Bishop Lord opened the afternoon session with devotions. After the singing of the hymn "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," the Bishop led in prayer.

Report of Board of Pensions—W. C. Strother, Jr., chairman, reported on the amounts raised for Conference Claimants Distribution, Permanent Fund, Stabilization Fund, and Temporary Reserve Pension Fund which will be distributed to the successor conferences. These pension assets have been deposited with the General Board of Pensions and will be distributed as authorized by the Joint Distributing Committee. (See VI. B-4). The Chairman announced that all ministers that were currently insured under the Death Benefit Program of the General Board of Pensions will be insured until July 1, 1965. The Delaware Conference is providing this additional time of coverage to allow the ministers to become insured through the successor conferences to which they will be transferred.

Tribute was given to James H. C. Kelly who served as secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions for twenty-two years. A pocket watch had been given to him by the Board in appreciation for faithful and dedicated service. In response, Mr. Kelly gave thanks to Almighty God for the ability to serve and to the Conference for the inspiration to serve.

Report of Ministers Wives Association For Conference Claimants' Fund—W. C. Strother, chairman of Board of Pensions, presided. Mrs. Edwin L. Ellis, president of the Association, was presented. She expressed appreciation to the ministers' wives, ministers, and laymen for their continuing support in raising funds for pensions.

The report was presented by the District Presidents as follows:

Rev. Strother commended the efforts of the Association. He reported that from 1950 through 1965 the Ministers Wives reported \$199,886.51 for current distribution and \$11,051.52 for Reserve Pension Fund, making a total of \$210,937.03. The annuity rate had been increased from \$16 to \$35 during the fifteen years which he had been serving as chairman of the Board. He praised the dedicated leadership of his predecessor, the late Reverend John W. Parker.

The following persons were presented by Mrs. Ellis: Mrs. Blake E. Nicholson, Jr., president of the Philadelphia Conference Ministers Wives Association; Mrs. John Wesley Lord, wife of the Resident Bishop; and Mrs. Edgar A. Love, wife of the former Resident Bishop. Each brought greetings and expressed praise for the work of the Ministers Wives Association.

On behalf of the Board of Pensions, Rev. Strother presented orchids to Mrs. Lord, Mrs. Love, Mrs. Ellis, and District Presidents of the Association.

Bishop Lord complimented the ministers' wives stating that this report was a demonstration of the depth of their commitment which also reveals the calibre and strength of the Delaware Conference.

Telegram of Greetings from Bishop and Mrs. Noah W. Moore, Jr., Southwestern Area, was read by Bishop Lord.

Bishop Lord presented Reverend Walter A. Russell, Jr., representative of the Cokesbury Press, who was in charge of sales at this Conference. He brought greetings and spoke concerning some recently published books which should be of interest to the Conference members.

Photographs were taken of ministerial members and approved supply pastors that were going into the three conferences, namely, Peninsula, Philadelphia, and Southern New Jersey.

Executive Session of Ministerial Members—The session was convened at 4 o'clock by Bishop Lord.

Report of Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications was presented by D. R. Fletcher, Registrar, and approved. (See IV. The Disciplinary Questions, II. Questions 21 through 33.)

Reception of Member—On recommendation of Board of Ministerial Training, Adolphus A. Berry was read into full connection by Bishop Lord.

Report of Committee on Conference Relations, read by Charles E. Kiah, was approved. (See IV. The Disciplinary Questions, II. Questions 42-44 and VI. B-1.)

In answer to question of H. H. Nichols concerning insurance coverage after dissolution of the Conference, the Reverend Allen Mayes of the General Board of Pensions stated that the General Board was willing to extend coverage for the pastors already enrolled in the Death Benefit Program to allow time for them to become enrolled in the insurance plans of the conferences into which they will be transferred. Members received on trial at this session will not be included in the extended coverage. W. C. Strother reported that the premiums have been paid for coverage to July 1, 1965.

In answer to question of D. L. Ridout concerning the status of pastors in Southern New Jersey, Bishop Lord stated that Bishop Prince Taylor had requested their transfer to the New Jersey Conference when the Conference is dissolved in May, prior to the New Jersey Conference session, June 9-13.

W. L. D. Lyght, chairman of Commission on Minimum Salaries, asked question concerning employed pastors. Bishop Lord stated that the case of each employed pastor will be considered on its own merit. The aim of the new Peninsula Conference will be to strengthen churches and full time service for the work of the Church is desired. Consolidations and mergers of local congregations to strengthen charges will enable higher minimum salaries to be paid. Pastors will be expected to cooperate.

Bishop Lord expressed appreciation to the ministers for their cooperation and for the gracious and courteous manner in which he had been received.

D. R. Fletcher expressed commendation on behalf of the Conference to Bishop Lord for his leadership in the dissolution of the Conferences of the former Baltimore Area. The procedure is expected to become the pattern to be used in other areas of the Church.

Bishop Lord stated that he was asked to make a report at the meeting of the Council of Bishops which met at Houston on what had happened in this Jurisdiction. He made a composite report of what had been done in the Area of each Bishop of the Jurisdiction and also included the Statement of Standards on which a vote had been taken, as well as a portion of the Plan of Merger which has been prepared for the Uniting Conference session. The members of the Council were so enthusiastic about it that they asked that a copy be sent to each member. Continuing, he said, "We ought to know this, Brethren, that we are working into history. This is something greater than most of you appreciate. We will make mistakes. We will need to pick ourselves up when we fall, but we are simply going a day at a time; we are not only making history, we are making law. We have nothing to go by. There are no precedents, and how much help we have received is just beyond comprehen-

sion. All of the bishops have been most gracious, saying, 'How can we help? What men can we take? These are salaries we will offer to make this transition.' This represents a cooperative spirit in the entire Northeastern Jurisdiction and Bishop Fred Pierce Corson, in whose area I sit, has been most cooperative. When we received his telegram this morning, we knew it came from his heart. . . .

"We must not become discouraged. We must not become impatient, but above all, we must trust each other. Everything will not go exactly as we like, but we do what we can do under the guidance of the spirit of God. We do not expect people to love us for what we are doing—we are acting courageously. This is not a popularity contest. We are doing the thing that under God needs to be done. . . . It is ridiculous! We ask our schools to integrate, we ask our hotels to integrate, we ask our businesses to integrate, and then we in the church in our own spiteful way say we will go our separate ways. It just doesn't make sense. We must be so careful that we do not allow an image to get outside that can be used by our enemies to say, 'If the church is not willing to do it, why should we?'"

"One of the great bishops of our Church, William T. Russell, who was never recognized as perhaps he should have been, before his death published an article in *Motive Magazine* in 1962 that is called *Methodism's Present Task—A Southern View*. 'He said he was not loyal to the South of the past, of slavery and secession; nor was he loyal to the contemporary South in which much is good, but much is still bad; but he is loyal to the South of the future—for there are three Souths—the South of the past, the contemporary South, and the South of the future. He said indeed he would want his grandchildren to know that their grandfather was loyal to the South of the future.'

"We've got to bring the South along with us and we're going to do it. This is one great Church and I think we are setting the pattern for what under God may one day be accomplished throughout every Jurisdiction when there are men of the same mind, intention, and heart of the late Bishop William T. Russell. 'Come what may,' said he, 'in this matter at least, I am going to be Christian.' We want to be Christian, and I think under God we can."

Announcements were made by J. R. Shockley and W. R. Hazzard.

Executive Session Adjourned—Following prayer by J. W. Elbert, the afternoon session was adjourned by Bishop Lord.

Lay Delegates' Meeting was held at 4 o'clock at Tindley Temple. The meeting was called to order by Hally P. Johns, conference lay leader. He led the discussion on the dissolution and merger of the Annual Conference. James R. Webb, associate conference lay leader, spoke on the contribution of the Delaware Conference to the work of The Methodist Church. Others who spoke on the contribution of laymen were Elmer T. Hawkins and James C. Hardcastle. The laity was encouraged to continue to be active in the work of The Methodist Church on all levels in all of the Conferences to which churches would be transferred.

The meeting was adjourned after the singing of a hymn.

The Annual Meeting of the Ministers' Wives Association was held at 4 o'clock in the Auditorium of the Tindley Temple Church School Center. The president, Mrs. Edwin L. Ellis, presided.

7:00 P.M.—Missionary Service: G. Wayne Cuff, missionary secretary of the Easton District, presided. The sermon was delivered by Walter H. Greene, conference missionary secretary. His subject was "Footprints of Time"; text, Jeremiah 7:23. Assisting in the service were other district missionary secretaries, S. W. C. Crosse, Carroll Scott, and S. L. Jones. Members of the Ministers' Wives Association led the congregation in singing.

8:00 P.M. The Historical Society presented "THE FINAL HOUR" with William C. Jason, Jr., chairman, presiding. Assisting in this presentation were Edwin L. Ellis, Widmon Butler, Jr., Clifford E. Landrum, Hally P. Johns, Daniel L. Ridout, Oliver H. Spence, and Ralph B. Thompson. The illustrated lecture covering the one-hundred-one year history of the Delaware Conference included its organization; statistical growth by twenty-five year periods; recollections of incidents, institutions, events, laymen, and ministerial members; and its transition. Music was rendered by the combined choirs of Bethsaida, Camphor, Community, Emmanuel, Haven, Janes, John Wesley, Mt. Zion, Peniel, St. Barnabas, St. Thomas, Tindley Temple, Tioga, Trinity, and Zoar under the direction of J. Russell Robinson. The hymn, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," was sung and the benediction was pronounced by a retired ministerial member.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 28—MORNING SESSION—9:30 A.M.

Devotions were led by Ralph B. Thompson.

The Conference Session was convened by Bishop Lord. He expressed appreciation to William C. Jason and the Historical Society for the presentation of the history of the Delaware Conference on the previous evening.

Bishop Fred Pierce Corson was physically unable to attend this conference session. Bishop Lord presented Dr. Alexander K. Smith, Philadelphia Area Administrative Assistant, who brought greetings to Bishop Lord and the Delaware Conference on behalf of Bishop Corson. He also extended the welcome on the Bishop's behalf to the ministerial members and churches that would become a part of the Philadelphia Annual Conference during its next session.

Bishop Lord presented Dr. Alton S. Miller, president of the District Superintendents of the Peninsula Annual Conference, who brought greetings and extended the welcome to the ministerial members and churches that would become a part of the Peninsula Annual Conference at its next session.

Bishop Lord in reference to the dissolution and merger of the Conference stated that "we are restoring that which is broken. This is return to the way The Methodist Church began. It was our sin which brought division. How could you begin a Church that was not inclusive? Christ never envisioned such division among the ranks of those who would bear his name. If we could just feel in our hearts and minds that what we are doing is restoring a broken church to wholeness, to health, to unity, then we would see that this thing

is of God. . . . We have a great tradition and heritage. We do this because we feel it to be the only thing we could do as a mark of character. Surely now, we have much to share with all Christ's Church and this great dream will be now pouring out into the life of the new conferences that are being organized."

Resolution to Abandon Property of St. James Church, Oriole, Maryland, Salisbury, Salisbury District was read by James W. Elbert and approved. (See Resolution 1.)

Proposed Constitutional Amendments from the General Conference were presented to the Conference for action.

Amendment III. Total votes cast—164; for 164; again 0.

Amendment XIV. Total votes cast—179; for 179; against 0.

Amendment XV. Total votes cast—182; for 182; against 0.

Amendment XVI. Total votes cast—180; for 180; against 0.

Amendment XVIII. Total votes cast—178; for 178; against 0.

Report of Board of Pensions—W. C. Strother, Jr., chairman, presented Dr. Walter A. Russell, Jr., field representative, Cokesbury Northeastern Regional Service Center. He reported that a check for \$3,799.06 from the Methodist Publishing House would be sent to Delaware Conference for pensions.

The financial report of the Board was read by the secretary, James H. C. Kelly and approved. (See VI. B-4.) He stated that pastors who are in arrears with the one and one-half per cent apportionment for claimants will be charged four per cent interest after entering the Peninsula Conference.

Dr. Allen M. Mayes, representative from the General Board of Pensions, was presented. He brought greetings and congratulated the Conference on the leadership it had given in the Central Jurisdiction in raising the annuity rate.

Telegram of Greetings from Bishop Prince A. Taylor, Jr. and members of the New Jersey Conference was read by Bishop Lord.

Privilege—On motion of W. C. Jason, Jr., telegrams were to be sent to W. A. T. Miles, W. C. Thompson, and J. I. Peaco, retired ministerial members, to express regrets for their physical inability to be present at this session and to participate in the historical program, "The Final Hour."

Chaplains Presented—Daniel L. Ridout presented Lt. Col. John W. Handy, Jr. who is to be promoted to the rank of Colonel—the first Negro Methodist chaplain to achieve this status. He also presented Elmer P. Gibson, retired chaplain, who is the president of Morristown College, Morristown, Tennessee. President Gibson made a progress report concerning the College and expressed appreciation to the Conference for its financial support.

Statistical Report—Samuel E. Parker, Statistician, read the report. It was accepted. (See Statistical Tables, VI-C.)

Treasurer's Report—Joseph E. Dunn, Treasurer, read the report which was accepted subject to audit. He reported that \$27,279 had been received from the New York Conference and \$15,000 was expected from the Newark Conference to compensate for the loss of funds incurred by the transfer of thirteen churches and three missions to these Conferences in June, 1964. (See VI B-2 and VI-C.)

Report of Trustees—The report of the Trustees, presented by Marion O. Ballard, was approved. (See VI B-5.)

Plan of Merger of the Delaware Conference with the New York, Peninsula, Philadelphia, Northern New Jersey, and Southern New Jersey Annual Conferences—The Preamble was read by M. O. Ballard. (See VI B-6).

Sections IV. District Parsonages, VI. Other Assets, VII. Corporations, VIII. Successor Conference, IX. Depository of Records, and XIII. Continuation of Officers, not having been previously confirmed, were subject to consideration.

Section IV was read and adopted.

Section VI was read and adopted after lengthy discussion.

Section VII was read and adopted.

Section VIII was read and adopted.

Section IX was read and adopted.

Section XIII was read and adopted after discussion.

On motion of M. O. Ballard, the Plan of Merger was adopted as a whole.

(See VI B-6.)

The motion of David W. Briddell, that the proceedings of the continuing corporation be included as a supplement to the 1965 Annual Conference Journal; and that all succeeding acts be reported by the continuing corporation to the respective annual conferences which Delaware Conference churches have been transferred or merged, was adopted.

Presentation of Members on Trial—Dennis R. Fletcher, Registrar, presented to Bishop Lord and the Conference the following persons who had been received on trial: Robert Edward Glover, Kenneth Hayward Greene, William Etheridge Russell, and Edwin Noel Toppin.

Bishop Lord asked J. W. Elbert to lead the Conference in prayer closing the business session.

Closing Service—The members of the Conference sang the hymn, "How Firm a Foundation," and prayer was offered by J. W. Elbert. The sermon was delivered by Marion O. Ballard.

THE TRIUMPH OF FAITH

These all died in faith, not having received what was promised, but having seen it and greeted it from afar, and having acknowledged that they were strangers and exiles on the earth. (R.S.V.)

More than a hundred years ago the Delaware Annual Conference was organized, holding its first session in John Wesley Church, which is now Tindley Temple Church. According to our conference journal, there were some

twenty men who were members of that organizing conference. It came into being amidst troubled times. The Civil War still raged on and although that terrible conflict was soon to be terminated by victory for the Union forces, in this year of eighteen sixty-four, the Confederate forces inflicted much heavier damage upon the Union armies than they had received. They were to surge to within five miles of Washington. The Conference came into being under these adverse circumstances and has survived until today. Today it passes out of existence to be merged with other Methodist Conferences in order to fulfill the requirements of a truly inclusive church.

The Delaware Conference has reached its present status because of the faithfulness of those who founded it and those who have followed after them. It is to such faith as that exercised by its founders and by those who still carry on that we pay tribute as we think on these words of the author of the letter to the Hebrews.

In this letter to the Hebrews the author is writing of the promises made to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. They were promised Canaan, a land flowing with milk and honey, and they were promised many descendants. But in so far as the promise pertained to Canaan and its material blessings, the promise never was fulfilled. Abraham remained a stranger in Canaan and could only purchase Machpelah as a burial ground. Beyond that, he had no possessions in Canaan. No other one of the patriarchs was able to actually call Canaan his home. Jacob died a stranger in a foreign land after his father, Isaac, had been laid away in the little plot that had been purchased by Abraham. But note, the astounding fact about all this is that these men did not surrender to despair and renounce the God who had made the unfulfilled promises to them. Some years ago in a community where I was a pastor, I heard a woman ask one of the children in the community to go on an errand for her. To induce the child to perform this service, she promised that she would pay her. The child refused, saying, "Oh no! You promised me once before that you would pay me and you did not do it." Failure to keep a promise had caused the child to be distrustful of this person. The amazing truth here is that they did not receive the promises made to them; still they were not distrustful of God.

Why did they remain faithful even when their promises were not realized? England's mid-nineteenth century preacher, F. W. Robertson, whose brilliance still shines through his written sermons, has a sermon based on the eighteenth verse of this chapter in Hebrews which he entitled, "The Illusiveness of Life." He says very well that life proved to be illusive for these men, but they were not deluded. They did not receive what they had hoped to receive, but were not deluded. They were disappointed, but not misled; God does not mislead his people. He never deceives men; we can believe that when our legitimate hopes and longings fail to materialize it is not because God is perpetrating a spiritual hoax upon us. Tennyson says in *Passing of Arthur*, "God fulfills himself in many ways . . ." He does not always act in the manner we have been led to believe He would act, but He fulfills Himself so that even though we are disappointed, we are not dismayed.

The ways of God are exceedingly strange to us at times because we are pilgrims and strangers upon the earth. Sometimes it appears that the best we can do is futile, and there is no attainment of our goals. We listened

last night in rapt attention as the history of our Conference was recited. We can never forget these lines of Charles Albert Tindley:

"Often times my sky is clear,
Joy abounds without a tear,
Though a day so bright begun,
Clouds may hide tomorrow's sun."

We do not surrender to defeat and despair. We labor on because of the inner assurances which God gives to those who trust Him. In Ernest Hemmingway's book, *The Old Man and The Sea*, he tells the gripping story of an old fisherman who had made the prize catch of his life, the big fish. It was a tremendous battle to catch such a fish, but it was finally accomplished. After he had latched the great catch to his boat, then came the battle against the sharks to prevent their devouring his catch before he could reach the shore. The old man's struggle against the shark was in vain, for when he reached shore, the sharks had devoured his big catch. The character of the old man stands out, in that, though he was defeated in his primary objective, he was never defeated in spirit. When it is all over, Hemmingway has the old man asleep in his little shack dreaming about the lions. It is thus that our faith enables us to triumph over the hindrances of this life. "We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed. We are perplexed, but not in despair."

Let it not be said that men of faith are able to endure because they do not feel as keenly the rebuffs and disappointments of life as other men. Oh, they feel the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune just as other men, but they do not succumb to the pressure of adversity as others do. The fact that Job did not repudiate God as his wife bade him, did not at all mean that he felt less keenly the crushing weight of adversity, but he had gathered a faith that sustained him to a greater degree than she was able to be sustained.

It is our faith that makes us triumph over despair. The truth which we learn from these great heroes of faith, and others whom we have known in our own day, is that there is a spiritual resilience born of faith which enables men to triumph over the most discouraging conditions. Brother I. D. Pitts, one of our ministers who had lost his sight, said on one occasion, "I have learned more in the years that I have been blind than I had learned all the years before." Faith grows and is strengthened in adversity if we submit and commit our souls to God. Who will doubt that out of the adverse experiences during the days when the whole of Kent County, Maryland was a circuit, men out of weakness were made strong?

Faith triumphs because men of faith live triumphantly, even when their desires are unfulfilled. A youth complained in one of our meetings, "I pray but nothing happens. What I ask for I do not get. Why should I pray?" It is under just such disappointing circumstances that the man of faith proves himself because he moves on undaunted and undismayed even in disappointment. Triumphant faith is not being faithful to principles because you get what you desire; it is being true despite your inability to obtain what you desire.

Faith makes us steady in all life's circumstances. It enables us to be firm and strong in the face of severe difficulties. Now, it is possible sometimes to confuse faith with stubborn determination and unyielding de-

fiance. The man of faith may be stubborn, unyielding and defiant, but not every stubborn, unyielding man is moved by the faith which actuated the heroes of faith mentioned here. Some men are hardy souls who can look defiantly at the world until some overwhelming disaster destroys them, but this is not necessarily faith as set forth in this chapter. A man can, like Prometheus, defied all hell to harm him, but this is not Biblical faith. William Henley has written some noble lines.

"In the fell clutch of circumstance
I have not winced nor cried aloud.
Under the bludgeonings of chance
My head is bloody, but unbowed."

These are noble sentiments and fine poetry, but they do not represent biblical faith. Biblical faith asserts itself not because man believes in himself, but because he believes in the ultimate purposes of God. Triumphant faith does not defy the world; it trusts God.

Triumphant faith has confidence in the character of God. When we have faith we trust God because we have confidence in Him. We unyieldingly pursue a course of action because we are confident of the kind of God that we are serving. When the Psalmist wrote, "He leads me in paths of righteousness for his name sake," he had reference to the character of God. God has a name to uphold. He has character. He could not be true to his character and be anything other than a dependable God. He cannot be inconsistent and capricious in His relationship with men. We are able to trust Him implicitly even though we do not understand His designs. We trust Him because we have confidence in the unchangeableness of His character. A little boy said his evening prayer one night at the bedside of his mother. When he had asked a blessing on daddy, mother and others, he prayed, "And please, dear God, take care of yourself, for if anything should happen to you, this old world would be in a mess." How great sometimes is the profundity of children! If God is not what Christian faith has said that He is, we are indeed in a mess. It is because we believe that He will always be what we have found Him to be that we trust ourselves to Him.

Faith relies on the integrity of God. Men of faith trust themselves to the goodness and mercy of God, though they may be surrounded by events that tend to deny His goodness and mercy. Sometimes, like Elisha's servant, we can discern only the peril of the "horses and chariots" that surround us. Then again, like Elisha's servant, when our spiritual eyes have been opened, we may see "horses and chariots of fire" on our side. Our hope is in the Lord, that He is the same for ever and ever, and that nothing will ever separate us from His love.


"Let not your heart be troubled,
His tender word I hear,
And resting on His goodness,
I lose my doubts and fears,
Tho' by the Path He leadeth,
But one step I can see:
His eye is on the sparrow,
And I know He watches me."

As God was with our fathers in the days that are past, and brought them through the terrible times of slavery and reconstruction, He will be with us as we too seek a newer world. As He did not ultimately disappoint them, he will not ultimately disappoint us. As we perhaps step hesitantly into the future, we do not go alone; God goes with us. Let us be encouraged by what the writer of the book of Hebrews says of these heroes of faith who set out in quest of a bounty which they did not receive. God gave them something better than the material possessions which they sought. Their material aspirations became spiritualized. He says of them, "But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared for them a city."

There may be some disappointments and some trials ahead for us, but the presence of God will give us strength. We will find a better life because He is with us.

Conference Adjourned—Following the closing prayer and benediction by M. O. Ballard, the Conference was adjourned.

Resolved, That all other property be turned over to the Delaware Conference Trustees for further processing or final disposition.

VI. The Reports

A. THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Lord, Members, and Friends of the Delaware Annual Conference:
We, the District Superintendents, are pleased to present our seventh and last composite report, which represents the five districts of the Conference. "The Church must summon man to his knees. In the silent and repentant hour, man must hear the Christ say, 'Follow Me.'"

—G. Bromley Oxnam, "The Church and Contemporary Change."
". . . only where God is known as He reveals Himself, can one obey Him, only where one is obedient to Him does one serve His honour."

—Emil Brunner, "The Letter to the Romans."

These two quotations are the guide lines which we have attempted to follow in preparing this report.

Let us turn back the pages of history one hundred and one years. The first session of the Delaware Conference for colored people of the Methodist Episcopal Church was held in John Wesley Chapel, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, July 29, 1864.

Rev. Charles H. Whitecar, Presiding Elder of the Bridgeton District, New Jersey Conference, conducted the religious exercises, after which Bishop Edmund S. Janes announced that he had carefully examined the papers of recommendation and had found the following preachers entitled to membership in the Conference, viz.—

Isaac Hinson, having been employed by a Presiding Elder sixteen years; James Davis, 15 years; Harrison Smith, 12 years; Isaiah Broughton, 10 years; John G. Manluff, 10 years; Samuel Dale, 8 years; Wilmore S. Elsey, 6 years; Jehu H. Pierce, 5 years; Nathan Young, 4 years; Joshua Brinkley, 3 years.

These ten preachers were then declared by Bishop Janes, the Presiding Officer, to constitute the Delaware Conference. The Bishop in a few neat and appropriate remarks congratulated the Conference upon this interesting event in the history of the Church; namely, the formation of the first Conference of Colored Preachers under the rule of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

He reminded them of the importance of recognizing in this the hand of a Divine Providence and requested the Conference to arise and sing—

"Praise God from whom all blessings flow;
Praise Him, all creatures here below;
Praise Him above, ye heavenly host:
Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost."

We have today had the last roll call of the Delaware Annual Conference and we leave behind a rich heritage.

As we merge, we shall be mindful of the overall programmed abolition of the Central Jurisdiction and shall initiate and support action at all levels to attain this goal.

Evangelism

The Methodist Discipline of 1964 states that "The aim of evangelism is to bring all men into living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Savior and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit. . . ."

Evangelism remains a major concern among consecrated ministers and laymen throughout the Conference. They have joined hearts and hands in an effort to promote this important cause that Christ's kingdom might come and His will be done on earth.

During the past years we have emphasized enlistment of every member of the local church in the program of the Church. We have tried to inspire our members to make a complete dedication of self to Christian ideals and living. We have attempted to win children, youth, and adults to Christ and His Church. We have encouraged the pastors and people to employ every method of evangelism. As a result, Visitation Evangelism, Preaching Missions, Convocations, Christian Witness Missions, Revivals and Mass Evangelism are among the methods widely used. Perhaps the most profound results come from the youth. Many of our youth, after participating in Conference Christian Witness Missions, have returned to their districts and local churches fired with a new determination to witness for Christ. Not only have their own spiritual lives been strengthened by Christian teaching and witnessing, but they have led other youth and adults to commit their lives to Christ.

Exact statistics are not available from the local churches, however, indications are leading us to say that progress has been made; keener interest stimulated, and signs of spiritual growth have been seen in local churches.

As we complete the first year of the Quadrennial Program "One Witness in One World," and as we embark upon a new adventure in Christian fellowship, we challenge our people to a rededication of heart, mind, soul, and strength to the "business of our Father." We further call each local Church to a renewal of all that is good and holy; and to earnestly strive to bring all men into a living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Savior, and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit.

Missions

The history of the Conference indicates by its statistical records and reports that the missionary endeavors of the Church have always held a position of priority with the pastors and people. The missionary story has been told and emphasized throughout the one hundred and one years of its existence. World Service and Conference Benevolences are familiar terms to both young and old.

The Conference Board of Missions, conference and district missionary secretaries have done an excellent job of promotion and interpretation of missionary outreach. The records will show that an increasing number of churches have responded by having Church-Wide Schools of Missions and paying the World Service budget in full.

This year, a larger number of charges have paid their World Service budget in full than in any other year. There are statistical evidences of gains in giving to Advance Specials.

Surely we have come to know that the real meaning of World Service and Advance giving is not in a column of figures but in the liberating, healing, and enlightening ministry that it makes possible. The Advance and World Service are not just benevolences, not just a number of dollars . . . they are expressions of love, courage, and understanding.

We, of the Delaware Conference, are in accord with the statement of the General Conference that: "World Service is the lifeblood without which the general boards cannot operate. The World Service agencies are almost totally dependent on World Service funds to carry out their operations. . . . The World Service dollar is the lifeblood of the entire outreach of The Methodist Church beyond the local parish."

We further believe that there is no substitute for the Advance program, nor is Advance a substitute for World Service. We rejoice in the fact that World Service and the Advance Program are experiencing a much deserved increase. The urgency and importance of the program as we endeavor to meet the needs of people around the world makes it imperative that we work for the success of both World Service and the Advance.

The Quadrennial Program and the Advance

The Advance fits perfectly into the challenge of the Quadrennial Program. It facilitates the much needed larger support for missionaries. The Advance is a providential instrument for the realization of the Quadrennial Program goals in church extension. This is the means by which we can lift up the twenty-one million dollar package of church extension projects; providing the money needed to purchase land for construction of churches, schools and hospitals, both at home and overseas.

Our Christian efforts in meeting the needs of people must not be measured by how much we give but rather we must enter into a deeper phase—a deeper empathy with persons, a deeper feeling about them, without which this Quadrennial Program will not matter. Through this Program and by means of the Advance, we must be led into a deeper feeling about persons. We must be led into a renewed concern for people and give to establish clinics, support physicians, relieve victims of calamity, feed the hungry, enlighten the mind, heal the body and bring persons everywhere into the Kingdom of our Christ.

Christian Education

This moment in the history of our conference is a revelation to all of the importance of the Church's teaching ministry. As we have moved toward more considerable progress this year in the understanding and practice of brotherhood across conference and district lines; it is believed, that it has come about because of the depth of Christian teaching in our churches. Whether it has been carried on from the pulpit, Sunday school lessons, additional sessions or study groups, it has had its effectiveness. Had more of our churches taken seriously the task of Christian education in the total program of the church, certainly, we would be much further advanced in the area of Christian brotherhood.

Let's take a brief glance backward upon the path which we have come. In 1939, the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church united to form The Methodist

Church. One of the conditions of the merger was to set apart all the Negro conferences in a separate racial jurisdiction known as the Central Jurisdiction. The rest of the Church was organized geographically into five other jurisdictions. Many voices of protest were raised against this policy of segregation.

Since 1944 the Council of Bishops has been calling for an end to all forms of segregation in the Church. The General Conference of 1964 set 1968 as the target date for the abolition of the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction. At the 1964 meeting of the Central Jurisdiction it was voted in the affirmative to do away with the Central Jurisdiction. In the light of these actions, the Northeastern Jurisdiction in its regular session of June 1964 received the Baltimore Area of the Central Jurisdiction. It immediately proceeded to dissolve the Baltimore Area. Bishop Prince A. Taylor, Jr. was assigned to the predominantly white New Jersey Area. The Delaware and Washington Conferences were assigned to Bishop John Wesley Lord of the Washington Area. It also voted that the Negro churches should become members of the white annual conferences in which they are geographically located by July 1965.

To have achieved this desirable state among Methodists of the Northeastern Jurisdiction was definitely an educational task. This willingness to unite came about through a long process of education in which attitudes were changed, appreciations were developed, understandings enlarged, and respect and admiration for one another were shared and expressed. What we have been able to achieve thus far in the area of human relations has come because of the influence of Christian teaching.

As a result of the foregoing procedures, most of our conference programs, this year have been sponsored on inter-conference and inter-racial bases. The scope of our program has consisted of such activities as summer camping, leadership training schools, youth institutes, adult convocations, ministers' retreats, workshops (preparatory to introducing the new curriculum materials for children) and other educational adventures. These experiences have been rich and rewarding. Across the Conference voices are being heard in praise of the new curriculum for children. Our teachers are happy and pupils are thrilled. Many churches have experienced an increase in attendance. The children are challenged to spiritual growth as they realize their significance in their own right as persons.

The Church is facing a tremendous challenge in these times of revolution. It has been reported that there are more children in America than ever before that will either grow up rapidly into Christian youth or young pagans. Therefore, what the Church hopes to do for its children, it must do it while they are yet children. For the gospel truths sown in the childhood years ripen into commitments to Christ and membership in His Church.

Not only should great stress be placed upon the Christian nurture of children, but the need is tremendous among our youth. Today's youth must also be confronted with Christ and His call for righteous living. Christian workers are needed to help these young minds develop into the adults that will make a worthwhile contribution to society. Let us not neglect this group that will very soon make decisions, laws, and occupy places of leadership that will influence our way of life.

Finally, as we move into new conferences in this new day in Methodism, let us pledge ourselves to meet the challenges of spreading the principles of Christ's teachings. Let us build a strong program of Christian education in

our churches. This, we believe, can continue to be a powerful medium for bringing about the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man throughout our land.

Christian Vocations

One need not go to distant lands or even to some nearby city to find opportunities to serve God and the Church. Look around you and see the opportunities for adventure in Christian service.

In our world of revolution and change, there is no greater need today, than to direct our young people to choose vocations in accord with the Christian view of life. Choosing one's vocation is usually one of the most difficult decisions to make.

During the days of the Reformation, Martin Luther's concept of a vocation asserted that every person has a double calling: first, the call to commit himself to God; and secondly, the call to practice his daily work faithfully and responsibly in the light of his commitment. This doubleness is actually two parts of a single summons. The parts are invariably bound together. In commitment, we bring the whole self. In answering the summons to live responsibly under God, we bring all of our life to the altar of faith.

The Christian concept of vocation applies to the dedication of any day's work. Since everyone must work sooner or later, why not encourage our young people to decide that whatever their work is to be that it will be church related? Today there is a tremendous need for committed and dedicated workers. The Methodist Church is calling for many qualified and consecrated workers. According to the bulletin on Methodist Related Vocations for 1965 it is stated that every year The Methodist Church needs: 2,100 for the Pastoral Ministry, 350 for missionary service at home and abroad, 5,500 for the health and welfare services of the church, 250 for Christian education in the local church, and 1,250 for college teachers and religious leaders of students. From such a report it is easy to see the many fine opportunities for full time Christian service. Yet, this quota is never met.

What has the Delaware Conference done to inspire its young people to help meet this gigantic need? Under the fine leadership of our Executive Secretary, Rev. Howard A. Bailey and his staff, some commitments have been made. Our records show that this year the usual procedure of recruitment has been used in our local churches. A number of churches have held career conferences. Several district meetings have been held under the direction of the directors of Christian Vocations. These meetings have offered inspiration and guidance to many of the persons who have shared in them.

Our Conference participated jointly, with the Peninsula Conference, in promoting the Bishop's Conference on the Ministry in December under the guidance of Bishop John Wesley Lord, Dr. Norman Trott, President of Wesley Theological Seminary, and others. There were twenty-five pastors and forty-five youth in attendance from the Delaware Conference.

Rev. Howard A. Bailey made this statement in his report to the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations in March 1965: "There is no way by which to measure the results of efforts designed to guide young people in their commitment to Christian vocations. Many are touched in positive ways and change their outlook on life though they never register their commitment in any procedure by which we seek to list such commitments. We are aware,

however, of a significant number of young people who have chosen church related vocations as a direct result of the work of those engaged in the Christian vocation program on the conference, district, and local church levels."

Now, as we unite with other conferences, it is our hope that every local church will continue to encourage and guide young lives into full time Christian service. Not only, should emphasis be placed upon commitment; but wherever possible the church should plan to help some deserving young persons who are potential leaders to attend college and prepare them to make a worthwhile contribution to society.

Worship

The worship of God is basic in the Christian Church. It is through worship she receives inspiration, motivation, and strength to carry out her mission.

Throughout the Conference, much attention has been given to worship in the local churches. The Conference Commission on Worship has furnished good leadership. Many churches have organized a Commission on Worship. In some churches, the liturgical color calendar is observed.

Punctuality adds greatly to any worship service. This has been a problem in some churches, but this too is being overcome, even in rural churches.

Ritualism in worship is a necessity. There must be forms, ways of expression and order, but to miss spiritual contact with God or fail to lead others into fellowship with Him is to have failed no matter how beautiful the worship service was otherwise.

When a beautiful worship service has helped persons to draw nearer to God, it has fulfilled its purpose.

"The hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshipers shall worship the Father in Spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship Him."

Christian Stewardship

Christian Stewardship is a way of life involving our relationship with God. It is something that relates to all of life and makes us responsible to God for what we do with it.

Helge Brattgard, the Swedish theologian states in his book, "God's Stewards," page one, that, "within the Protestant churches today . . . a concept has come strongly to the fore. This is found in the term Stewardship. It was the American church that took this term from the biblical text, and employed it as a designation for a rediscovery of personal responsibility which each Christian must assume."

It has been stated that he believes that this is the most significant gift of American Protestantism to modern church life.

Christian Stewardship cultivation in the Delaware Conference has been of great concern over the years, and there has been progress. This is evident in many ways, especially in the financial support of the church. This year is no exception, progress is still being made.

Christian Stewardship has been lifted up at Lay Retreats at Camp PeCometh, Maryland, Atlantic City, New Jersey, and at District Conferences. A one day inter-board school was held on each district last October and many chairmen of local church Commissions on Stewardship and Finance attended.

Many churches have reported prayer vigils and the every member visitation using Methodist materials and also have a year-round program of Christian Stewardship.

If there is to be truly "One Witness in One World" there must be a deeper faith in and greater commitment to the program of Christian Stewardship by all Christians, children and youth, included.

Pensions

Pensions is a key word in the merger and through the Joint Distributing Committee (procedures outlined in Par. 1609, 1960 Discipline), the work has been done.

All claimants of the Delaware Conference will be recognized as claimants of the conferences we enter for the years of service rendered within the geographical boundaries of these conferences. The General Board of Pensions shall be the clearing house and final authority in determining the years of service of all persons in the various conferences. The ministers of the Delaware Conference have been given the opportunity to check their service records through the Conference Pension Board and with the help of the District Superintendents.

The pension rate, of course, will be determined by each Annual Conference after merger, but it is recommended that the rate be no less than the existing rate of the Annual Conference. The same rate scale will apply to all claimants.

The plan for the distribution of the pension funds of the Delaware Conference has already been approved by the various conferences involved. The assets are over \$600,000 in addition to the amount reported this conference year.

Church Property

Throughout the history of mankind, he has felt a compulsion to erect a place where he might meet and commune with God. Today, we no longer believe that God is contained in edifices built by men, but we do feel that a physical structure is important as a place of worship, education, fellowship, and administration.

The time has come when we must re-evaluate our church building. We can no longer build to meet the needs of our fathers. It is important when we build a new church, restore or remodel an older building, that we consult the proper authority in planning our church building program.

We should make sure that the proposed building meets our needs, that the financial obligations incurred do not exceed our ability to pay, and that the project will offer the kind of experience that will contribute to the spiritual growth of the communicants.

Many churches have renovated their buildings that better service may be rendered.

"I love Thy Church, O God! Her walls before Thee stand,
Dear as the apple of Thine eyes, and graven on Thy hand."

Appreciation

Bishop Lord, we are grateful for your leadership in our Conference and Area in this momentous period in the life of The Methodist Church and our

Nation. For the Christlike guidance that you have given at this time of merger, and the strong voice and stand which you have taken in the civil rights movement—we are appreciative. Many things which you have done were beyond the responsibilities of your office. For Mrs. Lord's willingness to help certainly was a challenge to us, too.

For the leadership given our Conference by the boards, committees, commissions, the Woman's Societies of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guilds, and the Methodist Men, we are also grateful.

After these few hours spent here in this one hundred and third session of the Delaware Annual Conference, we shall in a very few weeks be merged with the Conferences in whose geographical area we fall. We shall be faced with a great new task. Making Christ real to people and making the Church an instrument of God's will are always new and great tasks—tasks that people can perform where they are, and it is precisely at that point that we are in the presence of our Lord.

BIRTH: One parsonage family was blessed with a baby, namely, Rev. and Mrs. Roland Dennis of the Whittman-Sherwood charge.

PASTORAL CHANGES: The Rev. G. Wayne Cuff was appointed to succeed the Rev. C. A. Edmonds at Waugh Church, Cambridge. The Rev. John W. Coleman was appointed to succeed the Rev. G. Wayne Cuff at the St. Michaels-Royal Oak charge.

District Activities

May I take this opportunity to thank the District Council, District Ministerium, Ministers' Wives Association, Board of Lay Activities, Woman's Society of Christian Service, and other directors and secretaries for their loyal support in planning and promoting the program of the church on the district and sub-district levels. The various workshops, seminars, conferences, retreats and rallies were well attended. Participation and interest were high at all times and good results were seen in local churches as a follow-up of these meetings.

Pastor's Salary Support

The charges of the district made excellent adjustments at the fourth Quarterly Conferences to bring salary support up to the standards of the Peninsula Conference. (\$4,000.00 for married members and \$3,400.00 for married supply pastors.) All charges of the district, except one, increased salary support up to the standards. Ninety-six percent of the charges also adopted a large share of the pastor's travel, expense, and parsonage utilities. Total amount of increase for the pastor's salary support was \$12,190.

World Service

It was a great day at the Pre-Conference Rally when the pastors and laymen in sixty-eight of seventy-seven local churches received World Service

Certificates. These certificates were presented in recognition that these churches had met their World Service obligation in full. Twenty-six of the twenty-nine charges reported World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full and all special days observed.

Survey of Charges

AIREYS: Sadness came to this charge in the middle of the year by the illness and death of the pastor, Mrs. Mary D. Hundley. However, the fine people and the local preachers of this 4-point charge took on new life and met the most of their obligations 100% under the supervision of the District Superintendent. Sunday services were well attended. The pastor's salary was increased \$900.00 in order to meet the new \$3,400.00 minimum. Total raised for all causes, \$5,441.

BECKWITH: Mrs. Josephine Farrare, Pastor. The pastor and people of this charge like, "Ole man river, just keep rolling along." Through the consecrated efforts of pastor and people this charge was one of the first to pay all askings 100%. This is a small charge in size but they do things in a big way. This charge will be combined with Church Creek.

CAMBRIDGE: During the middle of the year the Rev. C. A. Edmonds was transferred to Emmanuel, Philadelphia. The Rev. G. Wayne Cuff was appointed pastor, but in spite of the change of pastors Waugh has made one of her finest reports. Members added, 9. All askings paid in full, plus Advanced Special giving. Grand total raised for all purposes \$25,316.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT: Rev. T. M. Murray, Pastor, is completing his ninth year. In spite of being hospitalized during the year an excellent report is made. St. Luke made extensive improvements and Christ Rock has built and equipped a new church hall. World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full. Grand total raised \$10,400.

CARMICHAELS: Rev. G. A. Sherman, Pastor, and people joined hands and heart and another good report is made. World Service askings paid in full. Total raised \$6,414.

CENTREVILLE-GOULDSTOWN: Rev. J. M. Day, Pastor. The task here has not been easy. The memberships of the two churches are small and the faithful ones few, plus the fact, the pastor had to pull two loads as a student and as a pastor. Grand total for all causes \$6,980.00.

CHURCH CREEK: Rev. C. H. Cottingham, Pastor, and the faithful few continue their struggle to measure up but the faithful members are too few. It is our hope that the consolidation of Church Creek and Beckwith plus the abandonment and merger of Vaughn Church will give new impetus to the work.

CHURCH HILL: Rev. E. H. Jackson, Pastor. This is one of our fine appointments. The people and pastor are loyal workers. Mt. Vernon is building a new church. This charge has great potential.

CORDOVA-EARLES CHAPEL: Rev. H. G. Chase, Pastor. This charge reports another banner year. Many improvements were made on the church property. The pastor and people work as a team and a great job is done.

All askings paid in full. Pastor's salary increased to \$3,700, travel expense \$700 and parsonage utilities \$550. Grand total raised \$11,798.

CRAPO-GOLDEN HILL: Mrs. Carvilla Pinder, Pastor. The churches of this charge have experienced another good year. Now that the work at Ebenezer has been discontinued the pastor will be able to do a more fruitful job with the three remaining churches.

DENTON-WILLISTON: Rev. Widmon Butler, Pastor. The people of this charge have been highly stimulated by the spirit and ministry of this new pastor. Although they failed to meet their conference budget, new life in organization and effort has been reported.

EAST NEW MARKET-LINKWOOD: Rev. N. C. Stanley, Pastor. This year's report shows great improvements. A splendid report is made. Accessions, 10. World Service \$425 paid in full. Grand total \$13,730.

EASTON-JOHN WESLEY: Rev. W. H. Greene, Pastor, and people worked hard to overcome the forces of opposition that faced them, but in spite of their efforts the work was not able to measure up to previous years. Raised for all causes \$10,374.

EASTON CIRCUIT: Rev. A. H. Slacum, Pastor. This small congregation under the leadership of their beloved pastor has done exceedingly well. The spiritual life of the church is good and the attendance is on the increase. The pastor and people have had another good year's work. Williamsburg and Scott's Church, Trappe, will be united to form a circuit.

FEDERALSBURG: Rev. G. L. Stanley, Pastor. This charge had another fruitful year. The work here is well organized and the pastor has made every effort to promote the total program of the church. World Service and many of the other askings paid in full. Total raised \$6,675.

GREENSBORO: Rev. J. W. Ringold, Pastor. This charge has done well and has made remarkable advances under her new and ambitious pastor. Many of the people responded and a good report is recorded. Accessions, 2. Total raised, \$6,374.

HURLOCK: Rev. W. M. Staten, Pastor. The total program of the church is very carefully cultivated on this charge. The pastor leads and the people follow, therefore, the work continues to advance. A 100% charge. Accessions, 6. Grand total raised, \$7,910.

MARYDEL: Rev. J. H. Roberts, Pastor. This young minister gives good pastoral oversight to his people, even though he does not live on the charge. The pastor and people are happy and work well together. The report shows an increase in financial support to connectional askings.

McDANIEL: Rev. A. A. McDowell, Pastor. The work of this charge was interrupted by the prolonged illness and death of their pastor. The pastor's wife, under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the loyal support of the people kept things together, therefore we are happy to report

a budget paid in full. Asbury Church has been abandoned and the building has been sold. John Wesley Church will be united into a three-point circuit with Wittman-Sherwood.

MILES RIVER-STATEN CHAPEL: Mrs. Hester Opher, Pastor. This charge had another good year. The churches are well organized and the activities are moving along in fine stride. The pastor is faithful and the people are loyal. Accessions, 5. Many improvements were made and Statens Chapel did a good job on a do-it-yourself basis.

OXFORD-BELLEVUE: Rev. E. H. Hughes, Pastor. This year's report excelled the good report of last year, in fact and figures. The pastor is a good shepherd and every phrase of the work is presented. The faithfulness of the laymen has been a major part of the success story of this fine charge through the years. Grand total raised \$12,943.

PRESTON: Rev. Frank Robinson, Pastor. This charge has reported another good report in spite of many difficulties. Not 100%, but a very good report. Accessions, 5. The pastor is a conscientious worker and this charge is blessed with faithful laymen who are not afraid of work. The great need here is for a sound building fund program in order to begin construction of a badly needed church edifice.

RIDGELY: Rev. Kenneth Greene, Pastor. The work here got off on an uncertain start, but after a meeting of mind and heart, another good report was made. World Service \$425 paid in full. Grand total raised, \$6,468.

ST. MICHAELS-ROYAL OAK: The progressive program envisioned and planned by the Rev. G. Wayne Cuff was carried out to perfection by his successor, the Rev. John W. Coleman. Improvements were made on both churches and the parsonage. This charge had a great year. All causes 100%. The pastor's estimated salary is now \$4,800, travel expense \$600, and parsonage utilities \$300. Raised for all causes \$17,740.

STEVENSVILLE: Rev. C. M. Stafford, Pastor. This has been another good year for Stevensville under the leadership of a very conscientious pastor. The spiritual life of the church is good. The church property is kept in good repair, and the indebtedness on Union Church is reduced. The total program is advancing. Raised for all purposes, \$8,366.

TAYLOR'S ISLAND: Rev. W. L. Greene, Pastor. This charge has really taken on new life under the leadership of their beloved pastor. The churches are being organized, and the people, both youth and adults, are responding to the total program of the church. A good report was made. World Service \$340 paid in full. Grand total \$5,537.

TRAPPE: Rev. H. T. Hall, Pastor. This church continues to be the most active church on the district. The pastor is a diligent worker and the people are loyal. This combination of good leadership and responding laymen have brought another good year to Scotts Church.

VIENNA-REID'S GROVE: Rev. R. W. Dennis, Pastor. This charge has had a banner year and records many areas of growth. The pastor and people

are miracle workers. A planned stewardship emphasis is not only responsible for a 100% budget, but this charge has one of the finest financial programs on the district. WITTMAN-SHERWOOD: Rev. Roland Dennis, Pastor. A bright future faces this charge as she unites with John Wesley, McDaniel. The pastor is gifted with good leadership ability and great work should be done in the "Bay hundreds." Wittman-Sherwood had a good year.

I am grateful indeed for the high measure of understanding and support which was given me.

Survey of Charges

BETHSAIDA had a good year. Achievements have been made in strengthening two commissions and in children's work. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$301.

CAMPBOR has tutoring service for youth of the community sponsored by the Philadelphia Tutorial Project. The church is open five days a week for activities and has a fully organized Boy and Girl Scouting program. An older

adult group has been organized and is active in the life of the Church. A \$60,000 program has been launched for renovating the church and recreational hall. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$7,022.50.

CHRIST KINGDOM MISSION is working on a building fund. All commissions have been organized. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$125.

COMMUNITY has been able to raise its budget in full and meet the financial askings of the Church. One of the most tangible expressions has been the growth of a contagious spirit which is reflected in members' determination to join with others to make the Christian witness in Southwest Philadelphia more effective. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$599.

TRINITY, EAST GERMANTOWN reports increased attendance. Plans are being made to renovate the church building. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$1,350.

EMMANUEL—The loyal members were able to clear the mortgage which was incurred in 1954. The amount of \$10,779 was paid this year. Fifty-six persons have been added to the membership—an achievement through the work of the Holy Spirit. Benevolent giving increased by \$1,000. The effect of the "Pilot Project" is being felt in the community. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$3,603.

ST. THOMAS, FRANKFORD—Attendance at the services of worship have greatly improved. Purchasing of a new Allen Organ for the sanctuary and additional remodeling of the church interior are among the outstanding achievements of the year. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$762.

HAVEN has continued to make strides this year toward its building fund goal. Two additional properties on Oxford Street were purchased and negotiations are in progress with the City for purchase of additional land for parking facilities. Raised for building fund this year, \$15,106. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$8,377.

JANES, GERMANTOWN purchased the property at 57 East Haines Street for \$7,000 cash which provides eight additional classrooms and other facilities. There is an increase in the number of members who are tithers and the Church is ending five years without a rally for its financial support. There are twenty-seven young people in colleges and universities. The church is one of the Tutorial Project centers. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$7,331.

JOHN WESLEY has had a transformation of organizational structure through finding committed and qualified leadership. Among the accomplishments of this past year are improvements made on educational building, purchase of furnishings for recently acquired parsonage, installation of heating systems for church and parsonage, and liquidation of debt on new church roof. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$6,694.73.

MOUNT ZION reports complete renovation of the exterior of the church building. The adjacent church property has been enclosed by steel fencing and paved which provides for off-street parking and a basketball court. New side-

walks have been laid around the entire property. The new look was done at a cost of \$50,000. A loan of \$35,000 was granted by the Board of Missions and \$2,000 was given by the Delaware Conference. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$4,800.

PENIEL increased its church attendance by fifteen per cent. The men of the church gave their labor to improve the church property. The mortgage has been reduced to \$3,954 and the debt on the organ to \$596. Sent to the Conference Treasurer—\$1,788.57.

ST. BARNABAS launched a \$25,000 building improvement fund. More than \$3,000 have been raised. The organization of the church has been improved. The unit leader system has been organized so that every member is to be reached at least bimonthly. Groups were formed for greater effectiveness of the church to its membership and the community. The basketball team participated in the Church League of the Christian Street Y.M.C.A. and won the championship for the past season. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$1,070.

TINDLEY TEMPLE reports the completion of the Chapel and library, improvement of systematic giving for all causes of the Church, addition of thirty-eight members on profession of faith, addition of significant number of scholars to the church school, and extension of tutorial service were among the accomplishments of the past year. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$11,170.

TIOGA continues the eight Christian conversation groups which meet twice a month in the homes of members to discuss the nature and meaning of the Church and improvement of the devotional life. The auditorium was renovated, audio-visual equipment was purchased and some exterior improvements made. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$2,074.

ZOAR has experienced another fruitful year. The spiritual tone is uplifting. The Church carried out again this year a joint Revival meeting and the Every Member Visitation with five other churches of the district located in North Philadelphia. A full Boy and Girl Scout program is active. Tutorial project gives needed service and encouragement to young people. The Angels of Love continue to render lay counselling and referral services under the leadership of professional volunteer personnel. Zoar is cooperating with the Greater Philadelphia Council of Churches, Marriage Counseling Service of the University of Pennsylvania, and Friends Neighborhood Guild in a project of family living geared to junior high students and their families. Project Human Renewal, under the auspices of the City of Philadelphia, provides referral coordination to city agencies and services through an educational-recreational program. The Jolly T. Harris, Sr. collection of bound Delaware Conference Journals were presented to Zoar's library by his family. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$5,815.50.

ST. JOHN'S SPRING LAKE, NEW JERSEY is a summer appointment which is open during the summer from June to September. The attendance was high and the Church experienced a good season.

ASBURY, TRENTON, NEW JERSEY experienced a grand year. Pews and altar furnishings were installed, fellowship hall redecorated, new furnish-

ings secured for pastor's office, and grounds were improved. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$4,682.

ST. MATTHEWS, TREVOSE—The Church celebrated its fifth anniversary in February. The increase in church attendance and interest in the total program of the Church is evident. There is a strong church school. Sent to Conference Treasurer—\$250.

For a fuller picture of the District make a careful study of the Statistical Table, Philadelphia District, Section VI-C. However, we may state that the District sent to the Conference Treasurer this year \$109,384.80.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild remitted \$7,202.

As we come to the end of the road let me repeat my thanks to all pastors, District Council, laymen, and friends for their cooperation and warm comradeship. You dispelled the difficulties. The path proved to be a pleasant one, and the years were memorable and happy for me. You answered promptly and wholeheartedly every call I made upon you for service. The years heartened me with their enriching experiences.

Mrs. Strother joins me in thanking you with all our hearts for the kind welcome, the generous hospitality, and love which you have given us. The Testimonial Dinner given for us on April 9, 1965 at the Sylvania Hotel in Philadelphia will always be held in our memory.

As I go from this office to serve as Director of New Church Development, Section of Finance and Field Service, National Division of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church, the influence and impact which I have received from you will be of great help to me in this new field of service.

SHILOH, CRISFIELD, MD.—The Reverend Norman Tilghman has had a good year. The greatest need of this charge is a keener appreciation for the services of the pastor.

COTTAGE GROVE, OAKVILLE, FLOWER HILL, WINSTON CIRCUIT—This circuit continues to grow under the leadership of Rev. C. E. Handy. District and conference askings are paid in full. The charge merits the World Service certificate.

FRUITLAND AND ALLEN CIRCUIT—The Mt. Calvary Church in Fruitland is completing its new educational building. The church in Allen has been

completely restored. District and conference askings have been partly paid. Rev. G. B. Wilson is pastor.

GIRDLETREE, BOX IRON, MT. WESLEY CIRCUIT—Rev. L. H. Purnell, pastor. This charge continues to lead the district. An effective program of Christian education is carried on. District and conference askings are paid in full. World Service certificate is merited.

WESLEY CIRCUIT—This is a three point rural circuit that has had a fair year's work done under the leadership of the pastor, Rev. I. H. White. The great need here is for a constructive program of Christian education, stewardship, and evangelism.

WESLEY TEMPLE, SALISBURY—Historically speaking, this is the oldest charge on the Salisbury District, and is situated in the leading city of the Delmarva Peninsula. The pastor, Rev. T. H. Pendleton, has done his best in providing leadership during this past year.

DEAL ISLAND, DAMES QUARTER, CHANCE CIRCUIT—This charge has enjoyed a very good year's work under the leadership of Rev. Emerson Jolly. District and conference askings are in advance of former years.

MARION STATION—This charge received its pastor and family very cordially. Improvements were made on the parsonage. There has been an increase in giving for district and conference askings. The pastor, Rev. Haswell Young, and people are happy.

MARUMSCO, LIBERIA, KINGSTON CIRCUIT—Rev. Omar C. Jones is pastor of one of our finest circuits. The churches are completely organized. District and conference askings are paid in full. This circuit merits the World Service certificate.

MT. VERNON CIRCUIT continues to do good work under the leadership of the faithful pastor, Rev. E. Nathaniel Dennis. All three churches have had physical improvements made and cost has been paid. District and conference askings have been paid in full. The circuit merits the World Service certificate.

NANTICOKE CIRCUIT—This charge has had a fair year's work. District and conference askings are partly paid. Rev. S. P. Sanders is the pastor.

POCOMOKE CITY—Rev. G. O. Commodore is pastor. This charge has not done as well as in previous years. District and conference askings are partly met.

POWELLSVILLE-HUTTS MEMORIAL—A new parish house has been erected at the Friendship Church. This rural parish continues to grow under the leadership of its pastor, Mrs. Mary Jarmon.

PRINCESS ANNE-ORIOLE—Rev. Simon Stubbs, pastor, came into a difficult situation and has worked persistently to help solve the problems of this charge. His work as director of the Wesley Foundation at Maryland State College has been excellent.

QUANTICO—This circuit continues to grow in Christian stewardship. District and conference askings are paid almost fully. The World Service certificate is merited. Rev. Edward W. Lee is pastor.

ST. ANDREWS CIRCUIT—This charge is composed of three preaching places. The pastor, Rev. J. O. Stanley, and peopel have had a good year. The charge is well organized. Its greatest need is a merger of the local churches. District and conference askings have been paid almost in full.

SNOW HILL—Rev. James McClendon is pastor of one of our fine appointments. The church is well organized. District and conference askings which were paid represent a decrease from last year's report.

STOCKTON-SHILOH—Rev. C. R. Burke, pastor, has made an excellent record this year. The membership has increased with district and conference askings being paid in full. The congregation is happy to have Rev. Burke as pastor.

UNIONVILLE—Rev. Carrol Scott, pastor. This charge makes a fair report. The need is for a keener sense and appreciation for the program of the church and a greater willingness to support their pastor. Amount paid for district and conference askings shows a decrease over last year.

WETIPQUIN CIRCUIT—The John Wesley Church at White Haven, destroyed by fire, has been replaced by a modern building. This charge needs better organization and cultivation. District and conference askings have been partly paid. Rev. J. E. McBride is the pastor.

WHALEYVILLE—This is a three point charge which makes a good report. One of the great needs here is a program of Christian education which will challenge the youth and young adults. District and conference askings are paid almost fully. Rev. David T. Lewis is the pastor.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Bishop Lord, Members and Friends of the Delaware Conference:

This session symbolizes the closing of the curtain on one-hundred-one-years of glorious history of the Delaware Annual Conference. Its history is not unlike that of any other great movement. It has had its valleys and its peaks, its high moments and its low ones. Nevertheless, a thread of unbroken faith connected every one of them. Today we come, realizing that the drama is not finished. We look now to a larger fellowship of Christian service.

It is my privilege to briefly summarize the work of the Wilmington District for the year 1964-65.

Evangelism

During the past year, we have emphasized that every member of the local church should make a complete dedication of self to Christ and His way of life. To this end, we have urged the pastors and people to employ every method of evangelism. The following methods were widely used, namely, visitation evangelism, preaching missions, Christian witness missions, personal evangelism, and mass evangelism.

Christian Education

Under the leadership of our Executive Secretary of Christian Education, the Reverend Mr. Howard A. Bailey, and his staff, this year much of our program has been sponsored on an inter-conference basis.

The scope of the program has consisted of leadership training schools, adult convocations, youth institutes and assemblies, workshops preparatory to introducing the new curriculum materials for children, ministers' retreats, and a few other educational adventures.

All of these experiences, we believe, have been rich and rewarding. The worshipping, working, and fellowshiping together has done much to change attitudes. Appreciations developed, understandings enlarged, respect and admiration for one another were shared and expressed. Much of what we have been able to achieve thus far in the area of human relations has come about because of the influence of Christian teaching.

Christian Stewardship and Finance

"Christian Stewardship is a way of life involving our relationship with God. It relates to all of life and makes us responsible to God for what one does with it."

Christian stewardship cultivation in the district has been a great concern over the years. This year it has been lifted up at district conferences and at lay retreats. A one-day Interboard School was held last October. Pastors and chairmen of local church Commissions on Stewardship and Finance attended.

Many churches held prayer vigils, every member visitations, and sponsored monthly programs of stewardship cultivation. The financial support of the church has been greatly strengthened, and a deeper faith in the importance of a greater commitment to the giving of time, talents, gifts, and service has been evidenced.

Survey of Charges

ASBURY-ATLANTIC CITY: Rev. G. H. McMurray, Pastor. Asbury continues to grow. The general state of the charge has been good. The new curriculum materials for children was instituted in September and has added new zest to the Children's Division. All of the church properties are in good repair. Accessions six.

HAMILTON-ATLANTIC CITY: Rev. C. W. Derrickson, Pastor. The work on this charge under the leadership of its conscientious pastor is progressing slowly. The commissions are organized and functioning. Study classes were held on the study book, "One Witness, One World," along with the book of Ephesians.

BRIDGETON: Rev. H. E. Anderson, Pastor. Bridgeton makes a commendable report. The organizational structure of the church is good. A Sunday morning adult class has been very active. The Commission on Missions sponsored the study course, Spanish Speaking Americans. Inter-racial worship services were held during the year between this Church and Fourth Methodist of the New Jersey Conference. Accessions three.

BURLINGTON: Rev. Horace J. Fisher, Pastor. In spite of the pastor's illness for most of the conference year, Burlington carried on in a very com-

mendable way. Much praise goes to the loyal laymen and to his good wife. The financial condition of the charge is good. Church attendance has increased. The spiritual life is high. Five persons have been received into preparatory membership.

BUTTONWOOD-CHRISTIANA: Rev. Jacob C. Caulk, Pastor. The present condition of the charge is excellent. The pastor and people are happy. The membership has increased. Apportionments have been paid in full. Properties are in good repair.

EIGHTH STREET: Rev. Charles I. Young, Pastor. The general state of the church is good. The Sunday school is growing. There are signs of hope for Eighth Street Methodist. Substantial repairs have been made on the physical plant. Apportionments are paid. This church has a very small membership but it is a hard working group.

FERRY AVENUE: Rev. C. W. Bagwell, Pastor. This church carries on in the manner of a veteran. A new sense of the church's mission on the part of these people would be a true renewal. The church has great potential, but needs to double its efforts if it is to meet the challenges of a city church. The departments are organized and contribute to the total program of the church. The pastor and people are happy. Accessions two.

CAPE MAY-SWAINTON: Rev. Adolphus A. Berry. The Franklin Street Church has been restored physically. Both churches are working hard under the able leadership of an ambitious pastor. A new communion service has been donated by Mrs. Rebecca Shorts in honor of her mother. Plans for rebuilding of the Swainton Church are being formulated. Accessions two.

CHESTER-GRACE: Rev. Thomas Cameron, Pastor. This charge has striven hard to maintain its record of former years. Misunderstandings between pastor and some of the people have made the work difficult. There is hope of a brighter day ahead for this church and people.

CHESTER-SILOAM: Rev. John B. Redmond, Pastor. Siloam moves forward. Plans are about completed for launching an extensive renovation and building program. The educational program is good. The financial status of the church is sound. The conference and district askings have been met. Several new members have come into the Church school. The spiritual warmth of the church is gratifying. Accessions one.

ST. DANIEL'S-CHESTER: Rev. F. Donald Jones, Pastor. This church finds great joy in exceeding its record of the previous year. The spiritual condition of the church is good. The commissions are organized and functioning. The property on the corner of Fourth and Edwards Streets has been paid for and negotiations are being made to purchase the land on Fourth and Thompson Streets. The pastor and laity do an excellent job in helping to meet some of the challenges facing the city parish. Accessions five.

DARBY: Rev. Clayton E. Hammond, Pastor. This church continues to grow numerically, financially, and in Christian maturity. The pastor is grooming many into churchmanship. The pastor and members have endeavored to

meet the connectional responsibilities of the charge. The people are loyal and faithful. Accessions five.

DELAIR: Rev. George E. Geddis, Pastor. The church carries on in an enthusiastic manner. The church property is in good repair. Spiritual renewal could be the means of sustained growth. Peace and harmony prevail.

ELKTON: Rev. Martin U. Riley, Pastor. Under the leadership of this young man, Providence has taken on new life. The congregation is small but loyal and faithful.

FORDVILLE: Rev. William M. Tasco, Pastor. Another good year's work has been reported. The pastor and people still carry on in a marvelous manner after sixteen years of working together. The physical health of the parsonage family is improved as Mrs. Tasco is on her feet again.

GREENLOCH-RHOADES-BERLIN: Rev. Milton Brooks, Pastor. This charge suffered a division this year. Rhoades Temple was not served by the pastor appointed. It was placed under the pastoral guidance of Rev. C. W. Bagwell, pastor at Ferry Avenue. The membership remains few in number. Some of the conference and district askings were met by the charge. Some physical improvements have been made on the Rhoades Temple Church. This charge is in much need of a strong and dedicated pastoral leadership. The people are loyal and willing but need guidance. They are to be commended for their willingness to carry on.

LAWNSIDE: Rev. O'Connell Milbourne, Pastor. The work at Mount Zion has progressed well. Much has been witnessed by way of spiritual growth and forward movement. The pastor and laity have done a tremendous job in the renovation of the church basement, the work being done by the men of the church. The commissions are organized. Connectional askings are being met. Accessions four.

MERCHANTVILLE-ASBURY: Rev. Charles W. Cannon, Pastor. Another glorious year has been added to the history of Asbury. Church attendance continues to increase. The spiritual life is running high. The educational program is progressing and financial condition of the charge is good. The rest rooms and the church dining room have been very beautifully decorated. The women of the church did a marvelous job in entertaining the Annual Meeting of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service in May. Accessions eight.

MIDDLETOWN CIRCUIT: Rev. Lawrence C. Brown, Pastor. This circuit is composed of four churches; namely, Middletown, Odessa, St. Georges, and Kirkwood. The pastor and people have done an excellent job this year. Each church has experienced a definite growth spiritually and financially by the larger parish plan. The spirit of cooperation has been very commendable. Conference and district askings have been met and increase in church attendance has been noted.

MT. HOLLY: Rev. Walter L. Gray, Pastor. The work of the charge has had a marked improvement in several areas. The spiritual atmosphere is gratifying. The church school has been reorganized. Attention has been given

to meeting the financial obligations of the church. The parsonage has been beautifully renovated.

NEW CASTLE: Rev. William E. Russell, Pastor. Mt. Salem has "new life" under the dynamic leadership of its young pastor and wife. A daughter was born to the Russells in November. The spiritual atmosphere is high and church attendance has increased. Nine persons are now enrolled in the preparatory membership class. A "new look" has lifted the interior of the church sanctuary and new pews have been installed. The financial status is good. The parsonage has been renovated.

NEWPORT: Rev. C. B. Miles, Pastor. Simpson suffered a tremendous setback during the illness of their pastor. Rev. Miles, of necessity, was relieved of his duties in December. The Rev. Martin U. Riley had oversight of the work until Conference. In spite of the problems involved, the laity has carried on in a creditable manner. Services have been held each Sunday. Many special days have been observed. The church finances have been well supervised. The local preacher and lay leader are to be commended for the fine job they were able to do.

PLEASANTVILLE-OCEAN CITY: Rev. Leslie W. Coltrane, Pastor. This charge began the year in a fine manner. Brother Coltrane was confined to the hospital several times, however, the churches were able to carry on. The spirit of the churches was kept alive by the local preachers and lay leaders with the help of Rev. C. W. Perry, retired. This charge has great potential. The people are loyal and sincere. The future looks bright for them.

PORT NORRIS: Rev. John E. Bishop, Pastor. Under the leadership of an ambitious, hard working pastor, Port Norris has grown in spiritual and physical stature. All organizations participate in the total program of the church. The church attempts to serve the community. The property is in good condition. Accessions twenty.

PORT PENN-DELAWARE CITY: Rev. Howard Black, Pastor. These two churches have worked well together again this year. The people are loyal and sincere. Both churches remain spiritually alive. They support all phases of the church program. Although small in number, they meet their financial responsibilities with great pride. The number of accessions is two.

QUINTON: Rev. John H. Wilcher, Pastor. Quinton is far from reaching its potential. There are many conscientious, hard working members but there are still others who have not grown up to meeting the obligations and responsibilities of good church members. Consequently, the progress is slow. This church family needs renewal in Christian living and giving. Some of the financial askings were met.

SALEM: Rev. Charles E. Kiah, Pastor. The pastor and laity continue to make good progress. All organizations are functioning. More members are being placed in responsible positions. The financial status is commendable. The church building has undergone some repairs.

WILMINGTON-COLEMAN MEMORIAL: Rev. H. R. Snead, Pastor. Under the leadership of a dynamic preacher, Coleman continues to be spiritual-

ly alive. During the early part of the year the pastor was hospitalized and could not carry on his work for several weeks. The loyal laymen carried on in a marvelous way and the church did not suffer too greatly. The lay leader and officials deserve much credit for doing an excellent job.

WILMINGTON-EZION: Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, Pastor. Ezion maintains her good record as of former years. However, with the passing of time, this becomes more difficult as a down-town church. With the coming of urban renewal, the church is now faced with the task of determining whether to relocate or stay at the present site. Conference and district askings have been met.

WILMINGTON-HAVEN: Rev. H. T. Moody, Pastor. This church is also in process of transition. The pastor and people are called to work closely with Silverbrook Methodist in developing a stronger program in Christian education. It is hoped that this will give oneness to our Methodist witness on the west side of the city. The pastor and people work well together.

WILMINGTON-MT. CARMEL: Rev. E. V. Wimberly, Pastor. Mt. Carmel continues to work hard. The commissions are functioning. During the summer of 1964 the church participated in an Inner-City Day Camp program for children. Attention has been given to conference and district askings.

WILMINGTON-MT. JOY: Rev. Augustus Chancy, Pastor. Under the leadership of a very conscientious pastor, Mt. Joy moves forward. This church has great potential; the harvest is great, but the laborers are few. Extensive improvements have been made on the church and parsonage properties. A baptismal font has been given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fountain by their children.

WOODBURY-JERICHO: Rev. S. G. Fullman, Pastor. The pastor and people working together have wrought another good year's work. The property is in good repair. An extensive program of renovation is being planned at Mt. Zion. Harmony prevails.

As I conclude this report, let me express sincere appreciation to all of the fine people whom I represent. Our fellow ministers, their gracious wives, and the loyal and faithful laymen gathered here, as well as the unseen multitudes back home, have responded most creatively to our leadership.

To you, Bishop Lord, we are grateful for the fine leadership you have given during this transitional period. Your Christ-like spirit has been a stabilizing force in our midst. Mrs. Lord, your presence has also been a blessing to us.

The curtain has fallen on the one hundred-one years of glorious history of the Delaware Conference. The endless line of splendor shall not cease. While one curtain closes, another opens. It opens upon a bright and promising future in Methodism. It opens upon a future that belongs to those who dare to dream. This is true not only for people called Methodist, but also for Christians around the world. We look toward a future that holds promise of a world in which there will be no more war, brutality, injustice, nor sorrow, and universal brotherhood will hold sway.

Standing upon the threshold of a new world order, we are challenged as we join hands with fellow-Methodists to become channels through which

God's love can spread throughout the land. The vision granted to the Christian mystic will then be realized:

"The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord and His Christ, and He shall reign forever and ever."

AUDITOR'S REPORT—Conference Year 1963-1964

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the request of the Chairman of the Commission on Finance, we have made a special examination of certain accounting records of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church. Our examination was for the fiscal year ending in May 31, 1964 including certain transactions applicable to that period which actually occurred before or after the period. Our examination was made for the purpose of ascertaining whether (1) cash receipts as evidenced by remittance sheets were deposited in the bank (2) the amount of total disbursements applicable to the period as evidenced by cancelled checks (3) the amounts in savings accounts reflecting the balances at the end of the period.

For the entire period we prepared a listing of all cash receipts for each of the five districts: Dover, Easton, Salisbury, Philadelphia and Wilmington from amounts shown on remittance sheets. Remittance sheets showing the total receipts from Maintenance, Re-deposits and Conference Collections were also listed. Cancelled checks which were indicated to us as applicable to the period were listed. Balances in savings accounts were confirmed with depositories as of a date to include transactions applicable to the period.

In our opinion, cash receipts as evidenced by remittance sheets furnished us were in substantial agreement with total deposits made in the bank during the period covered by our examination, the amounts shown in the attached statements correctly show the total amount of disbursements by checks which we were informed were applicable to the period and the balances in savings accounts applicable to the period.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the request of the Chairman of the Commission on Finance, we have made a special examination of certain accounting records of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church. Our examination was for the fiscal year ending in May 31, 1965 including certain transactions applicable to that period which actually occurred before or after the period. Our examination was made for the purpose of ascertaining whether (1) cash receipts as evidenced by remittance sheets were deposited in the bank (2) the amount of total disbursements applicable to the period as evidenced by cancelled checks (3) the amounts in savings accounts reflecting the balances at the end of the period.

For the entire period we prepared a listing of all cash receipts for each of the five districts: Dover, Easton, Salisbury, Philadelphia and Wilmington from amounts shown on remittance sheets. Remittance sheets showing the total receipts from Maintenance, Redeposits and Conference Collections were also listed. Cancelled checks which were indicated to us as applicable to the period were listed. Balances in savings accounts were confirmed with depositories as of a date to include transactions applicable to the period.

In our opinion cash receipts as evidenced by remittance sheets furnished us were in substantial agreement with total deposits made in the bank during the period covered by our examination, the amounts shown in the attached statements correctly show the total amount of disbursements by checks which we were informed were applicable to the period and the balances in saving accounts applicable to the period.

5. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

In making this final report to the Annual Conference, the Board of Trustees wishes to point out that with the transfer of churches of the Delaware Conference into other conferences there are still some abandoned

churches and vacated parsonages that will call for immediate attention in the conferences to which they will belong.

The properties which have been reported to need supervision looking toward disposing of them as soon as possible are:

Lutherbury Chapel—Salisbury, Maryland
 Revels Neck Church—Salisbury, Maryland
 Church at Lincoln, Delaware
 Wesley Church—Springtown, New Jersey

An appraisal of the Wesley Church at Springtown, New Jersey has been made and the fair market value of this property has been set at \$3,000. There are other abandoned churches which should be placed on the list for sale.

The Delaware Conference holds title to the following properties:

St. Matthews Church, Trevoise, Pennsylvania
 Coleman Memorial Church and Parsonage, Wilmington, Delaware
 Community Church, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

A committee from the Delaware Conference Board of Trustees has met with committees from the conferences to which the churches will be transferred. We have discussed the assets of the Conference which will accrue to those conferences.

As of this writing the following assets will be involved:

Fifteen acres of land at Dover, Delaware, purchased for the purpose of erecting a home for the aged.

Sixty-two acres of land near Centreville, Maryland, purchased for a campsite. \$22,005.82 in cash raised by the Delaware Conference for development of the campsite.

There are several pieces of office furniture in the Board of Education office and audio-visual equipment. In addition to the audiovisual equipment in possession of the Board of Education, there are other items which were purchased by TRAFCO. Our assets will include also whatever equipment has been purchased for the treasurer's office, and by the conference secretary or other conference personnel.

The trustees are in the process of making a list of all assets belonging to the Conference.

At this writing, the formula for distributing these assets has not been made. When this formula has been worked out and accepted by the parties concerned, the report on this will become a supplement to this report.

I. Preamble

WHEREAS, on June 25, 1964 the Delaware Annual Conference was transferred into the Northeastern Jurisdiction, by the procedures provided in

Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church; and

Whereas, on June 26, 1964 the Northeastern Jurisdiction, under the power granted to it in Section IV, Article V, Paragraph 4 of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, resolved that the Delaware Conference be merged with the present Annual Conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction on the following basis:

1. That the boundaries of each Annual Conference of the Jurisdiction shall be so determined as to include all local churches within its geographical territory.
2. That the ministerial members of the Delaware Conference shall become members of the existing Annual Conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction as follows:
 - a. All ministerial members who are then appointed to churches geographically located within an Annual Conference shall be members of such conference; and
 - b. All ministerial members retired or under special appointment who then hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church geographically located within an Annual Conference shall become members of such Annual Conference; and
 - c. Ministerial members becoming members of an Annual Conference by reason of merger of the Delaware Conference with the existing Annual Conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction shall have the same rights and obligations as the other members of the Conference to which they transfer as provided in the 1964 Discipline, paragraph 639.
3. That all details of the merger shall be worked out as promptly as feasible by consultation between the Annual Conferences involved and that the final effective date of the merger shall be July 1, 1965; and

Whereas, the many details pertaining to the merger of the Delaware Conference with the New York, Peninsula, Philadelphia, Northern New Jersey and Southern New Jersey Conferences have been carefully and thoroughly considered by representatives of the Annual Conferences, such representatives having been duly appointed for such tasks by their respective bishops;

Resolved:

II. Churches

That the churches of the Delaware Conference shall be part of those Annual Conferences in which they are geographically located (a complete list of all churches of the Delaware Conference and the Annual Conferences of which they will become a part will be found in Directory, Section X).

II. Abandoned Properties

That abandoned church properties shall become the property of the Boards of Trustees of the Annual Conferences in which they are located.

IV. District Parsonages

That the district parsonages and furnishings, or the equity therein, of the Delaware Conference shall be transferred to the following:

DELAWARE CONFERENCE

1. The Philadelphia District parsonage to the Board of Trustees of the Philadelphia Conference.
2. The Wilmington District parsonage to the Board of Trustees of the Southern New Jersey Conference.
3. The Dover, Easton, and Salisbury District parsonages to the Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Conference.

V. Pension Assets

That the assets of the Board of Pensions of the Delaware Conference shall be distributed among the following Annual Conferences according to these percentages established by the Joint Distributing Committee, according to paragraph 1609 of the 1964 Discipline:

1. (Of the total assets of \$570,000 the Virginia-North Carolina Conference has already received \$20,292 which is 3.5% of the total based on 149.75 years of service.)
2. The remaining fund of \$549,708 will be distributed as follows:

3. The Clearing House of the General Board of Pensions shall be responsible for making this distribution after receiving all monies due from the Delaware Conference and shall make whatever adjustments are necessary in view of the growth of the fund and any refinements made in compiling the years of service rendered.

VI. Other Assets

That the other physical assets of the Delaware Conference (camp site near Centreville, Maryland, camp site fund, home site at Dover, Delaware, home site fund exclusive of the Kendall Fund, all monies left in conference treasuries after all bills are met) shall be divided among the following Annual Conferences according to these percentages:

1. Peninsula, 63%
2. Southern New Jersey, 13%
3. Philadelphia, 10%
4. New York, 7%
5. Northern New Jersey, 5%
6. Virginia-North Carolina, 2%

That as part of the above allocation the home site in Delaware (valued at \$7,500) be transferred to the Homes for the Aged of the Peninsula Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc., that the Kendall Fund (restricted for use at the Dover site) be transferred to the Homes for the Aged of the

Peninsula Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc., and that the camp site (valued at \$6,100) be transferred to the Peninsula Conference Board of Education of The Methodist Church, Inc.

That the distribution of the cash noted above shall be made after the financial books of the Delaware Conference have been closed and audited, which distribution shall be handled by the Board of Trustees of the Delaware Conference and the Boards of Trustees of the other Annual Conferences listed above.

VII. Corporations

That in regard to the following corporations related to the Delaware Conference:

1. The Board of Education of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc. (chartered in Delaware) shall disband.
2. The Delaware Conference Homes for the Aged, Inc. (chartered in Delaware) shall disband.
3. That the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated (chartered in Delaware) shall merge with the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc. (chartered in Delaware) and that the following named persons (Marion O. Ballard, Cyrus W. Derrickson, Kermit Cottman, Carl A. Still, Dennis R. Fletcher, Walter H. Greene, Marcellus Blackburn, Robert Poney, John W. Handy, Herman T. Moody, James R. Webb, Laurence Prattis) shall be the remaining trustees and members of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated until such time as they shall determine continuance of the corporation is no longer necessary and at that time they shall merge with the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc.

VIII. Successor Conference

That the Peninsula Conference shall be designated as the Successor Annual Conference of the Delaware Conference with the explicit understanding that any bequests or gifts to the Delaware Conference received after the dissolution of the Delaware Conference shall be distributed among the various Annual Conferences with which it merged according to the formula outlined in Section VI above.

IX. Depository of Records

That all financial, historical and other records of all officers, boards and agencies of the Delaware Conference and all historical memorabilia and other articles belonging to the Conference or one of its agencies shall be deposited with the Peninsula Conference Historical Society.

X. Conference Salary and Pension Claims

That the Delaware Conference will assume payment of its pension claimants and the salaries of its ministerial members under special appointment with claim on the conference through May 31, 1965 at the Delaware Conference rates and salaries and that the Annual Conferences to which the claimants are assigned and to which the ministers under special appointment are trans-

ferred will assume their responsibility at their respective rates and salaries as of June 1, 1965.

XI. Ministerial Members

That the ministerial members of the Delaware Conference shall become members of the geographical Annual Conferences as follows:

1. Ministerial members appointed to churches shall become members of the Annual Conferences in which the churches are located.
2. Ministerial members retired or under special appointment shall become members of the Annual Conferences of which the churches are members in which they hold their quarterly conference memberships.

That ministerial members who become members of Annual Conferences by virtue of the merger of the Delaware Conference with other Annual Conferences shall have the same rights and obligations as the other members of the Conferences to which they transfer.

(A complete list of all ministerial members and the Annual Conferences to which they shall be transferred will be found in Section II.)

XII. Conference Claimants

That the various Annual Conferences with which the Delaware Conference is merging will assume financial responsibility for the conference claimants of the Delaware Conference on the basis of the number of years of service which each claimant has within the boundaries of the various Annual Conferences.

That the Clearing House of the General Board of Pensions shall be the final authority in determining the years of service of all persons in the various Annual Conferences.

That the various Annual Conferences with which the Delaware Conference is merging will assume clerical responsibility for the conference claimants of the Delaware Conference as follows:

1. Widows of ministerial members of the Delaware Conference shall be the clerical responsibility of the Boards of Pensions of the Annual Conferences in which are located the churches where their husbands held quarterly conference membership at the time of death.
2. Retired supply pastors now living within the bounds of the Delaware Conference shall be the clerical responsibility of the Boards of Pensions of the Annual Conferences within which they are living; those living outside the bounds of the Delaware Conference shall be the responsibility of the Boards of Pensions of the Annual Conferences in which are located the churches they last served as supply pastors.
3. Widows of supply pastors shall be the clerical responsibility of the Boards of Pensions of the Annual Conferences in which are located the churches last served by their husbands.

That the Clearing House of the General Board of Pensions shall be the final authority in determining which Annual Conference shall carry clerical responsibility for the various conference claimants of the Delaware Conference. (See VI-B4.)

XIII. Continuation of Officers

That the secretary and the treasurer of the Delaware Conference shall continue to fulfill their duties until their work is completed and that during this time they shall be responsible to and amenable to the Board of Trustees of the Delaware Conference which Board shall be responsible for handling all legal, clerical and financial matters related to the Delaware Conference and which Board shall be itself responsible to the Resident Bishop of the Washington Area of The Methodist Church.

7. BOARD OF EDUCATION

We are grateful for the privilege of making this final report for our Board. Our purpose is to report the work of the past year and to look at the challenges which lie ahead.

CHILDREN'S WORK: This has been a great year in Children's Work. Mrs. Emma Wilson Strother and the members of the district staffs have done a significant job in preparing for and introducing the new curriculum for children. The material has been well received by both teachers and pupils in the children's division. We are pleased to report that 99 vacation church schools were held as follows by districts: Dover 26, Easton 27, Philadelphia 18, Salisbury 17 and Wilmington 11.

YOUTH WORK: In many respects, our youth work has reached a "high water mark" under the creative leadership of the director, Rev. Edwin L. Ellis. While he is working on a part-time basis, in many respects he has done a full-time job. His report reveals the fine work done by him with the help of the Conference Youth Council, composed of youth and adult workers.

ADULT WORK: In October, Rev. David W. Briddell, who has served as conference director for the past seven years, was called to serve as a staff member of the Board of Missions in New York. During his years of service the work made considerable progress.

Rev. Claude A. Edmonds is filling the unexpired term of Rev. Briddell as Director of Adult Work. He is supported by the Conference Council of Adult Work, with Miss Leotia Carroll as president of the Young Adult Fellowship.

The climax in our adult work was a convocation held at the Ambassador Hotel, Atlantic City, N. J., March 27-28, with our Resident Bishop John Wesley Lord as guest speaker.

GENERAL CHURCH SCHOOL WORK: The general church school work on all districts has been directed toward helping the children's workers introduce the new curriculum. All districts held meetings. General church school work was also given consideration at the Interboard Schools.

CAMPUS MINISTRY: Our ministry to students is an important phase of our work. If we are able to win and keep our students we can help assure the Christian leadership needed for our society. We call special attention to the \$1.50 per member giving to our School and College Fund. This is our first year in the Morristown College Building Fund Campaign. We hope that we may reach our goal of \$5,000.

STUDENT WORK ON CAMPUSES: Maryland State College: The student work at Maryland State College is making progress under the leadership of the new director, Rev. Simon N. Stubbs. This work should be encouraged.

Delaware State College: Rev. Leroy Hamilton is getting the work off to a good start on this campus. It is hoped that in the years which lie ahead we will be able to get a vital program at this College where there are hundreds of Methodist students. We are pleased that progress is being made.

Lincoln University: Rev. Edwin L. Ellis, though carrying a full load as youth director and pastor, finds time to serve the Methodist students at Lincoln University. His report shows the work being done. In all of these situations we long to be of greater service, but we are limited in resources to finance the work. As we enter the new relationship with other conferences, it is our hope that our ministry to students may be strengthened.

Morgan Christian Center: The work here is carried on by Rev. Howard L. Cornish. For a full report of his work with Methodist students we refer to his report sent to all pastors.

LEADERSHIP EDUCATION: We have been greatly encouraged by the participation of our churches in the Christian workers' schools sponsored jointly by the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences.

The Baltimore Area Leadership School was discontinued last year. We participated in the Northeastern Jurisdiction School of Christian Education and Church Music held at Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pa. Thirty-two students enrolled.

INTER-CONFERENCE LABORATORY SCHOOL: One of the unique leadership enterprises in which we engaged during the year was a laboratory school dealing with the approach to the work in the church school in the inner city.

The school was sponsored by the Northeastern Jurisdiction and held at Seventh Street Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa. Our conference was one that participated with an enrollment of nineteen.

CAMP DEVELOPMENT: It seemed wise to change our plans in light of the dissolution of our Conference. However, the campsite was used last summer for two ten-day pioneer camping periods sponsored by the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences. This necessitated some development, including the drilling of a well, installing a water system and telephone, connecting electric power line, and some landscaping. According to our treasurer, we now have in the campsite fund \$22,005.82. The campsite consists of 62 acres of land valued at \$6,100, which was the purchase price. This gives us a total asset of \$28,105.82 which includes a donation of \$1,000 made by Mrs. Helen Waters and presented at the conference session in May 1964.

As we look toward merger we have increasingly cooperated with the New Jersey, Philadelphia, and Peninsula Conferences on all age levels and in all areas of work. Our leadership is being integrated in such a way that our work will move smoothly during the coming year.

Perhaps this is the proper place to announce that the Executive Secretary

has been invited to become a staff member of the enlarged Peninsula Conference beginning in May. His title will be Associate Executive Secretary, with special responsibility in the areas of adult and general church school work.

As we face the future we are confident that we are being called of God to larger opportunities for all of us in the "main stream of Methodism." May each of us, wherever we are privileged to serve, make a significant contribution to the cause of Christian education. May God "grant us wisdom and courage for the living of these days."

Youth Director

The Youth program has continued at a normal rate of effectiveness. It has been a pleasure to serve in the capacity of Youth Director. The contacts and experiences with our youth and workers with youth have been beneficial to my Christian witness. I could not submit this report without verbalizing the impact which this opportunity has afforded toward my growth. I am grateful to the Delaware Conference for the blessings I have enjoyed working with our youth.

The youth work has been expanded during the past three years because of our association and cooperation with other Methodist Conferences. Youth from the Delaware Conference participated in summer programs with the Philadelphia and Peninsula Conferences. I am deeply appreciative to the Youth Council under the leadership of its president, Dale Webb, and the many adult workers who gave support to our inter-conference program. Dale has been an excellent Council president and Brent Cottman has served well as president of the older youth.

It is important that I call your attention to the splendid cooperation and work of our District Youth Directors, Mrs. Rachel Whittington Hall, Mrs. Cora N. Selby, Mrs. Elois Chester, Rev. C. E. Kiah, and Rev. George H. Outen. The major part of our program for youth is that which is carried out on the districts. With the support of district superintendents, councils, and sub-district directors; the district programs were more effective this year, as compared with other years. It is my opinion that participation and interest among the youth reached an "all time high."

Rev. Howard A. Bailey, our executive secretary, has been most congenial to work with. During my three years of service with the Conference Board of Education, he has not changed in his attitude toward my continued need for his guidance and direction. He has always been willing to help when called upon, both in the office and in service to youth. It is my hope and prayer that he will find satisfaction and joy in the service he will render after our Conference shall have dissolved.

All activities were well attended by the youth. More than 1300 youth were reached through our district, conference, inter-conference, and National conference programs. The highlight of the youth program was the National Convocation for Methodist Youth held at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana. Twenty-six youth and adult workers attended. This was the first time the Conference went over the top of its quota.

Special concern has been expressed for continuing the Christian Witness Missions. Each year's Mission has brought a wealth of inspiration to the

participating youth and adults that can hardly be measured or compared with any other experience. Because of their challenge in the Christian Witness Missions, many youth have committed themselves to the ministry and other full-time Christian occupations. Others may be found in positions of leadership in many local churches.

The final fellowship activity was in the form of a conference-wide "Round-Up" at St. Barnabas Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This activity emphasized the program for youth in the Conferences to which we will be transferred with special concern given to Christian education in the out-of-doors. The highlight of the day was the evening Banquet which was devoted to the recognition of former youth directors, council presidents, and adults who have given several years of loyal service to your youth enterprise. The meeting was well attended.

It has been a privilege for me to be your Youth Director. It has been difficult to serve in this capacity as well as a pastor. I can take no credit, but, I give all honor and glory to God that he enabled me to find strength equal to the many tasks that fell upon me.

The Wesley Club
Lincoln University
Oxford, Pennsylvania

The Methodist Student Work at Lincoln University has continued to progress. Many plans have been made for the year. Dr. Samuel G. Stevens, Campus Chaplain, is very concerned about the denominational program. He has made an effort to coordinate all religious activities, and to involve all denominational leaders. He has approved and placed the tentative Wesley Club schedule on the University calendar.

The Wesley Club program consisted of two activities per month.

1. Holy Communion on the 1st Sunday. A worship setting has been purchased for this purpose. Attendance has ranged in the area of 10-20 students.
2. Monthly Meetings are scheduled for 7:30 P.M. on the Thursday immediately preceding the close of the month. Special features, such as films, speakers, and panel discussions are included. All meetings have a brief period of worship.

The students of the Wesley Club have placed a subscription for "Motive" with the college librarian. This periodical is the voice of the Methodist Student Movement. In addition to the library copy, individual members have subscribed to the magazine.

We participated in Religious Emphasis Week on the campus during the month of March. We also joined in a period of fellowship with the Methodist students at the University of Delaware.

The interest among the students continues to be high although the number participating in our program is small. It is hoped that several of our ministers in the area will share in this ministry to students. I have found great joy in rendering this service.

Recommendation

That the Committee on Higher Education make specific recommendations to the Philadelphia Conference for continuing this work at Lincoln after the dissolution of the Delaware Conference.

Wesley Foundation—Maryland State College

The Wesley Foundation at Maryland State College was completely re-organized this past Fall.

The director represented the foundation at the Northeastern Regional of the Methodist Student Movement held at Chatham College, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Attempts to find prospective Wesley Foundation members from the college students nearby were unsuccessful. The director shared the responsibility for four representatives from the foundation at Salisbury State College, Salisbury, Maryland, which was his first meeting of this kind. It afforded rich insights into the student-mind plus opportunities to converse with experienced campus ministers and foundation directors.

A mimeographed brochure explaining the Wesley Foundation's purposes and membership requirements was distributed campus-wise at the opening of school. Membership solicitation on campus was prohibited by the college administration out of fear of precedent and infraction of the church-state separation principle. Registration was conducted at Metropolitan Methodist Church, the nearest Methodist Church to the campus.

During September, a student revealed that there were above 265 Methodist students at the college. A few of this number were A.M.E., A.M.E. Zion, C.M.E. and A.U.M.P. Cards were sent to Methodist preference students inviting them to be a part of the Wesley Foundation.

The first meeting was held in October at the campus library. This was to be the regular meeting place. The film, "The Church at the Campus," was shown which depicts an ideal Wesley Foundation functioning at a large, mid-western university. Officers were elected. Brief greetings were given by Rev. Howard A. Bailey, Delaware Conference Executive Secretary of Education.

A policy of the College limits student organizations to one meeting a month of the entire group. This meant that the foundation could not meet twice monthly as previously. The program, naturally, is limited by this restriction. Executive committee meetings are not bound under this policy.

The approach to developing the foundation's program has been guided by the various disciplines or sub-headings of religion, e.g., church music, church history, etc. The November and December meetings were given over to the field of church history. Two films on outstanding personalities were used; "Martin Luther," in November and "John Wesley" in December. Brief discussion was held between parts of the movies.

The director, one male and one female student represented the foundation at the Eighth Quadrennial of the Methodist Student Movement at Lincoln, Nebraska in December. Scholarships were obtained for the students from the Board of National Missions. Funds for travel were given by the Wesley Foundation at Salisbury State College and the Delaware Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. Each gave \$50.00. The remainder necessary for travel and expenses was added from the foundation's funds.

In January, permission was granted by the director's wife and official board of Metropolitan Methodist Church, Princess Anne, Md. to hold subsequent meetings of the Foundation in the parsonage. Approval was granted by the college administration to make this change though it was unprecedented. The decision to change proved to be wise. The atmosphere was wonderfully transformed and relaxed. The two delegates to the Quadrennial Meeting gave reports.

The meetings for February, April and May consisted of a study, "How Our Bible Came to Us," a series put out by the American Bible Society using filmstrips, records and study material. These materials were supplemented by resources at the director's disposal.

The March meeting was held jointly with the Wesley Foundation at Salisbury State College. All members of both Foundations were required to read "Sense and Nonsense About Race" by Alpenfels prior to the meeting. The two presidents led the discussion at the Foundation's house in Salisbury. A period of fellowship and fun concluded this meeting.

The foundation will attempt to speak meaningfully to the campus on the first Sunday night in March. The film, "The Church at the Campus" will be used as a starter. A Panel/question-answer period will follow the showing of the film. Two students, two faculty members and two ministers will present viewpoints and answer questions from the audience. The theme will center around "what the Church has to say to the campus."

The Lord's Supper is planned as the only formal worship service which takes place during the Lenten season. The foundation's thirty-two members regularly worship at Metropolitan Methodist Church.

It is hoped that several members will be able to participate in the Chesapeake Area Retreat to be held in the Spring on the Western Shore of Maryland.

Forty copies of "Orientation" magazine were made available for freshmen. Few freshmen responded, therefore, these magazines were given to any who wanted them.

Five copies of "Motive" magazine are received each month for the president of the Foundation, the director, lounge of the girls' dormitory, campus recreation room and campus library. The assistant librarian is to subscribe to Motive on a regular basis.

A newsletter telling of the Foundation's past activities and future plans is being planned. The Publicity and Public Relations Committee hopes to have it ready for campus distribution in early Spring.

The director has applied for membership in the Association of College and University Ministers.

The director asked to be on the February program of the Preacher's Meeting of the Delaware Conference Salisbury District with the film, "The Church at the Campus," being used. The work of the foundation director and activities of the students was explained to these ministers stressing the importance of the Wesley Foundation hoping they'll spread the word which will lead to increased financial support.

The Wesley Foundation formed itself into a choir to sing at Metropolitan Methodist Church on January 17, 1965. This was "College and Seminary Day" at Metropolitan. More such choir service is planned.

Future plans include setting up a four-year program in several religious

categories. A different curriculum will be used each of the four years. A student would complete the total program upon graduation regardless of time of entrance. Flexibility would govern this program, however, Old and New Testament Introduction are planned for the 1965-1966 academic year.

One major objective of this year, the closer contact of the Foundation with Metropolitan Methodist Church, its Commission on Education and its official family, is being realized.

9. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Soon after the newly formed Boards of Christian Social Concerns were organized in the Delaware and Peninsula Conferences, their officers began to meet together for mutual planning in regard to race relations and other areas of social concerns. It was apparent that these Boards, having responsibility for race relations, should work to bring their respective conferences into a closer working relationship.

In November, 1961, a joint meeting of one hundred leaders of the Delaware and Peninsula Conferences and the Resident Bishops of these Conferences, was held at Easton, Maryland. The purpose of this meeting was to ascertain where we were in our conference relationships, where we wanted to be, and what were the barriers preventing closer relationships. The findings of this meeting

were mailed to pastors and local church chairmen of Commissions on Christian Social Concerns of both Conferences. This document called for conference, district, and local church level interchanges. It was felt that the task of the Boards was to first make our people aware of the social issues of our time and of the implications of the Gospel in regard to them; secondly, help others to become aware of the social issues. We are happy to report that ministers and laymen of both Conferences have manifested a growing awareness of our obligations.

In April 1964, a joint meeting of Delaware, New Jersey, and Philadelphia Conference leaders was held at Arch Street Methodist Church. Bishop Fred Pierce Corson and Bishop Edgar A. Love made opening statements concerning the purpose of the meeting, which was to study and discuss phases of the transfer of churches of the Delaware Conference in the area of the New Jersey and Philadelphia Conferences. Many meetings have been held jointly even though the transfers will not be made until the sessions of the Conferences in 1965.

We commend Bishop John Wesley Lord, Edgar A. Love, and Fred Pierce Corson, the district superintendents, pastors, lay leaders, Woman's Society and Guild leaders, and personnel of conference boards and agencies for their concern and efforts to mould an inclusive Church.

We hope that pastors and congregations will go into the Philadelphia, New Jersey, and Peninsula Conferences with the conviction that our Lord is leading us forward. Let us go as living witnesses for our Risen Lord.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That pastors, local commissions, and congregations continue to support elimination of pornographic literature.
2. That our churches face the problems of gambling and alcohol as growing menaces.

10. BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Then, what is the task before us? We must take the gospel to them. Jesus said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations . . ."

How can it best be done? It can be done through the methods and techniques of preaching, personal evangelism, family, church school, and unconventional evangelism. We call upon each pastor and member of the Church to put forth a greater effort that the kingdom of God may grow.

We have accomplished much in the past. Past blessings are not enough in this time of tension and turmoil. We must put forth new efforts to make the present and the future brighter for all. This can be done through diligent participation in the field of evangelism.

11. BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

This is my twenty-first and final report as lay leader of the Delaware Conference. I am grateful to God that I have had this privilege to share the experiences of so many men and women of Methodism. If I have accomplished anything in life, I owe it to the Christian Church. I have seen the Delaware Conference grow, from a layman's standpoint, from infancy to adulthood. I shall set forth a few things that have happened in these twenty-one years.

Stewardship—This takes in all that we do for God and man. We have learned our true relationship to God and man. All that we have belongs to God and should be used in service to mankind—our talents, time and possessions. As Christians, this knowledge has meant real joy to our every day living. For the past sixteen years we have had workshops annually on the conference, district, and sub-district levels. The workshops on the conference level have been lead by members of the General Board.

Methodist Men—The study of organizing manpower in our church life has for twenty years been a concern and inspiration. It was my pleasure to serve on the committee to study the course we should use in The Methodist Church for the developing of men. We first had a brotherhood of men within the church and later decided that we should extend fellowship to all men, in the church and community. Today any man is welcome to come to our meetings and fellowship. He does not have to be a member of our denomination. We are interested in all men living for Christ. Today in the Conference over two thirds of our churches have Methodist Men's Clubs. These clubs develop the spiritual life of men and boys and undergird many other projects on the district and general church levels.

Leadership Development and Communication—Our Board has been deeply concerned with leadership development and communication.

Lay Leadership—For twenty-one years we have had an Annual Mid-Year Conference where we studied and discussed the development of leadership. We have had members of the General Board to assist in this training.

Lay Speaking—Over sixteen years we have stressed lay speaking even before the Church recommended it as a course of study in 1960 at the General

Conference. We felt that every layman should have at his command one or more phases of church life.

The Conference for eight years has been organized on conference, district, and local church levels as follows:

Conference Level—We have a lay leader, two associate lay leaders, three directors of Stewardship, Men's Work, and Leadership Development and Communication.

District Level—Directors and associate directors of Stewardship, Men's Work, and Leadership Development and Communication. All five districts have training sessions on district and sub-district bases of every phrase of church life.

Annually we have on the conference level at least three phases of the above mentioned work. For three years we have met in Atlantic City, N. J., at the Ambassador Hotel for a workshop with two hundred and fifty persons attending.

We bring to an end a great Delaware Lay Conference. It grieves many of us to discontinue this fellowship we have had over the years, but we hope we shall carry this work on wherever we go and God shall have the glory and praise. I am thankful to Him and all who have made the work of this Conference successful and fruitful.

12. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

As we make the fourteenth and final report of the work of this Commission, it is with a deep sense of gratitude to God and to the Conference for the privilege to serve.

Since the first Conference on Christian Vocations which we held in 1951, we have seen many tangible results of our efforts. We cannot measure the results of efforts designed to guide young people in their commitment to Christian vocations. Many are touched in positive ways and change their outlook on life though they may never register their commitments. We are aware, however, of a significant number of young men and women who have chosen church related vocations as a direct result of the Christian vocation emphasis on the conference, district and local church levels. In this number are a significant group of younger ministers who now serve as pastors, and in at least one instance, as a staff member of a general board of The Methodist Church. The number of lay workers in churches and those who make their Christian witness in various vocations throughout our Conference, are too numerous to mention even if we could identify them.

Local Church Activity

During the past year the usual procedure of recruitment has been used in local churches. A number of churches held career conferences, and it was the chairman's privilege to participate in some. Pastors have informed us of young people who have chosen a church related vocation often accompanied with a request for information about student loans and scholarships. It is to be regretted that many deserving young people who are the potential leaders of the church and society in future years, find it difficult to secure the assistance which they need to attend college.

A number of churches are doing something to help this situation. We hope that this practice will increase.

District Activities

Under the leadership of district directors of youth work and associates, young people have made commitments at various district meetings during the years. The names of these youth have been reported to the conference office and are placed on file.

Conference Activity

Our Conference participated, jointly with the Peninsula Conference, in promoting the Bishop's Conference on the Ministry which was held in Newark, Delaware at the Methodist Church and University of Delaware, on Saturday, December 12, 1964. The young men and women were given guidance by Bishop John Wesley Lord, Dr. Norman Trott, President of Wesley Theological Seminary, and Dr. Daniel G. Hill, former Dean of the School of Religion, Howard University, and a number of pastors. There were 260 persons registered, including 87 ministers and 173 young people. Of these, 25 pastors and 45 youth were from our Conference. We are confident that the conference made a lasting impression on the young people. It also was a day of significant fellowship between the two conferences.

The Future

The New Jersey, Peninsula and Philadelphia Conferences will be supplied with the information on our files. We are also supplying them with the list of members of our commission who reside within their respective boundaries.

Appreciation

We conclude with a word of appreciation for the loyal support given our commission by our Resident Bishops: Alexander P. Shaw, Edgar A. Love and John Wesley Lord. The district superintendents, pastors, district committee members and many others have labored long in order to achieve results.

It is rewarding to know that our efforts have not been in vain. As we enter the fellowship with other workers in this ministry, may we continue to be led by Him with whom we seek to serve in all of life's relationships.

14. GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

As our nation recognizes the necessity for better health and welfare for its citizens, it is our privilege, as church members, to serve as leaders in an area in which Christ set the example. This concern is now carried on in 265 hospitals and homes of Methodism. If we are to meet the challenge for improved services, we must work intensively on the local church level.

The Methodist Church affirms that God has laid upon His people the obligation to care for the sick, aged, youth, and children in distress. To accomplish this purpose, the Golden Cross Society should be established and supported by every local church. The Annual Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes is the stimulating and guiding force in this promotion.

"1964 Discipline, Paragraph 1560.1. There shall be a Golden Cross Society of The Methodist Church which shall promote the Hospital and Homes work, and shall collect money and afford other material assistance in providing care for sick, older persons, youth, and children. The enrollment in the Methodist Golden Cross Society shall be held annually in order to secure interest and support of Hospitals and Homes in every congregation in such manner and such dates as determined by the Annual Conference. The week following Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday shall be known as Hospitals and Homes week. Funds raised by said enrollment shall be used as directed by the Annual Conference,

through the Board of Hospitals and Homes, in keeping with policies of said society."

After exploring the possibility and need of a home for the aged of the Delaware Conference, fifteen acres were purchased. The site of the proposed home for the aged is at Dover, Delaware.

At the 1965 Convention, held in Chicago, Illinois, the keynote speaker, Bishop Ralph T. Alton, vice president of the Board of Hospitals and Homes said, "If the church got out of the welfare business, it would, to some extent, stop being the church of Jesus Christ."

I extend thanks to all for the support given our cause during the twelve years I have served as conference director.

15. HISTORICAL SOCIETY

This final report of the Historical Society covers a ten months period, May 25, 1964 to March 26, 1966.

Many requests have been made for printed material pertaining to the Delaware Conference. Most earnestly sought are MINUTES, the OFFICIAL JOURNALS of the annual sessions dating from 1864 to 1945. From 1896 to 1924, the issues carried pictures of a number of preachers and a few laymen. We need a sufficient number of Journals to establish files in libraries of Methodist-related schools, where they will be available to the research-minded of future generations. Newspaper clippings, old church programs, sermons of pre-union Delaware Conference preachers, and the diaries or day journals of preachers—especially those that cover the years served as presiding elders or district superintendents—are urgently requested.

The project, THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE IN PICTURES, was a success. With few exceptions, pictures of all Delaware Conference churches and of the pastor serving in 1964 are in the Chairman's possession. It is the plan to prepare for filing with each a thumbnail digest-history of each of these structures. The efforts under the authority of the Society and commitments to work on the Conference History have been interwoven.

The statistical data for the one hundred years of the Conference is now complete and up to date. All that our records will yield has been tabulated. We have for the first time a factual run-down on the living ministerial members of the Conference, alphabetized and on a ready-reference basis. Demands are being made for this information. I wish to express in the record our thanks to Miss Ann Virginia White for her skill and time given in compiling the statistical data. Without her aid the progress made to date would not have been possible. The Conference could not have gotten so much for so little. But then as a granddaughter of the late Rev. George Thomas Townsend and a member of the "Kiah Clan" could she have done otherwise?

The invitation of the Northeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church to attend the session of June 24 to 27, 1964 made it possible for members of this Society to attend. J. R. Webb, J. E. Licorish, and the Chairman were most cordially received.

The Chairman is scheduled to prepare and read a paper on the HISTORY AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE for the 1965

meeting of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Historical Society at Barratt's Chapel, Dover, Delaware, April 29, 1965.

Certain phases of our work—the rounding out of the final chapter, the determination of repositories; fire proof filing cabinets; the final filings—the fixing of the responsibility and the allocation of the necessary funds to do these things come properly for final determination before the annual conference.

Five years ago, on the invitation of Bishop E. A. Love I assumed the chairmanship of the Historical Society. I accepted it as a request to go to work. We have an accumulation of material (much unclassified) that should be preserved. Replacement is out of the question. In the gathering and in such success as I have achieved, the Delaware Conference has honored me. For the chance I am grateful.

16. DIRECTOR OF STEWARDSHIP

This year marks the close of the fifth year of special emphasis on stewardship and finance. It has been beneficial to serve with the Board of Lay Activities and to direct workshops on the local church, district, and conference levels.

The BIBLE has been our reference book and authority. We have used the programs of The Methodist Story, Manual for the Commission on Stewardship and Finance, and Methodist Discipline.

District Secretaries of Stewardship make the following reports:

Dover District, Robert Young, director: "Stewardship is the process of sharing our time, talents and whole selves. This spirit has been exemplified increasingly during this conference year. More people have increased their responsibilities and registered increases in tithing and proportionate giving."

Easton District, John L. Coleman, director: "The Laymen's Stewardship Clinic, Baltimore, Maryland, November 13-14, placed emphasis on teaching laymen that the foundation for stewardship is the recognition of their obligation to God." The Director reports an increasing number of prayer vigils and tithers. He has devoted a great deal of time and effort in presenting stewardship in local churches.

Philadelphia District, Hyland B. Frisby, director: "Christian Stewardship is the recognition and fulfillment of personal privilege and responsibility for

the administration of the whole of life. It was decided at the beginning of the conference year to group churches for the Every-Member Visitation. Steering committees were set up and six churches in North Philadelphia and three churches in West Philadelphia worked together successfully. At the Inter-Board School, the Director shared the leadership with the Reverend C. Paul Felton of the Philadelphia Conference in the Workshop on Stewardship. Edwin L. Ellis presented the quadrennial emphasis, 'Stewardship for Children and Youth.'"

Salisbury District registers increased stewardship led by pastors and laymen.

Wilmington District, Carl A. Still, director: "The need for stewardship education still looms large. The Conference Director held two successful sub-district meetings in addition to leading the stewardship section of the Inter-Board School. Successful Every Member Visitation campaigns were held by some churches. Local church reports indicate increased giving over the previous year."

The Town and Country Commission met July 8, 1964 at Delaware State College under the leadership of its new chairman, Nathaniel L. Miller. The proposed program for the new quadrennium was explored.

Last fall the Peninsula Conference Commission invited two members of our Commission to attend their meeting at the Dinner Bell Inn, Dover, Delaware. N. L. Miller had been transferred to the California-Nevada Conference. E. A. Hughes, acting chairman, and W. H. Greene, treasurer, attended. Both Commissions voted to hold future meetings jointly.

A committee was appointed to revise the standards for parsonages in the Peninsula Conference. The report will be presented at the next session of the Peninsula Conference.

The Commissions of both Conferences voted to assist in the implementation of the findings of the Survey Committee.

18. WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

In May when the Delaware Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service lost its president to the New York Conference, it realized that a great movement was taking place. The Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service set forth to involve all women in the change.

Invitations were issued by the New Jersey, Peninsula, and Philadelphia Conferences for the attendance of Delaware Conference women as guests to all executive meetings. The planning committees for the Schools of Christian Mission are composed of all the official members of the four conferences. The Northeastern Jurisdiction and the four conferences have representatives on each nomination committee. The Northeastern Jurisdiction elected Miss Elva Mae Stanley as Secretary of Campus Ministry. The Peninsula Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service has been fully reorganized with the Del-Mar Area women of the Delaware Conference being represented on the conference and district levels.

The work for the conference year can be summarized by the report from each district.

DOVER DISTRICT—Mrs. Albert Palmer, President:

As a district, the women have worked successfully together to meet all obligations of the Division and Conference. Local and district officers have presented the programs, study courses and officers' work to make them interesting, informative, and applicable. Many conference officers, missionaries, and field workers have been guests. A large number of women attended the Delaware Conference School of Missions, thus aiding the presentation of the work to local women in various unique ways. The attendance at District meetings has increased more than 40%. Now, at the end of the twenty-fifth year, a membership of twelve-hundred seventy-two women are working and witnessing as the Dover District Woman's Society of Christian Service.

EASTON DISTRICT—Mrs. Robert Jackson, President:

At the first Executive Meeting, the year's forward program was planned. One hundred-fifteen ministers and laymen attended the "Bridging the Gap" meeting at Salisbury, Maryland, sponsored by the Peninsula Conference. The twenty-fifth anniversary of the organization was observed at the District Conference with an informative and challenging program. At the Fall Meeting held at Lane's Church, Taylor's Island, a workshop was conducted where mission studies, explanation of the work and a model program were presented. From this meeting, workshops on "New Patterns" are being conducted on the five sub-district groups. The attendance is encouraging and the response has been rewarding.

The Mid-Winter Meeting was held at Waters Church, Oxford, Maryland with a record attendance. Our guests were the Conference Treasurer, Mrs. William Briddell and the Conference President who brought a very dynamic message.

The observance of the "Day Apart" on the district is shared by the ministers' wives of the District.

Since this is the last report as a district of the Delaware Conference, forget not that the call is to every woman of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild to commit herself to the spirit and principles of Christ.

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT—Mrs. Alfred E. Harmon, President:

As we come to the end of the fiscal year and of the Philadelphia District, it seems fitting to glance back over the years. This district has been blessed with the leadership of these women: Mrs. Emma F. Cruger (deceased), 1940-1947; Mrs. Alvin Peaker, 1947-1951; Mrs. Crawford Trader, 1951-1955; Mrs. William Summers, 1955-1959; Mrs. Albert Hoskins, 1959-1963; Mrs. Alfred Harmon, 1963-1965. Serving with these women were many dedicated officers, secretaries, and local members. The membership grew from 1,192 to 2,399, the financial giving from \$1,731 to \$8,542. Our efforts have benefited persons in need in foreign countries as well as here at home. There is great satisfaction in knowing this great work will continue regardless of the many changes taking place.

Many thanks to all who labored on the Philadelphia District. Again each

woman of the Philadelphia District will dedicate herself anew to the purpose and strive for kingdom building, the Christian task.

SALISBURY DISTRICT—Mrs. Vivian J. Evans, President:

The year 1964-65 has been a busy and profitable one for the Salisbury District. The new purpose has been a great challenge to us, and we have endeavored to carry it out in the following manner:

1. To help women grow in knowledge and experience of God as revealed by Jesus Christ:

Seminars and work-shops on all levels, and study courses on sub-district and local levels were held. There was an increase in sales of program materials, *The Methodist Woman*, and *The World Outlook*.

2. To challenge them to respond to God's redemptive purpose in the world: Spiritual life program has been inspirational on all levels; district officers have visited and spoken on every charge; home visitations were made; Wesleyan Service Guild has been more active.
3. Share through witness and service in the outreach of the church: Missionary workers visited the sub-districts; 100% cooperation with Peninsula Conference by attending meetings and participating in the activities of United Church Women.
4. Enlist workers and secure funds:

Most churches have paid their mission budgets in full; increased membership; more money given for local church activity; and more community activity in behalf of retarded children and migrant workers.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT—Mrs. James Wharton, President:

"Witness Through Service" has been the message to the more than 1000 members of the Wilmington District Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild. The power of prayer and the deepening of the spiritual life have been the result of the prayer calendar and prayer groups.

Good reading is necessary for growth. *The Methodist Woman*, *World Outlook*, *Annual Report of the Division*, and *Study Books* are a few of the books that were used in the district. At the Workshop, program and promotion have been emphasized. The Workshop for Secretaries of Children and Youth resulted in better informed young people and children of the work of missions and the Church.

No report could end without recognizing the members of the Board of Missions from the Delaware Conference. Mrs. William Strother, Jr. and Mrs. William Henry have given advice, support, and guidance to the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Just as this report was being finished notice has come that Mrs. J. W. Jewett has passed. This indeed marks the end of the twenty-five year period. Mrs. Jewett was the first president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and was the first member from the Conference to serve the Woman's Division of Christian Service.

"Summation of a New Age" has meant for the women of the Delaware Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, a call for witnessing and serving.

19. DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Delaware State Council of Churches continues to respond in every way possible to an increasing variety of needs. This is due to the loyal commitments of individuals and staff members, as well as the growing ecumenicity in Delaware. Plans are being made for a conference on *The Nature of the Church* for the clergy.

The various departments are engaged in new ventures for 1965. The Council continues to expand its service through the Migrant Ministry and to institutions. We have a clergyman serving full time in the State Hospital, Wilmington, Delaware.

Two outstanding events during this conference year were the Festival Service in observance of the fifth anniversary of the Council and the Sixth General Assembly which met in January, 1965 at the Wesley Junior College, Dover, Delaware. The guest speakers for these two events were Dr. Ernest Gordon, Dean of the Chapel, Princeton University and Roy McCorkle, American Friends Service, respectively.

This being our last report to the Delaware Conference, we wish to express sincere thanks for its loyal support, spiritually and financially. The experience has been rewarding.

A. MINISTERIAL MEMBERS



SAMUEL J. HORSEY

Samuel J. Horsey was born in Marion, Maryland, December 11, 1880, the eleventh child of the late Samuel and Joannah Miles Horsey, all of whom are now deceased.

He attended the public schools and early in life became a soldier of Christ.

After completing his studies at Morgan College, receiving the A.B. degree, he attended Drew Theological Seminary in Madison, N. J. and graduated in 1911 with a B.D. degree. He was ordained in 1911 as a minister with only one thought and desire—to serve.

On September 26, 1940, he was married to Mrs. Maryme E. Henderson who survives him. He was a most devoted and loving husband.

Rev. Horsey enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his colleagues. He was quiet, courteous, unassuming, and possessed those qualities of human sympathy which made friends. HAMPTON TURNER JOHNSON



Hampton Turner Johnson had the distinction of holding one of the longest service records in Methodist history. Born at Princess Anne, Maryland, on September 13, 1865, he died in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on December 26, 1964, in his one hundredth year. His life spanned nearly the entire life of the Delaware Conference (1864-1965). He was the son of the late Charles Elzie and Emily Gertrude Turner Johnson.

Educated at Princess Anne Academy (now Maryland State College), he was licensed to preach by the father of the writer, the late Reverend Daniel Archie Ridout, then pastor at Metropolitan Church, Princess Anne. Brother

Johnson was admitted to the Delaware Conference in 1889, the year of its silver anniversary, and did not miss a single roll call for seventy-five years. Though confined to a wheel chair, he was present at the roll call of the one hundredth anniversary session in May, 1964. For forty-three years he was registrar of the Board of Ministerial Training, a position he held with great faithfulness and high distinction.

On October 27, 1897, he was married to Miss Mattie Medley Kennedy. Three children were born to this union: Cornelius Lee, Clarence Aquila, and Dorothy Virginia (Mrs. Elmer W. Dean, widow of a Delaware Conference pastor).

Brother Johnson served churches at Fair Oak, Va.; Salisbury Circuit, Md.; Ridgely, Md.; Greenwich, N. J.; Union, Md.; Mt. Holly, N. J.; Orange, N. J.; Mt. Joy, Wilmington, Del.; Jamestown, East New Market, and Oxford, Md.; Newport, Del.; Hudson, N. Y.; Cape May, N. J.; Newman, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Pleasantville, N. J.; and White Plains, N. Y. After his retirement in 1942 he served as supply pastor at New Castle, Delaware five years and Elkton, Maryland four years.

At the Delaware Conference session of 1959, he was honored on the occasion of having reached the seventieth year of Conference membership. He responded with clear mind and firm voice: "I have loved the Church and have given myself for it. If I never more meet you here, I will meet you in heaven." He was destined to meet us there five more years!

Blest with a phenomenal memory, he was considered as Delaware Conference history in the flesh. Until within two or three years of his death, he could relate its history for hour upon hour. He practically knew all of it, never writing it down, but retaining it in his memory.

He is survived by his three children, three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held at Haven Memorial Church, Philadelphia, on December 30, the Rev. W. C. Strother, Jr., superintendent of the Philadelphia District, presiding. The writer delivered the eulogy. Others assisting in the service were: The Reverends Sercy L. Jones, pastor; Dennis R. Fletcher, O'Connell Milbourne, Walter R. Hazzard, and Marion O. Ballard. Interment was in Bridgeton, N. J.

CHARLES LANGHAM CARRINGTON

Delaware Conference—1941-1964

Charles L. Carrington was born on October 27, 1909 in Austin, Texas and died on Wednesday, March 3, 1965 at the Methodist Hospital in Brooklyn, New York.

His early education was received in his native city and he also earned the Bachelor of Arts degree at Samuel Houston College in Austin; the Bachelor of Divinity degree at Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia; and the Master of Arts degree at Drew University, Madison, New Jersey.

He was received on trial in the West Texas Conference in 1932. While continuing his seminary

training he served as assistant pastor and director of Christian education at St. Mark's Methodist Church, New York City and also as pastor of Butler Memorial, Bronx, New York. In 1941 he was transferred to the Delaware Conference and for the next twenty-three years was pastor of the Brooks Memorial Church, Jamaica, New York. During these years, the membership increased from seventy to eleven hundred with a seven-day week program of religious, educational, and community activities involving some two thousand people. The new church building and parsonage valued at \$250,000 were erected. Brooks Memorial was selected by the Department of City Work, Board of National Missions of The Methodist Church as one of five churches featured for study by the 1958 Convocation on Urban Life, Washington, D. C.

Brother Carrington served on a number of conference boards and agencies which include the Board of Christian Social Concerns, New York Area Metropolitan Planning Commission, Committee on Convocation of Urban Life, Board of Missions, Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, and Historical Society. He was elected as reserve delegate to Jurisdictional Conference—1956, reserve delegate to General Conference—1964, and delegate to Jurisdictional Conference—1964. He also served as dean of the Conference



Methodist Youth Assembly for six years and as dean of the Baltimore Area Pastors' School for thirteen years.

On June 22, 1964, Charles Carrington was transferred to the New York Annual Conference and became Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Missions. He and other pastors located within the geographical areas of the New York and New York Annual Conferences, with their churches, were transferred to the new New York Annual Conference. This action marked the beginning of the dissolution of the Delaware Annual Conference and progress toward achieving an inclusive fellowship within the Northeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

His leadership in community activities included: Organizer and chairman, Citizens' Committee on Juvenile Problems; Vice-President, Queens Federation of Churches; Board Member, Planned Parenthood Association of Queens; Executive Member and Past President, Jamaica Branch, NAACP; and charter Board member of Community Council of South Jamaica.

He is survived by his wife, the former Miss Muriel Jervis, whom he married in 1942, and their son Charles, Junior; a sister, Mrs. B. Wade Graves; a brother, A. J. Carrington; other relatives and friends.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE

Seventy years before the organizing of the Delaware Annual Conference, the seed from which she was to germinate, African Zoar Society, came into existence in the section of the City of Philadelphia called Campingtown.

African Zoar Methodist Church represents the historic continuity of the Afro-American within the traditional system of The Methodist Church. She is the remnant of Negroes who in the early days of the Republic, although disliking the patterns of participation available to them, refused to separate themselves from the fold of the "John Wesley Methodists." Their silent protest was evidenced in their withdrawal to their homes where they met for prayer, praise and unhampered worship. Later they occupied an abandoned butcher shop as their first place of public worship. Because of the rising protests and forward march of the blacks, they were granted recognition by St. George's in 1794. A lot was purchased and the first church edifice was erected.

Bishop Francis Asbury recorded in his Journal: "Thursday, August 4, 1796, I was called upon by the African society in Campington to open their new house, which I did, on Romans 1:16-18, and had an unwieldy congregation of white and black. Brother Dickins gave a lively exhortation on the new birth."

Other fathers of Methodism who preached in the first edifice were Dr. Thomas Coke, "the foreign missionary of Methodism;" William Colbert, a presiding elder, whose unpublished diary reveals his frequent visits and service at Zoar; Harry Hosier, Bishop Asbury's companion and great black preacher; and Henry Boehm, distinguished leader and preacher of the German Methodists.

It was at African Zoar in 1852, twelve years before the organization of the Delaware Conference, that the first Convention of Colored Local Preachers and Laymen was held. A second convention was held on June 28, 1855.

Beginning in 1857, a series of Conferences of Colored Local Preachers was held annually until 1863. The first met at Zoar on August 5, 1857 under the Episcopal leadership of Levi Scott. Subsequent sessions were held as follows: Second session, August 4, 1858, Ezion Church, Wilmington, Delaware; Third session, August 10, 1859, Zoar Church, Philadelphia; Fourth session, August 10, 1860, Ezion Church; Fifth session, August 1, 1861, Salem, New Jersey; Sixth session, August 7, 1862, Zoar Church; Seventh session, August 6, 1863, Ezion Church.

Bishop Levi Scott presided at each of these pre-conference sessions with the exception of the last one at which J. Mason, presiding elder, served in the absence of the Bishop.

✕The Delaware Conference was organized July 29, 1864, at John Wesley Chapel (Tindley Temple), Philadelphia, under the leadership of Bishop Edmund Storer Janes. This Conference was the first organization of Negro Methodists under the authority of the General Conference of The Methodist Church. Included in this group were the Negro local preachers who had been traveling under the supervision of presiding elders within the bounds of the Philadelphia and New Jersey Conferences for two or more years.

The charter members of the Conference were: Isaac Hinson (1864-1883), James Davis (1864-1871), Harrison Smith (1864-1874), John G. Manluff (1864-1879), Isaiah Broughton (1864-1890), Samuel Dale (1864-1874), Wilmore

S. Elsey (1864-1867), Jehu H. Pierce (1864-1915), Nathan Young (1864-1901), Joshua Brinkley (1864-1890), and Frost Pollett (1864-1872).

Admitted on trial were John W. Saunders, Simon Taylor, Abraham Brown, Stephen Johns, Wesley J. Parker, Charles Pollett, Stephen Whittington, Samuel G. Waters, Anthony Driver, and Robert Robinson.

The statistics of the first session revealed that the Conference was composed of thirty-four churches in the widely scattered territory of the New Jersey and Philadelphia Conferences with a membership of 4,871, probationers 93, local preachers 49, infants baptized 256, adults baptized 49, Sunday school pupils 841, and Sunday school teachers 151. The conference collection was \$76.25.

The following were elected as officers: President, Frost Pollett; vice-president, Jehu H. Pierce; secretary, Wilmore S. Elsey; treasurer, Isaac Hinson; managers, James Davis, Joshua Brinkley, and Harrison Smith; treasurer of conference collections, David Tilghman.

The period spanning the years 1864 to 1965 was filled with adventure. The dawning of a new era is upon us—a day in which we who unwillingly separated ourselves are joyfully and mutually rejoined with our brothers in Methodism. Together we march forward, rededicating ourselves to the basic tenets of Methodism and the blazing of new horizons in Christian fellowship and service.

THE HISTORY AND CONTRIBUTION
OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE
BY
WILLIAM C. JASON, JR.

(Prepared for the Annual Meeting of the Northeastern Jurisdictional
Historical Association's 1965 Meeting at Barratt's Chapel,
Frederica, Delaware)
April 29, 1965

Members of the Association, indulge me at the outset in a personal reference. Geographically, I am about as near home as a man can be. I was born on the campus of Delaware State College which my speedometer tells me is just thirteen miles from this historical spot so rightly hallowed by Methodists.

As a boy, I passed this way many times with my father, a Delaware Conference preacher for fifty-two years, as he went about on school and church business. Further, I had a grandfather, William Jason, a local preacher of the Delaware Conference as of 1874, who lived with us. Prior to 1916, when I left home, he kept bees. We had the service of an old horse "Barney" who somehow could in a day make it to points as far away as Frederica and back when our market for honey, either extracted or in the comb, demanded so long a voyage. So you see, Barrett's Chapel from the outside I have known all my life.

The honor you bestow upon me in this privilege of addressing the annual meeting of the Jurisdictional Historical Society is much appreciated. I know it is not because of any demonstrated scholarship in this field on my part. You are all much more likely to be familiar with the available historical data

than I. If then, this paper is to serve any purpose, it must be in the area of interpretation.

This paper is not documented narration. The chief source of factual material is the minutes of the one hundred-one annual sessions and especially the reports of presiding elders and district superintendents printed therein. A second source is an accumulation of miscellaneous data which came to hand only because my father, an itinerant preacher, had from the time of his appointment as president of the College until his death sufficient storage space never visited by fire. A third source is personal. It comes directly from identification that began before I was born, with the Delaware Conference.

That you may know my qualifications, and I do not boast, I will tell you that the preacher who made the greatest all around contribution to the Delaware Conference during the first fifty years of its existence was Massachusetts born Henry Augustus Monroe, a drummer boy in the Massachusetts 54th Infantry. He performed the wedding ceremony for my mother and father. My father's best man was Francis F. Wheeler, a Delaware Conference member pastoring a neighboring church in Northern Jersey. I was baptized by Charles A. Tindley, the District Superintendent of the Wilmington District at the time I was born. During all my early years I was in frequent contact with the preachers of the Conference who came to the School on either conference business or speaking engagements. Their children were my acquaintances and friends, and in more than one instance they became Delaware Conference preachers. When I graduated from school, my father persuaded his Drew classmate, C. S. Kemble, to come and address the graduating class. Finally, I attended Genesee Wesleyan Seminary, Lima, New York; belonged to the famous Class '14 and sang in the choir of the Methodist Church. The last eleven years have seen me with an assortment of conference, district, and local church assignments. I shall ever consider the privilege of representing the Delaware Conference as Lay Delegate to the General Conference of 1964 as a very high honor.

This paper has to reflect a philosophy of history that is Christian. Of course this means reconciling it to the Old Testament which recites the movements of a purposeful God. This paper must be written in such a way as to convey what the men who labored in the Delaware Conference believed to be true. We all know that motivation stems from what is true for us rather than from any exact, objective formula. To serve a useful purpose, it must make a contribution to understanding and insight for we hold that communication among men is only second in importance to reconciliation with God. In order, then, that we get at the aim and impact of the Delaware Conference we must try to see Methodism through the eyes of its preachers, and avoid any substitution of our judgments and values in the process. What is well known, taken for granted, or trite on your side of the railroad track, may well be significant to us.

The Delaware Annual Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church came into existence on Friday morning, July 29, 1864 when Bishop Edmund S. Janes declared that ten colored local preachers among those assembled in the little unattractive John Wesley Church (now Tindley Temple in South Philadelphia) had qualified by (1) having been employed by Methodist Episcopal presiding elders for two or more years, (2) endorsement by ten Methodist Episcopal presiding elders in the traveling connection, (3) recommendation

from a quarterly conference, and (4) presentation by a presiding elder. Note in passing, the severity of the test was a far cry from John Wesley's, "If thy heart is right, give me thy hand."

As of June 1964 the Delaware Conference, under the permissive legislation of the General Church, transferred to the New York and Newark Conferences nineteen churches with their pastors. Yesterday, on April 28, 1965, in preparation for the transfer of the remaining one hundred thirty-four charges and pastors to the New Jersey, Peninsula, and Philadelphia Conferences, the Conference adopted the plan of merger with the final effective date of the merger to be July 1, 1965. Thus in this area, race as expressed in Methodist Conference organizations disappears, and our Church moves on toward the more excellent way of oneness in the Church of our Lord.

This paper, in terms of our whole Methodist Church in America is dealing with a very few people operating as an organization in a limited area for a limited time. Realism demands that we see clearly that the main issue, from its inception to date—every step of the way—has been race. But we cannot pick up the Delaware Conference without carrying in the front of our minds the factors that brought this about. At the expense of replotting fields, I dare briefly refer to a number of these fibers which became the rope.

We view John Wesley's English Methodism as a resolute, Godly recall of the Christian Church to its duties of carrying its message and its service to the people, their location, their depravity notwithstanding. When Methodism came to America, it did not come to a churchless land. Roman Catholics, congregations of the Church of England, Presbyterians, and Quakers were in organization, and the criticism of them went to their efficiency and effectiveness only in so far as they served white people. The terms pagan and heathen could more accurately be applied to the Negro, slave or free—and there were a number of free Negroes in this area as of 1766. In justification, the proponents of slavery, theologians included, had written them off as soulless, unteachable, brutes decreed by God to be forever slaves.

Between 1766 and 1784 the English Wesleyan preachers wanted souls. It may have been by accident that Philip Embury preached to a little Negro girl in New York, but it was certainly by design that Captain Webb, Richard Boardman, Joseph Pilmore, and Thomas Rankin sought Negroes as members of societies worthy of salvation. The Negro hearers understood the simple gospel of Jesus. They believed it. Further, they believed in the sincerity and the equality which these evangelists preached. It is to be noted that aside from the money which Captain Webb gave, and the unusual generosity of Judge Philip Barratt, who I believe was the first affluent layman persuaded to erect a chapel for Methodists such as this, all contributions came from the poor. It is the thinking of my father that donations of Negroes went into the building of a number of Methodist churches. This preaching of salvation and freedom for all came to rest on both the popular upsurge for independence of the community and on the dynamics of Quakerism which ended slavery in Pennsylvania in 1780; and exerted a powerful influence in ending it in New Jersey. Thereafter, "cities of refuge" sprang up in South Jersey for run-a-way slaves, sufficiently defiant, once they had crossed the Delaware not to make the long trek to Canada. Methodist gospel persuaded many poor white people to aid slaves acquire freedom. Fugitive slave advertisements by the score spelled out the fact that the run-away was a Methodist, had gone off with

the Methodists, had been taught by Methodists, and strange to relate, a high percentage were described as Methodist preachers.

What really got a hold of Freeborn Garrettson that he at the head-waters of the Chesapeake Bay in Maryland did free his slaves, preach against slavery, use double talk in his sermons that tickled the ear of the slave holder and kindled the hope of freedom in the slave at the same time? It needs be pointed out that Garrettson never got to be Bishop. It was during these days that the one English preacher, Francis Asbury, who had not gone home, found use for Harry Hoosier—"Black Harry." Whether Francis Asbury looked upon Harry Hoosier as a useful dispenser of the word, first, rather than his man Friday, I do not know, but that Harry did much good for Methodism as a preacher to both black and white is attested by Bishop Coke, Freeborn Garrettson, Jesse Lee, and Asbury, himself. Dr. Coke, the prize package, the ambassador with portfolio, went forth from this place, November 1884; entrusted to no other than "Black Harry," who as pilot, bodyguard, and contact man was to convoy this preacher to some twenty-five or thirty Methodist societies of Negro and white members down here in Delaware and Maryland, and get him to the church on time at Lovely Lane, Baltimore.

Bishop Coke's severity on slavery which found expression in the conference of 1784 and which got him into one or more near fist fights was not a weapon in Bishop Francis Asbury's arsenal. In all kindness it is to be said that slavery was not challenged openly by our second bishop. Is not his preference to Bishop Coke thus explainable especially since their joint visit to citizen George Washington requesting his good office to work against the institution of slavery ended in failure? It needs also be noted that Americans heeded little John Wesley's great tract, "Thoughts on Slavery," and the encouragement he, and it, gave Wilberforce before the Parliament that outlawed the British slave trade. It was bad copy. This shows how the culture had cut into the purity of the gospel.

On this interpretation, no matter how you see it, the withdrawal of Bethel to form the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 1816 and the withdrawal in New York City to form the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church in 1820 were protests. So too, were the withdrawals of Zoar, Philadelphia in 1794; Ezion, Wilmington in 1805; and Whatcoat, here in Dover in 1852, a part of the procession; although as late as 1857, Barratt's Chapel, Milford Circuit, Eastern District, Philadelphia Conference carried a society of forty colored members and two probationers. The protest is found also in the ratio of Negro to white membership. In 1805 it was one to two, and in 1828 one to three and one-half. By 1836 it was one to five. All these withdrawals were traceable to the church's departure from its prior forthright position and secondly, its unwillingness to grant Negro preachers the noble status of itinerancy. The first group said, "we quit." The second group said, "our faith and our prayers together will be sufficient to see Methodism return to its former righteous way."

The Philadelphia Conference was the overlord of the entire area that became the Delaware Conference. The condition of Negro society members considered state by state was by no means uniform. In Pennsylvania and New Jersey as of 1830 slavery was gone. In Delaware it was half gone. By this I mean that above the canal the New Jersey/Pennsylvania influence supplied an antislavery sentiment and the economy had become commercial and in-

dustrial to the degree that slavery was unprofitable. Moving south, the shadows lengthened until you got as far down as Laurel. From there on down, plantation slavery held sway. The Negro Methodist societies here were held captive and they were policed. I read somewhere of a slave holder down there who made use of the leather lungs of a barrel chested young male slave for his defense. He would assemble his slaves for preaching, take his seat by the door, and as soon as the speaker came anywhere near "freedom or equality" the stern voice of the master would shout, "Buck, sing." When the other slaves joined, the preacher's sermon ended. This was the era of Patty Cannon's kidnapping activities on the Delaware/Maryland border. Operating as far north as Philadelphia it saw many free Negroes captured and re-sold into slavery. It was also the era of the underground railroad that saw Quakers and some sincere Methodists aiding fugitive slaves to freedom countries. This was the era of the abolitionists, and I am sure you know the position taken by the Philadelphia Conference and the General Church as to them. Under the impact of the great withdrawal of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South in 1844, we sometimes overlook the slightly earlier withdrawals of the Reverends Owens, Wells, and above all, Lucius Metlack. This was the man who in the sixties and seventies would drop whatever he was doing in order to attend the annual sessions of the Delaware Conference and to give his warm hearted and much appreciated help. One of the great bi-racial fellowships of all time—that of Lucius Metlack and Wesley J. Parker—was such a well known bond that on Reverend Metlack's death, convention yielded and Wesley J. Parker, speaking for himself and the Delaware Conference, addressed the funeral of our friend.

It was in the fifties and then under the urgings of a number of Negro preachers whose services had been secured by white presiding elders to "supply" little Negro societies scattered throughout northern Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and points north, that the organization of the local colored preachers of the Methodist Episcopal Church within the boundaries of the New Jersey and Philadelphia Conferences was authorized. The number of Negroes loyal to the Methodist Episcopal Church during that time remained small in the free states because of the appeal of dignity, itinerancy, and promotion afforded by the African Methodist Episcopal and the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Churches. In the southern part of the Peninsula, preaching by a Negro was forbidden unless in the presence of at least one white man. But there were a number of Negro preachers who in spite of this severe limitation gloried in making the attempt. They, as a rule, carried credentials which were in order, having purchased their own freedom. Churches, neither in the Northern or Southern sections, would grant these evangelists the itinerancy.

Now it is 1864 and these ten men stand in front of Bishop Janes consciously or unconsciously the composite of all these factors. In their initial legislation there are three items that show the maturity of the ten men who have now achieved the itinerancy. First they honored, by electing and placing in the number three spot on the roll, Frost Pullett. He was seventy-six years of age, all black, had been born in 1787, knew his parents (both of them), and had a son sitting in the church who was born in 1817 and about to become a conference member. He had in 1840 purchased his freedom and as an independent evangelist traveled the Peninsula, Delaware, and to Philadelphia preaching to all who would hear with such skill that aside from one

arrest and numerous flights from ruffians, had made it to his seventy-sixth year.

The second item was the Conference organizing itself into a "missionary conference." This was an expression of their understanding that their mission was to be among the illiterate, poverty stricken, about-to-be-abandoned Negroes in the lower Peninsula. Remember that the Emancipation Proclamation of 1863 only affected those in rebellion down in the Virginia tip. Delaware and Maryland had loyally fought to preserve the Union but not to free the slaves, and did not by their legislative acts for a number of years. It required faith and courage for ten of the twenty-one preachers who left that first session to come into the lower Peninsula before the passage of the Thirteenth Amendment.

The third accomplishment of note at the initial session was the recognition of the need for self improvement. After all, Methodism called for book learning, the ability to read being the very minimum. This demand for ever improving the intellectual qualifications of preacher-members was as old as the local preachers session of 1857: "Resolved, That the Conference earnestly recommends, that those preachers who may be appointed by the Bishop, or employed by the Presiding Elders, procure a copy of the Holy Scriptures, Hymn-book, Discipline, Fletcher's Appeal, and Wesley's Sermons; and prepare themselves to pass an examination on these several books, at the next session of the Conference; and it is further recommended, that they provide themselves with Hart's English Grammar, and study it as they have opportunity."

It is to be noted that the white presiding elder responsible for the southern Peninsula was not an official part of the organizing conference. As of 1857, the Reverend H. Colclazer, presiding elder of the Snow Hill District, was absent from the colored local preachers' conference and the records acknowledged to be most incomplete. They did not improve during the next seven years. Hence the first duty of the Delaware Conference appointees was to find those who still remained loyal to The Methodist Church, now that compulsion was removed. In many instances, the member found had to be given a family name. The simplest process was to assume the master's. The results are traceable unto this day and are reflected on our conference roll.

The glory of freedom in fact was upon the people. Once the repressions of slavery were removed the irresponsibility occasioned by joy was reflected in the revelry of whisky and loose living. The enjoyment of hunting and fishing, as old as the days of the Nanticoke Indians; the glories of a full peninsula moon in a cloudless sky were no more to be checked by hell and damnation sermons than by the awesomeness of the flash lightning of a rainless thunder storm. Thus these preachers found that they had to turn to education, and this called for a three-fold effort. They had to persuade the children to want to attend, to persuade the parents to raise some money, and make an effort to move the Delaware and Maryland legislatures to provide for a public education that would be Negro inclusive. The Church Schools were organized—but what of teachers? Can the blind lead the blind? For a number of years the Delaware Conference had preachers turned teachers and it was continually making preachers of teachers—just so interchangeable were the needs for spiritual and intellectual stimulation. The educational facilities remained at a very low level in Maryland until the Delaware Conference Academy (now Princess Anne) was founded in 1884, when the good

will and financial assistance of white Methodists were united with the Conference's conceived idea. The school was to prepare to preach, the young men of the lower Peninsula who in their desire to be somebody, emulated and imitated the one version of Negro dignity in their midst—the colored preacher. In the meantime, it was necessary to find a source of supply elsewhere. The first preachers had been slaves. The needs of the people could not tolerate those so limited in equipment. The second source of supply were the men who as soldiers in the Civil War had picked up knowledge somewhere and answered the call. The third set were Philadelphians—men who attended the Institute of Colored Youth (now Cheyney State Teachers College) in Pennsylvania. Thereafter, the flow began from the 1866 organized Centenary Biblical Institute (now Morgan State College) in Baltimore, from the Presbyterian established Lincoln University, and from Drew.

The establishment of the Land Grant College in Delaware was in no way a Methodist related event, but once it was established in 1891 the members of the Conference were sufficiently education-minded to petition for a Negro president. They succeeded better than they had reason to hope. Delaware Conference member, W. C. Jason, a Genesee Wesleyan, Alleghany College, and Drew Seminary graduate became president in 1896. A score of preachers came into the Conference from this institution during the twenty-seven years of his term there.

Beginning with the turn of the century, enough college and seminary trained men came into the Conference to permit the organization of a training course for member preachers and those who desired to become preachers. A poem by President Jason just prior to the Du Pont school building program of the twenties indicates that the frustration of limited educational opportunity was still quite real.

FIVE MILLION

"There are five million Negro youth in this country under nineteen years of age. There are not enough teachers, good and poor, to teach them."—The Afro.

Five million eager Negro youth
 Seeking the vital truth;
 For truth must save or wrong enslave
 When manhood follows youth.

Five million Negro hearts to dare,
 Dangers and toil to share.
 Ten million hands to loose the bands,
 Which else must them ensnare.

Five million tongues their need to speak,
 Ten million feet to seek
 The paths we know the race must go,
 Or be forever weak.

Who will the truth of God proclaim?
 Who fan the student's flame?

For some must preach and others teach,
Or all must suffer shame.

Who will the Negro doctors be?
Who will make the lawyer's plea?
And who will feed the men who lead
A race to liberty?

Each lass, each lass, must do their bit
Some useful place to fit.
And try their best to meet the test;
For only cowards quit.

It is here that the great service of the local preacher is clearly seen. He was out of the loins of the people. He knew them and their weaknesses. If he had a will to go straight and a mind that was teachable, he proved himself on the way up because he was used as a supply before it was determined that he was fit conference material. One hundred seventy-eight of the one thousand, nine hundred and seventy-eight local preachers during the history of the Conference became regular.

Too much cannot be said of the seventy-two presiding elders and district superintendents of the Delaware Conference. The reports were always faithful to Old Testament form. When times were good they praised the Lord; when times were bad they addressed themselves to the sins of the people. These circuit riders of circuit riders were the kings of the Quarterly Conferences. They came with news for those who could not read. They were the contact men with the other districts and the eyes and ears of the bishops. They were the first to discover the devastating results of an emotionally operated camp meeting that took on the features of circus and picnic rather than revival. They noted early that these camp meetings were the enemy of a stabilized church operated on a stewardship basis. Our presiding elders were the buffers of hardship.

When an presiding elder started out on a Monday morning down the Peninsula, he never knew in what condition he would find his preacher or his larder. No telephones reported sickness. Sermons frequently did not bring enough for the preacher to buy the food his family needed. Among themselves, the presiding elders got together something they called the "presiding elders' fund." Each dispensed it as the needs among his preachers were indicated. If two presiding elders met, the one who asked first could have access to and make use of whatever amount the other presiding elder was carrying. Many a preacher went to bed Sunday night knowing that he had received next to nothing for his day's effort—long miles on foot, three or more sermons; waking on Monday morning he found his back porch strewn with baskets of vegetables, chicken, rabbit, muskrat, fruit, pork, etc., which was an expression of "that which I have, I give."

It was only after the coming of the Delaware Conference that Negro Methodists down the Peninsula received a full gospel. The preachers, of course, took it that in preaching the love of Jesus they had a cause, and in the practice of Methodism they had a technique. During the captive Methodist

society days of slavery, each was adulterated below recognition. After the Nat Turner Rebellion of 1831, "Thou shalt not kill" was required in the sermons of preachers to slaves, as was, "Servant, obey your master." It is readily understandable that "Thou shalt not commit adultery" had no place. Such interfered with both the duties of the Negro mistress and cut in on the slave breeders' market.

Stewardship was completely out in the gospel preached to slaves. Reason? The slave would have to turn thief before he could make his sacrificial offering. With such a load upon him, rich in spirit, limited in education, a target for ruffians, a community coldness or indifference registered by the body politic, the white neighbors—Methodists included—the ignorance, poverty, and irresponsibility of thousands of people turned loose from the plantation system, it is any wonder that so many died young? Isn't it miraculous that so many enlisted and remained until death took them from the roll, the exact number being three hundred and twenty-five? With the teaching of stewardship their support of missions finally found implementation. The name of each contributor was promised placement in the annual minutes as a reward for his contribution. This went on for many years before it was challenged by the General Church because of the printing expense deducted from funds that were supposed to go for missions. The value however of having this compilation of names is great. It gives us the most reliable and often only available listing of hundreds of laymen who lived and died in our Delaware Conference churches.

In the nineties the tremendous soldier, scholar, preacher, and writer, Harry Augustus Monroe, having returned to the Delaware Conference from one of those transfers of limited duration to a Northern Conference in order to supply a Negro congregation, advanced the bright idea of breaking the Conference down along the lines of what had been free and slave states. His theory was that on the strength of what New York City Methodism and the Missionary Society had done for St. Marks much could be accomplished throughout New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania by an approach that was non militant. He believed that since the enabling action of the General Church extended the borders of the Delaware Conference all the way "down East" that on a mission basis churches throughout that area could gain financial assistance from white Methodism being pastored by preachers of the Delaware Conference in the meantime. The necessity for carrying on a strong campaign in the communities of Delaware and Maryland where prejudice was reflected in denial of employment, adequate schooling, occasional lynching, inequality by the law, and downright meanness, was quite clear. By 1910 it was proven that the northern conferences' presiding elders, now district superintendents, would not permit an outside preacher of the overlapping Delaware Conference to remain under the superintendency of the outside Delaware Conference presiding elder. In other words, they handed down the decision that, "if our people finance, our superintendents govern." Some fifteen little missions scattered throughout New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and New York, one in New Haven, and one as far away as Boston were lost because of this.

It needs be said that every national issue from the time of the Civil War; Spanish American War, First World War, the Depression, Second World War,

had impact on the Delaware Conference. Migration reflected the definite shift in membership percentage-wise after the First World War. During the depression there was a cut back and loss of members and loss of church property. Tindley Temple became a refuge for the homeless with free feeding to the destitute. The fact that the economy of Delaware and Maryland was so largely based upon trucking, oystering and fishing accounted for much uncertainty as to the matter of pastors' claims and could not afford a sufficient guarantee for building many substantial churches and parsonages. But somehow they continued to go up in increasing numbers. The inability of the Negro in this area to earn other income accounted for the weakening of southern Peninsula churches. It has been noted on a number of occasions that if you were a Negro with training and did not preach or teach, the Peninsula had no use for your skill. Even as late as 1937 a district superintendent reported, "there are but a few industrial plants in the district and they will be found in Salisbury where only a few colored people are employed in the most menial capacities in seasonal occupations."

No Delaware or Maryland community has been worsened by the presence of a Delaware Conference Methodist Church. Scandal has been conspicuously absent in the life of the Delaware Conference family. The great impact has been upon the individual's worth, in addition to the Christian services of baptism, eucharist, marriage as a rule, and burial always this far south. It is no secret that the undertaking parlor in the modern cities has cut this heretofore church function back to a degree.

One of the points of contact between The Methodist church and the white community has been the employment of women members of the Delaware Conference churches by people of the white churches as domestics. This point of contact has probably been more of a two way communication than that between white and Negro preachers of The Methodist Church, even when they have known each other and worked in the same vicinities for many years. Contributions for rallies or mortgage burnings from these households are acknowledged by Delaware Conference preachers.

Two attitudes concerning Negroes that flourished in the thirties were distasteful to them because they were basically false. The first was that Negroes wished to avoid the society of other Negroes. The second, that Negroes have contributed little of significance to anything. The former tended to make Negroes silent on the issue of equality that transcended race. The second justified a light humorous treatment by writers of all that he had done. That the Methodist Episcopal Church—in which we of this area had ever had our being, and to which we had proved our loyalty—showed no greater insight or felt unimpelled to battle this wrong attitude was disturbing. Some less charitable saw in this a deliberate affront in that white Methodism, when it spoke well or saluted a Negro Methodist, selected for citation, not the Methodist preachers of the Delaware Conference. In the Trade Union activities of the thirties, opportunity to challenge and change these evil attitudes were deliberately blueprinted. Instead of any institution of a like manifestation in the Methodist Episcopal Church, we were made aware of the shifting to compromise which resulted in the Central Jurisdiction. When in 1937 the plan of union came before the Delaware Conference the will to repudiate it was so

strong that it took parliamentary maneuvering to allow any proponent the floor. After a half hour debate the vote was:

✠ The Delaware Conference number one man of physical and mental vigor at the time was Davild Henry Hargis. Nobody could take him for white. He was on his way to eighteen years of superintending three districts covering Delaware, Maryland and southern New Jersey. He knew preachers and how to exact their loyalty. He was our representative through the formalities and frustrations. He then hammered out this line, "You've got a preaching place, haven't you? You don't know all you ought to know. You are not as good as you should be. So, study, teach, preach, and pray." The Conference turned inward or isolated if you prefer, turned to religious education rather than to the general program of the Church.

✠ With the coming of Bishop Alexander P. Shaw as resident, little preachers and laymen of little churches came for the first time to know the fellowship of a Methodist bishop. A broad gauged man, he came with a program, a will, and friendliness; followed by Bishop Love whose name inspired the quality, the Delaware Conference gradually adjusted and made effort to grasp and implement the entire program of The Methodist Church. Property values and the pension plan fell in line behind religious education.

The members of the Conference have always acknowledged with respect the efforts of the generations that preceded them. In this vane, Frederick Jackson Handy as district superintendent, wrote in 1913 concerning W. J. Parker, John Emory Webb, I. H. White, W. H. Coffey, A. R. Shockley, and H. A. Monroe who had served the Peninsula in the name of the Delaware Conference. "They led the way—during those pioneer days and sowed the seed—the harvest of which we are now reaping. The past then rising before us as a reality with its achievements, its sacrifices, its joys, commands our reverential respect. The present, with its increased opportunities and responsibilities, claims the best of brain and heart, and a spirit; and the future whose shadowed outline is mirrored ahead, beckons us forward."

"He forgot the steps already trod
And onward urge our way."

✠ The relationship of a social gospel to social service even to the point of being prophetic is found in a 1940 report to the Conference. It made the following points:

1. "The church must be in the forefront in all problems that affect human personality.
2. "The time is past for dealing with our critical condition in pious generalities, but it is high time for concreting them in definite action.
3. "We first desire to call your attention to the fundamental importance

of the home. If there is a breakdown here, it will be hard pulling for the church and the school.

4. "We call upon our churches, especially in the great centers of population to have agencies within the local church to be on the alert for opportunities to make contacts with those who can employ our people.
5. ". . . By 1970 there will be more than fifteen million people sixty-five years of age or older in this country; hence the emphasis being laid upon pension is quite opportune.
6. "We recommend that our churches in the great centers of population have social clinics; agencies that will help the troubled minds of people that come as a result of vexing domestic problems.
7. ". . . it leads us to say that humanity has two alternatives. It's Jesus' way of life or chaos."

The five composing elders had been members of the Conference for forty-five, thirty-one, twenty-eight, twenty-two, and nine years, respectively. They were from Cambridge and Pocomoke in Maryland; Bridgeville and Wilmington in Delaware; and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

What now, do statistics tell us? Did the Delaware Conference do well? We had 1,978 local preachers. Many of them became full members. We had five hundred thirty-five full members. Three hundred twenty-five are in the "cloud of witnesses," one hundred four were members until yesterday. Of the remaining one hundred six, thirty-eight withdrew; fifty-seven, including the eighteen of last year, transferred; three were expelled, four dropped, and the termination of four is not found in the record.

Seventy-two members became presiding elders or district superintendents. They were the big men, the contact men, the eyes and ears of "the Bishop"—and we all know bishops have favorite eye glasses and preferred hearing aids.

The Conference succeeded in making one and a half bishops. The half represents Bishop Alexander P. Camphor, who was a deacon of the Delaware Conference in 1895. Our whole bishop is Noah W. Moore, Jr., whose father faithfully served the Delaware Conference for twenty years.

The membership of 1864, below five thousand, when compared with the membership of 1964, forty-five thousand, looks impressive. It is an eight hundred per cent increase. But the second look reveals that the field of labor of the southern end of the Peninsula was made up of sixty-five thousand Negroes, as late as 1911. The field of labor now is the industrialized Delaware Valley beginning with the City of Wilmington, extending to Chester, Philadelphia, Camden and Trenton among the un-churched thousands who have migrated not only from the Peninsula, but from a broad area of the South.

In 1864, Delaware Conference churches, thirty-four, were valued at \$38,000. In 1964 the value of church property—265 units, was \$13,080,037. This too was an impressive percentage gained. Now we take the second look. A large number of these church buildings are in the Northern urbanized area. They were built thirty or more years ago by affluent Presbyterians, Lutherans, Methodists, and in a few instances by Jews, to suit their needs. When these congregations became suburbia bound those buildings became to them white elephants. Actually they fly in the face of both current Methodist architecture and the needs occasioned by a seven-day-a-week operating church. Moreover, in an age of color television, stained glass windows do not impress my grandson as they did me. Pictures of all white apostles are not of much meaning

to a colored child on relief, fed on Government surplus food. The Delaware Conference did not solve this problem.

✕✕ We are reminded that biography is not history, but I venture the life of Charles A. Tindley is the perfect example of the Delaware Conference in action. Born in 1856, Berlin, Maryland, left motherless, he was bound out as a slave, but somehow came to know the Lord while a young boy. In 1873, at seventeen, he learned to read. Hod carrier by day, correspondence school student by night, he was admitted to the Delaware Conference in 1885 at the age of twenty-nine. There followed twelve years of itineracy in Delaware, New Jersey, and Maryland. In 1897 he was made presiding elder of the Wilmington District. It is to be noted that during these years he "prayed" Frederick A. Cullen into hearing "the call" and into becoming a member of the Delaware Conference. Cullen was destined to be transferred to New York City where he built a humble mission into a great church, Salem, and sired in that challenging environment the brilliant, lamented poet, Countee Cullen. In 1900 Tindley became pastor of Bainbridge Street Church, successor to little old John Wesley there in South Philadelphia, where the Delaware Conference was born. In thirty-three years he guided that congregation through Calvary, East Calvary, into Tindley Temple with a membership larger than that of the entire Conference in 1864. Tindley Temple was the appropriate place for the Delaware Conference to surrender its charter. Between 1901 and 1916 Tindley published "Songs of Paradise." He wrote the words and music for thirteen of them and the words of thirty-three. He almost became a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church. At his death, the roll of Tindley Temple carried 7,000 full members; 3,000 probationary and 2,000 inactive members; a Sunday School of 2,000 pupils and 72 teachers. He raised that year \$650.00 for foreign and \$604.00 for home missions, and for Conference Benevolences \$24,000. The value of the two churches was \$500,000; the indebtedness \$24,000. This was during the depression. Of him it is written, "His towering physique, his commanding voice, his matchless eloquence, his cogent reasoning, his inimitable style and unbounding faith all combined to render him the most popular preacher of his time."

In conclusion, as men and money go, size of membership, outstanding scholarship, large donations, the Delaware Conference was not great. But for stirring up those for whom no one cared; teaching Christ as the doctor to salvation, decency, and dignity; living on little; moving up in qualifications generation by generation; affording opportunity to the willing and able; remaining loyal to the main stream of Methodism through good and evil days, the Delaware Conference was very great. Its record is void of shame. Wrong in principle, it was right in practice, for aside from baptizing and burying the dead of a confused and troubled people, it ever pointed them individually and collectively to the more excellent way of faith wedded to works. Many of us have believed and followed.

The compactness of a Negro conference like the compactness of the Central Jurisdiction has had its satisfaction. Men of like interests, attainments and skills speak therein the common language, "what it means to be black." As a unit, this is fine especially when a number of placements and appointments are guaranteed. I need not tell you of the temptations that lurk in a security although it rests upon acknowledged evil. Poison often does taste sweet. The evil in classification carries inherent limitations based on race that become in-

tensified as we move from the General Church down to the local church. As we love Methodism and The Methodist Church, it is our duty to it, as to our God, to overcome this evil.

This is a new day. It has its confusions but it is my conclusion that our Delaware Conference anchor lines will hold, that our belief in Methodism has been strengthened, especially by the will expressed by the 1964 General Conference. The Church must approach oneness to be the church of the Master. I can conceive of no better place to begin than with those whose ancestors and predecessors began with Methodism before the Revolutionary War.

I am sure you know the lines of the beloved poet, Henry Van Dyke.

Four things a man must learn to do
If he would keep his record true:
To think without confusion clearly,
To love his fellow men sincerely,
To work with honest motive purely,
To trust in God and Heaven securely.

I wish to state that on the record that the Delaware Conference has remained faithful to these ends, but there is one thing further I would say. We have sequence here also. Many years earlier, Henry Van Dyke, the boy, received the following from his father.

This will be to you a most profitable year. Only don't forget to study Christology in the heart as in the head. Only one thing has kept me from shipwreck—Loyalty to Christ.

I have not known a day without a cloud, nor have I known a night without a star, for always LOVE is near, and PRAYER is heard, and FAITH and HOPE abide.

SOME DATES TO BE REMEMBERED

- 1800 The General Conference authorized the ordaining of colored men as deacons.
- 1808 The Quarterly Conference given the right to recommend local preachers for ordination subject to the examination of character and approval of the Annual Conference.
- 1809 Bishop Francis Asbury ordained two black men—Jacob Tapisco and James Champion, local preachers of Zoar.
- 1811 Charges listed for the first time in the Minutes by name—Philadelphia: St. George's, Ebenezer, and Zoar (Negro) on one circuit; Union and Kensington on the other circuit.
- 1819 John Stewart, Negro preacher, became a missionary to the Wyandotte Indians, Upper Sandusky, Ohio. His labors led to the organizing of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Ohio.
- 1822 Zoar Church protested to the Philadelphia Conference against the control of its business by the Trustees of St. George's Church. The petitioner asserts that he had been a member of Zoar upwards of thirty years. (1792).
- 1824 Negro preachers authorized to travel.
- 1826 Zoar organized Mutual Help Societies: 1) Beneficial Philanthropic Sons of Zoar; 2) Female Beneficial Philanthropic Society of Zoar.
- 1832 The "Covenant of Assumption" agreed upon and was to become effective in 1835. This was a plan by which Ebenezer, Salem, Nazareth and Zoar would become separate stations.
- 1844 Petition of Negroes to become full members of a Methodist Conference rejected.
- 1844 General Conference adopted "Plan of Separation."
- 1848 Separate Negro Conferences authorized if thought to be "expedient and practicable" by the Bishop.
- 1844-1866 The Methodist Episcopal Church lost one fourth of its membership to church movements under Negro leadership.
- 1852 First Convention of Colored Local Preachers and Laymen held at Zoar, August 23-27.
- ✓ 1856 General Conference authorized "a conference of Colored Local Preachers."
- ✓ 1857 First Conference of Colored Local Preachers called at Zoar, August 5. A conference was held each succeeding year until 1864.
- 1858 Francis Burns, Negro, consecrated as missionary bishop for Liberia, West Africa.
- ✓ 1864 General Conference adopted the report of the "Committee on the State of the Work Among the People of Color" authorizing the organizing of separate Negro conferences. ✓ Delaware Annual Conference organized, July 29. Washington Annual Conference organized, October 27.
- 1865 Philadelphia Conference passed a resolution "to tender our colored people all needful aid in the way of counsel and advice in their effort to perfect their organization."

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- 1866 General Conference consecrated John W. Roberts, Negro, as missionary bishop for Liberia, West Africa.
- 1868 General Conference seated delegates from the Delaware and Washington Annual Conferences. The first time a delegated Negro was recognized and seated, thus, the Negro was officially represented in the General Church eighty-four years after the organizing of the Methodist Episcopal Church.
- 1920 Election of Negro bishops at the General Conference by special ballots.
- 1939 Plan of Methodist Union adopted.
- 1940 Unification achieved. The Central Jurisdiction becomes a legal reality.
- 1964 General Conference supports dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction toward the creation of an inclusive church. The Central Jurisdiction authorized the processes of transfer, merger, dissolution of itself as a legal entity. Two Negro bishops are assigned to predominantly white areas as general superintendents—James S. Thomas and Prince A. Taylor, Jr.
- 1966 Set as the target date for the complete elimination of the Central Jurisdiction.

X. Miscellaneous

RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised
1956

RULE I.—Decisions

The president shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie vote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III.—Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the presiding officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the presiding officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV.—Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V.—Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.—Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Sessions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the district superintendent to the Conference secretary.

RULE VII.—Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote or speak who is not within the legal limits of the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X.—Non-Debatable Questions

1. To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn to the Conference finally.
2. To suspend the rule.
3. To lay on the table, providing a representative of the committee shall have the right to speak.
4. To take from the table.
5. To call for a previous question.
6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.—Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

1. To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment, or may be laid on the table).
2. To adjourn.
3. To take recess.
4. To order a previous question.
5. To lay on the table.
6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
7. To postpone to a given time.
8. To commit or refer.
9. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.—Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

1. When a member has the floor.
2. When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
3. When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
4. When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non-debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV.—The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motions are pending, the mover shall indicate to what he intended the motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of conference relations.

RULE XV.—Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the presiding officer or secretary.

RULE XVI.—Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if it is subject to such division as he indicates.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.—Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.—Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION**RULE XXI.—Admitted on Trial**

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age.

RULE XXIII.—Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.—Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.—Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.—Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the district superintendents, the host pastor, the Conference lay leader and the president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII.—Program Planning

The Board of Ministerial Training, the Board of Pensions and the Board of Missions shall have authority to plan respectfully the Ordination Service, Memorial Service and the Missionary Sermon, including the selection of respective speakers without regard to district lines. In each instance the program must be approved by the presiding bishop.

RULE XXIX.—Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX.—Pictures in the Journal

Pictures in the Conference Journal shall be limited to: deceased ministers, newly appointed district superintendents, host pastor and the presiding bishop.

RULE XXXI.—Organization of Conference

The secretary shall prepare the resolution of organization for the Delaware Annual Conference after consultation with the Bishop and the Cabinet with the exception of quadrennial officers. The same to be printed in the Pre-Conference Report booklet. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

RULE XXXII.—Elders Orders

Only those persons shall be elected to local elders orders, either man or woman, whose appointment to a charge as a preacher in charge has been requested by the district superintendent.

RULE XXXIII.—Ministers in Retired Relations—Membership on Boards, Commissions and Committees

A minister holding a position on a quadrennial board, commission or committee upon entering the retired relation, may complete the term for which he was elected.

RULE XXXIV.—Membership on Boards and Commissions

A person may not be elected to serve on more than two conference boards or commissions. This rule shall not apply to any person elected to a board or commission by virtue of his office or any representation as provided by the Discipline. This rule shall not pertain to membership on any committee.

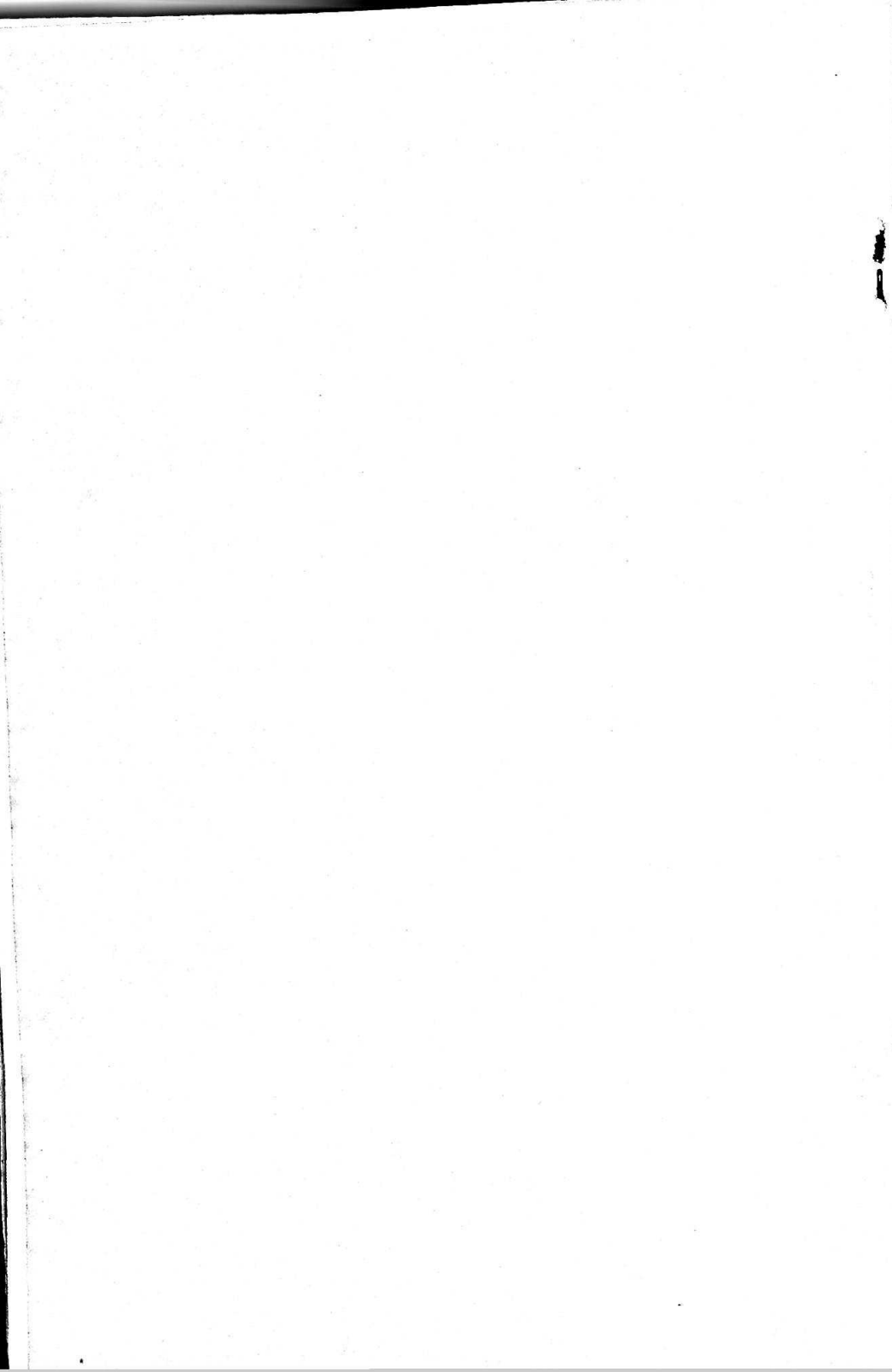
