OF THE

Maryland Annual Conference.

The forty-seventh session of the MARYLAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE convened in the Starr Church, Baltimore, Md., on Wednesday, March 10th, 1875, at 9 o'clock A. M., and was opened by the President, who read the 46th Psalm, the 15th chapter of Revelation, announced the 557th Hymn, and offered prayer.

The Missionary Society met in Anniversary exercises at 7.30 P. M. Devotional exercises conducted by J. B. Jones.

S. B. Southerland, President of the Society, in the chair.

Appropriate addresses were delivered by J. M. Holmes and J. R. Nichols, after which collections were made and contributions secured amounting to \$257 27.

SATURDAY, *March 13th, 1875.*

Conference opened with devotional exercises by W. M. Strayer.

The report of the Faculty of Instruction, L. W. Bates, President, was received and considered by items, when the following brethren were elected to Elders' Order: F. T. Little, R. L. Lewis, J. B. Butler, S. G. Sullivan, W. R. Graham, A. D. Melvin, S. B. Tredway, T. O. Crouse, H. T. Gernhardt and G. F. Kindley.

The report of the Committee on the report of the Board of Trustees of Western Maryland College was taken up and, after amendment, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE W. Md. COLLEGE.

Your Committee have examined the Report of the Board of Trustees of Western Maryland College, referred to them, and their attention has been especially attracted to a few items of significant importance contained in it.

The Report, as a whole, is a comprehensive and admirable exhibit of the College in all its relations—condition, prosperity and needs.

2. The Board of Trustees claim that they hold the Institution, with all its interests, in trust for the Methodist Protestant Church. This is emphasized as a fact. Here, then, is an institution of learning in full operation, with a competent corps of teachers; its course of study of a high grade, with one hundred and thirteen students enrolled for the year; its buildings commodious and eligibly located; under the control of the Methodist Protestant Church, where her sons and daughters may be thoroughly educated in every branch of science, theoretical and practical, that is adapted to fit them for usefulness in every department of the human economy; where, also, her future ministers may be prepared to take rank in learning, piety, and influence with their co-laborers in any other denomination. A providential hand has dropped this inestimable blessing into the Methodist Protestant lap to be fostered for the promotion of the great cause that lies nearest her heart.

3. They, the Board, show that the property alone is worth, in round numbers, \$34,000, an investment the dividends of which lie at the foundation of our glory as a Church, and perpetuity as a denomination. Our present material interest in the concern, as a Church, is about \$16,000. Its liabilities, \$18,000.

Is it for our interest to pay this debt? By paying \$18,000 we save \$16,000, and then have in possession \$34,000.

Here is a case that seldom happens, that by paying a debt the whole amount paid is returned to us. That is the Providential aspect of this case.

4. The plan for raising the amount of this indebtedness of \$18,000 as suggested by the Board of Trustees, is endorsed by your Committee, and is as follows:— This Conference shall apportion that amount, in the form of assessments, among the Stations, Circuits, and Missions pro rata, on the basis of the President's salary, payable in five annual installments. The President's salary is \$2,000. The debt is \$18,000. The annual assessment will be \$3,600. For instance, the Station that is assessed by the Finance Committee \$50, will be assessed for the debt per annum for three years, \$90.

5. But your Committee do not recommend laying a burden on our people without an equivalent in return. While the apportionment here recommended is made by authority of the Annual Conference and creates a firm obligation on the charges, it is also recommended that the College Trustees shall secure each charge in the amount assessed, and thereby create in its right a preferred lien on the College property in the following manner: As the amount of the respective assessments shall be paid, the said trustees shall issue their bond for the same to the Maryland Educational Endowment Society of the Methodist Protestant Church of Baltimore City.

6. It is also recommended by your Committee, in furtherance of this plan, that the Annual Conference do enjoy upon each Superintendent the duty of securing the amount apportioned to his particular charge, and also make a conscientious discharge of this duty a condition to passing his character.

MONDAY, *March 15th*, 1875.

The Conference opened with religious exercises, conducted by S. A. Hoblitzell.

The Report of the Committee on Boundaries was amended and adopted as follows:

- 1st. That Crumpton Circuit be changed to a Mission.
- 2d. That Potomac Mission be divided, setting off Gum Spring, Oak Grove, and St. John's Appointments, and be constituted a new charge, to be called Prince William Mission.
- 3d. That Deer Creek and Mt. Tabor Appointments, now belonging to Bel Air Circuit, be set off and constituted a separate charge, to be called Deer Creek Circuit.
- 4th. That Norrisville Appointment, on Stewartstown Circuit, be transferred to Peach Bottom Mission.
- 5th. That Galena Appointment be added to Warwick Circuit.
- 6th. Recommended that the case of Union Appointment, of Pocomoke Circuit, be referred to the Quarterly Conference of Pocomoke Circuit and Salisbury Mission.

The report of the Committee on Superintendents' Reports and Official Character was read and the character of all the Ministers was passed.

L. W. Bates, Chairman of the Committee on Itinerancy, recommended for reception P. T. Hall, W. W. White, C. S. Arnett, J. M. Sheridan; all of whom were, on motion, received into the itinerancy.

A second report of the Committee on Boundaries was read and adopted, as follows:

- 1st. Recommended that a Committee of five, composed of three ex-pastors and two Laymen, be appointed to arrange and adjust the parsonage property interest between Bel Air and Deer Creek Circuits, one of the Laymen to be chosen from each Circuit. *Committee*—D. A. Shermer, J. R. Nichols, J. Roberts, J. K. Rogers and J. H. Barrow.
- 2d. Recommended that Broadway Station be constituted a Mission.

WM. DALE, *Chairman*.

The report of the Committee on Superannuated Claimants was read at 12.45, and laid on the table for 24 hours.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That Dr. H. F. Zollickoffer be, and he is hereby appointed the agent of this Conference, to whom all moneys collected on the debt of Western Maryland College shall be paid, and that he be directed to pay over said moneys to the trustees of said College upon the transfer to "The Maryland Educational Endowment Society of the Methodist Protestant Church, of Baltimore City," of the liens by which said debt is secured, and not otherwise.

Resolved, That we now re-elect H. F. Zollickoffer, L. J. Cox, Dr. J. W. Her-ring, D. W. Bates and E. J. Drinkhouse as the Directors of "The Maryland Educational Society of the Methodist Protestant Church, of Baltimore City."

The report of the Committee to whom the communication from H. T. Gernhardt, trustee of the property given in trust by the Phœbean Society, was received and adopted, as follows:

1st. That the sum of twenty-five dollars, collected on account of general rent, be placed in the hands of the President for distribution among such Ministers as have come to Conference deficient in their salaries.

2d. That the trustee take legal counsel with reference to the sale of the property and the transfer of the proceeds to the Superannuated Fund Society of the Maryland Annual Conference.

3d. That if it is found that such sale of the property and direction of the proceeds can be legally made, then the trustee be requested to have such transfer made as soon as practicable.

Signed by order of the Committee.

Dr. H. F. Zollickoffer presented a paper on the Presidential Parsonage, which was referred without reading to the Committee on Finance.

Conference took a recess to give place to a meeting of the Superannuated Fund Society, which was organized with T. D. Valiant in the Chair, and T. O. Crouse Secretary pro tem.

H. F. Zollickoffer, Treasurer, presented his report, which was adopted.

The following Article, which was offered by H. C. Cushing at the last annual session and laid over for one year, was taken up and adopted:

Any minister of the Maryland Annual Conference having served the Church in the itinerancy for twenty-five years, shall, with the consent of the Conference, if he so desire, have the right to retire from the active work, without detriment to his claims or those of his family on the Superannuated Fund Society, whenever his condition and circumstances, or those of his family, under the present rules of the Conference, would grant a superannuated relation.

Society adjourned to meet at 7.30 P. M., in Anniversary.

Society met pursuant to adjournment at 7.30 P. M., E. J. Drinkhouse, Vice-President, in the chair. Religious exercises conducted by J. M. Elderdice.

Anniversary addresses were delivered by J. E. Read and J. R. Nichols, after which subscriptions and collections were made aggregating \$313.44.

TUESDAY, *March 16th*, 1875.

The Conference opened with religious services, conducted by J. B. Jones.

The roll was called, when, on motion, Hermon Pyles was recognized as delegate from Deer Creek Circuit.

The list of Standing Committees were called, when J. L. Mills, Chairman of the Committee on Sabbath Schools, laid the report of that Committee on the table.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was taken up and considered by items; the preamble and first item were adopted, and after a protracted discussion, the report was recommitted.

The Conference granted the Chairman of the Committee on Missions permission to make a partial report.

J. W. Charlton moved that we now proceed to collect \$1,314, the amount required to pay the appropriations of last year. After a lengthy discussion, the previous question was called and the original motion was adopted.

On motion, the list of Stations, Circuits and Missions was called to ascertain the amount of deficiencies and what amount thereof would be pledged by the first of May, when \$247.35 were assumed by the charges.

An appeal was then made to the audience by D. A. Shermer, and \$359 were contributed—in all, \$606.65, leaving still a deficiency of \$706.95.

On motion of E. J. Drinkhouse, it was resolved that when we adjourn, it be to meet at 7½ P. M. The hour for adjournment arrived and the Conference stood adjourned.

The Committee on the President's Report submitted the following, which was considered by items and adopted:

The Committee to whom was referred the President's Report, have given it a most careful—we might say, prayerful consideration.

On the very threshold of the report, after paying a suitable tribute to the memory of one who has passed from labor to reward, the President has given us the particulars of a case which has been productive of much diversity of opinion and feeling. Your Committee cannot too highly approve the candid, impartial and truly Christian manner in which he has detailed the particulars and submitted the case to the judgment of the Conference.

It is a source of the keenest regret to your Committee (in which most surely the Conference participates) that the brethren at East Baltimore should have felt themselves impelled to pursue the course they have. Of unimpeached and unimpeachable loyalty to the principles of the Methodist Protestant Church; with a past history of devotion to its ministers that may well be envied by any congregation in our bounds; with a record on the minutes of every Annual Conference, from the organization of the Church to this unfortunate occurrence, that will compare favorably with any sister church, we reiterate our regrets, and more especially that it should have occurred with one, whom his brethren had honored by electing him to the highest position in their gift, and upon whom the evidences of age are fast accumulating, and that strength which has been freely spent in your service, giving place to the feebleness of advanced life. All these things your Committee have most carefully considered, (not forgetting the fact of the violations of the law and the disregard of executive authority). But inasmuch as the right of appeal on the part of a Circuit or Station has been freely discussed and has many friends, (having been presented for the action of the last General Conference, and its consideration waived for want of jurisdiction); and inasmuch as East Baltimore declined all ministerial supply, save that of a Methodist Protestant; and inasmuch as she has her representative here and asks and expects her supply at our hands, and has contributed of her means to all the charities of Conference, your Committee are clear in their convictions that nothing can be gained by harshness, but that we shall only be imitating the example of our blessed Master if we freely and entirely forgive whatever we may think amiss in her course, and extend the same cordial relations as of old.

The succeeding items of the report are the usual routine duties of the President, and met your approval as they were detailed to you.

We deeply regret the difficulties which occurred at the Broadway Station, and heartily endorsing the President's course, we recommend the following resolutions as expressing the sense of this Conference:

Resolved, That Rev. Joseph P. Wilson, by his own act of withdrawal on the 3d day of December, 1874, did then cease to be a member and Minister of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church.

Resolved, That each and every one of the former members of Broadway Station, Methodist Protestant Church, who voted for the resolutions of severance passed at a meeting held in that church on Monday night, December 14th, 1874, did by that act, then and there, cease to be members of the said Broadway Station, M. P. Church.

Resolved, That, as we confidently expect the remaining and adhering members of that Station to be shortly repossessed of their Church property, the President be requested to furnish a ministerial supply to Broadway Church as usual, in accordance with the application of the Delegate from that Church.

Our beloved President has traveled weary miles and dispensed the Word to many hearers; the results belong to God, who will suitably reward him for his faithful ministrations.

The report of the Committee on Literature was taken up and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON LITERATURE.

The report of the Book Directory, covering the period of eight months up to the first of March, presents quite a gratifying exhibit. The Directory has fully carried out the directions of the late Convention. The report shows the paper to have been self-sustaining for that period, notwithstanding its enlargement and the employment of a paid editor. The subscription list has been considerably enlarged, but not to that extent which is both necessary and possible. To make the paper remunerative, the list should reach at least five thousand. This limit, your Committee think, with proper effort, might be reached before the close of the present volume. But this result will depend largely upon the zeal of the members of the Church within this District, for, the local papers established within the bounds and under the patronage of other Conferences, must, in the nature of things, injuriously affect the circulation of the *Methodist Protestant* in those sections.

Under the efficient management of the editor, Rev. E. J. Drinkhouse, the long established reputation of our Church organ is fully sustained, and the promise is given of its increasing value as a religious family journal.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following:

Resolved, That we as a Conference pledge ourselves to increased effort to extend the circulation of the *Methodist Protestant* during the present Conference year.

Resolved, That Rev. P. L. Wilson, Agent of the Western Maryland College, having consented to become travelling agent for the paper, it is hereby recommended to the Book Directory to employ him in that capacity.

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools would report as follows :

Resolved, 1st. That we consider the Sabbath School interest one of the most vital interests of the Church.

That in order to bind the Church and Sabbath School more closely together, we recommend that in Stations the morning service of the 5th Sabbath in the month be appropriated to a Children's Sermon or Service; and in Circuits that one sermon annually, at least, be preached to the children at each appointment, and that at these services a collection be lifted for the S. School.

Resolved, 3d. That a Teachers' Meeting be held weekly wherever practicable.

Resolved, 4th. That we continue our Annual S. School Convention, with the request that the President of the Conference appoint a Committee to arrange a programme of said Convention. But we would respectfully suggest to that Committee the propriety of using a part of the evening for illustrating the practical work of S. Schools by having some one give an infant class lesson, and a black-board exercise for the benefit, especially, of persons who have not had the advantage of attending institutes.

Resolved, 5th. That we request the editor of the *Methodist Protestant* to give comments on the uniform lessons, either original or copied, in each issue of the paper.

Resolved, 6th. That while we recommend the use of the uniform lessons, we insist upon the use of our Catechisms in our families and S. Schools.

Resolved, 7th. Not being aware of the extent of the work performed by the Committee on S. School Institutes, we are unable to recommend any action for the future in that particular.

WHEREAS, Experience has taught us that, in the prosecution of any good cause, it is necessary to employ such a variety of means as may be adapted to meet the various views of the friends of the cause, who are all laboring for the same end, and the various phases of opposition to the cause on the part of its enemies, that such opposition may be overcome and these enemies may be either converted to the good cause or prevented from hindering its progress; and WHEREAS, In the cause of Temperance, (which we regard as eminently entitled to be designated a good cause), the Maryland State Temperance Alliance is pursuing the method, thus taught by experience, to be necessary to success; therefore,

1. *Resolved*, That we, the members of the Maryland Annual Conference, do hereby pledge ourselves to do all in our power to promote the cause of Temperance, as occasion may require and opportunity be afforded in the several charges which we represent.

2. *Resolved*, We congratulate the Maryland State Temperance Alliance on the success of its efforts for the overthrow of the license system, and we heartily encourage the establishment and endeavor to promote the success of well-conducted and attractive *Temperance Eating Houses*, and give our influence towards discouraging public establishments where ardent spirits are sold as beverages.

F. Swentzell, Chairman of the Committee, read an obituary of Rev. JOHN ELDERDICE, a lamented deceased member of this Conference, which was ordered to be printed in the Minutes.

The Rev. JOHN ELDERDICE was born in Frederick County, Md., July 14th, 1814, and was born again in the 20th year of his age. One night, when alone in his bed chamber, while meditating upon the great provisions of the atonement, and praying for a personal experience of its saving power, he received the baptism of fire. His testimony was clear as to the genuineness of this inward work and adoption into the divine family, which he regarded as the greatest event of his life, changing his character and destiny. He was a devout man, believing in the efficiency of prayer; he enjoyed daily communion with God in public and private. Such was his devotion to religious principles, nothing could induce him to do what he believed to be wrong. Although modest and retiring in disposition, he was always first in opposing wrong and defending the right. He was honest, upright, and conscientious in his dealings, and exhibited the elements of Christian character in the sacred precincts of his family and in his pastoral relations with his people. For nearly forty years he honored his holy profession by an irreproachable character, and thus attained the altitude of human greatness. In his conversion, he received the impression God had called him to the work of the Ministry. He united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at Tom's Creek Chapel, near Emmettsburg; was licensed to exhort, and subsequently, by the Quarterly Conference of Gettysburg Circuit, to preach the Word. A Church difficulty occurred involving a question of interest, which directed him to examine the ecclesiastical polity of the Methodist Episcopal and Methodist Protestant Churches, which led him to believe in the rights of the laity to equal representation in the councils of the Church; readily decided to unite with the latter, and was received by the Quarterly Conference of Pipe Creek Circuit of the Methodist Protestant Church. In the fall of 1837, he was employed by the President, Rev. Isaac Webster, as assistant preacher on Shippensburg Circuit. At the next session of the Conference, was received as a probationary member. Realizing his responsibilities, he consecrated himself to his holy office; he was studious in his habits, read the best authors, diligent in the acquisition of knowledge, improved his time and facilities to qualify himself for the work, and was regarded by those who knew him as a good theologian.

His sermons were carefully prepared; methodically arranged and preached earnestly the doctrines of the Gospel, with simplicity and perspicuity. He labored under some physical defects of utterance, so that his sermons did not awaken the appreciation they merited, except to the thoughtful, who recognized careful preparation. But for this impediment in articulation, he would have been classed with the most popular men of his day. For thirty years he has upborne the blessed standard with a self-sacrificing spirit and heroic courage. God crowned his ministry with revivals of religion in the several fields of his labors, and he was among the most useful of our body. As a writer his style was attractive; his fancy clothed his thoughts in beautiful imagery; his themes were scented with roses. Under the signature of "Uncle Toby," living in the shadow of the mountain, he prepared a series of articles for the *Protestant*. These papers created considerable interest, and many inquired, "Who is 'Uncle Toby'?" They were eagerly read, and called forth many favorable comments. His intellect was shrouded in darkness for some four and a-half years, the primary cause of which we shall never know. The diseases of the brain and nervous system are involved in great obscurity, and are beyond the ken of philosophical research. We know but little of the primary causes which disturb the relation of reason with the brain. Every mind, severely taxed, is liable to be dethroned, just as the body may be enervated by too much labor, and invite disease. The loss of reason is the greatest of all calamities. Whatever may have been the exciting cause which has resulted so sadly in depriving him of the joy of conscious existence, the family of his presence, and the Church of his usefulness, it is our privilege to trust to God's providence, although inscrutable to our finite comprehension. A friend of the family requested a Sister of Charity to pray for him. She responded, "Mr. Elderdice prays enough for us all. He must have been a very good man; he is good now in his moments of excitement. I never knew him to be profane." When specially excited, he spent his strength in praying and preaching the Gos-

pel, and, it may be, some precious truth uttered has been a blessing to some in that institution. It was not his privilege to testify in the mortal hour to the power of the Gospel, which he had taught and by which he lived. Who of us needs such testimony from his lips? A long life of earnest piety furnishes stronger evidence of a fitness for heaven than a few brief utterances in death. His record on earth is written; his name is stricken from the roll of living men; he has reached the goal of his journey as a good man. What an epitaph to be written upon life's completed history! and what a name to bequeath to posterity! Brother Elderdice is dead! No, he has just begun to live. He has gone up to the enjoyments of a higher sphere—to comprehend in conscious intelligence his glorious home, and to mingle in blessed fellowship with Webster, Stier, Henkle, Reese, Varden, Roby, Wright, Bowers, and others of precious memory, and with the general assembly and Church of the First Born. Brother Elderdice died on the 9th of July, 1874. Memorial services were held in the Lexington Street M. P. Church, Baltimore; sermon by Rev. F. Swentzell. Appropriate remarks by Rev. L. W. Bates, D. D.; prayer by Rev. H. P. Jordan. His remains were buried in Mt. Gilead Church-yard, Baltimore county. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. A. D. Dick.

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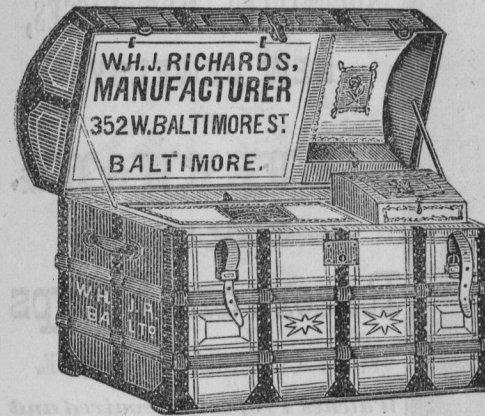
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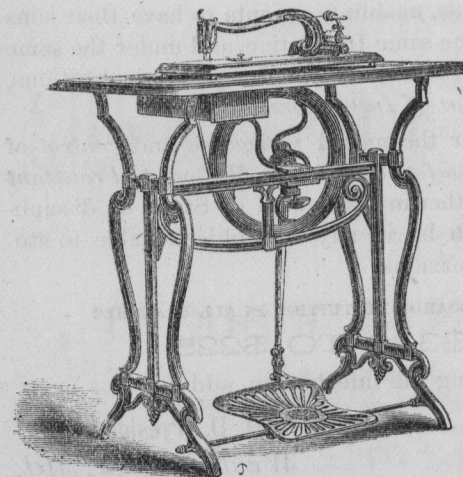
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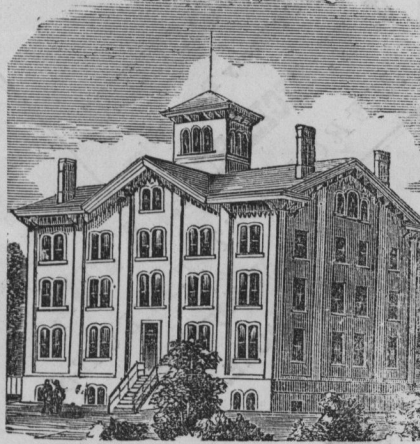
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
