# MINUTES

OF THE

# Maryland Annual Conference.

The forty-fifth session of the MARYLAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE convened in the Broadway Mission Church, Baltimore, Md., on Wednesday, March 12th, 1873, at 9 o'clock, A. M., and was opened by the President with religious exercises.

D. Wilson and J. E. Maloy were appointed a Committee on Credentials, after which the roll of Ministerial and Lay Members was called.

The President read his official report, and his official character was passed.

The Annual Sermon was preached by Rev. T. D. Valiant.

On motion of R. S. Rowe, the resolution on page 28 of the Mintes of the Annual Conference of 1867, classing Woods-meetings with Camp-meetings, and requiring the President to supply them with ministers, was rescinded.

THURSDAY, March 13th, 1873.

Religious services conducted by A. T. Melvin.

R. S. Rowe was re-elected Conference Steward, Robt. Whinna was re-elected Missionary Steward, and Rev. J. E. Maloy was re-elected Steward of the Superannuated Fund.

J. W. Charlton was re-elected Secretary, who selected as his assistants D. L. Greenfield, and J. D. Kinzer.

L. W. Bates read a report from Western Maryland College, which was referred to the Committee on Literature.

It was

Resolved, That the plan for securing Missionary Collections, by the Envelope System, as adopted by our last Annual Conference be left to the discretion of superintendents, who shall use it at their own expense, or that of the collection in their charge.

A letter from J. E. Darby was read; he was again loaned to the Board of Missions.

Letters and memorial from 1st Methodist Church, Pittsburg, and J. J. Murray, were read and referred to the President and the Executive Committee.

The following were appointed a Special Committee on Virginia District: — A. Webster, L. W. Bates, S. B. Southerland, E. J. Drinkhouse, F. J. Bartlett, W. H. Wheatly.

J. K. Nichols, David Wilson and W. Whitney, Committee, made the following report, which was adopted:

The Committee to whom was referred the statement of the Missionary from Williamsport and Berkeley Mission, concerning the financial embarrassments of Williamsport Church, having carefully considered the statements

and facts presented in Committee, respectfully report: that the Committee are of opinion that the Maryland Annual Conference can exercise no proper supervision in the premises, but express the hope, that by the blessing of the Great Head of the Church, some means may be provided to relieve the Church of all embarrassment.

FRIDAY, March 14th.

Conference was opened with religious exercises conducted by I. T. Adkins.

A letter was presented from William Dale, asking for the renewal of his Elder's Credentials, which request was granted.

On motion of J. K. Nichols, it was

Resolved, That G. W. Bishop be, and he is hereby appointed an Agent of the Conference to procure from the Maryland Legislature an Act, enabling the Maryland Conference to receive a lagacy of \$300 from the estate of Mrs. Horne, and that R. S. Rowe be authorized to receive the said legacy from the executor of the estate on behalf of the Conference.

J. E. Maloy, of the Committee on Unfinished Business, reported as follows:

The Committee on Unfinished Business report the following: —The fourth and fifth Resolutions of a paper signed by A. Webster, J. K. Nichols and others, to wit:

4. Resolved, That this Conference recommends the next General Conference to substitute for Article 12 of the Constitution, the following:

#### ARTICLE 12. .

- I. Each Annual Conference shall have power to define the terms of suffrage and eligibility to office within its own district.
- II. No person shall be eligible as a representative to the General Conference until he shall have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been in full membership two years.
- 5. Resolved, That the Secretary shall send a copy of the proposed amendment to each of the Annual Conferences, with a respectful request that they unite with us in the foregoing recommendation.

The report was adopted, and also the following offered by L. W. Bates:

To amend the Section 3 of Article 8 in the Constitution, by striking out the word "joint," and adding at the end of the Section the following: unless the

College shall determine to elect by order, then it shall require a majority of the laymen present to elect a Lay-representative, and a majority of the ministers present to elect a Ministerial-representative.

J. J. Murray, E. J. Drinkhouse and O. Hammond, Special Committee on the memorial from the Bethany Independent Methodist Church, reported the following: — which was adopted.

Resolved, that the application of the Bethany Independent Methodist Church be favorably commended to the President; that the said Church be supplied with a preacher for the coming year under the disciplinary provision for supplying churches belonging to other denominations, provided the exigencies of our own District and those of other Methodist Protestant Churches dependent upon us for ministerial supply, will permit.

On motion of J. T. Murray,

Resolved, That a recommendation from the Faculty of Instruction to the Committee on Itinerancy be required, in the case of all applications for the Itinerancy.

Conference resolved itself into the Home Missionary Society.

SATURDAY, March 15th, 1873.

Opening devotional services were conducted by James Thompson.

L. W. Bates, J. R. Nichols and R. S. Norris, Committee, made the following report, which was adopted:

Whereas, Broadway Church is unable to support a pastor, pay its debts, or even to legalize the mortgage upon which it borrowed the sum of \$2500, and is dependent upon the good offices of this Conference in its behalf, Therefore

Resolved I. That the Missionary appropriation to Broadway Mission for last year, be and hereby is increased by the addition of \$500; and that said additional \$500 be provided for in the assessments of this Conference session, and be paid over to the incoming pastor of said Church during the coming Conference year.

Resolved II. That Broadway Mission be, and hereby is set off as a

Station, under the name and title of Broadway Station.

Resolved III. That we hereby urge the incoming pastor, and the membership of Broadway to incorporate themselves under the Act of 1868, legalize the illegal mortgage, and make an earnest effort to pay off the Church debt; and that we commend the pressing pecuniary necessities of said Church to the liberal consideration of our entire membership in the Maryland District so soon as the present mortgage shall be duly legalized.

### On motion of J. T. Murray,

Resolved, That this Conference recognizes the importance of the work of Foreign Missions; and as we have no channel of our own through which the contributions of the Church may be made available in foreign mission fields, we recommend the co-operation of the Church with some sister Church engaged in such work.

Resolved, That we have a high appreciation of the management and operations of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and recommend the formation of societies auxiliary thereto in our Churches, or co-operation with the Society now existing is connection with East Baltimore Station.

#### On motion of D. Wilson,

Resolved, That on the Sabbaths of the ensuing Conference year on which the Superannuated Fund collections are lifted, we recommend that a memorial sermon be preached, commemorative of the deceased ministers of the Maryland Annual Conference.

The following brethren were introduced, and addressed the Conference as fraternal messengers from the bodies which they represented; viz: Revs. A. W. Wilson and Samuel Rodgers, of the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South; W. Collier and A. Clark, of the Pittsburg Conference of the Methodist Church; H. P. F. King of the West Virginia Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church; J. J. White of the Attorney St. Methodist Protestant Church of N. Y. City; J. K. Hembold of the Pennsylvania Conference, Methodist Protestant Church.

The Conference received a message of fraternal greeting from the New York Conference of the Methodist Church by telegram, and the President and Secretary of the Conference were authorized to reply by the same mode of communication.

H. C. Cushing, W. M. Strayer, W. S. Hammond and Pere Wilmer, Committee on Itinerancy and Orders, reported as follows:

#### Report adopted.

R. S. Norris, F. Swentzell, and F. Etchison, a Committee appointed at the last Conference, "to procure a lithographic design

for Juvenile Life-Membership Card, for the use of our Sabbath Schools," reported that they had concluded their labors. The card presented, they hoped, would meet with the favorable consideration of the Conference.

The thanks of the Conference were tendered the Committee for their service.

On motion of D. W. Bates,

Resolved, That we recommend the next General Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church to substitute the word Pastor for Superintendent, wherever it occurs in the Constitution and Discipline of the Church.

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to report this action to the different Annual Conferences.

Adjourned with prayer by J. J. Murray.

Monday, March 12, 1873.

Conference opened with religious services, conducted by A. D. Melvin.

The item of the report of Committee on Boundaries, relating to Pocomoke Circuit was adopted.

L. W. Bates and R. S. Norris, reported as follows:

Your Committee on Broadway Church would further report, that the Broadway Church authorities be required to transfer their property to the Home Missionary Society, in a legal form, so soon as they legalize the pending mortgage.

Report adopted.

The following report and accompanying resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the above money be paid over to the authorities of Broadway Church so soon as they legalize the Guion mortgage.

On motion of T. B. Bateman,

Resolved, That ministers receiving appointments under the stationing authority of this Conference, be, and they are hereby requested to call the attention, and urge upon the members of their respective charges, the importance of a more prompt and faithful attendance upon the means of grace, known in this Church as Class-meetings.

The following from the Committee on Virginia District, was adopted:

The Special Committee to whom certain papers relating to the Virginia Conference was referred, beg to submit that the necessities of the Virginia Conference are such as to commend it to this Conference for its countenance and assistance. Your Committee therefore, in view of the facts, recommend a supply for the following points in the Virginia Conference, viz: Lynchburg, Norfolk, Heathsville Circuit, Campbell and Otter Mission. Deeming the interests of these localities wowly of attention, and considering the fact, that by granting the ministerial supply asked for, several hundred members of the Virginia Conference, with ten or twelve churches, worth at least \$30,000, will be secured to the Methodist Protestant Church, and the hearts of our brethren gladdened thereby, thus giving them reason to hope that the Great Head of the Church will bless their labors, and make them strong and prosperous as in the years past. All of which is respectfully submitted in the absence of the Chairman.

The report of the Special Committee on Book Concern was received, and the Committee discharged.

D. W. Bates, A. J. Fairbanks, and David Wilson reported as follows:

The Committee to whom was referred the letters from the Colored Methodist Protestant Church of Charleston, South Carolina, beg leave to report as follows:

1. They find in one of the letters the sum of \$15.50 to be distributed to various beneficiaries connected with this Conference. The Committee have distributed the money as directed by the letter.

2. Said letter represents the Church as being in a prosperous condition, having added a net increase of ninety to its membership during the past

3. Resolved, That this Church, in its isolated condition, has our prayers and sympathies for its success and prosperity.

Report adopted.

A paper was presented by W. M. Strayer, in reference to a division of the Conference district, and referred to the following Committee, to be reported on at our next Annual Session: D. W. Bates, B. F. Benson, and J. W. Thompson.

Adjourned with prayer by E. R. McGregor.

TUESDAY, March 18, 1873.

Conference opened in usual form by J. L. Straughan.

R. S. Griffith, from Committee on Boundaries, made the following recommendations, which were adopted:

1. That White Marsh and Gideon appointments on Severn Circuit be added to Anne Arundel Circuit, and that the latter be supplied with a married and single minister.

2. That Talbot C'rcuit be divided, setting off Easton as a Station; leaving Oxford, Trappe and Bambury to constitute Talbot Circuit.

I Shrows C T Cochel and I E Nicholson made

J. Shreeve, C. T. Cochel and J. E. Nicholson made the following report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools beg leave to offer the following as their report:

Whereas, The grand work of the Sabbath School is the early conversion of the children, therefore,

1. Resolved, That we recommend a monthly prayer-meeting to be held in all the Schools.

2. That the practice of memorizing Scripture by each Scholar be at once

3 That R. S. Norris, F. Swentzel, and E. B. Bates be appointed a Committee to secure a list of the most approved Sabbath School Books, as a guide for those selecting Libraries.

4. That we recommend the uniform lessons to be used in all the Schools.
5. That we continue our Annual Conference Sabbath School Convention, and that R. S. Norris, F. Swentzel, and E. J. Drinkhouse be constituted a committee of arrangements.

6. That we recommend to the favorable consideration of Superintendents the Sunday School Paper published by the Methodist Book Concern in Pittsburgh, Pa.

James K. Nichols from the Committee on Literature made a report, which after amendment, was adopted.

The report of the Special Committee upon the papers presented by H. P. Jordan was considered, and finally laid upon the table.

#### J. L. Mills, Chairman, reported as follows:

The Committee on Bible Cause beg leave to report that the amount of collections aggregated \$201,45. There were 4 Stations, 19 Circuits and 6 Missions; in all 29 charges in this State, which neglected or failed to take collection for this purpose.

Your Committee recommend,

I. That the amount thus paid be applied to making James K. Nichols and Daniel W. Bates, Life Directors; John R. Nichols and A. Copenhaver, Life Members.

II. That, Whereas the salvation of the world is in a great degree dependent on the circulation of God's Word, this collection be considered a regular Conference collection, the failure to lift which may constitute a barrier to the passage of the official character of the delinquent.

III. That blanks furnished to be filled by the Superentendents have Bible Cause, either printed or written, in the list of items to be reported upon, so that Superintendents may not fail to report this with the other col-

Conference resolved itself into the Superannuated Fund Society.

WEDNESDAY, March 19th, 1873.

Conference opened by J. B. Jones, with religious services.

On motion, the Treasurer of the Missionary Society was author-

ized to pay the Book Concern the money loaned for the Juvenile Missionary plate.

#### J. R. Nichols, Chairman, made the following report:

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following report upon the subject of Temperance.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Conference, that Intemperance is one of the most gigantic evils of the age, and a formidable barrier to the success of the Church.

Resolved, That we hail with pleasure the increased interest manifested by the friends of Temperance, outside the Church, and recommend the co-operation of our people, with the effort to secure protective legislation against this evil.

Resolved, That we memorialize the next General Conference of our Church to give us such ecclesiastical legislation, as will protect the Churches from the pernicious influences of all rum-selling and rum-drinking members, and will so instruct our delegates.

Resolved, That we approve of the Conference Temperance Convention, and recommend the same Committee of Arrangement, and Thursday evening, 7½ o'clock, second day of the Conference, as the time it shall be held.

Resolved, That we recommend that each Itinerant Minister and Preacher in our District preach at least once at each of his appointments during the year upon this subject, and recommend the formation of Juvenile Temperance Societies in our Sunday Schools.

Resolved, That these resolutions be published in the Methodist Protestant some time during the month of May, as well as in our Minutes.

The following Resolutions, offered by J. J. Murray, were adopted:

Resolved, That there be appointed Fraternal Messengers, to convey to the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, the Christian greetings of this body; to express to our brethren of the Baltimore Conference our high appreciation of their repeated acts of fraternal courtesy, and to assure them that the presence and remarks of their Messengers, Rev. Alpheus Wilson, and Rev. Samuel Rogers, D. D., not only gave us pleasure, but inspired us with increased regard for the Messengers themselves, and for the body which they represent.

Resolved, That there be appointed Fraternal Messengers to the Pittsburgh Conference of the Methodist Church. That these Messengers be authorized to assure our brethren of the Pittsburgh Conference that we reciprocate their feelings of brotherly regard and of desire for more intimate relations between their Church and our own. That we were highly gratified by the visit and Christian bearing of their messengers, Rev. William Collier, D. D., and Rev. Alexander Clark; and that the subject of union referred to in the resolutions of the General Conference of the Methodist Church, and brought to our notice by Dr. Collier, is commended to the candid consideration of our own people everywhere.

Resolved, That the visit of Rev. J. J. White, of the New York Conference, Methodist Church, is also highly appreciated.

Resolved, That there be appointed Fraternal Messengers to visit the Virginia Conference; the West Virginia Conference; the Pennsylvania Conference

ence; the North Carolina Conference, and the Holston Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, with assurances of our sympathy and earnest desire for their prosperity.

Resolved, That Rev. M. J. Langhorne and Charles W. Button, Esq., of the Virginia Conference, Rev. H. P. F. King, of the West Virginia Conference, and Rev. J. K.
