoco products, be it

4. FREEDOM RIDERS

We, the Bishop, Cabinet, ministerial and lay delegates of the Ninety-ninth Session of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church, here assembled, do hereby wish to render our unswerving support of the "Freedom Riders" now being subjected to racial violence in their present historic journey throughout the Southern States.

We affirm that we do solemnly regard these young people, both Negro and white alike, as being the flower of their race and country and view their heroic attack upon the unlawfully segregated travel accommodations and other discriminatory restrictions of these areas as being truly consistent with the highest religious ideals of our Christian faith. We laud them for their willingness to suffer martyrdom and bloodshed in the open face of the familiar

extremist measures of desperation of the ante-bellum South, including the inspired hate-mob and other forms of organized brutality and lawlessness.

We condemn the lawless belligerent conspiracy of the political leaders of these states against the established Constitutional authority of our country in upholding segregation in rebellious defiance of the President of the United States and the Attorney-General whose alertness and response to this case we here wish to commend.

Finally, may we extend our most profound congratulations and praise to our fellow brethren in the ministry of churches in these sections, especially to the Reverends Martin Luther King, James Abernathy, and James Shuttleworth of The Montgomery Improvement Association, and The Southern Leadership Conference, and also to Mr. James Farmer of The Congress of Racial Equality, for the motivating, prophetic, and intellectual guidance they are giving to this cause. A. The District Superintendents' Reports

COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen:

With gratitude to Almighty God for guidance, and with profound appreciation, to the ministers and laymen, for their cordial hospitality and copious cooperation, we, your district superintendents, present for review, our third composite report.

Evangelism

Evangelism is still the main business of the Church. Our world is beset with wars and rumors of wars, with the matching of men with machines and with the clashing of ideologies, all of which threaten the destruction of religion and the Church. These evils thrust a terrific burden upon the Church. The moral and spiritual sights of our people must be elevated. We must evangelize or die. Renewed efforts are urgent if we are to seek and save the lost.

The Delaware Conference has not totally failed. But we need a growing awareness of the need for redoubling our efforts in order to cope with the task which rests upon us.

We have entered the "Decade of Dynamic Discipleship." Reports show that throughout the Conference there have been preaching missions, revivals, prayer vigils, prayer retreats, convocations on evangelism, organization of "The Twelve" in local churches, training conferences in visitation evangelism, visitation evangelism efforts in local churches, Youth Christian Witness Missions on all districts, distribution of evangelistic literature, distribution of booklets "Jesus Christ is Lord" to all pastors and periods of spiritual enrichment in several local churches during the Lenten season.

It is a disturbing fact that too many barren churches still exist. For lack of concern for the straying, we drop too many members from our rolls. While we are alarmed at the population explosion, many churches have not grown in membership. Hordes of church school pupils have never taken membership vows. This is an area where the fields are white, quite ready unto harvest.

The demands are great, and we can do the job. Almost any local church can sharply increase its membership, if the pastor will make three evangelistic visits each week, and extend the invitation to Christian discipleship, and enlist six teams of two each to visit three prospects per month and offer Christ to the people.

Where shall we find these teams? We need to challenge and train more laymen into being effective lay witnesses. They can be found in our Methodist Men's clubs, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Church School teachers, members of Commissions on Membership and Evangelism, Methodist Youth Fellowship, and Young

and Middle Adult Fellowships. Let us gird up our loins, go forth with unwavering faith in an unfailing Lord. Forth! with loftiness of purpose, depth of understanding, singleness of heart and clarity of vision. Go lead our perishing nation from bondage to freedom, from falsehood to truth and from gross darkness to Jesus, the Light of the world.

Christian Education

Since the earliest days of Methodism, Christian education has continued to hold a place of great importance in our ongoing program of activities. Through the passing years our great churchmen have been fully aware of the ceaseless march of principalities and powers and rulers of darkness as they wage an endless battle, relying upon false philosophies and distorted values as weapons whereby they expect to win the minds of the children of men. We are compelled as never before to study to show ourselves approved as workmen of God that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.

A survey of the educational work of the Conference this year reveals that around ten thousand children, six thousand youth and four thousand adults are enrolled in our church schools. The average attendance is about ten thousand persons of all ages. Five thousand participate in additional sessions, more than ten thousand were enrolled in our Vacation Church Schools, around seven hundred pupils join church from the church school on profession of faith, several pastors involve them in membership training classes. Key leaders from all districts attend the Leadership School at Bennett College. About seven thousand dollars is raised on the fourth Sundays for world service and conference benevolences.

The Executive Secretary, Rev. H. A. Bailey and the Director of youth, Rev. C. L. Miller render a vital service working with the several district staffs and helping to make our educational work more effective. This is demonstrated in Christian Workers' Schools, Vacation Church School Institutes, district assemblies, Christian Education Week, workshops, seminars and the many opportunities for learning new skills.

Christian Higher Education remains a great unfinished task. A new day dawns, new vistas beckon us on to a brighter, more glorious future. Today can be the day of salvation. But before it can fully come the minds of the uncommitted must be invaded and won. This will require dynamic leaders, well trained, disciplined, rooted and grounded in true Christian principles. It is imperative that such persons shall be found on our college faculties and as directors of our Wesleyan Foundations.

We call upon each Methodist of the Delaware Conference to look up, and behold a great vision of what can be done about our institutions of Christian higher education. Pledge yourself anew to protect and guarantee the well being of our church related schools by inspiring every member of every local church to give \$1.50 per

year. Put more enthusiasm in Race Relations Day that it might be both productive of better relations among people of different races and productive in terms of more dollars for our colleges. Then bend every effort to make your local church school so effective that it will produce strong dynamic Christian youth who may in the course of time enroll in one of our colleges and be a living testimony that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Worship

Man's experiences with God are expressed in many and varied ways. There are moments of joy and experiences of sadness. There are times when our awareness of God leads us to feel reverence and awe. Our need for guidance and dependence upon the will and way of God as proclaimed in the word leads us to search the Scriptures, and to seek God's will and way through the preaching of the Word or the interpretation of His will. Every honest soul seeks for proper dedication of his talents and services.

Through the Commission on Worship many churches have joined the Church-wide experiment with the new Book of Worship. Revisions in Order of Worship, and various rituals have been proposed by the General Commission on Worship. We single out the order for the proposed Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is of paramount importance in the Service of Worship of all Christians. The new service proposed by the Commission on Worship should be used by all churches, large as well as small throughout this quadrennium.

Commissions on Worship in every church should look at this service critically and appraise it in the light of its use on Communion Sundays. First of all it is a single service. Secondly, the service is biblical. Thirdly, the service is ecumenical in spirit and in form. Fourthly, the service is in traditional language. Fifthly, the service is a complete service. Sixthly, the service is flexible. Finally, the service is brief.

Let every church join this Church-wide experiment with the new proposed Book of Worship, so as Methodist, we will be at home in any Methodist Church.

An order of worship is not an arbitrary establishment of the rules of procedure, but a guide by which and through which it is hoped that people will be blessed and guided and deepened in their experience with God.

Stewardship

Stewardship, the ninth thrust of our Church's quadrennial program, undergirds the total program of the Church with strength and stability. Weakness here will mean weakness all along the line of church activities at home and in the uttermost parts of the world.

Many of our churches are coming to the realization of this pertinent fact and are accepting and implementing the stewardship

program. No longer are they satisfied to rely upon suppers, bakes, rallies, etc., to raise their financial budget, but are doing it by tithing and proportionate giving.

Many of the churches of our conference have had their every member visitation as outlined in the Every Member Visitation Manual. Others are planning to do the same.

Those churches that have done it are thrilled by the results. They have found that the implementation of the stewardship program not only increases the churches financial strength but stimulates interest and increases church attendance.

There are other churches that are seemingly satisfied with the status quo and continue to use obsolete methods to finance their program. These churches usually fail to raise their budget and are continually complaining that their budgets are too heavy.

The modern church cannot meet the challenges of the space age with a horse and buggy type of program. There are new frontiers to be explored in this area of change, new challenges, and opportunities. The stewardship thrust we believe will give the church the power it needs in today's world. It becomes a must for every local church.

The significance of the implementation of stewardship in some of our churches is being reflected in the conference reports. The first six months of this year showed an increase of \$3,000.00 for World Service over the same period last year, and we have reasons to believe that reports will show a much greater increase in the last half of the year.

Jesus said to his disciples "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and of the Holy Spirit and, lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age." With a greater sense of mission and dedication, every local church can move forward, keeping "in step with time" continue to advance the Kingdom of our Lord in the earth.

We recommend the following:

1. The every member visitation program be carried out in every local church according to Every Member Visitation Manual.
2. That stewardship be promoted in every charge by providing stewardship literature, and audio visual aids, by teaching in the church school, and preaching of the gospel.
3. The minister and members in each local church shall practice stewardship as the Christian way of life, based upon the conviction that our talents and possessions are a trust from God and are to be used to the benefit of all mankind and to the glory of God.

Jesus Christ is Lord. Let us increase the effectiveness of his Lordship by becoming faithful stewards.

Christian Social Concerns

The Methodist Church at its last General Conference reaffirmed its faith in the social aspects of the Christian gospel, by making the

Commission on Christian Social Concerns mandatory in the local churches.

There are three major social concerns of our Church, temperance, world peace, social and economic relations.

The Methodist Church is in militant opposition to the liquor traffic because its product assails the highest of personality and contributes greatly to the degradation of people, the deterioration of character, discord in family life, neglect and suffering of children.

It is reported that a half million people walk on the edge of alcoholism and go down to shame and degradation every year.

We call upon all Methodists and all decent citizens to relentlessly oppose the growing practice of the sale of alcoholic beverages. We also urge you to strongly oppose Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages.

We urgently appeal to every local church Commission on Christian Social Concerns to become active in its community.

We have deep concern for peace and world order. Ominous war clouds have not yet disappeared from the skies. Man has in his hand means to annihilate the human race and destroy the world as we know it. The Church cannot be complacent in the face of such world conditions.

We reaffirm our faith in Jesus Christ our Lord as the Prince of Peace, and believe that the practice of His teaching will bring peace to the world.

We call for an international agreement to establish a United Nations agency for cooperative exploration of outer space, and a control system to assure the use of outer space for peaceful purposes only.

We heartily commend those nations that are giving economic assistance to the under-privileged countries and the newly freed nations of the world.

The wind of social change is blowing all over the world. Men are struggling to be free and to walk the earth in human dignity.

We commend the United States Supreme Court and the President of the United States for their decisions and pronouncements in the area of civil rights. We commend the students for their orderly participation in sit-ins.

Many churches in our Conference have organized functioning Commissions on Christian Social Concerns and are doing a creditable job. There are many inter-racial ministers organizations. Inter-racial church services are being held in lower Delaware and on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. "The future is now," we must be up and doing.

Church Property

Since early times man has provided a place where he may commune with or meet his God. Sometimes this meeting place was nothing more than a stone, atop of a hill, or a bush. But as his

experience with his God has grown, so has his meeting place for God grown not only larger but also more complex: Instead of stone, we have many stones upon other stones, until we have reached the Cathedral Age.

While modern church architecture is not so much concerned with massive types of church cathedrals, we all agree that, a servicable, comfortable and a beautiful church home is needed in every parish.

Many of our present day church plants were built to serve an age that has passed. We need to give more attention to facilities for religious education, social and recreational programs. No where are these facilities more needed than in areas where facilities for these programs are not otherwise provided.

Among other things the following items may be profitably noted.

1. Have your church attorney investigate titles to all church property. When necessary, make adjustments that may serve the interest of the local church and the Delaware Annual Conference.
2. Make adequate provisions for an annual inspection for fire and other hazards.
3. Make certain that all church property is adequately insured.
4. Secure adequate advice and service on every aspect of your problem before you attempt to repair, restore, or build a new church property. Carefully read your 1960 Methodist Discipline.
5. Keep your church property fresh, clean and attractive as a building dedicated to God.

Christian Vocations

Every institution, profession or enterprise has a plan by which it seeks to maintain itself. Even the lower animals have a power by which they are able to replace themselves. A Crustacea that loses a claw by any means has the power to recreate a new member. Hence the principle of continuity governs to some extent everything that we know.

In secondary schools as well as in higher institutions of learning, the term vocations is used rather extensively. Public as well as private schools spend considerable time and talent in providing their students with educational guidance toward those goals for which they may have talent and native ability to achieve.

In church-related institutions, the principle of educational guidance is strikingly similar to that of the other professions and skills. In the trades, the emphasis is on the skills, in the professions and the sciences the key words are research and scholarship. In the Christian aspect of vocations we stress the skills, the research-scholarship, and the call to the service of strictly Christian enterprises.

There is a decline in the percentage of students entering Christian vocations today as compared to a decade ago. There is a growing

feeling among many young people of all faiths, that religious experience is not relevant to the life and age in which they live. The task of the Christian Church is to convince all people everywhere that religious experience always has been, is now, and always will be, relevant to man's experience. The very basis of our universe is ethical, and the problems of man can be solved only by an ethical procedure. Because the sense of the ought belongs to the Kingdom of the Absolute-God.

The Board of Theological Education has set a definite date (May 21st) as Ministerial Recruitment Sunday. This program is national in scope and wholly binding upon every pastor and layman throughout The Methodist Church to make a most substantial contribution to this most worthy Christian goal. God has always provided a remnant for Israel, that He will continue to do so now, is the basis for our present hope.

Missions

We have not reached all of our missionary goals, but have endeavored on each district to create or promote a Christian program which will cause each church member to experience such dedicated and trained relationship to Jesus Christ and His Church, that God can use him for a more perfect realization of His purposes, in every area of personal and social living, so that others may be brought to join in the active fellowship, prepared to cooperate with all Christians toward achieving a Christian world community.

In recent years we have been insisting that the mission of the Church throughout the world is one mission. For many decades we assumed that the work of the Church at home and overseas was different in kind, and our promotional and procedural strategies were developed accordingly. It is imperative that we recognize the basic fact that the Church's mission to America is the same as her mission to the rest of the world, for America has become an integral and important part of the entire world.

"Formerly it was often true that the sole reaction to the word missions was the idea of the Church at work overseas." Thanks for this new concept of Missions.

Our progress in missions is not as it should have been. Too many of our churches do not have active Commissions on Missions. The needs in the mission fields around the world, the migration of people from the rural area and from other sections of the country to the metropolitan centers, the changing neighborhoods in the inner city, and the need for financial support for some churches magnify our problems. There is, however, a growing sense of responsibility within the fellowship of Christians across the conference. Many members have increased their offerings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, because they have a larger vision of their purpose in life, and feel their brother's care. Many churches have shared in advance gifts.

Many churches, sub-districts, and districts have conducted schools

of missions using "Stumbling Block," a study of alcohol and Christian responsibility, "One World, One Mission," and other mission study courses.

The following achievements are evidence of progress in the area of missions: One new parsonage built; thirteen churches remodeled; five parsonages remodeled; mortgage liquidated on five churches, one parsonage, and one parish house; two parsonages purchased, one lot for a new church building; and ground breaking for a new church building.

We urge every church to be diligent in its endeavor to report apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and Promotion-Advance in full; to observe all special days for the promotion of missionary interests, and to pray that God's will shall be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

Ministerial Support

The Christian Ministry

Our Methodist *Discipline* states in ¶ 821, "Assumption of the obligation of the itineracy required to be made at the time of admission into the traveling connection puts upon the Church the counter obligation of providing support for the entire ministry of the Church. In view of this, the claim for ministerial support in each pastoral charge shall include provision for the support of pastors, district superintendents, bishops, and conference claimants."

The items listed under ministerial support are the pastor's salary, district superintendent's salary and expense fund, episcopal fund, conference claimants, conference permanent fund, minimum salary, and reserve pension fund.

Each Annual Conference is asked to determine the plan and method to be used in distributing the apportionments to its several districts and charges. This method may be by percentages based on the current cash salary paid to the ministers serving pastoral charges under Episcopal appointments, and to supply pastors, or by some other method.

The average salaries and annuity rates paid by the conferences of The Methodist Church present an interesting study. The North Texas Conference pays the highest average salary, \$6,931.00. The Rock River Conference is a close second with an average of \$6,678.00; thirty-five an average of \$5,000.00, seven an average of \$6,000.00; fifteen an average of \$4,000.00 and seven an average of less than \$2,000.00.

The Lexington Conference pays the highest average salary in the Central Jurisdiction, \$4,015.00. The North Carolina Conference pays an average of \$3,384.00, Washington Conference \$3,129.00 and Delaware Conference \$3,101.00. The Florida Conference pays the lowest average salary, \$1,470.00.

The Philadelphia and the Florida Conferences pay the highest annuity rate, \$70.00. Their average salaries are \$5,671.00 and \$5,-

796.00 respectively. Ten conferences pay an annuity rate of \$60.00 or more, twenty conferences \$50.00, eighteen conferences \$40.00, eight conferences \$30.00, and four conferences \$20.00. All others pay a rate less than \$20.00.

The Delaware Conference pays the highest annuity rate in the Central Jurisdiction, \$32.00. The Washington Conference, \$31.00 and North Carolina Conference, \$27.00. One Conference pays \$21.00, one \$19.00 and ten pay \$18.00 or less. The Southwest Conference pays the lowest annuity rate, \$8.00.

During a period of 47 years, the average salary in the Delaware Conference has increased from \$574.00 to \$3,101.00. The total paid for pastors' salaries has increased from \$31,422.00 to \$414,183.00. The annuity rate per year has increased from \$8.00 to \$32.00. The pastor's travel and expense fund has increased from 0 to \$48,403.00.

More than forty charges have increased the pastors' salary. Last year the salaries of this conference were raised 6%. This year they are increased approximately 7%. This is good but not good enough, because the increase in the minister's salary has not kept pace with the rising cost of living. The cost of living rose 57.5% during the last 37 years, while ministers' salaries rose only 44.5%.

The way to solve this problem is to cure the basic trouble. If we want good religious leadership, we must be willing to pay for it. We must provide a comfortable support for a man who may have spent seven university years preparing for this high calling. We are challenged to give an adequate salary to a man who works 60-80 hours a week, on every conceivable church and community problem, and is on call 24 hours a day just as a doctor. Surely a man who hears the unhappiest problems life has to offer deserves much better treatment.

The General Board of Pensions is authorized, in ¶ 1655 of the *Discipline*, "to act as a reserver funding agency for such conferences as may desire to transfer to it any or all of their obligations, for previous entrants under the pension code." Under this provision the General Board has been requested by twenty-five Annual Conferences, to date, to set up and administer such a program, in which complete transition to the Methodist Reserve Pension Fund is made.

The program is now in operation in twenty-one Annual Conferences. They will be joined by four more conferences in 1961. The Delaware Conference should be among the next conferences to join the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, but before this can happen \$320,000.00 must be raised. Of this amount \$237,630.00 was raised, but we need at least \$82,370.00 to reach our goal. Many charges have paid more than 100% on their apportionment for this worthy cause. Some charges have done very well, but some are still in the red. Churches that are paid out are asked to help the delinquent churches to pay out. Churches in the red column are urged to move up to the column, called Raised in Full.

The Reserve Pension Fund provides adequate protection for

every minister, orphan and widow. It is a great cause that is worthy of our wholehearted support. It should take precedence over all other campaigns.

Blessings, honors and perpetual praises must be given to the loyal, faithful and gracious ministers' wives, for the colorful role they play in raising the Conference Claimants and other allocations for this Conference. They toil untiringly on, while thronging duties press, for they find rest in doing the will of Jesus. With each district thoroughly organized, monthly meetings are held, that give time for fellowship and sharing. The intermittent programs are financially supported by our faithful and cooperative laymen.

For all of these wonderful accomplishments, we rejoice, and give thanks to God, and invoke His perpetual blessings upon us all.

Sickness and Death

Several of the parsonages have been visited with sickness. We rejoice that all have recovered. The sick were Rev. and Mrs. A. P. Jenkins, Rev. and Mrs. E. H. Jackson, Rev. and Mrs. Frank Farrare, Rev. S. L. Jones, Rev. T. M. Murray, Rev. C. E. Jordan, Rev. C. H. Cottingham, Rev. J. I. Williams and Mrs. A. H. Slacum.

Those who were hospitalized were Rev. E. N. Foster, Rev. S. E. Armstrong, Rev. C. M. Stafford, Rev. W. J. Mills, Rev. R. S. Caldwell, Rev. H. R. Snead, and Rev. Van B. Wright.

We were left in sorrow by the visitation of death, which claimed the new born son of the Rev. and Mrs. Claude A. Edmonds.

We also sustained the loss of several outstanding lay men and women who for years had supported the causes of the kingdom of God.

District Activities

Our district boards and agencies met with regularity. This included the Annual Meeting of Ministers and Wives at the district parsonage; meetings of the Council, Trustees, Stewards, Parsonage Committee, Staff, secretaries and directors; District Conference, Boards of Evangelism, Missions, Lay Activities, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Youth Rally, Missionary Institute, Pre-Conference Rally, Youth Assembly, Christian Workers' Schools, Seminars, Convocations, Workshops and Clinics, Preacher's Meetings, Sub-District

groups, District Day of Prayer, Roll Call, and Choir Festival. Not only did they meet as scheduled but, the attendance, programs and interest were gratifying.

Statement Concerning the Charges

AIREYS: E. P. Cooke, Minister. Pastor has kept smiling and done a fine year's work. Improvements have been made on church property, debts liquidated and gains made over previous year. Accessions 1. Return of pastor requested. Raised for all causes \$6,181.

BECKWITH: A. F. Farrare, Minister. This is our smallest charge. But the diligent labors of pastor and people have brought fine results. Church properties have been improved. The one hundred percent goal has been reached, harmony prevails. Raised for all causes \$2,365.

CAMBRIDGE: S. L. Jones, Minister. Under the inspired leadership of its pastor this charge maintains its high standards along all lines. It is one of the best organized and responsive churches of our Conference. Conversions 11, accessions 12, mortgage liquidated. Raised for all causes \$15,502.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT: T. M. Murray, Minister. The caliber of the work on this charge continues to improve. The parsonage has been completely decorated inside and new furniture purchased. St. Luke has been painted outside, its mortgage burned, and a Hammond electric organ installed. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for causes \$5,761.

CARMICHAEL: R. S. Caldwell, Minister. This charge continues to grow. The young adults are very active. The pastor on the thirteenth year of service here still gets things accomplished in a wonderful manner. Bryans church has done extensive renovation inside including modern toilet facilities. Also a new roof has been put on. Conversions 8, accessions 10. Raised for all causes \$5,266.

CENTREVILLE-GOULDSTOWN: C. Edgar Jordan, Minister. The pastor has striven diligently to organize, promote, and advance the work, and the charge has surpassed previous records. Improvements have been made on the parsonage, the debt on the new central heating plant has been liquidated. Conversions 3, accessions 3. Raised for all causes \$8,305.

CHURCH CREEK: C. H. Cottingham, Minister. This small charge has responded to the leadership of its new pastor and has experienced a fairly good year. A new roof was put on St. Paul church. The new parish hall at Church Creek has been painted inside. Conversions 4, accessions 10. Raised for all causes \$3,261.

CHURCH HILL: E. H. Jackson, Minister. The charge continues to hold its own. All church property has been greatly improved. The Mt. Vernon church has \$8,165 on hand in its building fund. A substantial increase of salary has been approved. Conversions 3, accessions 1. Raised for all causes \$5,968.

CORDOVA-EARLES CHAPEL: H. G. Chase, Minister. The loyal pastor and loyal people have done a commendable year's work. The charge is well organized. The organizations work well, a spirit of optimism prevails. Beautiful new furnishings have been placed in the parsonage and new chairs in

New Zion church. A substantial increase of salary has been voted. Pastors return requested. Conversions 6, accessions 32. Raised for all causes \$9,368.

CRAPO-GOLDEN HILL: Mrs. Carvilla Pinder, Minister. The new pastor was welcomed with open arms. The parishes have been inspired and enriched. Improvements have been completed on John Wesley church. Conversions 3. The pastor's return is urgently requested. Raised for all causes \$3,495.

DENTON-WILLISTON: C. A. Edmonds, Minister. The pastor has given efficient and dedicated leadership. He has worked faithfully to fulfill all obligations. While both pastor and wife are dearly loved by the membership and community and churches' attitude toward benevolences is unhealthy. Improvements have been made on the parsonage and the Thomastown Community Hall. Conversions 3, accessions 3. Pastor's return has been requested. Raised for all causes \$6,556.

EAST NEW MARKET: N. C. Stanley, Minister. This charge has had a measure of success under the tireless efforts of its pastor and the faithful few. Running water and modern bath have been installed in the parsonage. Conversions 3, accessions 1. Raised for all causes \$5,709.

EASTON: Rev. T. C. Jones was moved in July. The District Superintendent gave oversight to this fine charge for the rest of the year. In spite of this handicap, the congregation liquidated the mortgage on the church, voted a five hundred dollar increase of salary and kept intact. Conversions 2, accessions 8. Raised for all causes \$7,729.

EASTON CIRCUIT: A. H. Slacum, Minister. A very creditable year's work has been done. The interior of the church has been renovated. The interior of the parish hall painted, the parsonage beautifully redecorated and new furniture installed. Pastor and people are satisfied. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$5,425.

FEDERALSBURG: G. L. Stanley, Minister. This charge has been greatly transformed. The pastor and people work together in a fine way. New vitality is evidenced. The old parsonage has been demolished making way for a new modern structure soon to be built. Conversions 6, accessions 14. Raised for all causes \$8,071. Pastor's return eagerly solicited.

GREENSBORO: A. P. Jenkins, Minister. Brother Jenkins has worked earnestly to achieve results under great odds. He has experienced a prolonged period of illness, and has the constant care of his wife who is practically helpless. HURLOCK: W. J. Mills, Minister. The pastor was hospitalized for a short period. Though the charge falls below last year's mark, the achievements are good under the circumstances. A new roof was placed on Union Grove, new pulpit furnishings and rest rooms at Washington and Zoar churches. Conversions 5, accessions 4. Raised for all causes \$7,673.

LINKWOOD: Eric George, Minister. Brother George is enrolled at Howard University and serves as a student pastor. He is greatly revered by all. The charge increased his salary. Great improvement is being made on the parsonage. A new church is under construction at Salem to replace the one lost by fire. Pastor's return is requested. Conversions 2, accessions 14. Raised for all causes \$4,380.

MARYDEL: William Staten, Minister. This charge is happy to have a resident pastor. The pastor and wife are the proud parents of a fine baby girl. This is one of our weak charges, of limited means. The pastor shows deep concern and works hard. Accessions 4. Raised for all causes \$4,723.

McDANIEL: A. A. McDowell, Minister. Here we have a small church with a big heart and a wonderful spirit to work. The parish hall has been beautifully remodeled, new furnishings placed in the parsonage and all debts liquidated. Conversions 5, accessions 3. Raised for all causes \$4,183.

MILES RIVER: STATEN'S CHAPEL: Mrs. Hester R. Opher, Minister. The people here are grateful for a resident pastor and new strength through a merger with Staten's Chapel. Elaborate improvements including running water, new roof, modern bath and deep freeze have been made at the parsonage. The churches requested a permanent merger and the return of the pastor. Conversions 1, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$7,996.

OXFORD-JOHN WESLEY: E. A. Hughes, Minister. These three churches were successfully merged and they request that it remain that way. The pastor is a hard worker who plans well and gives unstinted leadership. The mortgage on the parsonage has been liquidated, new and substantial improvements have been made at Waters church at a cost of \$5,000. Extensive new furnishings have been put in the parsonage. Conversions 2. Raised for all causes, \$8,317.

PRESTON: Olen Molock, Minister. As this charge goes through an adjustment period some tension has existed. There is a need for better understanding and for the acceptance of truth and right. A new oil burner has been installed in the parsonage. A beautiful interior decoration job has been done at Zoar, debts have been reduced. Conversions 26, accessions 5. Raised for all causes, \$9,382.

RIDGELY: Van B. Wright, Minister. In spite of the declining health of the pastor this charge has made some progress. Old debts have been settled, a new \$3,000 heating system installed. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Total raised for all causes, \$5,604.

ROYAL OAK-BELLEVUE: J. I. Williams, Minister. This charge has a wonderful reputation for good works. Improvements have been made this year. The churches are well organized. TAYLORS ISLAND: E. N. Foster, Minister. The pastor of this parish has suffered much illness. He too was hospitalized. Under the circumstances this charge has had a good year. All church properties have been greatly improved. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Raised for all causes, \$3,980.

TRAPPE: H. T. Hall, Minister. I am happy to report that this progressive pastor and congregation marches on surpassing previous records. A brand new Community Hall has been erected debt free. The interior of the church has been renovated, modern rest rooms installed, a Hammond electric organ purchased and further improvements made at the parsonage. Conversions 3, accessions 3, pastor's salary increased by \$200, his return requested. Raised for all purposes, \$11,481.

VIENNA-REID'S GROVE: R. W. Dennis, Minister. To the surprise of many this charge is successfully adjusting itself to the new minister whose predecessor had served this point twenty-seven years. Advances have been made along all lines. Salary and travel substantially increased. The construction of a new \$10,000 parsonage will begin within a few days. Conversions 4, accessions 3, pastor's return requested. Raised for all purposes, \$4,716.

WITTMAN-SHERWOOD: Mrs. Mary D. Hundley, Minister. The Pastor has made great efforts to make this a progressive charge. Sherwood has responded in an excellent manner. Wittman lags, and demonstrates a lack of real concern. Many youth are being attracted to the church. The activities of the charge have been revived. Conversions 15, accessions 8. Raised for all purposes, \$10,721.

Conclusion

This brief review does not tell the whole story of the wonderful accomplishments which have been achieved by the loyal ministers and laymen of the District. Many of them have put in their very lifeblood to the task of liquidating long standing debts, meeting current expenses, constructing, maintaining church and parsonage buildings, and lifting the moral and spiritual sights of the people.

Certainly we have fallen short of our goals. We regret that more has not been accomplished for the kingdom of God. But we are grateful for the opportunity to work in its interest. We pray that the eternal Father will continue to guide, empower and sustain us as we seek to complete our unfinished task.

Our Pre-Conference Rally was well attended and the reports were gratifying.

2. COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Commission on World Service and Finance of the Delaware Conference humbly submits this its twentieth annual report. We are grateful to God for His loving care over us, and to our Bishop, ministers and loyal laymen, whose wonderful spirit of cooperation has made this report possible.

General Items

The Conference Treasurer for the quadrennium is The Rev. J. E. Dunn, 4715 Duffield Street, Philadelphia 24, Pa. He is bonded for \$50,000. The depository for our conference funds is The Girard Trust Corn Exchange Bank of Philadelphia, Pa. Rev. Dunn is the treasurer for the Board of Missions. He also serves as treasurer for the Board of Pensions. The depository for this fund is the Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.

The treasurers of all Conference boards and agencies have not been bonded in companies approved by the Commission. The books of all Conference boards and agencies have not been properly audited for the past fiscal year.

The Conference Treasurer's books have been audited by Certified Public Accountants, Walter P. Harris and Robert Bonner, Jr., and a satisfactory audited report has been filed with the Commission. This is the audited report filed with the Commission for the past fiscal year.

The list of other Conference funds, the names of treasurers of each, and the approved depositories are as follows: Board of Education, Rev. C. D. Gerald, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Bank and Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; Board of Lay Activities, J. R. Webb, Treasurer, People's National Bank, Laurel, Delaware; Board of Hospitals and Homes, Rev. C. E. Kiah, Treasurer, Salem National Bank and Trust Co., Salem, N. J.; Board of Evangelism, Helen Loatman, Treasurer, Wilmington Trust Co., Wilmington, Del.; Commission on Christian Vocations, Leonard Miller, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Banking and Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; Board of Social Concerns, O. Recommendations

2. We recommend that all boards and agencies receiving financial support from the Conference shall submit to the Commission (a) The name and address of their respective treasurers, and (b) The name and place where the Conference monies are deposited by June 30th, 1961.

3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer shall continue to give priority to (a) District Superintendent's Salary and Expense Fund, (b) The Ministerial Training School, (c) Conference Youth Assembly, (d) Salaries of Board of Education, (e) Baltimore Area Leadership School, and (f) Salary of Treasurer and Director of Stewardship, (g) Board of Christian Social Concerns.

4. We recommend that no request shall be made on the conference floor

for finance unless it has first been presented to the Commission On World Service and Finance.

5. We recommend that Children's Service Fund and the M. Y. Fund be remitted monthly.

6. We recommend that the Board of Pensions continue the Reserve Pension Fund campaign.

7. We recommend that the \$30,000 GOLDEN AGE investment drive be approved.

3. DIRECTOR OF STEWARDSHIP

Christian stewardship is the practice of systematic and proportionate giving of time, abilities, and material possessions, based on the conviction that these are a *trust* from God to be used in His service for the benefit of all mankind.

The message, motivation and method of stewardship was presented at the beginning of the conference year at each of the District Stewards meetings. The same was done at the District Conferences in the Fall. Workshops were held at lay meetings, preachers' meetings and messages delivered at churches by invitation.

Among the meetings attended were Regional Seminar Workshop, Ocean City, N. J.; Annual Meeting of Conference Board of Lay Activities, Delaware State College; North Eastern Jurisdiction Laymen's Meeting, Atlantic City;

Baltimore Area Council, Washington, D. C.; and Middle Atlantic Adult Convocation, Buck Hill Falls.

The program for 1960-61 began with the conference-wide Prayer Vigil on World-Wide Communion Sunday in October with evangelistic emphasis to the end of the year. The Every Member Visitation began January 8, 1961, using the new manual, ending with Loyalty Day and Victory Sunday.

Let us serve God by becoming faithful stewards. This will require a recovery of the New Testament conception of the role of the laity. Ministers and laymen are called to the same transforming experience of Christ. The layman is to witness not simply within the church organization as an usher, singer or member of a commission, but is a witness also by his words and way of life. Jesus Christ will be proclaimed as Lord of all the earth only as deeply committed laymen carry the good news of Christ and His ethical principles and resultant practices into the heart of the so-called secular world. Thus, "the kingdoms of this world are to become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ."

Quadrennial Emphasis

PURPOSE:

1. To provide a channel by which the individual Christian may grow in joyous giving.
2. To stimulate and undergird new and generous support for the World Service program of The Methodist Church.

PROCEDURE:

1. Month of emphasis on stewardship of possessions.
 - (a) Promote *tithing* as the minimum standard of giving. *Goal*: minimum of 10% of members as committed *tithers*.
 - (b) Challenge members to increased giving to World Service. *Goal*: Doubling of giving for increased costs of operation of agencies of The Church.
2. Renewed stimulation of the Every Member Visitation by use of the Manual and related materials.
3. Basic stewardship education through church schools and other organizations.

Recommendations

For the implementation of this program, I recommend:

1. A month of preaching on stewardship of possessions with an emphasis on tithing.
2. Study courses and teacher training courses in stewardship.
3. The use of audio-visual materials.
4. Stewardship emphasis be carried out during the Fall of 1961 (September through November).

Recommendations

1. We recommend that each Official Board through its commissions use the following new promotional materials made available free for cultivating the membership:

4. We recommend that we revive the awarding of certificates to charges paying in full the World Service and Conference Benevolences apportionment.

5. BOARD OF MISSIONS

Chairman

Our frontiers of today, and for the next quadrennium, are calling for a wide variety of qualified workers at home and abroad. There are openings in more than forty countries for over four hundred workers. Three hundred forty-six of these should be career men and women, while the balance may be special three year term workers.

These workers are needed for agriculture, home economics, business, evangelism, Christian education and specialized ministries, medicine, dentistry, social work and other categories.

Why should the recruiting of young men and women to fill these urgent posts in the mission field not be one of our serious goals? The standards are high and a definite religious experience and knowledge of God are a must. Good health and emotional stability are important, coupled with a burning desire to share one's faith and minister to the needs of others. Can we not find such persons within the bounds of our Conference?

The Board of Missions takes this opportunity to thank the Conference Missionary Secretary and the District Missionary Secretaries for a job well done. Theirs has been the task of keeping missions alive and vital in our Conference. They have not spared themselves in this assignment, answering the call to conferences, workshops, consultations, and board meetings. Theirs has been the joy of finding voluntary service a wonderful and compelling experience. No less loyal have been our District Superintendents who have been with us in every Board meeting, giving advice and consultation. These are the men who must give direction to all of our tasks.

To date, from our Promotional and Advance funds we have been able to assist fifteen churches of the Conference over tough spots. The total amount of such aid was \$25,394.39. In this area the Board will present a recommendation.

We are pleased to note the continued efforts of our churches to meet their obligations to the National Board. This is so very important that we hope there will never be any let up in these efforts. We must also watch our Mission Aid program and see that we fulfill the conditions under which such aid was given.

So we face, with all their challenges, our new frontiers with faith in the inherent loyalty of all Christians to meet the responsibilities of their tasks.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

It is with gratitude to Almighty God and appreciation to the members of the Conference Board of Missions, the District Superintendents, ministers and laymen, that I submit this my fourth annual report, to the Delaware Annual Conference.

The churches of our conference have in most cases, done a commendable job in raising the World Service apportionments. But our missionary obligation will not be fulfilled until a better job is done in the field of missionary education, promotion and cultivation. Missionary education must be at the heart of our missionary program, if we are to reap the benefits of Christian stewardship as it relates to Christian missions.

In order that we might have an "informed people" as well as a "participating people," an active Commission on Missions in every local church is a must. Every pastor has the responsibility to see that this commission is at work in his local church, not merely as a fund-raising agency, but as an agency of promotion, cultivation and education in all phases of the work of missions and church extensions.

Recommendations

General

1. In order that an effective program of missions might be projected, it is necessary that the Executive Committee meet with the District Superintendents and the District Missionary Secretaries in a planning Conference on Missions during the month of June.
2. That members of the board, District Missionary Secretaries and interested persons endeavor to attend the Missionary Conferences in order to receive inspiration and information so as to render larger service.
3. That every local church strive to set up and maintain a functioning Commission on Missions.
4. That every local church in the Conference plan and conduct a Church-Wide School of Missions using the study book "Methodist Work in South America."
5. That every effort be made to increase attendance and interest in the District Missionary Institute.
6. That every local church plan a "Missionary Sunday" and invite a missionary or a scholarship student as speaker for the day.

7. That every minister and lay member of our churches assume personal responsibility for the recruitment of young men and women for the ministry at home and the world mission fields.
8. That every local church endeavor to meet its World Service apportionment in full.
9. That churches in urban areas establish outpost Sunday Schools in relocated and newly developed areas.
10. That churches in farm and seasonal areas become more concerned in our ministry to the migratory and seasonal laborers.

Specific

We further recommend:

I—That the Delaware Conference whole-heartedly endorse and support the nation-wide study program for 1960-64—Over-all theme: "Jesus Christ is Lord"; Specific theme: "Our Mission Today"; (1) The Faith That Compels Us; (2) The Factors That Confront Us; (3) The Frontier That Calls Us; (4) The Program That Unites Us.

II—(a) That during 1961, the Bishop, District Superintendents, Conference Missionary Secretary, Chairman of the Board of Missions and the District Missionary Secretaries plan for and promote a CONFERENCE-WIDE WEEK OF MISSIONS, allowing one day for each district; (b) That qualified personnel on the work and program of missions and members of the Conference Study Team be engaged to give leadership for this week; (c) That the quadrennial emphasis, and the missionary concern of the Delaware Conference be projected and interpreted at these rallies; (d) That the Woman's Society of Christian Service be invited to share in the planning and promotion of the WEEK OF MISSIONS.

III—(a) That each District Missionary Secretary under the guidance of the District Superintendent shall make special effort to get more local churches to voluntarily adopt Conference initiated specials and General Advance Specials. (b) That our Annual Conference Specials shall be such projects that are currently met by the Promotion-Advance Fund—(1) That the Conference Board of Missions shall continue as the agency through which such projects are accepted, classified, and funds administered; (2) That every pastor and local church shall make special effort to meet the Promotion-Advance Fund asking in full during this conference year. (c) That every local church shall voluntarily accept to share in a General Advance Special—(1) That the following shall be accepted as suggested projects:

IV—That the Conference Board of Missions be granted the privilege to select speakers for the Annual Missionary sermons and planning the program appertaining thereto.

V—That the Annual Conference create an Inter-Agency Committee whose

responsibility shall be to coordinate the dates of all meetings of boards and agencies of the Delaware Conference.

CONCLUSION

We are grateful to our conference board chairman, Mr. Roy L. Cordery, to the District Missionary Secretaries: Rev. O. H. Spence, Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. W. H. Greene, Rev. R. B. Thompson and Rev. W. R. C. Mills, and to the District Superintendents. Without the assistance of these brethren, the promotion of missions in our conference could not be carried out successfully. It is because of their untiring efforts that the MISSIONARY STORY has been told on each district.

6. BOARD OF PENSIONS

Recommendations

1. CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS PAYMENTS—

We recommend that the General Board of Pensions be authorized to make payments to the claimants of the Delaware Conference monthly, in advance, beginning with July 1, 1961, in accordance with its policy. (The policy of the General Board is to continue quarterly payments when the total amount payable for the year is under \$120.00 but over \$39.00. Annual payments are made when the total annuity is under \$40.00.)

2. ONE AND ONE-HALF PER CENT—

We recommend:

- a—That the District Superintendent in all his contacts with the delinquent ministers urge the importance of paying their one and one-half per cent.
- b—That in planning the appointments of the ministers, the question of their relations to the fund be taken into consideration.
- c—That in order to reduce the immense amount of one and one-half per cent due, we recommend the following (1) Ministers receiving \$3,000.00 or more to pay in full; (2) Ministers receiving \$2,000.00 to \$2,999.00 pay 80% of their indebtedness; (3) Ministers receiving less than \$2,000.00 pay 60% of their indebtedness.
- d—We suggest that the above arrangement be for the conference year, 1961-1962.

3. PROPORTIONAL PAYMENT OF MINISTERIAL SUPPORT—

- a—The District Superintendent be asked to keep before the charges the importance of paying all ministerial obligations.
- b—It is suggested that an arrangement be made with the succeeding pastor to have the charge to liquidate all previous claimants apportionments.

4. PERMANENT FUND—

We recommend the payment of \$8,333.00 to the fund this year and until such time as we enter the Reserve Pension Fund.

5. HEALTH AND WELFARE—

We recommend:

- a—That the Commission on World Service and Finance make a contribution yearly to the Methodist Hospital in Philadelphia.

DELAWARE CONFERENCE

b—All ministers who have not registered for Social Security be encouraged to do so before April, 1962.

6. RESERVE PENSION FUND—

We recommend that during the conference year 1961-1962, that the Pension Board conduct a conference wide CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS STAMP SALE for our Reserve Pension Fund. Stamps to be sold in sheets of ten for one dollar per sheet. A sale date to be set by the Board.

7. BOARD OF EDUCATION

Executive Secretary

I am grateful for the opportunity to report some of the activities of the Conference Board of Education which have been promoted during the year.

With the passing of the years the work of Christian Education seems to become more and more important in our total church program. In short, education must underlie the successful promotion of all phases of work in the local church.

Our task has been one of seeking to make the program of education more effective in terms of its contribution toward the Christian growth of persons.

We have labored through our staff members on the conference, district, subdistrict and local levels, in order to achieve our goal. While this and other reports may reveal progress, it will also indicate that there remains "yet much land to be possessed."

HIGHER EDUCATION: In accord with the action of 1960 session of the Annual Conference, the Commission on Higher Education was merged with the Board of Education. The responsibilities formerly carried by the commission have been given to the newly created committee on Higher Education of the Board.

Dr. Walter R. Hazzard is chairman of the committee on Higher Education. Under his leadership we are continuing our work with the colleges and seminaries. We are grateful for the progress made in the campaign for Morristown College. We are committed to the completion of our campaign of \$15,000.00 for this institution. With \$10,500.00 having been paid, we are hopeful that we may pay the other \$4,500.00 by the end of the school year. Although Morristown College is no longer within the territory of the Baltimore Area, we feel that the Delaware Conference should still give financial support to it. A resolution setting forth this point of view is attached to this report.

There still remains much to be done in the area of *Student Work*. Our Methodist program at Maryland State College is progressing under the director, Rev. S. S. Tatem. Through the fine spirit of cooperation on the part of the college administration and staff, Rev. Tatem is effectively ministering to more than two hundred Methodist students.

Our plans are to have a similar program on the campuses of other schools within the territory of our conference. We likewise hope to have our local churches to more effectively serve Methodist students who attend colleges and

universities located in our large urban centers, such as Philadelphia, North Jersey and New York City.

Through the Methodist Student Movement of the Chesapeake Area we are helping to serve our Methodist students in some 17 state and private institutions. Our conference carries its equal share along with the Baltimore, Peninsula and Washington conferences, which make up the Commission. We are also affiliated with the New Jersey Methodist Student Movement. Mrs. Harvey Wynn is our representative on the commission.

Though we are able to award scholarships to a number of students each year who attend our colleges and seminaries, the available funds for this purpose are woefully inadequate. The amount paid in awards this school year was \$2,100.00.

CAMPING: Another area of our work which vitally affects the development of our youth is the program of camping. Our concern here is with the financial campaign which must support the camp development. We are about to close the first year of the three-year \$30,000.00 campaign. Informal reports indicate that Camp Development Day was successfully observed in most of our churches. Many individuals have pledged to give special donations for this cause.

The Architect's plans for the dining room-kitchen-lodge building are in the hands of the contractor. If funds are available we hope to begin construction in June. Some \$15,000.00 will be needed in order to construct the necessary buildings and otherwise provide for our camping program this summer.

SPECIAL DAYS: *Methodist Student Day* observance has shown an increase in the amount raised for the Methodist loan and scholarship fund. We are grateful to the Board of Lay Activities for *Layman's Day*, which for the past few years has been used to support our Schools and Colleges.

Church School Rally Day offering will be the largest that has been raised in any given year. We are still urging that *Student Recognition Day* be used as a day to help support our schools and colleges. *Race Relations Sunday* offering needs to be increased if we are going to give the support we would like to our work at Morgan Christian Center and at the same time help other institutions in our area. *Youth Loyalty Sunday* is rather new. This is an opportunity to give added emphasis to the Youth program. We are happy that through its observance we may help every local church to strengthen its youth program and at the same time give financial support to our conference program.

Camp Development Day. We are hopeful that this day will enable us to complete our camp development within a few years. Among the special days is the *Fourth Sunday World Service Observance*. Our conference has done an excellent job of raising these funds through the church school.

INTER-CONFERENCE WORK: Increasingly we are working with the Peninsula, Philadelphia, and other conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. Our first institute for Children's Workers was held jointly with the Philadelphia Conference in October. A number of joint projects on the youth level have been conducted during the year.

LEADERSHIP EDUCATION: We find a need to restudy some phases of our leadership education program with the hope of making it more effective. More local churches are doing a good job in this field.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT: We are grateful for the financial support given through the years. We are aware that those who support the work of Christian education must also meet other claims of the church. However, we conclude as we began this report by saying that education must underlie all phases of the church's program. To meet the demands made upon the Board of Education we need sufficient funds to move forward.

APPRECIATION: For the labors of the District Superintendents, the counsel of Bishop Love and the fellowship of co-workers on the conference and district staffs, I am most grateful. Words cannot express my indebtedness to my wife, our office secretary and constant companion, for her patience, devotion and faithful services. Thanks be to Him who has called us to our tasks, now and forever.

Recommendations

A—Higher Education

1. That we continue our asking of \$1.50 per member for the support of our schools, colleges and Wesley Foundations.
2. That we support from these funds the following institutions on the percentage basis as indicated: Morristown College, 25 percent; Bennett College, 25 percent; Wesley Theological Seminary, 20 percent; Gammon Theological Seminary, 5 percent; Wesley Foundation, Maryland State College, 10 percent; Morgan Christian Center, 5 percent; Wesley Foundation, Howard University, 3 percent; Allen High School, 2 percent; to develop new work at Delaware State College, 5 percent. Total—100 percent.
3. That we continue our efforts to organize new Methodist Student Work on other campuses within the territory of our conference.
4. That we support Morgan Christian Center with our Race Relation Day offering. Should this offering go beyond \$2,500.00 the remainder is to be given to other institutions in the area.
5. That we continue the observance of the following special days as a means of raising the \$1.50 per member for schools and colleges, Layman's Day, and Student Recognition Day.
6. That we give full support to the Chesapeake Area and the New Jersey Methodist Student Movements.

B—General Work

1. That we continue to support our campaign for Camp Development of \$30,000.00 over the period: 1960-1963.
2. That we enlarge our work in the area of Family Life.
3. That we give full cooperation to TRAFCO in setting up work in the area of Audio-visuals in the conference.
4. That we give fuller support to the Christian education work of the Council of Churches functioning within the territory of our conference.
5. That we give full financial support to all phases of the work of Christian education in the conference.

HOWARD A. BAILEY

Youth Director

This has been an exciting year. When we reported last year we had just concluded our Strategy Conference. It was our intent to draw in persons from across the conference to help us get a sense of direction for the future. Some of the major concerns which emerged were more use of audio-visuals, an emphasis upon Junior High Work, accelerate the camp project, provide more help in program planning for churches. These have been some of our guiding principles this year.

Training: We planned and carried out a leadership training project that provided each district director with a corps of five youth who could serve as a fellowship team to aid weak local churches. Each district held a summer enterprise ranging from 1 to 3 days in which the director shared either in planning or by carrying a program responsibility.

The Conference Assembly was in the words of the president "High in Youth-Adult Relationship." Nearly 200 persons were present at the assembly held at Delaware State College.

Adult Workers: While regular training opportunities are available through Christian Workers Schools we feel the need for additional opportunities. Hence we invited Rene Pino of the General Board of Education Staff to help us with a particular training for Junior High Workers. 50 persons availed themselves of this opportunity. Laura Hess of the Editorial Division will spend June 2-3 with us at Camphor in an effort to train persons who will be using the new Closely Graded Junior High materials next October. This conference is sponsoring a series of Adult Workers' Conferences in the fall of 1961.

Council Activities: To see the council at work under the leadership of Vernon Staten, the conference president, is a real joy. Under their guidance all programs are carried out. Special committees have planned a new constitution, program area seminars, assemblies, and conferences.

Special Program-Area Seminars: Christian Witness Missions were held in 4 places last summer involving 45 youth who made 523 calls, found 149 prospects and received 35 commitments.

A Social Concerns Seminar was held with the Philadelphia Conference. 11 youth and adults attended this meeting whose emphasis was Censorship or Control.

Camping: A dream nears reality. We are in the midst of a camping campaign to raise \$30,000.00 for shelters and equipment. Progress is slow but we hope steady. Camp Development Day materials to interpret this cause was shared in by the director who will co-direct some of the camping experiences this summer. Leadership training is continuing. We are recruiting leaders for two camps in 1961. A Senior High Camp and a Junior High Camp. Camping Committees have been set up on each district and we will share with them our concerns. Youth are members of these committees.

Welcome: We welcome Rev. George H. Outen, Mrs. Cora Selby, Mrs. Madeline Green to our staff succeeding Mrs. E. B. Armstead, deceased and Rev. C. E. Kiah and Edwin Ellis, transferred. A special tribute to Mrs. Armstead appeared in *The Informer* and our report to the Board of Education's Annual Meeting.

Missionary Education: We have a continuing emphasis, a special emphasis,

and a joint relationship with the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. Our theme at the Missionary Rallies which were held on all districts was "New Horizons." The giving to the Methodist Youth Fund increased but falls short of the goal of \$3,000.00. Four names are being submitted to the Society for consideration as a successor to Mrs. Lillian Brown who has served effectively for four years and must now retire according to the legislation of the society.

Regional and National Meetings: Seven persons representing three districts attended the Northeastern Regional Workshop. The director served as Dean of Men in 1960 and will serve as Dean in 1961. Both Vernon and I attended the National Conference of the Methodist Youth Fellowship in Nebraska. Charles Miller was elected by this group to the General Board of Education. I served on the staff of the National School of Moral Concerns for the General Board of Christian Social Concerns.

Finances: The final report for Youth Loyalty Sunday is not in. We have a concern at this point. We may have to rethink our whole program if the finances do not justify the work put in or the services rendered. We are aware of the tremendous growth of the youth population, the lack of communications which exist between youth and adults, the need for more and better trained adult workers, and the pressures faced by our youth as they grow into adulthood. Our recommendations seek to push us beyond our present work into new areas of concerns to help meet these and other needs.

Recommendations

1. That we seek to raise \$3,000.00 for the M. Y. Fund.
2. That we embark on a program of Stewardship Education for youth.
3. That we spend more time in the cultivation of those who make a commitment to a church related vocation.
4. That we seek to expand our use of Fellowship Teams.

I close with gratitude to Bishop Love, the Cabinet, the Members of the Board, Youth Council, along with the loyal folk who labor to make service a joy. My special thanks to my co-workers on the staff who labor untiringly in the cause to which we are committed.

8. BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Board of Evangelism of the Delaware Conference joins all boards and agencies of The Methodist Church in full participation of the Quadrennial Emphasis of Evangelism. To this end, we set ourselves aggressively in achieving the goals that have been set by the General Conference.

In order to accomplish what has been worked out by the Church and by the Conference Board of Evangelism, there must be unity of purpose and spirit on the part of laity and ministry. Having succeeded in this, the door is fully open to dynamic discipleship.

For the years of 1959 and 1960, there were no increases in membership of our conference according to the statistics for those two years. There was a loss of 0.7. For the ten years from 1950 to 1960, there was an increase in the membership of 13.6. Indiscriminate dropping of names from our church roll and the unwillingness to search for the loss is beginning to have its effect on our Conference.

The opportunities for evangelism are great in both rural and city areas of our Conference. It is true that many of our people have moved from the rural section to the city. But there are yet those in rural sections that are not saved. These we must bring to Christ and His Church. The city is teeming with thousands of our rural church members who have not connected themselves with any church. Many of our Methodist brothers and sisters are joining the Baptist Churches and other denominations. Certainly, we say, join the church of your choice. But we are convinced that no church has the program that our Methodist Church offers to the people. We must train workers in our local church and send them out to reclaim the lost and win the unsaved to Christ and His church.

The Conference-wide meeting that was held February 14, at Ezion Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware, on the Quadrennial Emphasis, was a challenge to the moral, spiritual, and intellect of each individual who attended that meeting.

The Board of Evangelism exists to supplement, strengthen and encourage Evangelism in each local church. The "fields are white."

Recommendations for your consideration:

A. That in the fall of 1961, we request the Bishop to set a time for Spiritual Life Retreat for Ministers.

Three Important Weeks in 1962

1. March 11-18—Week of Preparation for Every Methodist to become a personal Witness for Christ.
2. March 25-30—Week of Personal Evangelism.
3. April 15-22—Week of Worship, Baptism and Reception of New Members.

The Quadrennial program places a very heavy responsibility on the Board of Evangelism, the individual pastor and local church. The program being:

- a. Proclamation of the Faith—"Jesus Christ is Lord."
- b. Enlisting every Methodist to witness to this faith.
- c. Winning individuals and families to Christ.

9. BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

I am thankful to God to have this privilege to report the work covered this conference year.

The purpose of the Conference Board of Lay Activities is to deepen the spiritual life of the lay members of each church and to cultivate among them an increasing loyalty and interest that they may become an active working force in each local church.

We got off with a fine start at the seat of the Annual Conference by having a demonstration of an "Every Member Visitation." This has been stressed and we expect to continue until all members have a sense of responsibility to the total program of the local church.

We have potential leadership sitting in the pews Sunday after Sunday, but we do not try to win them. We must win leaders for the church just as we win leaders for other activities of life. Statistics show that only one church member out of three is active and further that only one man out of four is active. This presents a *MUST* program for 1961-1964, to win leaders, inactive members, man power and the unchurched for God and His church.

Commissions of the local church must be active. In order to have any local church functioning properly, it must have active the following commissions: Membership and Evangelism, Education, Missions, Stewardship and Finance, and Christian Social Concerns. Each of the commissions can be organized with a minimum of three persons.

Lay Speakers: In each local church, we would like to have at least one lay speaker, carefully selected and then approved by the Quarterly Conference. We hope that courses will be set up in several of our church related schools where lay speakers can be trained. This will be one of our concerns in this quadrennium.

Methodist Men Club: We are striving during this quadrennium to have an active Men's Club in each local church. "Man power with God's power" builds the church. Our Conference Director of Men's Work, Mr. Larry Jones is doing a fine job to that end.

Evangelism: If the influence of the church is to be felt in the community, each member must be a dynamic disciple of Jesus Christ. During the next decade, our goal will be to win the nominal members as well as the unchurched for Christ and His church.

Christian Stewardship and Finance: During this year under the direction of Rev. Joseph E. Dunn, we have made progress in Christian stewardship and finance. No church member can become a Christian steward until he realizes fully his responsibility to God and his fellowman.

Mid-Year Conference: For the last fifteen years, we have held on the conference level, a Mid-Year Conference for leaders of the Conference. Last year workshops were directed by leaders from the General Boards of Evangelism, Christian Social Concerns, and Stewardship and Finance. The Mid-Year meeting will be held this year September 15-17 at the Ambassador Hotel, Atlantic City, New Jersey.

May I thank the Bishop, untiring ministers and devoted laymen for their fine support in making this conference year successful.

The following are the properties to which the Delaware Conference holds legal title: Tioga Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa.; St. Matthew's Methodist Church, Linconia, Pa.; Coleman Memorial Methodist Church, Wilmington, Del.; Coleman Memorial Parsonage, Wilmington, Del.; and property near Centreville, Md., which is to be developed as a camp site by the Conference Board of Education. The deeds to the properties are kept in a safe deposit box at the Delaware Trust Company, Dover, Delaware.

11. BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The Board of Hospitals and Homes takes pride in presenting to the Conference our annual report. We are endeavoring to present our plans, progress, hopes and aspirations.

Certificate of Incorporation

The Delaware Conference Home for the Aged, Inc., received its Certificate of Incorporation from Elisha C. Duke, Secretary of State of the State of Delaware on the tenth day of February, A.D. 1961, at 9 o'clock A.M.

Narrative Prospectus for the Physical Plant for the
Delaware Conference Home for the Aged,
Dover, Delaware

At the direction of the Delaware Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, acting through the directors of the Home for Aged of the Delaware

Conference, the planning, construction, and operation of facilities to serve the aging of the Conference is under way.

The site now owned by the Conference is approximately 15 acres, located North 594 ft. and a depth of 1076 ft. The specific location of the facility on the site is yet to be determined, with a general agreement that the building be set back at least 150 ft.

This facility will provide congregate living in a Home for the Aged for a group of non-related elderly people of the Delaware Conference, attempting to provide a proper balance between the demands for the care of the feeble, the sick, and the mildly confused elderly residents on the one hand, and the genuine need for a healthy normal environment that gives the individual a sense of being "at home" on the other. A building alone, no matter well planned, cannot endow a home with the quality of life that its occupants want, nevertheless it has the potential for promoting that quality by its enabling provisions.

The actual operation would involve initial accommodation for approximately 60 residents with the mechanical systems, utilities, and all operational services in the physical plant, except living quarters, designed to support a future expansion of occupancy of approximately 100 residents. The structure will be one story only with the forms and materials carefully considered to in every way reflect a residential character. The building set back from Salisbury Road a substantial distance, will be linked by an access road for vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

The staff will have a separate dining area adjoining the kitchen, large enough to accommodate approximately 20.

A small chapel will be included to accommodate a small number of people and designed to allow its incorporation into the larger dining area. It shall include a stage for either services or when the altar is closed off, movies, entertainment, or lectures.

Residents' rooms will consist of 40 single rooms. All will have a private water closet and lavatory, and five of which will include a private bathtub or shower. Minimum clear room area will be 140 sq. ft. and minimum dimension 10'. In addition to this will be the bathroom, closet and storage. These are H.H.F.A. minimums and may be increased.

There will be ten double occupancy rooms, all of which will have a private water closet and lavatory and three of which will also, include a bath or shower. Minimum clear floor area 180 sq. ft. with 10' minimum dimension. Bathroom, closet, and storage in addition, again these are H.H.F.A. minimums.

Congregate bathing facilities for each sex will also be provided. This area will include space for assisted bathing of infirm residents with proper layout to accommodate this activity.

These are not optional obligations of the Church, they are essential parts of the Church's message, mission and witness. These deeds are best performed corporately through the Board of Hospitals and Homes and the Golden Cross Society. We can make plans, outline methods for carrying them forward, but without support of consecrated men and women will not get very far. THE COMMISSION ON INTER-JURISDICTIONAL RELATIONS

To: Council of Bishops and the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church

Enclosed is the "First Report of The Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations" adopted at the Washington, D. C. Meeting of April 28-29, 1961.

You will note that the Report urges a program which includes the re-alignment of the Jurisdictions by transfers from the Central Jurisdiction. It specifically commends for study, and implementation as soon as feasible, a series of transfers to four geographical Jurisdictions of Annual Conferences constituting particular Episcopal Areas of the Central Jurisdiction.

The Plan calls for no new legislation but urges that transfers be voluntary and under the provisions of Article IX. An important element of the Plan is the recommendation that particular transfers take place as soon as the merging units are prepared to act without delaying for action by the last of the geographical Jurisdictions.

To illustrate by reference to the first item A under Section II of the Report: If the Northeastern Jurisdiction and the Central Jurisdiction, acting through their respective Annual Conferences as provided in Amendment IX in their respective sessions being held during the next 12-month period, should act favorably the transfer of Bishop Love's Baltimore Area to Northeastern Jurisdiction could be accomplished before the end of 1962. The Report is based on the theory that such a transfer need not be delayed pending action by other Jurisdictions.

It is therefore in order that this matter be considered by each Annual Conference and such action taken as the particular Annual Conference may deem proper. The Report requests that the Commission be advised of the results of each Annual Conference consideration.

While the Report shows that the vote of the Commission was not unanimous, it may be noted that it received the unanimous support of the Commission members from the Central Jurisdiction.

FIRST REPORT OF
COMMISSION ON INTER-JURISDICTIONAL RELATIONS

I

The Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations submits this report to the Council of Bishops, the Conferences and the Church as the first step towards fulfillment of its task to accept "The continuing program of The Methodist Church to abolish the Central Jurisdiction, promote interracial brotherhood through Christian love, and achieve a more inclusive church" (Par. 2013, 1960 Discipline).

This goal should be reached as rapidly as possible by means of both short-range and intermediate steps which can be taken as necessary and possible in each case, depending on the local situation involved.

II

We, therefore, urge the following actions:

(1) The encouragement of all church members to develop individual friendships, mutual understanding, and actual experience in worshipping, cooperating and working together in matters of mutual concern without regard to ethnic background. This effort must be constructively planned and placed on a solid and continuing basis.

(2) The re-alignment of the Jurisdictions by the merging of the present Jurisdictions with appropriate Episcopal Areas, Conferences, or other units of the present Central Jurisdiction, as authorized by Amendment IX, to form new and enhanced Jurisdictional structures. This process will be voluntary and shall proceed at a schedule and in a manner dictated by the individual needs and desires of the merging units involved.

In our initial discussions, the following plan commended itself for reference to the Jurisdictions and Annual Conferences concerned for careful study and implementation as soon as feasible:

- A. To merge with the Northeastern Jurisdiction as a possible new area:
 - (1) Delaware Conference
 - (2) Washington Conference
 - (3) North Carolina Conference
- B. To merge with the North Central Jurisdiction as a possible new area:
 - (1) Central West Conference
 - (2) Lexington Conference
 - (3) Southwest Conference
- C. To merge with the South Central Jurisdiction as a possible new area:
 - (1) West Texas Conference
 - (2) Texas Conference
 - (3) Louisiana Conference
- D. To merge with the Southeastern Jurisdiction as a possible new area:
 - (1) South Carolina Conference
 - (2) Georgia Conference
 - (3) Florida Conference
- E. To merge with the Southeastern Jurisdiction as a possible new area:
 - (1) East Tennessee Conference

- (2) Tennessee Conference
- (3) Upper Mississippi Conference
- (4) Mississippi Conference
- (5) Central Alabama Conference

Note: In achieving the mergers suggested in the preceding plan (A, B, C, D, E) the re-alignment of Annual Conferences and Episcopal Area boundaries may be desirable.

(3) At a time when the last of the units comprising the present Central Jurisdiction has been transferred, that Jurisdiction will cease to exist and will be officially terminated as provided in Amendment IX.

(4) Later, the merger of Conferences within the re-constituted Jurisdictions should take place. This should proceed as soon as all Conferences affected are ready for this move.

(5) Ultimately—depending on the desires of the members concerned—it is hoped and expected that the final merger of individual congregations will become possible.

(6) Concurrently, all Boards, Commissions, colleges, hospitals, homes, bookstores and other Methodist institutions are urged to comply fully with the spirit and intent of the Statement on Race (Par. 2026, 1960 *Discipline*).

III

As part of this suggested plan, the principle shall be established that the stronger Conferences recognize their responsibility to assist the weaker ones in attaining as rapidly as possible better standards of program, ministerial training, salaries, pensions and similar goals.

Such help shall include a twofold plan of additional financial support: (1) Assistance to the newly merged Conferences to gradually upgrade their standards of pensions, salaries and ministerial training; (2) Assistance as may be necessary to the remaining part of the Central Jurisdiction for a continuation of the financial support previously carried by the Conference or other unit which had merged with the geographical Jurisdiction. It is anticipated that World Service and other apportionments will be adjusted accordingly.

Since the achievement of a fully inclusive Church is the concern of the whole Church, we recognize that the ultimate responsibilities for solving financial inequities must be assumed by the whole Church.

IV

The Commission requests that the bodies, to whom this report is addressed, report any actions or reactions which they deem will be of use to the future work of this Commission.

**CHRISTIAN BROTHERHOOD IN THE
NEW YORK AREA**

**Report and Recommendations from Ministers and Laymen in
the Delaware, Newark, New York, and New York East Conferences**

At the invitation of Bishop Edgar A. Love and Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke a meeting of Negro ministers in the Delaware, Newark, New York, and New York East Conferences, together with the District Superintendents involved and the Executive Secretary of The New York City Society was held on January 9th, 1960. This meeting suggested a further meeting to be enlarged by an equal number of white ministers and an equal number of laymen. A committee was appointed consisting of Charles L. Carrington, William C. Strother, Jr., Charles L. Warren, and Henry C. Whyman, Chairman.

A dinner meeting of the enlarged group was held at St. Paul and St. Andrew Methodist Church on Thursday evening, April 20, 1961, under the chairmanship of Rev. Charles L. Carrington. The program was as follows:

1. Summary statement by Rev. Charles L. Carrington.
2. Statements by Bishop Edgar A. Love and Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke.
3. Statement from the General Conference Commission of 36—Dr. Dean E. Richardson.
4. Group discussion.
5. General discussion—Dr. A. Dudley Ward, leader.
6. Recommendations and next steps—Henry C. Whyman.

The small groups were asked to confine their discussion to problems and opportunities in the utilization of Amendment IX for the voluntary transfer of Central Jurisdiction churches to contiguous Conferences in terms of the local churches and local Annual Conferences. Topics assigned were: Pensions, Apportionments, Representations on Boards and Committees, Apportionments to Local Churches, Services to Local Churches Through Boards, Committees and Agencies of the Conferences of the New York Area Fellowship and Supervision.

Resulting from the discussion came the following resolutions to be presented to the spring sessions of the Delaware, Newark, New York, and New York East Conferences:

Believing that a Christian witness with reference to brotherhood and the effectiveness of Methodist organization both require the early dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction, and in order to establish a pattern which might encourage other areas of the Northeastern Jurisdiction and indeed of The Methodist Church in general to take similar action, BE IT RESOLVED.

1. That the Newark, New York, and New York East Conferences at their impending sessions renew and reconfirm their cordial invitation to the 13 churches and 3 missions of the Delaware Conference located within the New York Area to unite with them. Further that these Conferences find creative ways of impressing upon Delaware Conference churches their earnest desire for a more intimate Christian fellowship.

2. That we urge the churches of the Delaware Conference within the New York Area to *present and secure favorable Quarterly Conference action on the use of Amendment IX* to unite with the other three Conferences.

3. Amendment IX is the legislation by which voluntary transfer of churches from the Central Jurisdiction to the geographical jurisdiction implies the gradual dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction. This involves a gradual weakening of the basic unit of Methodist organization, the Annual Conference. Upon the Annual Conference depends the welfare of its members—principally in terms of supervision and pensions. We believe that in justice to the churches and ministers of the Delaware Conference which do not elect to transfer or which are so located that it is not presently feasible to transfer—some adjustment must be made. While we envision the gradual diminution of the Delaware Conference membership, there must be no diminution of the services rendered the remainder of the Conference. They must not be permitted to pay a price for integration by personal sacrifice or less effective service and supervision.

BE IT THEREFORE FURTHER RESOLVED, that whenever a church transfers to another Conference under Amendment IX the Conference receiving that church and its minister obligates itself to pay to the Delaware Conference an amount equal to all apportionments placed upon that church by the Delaware Conference.

**“Problems of Race in The Methodist Church
in Metropolitan New York—New Jersey”**

An address to a selected group of ministers and laymen of The Delaware, Newark, New York and New York East Conferences, April 20, 1961, at The Methodist Church of St. Paul and St. Andrew, New York City.

We are met here to consider the possibility of bringing into organic union with the Newark, New York and New York East Annual Conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction those churches of the Delaware Conference, Central Jurisdiction, which lie within their bounds. Specifically, these Delaware Conference churches—

Within the bounds of the Newark Conference are:

- (Five churches)
- Clair Memorial, Jersey City
- St. Mark's, Montclair
- St. John's, Newark
- St. Matthew's, Newark, and
- St. John's, Orange

Within the bounds of The New York Conference:

(Two churches and one mission)
 Shaw Chapel Mission, Manhattan
 Trinity, White Plains, and
 St. Matthews, Ossining

Within the bounds of The New York East Conference:

(Six churches and two missions)
 Bethel (Mission), Brooklyn
 Grace (Mission), Brooklyn
 John Wesley, Brooklyn
 Newman Memorial, Brooklyn
 Redeemer, Brooklyn
 Brooks Memorial, Jamaica
 St. Luke's, New Rochelle, and
 Butler Memorial, Bronx

The grouping of Methodist Churches and institutions into two structural units, one based purely on race, is increasingly disturbing. The system is administratively wasteful. It makes for a divided witness and therefore a weaker witness for Christ, who would be Lord of all men. The mere acceptance of a racial factor as sufficient justification for a divided church fellowship fosters attitudes toward people—of bigotry on the one hand, and self-negation on the other—which are incommensurate with the Christian gospel of love, established ideals concerning brotherhood, and the religious concept of man's basic worth and oneness in Christ.

Apart from these "inner" compulsions, the pressures of public opinion in the local and world community make it imperative that the Christian church bring its practices on race into accord with its preachments on race if it hopes to maintain a position of moral leadership in the world.

On behalf of The Methodist Church it may be said, that her patterns of racial practices are reflective of patterns of racial practices in American life. Some, like Kyle Haselden, go so far as to point out that historically the American Protestant church has played a leading role in shaping the community patterns of racial practices. (See: "The Racial Problem in Christian Perspective.")

It is a matter of record that although Negro people played a leading role in the development of both the lay and ministerial strength of The Methodist Episcopal Church, they were segregated by that church into galleries, at separate communion tables, etc., as early as 1787. The segregation and discrimination in the church gave rise to the withdrawal of the groups of Negroes who formed the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 1816 and the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church in 1820. During all the years separate "Negro" Annual Conferences were maintained. As late as 1939, The Uniting Conference of The Methodist Church continued this pattern and adopted the Plan of Union which called for the segregating structure of The Central Jurisdiction as a part of the new constitution. This was deliberately done to the dismay of many liberals and over the violent protest of the large majority of its Negro constituents.

Whatever the responsibility the church, and specifically, The Methodist Church, might have had in shaping the patterns of racial segregation in the past, the church must make haste to mend her segregated ways lest she find herself far behind the rest of the community in facing up to what is perhaps the most critical moral issue of our time. Already it is a cliché: "Eleven o'clock on Sunday morning is the most segregated hour of the week."

In recent years The Methodist Church has become increasingly aware that its racial practices are untenable. Several General Conferences have produced and re-affirmed such statements as:

"There is no place in The Methodist Church for racial discrimination or racial segregation," and

"To discriminate against a person solely on the basis of his race is both unfair and unChristian."

The Central Jurisdiction itself has also acknowledged the need for its own demise—whatever its "advantages" might have been during these twenty-odd years of its existence. A resolution from its conference in Cleveland, Ohio, July 1960, said in part:

"that this Conference record its recognition of the inevitability of the abolition of The Central Jurisdiction as a racial unit in the structure of The Methodist Church, and do here express its willingness and intention to help develop satisfactory plans and procedures to abolish The Central Jurisdiction with as much speed as sound and satisfactory planning may permit, and to this end this Conference commits itself. . . ."

In substantiation of such pronouncements as these, The General Conference of 1956 took action looking toward the dissolution of The Central Jurisdiction. The action took two forms. One, a constitutional amendment, popularly called "Amendment IX," easing the means by which inter-jurisdictional transfers of churches might be made, and The Central Jurisdiction eventually dissolved; and secondly, the establishment of a Commission to Study and Recommend Action, Re. The Jurisdictional System, popularly called, "The Commission of 70."

The 1960 Conference followed this up with the appointment of a Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations ("Commission of 36"), basically to work toward the implementation of Amendment IX.

The recent General Conference also committed the church to a thorough-going exploration of factors in the life of the church and of the community with a view toward helping to create a climate, both in the church and in the community, whereby not only the structural changes of desegregating the church may be more easily facilitated, but whereby the spirit of true brotherhood may be increased within the fellowship of the church. A study and action program looking toward these ends has been developed in a conference just concluded in Louisville, Ky., under the joint sponsorship of the Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs of The General Board of Christian Social Concerns and The Department of Christian Social Relations of the Woman's Division of Christian Service of the Board of Missions. It is expected that program, once launched and promulgated throughout the church will give concrete evidence of

The Methodist Church's expressed intention to deal progressively and creatively with the problem of race, both in her own life and in the life of the community generally.

Since the enabling acts of the 1956 General Conference, local segments of the church have also taken steps looking toward a more inclusive fellowship. The Delaware Conference took advanced action to release any of its churches whenever they and an inviting conference agreed that they should transfer. The Northeastern Jurisdiction has extended an invitation to that part of The Baltimore Area, Central Jurisdiction, which lies within its bounds. The Baltimore Area has looked favorably upon the invitation and committees from both segments have begun discussions looking hopefully toward a union of all Methodist work in this geographical area as soon as possible.

In the same vein, it is heartening to note that in other sections of the country similar proposals for the transfer of churches are being offered and worked on. Not the least of these are the actions of the three conferences represented here seeking the inclusion of the racial churches of The Delaware Conference within their territory.

With such good intentions for movement coming from groups from both sides of the structural racial barrier, and, against the background of the church's pronouncements, and in view of the facilitating factors of Amendment IX, it would seem a small matter to effect the union we seek—especially as concerns the 13 churches and 3 mission stations which are our immediate concern. Quite to the contrary, there does seem to be considerable hesitancy to move under provisions of Amendment IX. As of the meeting of The General Conference in May, 1960, only 8 Negro churches had transferred to overlapping geographical conferences, and action with respect to 39 other churches was described as being in a state of "suspended animation." That which on the surface would seem to be a mutually desired and "simple" thing to do is simply not being done. It may be well for us to attempt to understand why.

Some Problems

Admittedly, there are some problems involved. One of these deals with the accusation that Negroes do not wish to abolish The Central Jurisdiction, because it offers them episcopal offices and other special jobs. We assume the prerogative of saying that it is our sober judgment that members of The Central Jurisdiction generally do not want to continue the separate racial jurisdiction purely because it gives opportunity for jobs and positions of leadership they might not otherwise have. Frankly, the latest records available show that of the 350,000 Negroes in The Methodist Church, there are about 25 persons holding paid positions—including Bishops, active and retired!

Dr. James P. Brawley, a lay member of The Central Jurisdiction, and a member of "The Commission of 36," speaks of "advantages" of The Central Jurisdiction to the Negro in the church. He relates these more to the advantage of representation at the program and policy making levels of the general church by virtue of the structure which gives the Negro the right to be present at such levels. He adds:

"The importance of representation does not rest in office-holding positions, as desirable as these are, but rather in the necessity of being a

part of policy and program making bodies at top levels where decisions are made and destinies determined."

"Advantages" or not, however, The Negro Methodist is embarrassed by the fact of a separate arrangement for him, and if he can be assured of a reasonable degree of status, both in his own sight and in the church at large, he would quickly forego such questionable privileges of "special-class" citizenship in the church community, and lose his life in the larger stream of a truly inclusive fellowship. He only wants to be sure that the proposed desegregated structure of The Methodist Church offers him the hope of a fellowship of service and love that is inclusive in a truly Christian way.

Having cleared, we hope, the myth of the Negro's desire to continue The Central Jurisdiction for its benefits to him, it would be well to consider certain other more real factors in the hesitancy to implement Amendment IX.

One of these is the problem of what is at times called, "fragmentation." The basic problem for the church is that of first dissolving the Central Jurisdiction which is not only a "symbol" of segregation, but as a structural unit in the constitution of the church is segregation in fact.

The question that arises when the issue of the transfer of a single church or a group of churches such as we have in prospect here is—what bearing does this local action have on the over-all problem of dissolving the jurisdiction as a whole?

Admittedly, with sectional attitudes, both in the church and in communities being what they are, it would appear that it could hardly be expected that the church could desegregate throughout at one fell stroke. It is obvious that The General Conference would not attempt to "force" desegregation by constitutional amendment beyond the provisions of Amendment IX. There is a concern, however, lest the transfers of one or more churches in those areas where this arrangement is now mutually desirable might leave the "satisfied" groups on both sides free from the pressures of the more progressive elements in the church—and thus delay rather than hasten the dissolution of the Jurisdiction as a whole.

Others feel that a move anywhere, and to any extent, will of itself serve as an incentive for progressive desegregation in other more conservative areas of the church community. Either of these opinions as to what would actually happen is largely a matter of conjecture. It does appear, however, that in the absence of some stated goals concerning a progressive and early dissolution of the whole of the Central Jurisdiction, there is likely to be little willingness on the part of churches and conferences of the Central Jurisdiction to move. Candidly, Negroes know that the fact of the racially structured Central Jurisdiction in the life of the church is an embarrassment to The Methodist Church. For the most part, they are unwilling to remove themselves from the "bargaining" position of membership within the jurisdiction until certain other assurances are given concerning the church's ultimate plans for their security and welfare as a group within the Methodist fellowship.

It is impossible for anyone to speak "for the Negro"—to say categorically, "what the Negro wants." For, "The Negro and what the Negro wants," are as varied as the varied likenesses and wants of any group of people. Having lived with the problem of segregation in The Methodist Church for so long, and

having discussed many aspects of it over and over in many groups and with many persons from varied sections of the nation, it may be possible to say that there seems to be one trend developing which offers the prospect of finding a fair degree of acceptance by a significant segment of Negro Methodists. We venture this with caution: An apparent willingness to accept the principle of transfers provided that, except for isolated Negro churches

1. the transfers be made in large blocks such as conferences or areas;
2. provided also that prior arrangement is made concerning the responsibilities to be borne by the remaining parts of such areas or conferences, so that no undue hardship occurs; and
3. providing that these moves be a part of an over-all plan for the speedy dissolution of the whole of the Central Jurisdiction; and
4. that in such moves union be effected in the spirit of "reorganization" of Methodist work in the area rather than in the spirit of "absorption" of Negro churches and institutions *into* the framework of existing "white" conferences.

These provisions need not be considered formidable, and should certainly not be judged to be "stalling tactics." Closely examined with open-mindedness, merit can be found in each of these provisos which could be in the interest, both of the welfare of the future church, and of the Negro constituents within it. Certain persons have expressed the intention of seeking General Conference and Central Jurisdiction Conference approval of a plan to re-set the Conference and Area boundaries within the Central Jurisdiction in such a way as to facilitate large-block decisions for movement as well as the local church Annual Conference levels of authority in voting transfers as now exist under Amendment IX.

Under such an arrangement, movement could be effected without incurring the knotty problems and hardships involved in the fragmentation of Annual Conferences. Such an arrangement would also make more possible the coordinate movement of large segments of The Central Jurisdiction toward a speedy, orderly and complete dissolution.

In all these movements—and indeed in the one contemplated here, there are other problems to be worked through. Some of these are of practical concern to each Annual Conference involved. Among them are such things as pension rights, minimum salary scales and educational standards.

Regarding pension matters, a communication from The General Board of Pensions indicates that the varying annuity rates of the 4 conferences here represented are:

Newark	\$62.00
New York	50.00
New York East	60.00
Delaware	32.00

Each of the conferences operates under the same type of pension program wherein the money for distribution to claimants is raised a year at a time. The communication continues:

"We do not believe the transfer of the number of churches you mentioned would be a great problem for the Northeastern Jurisdiction Conferences. We do think, on the other hand, that such a transfer might have

effect on The Delaware Conference pension program, since the transfer of these churches from The Delaware Conference would mean that hereafter, their apportionment for conference claimants would go to support the pension program of the conferences to which they had transferred. . . . However, there would be a fewer number of churches left in The Delaware Conference to support their current income pension program."

Minimum salary funds in the several conferences would probably be affected in the same way as pension funds.

As for educational standards, it is believed that there should be no problem of the Delaware Conference pastors meeting the regular requirements of the other conferences. A recent recording of these qualifications was considered by Bishop Newell as being far and above the average of the Area.

On this point, and on any other—and I think that I speak the sentiments of all the men here involved—we would not want to enter the fellowship of these or any annual conference on a special proviso. We would like to enter and work our way through purely on the basis of merit. We would further want, of course, that when on the basis of merit, advancement or opportunities should be granted us, we would not want them withheld from us purely on the basis of our race. We have been both men and Methodists, duly regarded as such by ourselves and our constituents. We, nor our congregations, would want to be judged as anything less in a wider fellowship of Methodist ministers and laymen.

We have mentioned many problems which underlie the immediate and general issue before us today. We could perhaps mention others which are of varying degrees of concern to interested parties here: such as itineracy, promotions, basic attitudes of acceptance and hostility, special "dos" and "don'ts" in harmonious race relations—the problem of "absorption of churches" vs "reorganization of Methodist work"—and many more.

We raise these problems not as deterrents to action, but as possible stumbling blocks which they might otherwise be, in the hope that if we see them, we may surmount them as we seek to walk together in Methodism along one common road.

14. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

One of the great needs of the church is to enlist youth who will commit themselves to the Christian way of life in their vocations. A Christian vocation has been defined as "The vocation of any Christian who has sought diligently to discover God's will for his life, who seeks to make it a way of serving God and his fellow man." From this group we are to recruit persons who will serve the church. "Church vocations are various positions of appointment and employment by the church such as the ministry, missionary service, directors of Christian education, deaconesses, church musicians, etc.

While our commission has worked in the general area of Christian vocations, our major concern has been in enlisting and guiding youth in the area of church related vocations. We have made a compilation of the figures which give a picture of our conference ministerial membership over the period of ten years from 1950-1960.

It will be noted that we have counted those "received on trial" but not those "received into full connection." To have counted both would have resulted in a duplication in the final count of two or more years. It will be noted that not once in the ten year period did we have a net gain. On the other hand in 1957 we suffered a net loss of 11. During the ten years the net loss was 41 effective members.

In 1951 we had 119 members in full connection with 3 on trial or a total of 122. In 1960 we had 100 members in full connection with 7 on trial or a total of 107. Here we have a loss of 15. At the present rate of decrease in membership in full connection by 1970 we will have just enough members to fill 50 percent of the 168 pastoral charges of the conference.

This has happened in spite of our efforts to enlist more young men since 1950. Here is the record of only one church related vocation. We may note that during the past decade we have not had a missionary commissioned to serve overseas. We have not as yet had a youth to be certified as a Director of Christian Education, though we have two who are in the process of becoming certified. We have not had a deaconess to be consecrated during this period.

These statements are made for the purpose of lifting up the urgency of our putting forth a greater effort to enlist youth in these and other church related vocations. If we fail here we shall fail to safeguard the future leadership of our church. We shall likewise fail to give to many youth an opportunity to find life fulfillment in a vocation which is not only Christian, but which at the same time becomes an avenue of service to the church.

Our commission has promoted church related vocations by encouraging local churches to carry out Christian vocations programs. We have worked with the districts in youth meetings and with the Conference Summer Youth Assembly, counseling and challenging youth in the area of vocations. From these sources we have added new persons to our list. The following is our

present record: The Pastoral Ministry, 51; Missions, 31; Nursing, 18; Christian Education, 3; Church Music, 1; Social Worker, 10. Total—114.

Each year we send a special communication to the college seniors who have indicated an interest in a church related vocation. This has reference to the ministry. Our purpose is to give guidance in the selection of a theological seminary for those going into the ministry and similar help for those choosing missions, etc.

The 1960 General Conference established Ministry Sunday, May 21, 1961. Every local church will observe this day by lifting up the ministry and seeking to enlist young men. (1960 *Discipline*, Par. 296.d).

We sponsored jointly with the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, the Conference on The Ministry and Missions during the Christmas Season. We had 21 young men and women present.

At the Ordination Service of the 1960 session of the Annual Conference 10 young candidates for the ministry were present to be presented to Bishop Love.

Recommendations

1. That each local church organize a committee on Christian Vocations (see *Discipline* Par. 145.9).
2. That Ministry Sunday be observed in every church (see *Discipline* Par. 296.2d).
3. That each district set up a committee on Christian Vocations.
4. That the challenge to young people in the area of church related vocations be made at all youth meetings held on the conference and district levels.
5. That we seek every opportunity to cooperate with the public schools and other institutions in the promotion of career days.
6. That we work with the colleges which are within the territory of our conference to the end of acquainting students with the opportunities in the field of church related vocations.
7. That a course on counseling youth in Christian vocations be offered in the subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools.

15. TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

Throughout Methodism, education is indicated as the key word. This year, your Town and Country Commission has endeavored to enter upon a campaign whereby more of us may become possessors of greater degrees of know-how.

October 18-20, 1960, Chairman Chancy attended the National Convocation of the church in Town and Country, at Denver, Colorado. The Commission sent the Rev. W. H. Greene to a Seminar on Extension Education for Agricultural Missionaries, held in Washington, D. C., February 28-March 9, 1961.

At Princess Anne, Maryland, October 12, 1960, we heard reports from the districts and committed ourselves to a campaign of re-vamping the charges, as needs indicate, through the leadership of the Superintendents and the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work.

An in-service training program was set forth in a resolution, offered by the Rev. Charles Carrington, to be considered by this Conference.

District Activities

The Easton District under the leadership of C. L. Trader, assisted by the Rev. E. A. Hughes, and Bro. Dewey Townsend, held a three-day convocation, with singing, Youth Group meetings, Work Shops, highlighted by Evangelistic preaching by the Rev. C. W. Derrickson and Bishop A. P. Shaw.

In Dorchester County, Md., a Regional Convocation was held on the same order. Cordova, Chapel, Miles River and Oxford charges have been re-vamped.

In the Salisbury District, Superintendent J. W. Elbert, assisted by the Rev. W. H. Greene, is beginning a program that will be far-reaching. Included are the charges of Exmore-Keller, Wachapreague and Leemount, having nine churches involved. Here, we have leadership. Here, we have a program. We only need to answer the call otherwise.

Recommendations

1. That the churches of the Delaware Conference observe May 7 as Rural Life Sunday.
2. That the churches of the Conference hold Harvest Home Festival in connection with Thanksgiving.
3. That Town and Country churches of our conference organize Farm and Home Committees.
4. That the Board of Missions, Board of Education, Conference W.S.C.S., Board of Lay Activities, Board of Evangelism, and Conference Youth Fellowship choose representatives to work with the Commissions on Town and Country Work, and send their names and addresses to Augustus Chancy as early as possible after this session of the Conference.

5. That, in view of the critical situation with respect to the shortage of ministers specifically trained for and committed to the Rural Ministry, Resolved that (a) The Annual Conference be requested to set up an Inter-Board Committee on recruitment, training and commitment of ministers to the Rural Ministry; (b) That the new board have representation from the existing Boards of Missions, Ministerial Training, Education (Scholarship Committee) and Town and Country Commission; (c) That it promote a special effort of recruiting and training, to advise with the Cabinet replacement, to encourage established pastors to remain in Town and Country, to seek improvement in salary arrangements and in such other factors which will lead toward a more stable Rural Ministry; (d) That the District Superintendent and District Committee would effect mergers wherever and whenever they seem advisable and report the same to the Town and Country Commission, calling upon the Commission to augment their efforts in an advisory capacity.

16. TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION (TRAFCO)

"Television, radio, and films used in Christian communication are more than mere techniques or gadgets. They are the incarnation of God's message of salvation for the lost and lonely and the forsaken. They are the source of truth and knowledge for growing minds in the classroom." According to Harry Spencer, General Secretary of TRAFCO, this is the spirit and purpose—the vision of the tremendous opportunity assigned to the conference commission. This report encompasses the work done, and plans initiated to fulfill these purposes and opportunities.

Organization

An organizational meeting was held during the year. Additional persons, whose experience and training qualify them for this work, were elected to the

Conference Commission. Careful attention was given to insure representation from all districts and all television and radio market areas of our conference. We are a service agency to other boards and agencies. Consequently, many boards and agencies are represented in the TRAFCO organization. We will consult and work with any agency of our conference attempting to use any of the mass means of communication in their program. Several members of our commission have been appointed to the radio and television committee of the various Councils of Churches in our conference area. We will continue working to have our conference represented on all of these committees dealing with television and radio.

Audio-Visuals

One of our major purposes is to provide audio-visual training for our conference. Our specific aim for this year is to have each district set aside a portion of one of their meetings (preacher's meetings, etc.), for the purpose of audio-visual training. Such training will include the selection and evaluation of audio-visual materials, proper purchasing and use of audio-visual equipment, and effective presentation of audio-visual materials.

In cooperation with the Board of Education, some preliminary plans were devised to establish a conference library of audio-visuals. We plan to loan to churches filmstrips at a nominal fee. We are ready to become the distributors for filmstrips purchased by other boards and agencies. Any church that may desire to place materials in the library may do so. Such a library will bring an increased use of audio-visuals and also reduce the costs for persons and churches using the materials. As soon as adequate materials are secured, a listing will be made available to all groups.

Children's TV Series

General TRAFCO of The Methodist Church has already completed the pilot program of a new children's television series. During this Annual Conference Session a group will preview this presentation and consider ways to promote this important series.

Radio and Television

We are appreciative of the work that some of our ministers and lay persons are now doing in radio and television. We hope to increase the opportunities by which our clergy and laity may appear in radio and television productions. For any group of ministers who are seeking to become more effective in radio and television programming, we will provide a training meeting.

We will cooperate with all sponsors that will place good religious programs on radio and television. We will publicize and promote those programs of special interest to our Methodist churches.

Finances

We feel the need to clearly define the manner in which the work of General TRAFCO and Conference TRAFCO is supported financially.

The Television-Radio Ministry Fund is the only means by which General TRAFCO of the Methodist Church is able to produce radio and television programs. No World Service money on apportionment is available for this

purpose. The Television-Radio Ministry Fund is a World Service Special, and therefore a voluntary gift. The funds are give to General TRAFCO so that programs may be produced in a professional manner and then returned to the Annual Conference and local communities for use. While an apportionment may not be made to an Annual Conference, the Annual Conference may elect to make this item an apportionment and write it in its apportioned budget to the churches. At present, it remains in our conference budget as a non-apportioned item under General and Conference Benevolences. (See Section II, item 9.) We are not recommending that it become an apportioned item at this time, but we strongly urge all of our churches to receive a special offering or contribute in some manner to the Methodist Television-Radio Ministry Fund. Without such funds, future programs such as *The Pastor*, *The Way*, *Talk Back*, and the *Children's Television Series*, cannot be produced.

The fund for our Annual Conference use will be known as Television, Radio, and Film Commission (TRAFCO), and is included in our apportioned non-ratio askings. (II, 31.) These funds are the means by which we hope to accomplish the work as set forth in this report. We are confident that the membership and churches of the Delaware Annual Conference will not fail to give adequate support to this new frontier in the proclamation of the gospel.

17. COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Commission strives to promote the interest of worship within the bounds of the conference, and to foster the use of the best resources for worship at our conference meetings and in all the churches of the conference. We are promoting the use of *The Book of Worship* and *The Methodist Hymnal* in all the churches of the conference by planning and promoting seminars and demonstrations on ways of worship and the use of hymns within the bounds of the conference.

We hope to provide exhibits at the conference session next year in the fields of architecture, church appointments, etc. We shall cooperate with the Board of Education and National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians in promoting seminars and other conferences on church music.

The Commission recommends:

1. That the pastors make full use of the Orders of Worship found in the Hymnal and additional services in the Book of Worship.
2. That where it is possible, our churches use worship bulletins.
3. That pastors use the *Marriage Manual* and *In Holy Matrimony* for careful counseling with those who are to be married; and take special care in choosing the proper music for weddings and funerals.
4. That pastors study the great hymns of the Church and seek to lead their choirs and congregations into the highest quality of worship and with great hymns of faith.
5. That seminars on Worship be held on district, sub-district, and local church level for the purpose of promoting and developing meaningful and spiritual worship.

19. DELAWARE CONFERENCE HISTORY

During the current year with Reverend Joshua E. Licorish as Editor-in-Chief, the goal has remained ever before us: The writing of "an accurate, readable, interesting account of the signal events, the struggles and the progress of the great, historic Delaware Conference."

There has been strict adherence to the outline and modus operandi adopted while Reverend Walter R. Hazzard was Editor-in-Chief and approved by this body on submission of reports to the ninety-fifth and ninety-seventh sessions. (Official Journal 1957, page 143, and Official Journal 1959, page 165.)

That progress has been slow can in large measure be traced to the weight and diversity of responsibilities—in the main, church-connected—that rest upon the sixteen Editors charged with this much needed, long awaited, technical task.

Editor-in-Chief Licorish was host to one staff meeting of the year at Zoar Church, February 19, 1961. Additional research material incident to Chapter I "Methodism comes to the Negroes of The Delaware Conference Area" (prior to 1852) and Chapter II "Pre-conference Organizations" (1852-1864) was submitted and/or reported by Editors Briddell, McMurray, Licorish and Jason. Chapter IV, "Progress and Later Developments," is being rewritten by Editor Webb. Chapter V, "Contemporary History," by Editor Ridout was submitted as a complete draft subject to revision and editing.

It was legislated to make a final appeal to this, the ninety-ninth session for such additional significant documents and historic items as may have been unearthed.

20. CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION COMMITTEE

Recommendations

1. Begin the celebration in 1963 with a testimonial banquet to our retiring Bishop.

2. That we request our Bishop in consultation with the College of Bishops, to set the date of the 1964 session of the Delaware Conference so that it will not conflict with other conferences of the jurisdiction.

3. That the Conference will officially open on Tuesday evening with Communion Service and a choir of one hundred or more voices. The procession to be led by our Bishop, president of the Council of Bishops, other Methodist bishops, bishops of other denominations, other denominational leaders, and ministerial and lay delegates of the Delaware Conference.

4. That we invite representatives from each of the sixteen Annual Conferences, representatives from the Northeastern Jurisdiction and other denominational leaders.

5. That a person be paid to write the history of the Conference for publication.

6. That we attempt to secure both national and international speakers for the celebration.

7. That on Friday night, we have a pageant depicting the growth and development of the Conference.

8. That on Saturday night we have Youth Night with a choir of one hundred or more youth and a youth representative from each district to speak on a given subject for about five minutes.

9. That we have a conference hymn. The hymn to be written by any member of the Delaware Conference except those of the original or main committee. This to be done in the form of a contest with three awards given for the best hymns according to the decision of the judges. First—\$100; second—\$75; third—\$50; fourth—honorable mention.

10. That a budget of \$2,500 a year be allowed the committee for the following purposes: promotion, awards, special programs and incidental expenses. If there is a balance it would be turned over to Reserve Pension Fund.

11. Goals: 1. By 1964 total lay membership reach 50,000.

2. By 1964 total active ministers reach 115.

3. To start two new congregations by 1964. Place to be determined by a committee with consultation with the Board of Missions.

4. That we raise \$105,000 by 1964 to assist in starting new congregations (\$35,000 each year for 3 years). This will be a part of the Promotional Fund Campaign Committees will help to promote.

5. The following Churches whose obligations to the Board of Missions are guaranteed, try to be self-supporting by 1964.

DELAWARE CONFERENCE

(Dunleith, Linconia, Tioga, and Community, West Philadelphia.)

6. Request that the Cabinet and each Superintendent on the Dover, Easton and Salisbury Districts, arrange for at least one \$5,000.00 appointment on each district if it has to take the combination of two or more churches.
7. Ask each church to set a goal for itself including the improvement of its properties.**
8. Each District to have a program at District Conference during the fall of 1963, lifting up 1964 CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION.

C. Other Reports

1. WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

It is with deep humility and gratitude to our Heavenly Father, and the loyal support of the conscientious women and pastors of the Delaware Conference, that I submit my third report.

It was at my very first Conference Executive Meeting in 1958, that I quoted these words of John Oxenham:

“For all who share the road with me,
Must share with all upon it;
So make we all one company,
Love's golden cord our tether,
And come what may, we'll climb the way.
Together, aye, together.”

And, *that* is what these noble women have been doing.

Our five district Presidents and the Secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild have reported progress along many, *many* lines of work. There is a strong tie that binds these two organizations. We have tried to follow suggestions of the Jurisdiction, and have passed on all materials received from the Woman's Division of Christian Service. We have been privileged to begin the new

Quadrennium with the General Church theme, "Jesus Christ is Lord," with the Board of Missions, adopting "Our Mission Today," as the quadrennial emphasis. We accept this great challenge to promote the four major emphases: (1) The Faith That Compels Us; (2) Factors That Confront Us; (3) Frontiers That Call Us; (4) The Program That Unites Us in Witness and Service.

Throughout the Conference the Twentieth Anniversary was 100%. It was my privilege to witness four out of the five celebrations. They were unique, original, and a great deal of information and inspiration resulted. It has been a joy to visit all five districts this year.

Officers' Training Day and Educational Seminars were conducted on each district. The four approved Study Courses have first place. A new interest in our responsibility for Missions—Home and Foreign is seen on every hand. New societies and added membership have been realized.

The World Bank though smaller in size, yielded an increase. Our \$13,000 Mission Budget will be met. Mrs. Ruth Webb, our worthy Conference Treasurer submits this statement and I copy it verbatim:

I have examined the accounts of Ruth M. Webb, Treasurer of the *Woman's Society of Christian Service, Methodist Church, Delaware Conference, for the period from June 1, 1959 to May 31, 1960*, and in my opinion, subject to the foregoing comments, the accompanying statement reflects the receipts and disbursements, and the cash balance at the end of the period.

I. MAXMILIAN MARTIN, Accountant and Auditor

Our Conference Project, "Friendship House," improves slowly. There are many things to be done.

The School of Missions grows in numbers and interest. An exchange of delegates with the Philadelphia Conference School of Missions continues. Our faculty as usual was A No. 1—Miss Thelma Stevens, Mrs. Bernice Masters, Mrs. L. H. Hazzard, Rev. Henry Nichols, Rev. Edwin Ellis and our Clinic Teachers were well prepared and did a marvelous job.

It was my privilege to attend the Wesleyan Service Guild week-end. It was graced with the presence of Miss Velma Geter of the Division and Mrs. Redmon of the Jurisdiction. The "Miss Wesleyan Service Guild Contest," brought in enough to liquidate a debt for the renovation of Friendship House kitchen. Other points were: growth in spiritual living, use of prescribed literature, two new Guilds and all units reporting.

I must mention the increased sale of literature. Long before the close of our School of Missions, Guides, Handbooks, Annual Reports, Approved Study Books, Program and Worship Books were sold.

Our executive meetings are mostly 100% in attendance and business is conducted in a Christian spirit.

Some of our Secretaries of different lines of work were privileged to attend Jurisdiction and Conference Schools of Missions.

Special days were observed on all districts.

We are aware of *this fact*—that all areas have not progressed as fast as others, but progress is being noticeably made. "Thanks be to God," that a realization of Matthew 19:14 has entered the heart of an interested Christian.

Our success is the Delaware Conference's success.

We press forward with this, as our prayer:

Lord, give us today a renewed vision of the world, Your Field. Show us the opportunities in our churches, our homes, our communities, and to the ends of the earth. Stir us to be ever exercising for your Kingdom's extension. *Please, Lord, Begin with me.*

2. THE ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

We recommend that our Annual Conference Area percentages be adjusted as follows:

Delaware Conference—40% (formerly 34%)
 Washington Conference—40% (formerly 34%)
 North Carolina Conference—20% (same)
 (East Tennessee Conference was 12%)

We recommend further that the Annual Conferences make these percentages retroactive as of the 1960 fiscal year, as we have received no support from the East Tennessee Conference this year.

The Area Council recommended a \$1,000 increase in the budget for 1961-1964.

The Area budget for the quadrennium was adopted by the Council and passed on to the Annual Conferences for adoption. The total is \$16,000 annually. The remaining \$4,000 required to operate the Area Office comes from General Promotion funds.)

We urge the Annual Conferences to help execute successfully the group insurance plan operative in the three conferences. (The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company has paid promptly all claims of deceased pastors to date: eight in Delaware Conference, one in Washington Conference. There have been no deaths among active pastors in the North Carolina Conference since the plan went into effect, September 1, 1959.)

We recommend that the annual Ministers' Wives Retreat be continued as a major promotional project.

We recommend that *The Messenger* be more adequately supported by our constituency through annual subscriptions.

The Area Office is the center from which the life stream of our total Area program flows. We are anxious to serve the Area, through conferences, seminars, workshops, retreats and other ways. Please call upon us. Please read our mail and area paper—and please help us make Christian fellowship genuine among the people whom we serve—for we are indeed one in Christ.

3. PHILADELPHIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Nearly 600 congregations of twenty-four denominations, including our own, are members of the Greater Philadelphia Council of Churches. Through it we not only provide to ourselves services which enhance our work, but we also render a ministry which could not be carried on except through our co-operation with other denominations. In the past year the Council performed 40 functions in which we had some share. As illustrations of these activities we would like to point out the following:

TELEVISION AND RADIO: A quarter of a million dollars worth of free time was donated to the Council by the twenty radio and television stations in the area so that we could broadcast religious programs. These included programs for children and adults; discussion programs and many relating to social issues and problems.

SCOUT RELIGIOUS AWARDS: The Council encourages both Boy and Girl Scouts to work for the religious awards available to them in their Scout troops. This brings them into personal contact with their clergymen and teaches them the beliefs and history of their own church. During the summer full-time chaplains are employed by the Council in the four Boy Scout camps.

REFERRAL SERVICE: The Council provides every clergyman with a guide to the social service agencies and resources of the community through which he can help those of his parish who may be in need. However, each year nearly 1,000 calls are made to the Council office by ministers whose problems of assisting parishioners are so complicated that the guidance of skilled staff there is needed.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS: Last spring, as every spring, the Council trained hundreds of teachers in the use of the curricula for summer vacation Bible schools. This enables our churches to put on more helpful programs during the summer period.

CHURCHES IN REDEVELOPMENT AREAS: Through the Department of Research and Planning of the Council future provision for churches in areas of the city being redeveloped is made. This enables our congregations to make sure that there is ample provision for their location or re-location once an area has passed through the process of development. The Redevelopment Authority depends upon the Council for guidance and advice in making adequate provision for churches.

These are but illustrations of the typical activities of the Council carried on in behalf of all our churches to the support of which we have never yet done our full part. Adequate support would mean that member churches should be contributing approximately 1% of their annual income—1¢ from every dollar received. It is the hope of those of us who have been associated on the Board of Directors of the Council that this more adequate support will reflect our genuine approval of this work in which we share responsibility.

4. DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

It has been a privilege to serve as one of the lay representatives from the Delaware Conference to the Delaware State Council of Churches and an honor to have been chosen by the Council to serve a three year term as a member of the Executive Board.

The Council was organized in October, 1959. During the first Convocation and General Assembly, the Constitution was ratified by the various denominational judicatories and the Council was declared duly organized.

During the first year, the Articles of Incorporation were drawn up and approved by the civil authorities. A bank account was established to receive \$3,450 of preliminary contributions from the denominations. The fiscal agent

was founded. Office equipment has been purchased and office space has been made available by the Presbyterian Church in Dover, Delaware. A part-time secretary has been employed for service to the Council.

In the initial budget askings to operate the Council, 1959-60, our Conference was asked to contribute \$1,000 based on membership, but through some lack of understanding, we did not fulfill our obligation. There seems to have been the question as to the source from which the contribution would come. I explained the matter fully to the World Service Commission at its Annual Meeting on March 25, 1961 and my report was very cordially received. This year, our apportionment asking is only \$100.00, but we need the \$1,000 requested for the previous years' operations to clear the deficit. We would be very grateful to the Delaware Conference if it will contribute \$1,100 for 1960-61 operational expenses.

The work of the Council will be engaged in two major areas as a beginning program; more intensive work with migrant laborers and the securing of a chaplain for the Delmar Area who will work in corrective institutions and at the regional Boy Scout Camp. A number of smaller ventures will develop during the ensuing year.

One of the principal values of the Council has been the steadily growing friendship among those who have been working together across parochial, denominational, racial and county lines. Oneness with each other has been developing and in this we are sure that our oneness in Christ, our Lord, has become ever more real.

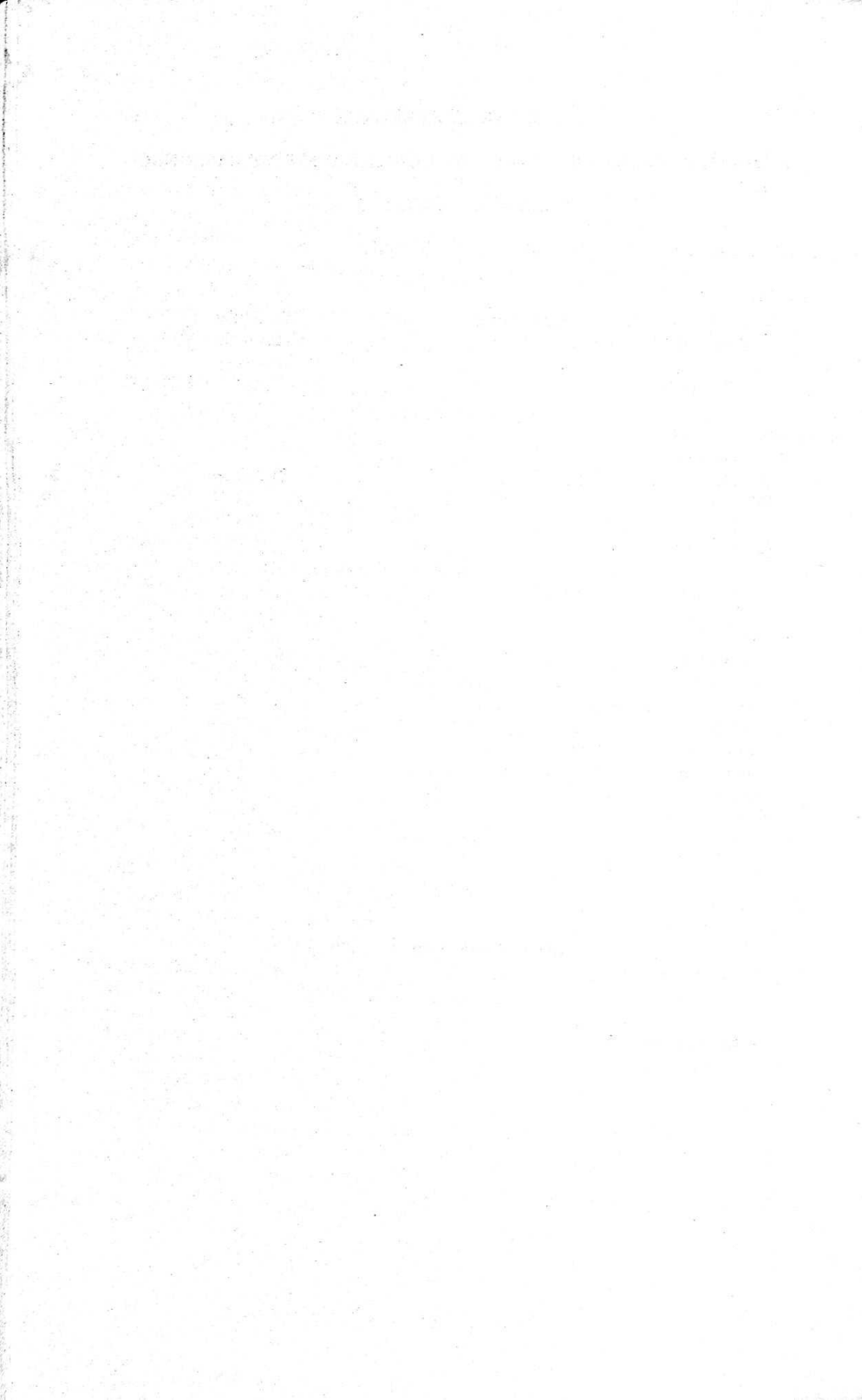

VII. Memoirs

ELMER WENDELL DEAN



Sixty-eight years ago, in the village of Slateville, North Carolina, life began for Elmer Wendell Dean. He departed this life on Saturday, November 12, 1960 in Cherry Hill Hospital, Delaware Township, New Jersey.

At the time of his death, he was serving as pastor of Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Lawnside, New Jersey. He was also president of the Preachers' Meeting of the Wilmington District as well as chairman of the Historical Society and Emancipation Proclamation Centennial Celebration Committee of the Delaware Conference.

Early in life Elmer Dean chose the Christian way and worked at it.

During his childhood, opportunities for formal education were limited. Elementary school offerings were not of the best and secondary schooling for youth of color was non-existent in his native community. Books were a luxury. At an early age he acquired the love for books and reached for this luxury. He read much and read well. He was richly endowed with the ability to retain, relate and to integrate ideas and had an exceptional power of recall. Self-tutoring during his youth made possible his admission to Claflin College at Orangeburg, South Carolina.

He received the Bachelor of Divinity degree at Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia. At Boston University, he earned the A.B., S.T.B. and S.T.M. degrees. While at Boston University School of Theology, a field work assignment placed him at Fourth Methodist Church in Boston.

After graduation he joined Bishop Robert E. Jones in promoting the development of the Gulfside Center at Waveland, Mississippi for two years. He then moved to Wiley College, Marshall, Texas to serve as chaplain and director of religious education, teaching philosophy, metaphysics, ethics, and courses in religious education.

The Wiley College appointment which he held for five years had the additional interest and duty in this church-related institution to cooperate in the religious extension program by assisting the Reverend Frederick H. Butler with mission work in the Texas area and working with Bishop W. A. C. Hughes in setting up Pastor's Schools, often serving as instructor in such schools.

In 1933, Reverend Dean transferred from the Texas to the Delaware Conference. Here it became his lot to receive appointments of small church member enrollment with not too high financial ability and potential. There was thus the need to seek additional employment. For over fifteen years he was associated with the Empire City Savings Bank, New York City, where he

became head of the multigraph department, being responsible for trustee reports and the like.

Working in the bank was not ministering. That was what he wanted to do. He looked about and found ways. He counselled, prayed with, and taught prisoners at Eastview County Prison; taught Negro history in an adult education program connected with the Evening Schools of White Plains, N. Y.; and gave Exhibits on Negro history at the Bank.

After many years of commuting and striving, he penned these words, "I warm'd both hands against the fire of life; It sinks and I am ready to depart."

The Reverend Elmer Wendell Dean is survived by his wife, Dorothy Johnson Dean; two daughters, Dorothy J. and Carol J.; a sister, Mrs. Ionia B. D. Ellis, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Perhaps he has died less permanently than some; for, in the minds of many of his former students and parishioners, there are for their recall, words of wisdom and of humor, and guides to truth. His love of nature and of God were ever in the fore. To his family, he gave a lasting image of courage and humility in a Christian life, and deep concern for one's fellow beings. He meant much to us. We are grateful to have shared his life.

EDWARD NATHANIEL WASHINGTON



Edward Nathaniel Washington, Jr., was born March 13, 1906, in Charleston, S. C. His mother, Mrs. Viola J. Washington, passed away while Edward and his two sisters were very young. The children found an exceptional mother in Mr. Washington's second wife, Edith. The re-established home was undergirded with love, comradeship and Christian devotion.

Young Edward was sensitive to these wholesome influences. He grew to be sterling of character, broad in human sympathies, and deep in his devotion to the better way of life for all men. He embraced the Christian faith at the age of eight. By the age of twelve, he was a class leader in the Morris Brown A.M.E. Church. A gifted speaker and a leader in young people's church and literary activities, he was popularly referred to as, "The Boy Preacher." For many years, the Christian ministry did not claim his services. He chose rather to be a dedicated Christian layman, serving the church faithfully in every other position of official responsibility. He was interested in many things, and felt that as a layman he would be more free to make a Christian witness in the areas of politics, the labor movement, race relations, and cultural advancement of his race. To all these concerns, as well as to his church, he gave tirelessly of his means, his time, his energy.

After years of active leadership in Allen A.M.E. Church, he and his family joined Brooks Memorial Methodist Church in 1944. Here he served faithfully as president of the Methodist Men and as Lay Leader.

Edward Washington accepted the call to the Christian ministry and was

licensed as Local Preacher in 1952. Continuing his studies for the ministry, he was graduated from the Baltimore Area School for Approved Supply Pastors in July, 1959 with highest honors.

He joined the staff of Brooks Church as associate minister in 1954. Through six years he rendered an invaluable service to the Church and community. By his faithful and able ministry, he endeared himself to the members of Brooks Church, and indeed, to the hearts of all who knew him.

RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised
1956

RULE I.—Decisions

The President shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie vote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The Bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III.—Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the Presiding Officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the Presiding Officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV.—Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V.—Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.—Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Sessions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the District Superintendent to the Conference Secretary.

RULE VII.—Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote who is not within the legal limits at the time the vote is taken. A member must vote on all questions before the Conference, unless otherwise excused by the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X.—Non-Debatable Questions

1. To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn to the Conference finally.
2. To suspend the rule.
3. To lay on the table, providing a representative of the Committee shall have the right to speak.
4. To take from the table.
5. To call for a previous question.
6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.—Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

1. To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment, or may be laid on the table).
2. To adjourn.
3. To take recess.
4. To order a previous question.
5. To lay on the table.
6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
7. To postpone to a given time.
8. To commit or refer.
9. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.—Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

1. When a member has the floor.
2. When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
3. When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
4. When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non-debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV.—The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motions are pending, the mover shall indicate to what he intended the motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of Conference relations.

RULE XV.—Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the Presiding Officer or Secretary.

RULE XVI.—Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if its subject to such division as he indicates. If there is no such, the Chairman may put the question to a vote without waiting for a second.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.—Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.—Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION**RULE XXI.—Admitted on Trial**

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In

cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age.

RULE XXIII.—Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.—Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and Associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.—Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.—Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for Conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, the lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the District Superintendents, the host pastor, the Conference Lay Leader and the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII.—Ordination Service

The Ordination Service shall be planned, including the selection of the Ordination speaker, by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training, or a Committee selected by it. The program must be approved by the Resident Bishop.

RULE XXIX.—Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX.—Pictures in the Journal

Pictures in the Conference Journal shall be limited to: Deceased ministers, newly appointed district superintendents, host pastor and the Presiding Bishop.

RULE XXXI.—Memorial Service

The Memorial Service shall be planned, including the selection of the Memorial Service speaker, by the Conference Board of Pensions, or a committee selected by it. The program and the speaker must be approved by the Resident Bishop.

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Report of the
NEW YORK METROPOLITAN AREA PLANNING COMMISSION OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

After nearly two years of meetings and preliminary work by the New York Metropolitan Area Planning Commission of The Methodist Church, its activities in the fall of 1961 were marked by the establishment of an office in the Inter-Church Center in New York City and staff began its task of study and planning.

Since then, The Commission through its staff has completed 10 projects which related to 96 local churches; in addition, evaluations of several church extension sites were made. Presently, an additional 11 projects involving 46 local churches are in process. Several other projects have been scheduled to be started either in late May or early fall. These studies--completed, in process, or scheduled--have been made in line with a set of priorities determined at a meeting involving all of the district superintendents. To date, the studies have been spread among churches in the Newark, New York, and New York East Conferences. A study which will have particular reference for the Delaware Conference will be started in the fall.

The projects which have been completed or are at present being made, in many ways reflect the whole spectrum of concerns facing Methodism in the region. From studies and planning consultations involving inner city churches to concerns of strengthening Methodist witness in the Town and Country areas, from relocations to new church extension sites, from mergers to major program adaptations has been the involvement of The Commission.

Also, one major study was produced for the Department of City Work of the Newark Conference which outlined proposed investment areas for the urban funds from the Faith-In-Action Crusade.

The above projects have been basically considered as short-term projects. Work has been initiated on a long-range area study and this study is constantly being developed. Part of the work on this long-range project was utilized in preparing the URBAN HIGHLIGHTS book for the New York Area Urban Convocation held in Stamford, Connecticut, during April. Completion of Phase I of this study is anticipated within the year. This study will provide an understanding of factors at work in the area and the resources with which Methodism moves to meet these forces. At the same time, it will provide the basic framework for indicating the needs and present the basic foundation for planning for inner city, suburban, town and country areas.

The Commission is grateful to all who have invested their time and efforts in co-operating with its work.
