Crampton, executive director, presented the statement of standards to be effective in the event of the merger of the Peninsula and Delaware Annual Conferences as proposed by the Boards of Christian Social Concerns of the two Conferences. (See VI. B-10.)

The Reverend Richard C. Stazesky, chairman of the Board of the Peninsula Conference, was presented. He spoke in favor of the report and urged the Conference to not delay or postpone action on it.

Discussion of the report followed. C. L. Carrington reported that this report had been considered in discussions with the New Jersey, Newark, and Philadelphia Conferences with the Delaware Conference on proposed transfers and merger. The report was adopted.

James Dashield, chairman of Human Relations and Economic Affairs, presented a resolution on the pending civil rights bill which was adopted. He urged all present to write letters to their Senators urging them to vote for cloture on the debate of the Bill.

Telegram from Dr. A. Dudley Ward, secretary of General Board of Christian Social Concerns, urging support for passage of civil rights bill was read by C. L. Carrington.

W. C. Strother, superintendent of the Philadelphia District, reported on the amount of money that the New York Conference will reimburse the Delaware Conference until 1966, to compensate for the loss of funds for General and Conference Benevolences due to the transfer of eight churches of the Philadelphia District, Delaware Conference to the New York Conference, effective in June, 1964. If the Delaware Conference has not been dissolved by 1966, a committee from both Conferences would meet to discuss another apportionment. The \$25,937 will cover General and Conference Benevolences; General Administration Fund; Schools, Colleges, and Wesley Foundations; Interdenominational Cooperation Fund; District Superintendents' Salary, Travel, and Office Expense Fund; Episcopal Fund; Conference Claimants Fund; Conference Permanent Fund; District Askings; and Ministers' Wives Fund for Conference Claimants. An additional amount for Minimum Salary Fund, equal to the amount paid for this item in 1963-64 by the eight churches, will be reimbursed.

Requests for Transfer of five churches in New Jersey to the Newark Conference was presented by C. L. Carrington. The Conference Secretary certified that Clair Memorial, Jersey City; St. John's, Orange; St. John's, Newark; St. Matthew's, Newark; and St. Mark's, Montclair had met the requirements for transfer according to Amendment IX, 1960 *Discipline*. C. L. Carrington presented the recommendation of the Board of Christian Social Concerns that these churches be transferred to the Newark Conference.

Additional information was desired concerning official invitation from the Newark Conference for the transfer of these churches and the financial arrangements that would be made by the two Conferences.

On motion of Hooker D. Davis, action on transfer of the churches was postponed until further information was available.

Gift of Appreciation from the Board of Christian Social Concerns was presented by Mrs. Boyd Alford to C. L. Carrington, chairman, for his dedicated leadership, and who will be transferred to the New York Conference at its next session.

All items under Section A adopted with item 8 amended to read, No representative of an agency can appeal to the Treasurer for funds not in the budget or for more than his pro rata share; and item 15, the word percentage to be added after proportionate. Section B—Recommendations one through six were adopted. Report was continued in the afternoon.

Report of Ministers Wives Association for Conference Claimants Fund: W. C. Strother, chairman of Board of Pensions, presided. Mrs. Alexander K. Smith, wife of the Administrative Assistant to Bishop Fred Pierce Corson, was presented. Mrs. Edwin L. Ellis, president of the Association, after being presented, expressed appreciation to ministers' wives, ministers, and laymen for their continuing support.

Report of Committee to Study Conference Finances (Continued): G. H. Outen, chairman, continued reading. Section B- Item 7 amended to read: The Treasurer be instructed to make a complete report including the following from the auditor's report, was adopted.

Recommendation 8 was adopted. Recommendation 9 was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

On motion made by H. H. Nichols, the Commission on World Service and Finance would have the apportionment sheets ready to send to the pastors by the District Stewards' Meetings, the first being scheduled for June 9th.

Recommendations 10 and 11 were adopted. Motion by H. H. Nichols that Commission on World Service and Finance make provision for finances to carry out recommendation 10 was approved.

Section C. Recommendation 1 was approved. Recommendation 2 was not approved, on motion of W. C. Jason. Recommendations 3, 4, 5, and 6 were adopted. Recommendation 7 was referred to Commission on World Service and Finance with additional instruction from Bishop Love to report on estimated cost of booklet.

Motion to adopt the report as a whole with revisions was approved.

Letter of Invitation From Philadelphia Conference to Churches of Delaware Conference within its boundary to become member churches was read by Bishop Love.

Report of Commission on World Service and Finance, presented by Miss Sallye Derrickson, president. Revisions in the printed report were read. Recommendation 5 added—We recommend four remittance vouchers to be returned by pastors to the treasurer who will in turn send a voucher of each remittance to the district superintendent at the close of each month. Recommendation 2, change Baltimore Area to Regional. World Service Apportionment changed to \$53,434; Conference Benevolences on apportionment to \$31,495; total, \$84,929. Under Ratio Benevolences—Itemized, 2. approved budget, \$13,530. Under Non-Ratio Askings—item 19 to read Regional Leadership School; item 18, typographical error, change to read \$600 straight across; item 20, budget approved, \$1,000; item 37, budget approved, \$550; items 27 and 32 deleted; IV. Ministerial Support, item 2, budget approved, \$3,000; Distribution to districts, deleted.

Motion by H. H. Nichols, that the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance be adopted with the provision that it be revised in accordance with the agreement that the Newark Conference would reimburse the Delaware Conference for the losses incurred by the transfer of five churches which are located within its boundaries, was approved.

Miss Derrickson was complimented upon being the first woman to serve as president of the World Service and Finance Commission.

J. E. Dunn was nominated and unanimously elected treasurer and director of stewardship for the next quadrennium.

Report of Board of Pensions: W. C. Strother presided. Financial report, read by James H. C. Kelly, secretary, was adopted. (See VI. B-6.)

Dr. Kenneth Thompson, of the General Board of Pensions, greeted the Conference on behalf of the Board and extended congratulations on being the first conference in the Central Jurisdiction to reach the annuity rate of \$35.00. He informed the Conference of the new legislation affecting widows. If her pension is based on fifteen or more years of her own service, her claim will be based on the total years of her husband's approved service. The services of the General Board include Reserve Pension Plan, Hospitalization Plan, and Death Benefit Program. W. C. Strother stated that service records for all ministers will be secured from the General Board.

Resolution Regarding the Inter-Church Child Care Society, read by J. E. Licorish, was approved. Sercy L. Jones was appointed as representative of the Conference to this Society. (See Resolution 7.)

Report of Golden Cross Society was made by Mrs. L. Beatrice Dorsey, director. She reported \$980.00 raised for 1963-64. The amounts by districts follows: Dover, \$194; Easton, \$132; Philadelphia, \$317; Salisbury, \$49; and Wilmington, \$288. Total funds for Golden Cross Enrollment—\$2,700. An additional \$126.00 was given for the Society at the conference session. Complete report was adopted. (See VI. B-13.)

Resolutions on Transfer of Conferences which would be brought before the Conference on Saturday morning with the request for suspension of the conference rule in order to take action, were read by C. L. Carrington. Motion by H. H. Nichols that resolutions be mimeographed, was approved.

Report of Television, Radio, and Film Commission, presented by D. W. Briddell, chairman, was adopted. (See VI. B-16.)

Benediction.

Pageant portraying the history of the Delaware Annual Conference, prepared by Daniel L. Ridout, directed by Mrs. Bernetta Jefferson Reid, was presented. The pageant was closed with an impressive candle lighting ceremony.

Anniversary Hymn Contest was sponsored by the Centennial Committee. The hymn written by George H. Outen, pastor of Tioga Church, Philadelphia, was chosen. DePriest W. Whye, pastor of Community Church, Philadelphia and Mrs. Olive L. Nutter, member of John Wesley Church, Bridgeton, New Jersey both received honorable mention for their hymns.

SATURDAY, MAY 23—MORNING SESSION—9:00 A.M.

Devotions were led by Alexander Reid. The message was delivered by Ralph B. Thompson using the text, Matthew 5:1-13. G. Wayne Cuff served as precentor. A solo was rendered by David Spencer.

Business Session: Bishop Edgar Love presided.

Committee on Journal Report, made by F. D. Arnold, that minutes of previous day's sessions were perused and necessary corrections made, was accepted.

Privilege: Bishop Love, on behalf of the Cabinet, presented gifts of appreciation to three assistant secretaries, Mrs. Harrilese Miles, Mrs. Helen H. Dobson, and Mrs. Maltilda M. Jackson for their many years of service to the Conference.

Report of Cabinet Nominations for Boards, Commissions, and Committees: Mimeographed copies of the report were given to ministerial and lay delegates. Necessary changes in nominations for membership of the various agencies were read by H. D. Davis, secretary of the Cabinet. (See II.) Report was approved subject to changes necessary due to redistricting, General Conference legislation or Cabinet changes or substitutions.

Report of Re-districting Committee was read by M. O. Ballard. Recommendation four was deleted. After discussion and adjustments were made in proposed listings due to transfer of five churches to the Newark Conference and changes in some charges on the Salisbury and Wilmington Districts, the report was adopted. (See VI. B-21.)

World Service and Finance (Continued): Miss Sallye Derrickson, chairman, reported on the matters that had been referred to the Commission. The Commission recommended that recommendations five and eight of the Board of Education report be approved. It was moved by D. R. Fletcher that Morristown College be removed from the category of capital fund campaign and be placed under non ratio askings. The recommendations and motion were adopted.

Report of the Commission on Higher Education: W. R. Hazzard, chairman, presided. Reports of progress with Wesley Foundations and Methodist Student Movement were given by Leroy L. Hamilton for Delaware State College; and E. L. Ellis for Lincoln University, Oxford, Pa. Delegates were urged to encourage Methodist students to participate in the activities of the Wesley Foundations and Methodist Student Movement on college campuses.

H. A. Bailey presented Dr. Carroll Long, a trustee of Morristown College, Morristown, Tennessee, who was representing the president, Dr. Elmer P. Gibson. Dr. Long expressed appreciation for the financial support being given the College by the Conference and informed the members of the wonderful progress which has been made in the growth of the Institution during the past few years.

Mrs. Carroll Long was presented by Bishop Love.

Motion for Certification of Mission Charges: On motion of W. C. Strother, the Secretary certified that the mission charges, Bethel, Brooklyn, New York and Shaw Chapel, New York City have met the Disciplinary requirements to be transferred to the New York Conference. Approval was voted unanimously for the mission churches to be transferred with the eight churches previously granted approval for transfer to the New York Conference. The third mission charge, Grace, Brooklyn, New York would go as a part of another church and did not require certification.

Pennsylvania Temperance League: Mr. Henry Kreiss, Eastern District Superintendent of the League, was presented. He spoke of the services of the League to the Church and community in seeking to check the spread of establishments for promoting use of beverage alcohol. Howard A. Bailey was elected to represent the Conference on the League.

Motion to Extend Time of Morning Session to 1:15 P.M. in order to complete the business, offered by H. H. Nichols, was approved.

Telegrams of Greetings from Bishop Lloyd W. Wicke, Bishop M. L. Harris and South Carolina Conference, and Bishop N. W. Moore and Texas Conference were read by the Secretary. On motion of D. R. Fletcher, the Secretary was empowered to send telegrams of greetings to all conferences in the Jurisdiction which were in session.

Board of Christian Social Concerns (Continued): On motion of C. L. Carrington, the rules were suspended in order to vote on resolutions regarding transfer of Conferences.

Resolution That the Delaware Conference Request Transfer to the Northeastern Jurisdiction following its proposed realignment at the 1964 session of the Central Jurisdictional Conference was adopted by 180 voting for, none voting against, and none abstaining. (See Resolution 8.)

Resolution for the Transfer of the Lexington Conference to the North Central Jurisdiction and Merger with the Annual Conferences of the Jurisdiction was adopted by 175 voting for, 2 voting against, and none abstaining. (See Resolution 9.)

Resolution Approving the Transfer of the Washington Conference to the Northeastern Jurisdiction following its proposed realignment at the 1964 session of the Central Jurisdictional Conference was adopted by 171 voting for, 1 against, and none abstaining.

Resolution Approving the Dissolution of the Realigned Delaware Annual Conference by the transfer of its churches at one time, into the three geographical Methodist Conferences within its boundaries; namely, Philadelphia Annual Conference, Peninsula Annual Conference, and New Jersey Annual Conference by 1966 was adopted by 180 voting for, none voting against, and none abstaining.

Letter of Acknowledgment of Invitation of the Philadelphia Conference to the churches of the Delaware Conference which are located within its boundaries to become member churches was read by C. L. Carrington and approved.

"We acknowledge with appreciation the invitation of the Philadelphia Conference to the churches of the Delaware Conference which lie within the geographical area to transfer to the Philadelphia Conference.

"We have been greatly heartened that in recent months the Philadelphia and New Jersey Conferences have jointly entered into discussions with us concerning criteria and procedures for orderly transfer, not only of the twenty-one churches in Philadelphia, but also the twenty-three churches which lie in the territory of the New Jersey Conference.

"These discussions are well along the way toward acceptable solutions to any problems involved. Similar discussions have been concluded with the Peninsula Conference, and approved at our Session and also by the Peninsula Conference meeting in Wilmington, Delaware this week.

"We, therefore, appreciate the invitation of the Philadelphia Conference and look forward to the successful completion of plans now under discussion, so that the dissolution of the entire Delaware Conference may be accomplished in 1966 by its absorption at one time into these three geographical Conferences."

Bishop Love instructed the Secretary to deliver a copy of this letter, personally, to the Inquirer Newspaper.

Motion That a Reunion Service be held once each year at the seat of the Conference session as long as any segment of the Conference remains, offered by H. M. Deas, was adopted. All transferred churches and pastors would be expected to participate.

Reception of Members: On recommendation of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Bishop Love received as members on trial, Clifford E. Landrum and Widmon Butler, Jr.; and into full membership, John M. Day and Thomas G. Snowden. On motion of H. H. Nichols, the orders of deacon for Widmon Butler, from the Baptist Church, received recognition.

Resolution on Civil Rights, read by C. B. Miles, was approved.

Information forms for the editors of the history of the Delaware Conference were distributed by the Conference Secretary to ministers who had not previously filed the necessary information.

Report of the Area Administrative Secretary, D. L. Ridout, was adopted. (See VI. C-2.)

Report of the Commission on Minimum Salary, presented by Miss F. G. Wilson, was adopted. (See VI. B-15.)

Report of Commission on Town and Country Work, presented by Augustus Chancy, was adopted. (See VI. B-14.)

Report of Board of Trustees, presented by M. O. Ballard, was approved. (See VI. B-17.) On motion of M. O. Ballard, the lawyer who negotiated the

sale of abandoned property on the former Dover Circuit to the Federal Government would receive a fee of \$50.00 from the \$250 which was received.

Report of Delaware State Council of Churches, presented by J. R. Shockley, was approved. (See VI. C-3.)

Invitation for 1965 Conference Session to convene at Tindley Temple was extended by the pastor, W. R. Hazzard. The invitation was accepted unanimously.

Conveners for the Boards, Commissions, and Committees, named by the Secretary of the Cabinet, were requested to call the members together immediately following lunch for organization.

Telegrams Reporting Action Taken on Transfers were received. The Texas Conference, Bishop N. W. Moore, Jr., presiding, approved the transfer of the Delaware and Washington Conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. Number present and voting—127, voting for—126, voting against—1, none abstaining. Resolution for merger of Lexington Conference with conferences of the North Central Jurisdiction approved. Number present and voting—127, voting for—126, voting against—1. May 21, 1964.

The Mississippi Conference, Bishop Charles F. Golden, presiding, approved the transfer of the Delaware and Washington Conferences to the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

Noon Message was given by the Reverend Dr. Ernest W. Lee, superintendent, Camden District, New Jersey Conference.

Benediction was given by Bishop Love, adjourning the morning session.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON—5:00 P.M.

Testimonial Dinner Honoring Bishop and Mrs. Edgar A. Love was held at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel with approximately six hundred people in attendance. Bishop Love, having served as Resident Bishop of the Baltimore Area for the past twelve years, would be retiring from the active ministry of The Methodist Church at the Central Jurisdictional Conference, meeting in Daytona Beach, Florida, June 16-21, 1964.

Dennis R. Fletcher, chairman of the Centennial Committee, served as Master of Ceremonies. Greetings were given by the District Superintendents; Dale Webb, president of Conference Youth Council; James R. Webb for the Board of Lay Activities; Mrs. Thomas A. Anderson, president, Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service; and Dr. Oscar Cooper, co-founder, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

Presentations were made to Mrs. Edgar Love by Mrs. Edwin L. Ellis, president of Ministers Wives Association and to Bishop Love by Daniel L. Ridout, Area administrative secretary, and Walter E. Stanley, district superintendent. Appreciation was expressed by Bishop and Mrs. Love.

Soloists for this occasion were Mrs. David W. Briddell and Waldo T. Kiah.

Motion that telegrams received today from Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr. and Bishop George W. Baber, be made a part of the record without reading, was adopted.

Motion by W. L. D. Lyght that following the reading of appointments, the Conference would stand adjourned, was approved.



Appointments of ministers to pastoral charges and special appointments were read by Bishop Love. (See V.)


District Stewards' Meetings were announced by the District Superintendents.

THE BISHOP'S GREETING

Members of the Delaware Conference:

Mrs. Love and I bring you sincere greetings and hearty congratulations as you celebrate at this 1964 session your 100th anniversary.

While we rejoice with you in your historic anniversary, we have feelings of deep sorrow that we will not be associated with you officially after this session. Our retirement from active service takes place next month. While we will live in Baltimore, at our home, and will thus not be far removed from you, yet we must of necessity retire in deed as well as in word. We ask that you receive my successor, whoever he may be, with the love and esteem with which you received me twelve years ago, and that you remain faithful to the Church, through his leadership, as you have done through mine.

I commend you on the choice of your theme, "Faith of Our Fathers, Living Still . . ." for this session. What a challenge is placed before us as we think of the faith of our founding fathers one hundred years ago! How could they foresee, except through the eyes of faith the glory which would be their children's children one hundred years later! This should be for you indeed the greatest session in your history.

9. PLAN FOR MERGER OF THE LEXINGTON CONFERENCE WITH ANNUAL CONFERENCES OF THE NORTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION

WHEREAS, It is the avowed policy of The Methodist Church to effect ultimately the dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction as one step toward achieving a truly inclusive Methodist Church, and

Whereas, The Central and North Central Jurisdictional Conferences and their constituent Annual Conferences are committed to the elimination of all forms of racial segregation and discrimination in The Methodist Church, including elimination, within a framework of overall planning, of the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction itself,

Be It Resolved, Therefore, That:

1. The Lexington Annual Conference, in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of the Methodist Church, by the adoption of this plan, votes to transfer from the Central Jurisdiction to the North Central Jurisdiction.

2. Each of the other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, by the adoption of this Plan, votes to approve the transfer of the Lexington Annual Conference from the Central Jurisdiction to the North Central Jurisdiction.

3. Each Annual Conference of the North Central Jurisdiction, in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, by the adoption of this Plan, votes to approve the transfer of the Lexington Annual

Conference from the Central Jurisdiction to the North Central Jurisdiction.

4. Each Annual Conference of the North Central Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan, votes to accept into its membership, upon the effective date, the following persons:

- (a) All ministerial members of the Lexington Annual Conference who are then appointed to churches geographically located within its boundaries.
- (b) All ministerial members of the Lexington Annual Conference under special appointment who then hold their Quarterly Conference membership in a local church geographically located within its boundaries.
- (c) All retired ministerial members of the Lexington Annual Conference who then hold their Quarterly Conference membership in a local church geographically located within its boundaries.

All persons who shall become members of any Annual Conference of the North Central Jurisdiction under subparagraphs "A," "B," or "C" above shall have all the rights, privileges, and obligations of the other members of that Annual Conference.

5. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Central Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan, determines the boundaries of the Lexington Annual Conference to include all churches of the Central Jurisdiction located in the States of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota and South Dakota.

6. The Jurisdictional Conference of the North Central Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan, determines the boundaries of its Annual Conferences in such manner as to include each local church of the Lexington Annual Conference in the other Annual Conferences of the North Central Jurisdiction in which that church is geographically located; thereafter, the Lexington Annual Conference shall no longer be continued as a separate entity of the North Central Jurisdiction.

7. The Jurisdictional Conference of the North Central Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan, requests the Council of Bishops to transfer to the North Central Jurisdiction, for presidential and residential supervision, the Bishop of the Central Jurisdiction assigned to the Lexington Annual Conference at the time of transfer. The Secretary of the Jurisdictional Conference shall immediately transmit the request to the Council of Bishops.

8. This Plan for the merger of the Lexington Annual Conference with the Annual Conferences of the North Central Jurisdiction shall become effective upon its adoption by the requisite votes of all the parties thereto, to-wit:

- (a) The Lexington Annual Conference.
- (b) The other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction.
- (c) The Annual Conferences of the North Central Jurisdiction.
- (d) The Jurisdictional Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction.
- (e) The Jurisdictional Conference of the North Central Jurisdiction.

9. The Secretary of each Annual Conference shall certify immediately the vote on this Plan to the College of Bishops of its Jurisdiction in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church so that prompt tabulation of all votes and announcement of the required majorities may be made.

VI. The Reports

A. The District Superintendents' Reports

COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

We, your District Superintendents are pleased to present our sixth composite report which represents the five districts of the Conference. Our aim is to set forth ideals and goals under which we render our services.

As we attempt to present the achievements of the past year, our hearts are overwhelmed with gratitude. When we think of the achievements that might have been accomplished this year and were not, we feel humble. We are, however, grateful to God for his blessings and for such fruits from our efforts as we have. Looking back over the one hundred years of the Delaware Conference with the achievements of its ministers and loyalty of its laymen, often with very meager material possessions, and the depth of their spiritual faith, we review in retrospect in the light of the poet who sang . . .

“Faith of our Fathers living still,
In spite of dungeon, fire and sword:
Oh how our hearts beat high with joy,
When-e'er we hear that glorious word.
Faith of our fathers, holy faith
We will be true to thee till death.”

Christian Stewardship

There is need to develop an understanding of basic concepts of Christian stewardship if we are to be effective in its promotion and cultivation.

God is Creator of the universe and Father of mankind. He calls us unto a stewardship relationship with Him, as his children who are members of His redeemed community. We are accountable unto God for our stewardship.

These basic principles of Christian stewardship incorporate the Christian doctrine of creation, grace, redemption and judgment. We, as Christians, must assume responsibility for our growth in understanding and appreciating these basic concepts and develop an effective program for cultivating these concepts in the congregation.

As we think of the financial plight in many of our churches, it should be clear to us that we must have a properly functioning Commission on Stewardship, the Every-Member Visitation, and stewardship cultivation. Special attention should be given to tithing, stewardship of time and ability with an emphasis on volunteer service, and cultivating Christian stewardship with children and youth.

In order that the local church make “One Witness in One World,” the stewardship program should not place an over-emphasis on stewardship of possessions at the expense of stewardship of time and talent. The total program of the church must be rooted in a spiritual climate in which the whole person gives all toward the advancement of the Kingdom of God.

Evangelism

The year of 1963 was designated "Aldersgate Year" in observance of the 225th Anniversary of John Wesley's "Heart Warming" experience. Mr. Wesley said on this occasion, "I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt that I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that my sins, even mine had been taken away."

The Methodist Church still believes that only with genuine inner motivation can the Methodist tradition of Christian performance be carried to its highest level.

This has been an active year in Evangelism. One of the outstanding events was the Aldersgate Evangelistic meeting held jointly with the Peninsula Conference at the Civic Center, Salisbury, Maryland on Sunday, October 13th. Bishop John Wesley Lord, Washington Area, presided and Bishop Edgar Love delivered the sermon. A large inter-racial choir rendered the music.

Reports from across the Conference show that there have been Convocations on Evangelism, Christian Witness Missions, and Aldersgate Services. Many local churches had mass revivals, visitation evangelism, and inter-racial lenten and Good Friday services.

There has been an increase in the number of pastors' youth membership classes. This is a fertile field for real meaningful evangelism. We urge all pastors to participate more fully in this rewarding work with youth. We call upon all teachers of children in church school to take full advantage of the evangelistic opportunities afforded them.

It is gratifying to know that there has been a great increase of lay participation in evangelism. The number of certified lay speakers has increased, and they are giving a fine account of themselves. We commend the Board of Lay Activities for their work in this field. If the Kingdom of our Lord is to come, we all must do our part in witnessing for Him.

Christian Education

Christian education is the back-bone of a church's future. The importance of youth participation in church schools is so fundamentally significant that we dare not view it casually. The educational program attempts to deal with all facets of everyday Christian living. This program is the very soul of the church. Greater attention should be geared to the needs that Christian education serves.

There is a need to re-evaluate our system of education. This still remains an un-finished task for many of us. We must seek new avenues to come to terms with the situation. We need to focus our attention upon the enrollment of children and adults in church school. Increase in the Fourth Sunday offerings is still needed. We are pleased, however, to note that many of the conference consultants, district directors, and staff are combining their efforts and talents to further the cause of Christian education.

Church Property

It is a matter of record that sanctuaries, parish houses, and parsonages have been renovated this year.

Mortgages were paid by: St. Barnabas, Philadelphia, Penna., Asbury, Trenton, New Jersey; Grace, Chester, Penna.; John Wesley, Brooklyn, New York; and St. John's, Fordville, New Jersey.

An educational unit was built and furnished for Tindley Temple, Philadelphia. Two parsonages were built for Union Church, Coleman, Maryland and St. Paul Church, North Berlin, Maryland. Two parsonages were purchased for Siloam Church, Chester, and John Wesley Church, Philadelphia.

Houses were purchased for expansion; two by Janes Memorial, two by Haven Memorial, and one by Tioga, all in Philadelphia.

Mt. Zion Church, Philadelphia, granted a contract for \$46,000.00 property renovation.

In 1964 the total value of church property in the Conference was over \$14,000,000. It is important that when we build, restore or remodel, that we consult the proper authority; make sure that the proposed building will meet the needs, and is adequately financed.

Special attention should be given to fire inspection and adequate insurance. Adequate insurance means covering the expense of all kinds of damages, an evaluation of the property which is related to the amount necessary to replace at the present cost of materials and labor. All improvements should be insured.

Ministerial Support

The significance of ministerial support is indicated by the fact the *Discipline* of our Church gives ministerial support priority over other financial causes in the local church. The Methodist Church is mindful of the biblical admonition, "The laborer is worthy of his hire." There are so many in the church who seem to be unmindful of this admonition.

It is astonishing to note how small the minister's wage in comparison with the wages paid in other vocations. In many instances the unskilled laborer has a larger pay check at the end of the week than the pastor of a charge.

The minimum salary of our conference was raised last year to \$2,600 for supply pastors and \$3,000 for conference members. This was a fair increase, but it was not adequate for the times. However, it is gratifying to learn that many of the charges in our Conference have raised their pastor's salary this year.

We gathered some statistics from many of the charges which indicate that thirty-two have raised their pastors' salaries in the aggregate of a little over \$10,000.

Statistics from the 1963 Journal show that last year there were thirty-one appointments paying less than \$2,100 salary and fifty-two paying less than \$3,000, a total of eighty-three appointments paying less than the minimum salary for conference members.

In consideration of the higher cost of living and higher educational standards for pastors, it is of vital necessity that ministers' salaries be increased. There must be a willingness on the part of small congregations to merge or be combined in the larger parish plan so that they can meet the minimum salary standard.

Christian Social Concerns

We are living today in a world of social revolution. As Dr. Fosdick once stated, "It is a great time to be alive." Christians should be alert to the burning social issues of the day, namely, human relations, economics, peace and world order, temperance and general welfare. These issues challenge our Christian witness.

This has been a busy year for our Conference Board, district committees, and local church Commissions on Christian Social Concerns. The Board has been represented at several meetings sponsored by the General Church, the Second Methodist Conference on Human Relations held in Chicago last August; Northeastern Regional Meeting in New York; and several State Conferences on Religion and Race. The Board in cooperation with other conference boards held an Interboard School on each district last October. Fifty-five members of local church commissions were in attendance. In addition to these, most of the districts held workshops.

Numerous meetings have been held with the New Jersey, Peninsula, and Philadelphia Conferences in an effort to study problems related to the transfer of Delaware Conference churches to these Conferences upon the dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction. The findings of these meetings will be presented for your consideration at this session of the conference.

From the reports that have come in, more local church commissions on Christian Social Concerns are functioning. The Church is challenged in every community to stand up and speak out for right and justice. As a Church and as individual Christians, we must bear an effective witness where we live, work and play.

We urge the continued observance of World Order Sunday, Commitment Day, and Race Relations Sunday.

The recent action of the General Conference to abolish the Central Jurisdiction, thrust upon each local church of our Conference the urgent necessity to become involved in leadership training, worship and fellowship experiences with Methodists of other conferences. This can be a means of knowing each other better which can facilitate the move toward a more inclusive Church.

Christian Vocations

One of the greatest matters of concern confronting the Church is the need for increasing personnel in church vocations. Statistics suggest to us how great is our need in the General Church for trained persons in the pastoral ministry, teaching ministry, and missionary field, both at home and abroad.

Every year The Methodist Church needs 2,400 persons for the pastoral ministry, 250 persons for Christian education in local churches, 1,230 persons for college teachers and student religious leaders, 350 persons for the missionary enterprise and 5,000 persons for the medical and social services of the church. Thus we can see the demands necessary to be met, simply to keep up. Our Conference must share in discovering in the local churches, persons who are awaiting the guidance necessary to be sensitive to "the call." Someone has defined "the call" in this manner: "When a line representing my talent crosses a line representing the world's need, therein is God's call for me." Therefore it is imperative that the local church help individuals sense the crossing of these two lines.

As Protestants, we believe that a Christian vocation is the vocation of any Christian who has sought diligently to discover God's will for his life, who seeks to make it a way of serving God and his fellow men, and uses it as an avenue through which to witness to his Christian faith making his daily labor "a calling of God."

The importance of a local church committee on Christian vocations cannot be over emphasized. The task of this committee is to make known the philosophy of Christian vocations, and to present regularly the opportunities in church vocations to young people and adults; to make known the qualifications for a particular vocation, and give guidance and encouragement.

Our Conference Commission on Christian Vocations is to be commended for their guidance. They report that as of December, 1963, there are 56 persons who will enter or who are now serving charges and preparing for the Christian ministry. There are 35 prospects for the missionary field. This is encouraging and every pastor and layman must seek to give encouragement, spiritual guidance, and financial aid if necessary, that these persons might realize their goals.

Some of the recommendations of the conference commission need our attention. It has been suggested that every charge should form a committee to help youth recognize the "call" to Christian vocation and also that such church committees cooperate with community agencies which are working in the area of vocations. On a district level it has been suggested that a placard with a list of various vocations be placed in all high schools. Ministers are to be urged to attend P. T. A.

We would like to urge that Ministry Sunday be used to give emphasis to the Christian ministry.

The local church must seek to create an image of the Christian ministry that is respected, looked to for direction, and felt to be worthy of proper support. We cannot proclaim the truths of stewardship unless in practice it becomes a reality. A sense of some security must be a part of our approach to young men entering the ministry.

The barriers of segregation are disappearing in many areas of employment and financial remuneration is tremendous. If we are to attract the type of leadership necessary for each local charge, then we must be willing to "pay the price." While we expect these men to "hear the call" and to make sacrifices, each of us must have a sense of responsibility in being good stewards to the Lord's prophets.

Cognizant of increased population and complex social problems, the Church must produce more leaders to guide our communities, nation, and world out of dilemmas.

The Church is the arena of the Holy Spirit for calling our young people to church occupations.

Worship

With the changing concepts of the function of the Christian Church and the questions that are sometimes raised about its ultimate purpose, one conviction seems to be increased, namely, that worship is the chief concern of the Church, and should be the very center of its ministry. Worship is basic to

the Christian Church. All the work of the church should receive its inspiration and motivation through worship. Hence, no plan of organization is complete that neglects it.

To enable the church to fulfill its mission in this regard, a commission on worship is to be constituted in each local church. Its purpose being that of seeking to enrich the devotional life of the church; and to assist the pastor and laymen who are entrusted with responsibility in the preparation for and the conduct of public worship. During this quadrennium many churches have had a delightful experience using the proposed Revisions for the Book of Worship For Church and Home.

Since music is a vital part of worship, the Commission has a committee on church music. Its function being to encourage the use of suitable music in the worship service of the local church, and with the approval of the official board, make provisions for proper leadership.

To this end, our districts have directors of music. These, along with many local church directors, attended a music workshop under leadership of Reverend D. L. Ridout. Some districts also held workshops.

Today, in most of the churches throughout the conference there is an appreciation for order and dignity in worship. The use of church bulletins, the Methodist Hymnal, services of vested choirs and ushers in uniform, all help to create an atmosphere for divine worship.

There are rich worshipful experiences in store for our home and church as we make use of the new Book of Worship for Church and Home, and the new Methodist Hymnal, both approved by the General Conference of 1964. The hymnal, however, will not be available for about eighteen months. We urge families and churches to make use of these as soon as they are off the press.

As we look forward to the days ahead, let us be mindful that individuals are seeking reality in their religious experiences. They need the assurance that they may seek and find God; that they may knock and in response a door will open for them into a world of spiritual values which can not be shaken.

Therefore, the Church must be aware that through its ministry of worship, it can provide the inspiration, and motivation that may guide men in their quest for God and open the door which leads into eternal life.

Missions

The peoples of the world are in revolution. More than a billion persons have changed their political status in the past twelve years. Millions have won political freedom and other millions are on the threshold of freedom. Along with new rulers many people are choosing new gods. It has been said, "Their choice of political rulers will change; but their choice of gods will last." The Discipline states that, "Our basic aim is to carry out the Great Commission: 'Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.' Our supreme objective is: to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples in all lands as their Divine Savior, to persuade them to become His disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian churches; to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God; to cooperate with these churches; to promote world Christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Jesus Christ."

Therefore it is our sacred responsibility to join forces with the General Church, and declare to all people that Jesus Christ is Lord.

This is an hour of decision also in the field of National Missions. With our present population increasing at the rate of 7,200 persons per day or 2,628,000 per year, it is estimated that by 1970 our national population will rise to a startling 220,000,000. This will represent an increase of nearly 40,000,000. This great increase in population, plus the shifting of population from rural areas to urban and industrial areas, poses a real challenge to the Church in the dwindling rural areas as well as densely populated urban areas.

There are no "cities of refuge." The Delaware Conference itself is confronted with many of the problems which are so evident in our national life. These problems reach into every district and local congregation. The city is a challenge with its changing pattern, economic and racial pressures, violence and growing crime rate. On the other hand, the Delaware Conference is confronted with a decreasing rural population on the majority of its districts, which creates a problem of adequate leadership and service by the Church in these areas. Some are saying, "Consolidate the weaker churches," while others are saying, "abandon them." The choice of either has its perils and must be pursued only after much prayer and deliberation.

Across the nation and within the bounds of the Conference, our people are depressed by intense racial and economic struggle. The equality of men and the right to pursue a livelihood, which are fundamental Christian tenets, are being challenged. Not only are the aforementioned a menace, but the witness of the Church and Christianity is also challenged by the surging tides of secularism. This is the time for every local church to move aggressively forward. They have never faced a graver challenge or greater opportunity than we are facing today. Very little can be accomplished by a hold-the-line action. The problems and needs are demanding immediate attention. There must be a renewal of the witness of the laity both spiritual and temporal. We must supply more and better leadership and service, particularly in rural areas. We must continue to increase our World Service giving in order that the needs of both national and world missions might be met.

The story of our mission today has been told in many of our local churches through Church-Wide Schools of Missions, Woman's Society of Christian Service and other special study groups. The study books, "Southern Asia," "Our Mission Today," and "The Changing City Challenges the Church" have been used in many of these study groups.

The churches have, in most cases, done a commendable job in raising World Service and Conference Benevolences apportionments. Progress is also evident in the field of missionary education, and promotion and cultivation on the local and district levels. We thank God for the missionary concern of the majority of the laymen and pastors. However, it is needless to say, that there are many who have not as yet been won to the cause of missions and our connectional obligations. There are yet segments in many local churches who feel that the program of the church begins and ends within the local church, therefore, they think of world service, conference benevolences and of the total program of The Methodist Church as unnecessary fringes. However, if God's Kingdom is to come and His will be done by Methodist Christians, the needs of others must be our concern because "the world is our parish."

District Activities

During the year the following meetings were held: District Stewards, Youth Assembly, Youth Christian Witness Mission, Church School Superintendents, Lay Retreat, Church School Workers Workshop, Missionary Institute, District Conference, Youth Missionary Rally, Convocation on Evangelism, Christian Vocations Conference, Pre-Conference Rally, Social Concerns Workshop, and Adult Workshop.

Survey of Charges

BRIDGEVILLE: Under the leadership of its pastor, this Charge makes its best report in many years. It is almost on hundred per cent. Conversions 5. World Service and Conference Benevolences 465 in full. Nearly all other apportionments paid. Paid for improvements \$308, debts \$1,040, total of \$9,051. Church attendance increased. Carlton H. Parker, Pastor.

BRIDGEVILLE CT.: This is a 100% charge. Accessions 2, World Service and Conference Benevolences paid \$480. All ministerial items paid in full. Raised for all purposes \$7,476. The pastor and people have worked well together. C. P. Spencer, Pastor.

CHESTERTOWN: Conversions 3, accessions 12, paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences \$355, other apportionments paid in full. Raised for current expenses \$1,573, total raised \$7,860. The attendance has doubled for the Sunday morning worship services. Chestertown has taken on new life under the dynamic leadership of its pastor. Richard R. Hicks, Pastor.

CHESWOLD: Cheswold has done better than usual. Conversions 6, accessions 5, World Service and Conference Benevolence paid in full, paid on Reserve Pension Fund \$388. Church attendance has increased. The pastor and

people are to be commended for a fine year's work. Wm. C. Thomas, Pastor.

CLARKSVILLE: This charge continues to give a good account for itself. Conversions 11, accessions 10, World Service paid \$265. Other conferences apportionments paid. CRUMPTON: The pastor and people have worked well together. Conversions 7, accessions 7. World Service and Conference Benevolences paid \$365, other apportionments paid almost in full. Total raised, \$7,356. I. W. Wallace, Pastor.

DELMAR: This charge has failed in many things. It is regrettable that this charge, although small in membership, has not come up to near its potential. We hope and pray that this congregation will have a new sense of dedication to Christ's work for another year. H. G. Young, Pastor.

DOVER: This charge has done exceedingly well. All benevolences and apportionments paid in full. Church is well organized and attendance good. Raised for improvements \$1,940. Paid on debts, \$2,412. Total raised for all purposes, \$16,958. The pastor is doing a good job. The people have cooperated well. They deserve our commendation. L. L. Hamilton, Pastor.

FAIRLEE: This charge has had a good year under the leadership of its new pastor. A considerable amount has been raised toward building a new parsonage. Raised for World Service \$110, other benevolences paid. Raised for improvement \$3,125, debts \$458, and current expense, \$4,113, total raised \$7,846. C. L. Willis, Pastor.

HARRINGTON: Harrington does well with very small membership. The pastor and people work well together. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$102, other conference askings paid. Raised for improvements \$867 and current expenses \$575. Total for all purposes \$5,320. Thaddeus Hackett, Pastor.

LAUREL: Under the leadership of its dynamic and efficient pastor this charge sends up a 100% report. Paid for World Service and Conference Benevolence \$465. An advance special for Forman Christian College, Pakistan, and other special benevolence offerings taken. Church is well organized and attendance is good. Raised for improvements \$3,090. Debts \$615 and current expenses \$1,350. Total raised \$12,919. S. W. C. Crosse, Pastor.

LEWES: This charge graciously received its new pastor and went to work and sends up nearly a 100% report. They have worked well together. Conversions 12, accessions 8. Raised for improvements \$675, debts \$300 and for current expenses 2,256, total \$6,671. R. B. Thompson, Pastor.

LINCOLN: This is a 100% charge. The new parsonage has been completed and payments on same up to date. New members received—9. Pastor and people have worked well together. Raised for World Service \$420 in full, all other causes paid in full. Paid on debts \$1,038, for improvements \$477, and for current expenses \$1,380, total, \$5,297. They deserve our commendation. SMYRNA: This charge has advanced over last year under the leadership of its efficient pastor. It has less than 50 in membership. The report shows conversions 6, accessions 6. Paid on World Service and Conference Benevolences \$150. Other causes advanced over last year. The few young people work well. Mildred White, Pastor.

SOUTH BERLIN: The pastor of this charge was transferred to Princess Anne, Maryland about the middle of the year and the charge was left without a pastor for about five months. The pastor returned and took the reins again. In spite of this break, the people have done very well. The report shows conversions 1, accessions 2. STILL POND: This charge's report is full and running over. World Service \$385 and all other apportionments paid in full. Conversions 1. These

people are faithful and the pastor hard working. Paid on improvements \$557. Current expenses \$1,157, total \$6,504. R. F. Wallace, Pastor.

TOWNSEND: This charge has done exceedingly well under the leadership of its new pastor. The churches on this charge have been renovated over the last three years. This year's extensive building improvement was done at Haven Church. Conversions 1, accessions 3. Paid on World Service and Conference Benevolences \$196. Other apportionments paid. PASTORAL CHANGES: Rev. John W. Ringold of Waugh Church was appointed to succeed the late Amos P. Jenkins of the Greensboro Charge. Rev. Mr. Wallace L. Green, Sr. was appointed to succeed Jeremiah Lee of the Taylor's Island Charge, who requested to be released of the work.

The Laity

One of the secrets of the district's strength lies in the steadily growing participation of our laity in the planning of programs, activities, and goals. Outstanding lay leadership has been and is being developed, and noble things are being accomplished. We salute our women for the well organized and wide-ranged program, and our men for their broad activities. The Woman's Society of Christian Service has been a vital force in the total program of the Church, and they adopted as their project storm windows and doors for the District Office Center. The Methodist Men contributed \$870.00 toward the district office project. This year a driveway and parking area around the parsonage and center . . . Thank God for the faithful and loyal laymen of the district.

Evangelism

Visitation evangelism was a salient emphasis on the district. Revival services were conducted in many of our churches. There were 105 new members received this year. The following charges received ten or more: Aireys, Waugh, Carmichaels, Federalsburg, Miles River and St. Michaels. However, in spite of the excellent emphasis by our district committee and the revivals conducted there is a decline in the overall membership of the district. Membership at the beginning of the year, 5,237. Membership now, 5,112. Evangelism is the life-blood of the Church. We solicit the continuous cooperation of the charges plus a renewed determination to employ all types of evangelism in order to win the children, youth and adults to Christ and His Church.

Missions

There is manifest a growing interest and concern for the missionary program of The Methodist Church. The response of the churches to World Service and Conference Benevolences has been excellent. A majority of the charges participated in schools of missions. A large majority worked hard to

raise their budgets. Twenty-one of the twenty-nine charges paid World Service and Conference Benevolences in full.

The World Service and Conference Benevolence apportionment for the district was \$13,395.00. Paid this year \$11,815.00.

Stewardship

Stewardship involves the totality of a man, all that he is and all that he has. It involves his personality, attitudes, time, talents, and possessions. As one preacher stated, "Where did you get it? Now that you have it—what are you going to do with it?" However, it is a difficult task to convince many members of the Church that sharing is a part of Christian faith; as much a part as worship or service. In every church there are members who do not contribute to the church budget. Yet, they stood before the altar and took vows to uphold it by prayers, presence, gifts, and service. In many churches the budget is carried by less than half of the membership. The need here is one of stewardship; a stewardship to organize a financial effort and send out workers so that every member is confronted with the decision to share or not to share.

The Church needs to inform its members concerning "the needs of their fellow man" in order to provide right reasons for giving. Often our stewardship is motivated by urging persons to share because of an emergent need, a possible tax reduction or just to meet our goal or to pay our claims, so that the per capital giving of Methodism might be maintained. Christian motives need to be instilled. The deepest reason for the Christian to give is that he feels himself a debtor and under obligation to Jesus Christ. Christians must learn to give out of love and concern. Without this profound motivation we give grudgingly and of necessity. "Then what do we more than others?"

Christian Education

Christian education has been lifted up at all meetings by lectures and workshops. However, statistics indicate a decline in church school enrollment and attendance. Whatever might be the reason for the decline, this trend reveals clearly the need for a better program of Christian education in our churches. It must begin with the pastor who learns to understand the educational processes and the needs of his charge, and then enlist consecrated teachers. They then must avail themselves of the numerous opportunities for leadership training.

The new Children's Division curriculum material will soon be available, and the staff has sought to interpret this to the pastors, teachers and leaders of local commissions of education. It is our hope that the new material will stimulate and inspire not only the pupils, but the teachers as well, so that the decline in our church schools may be overcome. Only by diligent effort can we overcome the present spiritual illiteracy of our people. The recent Supreme Court decision makes it imperative that we teach the Scriptures in the Church.

Ministerial Support

Ministerial support has been increased this year by \$7,530.00. The breakdown is: pastor's salary \$4,250, representing increases of 19 charges; travel and expenses \$1,955, 14 charges; and utilities \$1,125, 9 charges.

District Office Center

We were able, due to the loyal support of the pastors, laymen and friends, to pay \$1,417.35 for the office equipment, plus \$1,500 on the principal of the \$10,000 mortgage, and \$585 interest. We therefore, owe a balance of \$8,500 on this beautiful office center.

Survey of the Charges

AIREYS: Mrs. Mary D. Hundley, Pastor. This charge got off to a slow start, but after a meeting of mind and spirit between pastor and people new life was regenerated and a good year's work reported. Accessions, 11. World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$455 paid in full. Ministerial Support, \$3,210. Trustees and improvements \$2,639. Total all causes \$8,419.

BECKWITH: Mrs. Josephine Farrare, Pastor. Numerically this is a small charge but it is big in spirit and loyalty. The first charge to report a 100% budget. Accession, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$190. Ministerial Support, \$1,619. Trustees \$1,057. Grand total, \$4,220.

CAMBRIDGE: Rev. C. A. Edmonds, Pastor. This is a great church with loyal laymen and an excellent pastor-minister and gospel preacher. This is a combination that's bound to produce a remarkable report. A \$10,300 renovation program was completed. A 100% report made. Accessions, 10. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$1,100. Ministerial Support, \$6,935. Grand total all causes \$25,803.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT: Rev. T. M. Murray, Pastor. This charge had a fine year. All activities moving along in fine stride. Christ Rock Church had a fire that damaged its interior which has been beautifully redecorated. A new church hall is to be built. Accessions, 7. World Service apportionments paid in full, \$480. Ministerial Support, \$3,914. Trustees, \$8,940. Grand total, \$9,696.

CARMICHAELS: Rev. G. A. Sherman, Pastor. There have been difficulties but in spite of these an excellent report is presented by the pastor and people. All askings 100%. Accessions 16. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$355. Ministerial Support \$3,907. Total all causes \$7,796.

CENTREVILLE-GOULD TOWN: Rev. J. M. Day, Pastor. The task has not been easy but another good report has been made. An increase made in most items. Paid on World Service and Conference Benevolences \$350. Ministerial Support \$4,016. Trustees and improvement \$3,050. Grand total raised \$9,186.

CHURCH CREEK: Rev. C. H. Cottingham, Pastor. This charge is not up to its potential. The pastor has done what he could. A faithful few cooperated with him fully however, this was not sufficient to produce a good year's work. Some adjustment must be made. Paid on World Service and Conference Benevolences \$63. Ministerial Support \$1,570. Trustees \$932. Total \$2,870.

CHURCH HILL: Rev. E. H. Jackson, Pastor. The pastor works hard and the people are faithful. The church properties are kept in good repair. Mt. Vernon has a strong desire to build a new church but yet the people strive to meet all obligations. World Service and Conference Benevolences in full \$425. Ministerial Support \$3,642. Trustees \$2,340. Total all causes \$7,844.

CORDOVA-EARLE'S CHAPEL: Rev. H. T. Chase, Pastor. This pastor is one of our top men. He is a good team-man. He loves his people, and is loved by his people. A 100% report. Accessions 2. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$450. Ministerial Support \$4,990. Trustees \$4,916. All causes \$11,457.

CRAPO-GOLDEN HILL: Mrs. Carvilla Pinder, Pastor. The churches of this four-point circuit are faced with the problem of faithful members and distance. Memberships of two of the churches are very small and future growth is practically nil. In spite of handicaps a good report is presented by the faithful pastor and people. World Service and Conference Benevolences in full \$220. Ministerial Support \$2,660. Trustees \$1,300. Total raised \$4,390.

DENTON-WILLISTON: Rev. S. N. Stubbs, Pastor. The membership of this charge is small yet there is a need for more members to join the ranks of the faithful. The work here could progress with a bit more push from more of the laymen. World Service Apportionments \$395, paid \$222. Ministerial Support \$4,095. Trustees \$2,970. Grand total \$7,492.

EAST NEW MARKET-LINKWOOD: Rev. N. C. Stanley, Pastor. Although there are two churches with small memberships on this five-point charge, this charge has a rich potential with which to work. The report indicates progress but yet there is a need for greater effort and sacrifice toward the program of the church. Accessions 2. World Service apportionments \$670, paid \$350. Ministerial Support \$3,640. Trustees \$3,297. Raised all causes \$9,537.

EASTON-JOHN WESLEY: Rev. W. H. Greene, Pastor. This charge continues to carry on in spite of the difficulties that faced the pastor and people during the beginning of the year. The work is now moving. Accessions 1. World Service apportionments \$885, paid \$500. Ministerial Support \$5,510. Trustees \$4,188. Grand total \$12,653.

EASTON CIRCUIT: Rev. A. H. Slacum, Pastor. The pastor was ill this year, however, a good year's work is reported. Accession, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$245 in full. Ministerial Support, \$2,496. Trustees, \$2,542. Grand Total, \$4,397.

FEDERALSBURG: Rev. G. L. Stanley, Pastor. The churches on this charge are up and doing. The pastor and people have a program and well organized church. The youth and young adults are loyal supporters of the church program. Accessions, 10. World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, \$455. Ministerial Support, \$4,016. Trustees, \$3,960. Raised for all causes, \$9,607.

GREENSBORO: Rev. J. W. Ringold, Pastor. The present pastor was appointed here following the death of Rev. A. P. Jenkins. The people rallied to the new pastor and an excellent report presented. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$495 in full. Ministerial Support, \$3,160. Trustees, \$1,590. Total, \$5,650.

HURLOCK: Rev. W. M. Staten, Pastor. The pastor and a majority of the people have striven hard to carry out the total program of the church. They

have succeeded in some respects, and a successful report is made. World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, \$490. Ministerial Support, \$4,020. Trustees, \$2,960. Grand total reported, \$8,860.

MARYDEL: Rev. J. H. Roberts, Pastor. The pastor doesn't live on the charge, but he has been a real shepherd to his people. With a bit more effort from the people this could be a 100% charge. World Service apportionments in full, \$400. Ministerial Support, \$2,660. Trustees, \$1,340. Total for all causes, \$4,707.

McDANIEL: Rev. A. A. McDowell, Pastor. The pastor has been confined for several months due to illness. His good wife, faithful members and friends have come to the rescue. As a result the work has been done and an excellent report made, almost 100%. World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, \$240. Ministerial Support, \$2,370. Trustees, \$1,664. Total of all causes, \$5,640.

MILES RIVER-STATEN'S CHAPEL: Mrs. Hester Opher, Pastor. This charge has had a very good year under the leadership of its faithful pastor. Accessions, 15. World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, \$425. Ministerial Support, \$3,233. Grand Total raised for all causes, \$6,646.

OXFORD-BELLEVUE: Rev. E. H. Hughes, Pastor. After eight years of working together as pastor of Oxford and more recent of Bellevue, the pastor and people are going strong. The charge has a planned program and every phase of the work presented. A good report is made. World Service apportionments, \$745, paid \$600. Ministerial Support in full, \$5,766. Trustees, \$3,416. Total for all purposes, \$11,203.

PRESTON: Rev. Frank Robinson, Pastor. The pastor, although a student in seminary, has been faithful to his task and work. The three churches have taken the first step towards merger. A good report is presented by the pastor and people of Ridgely. Accessions, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$450 in full. Ministerial Support, \$3,590. Trustees \$2,930. Raised for all causes, \$7,769.

ST. MICHAELS-ROYAL OAK: Rev. G. W. Cuff, Pastor. Under the leadership of its new pastor this charge has completed an excellent year's work. Union Church has been renovated and new pews installed, and improvements made at St. Paul. World Service and Conference Benevolences in full, \$595. Ministerial Support, \$6,719. Trustees and improvements, \$10,115. Grand total, \$20,499.

STEVENSVILLE: Rev. C. M. Stafford, Pastor. This is a good charge with an excellent pastor. The pastor and people seem to be happy together. They

TAYLOR'S ISLAND: Rev. W. L. Greene, Pastor. This pastor succeeded Rev. Jeremiah Lee. The charge has made remarkable advances under the leadership of its new pastor. Pastor's salary increased to \$3,000 plus \$300 travel. World Service apportionments, \$265, paid, \$200. Ministerial Support, \$2,069. Trustees, \$1,729. Grand total, \$3,775.

TRAPPEE: Rev. H. T. Hall, Pastor. This is a busy church, loyal members and a hardworking pastor. After serving here for 11 years the Halls keep rolling on. Accessions, 2. World Service apportionment in full, \$470. Ministerial Support, \$3,361. Trustees, \$2,637. Grand total, \$7,245.

VIENNA-REID'S GROVE: R. W. Dennis, Pastor. This pastor is a miracle worker. Down through the years he has led the people to meet the financial obligations to the church, district and conference in full. The pastor and faithful members were among the first to report a 100% budget. Pastor's salary increased to \$3,000. Travel \$300. Accessions, 3. World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$460. Ministerial Support, \$3,940. Trustees, \$1,892. Raised for all causes, \$7,518.

WITTMAN-SHERWOOD: Rev. Roland Dennis, Pastor. Young Dennis is loved by his people. He was ill during the year but managed to complete the year at Maryland State College and has done a very good job on the charge. Accessions, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$380, paid \$239. Ministerial Support, \$2,910. Trustees, \$1,630. Grand total, \$5,425.

BETHEL, Brooklyn had a banner year. Many improvements were made on the church property. This is a growing Church. Ten persons were added this year.

GRACE MISSION, Brooklyn is in need of an adequate place of worship. A more suitable place must be found, however, it continues to grow. Five members added this year.

JOHN WESLEY, Brooklyn had a banner year with many marks of growth.

Application to the Board of Missions was approved for the sum of \$25,000.00 on an improvement program that will cost over \$45,000.00.

NEWMAN MEMORIAL, Brooklyn had a great year. Sixty-seven persons were added to the Church. Many improvements made on the church and other property.

REDEEMER, Brooklyn is a growing church in the midst of a financial drive to do some much needed renovation. All programs of the church show new life. Eight persons were added to the Church.

BROOKS MEMORIAL, Jamaica is still growing, seventy-seven persons were added. The Sanctuary floor was carpeted at a cost of \$2,200.00. An organ and chairs were purchased for the Chapel and additional pews for the Sanctuary. A new grand piano for the Sanctuary is to be installed during the summer.

CLAIR MEMORIAL, Jersey City experienced another great year. Nine persons were added to the Church. Raised \$1,900.00 for restoration of organ. MT. ZION, Philadelphia had a fine year. Nineteen persons were added to the Church. The interior of the church has been painted. Contract has been let for \$47,000.00 to remodel and beautify the exterior of the church, provide parking lot and play ground, and place fence around the church property.

PENIEL, Philadelphia experienced a good year. Eight persons were added to the Church. The property has been improved, dining hall, Sunday school rooms, and both lobbies have been painted, floors reinforced and tile laid on the floors. The pulpit chairs have been upholstered and electric water cooler installed.

ST. BARNABAS, Philadelphia had a great year. Twenty-three persons were added to the Church. Attendance for Sunday worship has increased more than forty per cent. This is a happy congregation. In accordance with schedule they had two more years to pay the mortgage, but the people had a desire to improve the building, therefore, they paid the mortgage in full and are now making plans to renovate the church.

TINDLEY TEMPLE, Philadelphia—The state of the church is good and within the last six months completed a new church school center, equipped it with new furniture, consecrated it on December 8, 1963, and reduced the mortgage by twenty-five thousand dollars. A new forward program is in progress and the church continues to make forward strides.

TIOGA, Philadelphia had a banner year. Twenty-two persons were added to the Church. Church building was renovated and improvements made on the parsonage. The size and significance of the Vacation Church School almost doubled.

ZOAR, Philadelphia is still growing. It is a church with a great program that is still moving in high gear with achievements along all lines. Yes, "Where Mother Zoar leads, we follow."

ASBURY, Trenton another great year. Fourteen persons were added to the Church. The entire first floor of the church was tiled and the steeple atop the church restored. The mortgage on the church was liquidated. It was a great year.

FRUITLAND AND ALLEN PARISH—Rev. G. B. Wilson, pastor. The total program of this church is very carefully cultivated on this charge. The Mt. Calvary Church in Fruitland is in the process of adding a new Educational building to the present structure. The charge merits the World Service Certificate.

GIRDLETREE, BOX IRON, MT. WESLEY PARISH—Rev. L. G. Purnell, pastor. This charge continues to lead the district. They customarily merit the World Service Certificate. The parsonage has been completely modernized.

MT. WESLEY-HOPEWELL PARISH—Rev. I. H. White, pastor. The Wesley Church of this charge continues to support two-thirds of the respon-

sibilities. The membership at the Hopewell church is too small for a separate unit.

HORNTOWN-NEW CHURCH PARISH—Rev. Howard Barclay, pastor. Both churches of this parish are working very efficiently. The congregation has again merited the World Service Certificate.

KELLAR, RED HILL, EXMORE PARISH—Rev. Roy Ennis, pastor. The response of these two churches has been fair. There has been an increase in Conference askings. The church at Exmore has a growing church school. The Red Hill Church continues to carry the burden of the charge.

JOHN WESLEY, WHITE TEMPLE, SALISBURY—Rev. T. H. Pendleton, pastor. The members of this parish have voted to merge the two churches into one large local unit. The new unit is now being organized with skill and efficiency. It is the hope of us all that John Wesley, the oldest church on the district and White Temple may organize a new church unit second to none in the Delaware Conference.

MANOKIN, REVELS NECK, WESTOVER PARISH—Rev. Nathaniel Dennis, pastor. The Mt. Wesley and St. James churches have done a splendid year's work. St. Paul, the Revels Neck church, has so declined over the years in membership that it will no longer be able to carry on as a single unit. Hence, it is being abandoned at this conference session.

MARION STATION, MT. PEER PARISH—Rev. J. W. Mickle, pastor. This is a good rural charge and the people work very diligently. The report for this year is in advance of last year's.

MARUMSCO, LIBERIA, KINGSTON PARISH—Rev. O. C. Jones, pastor. This parish continues to grow in kingdom building. The church at Liberia as well as the other two churches makes a full report.

MT. VERNON, POLKS ROAD PARISH—This parish continues to do its work. On March 1, 1964, their pastor, the Rev. D. S. Quillin passed to his reward. Rev. Alexander Reid has served as acting pastor until the end of the year. They did everything they could to aid their former pastor and his widow. May his richest blessings rest with the parish for loyalty and love for their former pastor.

VENTON, ORIOLE PARISH—Rev. Grover Jones, pastor. Here we have some very fine Methodist Church folk. The Venton church continues to carry the weight of the charge. The Oriole church continues to do its proportional share. This charge merits the World Service Certificate.

POCOMOKE CITY—Rev. G. O. Commodore, pastor. This charge continues to hold its own. Every department is carefully organized and smoothly functioning for the best interest of the church. This charge merits the World Service Certificate.

PRINCESS ANNE, METROPOLITAN—This historic charge has had two pastors during the conference year. Their pastor, the Rev. S. S. Tatem, was transferred to the New York Conference, August 1, 1963. Brother Nathaniel Miller was appointed to the charge, October 10, 1963. On January 30, 1964, he was transferred back to his former parish. The report this year neither represents his ability nor his will to do.

QUANTICO, ROCKAWALKIN, HEBRON PARISH—Rev. Edward Lee, pastor. This parish has made a most excellent beginning under the dynamic leadership of their Pastor, the Rev. Edward Lee. The charge merits the World Service Certificate.

NANTICOKE, ASBURY CHURCH—Rev. S. P. Sanders, pastor. This church has done a good year's work under the leadership of their new pastor, Rev. S. P. Sanders. Brother Sanders has sponsored a community wide program.

WHITE HAVEN, NEW TOWN PARISH—Rev. L. C. Waters, pastor. The John Wesley Church of this rural parish was destroyed by fire on New Year's evening. This has greatly handicapped their progress.

UPPER HILL, CENTENNIAL PARISH—Rev. J. O. Stanley, pastor. It was in this parish that the first public school on the Delmarva Peninsula for colored people was organized by the late H. A. Monroe of New Bedford, Mass., before the Civil War. This historic fact may account also for the fact that more ministers and school teachers have come from this place than any other locality on the District. All departments of the church are very active. They merit the World Service Certificate.

SHILOH, HUTS PARISH—The Rev. Mary Jarmon, pastor. This charge continues to grow very rapidly. The church at Huts Memorial has been completely modernized. A new parish house has been erected.

SNOW HILL, EBENEZAR CHURCH—Rev. James McClendon, pastor. This is one of our fine appointments. Here we have our largest church school enrollment. Each department is completely organized.

UNIONVILLE, ST. JAMES PARISH—Rev. Carrol Scott, pastor. This charge continues to grow and makes a good report this year. The pastor and his family were saddened by the accidental death of their son, Thomas.

WACHAPRAGUE, BURTON PARISH—Rev. Harvey Lambert, pastor. The work in this fine parish continues to prosper and grow. A new addition was made to its Grace church which includes a choir room and a study for the pastor. Rev. H. J. Lambert makes a good report. The charge merits a World Service Certificate.

WATTSVILLE, ATLANTIC PARISH—Rev. O. L. Molock, pastor. The pastor and its congregation continues to major in paying off old indebtedness. The people are beginning to see that they have a valuable, hardworking and honest leader. The Conference askings are higher than they have been in many years.

WITHAMS, MONSANGO PARISH—Rev. H. W. Spencer, pastor. Bro. Spencer has met with some very difficult financial problems in this parish, but with the help of God and the good thinking people of the charge, he is gradually overcoming them.

WETIPQUIN, JESTERVILLE PARISH—Rev. J. E. McBride. Rev. J. E. McBride continues his good work at this charge. Jesterville has a new parish house. The work at both churches is good.

WHALEYVILLE, PARSONBURG, BISHOPS PARISH—Rev. D. T. Lewis, pastor. This three point circuit continues to grow under the leadership of

Rev. D. T. Lewis. All askings are in full. Again this charge merits the World Service Certificate.

LEEMONT, WHITESVILLE PARISH—Rev. W. L. Mills, pastor. This is our finest rural parish. Both churches are well organized. The parish merits the World Service Certificate.

STOCKTON, SHILOH PARISH—Rev. Emerson Jolly, pastor. This parish continues to hold steady. The pastor has endeavored to organize it as a Methodist parish.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, and members of the Delaware Annual Conference:

It is again with thanksgiving to Almighty God, sincere appreciation to you for the opportunity to serve as district superintendent, and a deep sense of gratitude to the faithful ministers and laymen of the district that I submit this annual report.

We have been indeed blessed this year, in that death did not invade our ministerial ranks. All have enjoyed a measure of good health and happiness. Several have been ill for short periods of time.

No adjustments have been necessary in appointments since last Annual Conference.

The Reverend C. W. Perry is requesting retirement at this session of the Annual Conference. Reverend S. L. Wilkins is requesting to be left without appointment to attend school. Our prayers shall be with both of these brethren who have served well.

During the year Reverend Walter L. Gray, our pastor at Mt. Holly took unto himself a bride.

One parsonage family was blessed with a new baby this year, namely, the Reverend and Mrs. Howard Black of the Port Penn and Delaware City charge.

Christian Stewardship

We have continued the stewardship emphasis with workshops in the areas of Every Member Visitation and voluntary Christian service. Dr. Edwin A. Briggs of the General Board of Lay Activities again spent a day with us sharing the techniques of conducting the Every Member Visitation. Our efforts are geared toward continuing the Every Member Visitation in each local church.

I am happy to report that this year 10 churches conducted an Every Member Visitation canvass according to the manual.

District Activities

Our district has buzzed with activities this year. The following are a few which highlighted the year's work: District Stewards' Meeting, Youth Assembly, Lay Retreat, Church School Workers' Conference, Interboard School, Missionary Institute, Youth Missionary Rally, Laymen's Queen Contest, Lay Speakers' Training School, Christian Social Concerns Workshop and the Pre-Conference Rally.

Other activities include six Preachers' Meetings, Quarterly Meetings of

the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild, regular Monthly Meetings of the Ministers Wives Association and a Fall Recital sponsored by the organization. All of these activities were very well attended and the results gratifying.

District Parsonage Improvements

In an effort to make the district parsonage more comfortable and convenient, the District Trustees with the approval and support of the laymen have made some needed improvements. They include the following: A new masonry porch replaced the frame structure; the basement was renovated for office space and a new roof placed on the house. These improvements have done much to add to the beauty, convenience and value of the property.

Survey of the Charges

ASBURY-ATLANTIC CITY: Rev. G. H. McMurray, Pastor. Asbury has had another good year. World Service and Conference Benevolences have been paid in full. An Every Member Visitation was conducted. Improvements include the repairing of the pipe organ. Twenty-four new members were received.

HAMILTON-ATLANTIC CITY: Rev. C. W. Derrickson, Pastor. Hamilton maintains its record of former years; and in some instances has excelled under the leadership of a very conscientious pastor. World Service and Conference Benevolences have been paid in full. An Every Member Visitation is in progress. A spirit of unity seems to prevail. Accessions five.

BRIDGETON: Rev. H. E. Anderson, Pastor. Under the leadership of Brother Anderson, Bridgeton makes another good report. Needed improvements have been made in the church and parsonage. An Every Member Visitation has been conducted. Accessions nine.

BURLINGTON: Rev. Horace J. Fisher, Pastor. Burlington keeps moving ahead. Church attendance has increased. Conference Askings are paid in full. The pastor's salary has been increased. A project to purchase a parsonage is in progress. The sum of \$1,200 has been raised for the down payment. Accessions six.

BUTTONWOOD-CHRISTIANA: Rev. Jacob C. Caulk, Pastor. The members of this charge are a good example of what a few, but loyal people can achieve. Under the good leadership of their pastor they continue to move forward. The church property is in good repair. All causes have been met in full. The pastor's salary has been increased. Accessions five.

EIGHTH STREET-CAMDEN: Rev. Charles I. Young, Pastor. The pastor and people are still working hard to maintain the church in all of its phases. The mortgage payments are current. World Service and Conference Benevolences are paid in full. The Church School is growing slowly. There is a dire need for more workers with children and youth.

FERRY AVENUE: Rev. C. W. Bagwell, Pastor. Ferry Avenue is beginning to realize its potential. The laymen are more active in the local church and district activities. The church has been renovated and painted on the in-

terior and the exterior. Under the leadership of the pastor and the very fine cooperation of the members, the District Conference was very ably entertained. The spiritual fervor is good. Accessions six.

CAPE MAY-SWAINTON: Rev. A. A. Berry, Pastor. The pastor is providing good leadership and the people are following. Improvements have been made on the parsonage by installing baseboard heat. The Swainton Church has been painted on the interior. The Franklin Street Church is in the process of being restored. Peace and harmony prevails.

CHESTER-GRACE: Rev. S. L. Wilkins, Pastor. Under the sincere leadership of the pastor and the cooperation of the laity, Grace has had another glorious year. In an effort to preserve the physical plant, a new cement walk has been put around the church to keep the water out of the basement. The debt with the National Board of Missions has been liquidated and the mortgage burned. The pastor is requesting to be left without an appointment this year to attend school. Accessions five.

CHESTER-SILOAM: Rev. John B. Redmond, Pastor. This church is building a bigger and better Siloam in every respect. All of its financial obligations are being met. All phases of the church work is progressing under the leadership of a hard working pastor. The old parsonage and church house have been sold. Another parsonage has been purchased and dedicated. There are funds on hand to begin some improvements on the church building. Accessions thirteen.

CHESTER-ST. DANIELS: Rev. F. Donald Jones, Pastor. The longer this pastor stays, the more effective becomes his ministry. The church is again 100% in all askings. The community center which is sponsored by the church is a great asset in the church's ministry to the community. An Every Member Visitation has been conducted. Accessions sixty-three.

DARBY: Rev. Clayton E. Hammond, Pastor. The pastor indicates that the church's great advance in stewardship reflects a deepening faith in Christ and the Church. This advance has affected most of the church program for the better. High interest has been shown in the Every Member Visitation program. Accessions three.

DELAIR: Rev. George E. Geddis, Pastor. The church is alive spiritually. An Every Member Visitation has been in progress. Extensive improvements have been made on the parsonage. Conference and district askings are being met. Accessions seven.

ELKTON: Rev. Leslie W. Coltrane, Pastor. The membership is small at this church; but its members are very optimistic. The parsonage has been re-decorated. The church is in need of some major repairs. All of the Conference and District Askings have not quite been met. The pastor and people look forward to having a growing church which could have a greater impact upon the community. "The field is white to harvest; but the laborers are few."

FORDVILLE: Rev. William M. Tasco, Pastor. This charge has had an excellent year. A major achievement, the liquidation of the mortgage, became a reality. Renovations have been made on the church and parsonage. An expan-

sion program is under way. The pastor and people did a wonderful job in entertaining the Pre-conference Rally. An Every Member Visitation has been conducted. Accessions seven.

GRENLOCK-RHOADES-BERLIN: Rev. Milton D. Brooks, Pastor. This circuit is wide and spread out. The membership is few. However, the people are very cooperative. The pastor tries hard to make each point when scheduled. Some of the Conference and District Askings have been met. The church building at Rhoades needs to be replaced. The people are in earnest and are anxious to improve their lot. Accessions one.

LAWNSIDE: Rev. O'Connell Milbourne, Pastor. Mt. Zion reports another year of progress. There is an increase in Sunday School and church attendance. The choirs are rendering excellent service under their new director. Many improvements have been made on the church property. The pastor's salary has been increased. Mt. Zion has a potential for continued growth. Accessions, four.

MERCHANTVILLE: Rev. Charles W. Cannon, Pastor. Under the leadership of their earnest, hard working pastor, this charge has taken on new life. Church attendance has increased. The organizational structure of the charge is well organized and functioning. The financial condition is excellent. There has been an increase in the pastor's salary. The parsonage has been renovated and furnished. The spiritual atmosphere is high. Accessions forty-seven.

MIDDLETOWN-ODESSA: Rev. L. C. Brown, Pastor. These churches have done well this year; working together for their first time as a charge. A notable increase in the Sunday School enrollment at Odessa has been achieved. The church and parish house have been painted on the interior. Middletown has made improvements to the parsonage. Accessions ten.

MT. HOLLY: Rev. Walter L. Gray, Pastor. The pastor has taken unto himself a help mate. The work of the charge is steadily improving. New members are joining the fellowship. An increase in church attendance is evidenced. The church is in good repair. Plans are being made to renovate the parsonage. Accessions nine.

NEW CASTLE: Rev. W. A. T. Miles, Pastor. After ten years as pastor of this church Brother Miles gives a good account of his stewardship. He is a veteran of many years of faithful service. Conference and District Askings are being met. Improvements have been made on the church property. The sum of \$2,962.00 has been set aside for a Building Fund. Accessions eleven.

NEWPORT: Rev. C. B. Miles, Pastor. The pastor and people got off to a good start. The church maintains its giving to all causes as in former years. The attendance at worship has increased. The spiritual atmosphere is good. A new piano has been purchased for the sanctuary. The parsonage has been repaired and furnished. Accessions three.

PORT PENN-DELAWARE CITY: Rev. Howard H. Black, Pastor. These two churches were grouped at the beginning of the conference year. The pastor and people are happy working together. This is a small, but great group of people. The church is spiritually alive. They carry willingly their share of the financial load. There are signs of growth and the future looks bright.

PLEASANTVILLE-OCEAN CITY: Rev. C. W. Perry, Pastor. This is the pastor's thirteenth year as leader for this charge. He has done a good job in spite of failing health. Church attendance at both points is commendable. The Ocean City church has found new inspiration with the assistance of Brother Harold Anderson, local preacher from Asbury in Atlantic City. He has been a tremendous help to Brother Perry. The pastor retires at this Annual Conference. An Every Member Visitation has been conducted. Accessions twelve.

PORT NORRIS: Rev. John E. Bishop, Pastor. Port Norris continues to move forward under the fine guidance of a hard working, conscientious pastor. The charge is in a transitional period; that is, many of the elder persons are no longer active, therefore, it has become the responsibility of the young adults and youth to maintain the church. The future looks bright.

Unemployment is one of the major problems in this seaport community. However, the church debt has been reduced by \$1,500.00. And though not all of the Conference and District claims are paid in full; a considerable amount has been paid. Accessions thirteen.

QUINTON: Rev. John Wilcher, Pastor. This charge is capable of doing more for connectional interest of the church. Sunday School and church attendance is commendable. Some of the local church debts have been reduced. Some improvements on the physical plant have been realized. Four new members have been added to the church.

ST. GEORGES-KIRKWOOD: Rev. T. E. Cameron, Pastor. This has been a good year for this charge despite a decline in membership by several deaths. Many handicaps have failed to dampen the spirits of this small, but courageous group. The membership is loyal and dedicated. The church school attendance has increased. Accessions four.

SALEM: Rev. Charles E. Kiah, Pastor. The work on this charge is steadily moving forward. All organizations are functioning. Attendance at worship and other activities is on the increase. During the year organ chimes were presented to the church in memory of the late Alexander and Mary Gibson by their children. New flags were purchased by the Sunday School. The all purpose room and kitchen have been redecorated. The pastor's study has been renovated and refurnished by the Young Adult Fellowship. The pastor's salary has been increased. The spiritual life of the church is good. Accessions four.

WILMINGTON-COLEMAN MEMORIAL: Rev. Harry R. Snead, Pastor. Coleman continues to grow in all areas of church participation. The spiritual life of the church is good. An Every Member Visitation was conducted. The mortgage payments are current. All claims have been paid in full. Several improvements have been made on the property. They include new altar ware for the church, a furnace and some floor covering at the parsonage. The pastor's salary has been increased. Accessions twenty-six.

EZION: Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, Pastor. Ezion is again 100% in the payment of all of its connectional obligations. Improvements include the purchase of a dining room suite for the parsonage, three hundred chairs for the educational room, and the debt on a new piano has been liquidated. This, being

a downtown church, it has to work hard to maintain itself, since many of its members are now residing in many sections of the city. However, the membership appears to be increasing. Accessions twenty-five.

HAVEN: Rev. Hermon T. Moody, Pastor. Haven is happy with its ministerial leadership. The church maintains its good record of former years. World Service and Conference Benevolences are paid in full. The pastor and congregation maintain a working relation with other Methodists across district and conference lines in the area. An Every Member Visitation has been conducted. During the year the church windows were damaged by vandals. The windows have been restored. Haven has great potential in that, it is in the midst of a plenty of people. This should lend to the building of a bigger and more effective church. Each member should win one and bring him into the active fellowship of the church. Accessions eight.

MT. CARMEL: Rev. E. V. Wimberly, Pastor. The church is improving co-operatively, spiritually and financially. A local church school of missions was held. The purchase of some new audio visual equipment has improved the church's teaching ministry. World Service and Conference Benevolences are paid in full. An Every Member Visitation has been conducted. Accessions nine.

MT. JOY: Rev. Augustus Chaney, Pastor. A good report is made by this pastor and people. Church attendance is good. Extensive improvements have been made on the church and parsonage. A Hammond Organ has been presented to the church in memory of the late Fannie E. Brown by the Brown family. All connectional interest have been cared for. Accessions five.

WOODBURY-JERICO: Rev. S. G. Fullman, Pastor. Under the efficient leadership of Brother Fullman this charge continues to advance. Extensive renovations have been made to the church property. The church at Jericho has installed rest rooms and a new modern well equipped kitchen. Pastor and people are happy. An atmosphere of warmth prevails. Accessions five.

2. COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Commission on World Service and Finance of the Delaware Conference humbly submits this its twenty-fourth annual report and recommends its adoption. We are grateful to God for His loving care over us, and to our Bishop, ministers and laymen, whose spirit of cooperation has made this report possible.

General Items

The treasurers of all conference boards and agencies have been bonded in companies approved by the Commission. Some books of conference boards and agencies have been properly audited for the past fiscal year.

The Conference Treasurer's books have been audited by Certified Public Accountants, Harris and Shepard, and a satisfactory audited report has been filed with the Commission. This is the audited report filed with the Commission for the past fiscal year.

The list of other conference funds, the names of treasurers of each, and the approved depositories are as follows: Board of Education, C. D. Gerald, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Bank and Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; Board of Lay Activities, J. R. Webb, Treasurer, People's National Bank, Laurel, Delaware; Board of Hospitals and Homes, C. E. Kiah, Treasurer, Salem National Bank and Trust Company, Salem, N. J.; Board of Evangelism, Helen Loatman, Treasurer, Wilmington, Trust Company, Wilmington, Delaware.

Recommendations

4. That the Board of Pensions plan to continue Reserve Pension Fund Campaign, including stamps, and that amount apportioned at the beginning of the Campaign and amount paid by each Charge as of May 20, 1964, appear in next Conference Journal.

5. We recommend that four (4) remittance vouchers be sent by the pastors to the treasurer with each remittance. The treasurer shall send a voucher of each remittance to the respective district superintendents at the close of each month.

3. COMMITTEE TO STUDY CONFERENCE FINANCES

In accordance with the action of the 1963 session of the Delaware Annual Conference, "That a committee be formed with the express purpose of studying all phases of the financial structure of the Delaware Conference in consultation with the Commission on World Service and Finance, and that the findings be reported at the 1964 session of the Conference," we submit the following report for your consideration and perusal.

The report is divided into three sections. The first section is a re-statement of principles and rules which should regulate a conference financial program as stated in the Methodist *Discipline* and as outlined by the Council on World Service and Finance of The Methodist Church, and the General Board of Lay Activities. The second section deals with ways and means of bringing our conference program in line with the aforementioned suggestions and/or improving our methods and simplifying our procedures so as to remedy or alleviate present problems and anticipated difficulties. The third section probes the need for active stewardship programs to raise more money for the Conference.

SECTION A

Disciplinary Requirements

We recommend that the Conference go on record as approving and reaffirming its willingness to adhere to the following statements, 1-15, in spirit and in fact:

1. The making and enforcing of the fiscal policies of the Conference rests with the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, for these powers have been so delegated by the *Discipline*.

2. No member or employee of any conference board and no employee, trustee, or director of any agency or institution participating in the funds of the conference benevolent budget shall be eligible for membership on the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. (791)

A person now on the Commission and who desires to continue thereon must surrender their other responsibilities.

3. There should be nothing allowed in the selection, nomination or election of members of the Commission that would cast the least doubt upon the integrity, ability or acumen of this group, for the members of the Conference must have the utmost respect for and confidence in its Commission.

4. The Annual Conference, on nomination of the Commission on World Service and Finance, shall, at the first session of the conference after the General Conference, elect a conference treasurer. Thereafter, the conference treasurer is answerable to the Commission. (803)

5. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall have authority and supervision over the treasurer. (803)

6. No annual conference board or interest shall make a special conference-wide appeal to the local churches for funds without the approval of the Annual Conference, except in case of extreme emergency, when such approval may be given by a two thirds vote of the district superintendents and of the Commission, *jointly acting*. (810)

7. When application is made to the conference for the privilege of a

special conference wide financial appeal, whether by special collections, campaigns, or otherwise, the application shall be referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance before final action is taken. (811)

8. No representative of any agency can appeal to the treasurer for funds not in the budget or for more than his *pro rata* share.

9. The conference treasurer shall keep a separate account for each conference board or agency, enter the proper credits in each at the end of each month's business, and disburse the same on proper order from each board or agency, respectively. None of the above designated accounts shall be drawn on for the benefit of another. (808)

10. The Conference should accept the full amount of the World Service apportionment.

11. After the percentage has been determined, the treasurer must send the full percentage amount *each month* to the treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance. (804, 805, 806)

12. All monies raised for general causes, special purposes and world service special gifts shall be remitted monthly to the treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance. (805)

13. With regard to Ratio Askings, after the correct amount has been sent for World Service, in disbursing the remainder, salaries should receive priority.

14. No board or agency shall receive more than its apportionment.

15. No board or agency shall receive more than its proportionate percentage of the budget received.

SECTION B

Recommendations

We recommend that:

1. The only equitable manner in which to make apportionments is by a conference-wide formula administered by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, directly to the charges.

2. Three factors should be used to determine the amount of the apportionment:

a. The full membership of the church.

b. The pastor's cash salary.

c. The total local church budget (not including capital funds and benevolence items).

3. This formula be used. (1) The membership of each church is divided by the total conference membership thus giving that church's percentage of the whole. Then the pastor's cash salary (2) is divided by the total paid to pastors by the churches of the Conference (\$453,195.). (3) The total local church budget is divided by the amount spent by all local churches on other than building drives or benevolences (921,495 dollars).* (4) These three percentages are added together and divided by 3. (5) The result is the church's rate of sharing and is used as the multiplier (6) with the totals of the conference budget to compute apportionments. Use of this formula would reduce St. Daniel's Church, Chester, Penna. in World Service/Conference Benevolences

* Each charge would be asked to submit a copy of its local church budget to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

from \$2,133 to \$1,965. It would reduce Pocomoke City in the same item from \$550 to \$446. It would raise Tioga, Philadelphia, from \$325 to \$893.00.

4. The voucher used to remit monies should be vastly simplified. All conference administrative items should be together, and grouping of boards and agencies would alleviate and eliminate much competition and bias.

5. Uniform forms be used by all boards and agencies requesting money or

inclusion in the conference budget to the Commission. Our recommendation is below:

Request for Budgetary Funds

- I. Salaries (itemized)
 - Travel and Expense monies
- II. Other Fixed Obligations (itemized)
 - (e.g., continuing debts, pledges, etc.)
- III. Promotional and Office Maintenance Expense
- IV. Delegates' Travel and Expense Fees
- V. Meetings, Meals and Travel Expense

6. We should work toward this goal: The money to be spent in a given year will be that which has come in (received) during the preceding conference fiscal year. At the beginning of a year, a board or agency should know exactly how much money it will have to operate its program that year. The money should already be in hand! (held by the conference treasurer). This goal can be realized in stages using the Reserve Fund money. For example, the first year (1964-65) 1. Church Aid and Missions, 2. Regional Leadership School, and 3. Commission on Summer Agencies, could be supported by reserve funds. Monies received during the year would be used to support these items the following year. During the year of "Reserve Fund" support, the item would receive its full asking. The Commission on World Service and Finance would administer this program.

7. The treasurer be instructed to make a complete report including the following from the auditor's report:

1. Total amount on hand at the beginning of the fiscal year.
2. Total amount received for all purposes during the fiscal year.
3. Total amount to be accounted for.
4. Total amount of disbursements during the fiscal year.
5. Total amount on hand at the close of the fiscal year.

8. The conference treasurer's Annual Report be mimeographed and made available to the delegates to the Annual Conference at the time of the Annual Conference.

9. We recommend a Capital Funds Campaign to extend over a four year period and include the following items and amounts:

10. We charge the Commission on World Service and Finance with the responsibility of seeing that there is mailed to every member of the Annual Conference, a full and complete statement regarding the finances of the Annual Conference, including assets, within thirty (30) days after the close of this conference session.

*Apportioned to churches that failed to raise their quota before.

**Figure listed is for the immediate one year period and will possibly be revised upwards.

11. All conference boards and agencies shall within ten (10) days after the close of the conference session submit a full and complete financial statement, including assets, to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance.

SECTION C

Stewardship

We recommend that:

1. There shall be a better conference wide program of stewardship that reaches into the local church in a vital way, supported and guided by the Board of Lay Activities.

2. The director of stewardship shall be in contact with district secretaries of stewardship constantly and they, in turn, in touch with local church secretaries of stewardship. Each church shall have an active Committee on Christian Stewardship!

3. Each church shall be encouraged in every way to conduct an Every Member Visitation Program annually.

4. Each church shall be encouraged to lift up tithing as the *minimum* standard of giving in the Methodist Church, the Annual Conference itself affirming this principle.

5. There shall be district and sub-district workshops on stewardship conducted by conference and district personnel; these shall be followed by similar workshops in each local church.

6. A booklet shall be compiled by the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the Board of Lay Activities, with the Conference Director of Stewardship as editor, interpreting the conference program of stewardship to each charge. It shall include the conference definition of tithing.

1. That the Commission on Stewardship and Finance in every local church study and use the Manual on Stewardship and Finance.

2. That every charge should have the kit on stewardship with turn over chart.

3. That the emphasis, *Stewardship Education in the Local Church*, be continued.

4. That every local church conduct the *Every Member Visitation Campaign*.

5. That tithing be encouraged as the minimum standard of giving in every local church.

6. That Christian stewardship be more effectively taught to children and youth.

7. That every local church be represented at the Layman's Workshop, November 20-22, 1964 at the Ambassador Hotel, Atlantic City, N. J.

5. BOARD OF MISSIONS

Today we are facing decisions that will affect our Church and Conference for generations to come. We face them with uncertainty and meager information.

It is as much the task of the Board of Missions to help bring understanding and brotherhood as it is that of the Board of Christian Social Concerns. We are mindful that time is running out and that God may be looking for a handful of righteous men that He might spare our sinful world from the fire which hangs over us, for in Ephesians 5:15 Paul has written, "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise men but as wise, making the most of the time. . . ." What counts most is not what we are able to accomplish, but what He is able to accomplish through us.

Not only is the changing inner city a challenge to us, we are also challenged by the changing rural areas. Modern transportation will hasten merger of many churches regardless of sentiment, tradition, and heritage. The needs of many newcomers must be served by both rural and city churches.

Our missionary secretaries are aware of these problems and have done a tremendous job in missionary education and cultivation. Our Interboard Schools of October, 1963 touched two hundred eighty-one churches and five hundred twenty-eight persons. What a tremendous force this number of persons could be if they will put to work the things they learned at these sessions.

As chairman of the Board, may I thank the secretaries, members of the Board, and district superintendents for their loyalty and devotion to the tasks assigned us. In view of what is to be done and must be done, we are left sometimes with the feeling that we have accomplished very little to advance His cause, but we trust that it has been bread cast upon the waters whose purpose, some day, will be seen and fulfilled.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That on each district there shall be a Committee on Missionary Education, Cultivation, and Promotion composed of the following district officers: lay leader; secretary of Missionary Education, W.S.C.S.; secretary of Children's Work, W.S.C.S.; secretary of Youth Work, W.S.C.S.; director of Youth

Work; chairman of Christian Outreach, M.Y.F.; director of Children's Work; director of Men's Work; and members of Conference Board of Missions.

2. That each district purchase necessary materials for the use of the missionary secretary in his work.

3. That each district missionary secretary seek certification by the Board of Education in the course, "Missionary Education in the Local Church."

4. That in early fall there be held on each district, training sessions in missionary education, cultivation and promotion.

5. That at least ten persons from each district should attend the Appalachian Missionary Conference.

6. That greater use be made of returned missionaries, crusade scholars, nationals, and General Board members by local churches.

7. That we study and act upon the recommendations presented by the Boards of Missions of the Delaware and Peninsula Conferences.

6. BOARD OF PENSIONS

1. PERMANENT FUND. We recommend that the apportionment of \$8,333.00 for the Permanent Fund remain for this year pending revision by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance.

2. HEALTH AND WELFARE. We recommend that the same asking of \$500.00 be requested this year for the Philadelphia Methodist Hospital; that all ministers and their families be enrolled in health and hospitalization policies that are available through state and local Council of Churches and the Board of Pensions.

3. PROPORTIONAL PAYMENT OF MINISTERIAL SUPPORT. We recommend that all ministers prorate the payment of apportions on ministerial support and that each district superintendent make each minister aware of his obligation.

4. ONE AND ONE-HALF PER CENT. We recommend: (a) That the district superintendent in all his contact with delinquent ministers urge the importance of paying their one and one-half per cent; (b) that in planning appointments of ministers, the question of their relations to the fund be taken into consideration; (c) that in order to reduce the immense amount of one and one-half per cent due:

1. Ministers receiving \$5,000.00 or more cash salaries to pay in full.

2. Ministers receiving \$2,000.00 to \$4,999.00 pay 80%.

3. Ministers receiving less than \$2,000.00 pay 6% of their indebtedness.

(d) *ministers pay 3% interest on all arrears beginning this conference year*

(e) we suggest above arrangements for the conference year 1964-65.

7. BOARD OF EDUCATION

Recent emphasis has been placed upon the goal, "The whole church teaching and the whole church learning." This report and that of other members of our staff, are attempts to state briefly how we have sought to help make this a reality in our Conference during the past year. Some 2,403 officers and teachers under the leadership of 163 pastors have labored faithfully in this teaching ministry. To serve as a resource and guide to this host of workers has been the responsibility of your conference and districts staffs of Christian education.

Teaching the changeless Gospel in a period of rapid social change is no small task. In our Conference, amid the change so characteristic of our time, is added the period of transition from the "business as usual" to the adjustments which must be made as we seek to do our part in making ours a more inclusive Church. We trust that this report and those of our co-workers will show that there are great challenges and opportunities which lie ahead. We see our task as one in which we must make our program of Christian education as strong and effective as possible.

Children's Work: Mrs. Emma W. Strother, Director: For some reason we seem to share with the general church a loss in enrollment. During the past year our loss in the children's division was 89. This does not seem a large number, however, when we note that the public schools are witnessing a great increase in this age group, it does give us cause for concern. We are pleased that Bishop Love has called this matter to our attention with the suggestion that the Lenten season "be one in which Methodism moves into a new birth of Christian understanding and action through Christian teaching."

Youth Work: Edwin L. Ellis, Director: In the youth enrollment of our Conference there was an increase of 190 over the previous year. It is our hope that the churches will seek a greater involvement of youth in the life of the church. The excellent work of our conference and district directors is a real movement in this direction. We ask for them the fullest possible support.

Adult Work: David W. Briddell, Director, Miss Leotia Carroll, President of the Y.A.F.: We are convinced that no lasting progress in Christian education is made unless adults are vitally involved in a program of adult education. This area is one which needs our special attention. We note that the adult church school enrollment has increased by 351 over last year.

Family Life: James C. Hardcastle, Committee Chairman: It has been a source of encouragement to see the increased interest in the promotion of a family life program in many churches. The recent decisions of the Supreme Court regarding prayer and Bible reading in the public schools have placed upon the home a responsibility of teaching religion that is unmistakable. It is our hope that our homes will rise to the challenge and accept the task of Christian nurture.

General Church School Work: Our district directors of General Church School Work are aware of the task of giving leadership to the church school

workers. This has been effectively done through district workshops conducted as follows: Dover District, T. A. Jeter; Easton District, Arthur Wise; Philadelphia District, Herman D. Brown; Salisbury District, Mrs. Carolyn Dorman; and Mrs. Mary Forman on the Wilmington District.

Higher Education: W. R. Hazzard, Committee Chairman: We make an urgent appeal for greater support of our educational institutions. Likewise, we must seek to strengthen our ministry to the hundreds of Methodist students who attend institutions within the bounds of our Conference. We are disturbed that our support seems to be on the decline at a time when the need is most crucial. We must not fail our students. There is no doubt that the colleges will furnish the leadership of our society in the years which lie ahead. Whether this leadership is Christian depends to a great degree upon the concern which the Church shows for students today.

Leadership Education: This summer will see a new pattern in leadership education for our Conference. The Baltimore Area School, held at Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C., is being discontinued. Our leaders will be trained in enterprises formerly sponsored by the Northeastern Jurisdiction. We are sharing in the planning for these enterprises.

Camp Development: The prospect of cooperation with the Peninsula conference opens up to our youth and their counselors opportunities which would not have been possible to us working alone. We are pleased to offer our campsite in this cooperative project of the two conferences. Our concern is that we may meet the necessary stage of development of facilities which will make our site suitable to the needs of camping. These needs will be listed by the camping consultant who will assess the situation of the Peninsula conference as well as ours. This is to be done in light of the proposed joint program of camping.

Interboard Corporation: We were delighted with the opportunity to have a part in the Interboard Schools which were held on each district in October. There were 528 persons enrolled in the five schools. We were pleased that 54 chairmen of the Commission on Education were in attendance. The expert leadership from the Boards of Missions, Education, Social Concerns, Evangelism and Lay Activities was helpful to all.

Appreciation: To Bishop Love, who has been a source of strength during the twelve years of his administration, we are deeply grateful. We, who labor in Christian education have found him a real friend to our cause. We will miss his wise counsel. To the district superintendents, conference and district staffs, pastors and lay-workers, we say, thank you. Through all of these and many others too numerous to list here, God has revealed Himself through human personalities. To Him, we are supremely grateful now and always.

Recommendations

1. That we continue the asking of \$1.50 per member to support our schools, colleges and Wesley Foundations.
2. That this amount be placed in the budget of the church, with the suggestion that the fourth Sunday in November be used as the day to secure the offering of \$1.50 per member, and that other projects be sponsored for this cause.

3. That we use the amount raised for schools, colleges and Wesley Foundations as indicated:

(1) Priorities—to be reserved for immediate distribution when needed—\$3,200.00. a. To support the chaplain of the Wesley Club, Morgan Christian Center—\$1,200.00. b. To support Wesley Foundation and/or MSM on college campuses, and promotion—\$2,000.00.

(a) Delaware State College . . \$ 400.00
 (b) Lincoln University 400.00
 (c) Promotion 1,200.00

(2) Balance of money raised for schools, colleges and Wesley Foundations to be distributed on a percentage basis as indicated:

a. Morristown College 25%
 b. Bennett College 25%
 c. Wesley Theological Seminary 25%
 d. Gammon Theological Seminary 5%
 e. Wesley Foundation, Howard University 3%
 f. Wesley Foundation, Md. State College 15%
 g. Allen High School 2%

4. That we support Morgan Christian Center with Race Relations Day offering. Should this offering go beyond \$2,500.00 the remainder be given to other institutions in the Baltimore Area.

5. That the Delaware Conference shall raise \$20,000.00 during the next four years, to help the Morristown College building fund campaign, seeking to raise \$5,000.00 per year.

6. That Camp Development Day be observed on the second Sunday in March.

7. That we continue to develop the campsite in light of the future program of camping in cooperation with the Peninsula Conference.

8. That \$50,000.00 for Camp Development be raised during the quadrennium 1964-1968, seeking to raise \$12,500.00 each of the four years.

Youth Director

The Youth program of the Delaware Conference has been progressing steadily. The work has been greatly enhanced by the effectiveness of our Youth Council and Adult Counselors. Dale Webb has served diligently as the president and as coordinator with the Councils of neighboring Conferences. Many new areas of cooperation have been realized because of his effort.

Summary of Activities—The Assembly for Senior Highs was held at Delaware State College, Dover, Delaware. The theme was "Christian Family Living." Over one hundred sixty youth and adults attended. \$150.00 was given for the M. Y. Fund and \$50.00 as an Advance Special for Mozambique, Africa.

The District Youth Assemblies were well attended. The Easton and Salisbury Districts met jointly at Maryland State College, Dover and Wilmington Districts at Delaware State College, and the Philadelphia District at Drew University. Over four hundred youth, mainly Junior-highs, were in attendance.

Christian Witness Missions were held on each district. The training session and Central Mission was held at Redeemer Church, Brooklyn, N. Y. More than sixty teams made seven hundred visits during July. Our youth received many commitments for Christ and His Church.

The Older Youth held two activities. The first being, the Older Youth Weekend, held at Hamilton Memorial Methodist Church, Atlantic City, N. J. The theme was "The Inclusive Church." More than fifty youth and adults attended. The second was the Older Youth Workcamp held at the Delaware Conference campsite, near Church Hill, Maryland where sixteen youth helped to make improvements.

Successful Missionary Rallies were held on each district. The themes discussed were "The Christian Mission in Southern Asia" and "The Changing City Challenges the Church." One thousand fifty youth attended the five Rallies. Twelve hundred dollars were given for the M. Y. Fund and four hundred dollars for Youth Conference Support.

The youth participated in several joint activities with the Philadelphia and Peninsula Conferences, the Wesley Institute held at Drew University, Senior High Camp at the Peninsula Camp—Pecometh, and the Fall Conference at Harrington, Delaware. The Philadelphia and Peninsula Conferences are looking forward to a greater cooperation and participation from the Delaware Conference.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That the responsible boards consider sponsoring the Christian Witness Mission again this year.
2. That a program of stewardship education be initiated among the youth.
3. That continued cooperation be given to the efforts of the Delaware Conference and neighboring conferences in the interest of an integrated summer program for youth.
4. That M. Y. Fund rebate be used for conference scholarships in lieu of being distributed to the districts.
5. That we continue to devote attention to cultivation and follow up of those who make commitment to church related vocations.
6. That more opportunities be provided for training of youth officers and adult workers with youth on all levels.

I close my report in the spirit of gratitude and appreciation to Bishop Love, the Cabinet, members of the Board, Youth Council, youth and adults of the Conference, and my co-workers on the staff. It is my sincere desire to serve the Board and the Conference to the best of my ability.

Camp Development

We presented to the Annual Conference the recommendation of the Board of Education: That we continue to develop the campsite in light of the future program of camping in cooperation with the Peninsula Conference.

On May 11, Miss Elizabeth Brown, Camp Consultant, of the General Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn. met with the joint committee of both Conferences. As a result of the meeting with Miss Brown, the two conferences agreed to the following:

1. The Peninsula Conference will cancel its plans to build the proposed lodge as formerly planned.
2. All facilities of Camp Pecometh are available to all individuals and groups of the Delaware Conference on the same basis as the individuals and groups of the Peninsula Conference.
3. A joint committee is to plan for a unified program of summer activities for 1965.

The Delaware Conference is to provide for the use of our Campsite for pioneer camping by providing the following facilities:

1. Cancel the plan to erect the diningroom-lodge building.
2. Install adequate water supply.
3. Construct adequate shower houses for campers and staff.
4. Construct simple type of shelter to accommodate groups of 75 to 100 persons.
5. Construct storage for food and equipment and first aid supplies.
6. Investigate the possibility of acquiring additional land.
7. Provide such other facilities as are required for pioneer camping.

The Wesley Club

Morgan State College, Baltimore, Maryland

I. PURPOSE OF THE WESLEY CLUB

The purpose of the Wesley Club is to assist the spiritual growth of college students by providing opportunity for experiences of Christian worship, fellowship, leadership, group cooperation, study, discussion, recreation, and social service—to the glory of God, and for the up-building of his Kingdom.

II. ACTIVITIES OF THE WESLEY CLUB CHAPLAIN

A. *Methodist Student Loan Fund*

The Wesley Club chaplain is the campus "loan officer" for this national fund. He counsels with students who apply, assists them with application forms, corresponds with the student loan office in Nashville, Tenn., and forwards to students any loan-checks received.

Between September, 1964, and January, 1964, Methodist student loans amounting to \$850.00 have been approved and received for four Morgan College students.*

B. *Student Counselling*

In addition to loan-fund assistance, the chaplain counsels with any other students who may require it. Thus far, most counselling has been on an informal rather than a formal basis. Counselling of Methodist students, and others, is also provided by the director of the Morgan Christian Center, the Reverend Howard L. Cornish. Students are sometimes referred by one of us to the other.

* One student, a Wesley Club alumnus, was also assisted with successful application for a scholarship at Meharry Medical College.

C. *Participation in Activities of Morgan Christian Center*

The Wesley Club office, in the Morgan Christian Center, is shared jointly with the Presbyterian-U.C.C.F. chaplain.

The Wesley Club chaplain, as time permits, participates actively in the program of the Christian Center, including attendance at Sunday morning services at the Center, conducted by the Reverend Howard L. Cornish; participates in the discussion period and group meal which follows the Sunday services; speaking as guest preacher, usually about once each semester; attending the monthly (two-day) Religion-in-Life programs of the Center, and encouraging Wesley students to do so; serving as co-chairman of the Public Affairs Committee of the Morgan Christian Council.

D. *Participation in Programs of Methodist Agencies*

In addition to activities of the Methodist Student Movement on all levels, the Wesley Club chaplain attended two days of the Baltimore Annual Conference, led by Bishop John Wesley Lord; gave a conference devotional at Washington Annual Conference; was ordained an elder by Bishop Edgar A. Love, and admitted into full connection in Washington Conference; was a staff member for one-week, "Youth Seminar on Christian Citizenship," Wesley Maryland College, Westminster, under joint sponsorship of Methodist Boards of Education, Baltimore and Washington Conference seminar director, the Reverend Willard A. Williams; attended Methodist Tri-District Institute on Overseas Missions and the Inner-City, Linthicum Heights Methodist Church, Linthicum Heights, Md.; attended two sessions of Methodist Leadership Training School (seminar on "Christian Social Concerns," the Reverend Everett G. Miller, leader), Northwood-Appold Methodist Church, Baltimore.

- A. Continue and increase helpful influence at Morgan State College.
- B. Further increase in active participation of Methodists and others.
- C. Develop our committee structure to broaden participation.
- D. Schedule some fall programs before school ends this spring.

- F. Consider publication of a Wesley Newsletter beginning this fall.
- G. Prepare a Wesley Club promotional leaflet, and stationery.
- H. Increase the amount of student-counselling done by chaplain.
- I. Develop more activity in religious drama and social service.
- J. Increase contacts with, and participation of, college faculty.

The Wesley Club
Lincoln University

The Methodist Student Work at Lincoln University proved to be a successful undertaking during this conference year. Rev. Samuel G. Stevens, Campus Chaplain, worked directly with us in an effort to coordinate the work of our group with that of other religious organizations to establish an effective calendar of religious activities for the students. We were always assured of a comfortable meeting place, and equipment needed for our sessions.

The President, David Williams, now a senior, has given excellent leadership. It was through his untiring efforts that our attendance maintained a desirable level at each meeting, and that every activity was effectively publicized.

Meetings were held twice each month on Wednesday evenings at 7:30 P.M. in the newly constructed modern Student Union Building. Attendance averaged between twenty and thirty persons.

The highlights of our Student program were as follows:

1. Holy Communion on the first Sunday mornings monthly at eight o'clock. Attendance was small, but inspiration was great for those present.
2. Field Trip to Wesley Foundation at University of Delaware. Our students shared in a discussion on the "Mission of the Church." This trip furnished great motivation for our club.
3. The film, "John Wesley," was shown on the campus. More than fifty students were present. We planned only to show Part I of the film, but the students insisted upon remaining for another hour to see the complete story.
4. Dr. Schuyler Cammann, Professor of Oriental Studies at the University, visited us and led in a challenging informal discussion on "Communism Challenges Christianity." In spite of the busy time of the year on the campus, students responded well.

Many other phases of the program were equally as interesting as those above, but space does not allow for elaboration.

The interest in our program among the students is high, and it is hoped that next year a similar or even more effective program will take place on the campus of Lincoln University. It is further desired that more ministers and laymen of the Conference participate in this most needed endeavor. 8. BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Evangelism today must combine the methods and techniques of the past and the present with some creative procedure in order to meet the challenge of the present and the future. If the church is to be the true spiritual leaven in society, it is essential that her understanding and image of evangelism be deepened. Evangelism is not an added appendage to the church's life. Evangelism is an indigeneous part of the church. The church cannot be an active force for redemption of the world apart from evangelism.

Evangelism refers not simply to periodic activities in which we engage, as a part of a program adopted by some ecclesiastical body, by individual Christians and by the church in some corporate way. We should always keep in mind that a self-contained Church is a dying Church. A vital church is ever seeking new relationships of depth and meaning; it seeks, it shares, it serves, it bears witness to a redemptive gospel.

The General Conference of 1960 made this pronouncement, "The major

threat facing the Church today does not come from the enemies of the Church. It is the spiritual deadness of the witness of the Church, the lack of evangelistic initiative. The Church's evangelistic effort is to be neither seasonal nor sporadic, nor should evangelism be reserved for the labors of specialists. It must be made the continuing activity of all members of the Church."

Dr. Denman in his letter to me made this statement: "I sincerely hope that your Conference Board of Evangelism recommends to the Annual Conference a creative and workable plan of evangelism."

To the end that evangelism shall become a major emphasis in the Delaware Conference, the Board recommends the following:

1. Family Evangelism
2. Church School Evangelism
3. Un-conventional Evangelism
4. Retreats among local church Commissions on Evangelism
5. The district secretary shall work toward organizing the "12" in every church.

9. BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

I am thankful to God to have this privilege to make my twentieth annual report as Conference Lay Leader.

The main emphases of our Board are Christian Stewardship and Finance, Methodist Men's Work and Lay Speaking which are studied annually in a two day workshop directed by a member of the General Board of Lay Activities. For two years these sessions have been held at the Ambassador Hotel in Atlantic City, N. J. Two hundred laymen meet and study together.

Christian Stewardship: The conference director of Christian Stewardship is the Reverend Joseph E. Dunn who presents the cause of stewardship at every opportunity.

We have had on every district a workshop on Christian Stewardship. This work is being emphasized at every opportunity by preaching, teaching and giving of our resources.

We are grateful for the cooperation of district superintendents and pastors in this phase of the work, especially the Every Member Visitation. The Every Member Visitation wherever carried out has greatly stimulated local memberships. We give to a cause when we are properly informed. Thus, it is important to have well organized and trained Every Member Visitation teams.

Interboard Schools conducted in cooperation with other boards, were largely attended. All day sessions were held on each district.

Methodist Men: The director of Methodist Men is Larrie Jones, who has been given a difficult assignment. Men represent a great potential power in the local church. The General Board has been working on a special plan for four years known as the second mile. This plan we hope will give all of our men a deeper sense of mission. Over two thirds of our churches have Methodist Men's clubs, but few maintain an active program of activities. We are hopeful that the second mile will deepen their interest.

Lay Speaking: The director of Lay Speaking is T. A. Jeter, who has properly organized the work as the General Board directs. He has received

letters of commendation from the General Board staff. This phase of our lay work has deepened the interest of many of our lay women and men of all ages. They are reading more. We have discovered some who have the gifts to become missionaries and ministers. We have many lay people who are called upon to take charge of worship in the absence of the pastor. We hope to develop an increasing number of certified lay speakers.

10. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

On July 13, 1963, the chairman, director, secretary, Claude A. Edmonds, and the chairman of the Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs, James B. Dashiell, met with Richard C. Stazesky, chairman, and other representatives of the Peninsula Conference Board to make joint plans for the year's program in the area of race relations.

Mindful of the prospects that by 1966 the Baltimore area may be transferred to the Northeastern Jurisdiction and the Delaware Conference merged with the geographical conferences which it overlaps, the group sought to prepare the way for orderly transition.

The program devised was two-pronged. It called for each Board in its respective conference to promote exchanges, meetings and other contacts between the people of the two conferences. All boards, agencies, and supervisory personnel of the two conferences were called upon to invite their counterparts to share in conference and district programs.

Through the year this has been done, and considerable progress has been made in mutual understanding through enlarged involvement of each group with the other.

The second prong of the program was to be a study of the boards and agencies with the problems involved in the proposed merger. It is hoped that the results of the study will be shared with each Annual Conference in their 1964 session, and that the recommendations growing out of the study will be adopted as the contingent policies and plans that will be operative when the merger of the Delaware and Peninsula Conferences takes place.

A study outline was devised dealing with nine areas of concern—Camping, Church Location and Extension, District Boundaries and Itineracy, Finance, Institutions, Legal Matters, Ministerial Qualifications and Training (including supply pastors), Organizations and Pensions. A series of questions was formulated concerning each of these areas. The boards and agencies dealing with these areas of concern, including the Cabinets of the two conferences, were asked to jointly consider the questions and other germane issues, and to make recommendations.

During the year these boards have met. Preliminary reports of their findings and recommendations are encouraging. The report on the study is being published separately and will be distributed to the delegates of the two annual conferences prior to opening of their sessions.

It is of interest that the General Board of Christian Social Concerns was so impressed with the study outline that it re-processed it in detail and sent it out with a commendatory letter as a general mailing to The Methodist Church.

In March and April of this year, the Philadelphia, New Jersey and Delaware Conferences, under the leadership of Bishops Corson and Love, entered

joint discussions along the lines suggested by the Delaware-Peninsula study. Their recommendations will be presented to the 1964 sessions of these conferences for adoption.

The Second Methodist Conference on Human Relations was held in late August in Chicago. Two members of the Board and the director served as official delegates. The Chairman served as a discussion leader. Twelve other persons from the Conference attended. The Conference approved many far-reaching proposals for consideration by the forthcoming General Conference.

Two board meetings and several meetings of the Executive Committee have been held. The board cooperated in the conference-wide Inter-Board Schools held during the winter. The Director initiated a newsletter, "Focus," for promotional purposes. The district directors have vigorously promoted the work in each district, and there is evidence of a growing involvement in Christian Social Concerns on the local level. The director has served faithfully and creatively.

The budget recommended for the new year is a minimal one. Summarized below, it amounts to the same amount as for the current year:

1. That the Annual Conference approve the recommendations growing out of the merger studies between our Conference and the Peninsula, Philadelphia and New Jersey Conferences.
2. That the Conference approve report of a special negotiating team regarding the requests for transfer of 5 churches to the Newark Conference.
3. That the Conference call upon all members and local church commissions to write their Senators in support of the Civil Rights Bill as passed by the House of Representatives without any weakening amendments.
4. That the Conference sponsor Inter-Board Schools on each district and under the direction of the conference agencies involved.
5. That the budget asking be approved.

Proposed Merger and Transfer of Delaware and Peninsula Conference Churches: A study outline for the proposed merger and transfer of churches of these two Conferences has been submitted to the various boards and agencies of both Conferences. After editing the various reports, a joint report will be presented to both Annual Conferences in May, 1964.

Interboard Schools: These schools were a satisfactory series of training experiences in our Conference. The district directors are conducting follow-up

sub-district meetings with local church leaders. Two hundred eighty-one churches were represented, five hundred twenty-eight persons attended with one hundred four pastors being in attendance.

Conference Newsletter: The first issue of the Board Newsletter was published in January. Its purpose is fourfold; to inform, inspire, encourage, and promote Christian Social Concerns. Two or three issues will be published annually and sent to pastors, chairmen of local church commissions, and secretaries of Christian Social Concerns of the W.S.C.S.

The days ahead will demand vision, courage, determination, and commitment of the whole self to God and our beloved America. To this end, our prayer is . . .

"God of grace and God of glory, On Thy people pour Thy power;
Crown Thine ancient Church's story; Bring her bud to a glorious flower.
Grant us wisdom, Grant us courage, For the facing of this hour."

PART I

THE CENTRAL JURISDICTION AND THE GEOGRAPHICAL JURISDICTIONS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

(1) When The Methodist Protestant Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church and The Methodist Episcopal Church South united in 1939 to form The Methodist Church, the Constitution of The Methodist Church stated that The Methodist Church in the United States should be divided into five geographical jurisdictions but that "The Negro Annual Conferences, the Negro Mission Conferences and Missions in the United States of America" shall form the Central Jurisdiction. (Const., Sec. VIII, Art. 1, Par. 26, 1960 *Discipline*). At the time of union, the Negro constituency of the uniting churches voted overwhelmingly against this jurisdictional plan on the basis that it represented segregation both in symbol and fact.

(2) Beginning with the General Conference of 1944 and from every General Conference since then, there has come a plea for the elimination of all forms of discrimination and segregation within The Methodist Church (Par. 2172, 1944 *Discipline*; Par. 2026, 1948 *Discipline*; Par. 2027, 1952 *Discipline*; Par. 2026, 1956 *Discipline*; and Par. 2026, 1960 *Discipline*). The General Conference of 1960 requested that these ideals become the basis for action: "That as basic steps toward the removal of racial barriers in the organizational structure of the church are taken, consistent planning shall be undertaken by every jurisdiction and conference to implement the procedures duly authorized in Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church" (Par. 2026. 3, 1960 *Discipline*).

(3) The General Conference of 1956 recommended Amendment IX, and the annual conferences ratified it, which provides a method by which the Central Jurisdiction may be gradually abolished. This amendment provides the means by which local churches can transfer from an annual conference of the Central Jurisdiction to an annual conference of a regional jurisdiction and the means by which an annual conference may transfer from the Central Jurisdiction to one of the regional jurisdictions. In order for an annual conference to make this transfer, it needs to have approval by a two-thirds majority of the total of annual conference members present and voting, both of the Central Jurisdiction and of the jurisdiction into which it is requesting transfer.

(4) The Central Jurisdiction of 1960 endorsed the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction and set up a Committee of Five to guide the Jurisdiction in this regard. In March, 1962 this Committee called together 200 leaders of the Central Jurisdiction. This gathering reaffirmed and endorsed "the inevitability of the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction as a racial unit in the structure of The Methodist Church." It also recommended that "no annual conference of the Central Jurisdiction be transferred into a regional jurisdiction in which it is not located geographically." In order that this might be possible, the Central Jurisdiction Conference in 1964 will be asked to realign its conferences' boundaries so that no annual conference is in more than one regional jurisdiction. After this is done, it is the plan, worked out by this gathering of 200 leaders, that annual conferences will seek transfer to the regional jurisdictions in which they are located.

(5) The General Conference of 1964 reiterated the Church's determination to rid itself of racial segregation by stating "that if by September 1, 1967, for any reason the Central Jurisdiction shall not have been dissolved pursuant to the procedures provided in Amendment IX, any remaining Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction that have not merged with a regional Jurisdiction shall then be referred to as The Central Jurisdiction in Transition, and the Commission shall draft a report to the General Conference of 1968 on a plan for the termination of the Central Jurisdiction" (report of the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations, adopted May 1, 1964).

(6) It is clear, then, that it is the expressed purpose of the General Conference stated since 1944, soundly endorsed by the Central Jurisdiction, to eliminate as quickly as possible racial discrimination and segregation within The Methodist Church. This means the abolition of The Central Jurisdiction by transferring the annual conferences from it into the regional jurisdictions in which they are located. As stated above, the 1960 General Conference called upon all annual conferences to begin to make plans to implement such transfers under Amendment IX of the constitution of The Methodist Church.

PART II

DELAWARE—PENINSULA CONFERENCE RELATIONSHIPS AND PLANNING 1960-64

(1) Soon after the newly formed Boards of Christian Social Concerns were organized in the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences, their officers began to meet together for mutual planning in regard to race relations and other areas. It was apparent that these Boards, having responsibility for race relations, should work to bring their respective Conferences into a closer working relationship with each other.

(2) On May 18, 1961 the Peninsula Annual Conference voted to "approve the transfer of the Washington, the Delaware, and the North Carolina Annual Conferences to the Northeastern Jurisdiction from the Central Jurisdiction" (114 in favor, 3 opposed, p. 307, *Peninsula Annual Conference Journal, 1961*). The Delaware Annual Conference, at its session on May 21, 1961, voted to "approve the transfer of the three annual conferences of the Baltimore Area to the Northeastern Jurisdiction" (160 in favor, 17 opposed, p. 37 and p. 47, *Delaware Annual Conference Journal, 1961*). The transfer of these three annual conferences was approved by the required two thirds vote in the annual conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. However, these transfers were not approved by the annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, because the three annual conferences all had churches lying outside the boundaries of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. The approval of the Northeastern Jurisdiction is still valid and when the Central Jurisdiction annual conferences approve, the Delaware Conference and the Washington Conference will immediately be transferred into the Northeastern Jurisdiction. No further voting in regard to the transfer of the Delaware and Washington Annual Conferences into the Northeastern Jurisdiction is necessary on the part of the annual conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

(3) In November, 1961 a joint meeting of 100 persons—leaders of the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences, including the two bishops—was held at Easton, Maryland. The purpose of this meeting was to ascertain where

we were in our conference relationships, where we wanted to be, and what were the barriers preventing closer relationships. The findings of this important meeting were mailed to all the ministers and local church Chairmen of Commissions on Christian Social Concerns of the two conferences. This document called for all kinds of conference-district-local church level interchanges between Delaware and Peninsula Conference people and for as many joint programs as possible.

(4) Since that meeting, there have been many conference-district-and local church level interchanges and joint programs. There have been joint Methodist Youth Fellowship conferences, joint board and agency meetings, joint training schools, joint summer camping, innumerable local church pulpit, choir and other exchanges, integrated vacation church schools and other integrated local church activities including church membership. For three years, at least, people of these two conferences have been in frequent contact with one another.

(5) The Delaware Annual Conference session of 1963 (Pgs. 49, 141) designated its Board of Christian Social Concerns as the agency responsible for proceeding with plans to bring about a transfer of the Delaware Conference into the Northeastern Jurisdiction. On January 9, 1962 Bishop John Wesley Lord gave approval to the Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns to proceed with plans for studying a merger of the Delaware Conference churches within the Peninsula Conference boundaries with the Peninsula Annual Conference.

(6) On July 13, 1963 and later on October 10, 1963 a proposed study for the merging of the two conferences was drawn up by representatives from the two Conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns. Copies of the study were distributed to the pastors of the two Conferences. This study has been made in consultation with the various Boards and agencies of the two Conferences which have responsibility for topics involved in the study. In all, over 150 people have been actively related in some way to this study, but it is submitted only in the name of and by the Boards of Christian Social Concerns of the two Conferences.

PART III

PROPOSED STANDARDS FOR MERGER

The *PURPOSE* of these proposed standards is to set forth policies, agreed upon by the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences; these standards will guide in merging the Delaware Conference churches of Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland with the Peninsula Annual Conference.

The adoption of these standards by the two annual conferences is not actually a vote for the transfer of the Delaware Conference into the Northeastern Jurisdiction and the consequent merger of the Delaware Conference with the regional annual conferences which it overlays. The Northeastern Jurisdiction annual conferences have already voted on this, as has the Delaware Conference (see page 159, paragraph 2). There will be a transfer when the necessary approval is given by the other annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction. It is expected that this approval will be given after the realignment of the Central Jurisdiction annual conferences by the Central Jurisdiction, June 1964. Thus, a transfer of the Delaware Annual Conference into

the Northeastern Jurisdiction and the resulting merger of it with the regional annual conferences could take place in 1965 and will take place, probably, by 1966.

In adopting these proposed standards, the two annual conferences will be doing two things: (1) they will be reaffirming their desire to merge with one another and (2) they will be establishing the standards to be adhered to when the merger of the conferences is brought about.

A. Church Location and Extension

(1) It is recommended that a survey be made of Methodism in the area covered by the Peninsula Conference and the Delaware Conference Churches within the bounds of the state of Delaware and the nine counties on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, by the Department of Research and Survey of the Division of National Missions, in order to determine the feasibility of mergers, consolidations, relocations, realignments and church extension needs, and that recommendations accompany this report. It is recommended also that this report and survey be made as soon as possible.

(2) It is recommended that when two or more churches are near each other and cannot support a pastor by themselves, that the desirable policy is to merge the churches involved. In many instances where merger does not seem advisable, at the present time, there is need for cooperative action in order to make a greater impact upon the community, and to build rapport between the Methodist churches through cooperative programs, union services, pulpit exchanges, group ministries, Methodist Council programs with representatives from each church, etc.

(3) In areas that are sparsely populated, it is recommended that there be realignments of circuits, in order to make more effective the ministry to the people. This may take the form of attaching two churches, formerly stations, together, thus forming a new and stronger charge; attaching a weaker to a stronger church; placing additional churches upon circuits, etc.

(4) It is recommended that the following policies govern the building of new churches: (a) The building of new churches should be in places of population density and in places of great possibility of growth. (b) When new churches are built, in accordance with this population density and great possibility of growth, the new church should incorporate *all* Methodism in the area.

B. District Boundaries

- (1) Districts will not exceed 50 charges in number.
- (2) Actual district boundaries will be drawn at the time of merger.

C. Institutions

- (1) All institutions related to the merged annual conference shall offer their services without regard to race, color or national origin.
- (2) Employment policies of all institutions related to the merged annual conference shall be established without regard to race, color, or national origin.

D. Minimum Salary

- (1) The minimum salary schedule in force in the Peninsula Annual Conference at the time of merger shall be the schedule adopted in the merged conference.

(2) In order that no pastor shall receive more than \$500 from the minimum salary fund and yet still receive the minimum salary established, circuits and other pastoral arrangements shall be employed to raise the pastoral salaries to the required levels.

E. Ministry

(1) All ministers now in full connection with either the Delaware or Peninsula Annual Conferences will be recognized as ministers in full connection in the merged conference.

(2) All ministers of the merged conference shall enjoy the same status, rights and privileges.

(3) After the merger, ministers will be admitted into full connection only if they have college and seminary degrees, with the exception that those ministers on trial at the time of merger shall be admitted into full connection when they have fulfilled the requirements of the rule under which they were admitted on trial.

(4) Approved supply pastors in either conference at the time of merger shall be recognized as approved supply pastors in the merged conference.

(5) Recruitment for the ministry will be carried on without regard to race, color or national background.

F. Organization of the Annual Conference

(1) The opportunities of laymen in the annual conference shall not be limited in any way due to race, color or national origin.

(2) Ministerial membership on annual conference boards and agencies shall be limited to full time, active conference members.

(3) No person shall serve on any quadrennial board or agency for more than two terms or on any triennial board or agency for more than three terms.

G. Pensions

(1) All claimants against the present Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences will be recognized as claimants against the Conference after merger for the years of service rendered within the geographical boundaries of the Peninsula Annual Conference. The General Board of Pensions shall be the clearing house and the final authority in determining the years of service of all persons in the various Conferences.

(2) The pension rate, of course, will be determined by the Annual Conference after merger, but it is recommended that the rate be not less than the existing rate of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the time of merger.

(3) The same rate scale (retired ministers, widows, special conference claimants—retired ministers, special conference claimants—widows, children) will apply to all claimants; that is, there will not be one rate scale for those who served in the Peninsula Conference and another rate scale for those who served in the Delaware Conference.

(4) The permanent funds of the Delaware Conference will be distributed among the various conferences with which it will merge according to the procedure outlined in Par. 1609, *1960 Discipline*, but it is recommended that this will be done on a pro rata basis based upon the years of claim assumed by the conferences with which the Delaware Annual Conference will merge.

H. The Remainder of the Central Jurisdiction

The merged conference shall be mindful of the overall programmed abolition of the Central Jurisdiction and shall initiate and support action at all levels of the church to attain this goal.

The merged conference shall be mindful of the financial support which the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences now give toward the various institutions with which they are now respectively related.

PART IV CONCLUSION

A. What This Proposal Is

(1) This is a proposal to establish the goals and standards to be adhered to when the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences merge.

(2) This is a proposal to encourage the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction to approve the transfer of the Delaware Conference to the Northeastern Jurisdiction by demonstrating that the Peninsula and Delaware Annual Conferences desire this transfer and the consequent merging of the two Conferences and that they have agreed upon the standards to be followed in merging the two conferences.

B. What This Proposal Is Not

(1) It is *not* a vote on the transfer of the Delaware Annual Conference into the Northeastern Jurisdiction and the merger of the Delaware Conference with the regional annual conferences which it overlays. As was explained on page 159, paragraph 2, that vote has already been taken affirmatively. The only voting still necessary to effect such a transfer must be done in the annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction.

(2) This proposal does *not* seek to cover all matters relative to a merger of the two Conferences; it deals only with certain fundamental issues. Many matters can be adequately and easily and better dealt with after a merger.

(3) This proposal does *not* assume that there will be no problems in a resulting merger. It can be expected that there will still be colored and white churches, that for the most part for a time at least, colored ministers will be serving colored churches and white ministers, white churches. Local church customs in worship, organization, financing and other matters will continue and should continue without any effort to standardize everything. Differences, even difficulties, will be in the future. There is no assumption herein that a merger will be easy. But it is assumed that merger is right and that it is entirely possible to achieve.

PART V APPENDIX A. Statistics

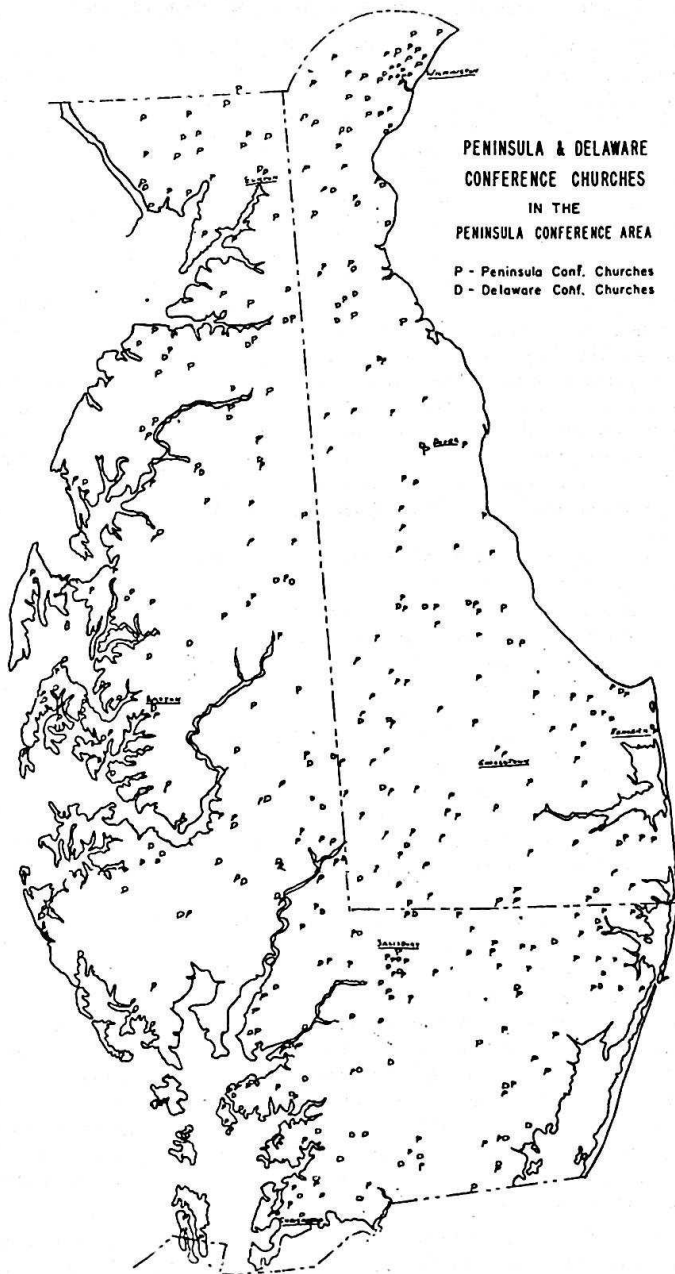

11. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The Church has no more urgent task than that of guiding young people in choosing vocations. Not so much a matter of helping our youth to make a living, but helping them to make a life, is our concern. As the Commission increasingly becomes committed to this position, it becomes more aware of the role which the church and home must play in guiding youth in making vocational choices. More emphasis must be placed upon giving children and youth, as well as adults, more opportunity for voluntary service in the church. It is through involvement in the real mission of the church that people frequently hear the call of God to a life's work. Our churches must give more attention to deepening the spiritual lives of youth, helping them to develop a greater sense of stewardship and a conviction that there is a ministry in which every Christian is to engage.

Through the Christian Witness Missions, Conference Youth Assembly, District Assemblies, and Missionaries Rallies, young people made commitments to church related vocations during the year. We urge greater effort on the part of our churches to see that more young people are exposed to these activities where growth in Christian decision becomes a natural and normal result of the fellowship. We must increase our efforts to enlist youth for the ministry, mission field, Christian education, church music, and other church related work.

We are pleased to report that two young women are in preparation for missionary service. Miss Virginia Burke, student at Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C., is in the field of Religious Education and Miss Barbara Qunton, student at Meharry Medical College, Nashville, Tennessee is to become a medical missionary. A number of young men and women who are enrolled in colleges are planning to enter seminaries and graduate schools in preparation for vocations in the church. Currently seven young men, John Coleman, Herbert Palmer, Richard Hicks, John Day, Frank Robinson, Simon Stubbs and Kenneth Greene are enrolled in seminaries.

We urge a greater concern for guidance of youth who do not feel called to serve in a church related vocation but who hope to serve as teachers, social workers, government employees, etc. If we fail to help them to be effective Christian witnesses in their vocations, we shall deprive them of their rightful heritage.

The Commission is aware of the need to give assistance to pastors and other workers in vocational guidance. Plans are being made to conduct two projects jointly with the Peninsula Conference. One is to be a meeting on recruiting for the ministry, where the Bishops of the two conferences will take the leadership. The other is a seminar on vocational counseling in which pastors and public school counselors are to participate. We shall explore the possibility of having similar meetings with the Philadelphia and New Jersey Conferences. Under the leadership of the Maryland Council of Churches, Seminars on Vocational Counseling for pastors were held at Denton and Salisbury, Maryland last September. Some of our pastors participated. The Commission participated in the Conference on the Ministry and Missions which is held annually in Wilmington, Delaware.

Appreciation: We are grateful for the support which Bishop Love has given to Christian Vocations during his twelve years as resident bishop. He

has sponsored the annual Christmas dinner which has more recently been called The Conference on the Ministry and Missions. We shall miss him as he enters the retired relations and be ever grateful for his wise counsel and deep concern for the Christian growth of youth.

District superintendents, pastors, youth directors, workers with youth, and parents have shared in helping youth to become aware of the Christian faith as related to vocational choices.

There remains much to be done in Christian Vocations. We urge every local church and home to give serious consideration to this phase of the church's ministry. To this end, we offer the following recommendations.

I. *The Local Church*

1. That every church organize the Committee on Christian Vocations.
2. That at least once a year a Career Day be observed.
3. That provision be made to cooperate with the public schools and other agencies in vocational guidance of youth.

II. *The District and Sub-district Levels*

1. That the district superintendents continue to emphasize Christian vocations in Quarterly Conferences.
2. That each district conduct a Christian Vocations Conference annually. These are to include parents and adult workers with youth.
3. That emphasis upon Christian vocations be continued at all district and sub-district meetings of young people.

III. *The Conference Level*

1. That we continue to promote the Conference on the Ministry under the leadership of our resident bishop.
2. That we cooperate with the Peninsula and other conferences in vocational enterprises.
3. That we put more emphasis on church related vocations in our work with students on college campuses.

12. BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The Board of Hospitals and Homes has worked hard and long to bring into fruition the reality of a Home for the Aging. The following is a brief summary of the case at present.

1. The Board now owns a 15 acre tract of land on Salisbury Road, Dover, Delaware. The land cost \$7,500—present value might well be \$20,000.
2. Complete architectural plans with estimated cost of building and operational cost have been submitted by architects, Stude-Dolan and Anderson.
3. A Board of Directors, elected by the Conference, has formed a corporation and has been chartered by the state of Delaware.
4. The Federal Housing and Homes Agency has pledged a loan as soon as the corporation can secure sewage disposal services from the city of Dover, and revise plans of Home to include a separate infirmary.
5. A joint committee of the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences have met and concluded that in event of a merger of Conferences all of the existing and planned facilities would be needed.
6. We have the following funds in trust:

13. GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

Proposed legislation from Board of Hospitals and Homes Convention, St. Louis, Missouri, January, 1964.

CLARIFICATION OF THE GOLDEN CROSS. In order to clarify the concept of the GOLDEN CROSS and make it more workable in promotion, both at the National and Annual Conference levels, it has been recommended that paragraph 1559.1 be revised to state a more specific definition of Golden Cross. It will change the name from Golden Cross Society to Golden Cross Fund. Money received will be limited to provide free and part-pay care to indigent persons through helping and healing agencies as determined by the Annual Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That the second Sunday of November be continued as Golden Cross Sunday. The enrollment fee, \$1.00 per member.
2. That enrollment fees collected shall be labeled Golden Cross Society, when remitting to Conference Treasurer.

15. COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARIES

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That all ministers who are members of the Annual Conference (probationers included) serving a pastoral charge and not gainfully employed in any other occupation, shall receive \$3,000.00 minimum per annum.
2. That all approved supply pastors giving full-time service to a pastoral charge and not gainfully employed in any other occupation shall receive \$2,600.00 minimum per annum.

3. That the minimum salary plan of our Conference shall not include retired ministers, student approved supply pastors and part-time approved supply pastors.

4. That the minimum salary of a minister shall include the amount paid for salary from any other source of the church (e.g., Division of National Missions, Promotional Fund). The Committee discourages persons from asking for consideration who receive an income from other sources whereby they attain the minimum salary level.

5. That the apportionment for minimum salary for each pastoral charge be equal to 5% of the pastor's salary paid by that charge.

6. That payments be made to ministers, quarterly (September, December, March and May).

7. That no pastor be granted minimum salary who does not submit to the Commission on Minimum Salary the information that is required to determine his eligibility. We further recommend that the request of each minister shall be made to the Commission not later than 30 days following the beginning of the conference year.

8. That a local church shall be reapportioned the next conference year any unpaid amount for minimum salary within a conference year. We further recommend that the provisions of paragraph 823, *Methodist Discipline*, regarding minimum salary as an essential part of the proportional payment of ministerial support, be practiced by all pastoral charges.

16. TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMISSION

We are happy to make a report of our work for the past year. Last year we recommended that audio-visual equipment be secured and made available for the boards and agencies of the Conference. We were successful in securing this equipment through the help of the Board of Education, Young Adult Fellowship, Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild, and Methodist Youth Fellowship. Mrs. Sylvanus Brown and Mrs. Ruth Webb were so interested in the project that they made a personal contribution. Such equipment will be available this summer for all conference summer meetings. It has already found use in work with Wesley Foundations and stewardship training seminars.

TRAFCO has continued to seek placement of Methodists and Methodist programs on television and radio. You will note in the Centennial Program that Rev. M. O. Ballard and Camphor Methodist Church will do a special radio broadcast. We have secured placement for a prominent personality of our conference to appear on the Ed Harvey Show on June 24th, (Philadelphia, WCAU). These are examples of our efforts to feature Methodists who are clergy and laity of the Delaware Conference. BREAKTHRU, a children's program produced by The Methodist Church, was placed in Philadelphia this year through the Philadelphia Council of Churches. Our Conference Trafco shared in the placement and promotion of this series which was received enthusiastically by television viewers. The second series of BREAKTHRU has been partially released. Six shows were cancelled for the lack of funds. We therefore urge all of our churches to support the Methodist Television-Radio Ministry. It is our hope that each church will conduct a special offering and remit the same to the Conference Treasurer. The minimum goal should be \$.10 per member.

We have provided help to churches and districts in audio-visual selection and training. We will continue this phase of our work. Our plans were discontinued for an audio-visual library, but we are able to make recommendations regarding other libraries and centers where audio-visual materials may be secured. Trafco is a service agency. We help you in your work. We help you to communicate your work.

17. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Delaware Conference is incorporated under the laws of the State of Delaware.

The officers of the board were duly elected at a regular meeting held at Dover, Delaware in June of 1963. The officers of the board are: President, C. W. Derrickson; Secretary, M. O. Ballard; Treasurer, J. R. Webb.

All legal papers of the board are kept in a safe deposit box at the Bank of Delaware, Dover, Delaware.

Early during the year a letter was received from a United States District Attorney informing us that we are to be paid one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) for a parcel of land on which one of the churches of the former Dover Circuit, of the Dover District had been located. The money was in payment for this land which the United States government had acquired some years ago when the Air Force Base was being established near Dover. We are pleased to report that as a result of the efforts of Lawrence Prattis, an attorney and a member of the Board of Trustees, the sum finally received from the land was two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00). The check was sent to the Conference Treasurer.

It is well to point out that, had not we received the communication from the United States District Attorney, we would not have known that any money was due the Conference for this land. This points up the necessity for district records on all properties of the local churches. Succeeding district superintendents and conference boards of trustees cannot know what properties we possess unless adequate records are kept.

There are now abandoned churches in the Conference that should be disposed of, but because of a lack of recorded deeds and other legal problems, the Conference Trustees cannot act. Some deeds have been lost, and some churches have not complied with the state requirements for the incorporation of churches. A few years ago the Conference Trustees had to dispose of an abandoned church property for perhaps half its real value because the church had never complied with the state requirement for the incorporation, acquisition and disposal of church property. This is of paramount importance as we move toward an integrated church. The conference trustees cannot know what properties we hold unless the local church trustees have deeds and records to certify our claims.

18. COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Commission on Worship proposes that each minister do the following things for the spiritual welfare of himself and the congregation:

1. That he lead the people to the awareness of the meaning and practice of worship, and how it is related to every-day living.
2. That he use the Manual for the *Commission on Worship in the Local Church*, which outlines and suggests the structure for a Commission on Worship in the local church.
3. That he use his office and insights to make the best use of music (hymns, anthems, canticles, responses, etc.) in all acts of worship. That he cooperate with the organist and director of music in teaching the congregation new

hymns. That he discipline himself in the use of a prescribed lectionary for Sunday services, especially since one of the additions to the *Book of Worship* will be a complete lectionary.

4. That he supervise the choice of hymn books for the Church School, and that he assist, through the Commission on Education, in making worship meaningful in the Church School.

5. That he give time each morning to the discipline and life of private devotions, and that he constantly encourage his congregation in the same, so that these regular "solitary moments" may add to and strengthen the spiritual enrichment gained in the Sunday worship.

6. That he do all in his power to encourage the members of the church to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion monthly not only as a memorial meal but also as the glorious opportunity to meet and to receive the presence of Christ, risen and eternally interceding for His people. And that he carefully prepare the people for the other sacrament, baptism, as well as for all the ordinances of the Church.

10. That the study of the history of the Delaware Conference be included in membership training classes in each local church and further that church-wide study course of the Negro in Methodism be initiated during the next quadrennium 1964-1968.

The Delaware Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild studied and proclaimed during the first three years of this quadrennium, the Emphases: The FAITH that compels us; FACTORS that confront us; and the Frontiers that call us. In this, the last year, we are working on the 4th, the PROGRAM that unites us in WITNESS and SERVICE.

Delegates attended the following conferences: The Church In Town and Country; Women In a New Age; and The Second Quadrennial Conference on Human Relations. Schools of Missions attended by members of Conference Society and Guild were: Central Jurisdiction, Northeastern Jurisdiction; New York East, Washington and Philadelphia Conferences. Exchange visits were made with the Peninsula Conference School. The number attending our School of Missions was the largest on record. Members of the Society attended the Guild Week-end; and Guilders attended the School. One Guild member attended a Regional Workshop on Visual Aids. Mrs. Marie Green is available for this service throughout the Conference. The use of literature is increasing. Sales at our School of Missions and Annual Meeting, alone, amounted to \$660.00.

Our 210 Societies and 20 Guilds have a total membership of 6,921, at last report. This is a small gain.

Cooperation with other conferences has been splendid. Among activities have been: Participation in World Day of Prayer; Observance of Week of Prayer and Self Denial; Sponsoring of Trick or Treat for UNICEF; March on Washington; Promotion of Health and Alcohol Education; and Seminar on Christian Social Relations sponsored jointly by the New Jersey, Philadelphia, Peninsula and Delaware Societies and Guilds. This Seminar did much to deepen the insights of those present into problems, needs, and action, for the Philadelphia area. Resource persons were Miss Thelma Stevens, Rev. D. R. Fletcher, Miss Elizabeth Dalbey and the Fourth World Understanding Team from Latin America.

Our Youth Secretary was in attendance at a meeting to consider the Delaware Conference as co-sponsor of the "Christian Outreach Camp," which is now being sponsored by the Board of Missions, Board of Education, and Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Philadelphia Conference.

The Delaware Conference president has been put on roster of the Board of Directors of Neighborhood House, the Peninsula Conference project in Wilmington, Delaware. A request for volunteer service by members of the Delaware Conference churches in Wilmington was referred to the president of our Wilmington District Woman's Society for action.

An invitation, extended by the School of Missions Committee of Peninsula Conference, was accepted by our School of Missions Committee. Our school will share in their program on Tuesday evening.

Conversations are being held by a committee appointed by the trustees of Friendship House with the trustees of the Philadelphia Conference projects. It is the desire of the Woman's Division that all Methodist projects in the Philadelphia area be coordinated in planning, program, and service. Bishop Love and members of his Cabinet met with the trustees. We hope for an early report from this committee.

Spiritual Life has been lifted through celebrations of the 225th Anniversary of John Wesley's Aldersgate Experience. A celebration was presided over by Bishops John Wesley Lord and Edgar A. Love with an attendance of over two thousand from the two conferences.

Our student educational level is high. More than five hundred are reported by secretaries as attending various colleges. These students were honored on Student Recognition Day. Some assisted in morning worship services; others were presented gifts while still others were served luncheon. Eighteen young people were reported as having attended Christian Vocations Conferences. Others attended Student Conferences and Schools of Missions for youth. Thirty-five young women are reported planning to enter the mission field. These names have been sent by Secretary of Christian Vocations to district secretaries of Christian Vocations for follow-up.

Our Conference Society through the secretary of Children's Work, is in close touch with the Conference Board of Education and is working with district secretaries on the new curriculum for children.

The manner and materials of our over and above giving is being stressed. Our conference pledge at the Jurisdictional Annual Meeting was maintained at the same amount for 1964-65 as we have given this year. The Jurisdiction President commended Delaware Conference for this step, taken in spite of the

fact that the Conference will have at least eight less churches in the coming year.

In September, 1965, the Woman's Division of Christian Service will reach its twenty-fifth anniversary. The celebration of this anniversary is begun now and will culminate in May, 1966. During this time of celebration it is prayed that each conference will secure one regular missionary, one deaconess, one U.S.—two and one over-seas special term missionary. This is a minimum. It is also requested that on all levels there be an increase in membership in the Society and Guild of 25%; and a 25% increase in pledge giving in comparison with the pledge giving of 1962-63. Under our new GOALS we will strive for:

1. Growth in understanding and spiritual power;
2. Increase in knowledge of the needs of the world;
3. Sharing through WITNESS and SERVICE in the outreach of the Church.

There will be a number of changes in the structure of the Woman's Division in respect to its joint responsibilities with other sections of the Methodist Board of Missions. After June 1, 1965 there will not be a secretary of Children or Youth Work of the Society on any level. Plans are being worked out for the carrying on of this work. In the meantime, secretaries are to continue to work in these two areas until June, 1965. In 1965 eight Regional Schools of Christian Missions will replace the Jurisdiction Schools.

All districts are urged to work with the conference vice-president, who will have charge in the planning of district seminars. All vice-presidents are especially urged to attend Conference Schools of Missions this summer. The Division is making a plea that ten percent of the women sent for training for leadership in Regional schools (1965) be women under 40. This gives a year to invite more young people into leadership roles in our societies and guilds.

This is my last official report to the Delaware Conference, as president. After two years in this office I shall retire June 1, 1964. In harmony with the changing times and efforts of The Methodist Church to make a reality of its belief in "inclusion," the Delaware Conference voted last May to allow a block of its churches to transfer. These churches are located in the area of a new conference which will be formed in June, 1964. Being a member of the Brooks Memorial Church of Jamaica, Long Island, I shall be out of the Delaware Conference. I have worked, ever trying to give good account of my stewardship, with full knowledge that I have a definite CHARGE TO KEEP. I have endeavored to work with all boards, commissions, committees on which I have membership. Have attended many meetings and tried to implement in every way, on every occasion, the work of kingdom building throughout the Conference and in my contacts with other conferences, institutions, and organizations.

I wish to thank Bishop Love, district superintendents, ministers and laymen who have helped to make it possible for me to serve four years as secretary of Missionary Education and Service; four years as vice-president; and two years as president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. There are many memories which I shall treasure forever.

It is my sincere hope that we of The Methodist Church will acknowledge ONE LORD, ONE FAITH, AND ONE BROTHERHOOD OF MANKIND UNDER THE FATHERHOOD OF GOD.

2. AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

We come to the end of a quadrennium and an era. The administration of Bishop Love has been marked by success and outstanding achievements. The Baltimore area has become a highly regarded unit in our Methodist structure. We are at the point of not knowing just what will be the future of our area as presently constructed.

Since "we know not what the future hath of marvel or surprise," it seems advisable at this point to recommend the continuation of the area office as now constituted. In the light of anticipated changes in our Jurisdictional structure and even the possibility of dissolution of the Delaware Conference as we now know it, it is likely that drastic changes will be made during or by the end of the present quadrennium.

We recommend the same budget as that under which we have operated this quadrennium—a total of \$21,000.00 annually, apportioned to the Annual Conferences as follows:

4. GREATER PHILADELPHIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The activities of more than 450 volunteer members of more than 40 Boards and committees at work with a staff of fifteen full-time, four part-time and four summer chaplains cooperate and work through the Greater Philadelphia Council of Churches.

Broadcasting

The Radio and Television Department will soon have its own staff executive because the Presbytery of Philadelphia and the United Church of Christ have promised us more than \$30,000.00 pro-rated over a three-year period as a starter. Other denominations are expected to join in our support in the next several years.

During 1963 we provided programming for 418 hours on 15 radio stations and 182 hours on four television stations. The New Jersey Council's Department of Radio and Television furnished us with many programs.

Research and Planning

The Department of Research and Planning is concerned with people. To bring people into the Kingdom of God is the reason for the existence of this Department. It is for this reason that the Department has co-sponsored six Religious Censuses in 1963 in which 1,600 volunteer workers called on 44,000 homes to reach 158,000 persons. A major undertaking on statistics was completed this past year. One hundred statistical profiles on population and hous-

ing characteristics were compiled covering the five-county area. Because of the availability of these profiles, no church in the five-county area needs to be unaware of the population and housing characteristics of its parish.

The Department promoted and supported a major pilot in-service training project at Conwell School of Theology. A three-year course on "An Effective Church In An Urban Society" was established in 1962. This unique project enrolled 45 pastors. None had less than three years and some 30 years experience in the ministry. The churches ranged in size from less than 100 to more than 2,000 members and represented 17 denominations. There were 27 white pastors, 17 Negroes and one Puerto Rican. The third year of this project will be completed in the spring of 1964. Though initiated and promoted by the Department it was underwritten by the Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church and housed and led by the Conwell School of Theology.

The Department has kept close touch with Urban Renewal and County Planning programs in Philadelphia and surrounding counties, Philadelphia Redeveloping Authority, and West Philadelphia Corporation. These relations over the years have affected scores of churches.

A long-range planning conference was authorized by the Board of the Council. The Department of Research and Planning was asked to promote and sponsor it. The theme selected was, "The Church and Its Mission In Metropolitan Philadelphia." One hundred selected lay and clerical leaders are being invited to participate in this significant conference.

Christian Education and Evangelism

Youth is a time for growth, learning and decision making. The activities of the Department of Christian Education and Evangelism cover a wide scope aiding thousands of leaders and teachers in leadership training programs throughout the year which include: an annual fall two-day Christian Education Skill Shop, this past year on the theme, "Ways to Make the Bible Vivid and Relevant"; fall and spring semester "School of Bible and Religion," on a college level, in cooperation with Beaver College; and Vacation Church School Institutes in Center City and three county areas.

Three new ventures in 1963 were well received: School of Missions for children's leaders; Seminar on Sunday Schools for the mentally retarded; and one-day Conference for Church Librarians offered in conjunction with Drexel Institute of Technology.

Inter-faith cooperation has come to the fore. The annual meeting of this Department centered around a study of the image of the Roman Catholic and the Jew in our Protestant religious textbooks and their counterpart presentation of Protestantism. An inter-faith luncheon meeting, realistically facing our differences, proved most helpful and a follow-up meeting of Protestant Christian education leaders offered a strong challenge to religious brotherhood and understanding.

Hundreds of churches shared in a Youth Rally on Evangelism. A project entitled "Testaments Unlimited" was launched to provide New Testaments to youth who have had their first brush with the law. These were presented as gifts from concerned Christian youth. Already 1,000 have been furnished with nine months of effort still ahead. Full-time chaplains in four Boy Scout summer camps have ministered to well over 9,000 scouts and scouters during July

and August. Year round work toward religious awards for both Boy and Girl Scouts is rapidly growing. Over 1,000 boys and girls shared in our annual tours to augment work in Vacation Church Schools. In 1963 the Chinese Christian Church and Center was featured.

Community Services

One of the most interesting activities of the Community Services Department has been the course in Education for Marriage for Engaged Couples, which has been conducted three times a year since 1960. Response of the young people to this course has been enthusiastic.

Early in the year a meeting was held of leaders of older age groups which meet in the churches in the Philadelphia area. This was attended by thirty-five men and women who are leaders and whose groups meet regularly. They meet for information, inspiration and recreation.

A very exciting and challenging development in the Department of Community Service has been that of Church and Community Cooperation, in which the Board of Directors of that Department has been interested for five years. A request was made to the Dolfinger-McMahon Foundation for funds to employ special staff to concentrate the program in one area in Philadelphia. In July of 1963, funds for this purpose was granted by the Foundation and it was possible to secure a young couple, Mr. and Mrs. Bruce E. Johnson, to do the field work.

The reorganization of the Community Services Department under a professionally trained successor to Mrs. Heydrick, who retired October 1 from this work, will result in increased activity in the type of service which such a department can render, not only to the churches and their congregations, but in social planning in the field of health and welfare.

United Church Women

World Day of Prayer services on the theme, "Let Us Pray," were held in more than a hundred churches. Offerings were brought to sustain twelve Christian colleges for women in Asia and Africa; to make possible the translation, printing and distribution of the present program among Indian-Americans, migrants, and students coming to this country from all over the world.

May Fellowship Day, held at the Chinese Christian Church, had as its theme: "One Family Under God: Genuine and Full Participation" with Dr. E. Luther Cunningham as speaker. Participating in the worship services were Puerto Rican Americans and Chinese Americans. Jewish women also attended this observance and presented the luncheon program on "Jewish Commitment in Race Relations."

Some of the most outstanding work in this department is done by the Foreign Student Committee. 2,300 students have been extended home hospitality by 900 host families. Here is an opportunity for Christian witness when 3,000 foreign students, many from our mission schools abroad, come to Philadelphia to study each year.

The committee on Church World Service continues its work through twenty-nine collection centers, collecting 50,000 pounds of clothing during the last year. 15,000 pounds of blankets for Algeria were flown directly from the

Philadelphia Airport. This committee also helped with the arrangements for the Church World Service Luncheon of the General Assembly of the National Council of Churches in December.

A new venture for this year was the Christmas Luncheon sponsored cooperatively with the Alliance for Catholic Women—Ladies of Charity. Forty Roman Catholic women and forty United Church Women had an hour of genuine Christian fellowship with Mrs. Janet Harbison of Presbyterian Life magazine and Mrs. Margaret McFadden of the Committee on Religion in a Free Society speaking on the theme, "The Significance of the Vatican Council for Catholics and Protestants."

Methodist churches, clergy, and laity shared in these responsibilities, including contributing \$17,468.95 of the \$132,293.62 received for the year's expenses.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Thursday Morning, July 28, 1864

Bishop Janes, in accordance with the Episcopal plan, met the Colored Preachers who had been traveling within the bounds of the Philadelphia and New Jersey Annual Conferences in the John Wesley Church, Philadelphia, Pa.

He called the meeting to order at 9 o'clock, and conducted the opening religious exercises which consisted in the reading of the Scriptures, singing and prayer. He then announced a second hymn, which was sung, after which Rev. Frost Pollett led in prayer.

Joseph Castle, Presiding Elder of the South Philadelphia District, (Philadelphia Conference); Joseph Mason, P. E. of the Wilmington District; Thomas J. Quigley of the Easton District; Adam Wallace of the Snow Hill District; Charles H. Whitecar of the Bridgton District, (New Jersey Conference), and others were present to witness the organization of the Delaware Conference, the first organized among our colored people in the United States.

Bishop Janes called for the recommendations of those who proposed to become members of the Conference. The Presiding Elders presented the recommendations from the Quarterly Conferences, properly signed by ten Elders of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the traveling connection, of those who had been employed by them for two or more years.

The Bishop, after an interview with the Preachers present, dismissed the meeting, assuring them that he would in the interval examine the papers placed in his hands, and report the result tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

FRIDAY MORNING, JULY 29th, 1864

The first session of the Delaware Conference for colored people of the Methodist Episcopal Church was held in John Wesley Chapel, Philadelphia, July 29th, 1864.

Rev. Charles H. Whitecar, Presiding Elder of the Bridgton District, New Jersey Conference, conducted the religious exercises, after which Bishop Janes announced that he had carefully examined the papers of recommendation and had found the following preachers entitled to membership in the Conference, viz.—

Isaac Hinson, having been employed by a Presiding Elder 16 years; James Davis, 15; Harrison Smith, 12; Isaiah Broughton, 10; John G. Manluff, 10; Samuel Dale, 8; Wilmore S. Elsey, 6; Jehu H. Pierce, 5; Nathan Young, 4; Joshua Brinkley, 3.

These ten Preachers were then declared by Bishop Janes, the Presiding Officer, to constitute the Delaware Conference. The Bishop in a few neat and appropriate remarks congratulated the Conference upon this interesting event in the history of the Church; namely, the formation of the first Conference of Colored Preachers under the rule of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

He reminded them of the importance of recognizing in this the hand of a Divine Providence and requested the Conference to arise and sing—

“Praise God from whom all blessings flow;
Praise Him, all creatures here below;
Praise Him above, ye heavenly host:
Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.”

which they did “with the Spirit” and with the understanding when Rev. Dr. Durbin, Corresponding Secretary of the Missionary Society, being called upon by the Bishop, led in prayer. It was an impressive and solemn season—a marked period in the history of the Church.

Wilmore S. Elsey was nominated and elected Secretary of the Conference.

The Bishop then called for the recommendations of Local Deacons for Elders' orders. The following were presented and read, after which each applicant was carefully represented and they were elected, viz.—

Solomon Jackson, recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Waugh Circuit, Cambridge, Md.; Frost Pollett, recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Manoken Circuit, Somerset Co., Md.; and Samuel Elsey, recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Wycomico Circuit, Somerset Co., Md.

RESOLVED, By the Delaware Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Conference assembled, that our hearty thanks are due and are hereby tendered to Thomas W. Price, Esq. of the city of Philadelphia, for the elegant and substantial Record Book, suitably lettered, which he has this morning presented to this body, in which our Minutes shall be preserved and transmitted to future generations.

Frost Pollett having been recommended was received as a member of the Delaware Conference, and his name to be entered as the third on the roll.

The Conference on motion adjourned to meet this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

SECOND SESSION

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, JULY 29th, 1864

The Conference met according to adjournment at 4 o'clock. Bishop Janes in the Chair. Religious services conducted by Isaac Hinson.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Question 1st of the Minutes, viz.—Who are admitted on trial? was taken up.

The Conference on motion adjourned to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

THIRD SESSION

SATURDAY MORNING, JULY 30th, 1864

The Conference met according to adjournment at 9 o'clock, Bishop Janes in the chair. Rev. Mr. Macay of Boston, conducted the religious exercises. The minutes of yesterday's afternoon session were read and approved.

The statistics of the past year were called for by the chair and presented. See page 236.

David Tilghman, Jehu H. Pierce, and James Davis were appointed a committee to receive the Conference collection.

James Davis, W. S. Elsey, and Harrison Smith were appointed a committee on Public Worship to make the appointments for the approaching Sabbath.

The following resolution was adopted, viz.—Resolved, That Rev. David Tilghman be instructed to publish five hundred copies of the Minutes and distribute them, and pay for them in the same manner as he did last year.

Rev. D. Tilghman reported the expense of publishing the Minutes of last year to be \$22.50; leaving a balance in his hands of \$27.85.

The committee reported the Conference collection to be \$76.25. Collection received in payment of Minutes last year, \$15.85.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—viz.—

Resolved, That the Delaware Conference resolve itself into a Conference Missionary Society auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Resolved, That we adopt the Constitution of the New Jersey Annual Conference Missionary Society as the constitution of this Society, and that it be published in our Minutes.

Resolved, That John G. Manluff and Isaac Hinson be a committee to nominate officers for the ensuing year.

The recommendation of Robert Robinson, a Local Preacher from the Zoar Quarterly Conference, for Deacon's orders was presented and read; he was then represented and elected to Deacon's orders.

Question 1st of the Minutes, viz.—Who are admitted on trial, was resumed. Robert Robinson, recommended from Zoar Quarterly Conference was represented and admitted.

E. Zion, Wilmington, Delaware was fixed as the seat of the next annual session of the Conference.

On motion of John G. Manluff, David Tilghman, Treasurer of the Conference collection, was authorized to pay Isaac Hinson, James Davis, and Harrison Smith, each \$10.00 from the funds in his hands. Six dollars additional were given to Harrison Smith by a few of his friends.

A collection was taken up for the benefit of the Sexton which amounted to \$2.45.

Bishop Janes presented to each of the members of the Conference a copy of Dr. Kidder's, "*Treatise on Homiletics*," when the following resolution, presented by W. S. Elsey and Jehu H. Pierce, was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:—

Resolved, That the hearty thanks of this Conference are due, and are hereby tendered to Bishop Janes for the gift of *Dr. Kidder's Treatise on Homiletics* to each of the members of this Conference.

The Journal was read up and approved.

Bishop Janes addressed the members of the Conference with reference to their work, and gave the preachers most excellent advice; after which, he read the appointments for the coming year.

The Doxology was sung, after which, Rev. Dr. Castle led in prayer.

Bishop Janes pronounced the benediction. Thus closed the first session of the Delaware Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church—the first Conference ever organized by the Church among the colored people of the United States. Through the instrumentality of this Conference may many, many thousands be converted to God, and gathered into the Church. Amen, Amen.

RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised
1956

RULE I.—Decisions

The president shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie vote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III.—Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the presiding officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the presiding officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV.—Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V.—Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.—Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Sessions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the district superintendent to the Conference secretary.

RULE VII.—Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote or speak who is not within the legal limits of the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X.—Non-Debatable Questions

1. To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn to the Conference finally.
2. To suspend the rule.
3. To lay on the table, providing a representative of the committee shall have the right to speak.
4. To take from the table.
5. To call for a previous question.
6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.—Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

1. To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment. or may be laid on the table).
2. To adjourn.
3. To take recess.
4. To order a previous question.
5. To lay on the table.
6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
7. To postpone to a given time.
8. To commit or refer.
9. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.—Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

1. When a member has the floor.
2. When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
3. When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
4. When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non-debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV.—The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motions are pending, the mover shall indicate to what he intended the motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of conference relations.

RULE XV.—Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the presiding officer or secretary.

RULE XVI.—Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if it is subject to such division as he indicates.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.—Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.—Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION**RULE XXI.—Admitted on Trial**

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age,

RULE XXIII.—Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.—Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.—Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.—Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the district superintendents, the host pastor, the Conference lay leader and the president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII.—Program Planning

The Board of Ministerial Training, the Board of Pensions and the Board of Missions shall have authority to plan respectfully the Ordination Service, Memorial Service and the Missionary Sermon, including the selection of respective speakers without regard to district lines. In each instance the program must be approved by the presiding bishop.

RULE XXIX.—Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX.—Pictures in the Journal

Pictures in the Conference Journal shall be limited to: deceased ministers, newly appointed district superintendents, host pastor and the presiding bishop.

RULE XXXI.—Organization of Conference

The secretary shall prepare the resolution of organization for the Delaware Annual Conference after consultation with the Bishop and the Cabinet with the exception of quadrennial officers. The same to be printed in the Pre-Conference Report booklet. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

RULE XXXII.—Elders Orders

Only those persons shall be elected to local elders orders, either man or woman, whose appointment to a charge as a preacher in charge has been requested by the district superintendent.

RULE XXXIII.—Ministers in Retired Relations—Membership on Boards, Commissions and Committees

A minister holding a position on a quadrennial board, commission or committee upon entering the retired relation, may complete the term for which he was elected.

RULE XXXIV.—Membership on Boards and Commissions

A person may not be elected to serve on more than two conference boards or commissions. This rule shall not apply to any person elected to a board or commission by virtue of his office or any representation as provided by the Discipline. This rule shall not pertain to membership on any committee.
