VI. The Reports

A. The District Superintendents' Reports

COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Moore, Ministers and Laymen:

With profound gratitude to Almighty God for His care and guidance, and for the combined efforts of ministers and laymen in Christian service, we, your district superintendents are pleased to present our fifth composite report.

The privilege is mine to read this report which represents the collective thinking and information gathered by the superintendents.

Evangelism

The nineteen sixties have been designated "The Decade of Dynamic Discipleship." The deeper we become involved the more we become aware of the ever mounting challenge which confronts us. The central need for our times is evangelism. We believe that the observance of Aldersgate year in nineteen sixty-three is a step in the right direction. Throughout the boundaries of our Delaware Conference, an ever increasing number of pastors and laymen are giving themselves to the program outlined by the General Council of Evangelism.

There is a lag in our church membership. The population explosion has brought no significant church membership increases. Too many people continue to drift about, having no vital relationship to the Church. We call upon local church Commissions on Membership and Evangelism to stir yourselves, go to the homes of non-Christians, knock, seek, find and show a deep concern for them. Tell them what the Lord has done for you.

Ministers today have become objects of severe criticism. Much of it may or may not be justified. However, it indicates that we must start with ourselves. It is highly important that we take a realistic look at ourselves.

The Ministers Retreat at the DuPont Hotel, Wilmington, Delaware, last fall gave the ministers and wives of the Baltimore, Delaware, Peninsula and Washington Conferences an opportunity for soul searching. At this meeting we explored deeper depths, broader vistas and nobler heights of the spirit.

There have been other meetings in Baltimore, Philadelphia, and Washington and gatherings on annual conference, district, sub-district and local church levels, where clergy and laymen have sought newness of life.

Reports from across the Conference show that there have been Mass Revivals; Visitation Evangelism; Christian Witness Missions; Mid-Week Services; Prayer, study and witness groups; sermon series on Romans; and church wide study of the Book of Romans as a starting point for Bible reading and study.

Little by little laymen are recognizing that evangelism is a God given task for all, that the minister leads and directs the laity until they feel compelled to witness for Christ through their daily activities. Everyone must bear witness; farmer, laborer, merchant, office workers, mill hands, factory employees, doctors, professors, teachers, students, domestic servants, housekeepers—All must witness for Christ.

How long must we lift up Christ? As long as there is crime, delinquency, alcoholism, dope addiction, promiscuity, poverty, racial antagonism and other moral, economic and social problems.

Just as the fire of evangelism broke out when the Wesleys led the evangelical revival of their times, so can we Methodists empowered by the spirit of God set the cold hearts of our day afire and save the unredeemed multitudes in our world. Let us see to it that the evangelistic passion remains at the very heart of Methodism.

Christian Education

Christian education must always be one of the vital concerns of The Methodist Church. Through the years the people called Methodists have heard the Master's irresistible call, and have gone forth to teach the nations in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Methodists today continue to hear that sacred call and to make responses.

It is with deep regret that we must acknowledge that the response is weaker than we desire. We can mention scores of dedicated men and women who are giving much to promote Christian education, but the number is too small. Recruits are needed in order to reinforce their ranks.

Though we are experiencing population explosion and the building, improving, and modernizing of our church properties, our average church school attendance shows no gain, in fact, the children's division reveals a loss. No significant gains are being reported in our church school staffs. The number uniting with the church on profession of faith shows only a slight increase. The amount contributed through Fourth Sunday World Service offerings remains about the same. Too few churches conduct additional sessions. The Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship does not seem to be important to the program of many of our churches.

If we expect religious growth to take place among our boys and girls, men and women, Christian education must be more vigorously promoted. It is next to impossible for our Methodist system to flourish if the soft pedal is put on the work of the church school.

It is encouraging to note that representatives from district staffs attended Bennett College and Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pa., for training in Christian education. We rejoice that on each district there are training opportunities such as: Christian Workers Schools, Vacation Church School Institutes, Missionary Rallies, Youth Assemblies for Junior Highs, various seminars on district, bi-district and tri-district levels, and many other occasions for in-service training for various local church leaders.

All of the districts have taken a new look at Family Life. A large number of husband-wife teams attended a Family Life Conference in Chicago last fall. Upon their return, much has been done to show the relationship of the Committee on Family Life, to the Commission on Education. Many churches have responded by setting up Committees on Family Life.

Too much credit cannot be given to Brother Howard A. Bailey and staff for their constant promotion of Christian education.

The cost of higher education continues to rise. Few students could go to college without aid from taxes, endowments, gifts and scholarships. Our church-related colleges are in financial need. In these days of specialization Christian education is more needful. If we are to have Christian higher edu-

cation, the Church, your local church, and mine, must provide it. For years, our goal has been \$1.50 per member. A few churches have met the standard, some have given token support, others have ignored it. If we are to keep our heads above the raging torrents of secularism and materialism, each and every church of our Conference must join the ranks of the concerned, banish lip service and dig deep enough into our pocketbooks to pay what we have vowed unto the Lord. Can the Lord depend upon us to do our part?

Christian Social Concerns

Since the Commission on Social Concerns became mandatory in the local church, reports show that each year there has been an increase in the number of commissions organizing and functioning.

We commend our Conference Board for alerting and educating our congregations in regard to social, political, and economic affairs.

The director's report shows that some of the districts and local churches have held observances and meetings such as Negro History Week, joint meeting of the Delaware and Philadelphia Conferences on Peace and World Order; sharing with the New Jersey Conference on Consultations on Race in The Methodist Church, World Order Sunday, World Temperance Sunday, and Race Relations Sunday.

Our pastors have been invited to preach in white churches. Perhaps the most notable was the exchange of pulpits of the pastors of Cheswold, Delaware on Race Relations Sunday, and Rev. A. J. Dredden who preached twice and taught Sunday School class on Smith Island. These positive and constructive programs are bringing about better understanding and feeling among the races.

Temperance: One of the worst tragedies we face today is the use of beverage alcohol. The use of alcohol by adults in the home is most damaging to growing children because it often leads to the producing of an alcoholic. We urge the practice of abstinence.

World Peace: Ominous war clouds still hover over our world and threaten destruction. Twice last year we were on the brink of war. People of every race and nation want peace even if their political leaders do not. The Christian Church is in a strategic position to make the gospel of Jesus Christ articulate in the world that true peace may be realized. Let us always remember that we follow one called "The Prince of Peace."

Rev. H. M. Deas of our Board went to Russia on a world peace tour representing the Conference.

More local churches are observing World Order Sunday and becoming better acquainted with the work of the United Nations.

Our Board is planning to cooperate with the Inter-Board Schools for pastors and Official Board members on the districts. These schools should be of great value and we urge the fullest cooperation on the local church level.

Ministerial Support

The principle of adequate support for the ministry is grounded upon numerous scriptural admonitions; a few of which are as follows:

"For the laborer is worthy of his hire." Luke 10:7.

"For the scripture saith, Thou shalt not muzzle the ox that treadeth out the corn. And, the laborer is worthy of his hire." I Tim. 5:16.

"Even so did the Lord ordain that they that proclaim the gospel should live by the gospel." I Cor. 9:14.

The attitude of many church people toward the subject of ministerial support is one of ignorance and indifference. "The preacher is getting all he is worth." "If he is not satisfied, let him quit." "Let him take care of his work and his people will support him." Such thoughtless utterances as these, together with a widespread reticence concerning the miserable, low salaries paid some of our ministers, reveal in an unbelievable manner, a disregard for Christian ethics and social responsibility on the part of many of our church people.

However, the picture is not all black. There are signs of concern about the support of the ministry exemplified by some of our laity. During the past year, more than twenty-five charges increased the pastor's salary. This is a small percentage and the increase, in most instances, did not make the support adequate. While the increases may not have been adequate, it is a hopeful sign that we are moving in the right direction.

Several months ago, an article appearing in *The Methodist Layman* quoted a district superintendent addressing a local church Official Board about the importance of supporting the pastor as follows:

"Your pastor's happiness, his efficiency as a pastor, his reputation in your community and even the standing of your church in the locality, are involved in the payment of his salary." It is imperative then, that your minister be provided with adequate support.

The foregoing statements tend to present the question: What is adequate ministerial support? In answer to this question, it can be said with great emphasis that adequate support should make it possible to provide for the material and cultural needs of the minister and his family. It should make possible a reasonable margin for saving, and in addition, make possible liberal giving.

Therefore, church officials should take these and other significant facts into consideration and should be fair enough to set the minister's salary at a generous figure rather than at one which would unduly cramp his freedom and limit his effectiveness. The members of the finance committee in the local church might well consider their own willingness to live under conditions similar to those which the salary automatically imposes upon their pastor.

The scope and importance of ministerial support is broad and embraces many angles and relationships. As Christian laymen, we must make sure that we help to make the Christian ministry attractive to young men if we are to have a growing church under a trained and consecrated leadership. Let us be considerate of our minister. Let us provide adequately for him and his family. We need his services.

Church Property

It is a matter of record that sanctuaries, parish houses, and parsonages have been renovated this year. One educational unit is being built; three parsonages have been built. In 1953 the total value of church property of the Conference was declared to be \$6,813,150.00. This year it has reached over \$14,000,000. Even when adequate allowance is made for readjusting appraisals, this has been no small achievement.

Now, as a result of the population explosion, new sectors are springing

up within the bounds of our Conference. The Eastern Seaboard and the Delaware Valley are attracting families who are seeking better opportunities for work. The people do not always find the church—the church must find them. So, we need to take a second look at church property. We must meet the needs of today. It is important that when we build, restore or remodel, that we consult the proper authority in planning. Make sure that the proposed building will meet the needs and that it is adequately financed.

A word about parsonages seem to be in order. A look will confirm that many ministers' families have encountered a variety of practices. Some are taken care of by the trustees, some by the Parsonage Committee, some by both, and a few by chance. When the church does not take the initiative, the minister's family is confronted with an embarrassing situation. Shall they ask for needed repairs and furnishing, and be called mercenary? Or shall they keep still, making the best of what is given, and be called sloven and careless of church property? Our appreciation to those churches that have a definite and working plan for providing a parsonage which is attractive and comfortably furnished. As for others, whose failure is largely due to oversight, we call attention to the matter and urge appropriate action.

Christian Stewardship

"Christian stewardship is the recognition and fulfillment of personal privilege and responsibility for the administration of the whole of life . . . personality, time, talents, influence, material substance, everything . . . in accordance with the spirit and ideals of Christ," as stated by Julius E. Crawford in his book, *The Stewardship Life*.

The above statement is very well put; but for this report, our minds are pregnant with thoughts concerning tithing and material possessions. This is because our Conference faces the need for a fuller dedication of life to God on the part of our people.

It is a known fact that materialism is threatening to engulf the Christian Church. It turns attention away from God to things. A very few people are able to escape its pull. It steals quietly into our homes and makes us think that we need one more shiny gadget for comfort. It even enters into our Church's financial program. An example of which, is the church social which has been a part of the Church's financial structure since the fifteenth century. Many types of money making schemes have evolved taking the form of bazaars, entertainments, suppers, rummage sales, commission selling and the latest being, the Sunday afternoon tea and hat show. Although the element of giving is found to some extent in all of them the prominent idea is to exchange goods, services or entertainment for money.

It is not difficult to imagine what such schemes are doing to the Church's witness in the world. The manner in which professed Christians engage in such projects leads the world to believe that this is the way to keep the doors of the kingdom open. This is appalling, for we claim to have the greatest news that has ever come to mankind. We profess to be the keepers of a power that can change the hearts of men and make them new. Our belief is not strong enough to make us sacrifice and give of our material possessions in order that the Church might continue to be the visible body of Christ in the world.

As we think of the financial plight of our churches today, we see an urgent need for a wall to keep back the onslaught of materialism. It is felt that a

program of stewardship education is one of the best means of meeting this threat.

The Methodist Church attempting to meet this challenge has set up a quadrennial program emphasizing the theme: "Jesus Christ Is Lord." This is proving to be of benefit in some of our churches. Wherever churches have taken the program seriously, there has been an improvement in their spiritual and financial growth. About one-fourth of the churches in the Conference have conducted an Every Member Visitation. The Commission on Stewardship and Finance has become reactivated in many and more local secretaries of stewardship are promoting stewardship cultivation. This kind of concentrated effort has led to an increase in the number of persons who have committed themselves to tithing as a minimum standard of giving. This is good—but not good enough, for the majority have not yet responded to the concept of Christian stewardship.

In order to undergird the Quadrennial program, the General Board of Lay Activities has recently launched a program known as *Pilot Projects in Stewardship Cultivation*. This program will continue indefinitely. Projects have been set up in twelve districts representing all jurisdictions and geographical sections of the Church. We are very happy to report that the Wilmington District of our Conference has been chosen as one of the twelve districts to participate in the program. As a result of this experience, it is hoped that our entire Conference will eventually be benefited.

To lift our churches out of financial quick-sands, we can neither remain token givers, nor continue to engage in schemes and clever devices. We need to reevaluate the financial program of the local church, and make sure that it is undergirded by a continuing program of stewardship cultivation that reaches throughout the congregation. If our churches are to be vital forces in the challenge for Christian living and giving, there must be an informed leadership and consecrated laity. The Church must stand as a beacon to falling humanity with commitment. We must dig deeper into our pockets and share the money that God has so graciously entrusted to our keeping. It is imperative that we go farther into Christian living and giving. However, it is apparent that we cannot go farther, until we go deeper in the understanding of our stewardship responsibility and commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord.

Worship

The very nature of man makes him reach out for a closer fellowship with God. That is one reason why man has always worshipped. The way in which he worships changes from time to time and the forms of worship services vary. The basic purpose for worship is the full surrender of one's self to God as he is revealed in Jesus Christ the Saviour.

God is the initiator of the worship relationship and man is called upon to glorify Him with his entire being. Man's life is made up of opportunities to choose between glorifying his Creator or separating himself from Him.

Christian worship has its focal point in devotion to the person, life, teaching and sacramental presence of Jesus Christ, through whom God has chosen to reveal himself in history. Christian worship is always directed toward the purification of life. The Christian prays with the psalmist, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me," and strives

for a spiritual oneness with God, which he may never attain but which is set before him as a beacon light by the Christ whom he serves.

The worship service in the church is of great significance, and more of our pastors and laymen are becoming more aware of it. Because of growing awareness they are endeavoring to improve the worship service. According to reports and observations, more commissions on worship are being organized, especially in the town and country churches. They are buying electric organs and making more use of the Methodist Hymnal and Methodist Book of Worship.

We urge our pastors and commissions on education in the local churches to have a deeper concern for the training of youth choirs and organists.

"Let the inspiration of Christ dwell in your midst with all its wealth of wisdom, teach and train one another with music of psalms, with hymns, and songs of spiritual life; praise God with thankful hearts."

Christian Vocations

Every institution, profession or enterprise has a plan by which it seeks to maintain itself. The principal of continuity governs to some extent everything that we know.

In secondary schools as well as in higher institutions of learning, the term vocations is used rather extensively. Public as well as private schools spend considerable time and talent in providing their students with educational guidance toward those goals for which they may have talent and native ability to achieve. The Christian Church must do no less.

There is a decline in the percentage of students entering Christian vocations today as compared to a decade ago. There is a growing feeling among many young people that religious experience is not relevant to the life and the age in which they live. It is the task of the church to guide them into Christian vocations. We commend our Commission on Christian Vocations for the fine leadership it is giving in this field.

In its last meeting it recommended that it continue its cooperation with the other agencies in promoting the Christmas Conference on the Ministry and Missions. It also recommended that a closer follow-up be made of those young people who make commitment to Christian vocations, and that such a follow-up include contacts not only with the youth, but also with parents, pastors and workers with youth. The Conference on the Ministry and Missions was held last December at Ezion Church in Wilmington, Delaware. It was well attended and fruitful.

An increasing number of local churches have held Christian vocation meetings and career days. One district held a Christian Vocations Conference. We urge our pastors and the committees on Christian vocations in the local churches to become more active in helping to guide more young people into Christian and church-related vocations. The need is tremendous.

Missions

From the beginning of the missionary movement to the present time, the emphasis has been shifting, motives have been revised, and progress has taken place. The aim of carrying the Gospel from Christian to non-Christian peoples has remained the primary idea of the missionary movement.

In recent years, world conditions are forcing us to rethink the nature and

validity of the missionary efforts of the church in these revolutionary times. Our Board of Missions launched a series of meetings in the fall of 1962 known as "Our Mission Today" held one day on each district. This was a phase of the 1960-64 Quadrennial Emphasis: "Jesus Christ Is Lord." The program is basically one of study, revolving around three themes. They are: "The Faith That Compels Us," "The Factors That Confront Us," and "The Frontiers That Call Us." Though launched on the conference and district levels, the program now moves to each local church for study and action.

It is encouraging to note that an increasing number of ministers and laymen have participated in regional, conference and district missionary training enterprises. Our conference and district secretaries of missions have done an excellent job in promoting the cause. Each district held a Missionary Institute, and Youth Missionary Rally. One district participated in the "Mission To America" project. More church-wide schools of missions have been held this year than previously.

As a part of the continuing program, each local church through its Church School, Woman's Society of Christian Service, and special study groups will be expected to give much thought and consideration to this year's study book entitled, "Our Missions Today," by Tracey K. Jones.

It is not only necessary to study, but it must be followed by action. It is a well-known fact, that from the National as well as the World Mission Field comes the clarion call for help,—more help! We therefore, urge our churches to heed the call and help by paying in full the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and by accepting one or more Advance Specials.

As we rethink the nature and validity of the Church's missionary efforts today, let us not forget that Jesus sends us forth to teach men to do all things that he commanded. We are a long way from that goal; but we press toward it. It shall be achieved.

One day the vision granted to the Christian mystic will be realized.

The kingdoms of this world are become
the kingdoms of our Lord, and his Christ;
and he shall reign for ever and ever.

This report does not give a full account of what has been accomplished this year, but it gives some of the highlights, trends, and objectives.

Our hearts are filled with profound gratitude to Almighty God for the privilege of our stewardship and for the generosity and faithfulness of the loyal pastors, their gracious wives, and the loyal laymen.

It has been an esteemed pleasure working with our beloved Bishop Love for another year. His leadership is superb.

May God's richest blessings rest upon all of us and the work we do in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Bishop Moore and members of the Delaware Annual Conference:

It is with gratitude to Almighty God and sincere thanks and appreciation to the ministers, their wives and the laymen of the district for their sacrificial service in the Christian cause, that I submit my second annual report.

We have been blessed this year in that we have not lost one active minister by death. The Reverends John T. Ayers and M. L. McKenney, both retired, died during the conference year. Two of our ministers' wives and two widows passed to the great beyond. They were: Amanda Caulk, Mary V. McKenney, Anna Jefferson and Elizabeth Martin.

Stewardship Pilot Project

Our district is one of twelve throughout The Methodist Church chosen to be a Pilot Project in Stewardship Cultivation. This is not a crash program, but one of long range development which will extend over the next four or five years.

Dr. Edwin A. Briggs of the General Board of Lay Activities has been working closely with us in our program development. We have held training sessions for ministers and laymen, and a month of stewardship cultivation in the local churches with emphasis on tithing. Twenty-one charges participated in the emphasis. During the month the pastors preached one sermon on the stewardship of life, and four sermons on tithing. Each participating church divided its membership into groups of eight families with an expediter named

for each group. Under the direction of the expediter, stewardship reading materials were circulated among the families in each group. The Sunday school teachers were given stewardship training prior to the month of emphasis and they taught stewardship to the Sunday School pupils. The last Sunday of the month was enlistment Sunday. The results of this stewardship cultivation are gratifying. Not only did many commit themselves to be tithers; but many more committed themselves to Christian service within the local church. The emphasis next year will be the Every Member Visitation.

ASBURY, ATLANTIC CITY: Rev. G. H. McMurray, Pastor. This has been another banner year for this charge. All interests of the Church have been cared for under the leadership of a hard working pastor and congregation. Among their achievements has been the construction of a new parsonage. This home was blessed on April 28th and the parsonage family is now enjoying it. Several new members have been added to the church. The pastor and people are happy.

HAMILTON-ATLANTIC CITY: Rev. H. D. Davis, Pastor. It is difficult to find a harder working group than the people at Hamilton. The church membership and attendance are growing. On March 21, visitation teams reported seventeen new commitments. This year fourteen new members have been added. The parsonage debt has been reduced and a lot next to the church on Arctic Avenue has been purchased.

BRIDGETON: Rev. T. H. Pendleton, Pastor. The pastor and people on this charge are happy. Presently, plans are being considered to enlarge the physical plant in order to increase the effectiveness of the church's program in the community. All age groups are involved in the program of Christian education. Church attendance is on the increase.

BURLINGTON: Rev. H. J. Fisher, Pastor. This has been another good year for Burlington under the leadership of a very conscientious pastor. Eight new members have been added to the church. Three new tithers have been secured. All phases of the church's obligations have been met. The mortgage has been liquidated on the church property.

BUTTONWOOD AND CHRISTIANA: Rev. Jacob Caulk, Pastor. The churches on this charge are up and doing. The pastor and people are well adjusted. The young people are loyal supporters of the church program. Improvements this year include the purchase of a communion table and laying of hardwood floors in the church. All causes have been met in full.

EIGHTH STREET-CAMDEN: Rev. Charles I. Young, Pastor. The interior of this church is beautiful to behold. Under the leadership of an energetic pastor, new life is evident all around. Church attendance is on the increase. New carpet has been installed in the sanctuary and paid for. The mortgage payments are current. The pastor and people are working miracles.

FERRY AVENUE-CAMDEN: Rev. C. W. Bagwell, Pastor. This charge is moving forward. The membership and attendance are on the increase. This year eighteen members have been added to the church. The organizations are active. Extensive improvements have been made on the church and the parsonage. Some new furniture has been purchased for the parsonage. The pastor and people are working harmoniously together.

CAPE MAY AND SWAINTON: Rev. A. A. Berry, Pastor. The churches on this charge report an increase in financial support. Both churches plan to beautify the physical plants. A special banking account has been set up by the Franklin Street Church. A Methodist Youth Fellowship with twenty-five active members has been organized. Accessions 2.

GRACE-CHESTER: Rev. S. L. Wilkins, Pastor. The pastor and people had some difficulties at the beginning of the year in getting adjusted. However, as the year progressed, the work of the church began to move forward. All financial interests of the church have been considered. Mortgage payments are current. The spiritual life of the church is improving. Harmony prevails.

SILOAM-CHESTER: Rev. John B. Redmond, Pastor. This pastor has brought forth a slogan, "A New and Greater Siloam." It has served as a rallying call among the people. The congregation is looking up. The pastor is leading this church to new and higher heights in Christian service. The expansion program of the Pennsylvania Military College near by will make it necessary for them to relocate the parsonage and parish hall. This is a big problem to solve, but they face the future unafraid.

ST. DANIEL'S-CHESTER, PA.: Rev. F. D. Jones, Pastor. The advantages of a long term pastorate are clearly seen at St. Daniels. Many good things have been brought about under the fine leadership given by this pastor and the togetherness of the congregation. The spiritual condition of the church is good. The organizations are functioning as a part of the total church program. A new Brownie Scout Troop has been organized. The Recreation Center continues to contribute to recreational needs of the community. The sanctuary has been made beautiful with new carpet. All financial responsibilities have been met.

UNION MEMORIAL, DARBY, PA.: Rev. C. E. Hammond, Pastor. A bright and new future faces this church. The areas of Christian education, stewardship and evangelism are being developed under the noble leadership of the pastor. Lay leadership is being emphasized and many more laymen are assuming leadership responsibilities. The pastor is conscientiously working to develop the total life of the church.

DELAIR, N. J.: Rev. Rupert Adams, Pastor. The church is advancing in some areas of work. The church school continues to function on a high level. Other organizations are doing good work. The interior of the sanctuary and the parsonage have been redecorated. The pastor supplies a vigorous leadership for a group of cooperative people.

ELKTON, MARYLAND: Rev. J. J. Webster, Pastor. This church has a small membership; but its people are faithful and loyal. They cooperate with the district program. Extensive repairs are needed on the church and parsonage. The pastor is a courageous leader.

FORDVILLE: Rev. William Tasco, Pastor. The work done this year at Fordville shows an increase over that of last year. The pastor and people are in harmony. Repairs to the properties include a new roof on the church, tower and chimes reconditioned, and closets added to the parsonage.

GRENLOCK-RHODES AND BERLIN: Rev. M. D. Brooks, Pastor. The churches on this circuit do their bit. Being few in number and scattered widely

makes it a difficult charge to pastor. A new church building is needed at the Rhodes Church. Some of the conference and district askings have been paid. The pastor is in earnest and the people are cooperative.

LAWNSIDE: Rev. O'Connell Milbourne, Pastor. This charge continues to advance. The pastor and people are happy. The pastor's salary has been increased. Improvements on the church include the installation of hardwood floors and carpet in the sanctuary. The parsonage has been painted both on the interior and the exterior. The organizations are functioning. Lawnside has a bright future.

MERCHANTVILLE: Rev. G. E. Geddis, Pastor. The people and pastor have striven to carry the full program of the church. The pastor considers this his best year financially, among the six years he has pastored these people. Twenty-one preparatory members were received during a revival. Improvements on the physical plant include the installation of a public address system, cabinets and steam table for the church kitchen and floor covering installed in the kitchen and bathroom of the parsonage. The church is growing.

MIDDLETOWN AND DELAWARE CITY: Rev. L. C. Brown, Pastor. Pastor and people have striven hard to carry out the program. They have succeeded in some respects. Dales Church entertained our Pre-Conference Rally. The young people are active. Church attendance is good. The members on this charge are loyal and cooperative.

MT. HOLLY: Rev. Walter L. Gray, Pastor. The membership of this church is very small. However, it is a loyal, hard working group. The pastor and members work well together. A new organ and piano were purchased last May. To date, only a small balance is due on these instruments. The church is well kept and the members show real church pride. The pastor is sincere and ambitious.

NEW CASTLE: Rev. W. A. T. Miles, Pastor. After nine years of working together, the pastor and people are still going strong. The organizations are moving forward. Financial reports indicate an increase in receipts. Some new members have been added. New Castle is one of the few churches that keeps a light burning on Sunday night.

NEWPORT: Rev. G. Wayne Cuff, Pastor. The work of the church under the leadership of the young pastor proceeds very well. The worship, fellowship and service is of high Christian quality. The Church is felt in the life of the community. This year new pews were installed and paid for in full. The pastor was presented a white communion robe by the Usher Board at Christmastide. Sensing the need for a fuller commitment to the life and work of the church, this pastor will give full time to the pastorate this ensuing year.

ODESSA-PORT PENN: Rev. Floyd Waters, Pastor. This charge continues to carry on in spite of its many difficulties. The debt on the parish house at Odessa has been reduced. The people strive to carry their share of the district load. Some of the organizations are functioning. The need for full time leadership on this charge is very evident.

PLEASANTVILLE-OCEAN CITY: Rev. C. W. Perry, Pastor. The people are very cooperative and understanding on this charge. Many leadership responsibilities are assumed by the laity. Eight new persons have been re-

ceived into the full membership of the church. The pastor is a conscientious worker.

PORT NORRIS: Rev. J. E. Bishop, Pastor. This pastor and people have done the unbelievable. This year a parish hall has been erected and equipped. New pews, pulpit and choir furniture, carpeting, and a new heating system have been installed at a total cost of \$15,000.00. To date, \$3,613.00 has been paid on the bill. Conference and district askings have been met. We are proud of the church, people and pastor at Port Norris. We now have a \$50,000.00 plant. After having served this charge several years as a part-time pastor, the pastor has been giving full time this year. The salary has increased \$1,000.00.

QUINTON: Rev. John Wilcher, Pastor. This has been a good year for Quinton. Financial receipts are in advance of last year. The parsonage mortgage has been reduced by \$700.00. The storm window debt has been liquidated. Other achievements include rewiring of the church, installation of rest rooms, and the purchase of equipment for the pastor's study. Church attendance is on the increase. Eight new members have been added this year.

ST. GEORGES AND KIRKWOOD: Rev. T. E. Cameron, Pastor. The members of this charge are few, but very faithful. They love the Lord and His Church. The pastor works hard to promote the total program. Peace and harmony prevail.

SALEM: Rev. C. E. Kiah, Pastor. Salem maintains her good record of former years. All askings are in full. A young Adult Fellowship was organized during the year. Extensive improvements have been made to the church and parsonage. Church attendance has increased. Accessions 8.

COLEMAN MEMORIAL: Rev. H. R. Snead, Pastor. Coleman has had another good year. To deepen the prayer life of the people a Prayer Room has been set up in the church. The mortgage payments are up to date. Three choirs have purchased new robes. The church attendance is increasing. New members are being added.

EZION: Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, Pastor. Ezion again maintains her standing among those who go beyond the call of duty. Additional improvements to the parsonage have increased the comforts of pastor and his family. A loan of \$8,000.00 has been liquidated. A new piano has been purchased for sanctuary. The church school and Vacation Bible School enrollments have increased. Pastor and people are hard working, faithful and loyal.

HAVEN: Rev. H. T. Moody, Pastor. Haven is fast becoming one of the more desirable charges on the district. The pastor leads and the people follow. Several improvements have been made to church and parsonage. These include painting of the interior of the church and parsonage, and carpet for the sanctuary. Family days which are held periodically add to the spiritual and financial growth of the charge. There has been a nine per cent increase in the church membership.

MT. CARMEL: Rev. Edgar V. Wimberly, Pastor. The membership is manifesting a new vision of its responsibility toward God and His kingdom, and toward one another. The fellowship is characterized by a sense of to-

getherness. This is good, for this is one of the essentials of a strong church. Many improvements have been made to the physical plant. The total program is advancing.

MT. JOY: Rev. A. Chancy, Pastor. This church has gone beyond its record of former years. All interests of the church are being promoted. Financial receipts are in advance of last year. Improvements have been made to both church and parsonage. Church attendance is good. The pastor works with sincerity and vigor.

WOODBURY-JERICHO: Rev. S. G. Fullman, Pastor. This charge continues to move forward. Some members are making a fuller commitment of themselves to the Lord. Altar sets have been purchased. Mt. Zion plans to paint the church inside. Wesley plans to install rest rooms and landscape its grounds. A warm cooperative fellowship exists among pastor and people.

The Commission on World Service and Finance of the Delaware Conference humbly submits this its twenty-second annual report and recommends its adoption. We are grateful to God for His loving care over us, and to our Bishop, ministers and laymen, whose spirit of cooperation has made this report possible.

General Items

The treasurers of all conference boards and agencies have been bonded in companies by the Commission. The books of all conference boards and agencies have been properly audited for the past fiscal year.

The Conference Treasurer's books have been audited by Certified Public Accountants, Walter P. Harris and Robert Bonner, Jr., and a satisfactory audited report has been filed with the Commission. This is the audited report filed with the Commission for the past fiscal year.

The list of other conference funds, the names of treasurers of each, and the approved depositories are as follows: Board of Education, Rev. C. D. Gerald, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Bank and Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; Board of Lay Activities, J. R. Webb, Treasurer, People's National Bank, Laurel, Delaware; Board of Hospitals and Homes, Rev. C. E. Kiah, Treasurer, Salem National Bank and Trust Company, Salem, N. J.; Board of Evangelism, Helen Loatman, Treasurer, Wilmington Trust Company, Wilmington, Delaware.

Recommendations

3. DIRECTOR OF STEWARDSHIP

THE PILOT PROJECT. The Wilmington District is one of twelve districts in The Methodist Church working a pilot project in Stewardship and Finance under the direction of Dr. Edwin Briggs of Evanston, Illinois. The purpose and program of the project for the Delaware Conference will be presented at the Annual Conference.

TO DEVELOP A GOOD RELATION BETWEEN THE OFFICIAL BOARD AND COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE: 1. Plan programs that can be undergirded with the full support of the entire church. 2. Conduct workshops in the local church. (Two well proven plans have been given to district superintendents for pastors.) Write or consult with your district or conference director of stewardship for direction and service.

TO IMPROVE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE CONGREGATION AND COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE: 1. Send a monthly statement, rather than quarterly, to all persons on membership roll showing amount of their contribution during the month. Be sure to include persons who may have neglected giving. 2. Include with the monthly statement of individual giving a report of receipts and expenditures of the church for the month as given to the Official Board. 3. Enclose a Stewardship leaflet with these statements.

4. BOARD OF MISSIONS

"Our Mission Today" is the quadrennial emphasis of The Methodist Church in the area of missions. The Board of Missions of The Methodist Church sponsored several Regional Conferences to promote this emphasis in February, 1963.

Members of our Conference Mission Team attended the Regional Conference held in Washington in February and spent one day on each district during October of last year. We are looking toward the involvement of every church in our Conference. The study book, "Our Mission Today," by Tracey K. Jones should be in the hands of every pastor and layman.

We are looking toward the summer conferences on Missions with the hope that more people will feel impelled to be involved in our objective. What is that objective? "Our mission in the future," says Dr. John H. Graham, "will be more costly. With the depreciation of the dollar, it will be necessary to contribute more to the mission needs of the Church." This means that the "second mile" must become real to each of us.

Our Conference and District Secretaries of Missions have done a tre-

mendous job this year, at great personal sacrifice, to carry the message of missions to our people. The Board is grateful and the Conference should be grateful for this extra service of these dedicated ministers of the Gospel. We also recognize that the work was accomplished with the cooperation of Bishop Love, the District Superintendents, local church Commissions on Missions, pastors and laymen. As we express thanks to all, we pledge to give the best of ourselves to this important mission of our Church.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

Recommendations

1. That the importance of the World Service budget as the basic item in the structure of Methodism be emphasized.
2. That special emphasis be placed on "doing a better job" with children and youth in missionary education in the Church School, Daily Vacation Bible School and Special Sessions.
3. That every local church endeavor to meet its World Service and Conference Benevolences apportionment in full. Every 100% local church shall be presented a World Service Certificate; each superintendent shall prepare a roll of the churches meeting their World Service apportionment in full; said roll shall be read during the anniversary program of the Board of Missions and published in the journal.
4. That each district missionary secretary under the guidance of the district superintendent shall make a special effort to get more local churches to voluntarily adopt Conference initiated specials and General Advance Specials.
5. (a) That our Conference Advance Specials shall be such projects that are currently met by the Promotion-Advance Fund. (b) That the name of the Promotion-Advance Fund be changed, and defined as follows:
 - 1—CONFERENCE EXTENSION FUND—Those funds dealing with Conference projects or obligations.
 - 2—Advance Specials—Those funds dealing with General Conference Advance requests for the divisions of National Missions or World Missions.
- (c) That priority to the CONFERENCE EXTENSION FUND shall be extended to the following in the order listed.
 - 1—New Congregations.
 - 2—Small congregations in fast developing population areas.
 - 3—Older struggling congregations where there are possibilities of growth.
 - 4—Salary assistance only to new congregations.
- (d) That where regular salary assistance is being given from the Promotion-Advance Fund or shall be extended from the Conference Extension Fund, such giving shall be done on a \$400.00 declining scale, i.e. \$1,600.00 first year; \$1,200.00 second year; \$800.00 third year and \$400.00 fourth year. (e) That the asking for the Conference Extension Fund shall remain the same (\$35,000.00) as is currently requested for the Promotion-Advance Fund. (f) That this asking (\$35,000.00) be distributed to each district on the present "district percentage basis" and that each district superintendent spearhead this asking in his district and receive reports of remittance at each Quarterly

Conference. (g) That every pastor and local church or charge lay leader make special effort to meet the Conference Extension Fund in full during conference year, 1963-64. (h) That the Conference Board of Missions shall be the agency through which such projects are accepted, classified and funds administered. (i) That the conference treasurer shall supply a list to the Conference Board of Missions of all assistance given to local churches so as to be published in the Journal.

6. (a) That every local church shall voluntarily accept to share in a General Advance Special, either National or World. (b) That the following shall be accepted as "suggested" projects:

1—*National Missions* (Home)

Salary for Indian Mission preacher—\$640.00

Shelf of books for Alaska Methodist University Library—\$27.00

Room and board for orphan child at Henderson Settlement, Kentucky for one week—\$10.00

Lunch for four weeks for a Negro child in the Good Shepherd Child Care Center, Chattanooga, Tenn.—\$10.00

Latin American pastor, minimum monthly salary—\$25.00

Peoples Methodist Community Center, New Orleans, La.—\$50.00

2—*World Missions* (Abroad)

Teacher's salary in Liberia—\$840.00

Support hospital bed in Angola, India, Sarawak—\$100.00

Cost of an operation in a Mission Hospital—\$25.00

Year's board for African or Indian Student—\$100.00

7. That contributions for General Advance Special be remitted as follows: (a) To Annual Conference Treasurer plainly designated. (b) Directly to agency involved: World (Foreign) Specials, 475 Riverside Drive, New York 27, N. Y. or National (Home) Specials, 1701 Arch St., Philadelphia 3, Pa.

We are grateful to our conference board chairman, Mr. Roy L. Cordery, to the District Missionary Secretaries: Rev. Rupert Adams, Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. W. H. Greene, Rev. R. B. Thompson, and Rev. S. W. C. Crosse, and to the District Superintendents. Without the assistance of these brethren, the promotion of missions in our conference could not be carried out successfully. It is because of their untiring efforts that the MISSIONARY STORY has been told on each district.

5. BOARD OF PENSIONS**Recommendations****1. PASTOR'S ONE AND ONE-HALF PER CENT**

We recommend:

- That the district superintendents stress the importance of the 1½% payments and urge all pastors who are in arrears to pay the amount due this fund.
- That in planning the appointments of the ministers, the question of their relation to the fund be taken into consideration.
- That in order to reduce the immense amount of 1½% due, ministers receiving \$5,000 or more cash salary should pay in full; those receiving \$2,000 to \$4,999 cash salary pay 80% of indebtedness; and those receiving less than \$2,000 cash salary pay 60% of indebtedness.
- That the suggested arrangements for delinquent payments be made for the conference year 1963-64.

3. HEALTH AND WELFARE

We recommend:

- That all ministers be enrolled in Health and Hospitalization policies that are available through state and local Councils of Churches.

4. DEATH BENEFIT PROGRAM

We recommend:

- That we cancel our Group Insurance policy with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

- b. That we enter the Death Benefit program of the Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church.
 - c. That the Conference Board of Pensions be the designated agency to handle the Death Benefit program.
 - d. That a fact sheet regarding the Death Benefit program be distributed to members of the Annual Conference.

6. BOARD OF EDUCATION

Executive Secretary

The more one works in the field of Christian teaching the more one is impressed with the ever increasing demand to enlarge the program, to set new goals and to strive harder to help bring about real change in the lives of persons. Christian teaching has to do with life at its best. We must be ever aware of its need to be dynamic and progressive. Our staff has been seeking to discharge its responsibilities. We have tried to keep the proper balance between program promotion and the needs of persons.

Children's Work: I am aware of the great need to give our children more

effective Christian teaching. Too many of the children of our communities are not enrolled in any church schools. Too many of our homes seem not to be interested in the religious growth of their children. Too few adults are responding as teachers and other leaders of our church schools. It is our hope that every church will seek to be ready for the new material for the children's division when it is issued in September of 1964.

Our Children's Director, Mrs. Emma W. Strother and district associates are making every effort to improve the work with children.

Youth Work: Our Director of Youth Work, Rev. Edwin L. Ellis reveals in his report that a vigorous program has been promoted.

We are aware that many of our churches are working most effectively with their young people. On the other hand, the hundreds of youth in many of our communities who have no church relation give us cause for deep concern. We call upon our churches to seek to bring the youth outside the church into a meaningful fellowship with Christ.

Adult Work: We feel that there is much which we need to do in the area of adult education. The emphasis must be in a ministry to all adult groups.

Our Conference is currently engaged, with the Philadelphia Conference, in studying the needs of the older youth-young adult persons in Philadelphia. Our Director of Adult Work, Rev. David W. Briddell, is chairman of the study committee.

We welcome Miss Leotia Carroll, the new president of the Conference Young Adult Fellowship. Her report reveals an effective program.

General Church School Work: We are pleased to know of the district church school workers' meetings held during the year on all districts under the direction of district directors of General Church School Work.

Leadership Education: We are seeking ways to make our work of leadership education more effective. The prospects of working with other Annual Conferences are very good. Plans are being made in this area with the Philadelphia and Peninsula Conferences.

Family Life: The Family Life Committee's report gives evidence of progress in this once neglected phase of our work. Thirty-nine delegates from our conference attended the Family Life Conference in Chicago in October.

We are of the opinion that many problems in the area of Christian education would be solved if we could get families of our communities committed to Christ and his teaching. Special Family Life projects have been promoted on all districts since the Chicago Conference.

Camp Development: We are pleased to report progress in our camp development. During the year we purchased 12 additional acres of land making a total area of 62 acres.

A few months ago we were saddened by the passing of Mrs. Rosa Cheers from whom we purchased the major part of our campsite. She was most interested in our project as was shown by her willingness to make the tract of land available to us at a very modest price. She was a friend to our cause.

Now that we are in the final campaign to raise \$20,000.00, we have been greatly encouraged by the great response given to the "Miss Delaware Conference Queen Contest."

I take this opportunity to announce the receipt of a \$2,500 donation from

Mr. Walter S. Carpenter, Jr., Methodist layman, member of Grace Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware.

Student Work: Visits to some of our campuses by members of the committee, have revealed our need to keep in closer touch with students. We feel a keen sense of responsibility for the ministry to Methodist students in the state and private colleges within the territory of our Conference. We have found the administrations of these colleges most anxious to have us work with the students.

Scholarship Aid: The report of the Scholarship Committee will reveal a great need to help more of our students financially. We have awarded for this cause \$2,305 this school year.

Cooperation with Other Boards and Agencies: Realizing that our work in education is merely a part of the larger ministry of the church, we have counted it a privilege to have worked with other boards and agencies of the conference.

Working with Other Conferences: We are pleased that Mrs. Emma W. Strother, Rev. Edwin L. Ellis, and Rev. David W. Briddell of our staff, are frequently called upon to serve in other conferences in laboratory schools for Children's Workers, Camps for Youth and Workshops for Adults.

The Annual Children's Workers' Institute held jointly with the Philadelphia Conference and Laboratory School held last summer jointly with the Peninsula Conference, have done much to strengthen a sense of fellowship across conference lines.

Appreciation: We shall be ever grateful for the support of all who have made this report possible. Our staff has been resourceful, able and willing to work.

Recommendations

I. Children's Work

1. That every church organize a Council of Children's Workers.
2. That Missionary Education be given greater stress in all churches by the Commission on Education and Woman's Society of Christian Service.
3. That every church make special plans to be ready to use the new Curriculum for Children which will be issued in time to be used in September, 1964.
4. That the workers with children be given special training in leadership development.
5. That there be a Vacation Church School conducted in every church.

II. Youth Work (See The Youth Director's report)

III. Adult Work

1. That a Conference Council of Adult Work be established in the Delaware Conference, whose function shall be to provide a comprehensive program of Christian education for young, middle and older adults of the conference.
2. That the Council of Adult Work shall receive all funds from the Conference treasurer, designated for adult work; budget and appropriate the funds to the various agencies and enterprises of adult work in the conference.
3. That the apportionment for "Young Adult Support" be amended to read, "Adult Work Support."

4. That we request the Commission on World Service and Finance to increase the asking for Adult Work Support based upon $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1% of the pastor's salary to an amount equal to 1% of the pastor's salary.

IV. *Special Days*

That in addition to the regular special days provided for in the *Discipline*, we observe the following:

1. *College and Seminary Day*—the fourth Sunday in November.
2. *Camp Development Day*—the second Sunday in March, except when this is the date of One Great Hour of Sharing. In that case the fourth Sunday in February is to be observed as Camp Development Day.

V. *Higher Education*

1. That we continue the asking of \$1.50 per member to support our schools and colleges.

2. That this amount be placed in the regular budget of the church, with the suggestion that the fourth Sunday in November, *College and Seminary Day*, be used as the special day to secure the offering of \$1.50 per member, and that other special projects be sponsored for this cause.

3. That we use the amount raised for schools and colleges and Wesley Foundations as indicated:

- (1) Priorities—to be reserved for immediate distribution when needed—\$2,400.00
 - a. To support the chaplain of Wesley Club at Morgan Christian Center—\$1,200.00
 - b. To support Wesley Foundation and/or MSM on college campuses, and promotion—\$1,200.00
 - (a) Delaware State College—\$400.00
 - (b) Lincoln University—\$400.00
 - (c) Promotion—\$400.00
- (2) Balance of money raised for schools and colleges and Wesley Foundations to be distributed on a percentage basis as indicated:

a. Morristown College	25%
b. Bennett College	25%
c. Wesley Theological Seminary	25%
d. Gammon Theological Seminary	5%
e. Wesley Foundation, Howard University	3%
f. Wesley Foundation, Md. State College	15%
g. Allen High School	2%

4. That we support Morgan Christian Center with our Race Relations Day offering. Should this offering go beyond \$2,500, the remainder is to be given to other institutions in the Baltimore Area.

Family Life

1. That a district director of Family Life be appointed by the district superintendent to be the director of this program.

2. That time be given at each district conference in 1963 for education in family life.

3. That each district be urged to select a church to do a pilot program as project on family life.

4. That each minister obtain from the Department of Family Life, Board of Education, Methodist Church, the summary of the session of the National Conference on Family Life, held in Chicago, Illinois, October 19, 1962. Price \$1.00.

5. That the "Church at Home" concept be given urgent attention through phases of worship, study, fellowship and counseling the family unit.

6. That a Work Camp in Family Life for local church leadership and/or a Work Camp for interested families be held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth or another appropriate camp during the coming summer season.

7. We finally recommend, in order that a more effective and stable program of family life be projected, and finalized with adequate resources, that the Conference Board of Education provide a budget for the committee's work.

HOWARD A. BAILEY

The Youth Director

My first year as Youth Director has been challenging and exciting. Three of the most helpful activities which contributed to my adjustment were the Senior High Laboratory held at Williamsport, Pennsylvania, the Wesley Institute of the Philadelphia Conference held at Drew University, and the New Directors' Workshop held at Nashville.

The youth work of the Conference has continued progressively. This has been possible through the conscious efforts of the Youth Council, under the leadership of its president, Miss Carolyn Jackson, and the loyal support and direction given by our Executive Secretary, Rev. Howard A. Bailey.

Junior High Assemblies: Each district held successful assemblies. The Philadelphia and Wilmington Districts met jointly at Haverford College, Haverford, Pennsylvania; the Salisbury and Easton Districts met jointly at Maryland State College, Princess Anne, Maryland; and the Dover District had its assembly at New Zion Church, Laurel, Delaware. The district directors are doing fine work.

Conference Youth Assembly: The Senior High Assembly was held at Haverford College with an attendance of 126 youth and 34 adults. The theme was, "Being a Christian at Work." My sincere thanks and deep appreciation to the loyal staff members. Also adding interest to the assembly were Mr. Marion Way, missionary on leave from Angola, and Miss Lena McRoberts, deaconess serving the Philadelphia Conference.

Christian Witness Missions: Our Conference youth participated in six missions throughout the conference, sponsored jointly by the Boards of Evangelism, Missions, and Education. There were 49 teams in the project, 612 visits made, 555 interviews, 138 commitments, and 393 prospects throughout the area covered by the five districts.

The Missionary Rallies featured "The Christian Mission on the Rim of East Asia" and "The Church's Mission and Persons of Special Need" last November. A total of 1,055 persons were reached through their effort. This includes 891 youth, and 164 adults. The amount of \$988.00 was reported for the M. Y. Fund, and \$41.00 for Youth Conference Support. A total of 103 charges out of a possible 167 were represented. It is hoped that this activity will grow to include larger representation, and greater support for the financial causes emphasized.

Camping: The Youth Council went on record in support of the "Miss Delaware Conference Queen Contest." The youth worked hard to put the campaign "over the top."

Many adults participated to make it successful. Camping committees are being set up on the districts and in many local churches. Several adult workers attended camp training sessions to become better prepared as camp directors and leaders. Such leadership will be continued. A developed campsite, and a strong program of camping, are necessary for our Conference.

Leadership Training projects were planned and carried out on some of the districts. These enterprises were for the purpose of orienting adult workers and youth officers of the local churches, sub-districts and districts in the organization and program of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, and to relate their particular responsibilities as officers and workers. The Youth Council will again, this coming fall, plan for more leadership training on the five districts.

The Youth Council: It is my opinion that we have one of the better councils. To see it at work under the leadership of Miss Carolyn Jackson, our conference president, is a real joy. These young people exemplify young churchmanship at its best. Under their guidance, programs planned are faithfully carried out. Their initiative and creative capacities are far above the average. (It is because of their loyalty and efficiency that much of the usual pressures are relieved from the Youth Director and other adults who work with them.)

Finances: It is a real concern for our conference that greater emphasis be put on raising the educational items of our apportionments. Some feeble attempts have been made by the Youth Director and the Council to encourage local churches to observe such special days as Rally Day and Youth Loyalty Sunday, to lend greater support to the youth work of the Conference. No reasonable degree of success has been achieved. If our present program is believed to be essential, our financial efforts must be commensurate. We must sincerely face this problem so that no phase of our program should suffer or be eliminated.

Worthy Note: The Council and the youth of the Delaware Conference enjoy a distinct honor to have our president, Miss Carolyn Jackson, elected as the secretary of the National Conference of Methodist Youth. Miss Jackson journeyed to Willamette University, Salem, Oregon, last summer to represent us. Carolyn has been a fine president, and has always been willing to share her experiences with the youth. I am sure that she will do a great job in her office as national secretary.

Recommendations

1. That the responsible boards of the Conference consider sponsoring the Christian Witness Mission again this year.
2. That more time be given to the cultivation of a program of stewardship education among youth.
3. That further cooperation be given to the efforts of the Delaware Conference and the neighboring conferences in the interest of an integrated summer program for youth.
4. That we approve the increase in the budget of the Youth Council for the ensuing year.

5. That we continue to devote our attention to the cultivation and follow-up of those who make a commitment to church related vocations.

6. That we embark upon a strong and active program for youth in the area of Christian Social Concerns with special emphasis on "The Inclusive Church."

7. That more leadership enterprises be established for the training of youth officers and adult workers with youth on the local church, sub-district, district, and conference levels.

I close this, my first report in a spirit of gratitude and appreciation to Bishop Love, the Cabinet, members of the Board, Youth Council, loyal youth and adults of the Conference, and co-workers on the staff. It is my sincere desire to serve the board and the Conference not only to the point of your expectations, but over and beyond, insofar as God gives wisdom, strength, and direction.

7. BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The responsibility of the Board of Evangelism is to give guidance to the District Committee on Evangelism and the local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism in carrying out their purposes and responsibility as outlined in the *Discipline*, paragraph 222. Eighteen objectives are encoached in this paragraph for the promotion of evangelism. These goals can only be accomplished to the degree that pastors, laymen and local commissions accept them as their full responsibility for achieving.

This being the Aldersgate Year, evangelism is very urgent. The goals that

we set for ourselves in the year of 1962 have not as yet been achieved. Spiritual renewal is the aim for laity as well as the minister. We cannot cease our efforts until the Church shall have another Pentecost.

Two major objectives that should attract the attention of every layman and minister of the Conference are: "Go Deeper, Go Forward." In order to build a superstructure, the foundation must be deep in the earth. The same is true of our spiritual lives. The foundation must be laid deep in the things of God. We must not be afraid to make Bible reading the major emphasis. We are fully convinced that the words of the Psalmist are as true today as they were when first spoken. "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path." According to John Wesley, it was the words from the Bible that started him on the road of this renewed life. Hence the "warm heart." Because of this experience there came a new awakening in the Church of that day.

Two books that have been suggested as aids to deepening the spiritual lives of both minister and layman are Luther's Preface to Romans and Acts. These are called the books of "power." In II Timothy 2:15 we have this command, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." The new English Bible translates this verse in these words: "Try hard to show yourself worthy of God's approval, as a labourer who need not be ashamed, driving a straight furrow, in your proclamation of the truth."

Each one of us is called upon to witness for Christ through our daily vocation. The total program of witnessing for Christ must not be left to the minister alone. The minister rightly assumes the responsibility of leadership in evangelism and at the same time gives direction. The layman must join hands with the minister in telling God's Good News. The heart of evangelism is proclaiming the Good News that God in his infinite love has opened up a road for man's salvation.

Recommendations

1. That the Delaware Conference shall cooperate with other conferences, Peninsula, Baltimore, and Washington in the celebrating of the 225th Aldersgate Anniversary and that on October 13 Delaware and Peninsula Conferences shall hold a joint service at the Civic Auditorium in Salisbury, Maryland.
2. That we shall cooperate in the program set up by the Council of Evangelism at Ocean City, N. J.
3. The Board of Evangelism and Board of Education work cooperatively on joint programs of "Evangelism through the Church School."
4. That the Board of Evangelism cooperate with the Board of Missions and other agencies in establishing new congregations.
5. That the Board of Evangelism seek ways to promote inter-denominational evangelism.
6. That the Board of Evangelism make available at the conference and district levels a comprehensive display of available evangelistic materials and *The Upper Room*.
7. That the Board of Evangelism explore the possibility of "Commando Groups" for use through the conference.

8. BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Recognizing it to be imperative that we become better informed on the work of the General Board of Lay Activities the Conference Board recommends the following:

1. That a Workshop Conference, under the direction of the General Board, be set up for ministers on a conference level.
2. That in order to prevent conflict, an inter-board council be set up for the purpose of planning programs and clearing dates on the conference level.
3. That the Bishop or his appointee be chairman of this council.
4. That each church send its pastor, lay leader or lay speaker, chairman of Commission on Missions, president or officer of Methodist Men, and secretary of stewardship to the Mid-Year Conference in Atlantic City, November 15-17, 1963.

9. BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Revised Proposal for Raising The \$30,000 Matching or Building Fund

The campaign to raise the aforementioned funds has been greatly curtailed due to the apparent apathy toward the project of a Home for the Aging. This threatens to curtail the present and much needed support from the Kendall Fund which is administered by the General Board of Hospitals and Homes.

The need for a home is much in evidence and increases daily. The Board of Hospitals and Homes, Directors of the Home for the Aging and the Cabinet agreed on the following proposal, providing the Federal Housing Administration grants the loan to erect the planned building.

Recommendations

1. That the Commission on World Service and Finance accept and present to the Conference as a part of the 1963-64 Budget, the amount of \$30,000 and that any unpaid assessment be re-assessed to the delinquent charges for the year 1964-65.
2. That the Conference Treasurer submit to the Cabinet, Bishop and Campaign Director a progress report of charges quarterly: Sept. 15, 1963, Jan. 15 and April 15, 1964.
3. That we work toward raising the Fund completely by Oct. 1964 (District Conferences).
4. That the District Superintendents arrange for a roll call at each District Conference; Board of Hospitals and Homes arrange for an Annual Conference roll call in 1964 and a Victory Rally at the 1965 Annual Conference with the awarding of banners to districts and certificates to local churches.
5. That any previous amounts paid since the drive was initiated, that can be certified by vouchers, will be credited to the respective charge and district.
6. The district apportionment shall be on the usual percentage basis.

10. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

The Board was officially represented in a number of international, national, and interjurisdictional conferences in an attempt to keep itself and the Conference abreast of the issues for which it carries a responsibility, and to give voice to the interests and aspirations of the Delaware Conference in all these concerns.

The chairman of the Division of Peace and World Order represented us on the World Peace Tour of Europe and Russia.

Proposed Program of Integration

A major concern of the Board this year has been the area of race relations. Of special concern is the existing and proposed legislation respecting the Central Jurisdiction, and particularly how this legislation affects the Delaware Conference.

The Board takes a position fostered by The Church in such General Conference pronouncements as:

"There is no place in The Methodist Church for racial discrimination or racial segregation."

It is in agreement with the principles which underlie legislation designed to eliminate the Central Jurisdiction. More specifically, the Board accepts the point of view voiced by the 1960 Central Jurisdictional Conference which said in part:

"that this Conference record its recognition of the inevitability of the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction as a racial unit in the structure of The Methodist Church, and do here express its willingness and intention to help develop satisfactory plans and procedures to abolish the Central Jurisdiction with as much speed as sound and satisfactory planning may permit, and to this end this Conference commits itself. . . ."

A further refinement of the Board's point of view would be its endorsement and agreement with the general proposals worked out at and following the Cincinnati Study Conference as set forth in "The Central Jurisdiction Speaks" and the "Study Document." In summary, these call for an inclusive "Christian fellowship completely uncircumscribed, at all levels of church life, by distinctions based on race or color"; the realignment of conferences of the Central Jurisdiction; the subsequent merging of all Central Jurisdiction conferences and churches with the geographical jurisdictions and conferences; the current use of Amendment IX to facilitate transfers of individual churches or groups of churches, provided that the transfers be made in a "framework of over-all planning" as suggested by the Cincinnati Study Conference.

The Board understands that the General Conference Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations has accepted in principle this point of view, and is preparing its report to the coming General Conference with a view toward seeking legislation and authorization to implement these actions during the quadrennium 1964-68.

All this would indicate that the hour of decision in the Delaware Conference is close at hand. Invitations are already on record requesting the Conference to transfer to the Northeastern Jurisdiction. Groups of churches of the Conference also hold invitations to join geographical conferences in which they are located. In both cases, the declared deterrents which have delayed transfer up to this time will be eliminated if the proposed legislation is enacted. The issue of the dissolution of the Delaware Conference and the merging of its churches and institutions with the conferences which it overlaps is one that in all probability will have to be faced within the next two years.

The Board has sought to call this to the attention, both of our own conference and the six conferences whose territory we overlap. Each of the Northeastern Jurisdiction Conferences involved has been alerted to our desire to sit down together and begin discussion of the issues.

Internally, the Board has listed a number of factors which will need exploration, and has made a survey of these for each group which will be having separate discussion sessions with the six Annual Conferences involved. These factors include such items as personnel; salaries; annuity rates and responsibilities; financial strength and potential; property values, liabilities and assets; itinerancy policies; leadership potential and opportunities for laymen and ministers; ministers in detached services, etc.

THE SPECIAL CASE OF THE NEW YORK CHURCHES

Invitations have been extended over a period of several years seeking the transfer of all eleven Delaware Conference churches in that area into the New York and New York East Conferences. Discussions had ceased for some time in deference to the proposals of the Cincinnati meeting calling for mass realignment of all Central Jurisdiction Conferences and mass transfer by conferences following realignment in June 1964, except in cases where churches and groups of churches might be transferred prior to that time if done in accordance with "sound and satisfactory planning."

The Board has made a survey of the Conference and is prepared to share summaries of pertinent facts concerning the group of churches involved with each of these six conferences with which it is proposed that we will be merging. Arrangements have been made for full discussion of these issues during the session of the Annual Conference.

On March 4, 1963, the New York and New York East Conferences issued a joint renewal of their previous invitations to the eleven Delaware Conference churches to transfer as of June 1964. The urgency of the new invitation was the fact that the New York and New York East Conferences are set to merge into one new conference, effective at the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference in June 1964. It was argued that it would be quite advantageous for these eleven churches to be in on the ground floor of a three-way reorganization of all Methodist work in the area into the new conference.

Recognition was made for the fact that the Cincinnati proposals call for the transfer of the entire Delaware Conference after its realignment at the Central Jurisdictional Conference, also to be held in June 1964. It is assumed that the Delaware Conference, once transferred, would shortly thereafter be merged with the existing Northeastern Jurisdiction's Conferences. The proposed transfer of the eleven churches as of June 1964 would be anteceding an action that would otherwise be taken only a month or two later.

The invitation offered the same guarantees as had been previously made, to the effect that the new conference would meet all the financial obligations which these eleven churches had been assuming in the Delaware Conference until such time as the Delaware Conference is dissolved.

The invitation proposed that the churches take action now and seek the approval of the 1963 Delaware Conference session to transfer as of June 1964. This done, the Delaware Conference would be asked to appoint representatives to the joint committee which is working on organizational plans for the new New York Conference.

On March 22nd, a meeting was called by Bishop Love, which was attended by the pastors and lay representatives of the eleven churches. The Bishop informed the group of the invitation that had been extended. He expressed his personal sense of obligation to put the issue clearly before the churches and to urge that the congregations be given an opportunity to discuss the issue freely and to take whatever action they desired concerning the invitation. He pointed out that the climate for racial unity within the Nation and the Church has significantly improved; and commented that it becomes increasingly difficult to justify our claim that we want to end segregation in the Church while continuing to refuse invitations to transfer to the geographical conferences.

After considerable discussion and questions, Bishop Love reviewed the procedure whereby a local church takes action to transfer. Background

materials were shared, including factual data concerning the churches and the new conference prepared by the Board, "The Central Jurisdiction Speaks," "The Church and Race" and the "Study Document." The Bishop commended the Board for the attention it is giving to this matter here and throughout the Conference.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation to Bishop Love, Cabinet, Executive Director, District Directors, and all others who have cooperated so well in promoting Board's work this year. The Chairman is deeply grateful to all these, too, and to the members of the Board whose hearty cooperation have made what might have been a tedious chore a pleasurable service.

Recommendations

1. That the Conference go on record as endorsing the proposals developed as outgrowth of the Central Jurisdiction Study Conference and outlined in, "The Central Jurisdiction Speaks" and the "Study Document."

2. That the Conference call upon its churches, boards and agencies, and other administrative units to stand alerted to the prospect that the Conference may be transferred to the Northeastern Jurisdiction in the not too distant future, and that efforts should be made by all to do whatever is conceivable to make the transition as smooth and as profitable as possible.

3. That a committee be established consisting of the chairmen or representatives of each major board or agency, and the district superintendents which shall, in cooperation with the Board of Christian Social Concerns, formulate goals, standards, and other criteria for negotiating the transfer of the Conference and subsequent mergers with other conferences. That the committee be empowered to work with a similar committee of any other conference.

4. That endorsement and encouragement be given to a program of education in Christian race relations in each local church so as to provide a more propitious climate of attitudes; that such a study include practical suggestions for encouraging and establishing inter-racial fellowship activities.

5. That in the case of the churches in the New York Area, that the Conference approve the transfer of such of them as request it, effective as of June 1964.

6. That the Conference increase the number of members on the Board, giving consideration to adequate representation from all geographical sections of the Conference.

Conference Director

It has been a privilege to serve the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns. The work this year has been primarily that of working on Human Relations and Economic Affairs, Peace and World Order, and Temperance and General Welfare. Upon these areas of concern hinge the alternatives of fulfillment or deprivation for individuals, freedom or captivity in our society, existence or destruction of our planet.

Christian Social Concerns must be vital in every church. If we fail to live as Christians in day by day relationships, our evangelism, missions, and all other relationships will prove ineffective.

OUR STAFF. Our Chairman, C. L. Carrington, has given outstanding leadership. He has represented our Board at sessions of the Genesee Conference and the Chicago study conference on "Moral Man and Moral Society."

The division chairmen and district directors deserve special mention for excellent cooperation and of bringing the life and the practices of the Church into harmony with God's will as revealed in the statement "Jesus Christ is Lord." Bishop Edgar A. Love, District Superintendents, and pastors have supported and given encouragement to the total program.

DISTRICT DIRECTORS' REPORTS: The reports of the Directors reveal some unusual observances of special days, special weeks, and Social Concerns meetings; examples, Negro History Week, Joint meeting of the Delaware and Philadelphia Conferences on Peace, sharing with the New Jersey Conference on "Consultations on Race in The Methodist Church," and Race Relations Day seeking to develop constructive, positive programs to lessen race tensions and develop wholesome community attitudes.

On the other hand, the questionnaires returned to our office reflect a lack of emphasis on some vital issues, such as expressing opinion to government officials, study programs of books on disarmament, alcoholism, housing, unemployment, pornography and other social concerns.

On a whole, the work of the Board of Christian Social Concerns has been encouraging and challenging. We have taken the call issued by the General Conference and General Board of Social Concerns seriously, and are thinking and talking about the impact of the Christian faith on the individual and national life of our people.

Your director and staff stand ready to assist in every way possible.

We Recommend

1. That we express concern to our government representatives by letters and personal contact on vital social issues.
2. That we stimulate public interest by writing newspapers concerning local efforts for social betterment.
3. That we remind the public that 62 cents of each tax dollar is for defense. Under world law, we could safely disarm and reduce that burden and our schools, hospitals, and scientific research would benefit.
4. That we make use of literature, filmstrips and available speakers.
5. That we coordinate the year's programming of meetings, discussion groups, and major events with other Conference boards and commissions.

Resolution Implementing Recommendation No. 1, Board of Christian Social Concerns

REALIGNMENT AND ABOLITION OF THE CENTRAL JURISDICTION

WHEREAS, at its One Hundredth Annual Session in 1962 the Delaware Conference resolved that the statement of principles and recommendations of the Cincinnati Study Conference shall be regarded "as definitive criteria for the consideration of any proposal or proposals for transferring a local church or an annual conference from the Central Jurisdiction under Amendment IX," and

Whereas, one recommendation of the Cincinnati Study Conference was that

the Committee of Five "develop a proposal for presentation to the 1964 Jurisdictional Conference" which would realign the annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction "so that each conference will be located within the boundary of not more than one regional jurisdiction," and

Whereas, the Committee of Five has developed for purposes of annual conference consideration a Study Document on Realignment of the Central Jurisdiction (hereafter called the *Study Document*), which contains the substance of a proposal to be recommended to the 1964 Jurisdictional Conference,

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, THEREFORE, as follows:

1. That the Delaware Conference endorses and supports the basic principles and recommendations regarding realignment of the conferences of the Central Jurisdiction which are contained in the *Study Document*.

2. That the Delaware Conference endorses the principle that if realigned substantially in the manner proposed in the *Study Document*, conferences of the Central Jurisdiction should seek, during the 1964-68 quadrennium, to transfer into the regional jurisdictions in which they will lie geographically.

3. That the Delaware Conference hereby pledges its support of such transfers, *PROVIDED*, that as presented to the conferences of the Central Jurisdiction for approval, the *actual agreements* to effect the transfers shall specifically stipulate that:

(a) The conferences transferring from the Central Jurisdiction shall be merged as soon as possible during the 1964-68 quadrennium with existing (or newly created) conferences of the regional jurisdictions into which they transfer.

(b) The ministers of Central Jurisdiction conferences transferring into regional jurisdictions shall enjoy the same status, rights, and privileges (under the same conditions) as are or may be enjoyed by the other ministers in the conferences of the regional jurisdictions.

(c) The opportunities for lay men and women and ministers of churches transferred with Central Jurisdiction annual conferences to participate in all aspects of the programs of conferences in the regional jurisdictions, shall not be limited or abridged on grounds of race or color.

(d) When all the annual conferences of a given episcopal area of the Central Jurisdiction transfer into the regional jurisdiction in which they are geographically located, the resident bishop of the area involved shall also be transferred into that jurisdiction in accordance with the applicable provision of *Article V* of Division Three, and/or *Amendment IX*, of the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

(e) Any regional jurisdiction into which a Central Jurisdiction annual conference (or conferences) shall transfer, shall indicate a willingness to assist in coping with the problems resulting from (1) the transference of the conference (or conferences), and (2) the relation of such transfers to the overall *programmed* abolition of the Central Jurisdiction.

4. That in such cases wherein Central Jurisdiction conferences or churches cannot be transferred into regional jurisdictions and conferences in accordance with the provisions as set forth under Number 3, above, those conferences and/

or churches shall remain within and be "The Central Jurisdiction" until such time as they have been transferred to regional jurisdictions in which they lie, in full accordance with the provisions of Number 3 above.

**Resolution Implementing Recommendation No. 5,
Board of Christian Social Concerns**

**TRANSFERS OF LOCAL CHURCHES IN NEW YORK CITY
AND VICINITY**

WHEREAS, In their joint declaration of September 1, 1962, further implementing the recommendations of the Cincinnati Study Conference, the College of Bishops of the Central Jurisdiction and the Committee of Five expressed approval of and sought to encourage the transfers of local churches into annual conferences of the regional jurisdictions, where such transfers are "properly planned and executed," and

Whereas, As a result of joint planning on the part of representatives of the New York East Conference, the New York Conference, and the Delaware Conference, it has been proposed that the eleven (11) Central Jurisdiction churches in New York City and vicinity which are located geographically within the bounds of the New York East and New York Conferences join these two conferences in a three-way merger of all Methodist work in New York City and vicinity into the new New York Conference, and

Whereas, The aforementioned proposal is part of a projected plan of merger of the New York East and New York Conferences in 1964, and

Whereas, The New York and New York East Conferences have given assurance that the effective ministers of the Delaware Conference churches involved and the ministers in detached service of the district involved shall have the right to enter as Charter Members of the new New York Conference, and that those electing to exercise this right shall enjoy the same status, rights, and privileges (under the same conditions) as are or may be enjoyed by the other ministers of the New York East and New York Conferences, and that the opportunities for lay men and women and ministers of the local churches involved to participate in all aspects of the programs of the new New York Conference shall not be limited or abridged on grounds of race or color, and

Whereas, Plans have been formulated for the inclusion of representatives of the eleven (11) churches in the joint planning of the new conference so as to insure adequate and proper participation at all levels, and

Whereas, The New York East and New York Conferences (or the successor conference thereto) have indicated a willingness to assist the Delaware Conference in coping with the problems resulting from the transfers of the said eleven (11) local churches; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Delaware Conference hereby approves such transfers of the said eleven (11) churches of the Central Jurisdiction as of the time of organization of the new New York Conference in June 1964, PROVIDED that:

All of the procedures of Amendment IX are fully complied with by the said local churches, and further

Resolved, That the Cabinet of the Delaware Conference, after consultation with the Board of Christian Social Concerns of said Conference, shall, and hereby is authorized, to make a determination in writing that the conditions

specified in the preceding paragraphs of this Resolution have been fully met; and further

Resolved, That the written determination of the said Cabinet and the record of voting of the churches involved shall be made a part of the permanent records of the Delaware Conference, and shall constitute the final action of the said Conference with respect to the transfers of the local churches under Amendment IX.

REPORT OF HENRI M. DEAS ON TRIP TO EUROPE AND RUSSIA

On July 18, 1962, the delegation of thirty-one Methodist pastors, teachers, scholars, and theologians representing the six jurisdictions of The Methodist Church left New York City on a Study Tour to nine European countries including territory within the Soviet Union. The tour which lasted until August 31, was conducted by Dr. Carle D. Soule, director of the Methodist United Nations Office.

The purpose of the Study Tour was to acquire information and insights which would enable Methodist leaders to be more effective in understanding the underlying policies and programs relative to better international accord and world order. In proceeding under a rigid schedule and traveling over 50,000 air miles the delegation met with more than a hundred prominent civic, church, and state officials in the nine countries and held some sixty-four discussions, interviews and formal conferences with them. Discussions were held with representatives of the British Methodist Church, members of British House of Parliament and German Bundestag in Bonn, Germany; Arch-Patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church; Bishop of Moscow; Head of the Russian Orthodox Theological Seminary at Zagorsk; ministers and leaders of the Russian Orthodox Church and the Baptist Church in the Soviet Union. Visits were held with officials of the Soviet Government in the following cities: Moscow, Samarkand, Tashkent, Kiev, Warsaw, Prague, Tbilisi, and Leningrad.

The conferences involved discussions on theology, church policy, attitudes

and influences of the organized church for peace; and on industrial and agricultural development within the Soviet Socialist Republics. Insight was gained concerning the extent and practice of religion in Russia.

The conversations with Russian churchmen were held in a spirit of mutual understanding, fraternity and cordiality. It was agreed to do all possible to develop and extend friendly relations between the people of the U. S. A. and the U. S. S. R. to promote mutual understanding and to abolish mistrust and fear between these two countries. In Russia, as well as in Czechoslovakia and Poland, a wide interest was continually shown by their citizens in the current problem of race relations in the United States. The condition of the American Negro was the subject of question periods following nearly every discussion.

Concern was shown in all countries, particularly among the ordinary citizens in the so-called iron-curtain countries, toward the attaining of a just and lasting peace; for the relaxing of world tensions; the persuading of the atomic and nuclear powers to reach agreement for the prohibition of nuclear tests and to direct their energies toward general and complete disarmament and international control.

11. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

When one looks at the great task which confronts the Church, it becomes increasingly evident that its future leadership must be assured. In our present day society every institution is expressing a deep concern for recruiting and training of leaders. Scholarships, loans and other types of aid are being offered to promising students by the government, industry, social agencies, and other institutions. Can the Church do less to assure its leadership?

Our concern is not merely to help provide leadership for the Church and its related institutions, but we are also interested in helping our youth to find a life of fulfillment through Christian service. With these two objectives as our motivation, the Commission on Christian Vocations has promoted its program.

We are concerned that parents and local churches should work together in this area of work with youth. It is our hope that all of our churches have organized committees on Christian vocations. In some instances one or two persons who have a real concern in this area, may work most effectively through the Commission on Education.

The chairman of the Commission had the privilege of working with the Conference Board of Missions in a series of district meetings on "Our Mission Today." This was an opportunity to work with others in interpreting Christian vocations as it relates to missions and other areas of the Church's ministry. Our Commission also participated in the regional meeting of "Our Mission Today" in Washington, D. C.

Through the Committee on Higher Education, we are working with college students in the area of Christian vocations. We see a real possibility of recruiting for church related vocations. The interest in this matter on our college campuses has been encouraging.

We are of the opinion that the Christmas Conference on the Ministry and Missions is still one of our most effective opportunities to give guidance to those committed to serve in these two fields.

District Activities

The Dover District reports a Conference on Christian Vocations was held in March. Many areas of church related vocations were studied by the large number of youth who attended.

All districts have presented the challenge of vocations in summer assemblies and Missionary Rallies.

Recommendations

I. LOCAL CHURCH

1. That the Committee on Christian Vocations set up opportunities for youth to recognize the "call" to a Christian vocation.
2. That the committee organize for work in accord with the *Discipline*.
3. That the local committee cooperate with the district committee and Conference Commission in recruiting and guiding youth.
4. That the committee cooperate with community agencies which are working in the area of vocations.

II. DISTRICT AND SUBDISTRICT

1. That the District Superintendent emphasize vocations at quarterly conferences.
2. That a district director of vocations be appointed on each district who will work with the district committee.
3. That a career conference be held on each district annually.
4. That a workshop be conducted for vocation aspirants and their parents on the district or subdistrict level.

III. CONFERENCE

1. That we continue cooperation with other agencies in promoting the Christmas Conference on the Ministry and Missions.
2. That the Committee on the Annual Conference program make a provision for a special presentation on vocations at a conference evening session and that youth be invited to attend.
3. That we continue our cooperation with colleges and high schools in seeking to interpret to youth and young adults the call to Christian vocations.

12. COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

The District Superintendents with town and country charges have been very cooperative in arranging their programs to help promote our work. On the Dover District at Chesterton, Easton District at Easton, and Salisbury District at Pocomoke City, the discussions definitely lifted the ideas of mergers and togetherness.

At the Wicomico County Youth and Civic Center, Salisbury, Maryland, Nov. 30-Dec. 1, 1962, we held the first Town and Country Convocation. The attendance was over five hundred for the two days. Mrs. Ella Small, 83 years old, of Oxford, was the oldest in attendance. There were thirteen Federal, state and local agencies and ten conference boards and commissions displaying materials and equipment available to workers in our churches.

Opening with a banquet, fellowship was highlighted as we listened to an address by the Reverend Richard Johnson, pastor of Ebenezer Methodist Church, Washington, D. C. The keynote address was delivered by Mr. Phillip Aylesworth, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. Fifteen discussion groups presented needs and problems with possible solutions for the town and country charges. District Superintendent C. L. Trader showed films of Mission stations and scenes of activities in foreign lands. Directing a chorus, Dr. D. L. Ridout lifted the audience to high spirit. Dr. C. L. Carrington delivered a masterful sermon on "Jesus Feeding the Hungry Thousands."

We offer thanks to the Steering Committee, directed by Rev. E. A. Hughes, Bishop Love, the Cabinet and workers of all ranks.

The total cost of the Convocation was \$1,901.08. The districts gave financial supports as follows: Dover, \$243.50; Easton, \$401.00; Philadelphia, \$54.00; Salisbury, \$368.00; Wilmington, \$256.00; total, \$1,322.50.

13. TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

We report the following items as evidence of our work during the past year.

1. Three persons from our Conference received intensive training in audio-visuals at the Audio-Visual Seminar in Williamsport, Pa., August 1962.
2. Letters were sent to all pastors encouraging them to support the Methodist Television-Radio Ministry Fund and to encourage organization of the Inter-commission Audio-Visual Committee.
3. A standing invitation was conveyed to all district superintendents to call upon our agency to provide training experiences in audio-visuals and radio broadcasting techniques for ministers.
4. Contributions were requested of all conference agencies to purchase audio-visual equipment for use at and by conference meetings and agencies. We gratefully acknowledge the following contributions:
Board of Education \$100.00, Woman's Society of Christian Service \$50.00, Wesleyan Service Guild \$50.00, Young Adult Fellowship \$50.00, Mrs. Ruth Webb \$5.00, Mrs. Alberta Browne \$10.00; Total \$265.00.
5. A list of all audio-visual aids available in our Conference is now being compiled. We have consented to serve as the distributor for all audio-visual aids that persons, churches and agencies are willing to place in the Audio-Visual Library.
6. We have cooperated with Councils of Churches in the placement and promotion of Methodist programs such as Breakthru.
7. We have recommended certain ministers to receive training and participate in the radio and television ministry of various Councils of Churches. Some ministers and choirs have participated in radio and television programs.
8. We have cooperated with the program and work of General Trafco of The Methodist Church.

During the year to come, we will continue our efforts to secure the projector and screen for use in our conference enterprises. We will gladly accept the contribution of any conference agency so that we may have this equipment available for our summer meetings. Efforts will be made to complete the establishment of our Audio-Visual Library. We reaffirm our desire to provide training experiences for any conference, district or sub-district agency. We commend local churches that are making a serious attempt to use effectively audio-visual materials. We suggest that every church use the new manual for Intercommission Audio-Visual Committee. We further encourage local churches to use all the resources possible in their communities to secure the many excellent free films that are available in libraries and other centers.

Recommendation

We recommend that every church take a special offering for the Methodist Television-Radio Ministry Fund by September 1st and report the same to the conference treasurer.

Recommendations

1. That all ministers who are members of the Annual Conference (probationers included) serving a pastoral charge and not gainfully employed in any other occupation, shall receive \$3,000.00 minimum per annum.

2. That all approved supply pastors giving full-time service to a pastoral charge and not gainfully employed in any other occupation shall receive \$2,600.00 minimum per annum.

3. That the minimum salary plan of our Conference shall not include retired ministers, student approved supply pastors and part-time approved supply pastors.

4. That the minimum salary of a minister shall include the amount paid for salary by the local church and the amount received for salary from any other source of The Church (e.g., Division of National Missions, Promotional Fund). The Committee discourages persons from asking for consideration who receive an income from other sources whereby they attain the minimum salary level.

5. That the apportionment for minimum salary for each pastoral charge be equal to 5% of the pastor's salary, paid by that charge.

6. That the Minimum Salary Commission administer and distribute the funds for minimum salary.

7. That payments be made to ministers quarterly (September, December, March and May).

8. That the Commission on Minimum Salary shall recommend to the Conference each year, the proposed schedule of minimum salary.

9. That no pastor be granted minimum salary who does not submit to the Commission on Minimum Salary the information that is required to determine his eligibility. We further recommend that the request of each minister shall be made to the Commission not later than 30 days following the beginning of the conference year.

10. That the proposed apportionment for minimum salary shall be paid this coming conference year, but that the distribution of the funds as proposed in these recommendations begin the conference year of 1963-1964.

11. That a local church shall be reapportioned the next conference year any unpaid amount for minimum salary within a conference year. We further recommend that the provisions of paragraph 823, *Methodist Discipline*, regarding minimum salary as an essential part of the proportional payment of ministerial support be practiced by all pastoral charges.

PROGRESS TOWARD GOALS:

1. Membership goal is 50,000 members. This year our increase was by 314. This is a total of 44,431.

2. Ministerial active membership goal is 115. We have 99 including probationers.

3. We have asked for at least one \$5,000 appointment on Dover, Easton and Salisbury Districts.

It is suggested that the District Superintendents of the three Districts lift up in each Quarterly Conference, District Conference, and District Stewards meeting the matter of salaries and the uniting of churches to make circuits.

C. Other Reports

1. WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

It is with thanks to our Heavenly Father, and with appreciation and credit to our officers, secretaries of lines of work, and members of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild, that I offer this, my first report as Conference President.

The year 1962-63 has been one of study, planning and participation in the program of our Conference, Jurisdiction and The Methodist Church.

Ours was the privilege of being co-hostess to the Sixth Assembly of the Woman's Society, May 15-20, 1962 in Atlantic City, N. J. The "Struggle for the Minds of Men" and the tremendous thrust for brotherhood, which permeated the Assembly, were stamped indelibly on the minds of the uncounted number of delegates and visitors from the Delaware Conference. The bold stand calling for the elimination of bigotry and prejudice from our Methodist Church has greatly strengthened us.

At the Annual Meeting of the Central Jurisdiction held in Daytona Beach, Fla., February 20-24, 1963, we were represented by thirty-three delegates and visitors. We came home with the feeling that sincerity in our Christian living is demanded in this new era.

We are represented on the Executive Committee of the Division by Mrs. Wm. C. Strother, Jr. and on the Jurisdiction level by Mrs. Wm. A. Henry, Treasurer; Mrs. Thomas A. Anderson, member Nominating Committee; Mrs. James R. Webb, Member-at-large (Guild); and Mrs. Lena Dendy, Wesleyan Service Guild.

Complete cooperation between our Society and Guild has been enhanced by invitation and notification plus cooperation both by delegated officers' attendance and through cooperative study.

Our School of Missions continues to grow in quality and numbers. The excellent staff is appreciated. Echoes from their leadership resounds throughout the Conference. Each district has conducted a successful Seminar presenting the Approved Studies for the year. Leadership Training Workshops have also been conducted in all districts. Local societies and guilds have received a number of Jurisdiction Credit Certificates. We have studied with Central and Northeastern Jurisdictions and maintained an exchange of students with the Philadelphia, Washington and Peninsula Conferences.

We have cooperated with and have been a part of all Delaware Conference commissions and boards. As we toured the Conference with Bishop Love and other members of the Mission Team, we were pleased to see members of the Society and Guild there to greet us. The Commission on Town and Country, Boards of Christian Social Concerns and Education, and TRAFCO are among the conference agencies with which we are affiliated.

Our project, Friendship House, is enjoying good leadership under our Director, Mrs. Anna Elzey. Worship Services are being conducted by the

girls every Wednesday evening, with neighborhood clergy as guest speakers. The residents this year of various ethnic groups have lived happily together. The Annual Luncheon held at Friendship House was a gala occasion, with FELLOWSHIP the keynote. We are very grateful to Mrs. J. E. Dunn and her committee for their fine service. Trustees and Board of Management members are to be commended for their untiring vigilance and service. The Guild is also to be thanked for the gift of a washing machine.

We had the good fortune of entertaining in three areas of our Conference, the Third World Understanding Team that was brought to the United States under the auspices of the Department of Christian Social Relations, Woman's Division of Christian Service. Mrs. Lydia Zimonte of Southern Rhodesia, Miss Suma Kaisi of Tanganyika and Mrs. Christiana O. Onosanya of Nigeria were introduced to many of our American institutions and customs including: our family-life, churches, schools, colleges, health centers, hospitals, clinics, movie houses, etc. We hope they gained something of value from us. We saw in them SINCERITY, a desirable quality.

In addition to attendance at Schools of Missions this summer we expect two members of our Conference to attend the Town and Country Convocation in Minneapolis, Minn. in July; three to attend the Conference on Human Relations in Chicago, Ill. in August; and one to attend the National Seminar on "Women In Today's World" at Tacoma, Washington in August.

We thank every committee member, every society and guild member. It has been through the sacrifice and cooperation of each that this year's success has been achieved.

We offer the following recommendations:

1. That we find at least one candidate for Deaconess training in our Conference.
2. That each local and district society ascertain correct number of members enrolled.
3. Each Society become more aware of necessity of pledges to the "TOTAL BUDGET" being made by all members.
 - a. Explanation by treasurer of the budget and its provisions.
 - b. Minimum asking per capita by the Woman's Division for MISSIONS.
4. That all members avail themselves of opportunities to study the Methodist program.

May God help us each one to see clearly what her "MISSION TODAY" is; and to act so as to further the implementation of this mission.

2. AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

We have entered upon our 11th year of service in the office of our resident Bishop, with a deepening sense of appreciation for the duties incumbent upon us and with increasing appreciation for the cooperation of the pastors and laymen of our churches.

I have pointed out several times previously that my major responsibility is to assist Bishop Love in his administrative duties. It has been my privilege to represent him on many occasions when previous commitments caused him to be elsewhere.

The Bishop has, on the other hand, given me considerable freedom to work in the area of my major interest—the field of church music. My work with the

DELAWARE CONFERENCE

Methodist Commission on Worship and the Hymnal Revision Committee has absorbed much of my time during the last two and a half years. In addition, I have served the area at-large, annual conferences, districts, sub-districts and local churches in this educational program. It has been a most rewarding experience.

On February 3, 1964, at the Lyric Theatre, Baltimore, our Area office will present Methodist-born-and-bred Grace Bumbry in recital. Miss Bumbry, though only 25 years of age, has been hailed in the musical capitals of the world as one of the greatest—if not the greatest singer of the present time. This will be a major promotional effort, of course, and we are depending upon our pastors and churches within easy access of Baltimore to support us in this effort. Bishop Lord has pledged the cooperation of his office and the support of the churches in the Baltimore and Washington metropolitan areas.

The group insurance plan continues to be a blessing to widows of deceased ministers since instituted in September, 1959. We urge churches and/or pastors to pay premiums promptly to the conference treasurer. The rates increase slightly each year unless a larger number of young men are admitted to the conference to lower the average age of our pastors. Please remember that all pastors and full-time lay employees of our churches are insurable, except those who have reached the age of retirement before employment.

The Area Council will meet at Tioga Church, Philadelphia, October 15-17, 1963. This will be the last council over which Bishop Love will preside. It should be a notable session.

We should be reminded, too, that 1964 will mark the centennial year of the organization of the Delaware and Washington Annual Conferences. It will also mark the retirement year of Bishop Love. I need not suggest that we all work together to make 1964 a banner year at our Annual Conference sessions.

3. DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Delaware State Council of Churches had another successful year in its ministry.

The Annual General Assembly was held in Dover, January 31, 1963. Following the installation of the Executive Secretary, small group discussions and a business session were held. Officers were elected for the ensuing year. James C. Hardcastle of our Conference and the Dover District was elected treasurer.

The 1962 Migrant Ministry program sparked the first summer school in Delaware for children of migratory workers. The school under the supervision of a special staff committee of the State Board of Education, was held in space given by the Smyrna School Board. Expenses were underwritten by a grant obtained from a Delaware Foundation by the Council of United Church Women. A new Child Care Center for pre-school children was operated with migrant ministry funds in connection with the school. Chaplaincy program to Spanish speaking and Negro seasonal workers as well as the Staytonville Child Care Center were continued last summer.

Our financial goals for 1963-64 are: Receipts \$29,275.00 and expenditures \$29,275.00. These figures are somewhat above last year because this is the first time we have had a full time executive secretary. The total amount asked

from the Judicatories is \$16,275.00. We are asking \$200.00 from the areas in Delaware, thus affected.

As your representative on the executive board, I am asking that our contribution be sent directly to Mr. James C. Hardcastle, 121 N. Kirkwood Street, Dover, Delaware. Our 1962-63 contribution is now due.

In conclusion, may I say that through the Migrant Ministry, alone, there were: seven child care staff positions, four chaplains, 1,457 days of child care given, and 3,600 migrants served in addition to those in child care. The amount of \$10,301.00 was spent to cover the costs of this ministry in the name of churches of Delaware.

It has been a privilege to serve as your lay representative to the Delaware State Council of Churches, and on the executive board.

4. GREATER PHILADELPHIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Seventeenth Annual Meeting of the Greater Philadelphia Council of Churches held recently reflected the growing participation of the Delaware Conference churches in the programs and services which that cooperative agency provides. Gleaned from the reports of the six departments of the Council were the following items reflecting the breadth of this cooperative activity and the extent to which it enables us to undertake needed enterprises in the name of Christ and His Church.

The Preparation for Marriage Course aided more than fifty young engaged couples, most of whom had been referred by clergymen. The series, held three times a year, consists of four Monday night sessions under highly qualified leadership.

The rapidly changing nature of the City of Philadelphia requires careful planning on the part of the churches to meet the religious needs of the people. Each redevelopment area makes provision through the Council's Department of Research and Planning for churches that will be needed.

Of the forty-five ministers enrolled in the seminars conducted at Conwell School of Theology with the cooperation of the Council's Department of Research and Planning, two members of Delaware Conference are included. The other forty-three churches represented by the clergymen vary in size from 100 to more than 2,000 members. The men themselves range in educational achievement from less than high school to graduate work and they have served as pastors from less than three years to more than 30 years. Every shade of theological opinion is represented among them.

The Council continues developing new Sunday Schools for mentally retarded children of which there are at least 5,000 in the non-Roman constituency. The schools are held in areas where a number of churches cooperate and in which adequately prepared teachers can be found for this difficult but rewarding task.

Last summer more than 1,000 children from 40 vacation church schools visited the University of Pennsylvania Museum on Bible archeological tours arranged by the Council; other youth were served by the Council providing four full-time chaplains at the Boy Scout camps in the metropolitan area.

The growing number of students from other lands in the Greater Philadelphia Area makes increasingly heavy the foreign student hospitality program conducted by the Department of United Church Women. Each student

is offered the possibility of home hospitality as soon as his registration is completed at the university, hospital or technical school where he is enrolled. More than 600 host families participate in the program and many more are needed.

During the year the Council provided 329 hours of television and radio religious programming, the commercial value of which is nearly half a million dollars. The stations donate the time, but the Council through its Broadcasting Department must provide the program content.

The full report of the 1962 activities of the Council has been sent to each member congregation and is available to others upon request. There are at present 555 churches of twenty-six denominations carrying on this work assisted by hundreds of volunteers and a staff of sixteen full-time people, supported by an income in 1962 of approximately \$125,000.

The Rev. Henry H. Nichols of Janes Memorial Methodist Church is the new president for 1963.

6. REMARKS OF APPRECIATION

The church family of Mother Zoar looks forward to being host to the Centennial Celebration of the Delaware Conference. On behalf of Zoar, I publicly express appreciation to the Pastor, officers and members of our daughter congregation, Tindley Temple, for making possible the special arrangement which will permit Zoar to entertain at this site.

Although the official date of the founding of Zoar is 1794, persistent tradition states that as a praying fellowship she existed long before that date in Campingtown (Northern Liberties) where as occasion warranted, she would "steal away to Jesus" for free and unhampered worship, though being members of St. George's Church.

Zoar Church, the oldest Negro congregation within the organizational structure of The Methodist Church, has been in continuous service for one hundred and sixty-nine years.

Such historic persons as Henry Boehm, Thomas Coke, Francis Asbury, John Dickins and Harry (Black) Hoosier broke bread at Zoar.

Bishop Francis Asbury recorded in his Journal, "that on Thursday, August 4, 1796, I was called upon by the African (Zoar) Society in Campington to open their new house, which I did on Romans 1:16-18, and had an unwieldy

congregation of white and black. Brother Dickins gave a lively exhortation on the new birth."

The first Convention of Colored Local Preachers and Laymen was held at Zoar Church, August 23-27, 1852. Likewise, on August 5 and 6, 1857, the initial Conference of Colored Local Preachers was convened by Bishop Levi Scott. These meetings were forerunners of the organizing session of the Delaware Annual Conference which was convened July 29, 1864 at John Wesley Church, whose successor is Tindley Temple.

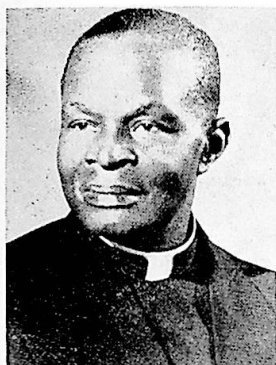

WILLIAM ARNOLD HAREWOOD



William Arnold Harewood, the first born of the late Alexander and Lillian Harewood, was born in Barbados, British West Indies. He came to this country at an early age, and was reared in a Christian home in Brooklyn, N. Y. As he grew into manhood, he looked for areas of service. He became, as a young man, one of the founders of John Wesley Methodist Church, Brooklyn, N. Y. As a layman, he held about every office in this Church which he loved.

His education included attendance in the secondary schools of Brooklyn, South Carolina State A. and M. College, and Gammon Theological Seminary. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Wilbur P. Thirkield in 1928 and elder by Bishop Edwin Holt Hughes in 1931. He was admitted to the Delaware Conference in 1929 and for thirty-four years was a militant minister of Jesus Christ. Except for the eight years spent in Montclair, N. J. as pastor of St. Marks Church, the churches which he served were all on the beautiful eastern shore of Maryland as follows: Cambridge Circuit, four years; East New Market, six years; Denton, two years; and Snow Hill, eight years. In 1949, he was appointed superintendent of the Easton District, from which he went to Montclair.

His first marriage to Miss Alverta Mae Johns was dissolved by her death. On November 22, 1945, he was united in wedlock to Miss Inez C. Campbell, who survives him.

He possessed a burning passion for the Lord's work. His talents were used for the glory of God. His joy was to help others. Throughout his ministry, he gave much of his strength to physical improvements in every parish with which he was connected. His knowledge of music was invaluable to the music ministry of each church. Where there was no organist, he met regularly with the choirs and trained them in singing the hymns and chants of the Methodist Hymnal, as well as difficult anthems. He is remembered for having each voice sing a score at least ten times until it was perfected. For him, no church was too small to learn the great hymns. His library included many valuable books on hymnody.

William Arnold Harewood had the faith and courage of Abraham. He not only wanted to do great things for God, but by faith, he demonstrated to his people how it could be done. With the love of Joseph and determination of Paul, he set out to attain many goals that seemed inaccessible. He worked hard to meet all conference apportionments. Being a tither himself, he led his people, wherever he served, to tithe and give more generously to the support of the churches. His crowning success came at St. Marks when two mortgages, totaling \$86,000, were paid and the church dedicated. It was only seven months after coming to Montclair that his health began to fail; yet, like Moses, he led his people to a spiritual and financial victory. When failing health limited his activity, he did much work by telephone from his sick bed.

He bore his affliction with grace and dignity. His appreciation to the loyal people of St. Marks was daily on his lips.

He left each pastorate better than he found it. He sought the best for God and His Church. He loved young people and strove to make them an integral part of the total life of the church. As administrator, he lifted the standard of the Easton District to a higher level. Churches became better organized, salaries raised, parsonages improved, and two lots located beside the district parsonage were purchased and paid for in six months. He had the privilege of assisting the late Reverend W. J. Helm when the latter was treasurer of the Delaware Conference. For thirteen years he served as registrar of the Conference Youth Assembly.

One citation of his civic leadership was evidenced when he organized a branch of the N.A.A.C.P. in Worcester County, Maryland. Through it he initiated educational scholarships for worthy college students.

Two of his many favorite hymns, "I'll Praise My Maker While I've Breath" and "Through All the Changing Scenes of Life," summarize his life. He was devoted to his family and was always respected as a Christian gentleman. He was a man of integrity. As a minister and friend one could always rely upon his promises. His greatest desire was not to be a great preacher or district superintendent, but he wanted to live so humble a Christian life that those with whom he labored might see the Christ of whom he spoke. His philosophy of life was based on Romans 8:28, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God."

When the end came in the early morning of February 18, we believe that he must have recalled those familiar words from Revelation 7:13-17 with which he customarily dismissed the Stewards from the Holy Communion: "Who are these that are arrayed in robes of white and whence came they? My God, Thou knowest. These are they which came out of great tribulation and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore are they before the throne of God, and serve Him day and night in his temple: and he that sitteth on the throne shall dwell among them. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat. For the Lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters: and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes."

"Now the laborer's task is o'er; Now the battle day is past; Now upon the farther shore lands the voyager at last. Father, in Thy gracious keeping leave we now Thy servant sleeping."

MARTIN LUTHER MCKENNEY, SR.

Martin Luther McKenney, Sr., born May 13, 1893, died on Monday, May 20, 1963, at the Lincoln Memorial Nursing Home in Baltimore, Maryland. He was the son of the late Reverend Martin Luther and Lydia McKenney.

His early childhood was spent on the eastern shore of Maryland. During World War I, he served in the Medical Corps of the United States Army, and saw active service overseas in France. In 1921, he joined the Washington Annual Conference of The Methodist Church and served for a number of years. During this time, he married Allean M. Later Rev. McKenney transferred to the Delaware Conference, the Conference of his father. He later married Mary V. Warfield of Buckhannon, West Virginia, who served the church faithfully until her death in October, 1962.

In February of 1962, he became ill. His illness forced his retirement from his one great love, the ministry of The Methodist Church after forty-two years of service. The last one and a half years of his life were spent in hospitals and nursing homes. During this time, he fought hard to regain the strength, vitality, and speech, which he had lost, but he was not able to win this battle. On Monday, God granted him mercy and ended the battle for him.

He leaves one son, Martin, Jr.; sisters, Iola McKenney and Beatrice Scott; brother, Lorenzo; daughter-in-law, niece, nephew, and other relatives.

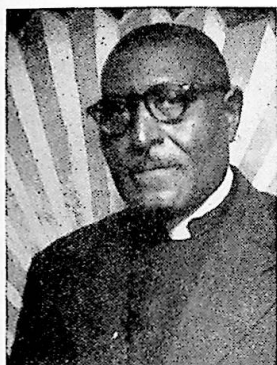

He possessed a great missionary spirit and a passionate heart for the salvation of the souls of men. He sought to answer the command of the Master, "Go ye into all the world."

On September 5, 1914 he was joined in holy matrimony to Josephine Chase, the daughter of the late Nathaniel and Mary Ann Chase of Upper Dorchester County. For forty-nine years this couple has given an example to the world of what two people dedicated to God and to each other can accomplish for the building of God's kingdom. During their married life his wife has been called to the ministry. Often when he could not fill his pulpit she has stepped in.

His first appointment by the late Dr. D. H. Hargis was to fill the unexpired pastorate of the late Rev. O. P. Dickerson who passed to his eternal rest while pastoring the Christ Rock Church. This, the Rev. Farrare did without pay. Then followed his very successful ministry as a pastor at Beckwith in Dorchester County, Cordova, and Williamsburg in Talbot County. He loved all of the people he served as one big family. They loved him and called him blessed, for as they met him, young and old, they were reminded of the holy kiss as they embraced him.

The Delaware Conference and the Easton District have been richer in their missionary endeavor, because these two people served well. Usually his church would report in full and many times first. This missionary spirit was with him even to the end for he said to his devoted wife the day of his passing, "Come on dear, let's go home." She said, "We are at home dear." "No, I mean our real home. I am so tired. Aren't you tired? Well, if you are not ready I won't have to cross Jordan alone." Then he sang in clear tones, "Lord I want to labor." With the assurance that his labor was over, he crossed Jordan, but not alone.

Besides his faithful wife he is survived by a devoted foster daughter, Fannie Stevens; a faithful son-in-law, Willard Stevens; and several nieces and nephews.

Marguerite Louise Jackson Reed, born in Jefferson, Texas in 1880, died in Washington, D. C. in November of 1962.

Marguerite was united in holy matrimony with the Reverend John H. Reed by Bishop I. B. Scott on December 10, 1894. To this union four children were born, a son, Walter; three daughters, Verna, Fannie, and Florence with whom she resided at the time of her death.

At the time of her marriage, Rev. Reed was a member of the Texas Annual Conference. Later in 1904, while visiting the General Conference in Los Angeles, Calif., her husband was reminded by the late Bishop J. C. Hartzell of a pledge which he had made while attending New Orleans University to forever stand "in readiness at the call of God and the church to go to Africa as a missionary!"

Rev. Reed decided to accept this call, but Marguerite, not having known of this pledge, was reluctant. After serious contemplation and recalling her experience in the devastating Galveston flood of 1900, being thankful to God for their survival, she too, decided to answer the call.

In January, 1905, Marguerite Reed, with her husband and two children, sailed from New York City for Monrovia, Liberia, under the sponsorship of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church. They were among the first Negro missionaries sent to Liberia by their Church.

They began to work at Kroo Town Mission and continued to serve in Liberia for eighteen years. She taught the girls sewing, cooking and washing and the boys to be gentlemen. The Reeds became a symbol of Christianity and culture to the people of Liberia. Mrs. Reed became a molding force in the lives of many boys and girls.

Some of the outstanding men of the Republic were under her care when they were young. She mothered two secretaries of state, the Honorable Momolu Dukuly, who has served as a delegate to the General Conference of The Methodist Church, and the late Gabriel L. Dennis.

She and her daughter, Florence, were invited to be guests of the Liberian government at the inauguration of President William V. S. Tubman in 1952. She was presented a solid gold lavalier at a dinner which was given in her honor. Many people will recall the great joy which was hers as she wore this gift and talked with great enthusiasm about her eighteen years in Liberia and the trip in 1952 when in attendance at the sessions of the Annual Conference.

Upon returning to America in 1924 from the foreign field of service, John H. Reed transferred to the Delaware Conference, where he served until his death in 1932. Mrs. Reed began teaching in the public schools of Maryland

and continued for twenty-three years until reaching the age of retirement. She traveled widely over many areas telling Methodists about the work of the Church in Liberia.

MRS. JACOB C. CAULK

Lydia Amanda Caulk, daughter of the late Denny and Amanda Bleen, was born May 15, 1893 and departed this life October 4, 1962. She was joined in holy matrimony to Rev. Jacob Caulk, January 15, 1932. She was a devoted wife and mother.

RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised
1956

RULE I.—Decisions

The president shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie vote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III.—Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the presiding officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the presiding officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV.—Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V.—Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.—Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Sessions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the district superintendent to the Conference secretary.

RULE VII.—Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote or speak who is not within the legal limits of the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X.—Non-Debatable Questions

1. To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn to the Conference finally.
2. To suspend the rule.
3. To lay on the table, providing a representative of the committee shall have the right to speak.
4. To take from the table.
5. To call for a previous question.
6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.—Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

1. To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment, or may be laid on the table).
2. To adjourn.
3. To take recess.
4. To order a previous question.
5. To lay on the table.
6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
7. To postpone to a given time.
8. To commit or refer.
9. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.—Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

1. When a member has the floor.
2. When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
3. When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
4. When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non-debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV.—The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motions are pending, the mover shall indicate to what he intended the motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of conference relations.

RULE XV.—Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the presiding officer or secretary.

RULE XVI.—Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if it is subject to such division as he indicates.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.—Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.—Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION**RULE XXI.—Admitted on Trial**

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age.

RULE XXIII.—Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.—Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.—Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.—Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the district superintendents, the host pastor, the Conference lay leader and the president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII.—Program Planning

The Board of Ministerial Training, the Board of Pensions and the Board of Missions shall have authority to plan respectfully the Ordination Service, Memorial Service and the Missionary Sermon, including the selection of respective speakers without regard to district lines. In each instance the program must be approved by the presiding bishop.

RULE XXIX.—Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX.—Pictures in the Journal

Pictures in the Conference Journal shall be limited to: deceased ministers, newly appointed district superintendents, host pastor and the presiding bishop.

RULE XXXI.—Organization of Conference

The secretary shall prepare the resolution of organization for the Delaware Annual Conference after consultation with the Bishop and the Cabinet with the exception of quadrennial officers. The same to be printed in the Pre-Conference Report booklet. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

RULE XXXII.—Elders Orders

Only those persons shall be elected to local elders orders, either man or woman, whose appointment to a charge as a preacher in charge has been requested by the district superintendent.

RULE XXXIII.—Ministers in Retired Relations—Membership on Boards, Commissions and Committees

A minister holding a position on a quadrennial board, commission or committee upon entering the retired relation, may complete the term for which he was elected.

RULE XXXIV.—Membership on Boards and Commissions

A person may not be elected to serve on more than two conference boards or commissions. This rule shall not apply to any person elected to a board or commission by virtue of his office or any representation as provided by the Discipline. This rule shall not pertain to membership on any committee.

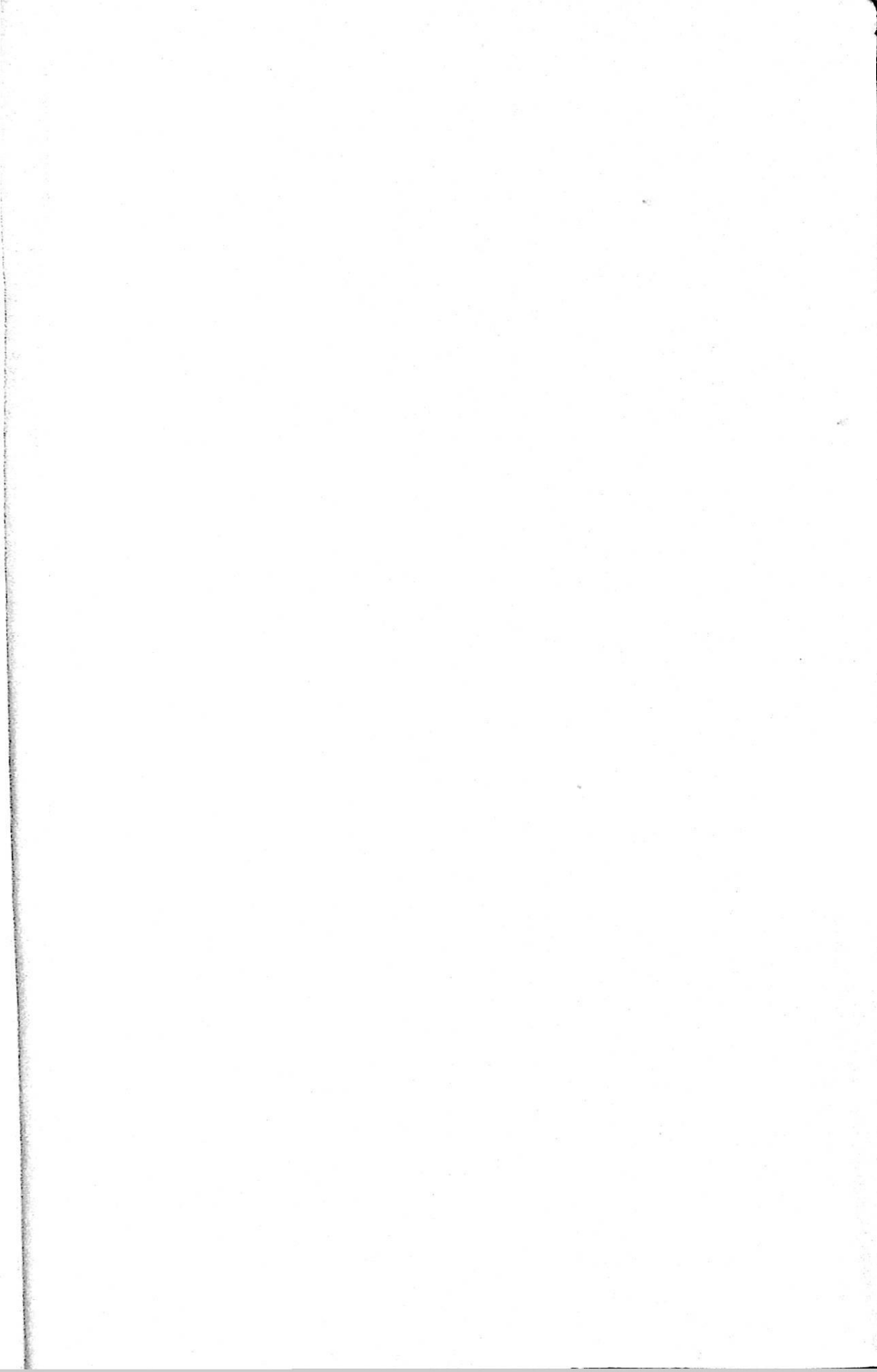
