# Maryland Annual Conference.

The Forty-Ninth Session of the Maryland Annual Conference convened in the Methodist Protestant Church, in Westminster, Md., on Wednesday, March 14th, 1877, at 9 o'clock A. ### THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY MORNING, March 16th, 1877.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Superannuated Fund was received and read, and referred to the Superannuated Fund Society.

Resolutions in reference to the Women's Foreign Mission work were adopted, as follows:

Resolved, That we earnestly recommend to the women of our Church, that they organize Societies, auxiliary to the Women's Foreign Missionary Society.

Resolved, That where auxiliary Societies are formed in any of the local churches of the Maryland District, the money collected by the children of these churches respectively, may be paid to the said auxiliary Societies.

Resolved, That it be, and is hereby made the duty of the Superintendents of Circuits, Stations, and Missions, to enlist their Sabbath Schools in behalf of Foreign Missionary work.

Resolved. That they request the children of each school to collect money for Foreign Missions at a specified date in the Conference year.

Resolved, That these collections be made in the third week of June next, in the city schools, and in the second week in July or the second week in September in the country schools.

Resolved, That these collections be forwarded by the Superintendents, without delay, to the Editor of the "Methodist Protestant," to be by him paid over to the proper authorities of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of Baltimore.

E. J. Drinkhouse reported that the deed of the Norfolk Church property had been properly signed and handed over to the proper authorities, after which the Society adjourned, to meet in Anniversary Exercises at  $7\frac{1}{2}$  o'clock P. M.

The Anniversary Meeting of the Missionary Society was held at 7½ o'clock, P. M., when the annual addresses were delivered by J. B. Jones and F. Swentzel, after which collections were made. Nineteen life-memberships were subscribed, and \$73.00 annual dues were paid in.

Conference resumed its session.

The Report of the Committee on Literature, which was under consideration at the close of the morning session, was adopted, as follows:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LITERATURE.

The Committee on Literature, having carefully considered the Report of the Book Directory and accompanying papers, beg leave, in the outset, to express in general terms their approbation of the past management of the Concern, and their confidence in the plans adopted for the future promotion of the interests under its care. We especially commend to the attention of the Conference the plan submitted by the Directory for putting "The Methodist Protestant" upon a more substantial basis, which includes the raising of a fund, on the principle of subscriptions to be made by one hundred persons, of \$20 each, in part, as advanced payment on subscription for the paper, and in part in trust, to be re-

funded with interest so soon as the Concern shall find itself in circumstances to do so. Your Committee are gratified to learn that about one-half the number of subscriptions required have already been secured, and would urge that persistent efforts be made to secure the whole number, and thus put the paper upon a vigorous footing, and help it forward to enlarged prosperity. And to encourage a prompt and hearty response to this appeal, it is gratifying to be able to state, that, after a season of great depression, seriously hreatening the very life of the game, the tide is tunning in its furn page when there are not the tide is tunning in its furn page when there are not set to the second of the s very life of the paper, the tide is turning in its favor, new subscribers coming in to take the place of the non-paying ones stricken from the list, and the weekly receipts being largely in excess of the weekly expenditures, so that the gross amount of indebtedness has already been reduced nearly one-half. There is no risk, therefore, in taking the stock, as the Concern has every prospect of meeting all its liabilities. We also commend the project of employing a travelling Agent in the interest of the paper, to solicit subscriptions and advertising patronage, which seems not only feasible, but full of promise.

Your Committee also take the occasion to express their high sense of the obligation which the Church is under to our beloved brother, Dr. Drinkhouse, for the zeal, tact, and ability which he has evinced in the conduct of the paper, and especially for the more than ordinary skill that has been required to continue the publication of our journal during a period of unprecedented financial depression, that has been fatal to so many publications. Your Committee, therefore, cannot too warmly commend to the Convention of the Church, to be assembled in May next, the importance of continuing Dr. Drinkhouse in the position of Editor and Publisher. To this end, we recommend the passage of

the following resolution:

Resolved, That our Representatives to the General Convention aforementioned, be, and they are hereby instructed to use their best efforts to secure the re-election of Rev. E. J. Drinkhouse, M. D., to the office of Editor and Publisher of the "Methodist Protestant." We also recommend the confirmation of Horace Burrough as a Director, in place of James Frame deceased.

The Report of the Special Committee on the President's Report was read, and, on motion, laid on the table.

The Report of the Trustees of the Western Maryland College was received, and referred to the Standing Committee on College.

The Report of the Committee on Boundaries was read, and while it was under consideration the hour for devotional services arrived, which were conducted by the President; doxology and benediction by T. D. Valiant.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference devotional services conducted by G. F. Kindley.

A letter was read from the Colored Methodist Protestant Church of Charleston, S. Carolina, and referred to the following committee: E. R. McGregor, J. Shreeve, and H. Swope.

Having read with pleasure the letters of Revs. M. J. Langhorne and J. G. Johnson, Fraternal Messengers from the Virginia Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and from R. A. Lowther of West Virginia Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and from Geo. E. Hunt of the North Carolina Conference M. P. Church, and from John Gregory of the Pittsburgh Conference Methodist Church, we recommend the following:

Resolved, That we extend to the Conferences represented by these brethren, our sincere congratulations upon the successes which have attended their labors, and heartily reciprocate the fraternal sentiments expressed by their messengers to this body.

2d. Resolved, That Fraternal Messengers be appointed to the Virginia, West Virginia, and North Carolina Conferences of the Methodist Protestant Church, and to the Pittsburgh Conference of the Methodist Church.

The Special Committee on the paper with reference to stationing the President reported as follows:

The Committee are unanimously of the opinion that the paper ought not to pass.

The Committee on the paper from Lexington Street Station reported as follows:

The Conference by its action having restored Lexington Street to the list of Stations, there remains nothing for us to recommend.

The Report of the Committee on Official Character and Official Reports was read, and the names of delinquents called for explanations.

A letter from J. L. Mills of Montgomery, Alabama, was read, and referred to the Committee on Supply outside of the District.

- R. W. Berryman was left without an appointment, at his own request.
- J. D. Wilson and H. P. Jordan were transferred to the unstationed list.

A. Baker and P. L. Wilson were granted a supernumerary relation.

T. M. Bryan, D. F. Ewell, D. E. Reese, J. W. Everest, and J. A. McFaden were referred to the Committee on Superannuated Claimants.

The ordination of Elders was ordered to take place Sabbath morning after preaching.

The following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That the Secretary be requested to send the loving greetings of the Conference to Brother Mills in his distant field.

The character of all the Ministers was passed, and Conference adjourned with the doxology, and benediction by the President.

### FIFTH DAY.

MONDAY, March 19th, 1877.

Conference devotional exercises conducted by J. L. Killgore.

The Report of Committee on Sabbath Schools was adopted, as follows:

### COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee would respectfully submit the following:

Feeling gratefully Impressed with the growing interest manifested in reference to the religious instruction of the young, we deem it a matter of deepest interest to the Church that our Sabbath Schools be placed under the control of the best talent and piety of the Church, and that all the exercises be conducted with a view to the immediate conversion of the children. We therefore recommend,

- 1. That the members and friends of the Methodist Protestant Church be earnestly requested to give to the Sabbath Schools the support of their attendance upon the school exercises, and of their pecuniary aid to the utmost of their ability.
- 2. That Churches sufficiently near each other hold a day's convention at least once in the year, for the purpose of awakening interest in the Sabbath School cause.
- 3. That the Editor of "The Methodist Protestant" be requested to give as much space as possible to matters relating to the Sabbath School work, and to news of its progress in our district and elsewhere.
- 4. That we recommend the use of the International Bible Lessons in all our schools.
- 5. We recommend further that the officers of our Sabbath Schools make singing a special feature of the exercises, and that only such hymns be sung as are calculated to inspire devotion.

6. That the Annual S. S. Convention of this Conference be continued, and a programme of exercises be arranged by the following committee: R. S. Norris, T. H. Lewis, and E. B. Bates, which committee shall cause the said programme to be published in "The Methodist Protestant" two months previous to the meeting of Conference.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

On motion, J. Clay was left without an appointment, at his own request.

The report of Committee on Official Character and Official Reports was adopted as a whole.

On motion, \$2.25 sent by R. H. Powell for Conference collections were ordered to be paid to Steward of Missionary Fund.

On motion, it was resolved to hold the Electoral College at 11 A. M.

The second Wednesday in March, 1878, was fixed as the time for holding the next session of the Conference.

The invitation of the Church at Easton, Md., to hold the next session in that place was accepted.

The following paper in reference to the Convention was adopted:

WHEREAS, the authorities of the Methodist and the Methodist Protestant Churches have respectively called a convention of their denomination to meet in Baltimore on the 11th day of May next.

And, whereas, the entertainment of both conventions is to be provided for by this Conference, therefore,

Resolved, 1st. That the Pastors and Delegates of Baltimore are hereby constituted a committee to provide entertainment for the representatives of said Conventions.

Resolved, 2d. That every Superintendent is hereby required to have a collection taken up in each congregation of his pastoral charge in this behalf, and forward the amount to the Editor of "The Methodist Protestant" by the 15th of May, to be by him paid over to the Treasurer of the aforesaid Committee.

Resolved, 3d. That we recommend that the Methodist Convention hold its sessions in West Baltimore Station, and the Methodist Protestant Convention hold its sessions in East Baltimore Station, until such time as they shall meet in joint convention, which joint convention shall meet in Starr Church, or at such other place as the local committee shall select.

The President reported the reception of a check for \$48.00, which, on motion, he was required to retain for the present, and during the ensuing year to distribute the amount among the most necessitous Ministers.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the attention of the Convention to meet in Baltimore in May, 1877, be called to the consideration of the suggestion to provide a Hymnal for universal Methodism.

On motion, Conference adjourned at 11 A. M., to give place to the meeting of the Electoral College.

The Electoral College met. J. K. Nichols was elected President, and W. S. Hammond, Secretary.

J. T. Murray, J. E. T. Ewell, J. E. Read, R. S. Griffith, C. W. Button, and J. W. Thompson, were appointed judges of the election.

ITEM 4TH.—That Campbell Circuit, Va., be placed on the lists of Circuits and Stations.

ITEM 5TH.—That Dames Quarter and Hungary Neck be united to Quantico Circuit

ITEM 6TH.—That Union Church be recommended to the fostering care of Salisbury Station.

TIEM 7TH.—That the request of Eutaw Station and Hampden Mission to be served by one minister be sanctioned by this Conference.

ITEM 8TH.—That Henkle and New Hope Mission be united to Whaleyville

ITEM 9TH.—That Peach Bottom Mission be changed to Fawn Grove Circuit.

ITEM 10TH.—That little Georgetown, Harmony, Clear Spring, and Park Head, be united and called Berkeley Circuit.

ITEM 11TH.—That Williamsport and Jones Chapel be set apart as Williamsport Mission.

ITEM 12TH.—That Jefferson Circuit be referred to the Conference.

The Report of Committee on Temperance was adopted, as follows:

Whereas, the subject of temperance is attracting special attention, and inviting vigorous action on the part of its friends, it is particularly desirable that the Church should occupy an advanced position in all great moral reforms; therefore, be it

Resolved 1st, That we regard the manufacture, sale, and use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, as a great evil, morally wrong in principle, and depraving in its influences, and that we do hereby pledge ourselves to the support of the temperance reform.

Resolved 2d, That in furtherance of the work, we urge our ministers to study this question in all its bearings, and to preach and lecture on the subject, with a view to exciting investigation by the public mind, and impressing the public conscience with the enormity of the evil.

Resolved 3d, That we do heartily disapprove of the practice of social drinking, and admonish our people to abstain from the occasional glass, for example's sake.

Resolved 4th, That all "prohibitory laws" are conducive to the best interests of society, and every individual member thereof: and that we heartily approve of the efforts of the Maryland State Temperance Alliance to secure the overthrow of the traffic in ardent spirits, and that we will co-operate in every legitimate effort to sweep the curse from the State and nation.

Resolved 5th, That we recommend the formation of juvenile temperance societies in all our Sunday Schools.

The Report of Committee on Superannuated Claimants was laid on the table.

D. A. Shermer offered a paper from Broadway Mission, which was referred to the Missionary Committee.

On motion, the Steward of the Superannuated Fund was instructed to pay the amount due the late Dr. A. S. Eversole, to his widow.

On motion, the appropriation made to Mrs. J. S. Reese last year be distributed *pro rata* among the other claimants upon the Superannuated Fund.

It is a high but not undeserved tribute to the intelligence, zeal and fidelity of the gentlemen composing the local board, to say that they have successfully conducted the institution under their charge, for a number of years, not only without an endowment, but with a large debt to be provided for; and that during these years the College has maintained a respectable standing, given to the Church and community a considerable number of young men and women prepared by training within its walls to assume responsible stations, and has been steadily growing in the confidence and esteem of the Church and its

patrons in general.

The importance of this institution, both as a means of retaining in the Church our educated youth of both sexes, and of affording facilities to young men seeking an education with a view to the ministry in our own Church, is generally conceded. Nevertheless, we have failed to make adequate provision for the wants of the College; and it has become indispensable to the future efficiency of the same that we make vigorous and sustained efforts to secure for it a liberal increase of patronage. It must have substantial aid; otherwise embarrassment to the Faculty, discouragement to the Trustees, and serious loss to the denomination must ensue. The plan of relief adopted two years ago should be made effective, and the assessments should be collected and paid over without unnecessary delay.

It is believed that zealous efforts by our ministers, in connexion with the labors of the agent and the co-operation of our lay members, will so increase the number of students and augment the revenue of the College as to make full provision for the current expenses, leaving the assessments on the churches to pay the outstanding debt, and thus secure the College property to the Church

in perpetuity.

The Committee recommend that the request of the Trustees, viz: that Rev. H. C. Cushing be permitted to serve as Vice-President, and Rev. J. W. Charlton as Agent, be granted; and that every facility be given to the Agent in the prosecution of his work in the charges that may be visited by him.

In conclusion, they append the resolutions following, with a recommenda-

tion that they pass, to wit:

- 1. Resolved, That the Conference does hereby concur in the appointment of Rev. H. C. Cushing as Vice-President, and Rev. J. W. Carlton as Agent of Western Maryland College.
- 2. Resolved, That the assessments made heretofore be collected and paid over as soon as practicable; and that Superintendents be enjoined to give this business their prompt attention and faithful exertions.
- 3. Resolved, That it be recommended to all our ministers and members to use their influence in behalf of an increase of students; and by all honorable means to promote the prosperity of Western Maryland College.

On motion, the name of D. F. Ewell was transferred from the Superannuated list to the effective list.

Conference adjourned with doxology, and benediction by J. D. Kinzer.

The Report of the Special Committee on paper from Bel Air was adopted, as follows:

The Committee to whom were referred the interrogatories presented by the Quarterly Conference of Bel Air Circuit, respectfully report.

In their opinion the correct answers to the interrogatories are as follows:

1st. Yea, if the Trustees were originally constituted by the vote or act of the Church. Otherwise, not. If originally constituted merely by some special deed, then they elect their own successors (upon death or resignation) and continue their own succession by their own vote — the trust continuing in the survivors.

2d. If originally constituted by the vote or act of the Church (under charter or otherwise), or if the deed contain a special dispensation for such purposes, then they should be elected by the male members (annually). If the election does not take place at the annual period, then the Trustees (constituted as above) merely hold over till a new election, which may be held at any time upon proper notice.

3d. No. But a majority of the Board may act in the absence of others, and for the purposes of purchasing, building, repairing, leasing, selling, renting, mortgaging, or otherwise procuring or disposing of the Church property, the Board are obliged to obey the mandate of the male members' meeting called for the purpose.

We append the interrogatories as a part of this report:

### INTERROGATORIES.

We, the members of the Quarterly Conference on Bel Air Circuit, do most respectfully request the Annual Conference, to interpret the law (on pages 77 and 78 of the discipline) defining the duties of Trustees, by answering the following questions:

1st. Should the Trustees of a Circuit Parsonage be elected annually?

2d. Should they be elected by the male members over twenty-one years of age in the respective societies constituting the circuit; or by the Quarterly Conference?

3. Does the repeated failure of a Trustee to meet the Board at the call of the Quarterly Conference, and his manifest indisposition to co-operate with the Board in carrying out the plans of the Circuit for the preservation of property, justify the Quarterly Conference in declaring his place vacant, and filling it with a better man?

## Mbituaru.

### REV. AMON RICHARDS.

REV. AMON RICHARDS was born October 31, 1787; converted to God, 1809; licensed to preach the Gospel, January 2, 1819; ordained a Deacon, April 22, 1823; ordained an Elder, April 8, 1834; called to nobler service and sweeter joys in the presence of his Master, July 12, 1876, and his body is now sleeping in the old churchyard at Mount Gilead, awaiting the resurrection. Eighty-nine years on earth, sixty-eight years a Christian, fifty-eight years a minister of the Gospel — forever a child and saint of God.

As a man he was highly respected for his stability of character and unshaken adherence to what he believed to be the right. As a Christian he was earnest, spiritual, and consistent; as a preacher he was logical, forcible and clear. He identified himself with the Methodist Protestant Church in its early days, when it was small among the princes of Israel; but lived to see it increase as Joseph, and its principles possess the gate of its former enemies. Though a local minister all his life, he was a few years ago elected to honorary membership in the Maryland Annual Conference, as a mark of the esteem in which he was held by his brethren; and when his death was formally announced to the Conference, several of its members arose and paid tributes of respect to his memory. During his life he gave a lot of ground to the church on Finksburg Circuit, and assisted in building a sanctuary thereon; and his funeral sermon was preached in that identical building, and his body buried in the ground he had dedicated to God and His agrees on conth. had dedicated to God and His cause on earth.

During his last illness he was calm and happy in God, awaiting his transfer to that conference which holds its sessions in the shade of the Tree of Life.

His name is upon the dead-roll of the conference on this side of the river, and we believe his new name is in the Lamb's Book of Life, from which it shall never be blotted out.

### REV. A. S. EVERSOLE, M. D.

Died at his residence in Seaford, Del., February 3, 1877, ABRAHAM S.

Eversole, M. D., in the 64th year of his age.

Dr. Eversole was born in Berkeley County, Virginia (now West Virginia),
July 10, 1813. He was of German extraction, his ancestors having emigrated from the German settlements of Pennsylvania to that part of Virginia where he was born. His parents were, religiously, of German Reformed stock, and his early life was doubtless moulded after the forms of that Church. His opportunities of education were very limited, being confined to the ordinary country schools of the neighborhood in which he lived. All his intellectual attainments, which were very respectable, were the result of his studious habits in after life, built upon this slender foundation.

He was converted to God about the year 1834, and soon after began to entertain impressions looking toward the ministry. Not long after he suffered an affliction in one of his limbs, which quite disabled him for some months. Confined to the house, and mostly to his room, he improved the weary hours of his confinement by studious and prayerful reading of the Bible. From this time all his thoughts ran in that one direction. In the prosecution of his studies, advised by a friend, he procured Clarke's Commentary, Watson's Dictionary, Wesley's Sermons, Brown's Concordance, Watts on the Mind, &c. Thus furnished with helps, his progress was steady and full of encouragement. In due time he was licensed to preach, and in the spring of 1839 he was received into the Maryland Annual Conference and appointed to Trough Creek Circuit, now embraced in the territory of the Pittsburgh Conference of the Methodist Church. This was a heavy responsibility - in charge of a circuit without experience, and not even an assistant to share it with him. He was well received, however, and fulfilled the duties of his position with acceptability to the Church and credit to himself.

At the ensuing Conference, although he had exercised under a license but, one year, he was admitted to deacon's orders and sent to Caroline Circuit, in charge again and without assistant. The next year he was assistant to Rev. L A. Collins on Snowhill Circuit, the year following had charge of Lewis Mission, and for the two succeeding years labored on Kent Circuit as assistant with Revs. W. H. Bordley and W. Roby respectively. At the close of his second year in Kent, having been giving some attention to the science of medicine, and wishing to perfect himself in the profession, in the spring of 1846, at his own request, he was transferred to the Philadelphia Conference, where he remained several years. He filled one or more charges in that city, and in the spring of 1850 was elected President of the District. While thus engaged, he had been pursuing his medical studies, and having attended two courses of lectures, in the spring of 1851 he graduated from the Jefferson

Medical College of that city.

The General Conference of 1850 having transferred the Philadelphia Conference back to the Maryland Conference, in the spring of 1851 Dr. Eversole returned to his home Conference, and was placed in charge of Dorchester Circuit, where he remained for two years. The following year he was appointed to Newtown Circuit, remaining in charge for two years. While here, on the 7th day of July, 1853, he was married to Miss Lizzie Wallace of Seaford, Delaware. From this field he was sent to Union Circuit, and was

continued in charge for three successive years. During the last year of his service here - May 3, 1857 - he had the misfortune to lose his excellent wife, and shortly after his only child, little Maggie. At the next Conference he was appointed to Alleghany (now Bedford) Circuit, and from thence the following year to Baltimore Circuit, where he remained two years. In the spring of 1861 he was sent to Frederick Circuit with Rev. J. K. Nichols, and for the following two years to Newmarket (now Stewartstown) Circuit, with Rev. J. H. Ellegood for his assistant. The next year he was appointed to Seaford Circuit, with Rev. G. W. Simpson for his assistant, and the next year to Caroline Circuit, with Rev. H. J. Day as assistant. The following two years he labored on Worcester Circuit, and the next year on Delaware Mission. During this year-September 3, 1868—he was married to Mrs. Sarah Brittingham, and at the following Conference was appointed to Cecil Circuit, where he remained three years, and the year following was sent to Peach Bottom Circuit. His health becoming somewhat impaired, at the following Conference he was granted a supernumerary relation and assigned to Seaford Circuit, with Rev. C. McF. Thompson as superintendent. The spring following he was placed on the superannuated list, and was continued in that relation up to the time of his death.

Dr. Eversole was highly esteemed by all who knew him, and by none more than by his brethren of the Conference, who had been intimately acquainted with him for nearly thirty-eight years. He was a warm-hearted, genial Christian man; and, with a vein of humor and a fund of amusing anecdote, in his earlier years he was the life and soul of every circle in which he moved. He was a sound and earnest preacher, his sermons giving evidence of careful thought in preparation. His style was generally animated, and sometimes rose into a glow of impassioned earnestness. His work was always prospered, and his charges were uniformly improved under his administration. He was a man of good judgment and well versed in the business routine of the Conference. Thoroughly acquainted with the Discipline and usages of the Church, he was rarely on the wrong side of the question when the law was concerned, and he came to be regarded, in some sort, as the Conference lawyer. Close and compact in his reasoning, and withal having a sparkle of wit in his efforts, he was a most successful debater on the floor of Conference. He always commanded

attention, and seldom failed to carry his point.

His death was befitting a life so well spent, so fully given up to God. A letter from one who was associated with him in his last years, and visited him in his last sickness, says:-"He was sick just one week before his death, with nn his last sickness, says:—"He was sick just one week before his death, with pneumonia. The first time I went to see him he said to me, 'I do not know what the Lord intends by this, but of one thing I am well assured—He will do right.' At another time he exclaimed, 'O, the folly of trusting in an arm of flesh when we have the strong arm of Jehovah upon which to lean!' And again, with his face all aglow with joy, 'O the fulness of the provision in Christ! there is enough and to spare.' At one time his wife was giving him some nourishment, and asked him if it was nice. He replied, with a smile, 'Yes, everything is nice; but the nicest thing of all is the love of Jesus.' A few hours before his death, when I saw that he was going first I inquired of few hours before his death, when I saw that he was going fast, I inquired of him whether he had any message to send to the Conference. 'Yes,' he replied; 'give my love to the brethren, and tell them I hope to meet them all in heaven.'

His sorrowing companion says in a letter:- "His mind was perfectly clear and calm to the last moment. He passed away without a struggle. O that my last moments may be like his!" So may it be, and so may it be with us all.

"Servant of God, well done, Rest from thy loved employ; The battle fought, the victory won, Enter thy Master's joy!"
