

Conference Louis Randall anappointee, preached the sermon on "The Gospel of Christ and Its Universal Diffusion"; text, "And He said unto them, Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature", Mark 16:15. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was conducted by President Sheridan, assisted by Louis Randall, W. S. Phillips, E. C. Makosky and F. T. Benson. The benediction was pronounced by J. E. Nicholson at 12:20 o'clock.

Afternoon

President Sheridan called the Conference at 2 o'clock. The roll was called, noting absentees and making changes in lay roll. A letter from J. L. Straughn, telling of his affliction and his hope of recovery, was read by the Secretary.

The report of the Special Committee on Rule 4 of the Manual, was read, recommending such changes in Rule IV and Rule VI, article 5, as to effect a reorganization in the Board of Stewards, creating one officer, a Disbursing Steward, to whom all money shall be payable by pastors in one check, and said money being distributed by the Disbursing Steward through his assistants. The name Disbursing Steward was changed to Treasurer and the report was so adopted, (Report V).

The bar of the House was fixed for the entire audience room except the last three pews.

The election of officers took place at 2:50 o'clock. G. E. Brown, B. F. Ruley, Dr. A. B. Stine and L. H. LeCates, being the tellers. The vote for President resulted as follows: Total vote, 181, necessary to election, 91; J. M. Sheridan 115, G. W. Haddaway 1, W. R. Graham 33, F. T. Tagg 3, J. S. Bowers 8, J. W. Kirk 4, J. M. Gill 1, W. S. Phillips 6, F. T. Little 6, T. O. Crouse 1, J. W. Trout 1, W. W. Johnson 1, F. T. Benson 1. The Secretary declared J. M. Sheridan elected. The President acknowledged his pleasure at the continued confidence of his brethren and pledged himself to the work. At the conclusion of his address, on request, F. T. Little led in prayer. On motion of G. Q. Bacchus, the assistant secretary cast the vote of the Conference for W. S. Phillips as Secretary.

On request of J. L. Mills, the Secretary of the Faculty, the Faculty and the students in course, were excused from Conference session. The President introduced Rev. W. A. Wise, secretary of the Wilmington Conference. M. E. Church, and Rev. Mr. Carey of the M. E. Church South.

The following were elected: Conference Steward, Clayborne Phillips; Conference Treasurer, C. P. Nowlin.

The Secretary announced as his assistants: J. H. Straughn, G. I. Humphries and G. J. Hooker.

The vote on Standing District Committee was then ordered and taken. The tellers retired to count the ballot and G. J. Hill, P. W. Crosby, A. R. Lewis and Dr. J. B. Jones, were appointed tellers to take the vote for the Committee on Appeals. The ballot was taken and the tellers retired to count the vote.

The following Trustees, whose terms expire with this Conference, were elected until 1914, by vote of the Secretary: J. L. Mills, J. M. Sheridan, Rowland Watts and T. A. Murray.

A motion to adjourn was lost. The resolution signed by E. C. Makosky, requesting G. W. Haddaway to furnish copy of his sermon for the Conference minutes was adopted, (Resolution 1).

J. W. Trout offered a resolution that the history of the Maryland Conference should be preserved in some concrete form and that the President appoint a committee of three ministers and three laymen who shall prepare a constitution and by-laws of a Maryland Conference Historical Organization and shall report at the next Conference. The paper was adopted, (Resolution 2).

A letter from R. S. Rowe was read regretting his inability to attend Conference and the Secretary was instructed to convey to Brother Rowe the affectionate greetings of the Conference.

- J. W. Trout moved to amend regulation 7 of the Manual to read, That "every church shall elect" instead of "every pastor shall appoint". The motion was amended that in stations the members elect and on circuits the quarterly conference elect. The motion was laid on the table. F. T. Little moved to strike out of Regulation 7, article 1, the phrase requesting lady visitors to raise one-third of President's salary on their charge. G. W. Haddaway moved to strike out the entire article. It was withdrawn. Louis Randall moved to amend that the lady visitor collect the assessment for the Home. C. P. Nowlin offered a substitute that the lady visitor shall discharge every duty assigned by the charter of the Home. All the motions and amendments, by motion of the Secretary, were referred to the Committee on Benevolent Agencies, (See Report L).
- F. D. Reynolds announced a bequest of \$213. by John McCoy of Dover to the Church Home.

The program committee submitted its report, which was adopted, (Report P).

The bill of expense of \$13.75 of J. M. Sheridan in trial of E. P. Perry was ordered paid by the Secretary.

The tellers for vote on Committee on Appeals reported elected: Ministers, J. L. Mills and W. M. Strayer; Layman, A. R. Lewis. On motion, the Secretary cast the ballot for A. W. Mather, minister, and T. E. Harrison and E. B. Fenby, laymen, they having the next largest number of votes.

The Conference then adjourned with benediction by President Sheridan at 4:50 o'clock.

Evening

The evening meeting was devoted to Foreign Missions, F. T. Tagg presided and addresses were made by F. C. Klein and John M. Holmes, Jr.

Second Day-Thursday

W. M. Strayer conducted the morning worship from 8:30 to 9 o'clock, and at the conclusion of the service the President took the chair and proceeded with business. The minutes were read and approved. On motion the roll of those who failed to respond yesterday was called. On a call for communications papers were referred to various committees.

Three invitations to entertain the next session of Conference were read, from Rhode Island Ave., Washington, Laurel, Del., and Lynchburg, Va. According to rule the invitations were laid on the table for twenty-four hours.

The report of T. H. Lewis, president of Western Maryland College, was without reading referred to the Committee on Literature and Education, (See Report H). Dr. Lewis as special collector for the Superannuate Fund subscriptions of last year called attention to the remaining unpaid subscriptions, (See Report G). As a matter of privilege Dr. Lewis in a paper outlined his endeavor to secure a complete set of the published Disciplines of the Methodist Protestant Church from its organization and announced the successful completion of his task and presented the set to the Conference. A motion was made by the Secretary that the Conference accept the gift, and that the President appoint a special committee of three to properly express the appreciation of the Conference for the gift and that

Dr. Lewis' address be printed in the Conference Minutes. The motion was adopted. The Committee appointed was, W. S. Phillips, J. W. Trout and Dr. A. B. Stine, (Report T).

The report of the Westminster Theological Seminary was without reading referred to the Committee on Literature and Education, (See Report H).

The special committee appointed last Conference to bear fraternal greetings to the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church reported that it had performed its duty and had been cordially received. The report was accepted and the Committee was discharged, (Report U).

A resolution signed by J. S. Bowers and F. T. Little requesting Dr. Lewis at his convenience to address the Conference on the present status of union of Methodism was adopted, (Resolution 3).

A request from J. D. Kinzer made by J. W. Kirk that he be given a Superannuate relation was referred according to rule to the Committee on Superannuates.

The tellers on the vote for Standing District Committee announced the election of F. T. Little and W. R. Graham, ministers, and T. P. Fisher and T. A. Murray, laymen. By motion, J. S. Bowers, minister, and W. G. Baker, layman, were declared elected, they having received the next highest vote.

F. T. Benson offered a paper from the Executive Committee of the Conference C. E. Union stating the very successful convention held last fall at Hampden and requesting the Conference to consolidate the Christian Endeavor Societies and the Sunday Schools in one organization. The paper was referred to the Committee on Young People's Work with a request that the Committee report this afternoon, (See Report I). G. I. Humphries was excused from serving on the Committee because of his work as assistant secretary and F. T. Benson was appointed to succeed him.

At 10 o'clock according to rule the roll was called and the pastors deposited their reports.

The Committee on Transportation, W. S. Phillips, stated that S. W. Rosenberger had been appointed to collect certificates from all who secured the same from the railroad agents in order to secure reduced return fare.

G. W. Hines offered a resolution that the ministers of the Conference pledge themselves to secure on their charges this year for missions an

amount equal to one dollar per member and on motion it was referred to the Committee on Missions, (See Report N).

The report of the Trustees of the Maryland Conference stated the composition of the Board and appended the reports of its Treasurer, T. A. Murray, and of the Joint Committee on Book Rooms. The report was adopted, (Report C).

A communication from the Executive Committee of the General Conference gave the proceedings of its last session at Gull Lake, Mich. The item of the report stating the \$450. apportionment of this Conference towards the expenses of the delegates to the Federal Council in Philadelphia last year and to the Ecumenical Council of Methodism in 1911 was referred to the Board of Finance with instructions to assess the charges, (See Report D for list of assessments).

The resolution offered by F. T. Little instructing the President of this Conference to attend the sessions of the Executive Committee of the General Conference was amended by T. H. Lewis to read that the President of this Conference shall attend the meetings of the Committee and that his expenses be paid out of the Conference funds. It was so adopted, (Resolution 4).

The Church Enterprise Committee reported the holding of a meeting in Baltimore and approved the plans of Christ Church, Baltimore. It also states the expense of the meeting to be eight dollars. The report was adopted and the bill was ordered paid, (Report O).

That the President of the Conference shall not be required to visit the charges more than once in two years was the substance of a resolution offered by W. N. Sherwood which was referred to a special committee of three. The President appointed F. T. Little, S. W. Coe and J. H. Baker.

At a few minutes before eleven o'clock C. H. Hubbell, Secretary of the Board of Young People's Work, and G. R. Brown, Sec.-Treas. of the Board of Ministerial Education, were each introduced to the Conference, and each in turn presented their interests. The addresses were concluded at 11:40. W. D. Litsinger, because of the death of a daughter-in-law, was excused from Conference. After announcements Conference took a recess at 11:50 o'clock.

Afternoon

The Conference followed the program, which was a meeting on behalf of the Church Extension Society and was addressed by John S. Bowess, Chairman of Committee; Mr. W. H. Anderson of the Maryland Anti-Saloon League, and Rev. Mr. Cleland of the Anti-Saloon League of Delaware, were introduced to the Conference and made addresses. Rev. Mr. Keen, Eastern Shore Secretary, was also present.

The President announced the receipt of a telegram of the death of S. A. Hoblitzell and that the funeral would take place in Belair Sunday morning at eleven o'clock. T. H. Lewis moved that the name be transferred to the Dead Roll, that a committee of three be appointed to draft suitable resolutions and to designate a committee to attend the funeral. The President appointed W. M. Strayer, H. L. Schlincke and Dr. J. B. Jones.

The Dead Roll was called at 3:15 by Louis Randall. At the call of the name of S. A. Hoblitzell, the Conference suspended business, and following prayer by J. L. Mills, brief eulogies were made by W. M. Strayer, F. T. Tagg, F. T. Little and J. E. Maloy.

Acting on the resolution of J. W. Trout, Conference adjourned at 4:10 o'clock for the day, out of respect to the memory of Brother Hoblitzell, (Resolution 5).

Evening

F. T. Benson presided at the evening session, which was devoted to Christian Endeavor and Sunday School work. Luther Warner and C. H. Hubbell and G. W. Haddaway made addresses.

Third Day-Friday

J. E. Maloy led the morning service and at 9 o'clock the President opened the business of the day. The minutes were read and approved. The roll of absentees was called. H. B. Minner was not received as delegate from Frederica, having no credentials. A letter from S. J. Smith telling of his illness and expectancy of moving to Stewartstown and suggesting that he be discontinued from the Faculty was read. The letter was received and the item referring to his membership in the Faculty was referred to the Faculty, (See Report E). A letter from G. L. Wolfe was

received, enclosing his report, and was filed. J. D. Smith wrote that his school duties kept him from attending Conference and requested as relation that he be left without appointment for one year. The letter was referred to the Committee on Official Relations, (See Report M).

The partial report of the Committee on Young People's Work concurred in, and recommended that the Conference grant the request of the Conference Union to amalgamate the Christian Endeavor Societies and Sunday Schools in one organization. It was adopted, (Report I).

The Secretary reported receipt of credentials from all charges except Campbell, Frederica, Harpers Ferry, Lewistown, Middleway, Prince George, St. Paul's and Williamsport. His financial report shows a balance of \$101.15. As Transportation Agent, that he had concluded the only practicable plan possible. The report was adopted, (Report B).

The Committee on President's Report gives graification for the splendid report of the President and endorses all of his official actions of the year. The report was adopted, (See Report A).

The Special Committee on the gift of T. H. Lewis expresses the high appreciation of the Conference for the gift and for the completion of full historical records of the Church. The report was adopted, (Report T).

The report of the Special Committee on the demise of S. A. Hoblitzell speaks of his effective work as a minister and appoints as committee to attend the services, T. H. Lewis, J. W. Trout and H. L. Schlincke. On a motion by the Secretary, the name of T. H. Lewis was omitted from the list and the report was thus adopted, (Report W).

The Church Extension Society of Washington reported the work at Mt. Pleasant and the co-operation of the Washington pastors and churches. The total receipts for the year was \$2389.56 and the total remaining indebtedness of \$8393.48. The report was referred to the Committee on Church Extension, (See Report F).

The Board of Managers of Our Church Home states in its report a total of \$836.54 on hand, that four inmates had been received during the year and that a total of seventeen were in the Home. The report of the Treasurer was attached. The entire report was sent to the Committee on Benevolent Agencies, (See Report L).

Rev. C. H. Beck, Sec.-Treas. of the Board of Home Missions, Rev. Mr. Dashiell of the M. E. Church and Rev. C. E. Wilburs, Editor of our Sunday School Literature, were introduced to the Conference.

The invitation to entertain the Conference next year were taken from the table, the order for ten o'clock being deferred. The delegates and pastors from Rhode Island Ave., Laurel and Lynchburg were heard with applause and the Conference proceeded to ballot. W. N. Sherwood, P. W. Crosby, C. E. Nichols and William Vansant were appointed tellers. They were excused to count the vote.

The Chairman of the Committee on Pulpit Supply read the report of assignments for Sunday. The report was adopted.

The postponed order, the report of the Committee on Literature and Education, was observed at 10:30. The first of the report was of the Baltimore Book Directory. The total subscribers to the Methodist increased 82 and the net profits for the year are \$1743.05. The Secretary of the Committee, A. N. Ward, read the report of the Committee on the Book Concern report. There was a motion to adopt this part of the report. J. L. Mills, Secretary of the Board, T. R. Woodford, Agent, and F. T. Tagg, Editor, addressed the Conference. During the address of the latter, time was extended. Dr. Wilbur spoke in behalf of his office. The motion prevailed. On motion of T. H. Lewis the remainder of the Committee's report was postponed, (See Report H). The Secretary then moved that the order be postponed to hear Dr. Beck and that the time be extended until the order following be completed.

A supplemental report of the Committee on Pulpit Supply was read and accepted.

The tellers on vote for entertainment of Conference next year reported as follows: Laurel 80, Lynchburg 46, Rhode Island Ave. 43. Laurel having received a plurality, on motion of T. H. Lewis, their invitation was accepted.

- C. E. Taylor was received through a report of the Committee on Credentials as a messenger from Patapsco.
- C. P. Nowlin, Superannuate Steward, asked instructions about payment in the case of Mrs. McFaden who died during the year. The matter was referred to the Superannuate Committee. In the case of S. A. Hoblitzell the Steward was instructed to make payment to Mrs. Hoblitzell.

The order was then observed with the introduction of Dr. Beck, who made his address to the Conference in explanation of the work of the Home Mission Board. At the conclusion of his address, Conference adjourned with the hour of the day, the address of F. C. Klein, still pending at 12:15 o'clock. J. H. Straughn pronounced the benediction.

Evening

The evening session was given over to a discussion of the financial administration of churches. W. S. Phillips presided, and H. C. Staley and E. C. Paige were the speakers.

Fourth Day-Saturday

The Conference devoted a half hour to a devotional service and was led by J. W. Gray. The minutes were read and approved at nine o'clock. The roll of absentees was called. The delegate from Belair was excused from further Conference sessions. After a call for communications the suspended order of yesterday was taken up and F. C. Klein addressed the Conference in the interest of Foreign Missions.

The postponed order of the report of the Committee on Literature and Education was taken from the table. The report of T. H. Lewis, President of Western Maryland College, was read. This closes his twenty-fifth year as President. The endowment is \$67,000. The student body is larger than last year. The report of the Board of Governors of the Westminster Theological Seminary was then read and states that there are 38 students in the institution from 13 States and that 14 students are in the Senior class. There is urgent need of endowment. The same assessment as last year is requested, also the assignment of H. L. Elderdice as President. The Committee's report on these two institutions expresses the high favor in which they are held and congratulates the fine administration of each. sessment for the Seminary and the loan of H. L. Elderdice are recommended. Dr. Lewis for the College and Dr. Elderdice for the Seminary made addresses. At the conclusion of the addresses all the students and graduates of the College present in the audience stood. The same was done with the Seminary graduates. There was a large showing from each institution. J. W. Hering, President of the College Board of Trustees, emphasized the College Commencement program in honor of Dr. Lewis' twenty-fifth anniversary as President. The report as a whole was then adopted, (Report H).

The report of the Committee on Young People's Work was postponed and on motion of J. W. Hering, F. T. Tagg was heard by the Conference on a movement in Baltimore to secure a Methodist Hospital; that a number of ministers and laymen of the three Methodisms met in Baltimore and

that sub-committees had been appointed who negotiated the transaction of securing the Maryland General Hospital for \$167,000. Following the statement the Conference adopted a resolution offered by F. T. Tagg wherein the Conference approves the acquirement of the property without financially obligating itself, (Resolution 6).

The order of hearing the report of the Committee on Young People's Work was again deferred, and a partial report of the Faculty of Instruction was had. L. H. Joslin, V. A. Miller, R. W. Coe, R. Y. Nicholson, C. W. Sanderson and W. C. Mumford are recommended for reception. This item was adopted. Item 2 was adopted recommending for ordination M. E. Hungerford, A. B. Dupuy, J. R. Wright, A. J. Torrey, L. E. Purdum, and J. R. Horsey. Licenses for the ordinances were granted to W. C. Mumford, R. Y. Nicholson, C. W. Sanderson and R. W. Coe. E. W. Simms, is left in the hands of the President. The report also states passing of students in course, and the partial report was adopted, (Report E).

The report of the Board of Deaconnesses states the completion of its organization in Baltimore with Miss Estelle Gilligan as President of the Co-operative Board of Ladies; that Miss Evelyn M. Jefferson had been secured for the first deaconness; and that various circles had been formed in the city of Baltimore. The Conference was requested to fill the vacancies in the Board which occur with this Conference.

An order of the day for Monday at 2:30 o'clock was made to hear Dr. Lewis on the state of Methodist Union. Miss Gilligan and Miss Jefferson were then introduced to and addressed the Conference. Dr. Tagg, President of the Board, supplemented the report with an address. Those whose terms expire with this Conference are re-elected. The resignation of Daniel Baker was accepted and Mr. F. M. Wilson, of Pocomoke City, was elected. J. W. Kirk was elected to succeed J. M. Gill, resigned. The report was then adopted, (Report R).

A request from the Federal Council of Maryland was read requesting the appointment of a small committee to co-operate. J. E. Nicholson moved that the paper be received and that the committee be appointed. The motion prevailed. It was ordered that the President appoint a committee of three.

Afternoon

F. T. Little called for order at 2 o'clock. The report of the Committee on Young People's Work was taken from the table and read. There are 283 schools and 30,501 scholars. Christian Endeavor Societies number 131 with 5,363 members. There are three recommendations: 1, that pastors endeavor to grade the Sunday Schools; 2, requesting that Sunday Schools give one offering a year for the Board; 3, that C. E. Societies contribute \$1. each for the Union work. F. T. Benson spoke on the report after which it was adopted, (Report I).

A resolution coming as a part of the above report changes Rule V, section 2, sub-section 17, of the Manual, reducing representation of the Conference on the Executive Committee of the Union, was adopted, (Resolution 8).

The Committee on Moral Reform reported. It reviews the great movements of the world for the improvement of moral conditions and for the promotion of peace. The following recommendations were adopted by items: endorsing the effort of President Taft and others to secure arbitration treaties; commending the Lord's Day Alliance; appointing a committee of three to present these resolutions to President Taft; and sending copies to the Maryland, Delaware, and New Jersey Senators. There was a motion to amend the report by striking out the name Anti-Saloon League so as to endorse all temperance organizations. It was lost and the report as a whole was adopted, (Report K).

The order for 2:30 was observed at 3:20, the hearing of Dr. Lewis on the present status of Methodist Union. At the conclusion of the address, J. E. Maloy was given privilege to give his status on union. At 4:20, Conference resumed business.

The motion to appoint two men to serve with the Anti-Saloon League Board was adopted.

N. C. Clough, collector Superannuate dues, reported \$120. paid, and F. M. Clift, collector Church Extension dues, reported \$111. received. These reports were accepted.

The Educational Steward reported \$594. for Ministerial Education; \$1837. for Seminary, and \$1427. for the College. The report was adopted. The Foreign Mission Steward reported a total of \$12,650. for missions. It was adopted. The additional report of the Committee on Superannuates,

adopting the recommendation of the Board of Managers on the new basis of distribution, was made the order for Tuesday at 10 o'clock.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to pay the expenses of J. W. Trout to the funeral services of S. A. Hoblitzell.

The report of the Conference Steward shows a total of \$34,013. paid for General Interests, the decrease from last year being due to the special \$10,000. fund for Superannuates raised last year, and a total of \$298,129. paid for Local Interests. It was adopted, (See Financial Summary).

The appointment of F. P. Krauss and J. R. Wright as assistant Conference Stewards was approved by the Conference.

The Committee on Statistics shows a present total full membership of 28,018, of probationers 1,568 and of ministers and preachers, 144, appointments 291. The report was adopted, (See Statistical Summary).

The Conference adjourned at 4:40, J. E. Nicholson offering the benediction.

Evening

"The Laymen's Responsibility in the Spiritual Work of the Church" was the subject of discussion at the evening service. Fred. P. Atkins presided and addresses were made by D. L. Greenfield, J. W. Hering and Julian P. Dodge.

Seventh Day-Tuesday

The Conference held its usual morning devotional service with J. E. Nicholson as leader. The Secretary stated at nine o'clock the absence of the President, and on motion F. T. Little was made chairman. The minutes were read and approved. The roll call shows that the following laymen had not responded to their names: Harry Hammond, R. W. Parks, L. E. Growden, F. M. Bell, J. W. Creager, W. H. Willey, J. W. Evans, J. T. McGinnes, J. H. Barrow, Bayard Dorsey, D. L. Johnson, Charles Stoeckel, C. B. Jarman, Nelson Johnson, Alexander Clark, Winchester Knox, J. J. McCauley, Albert Hamline, J. B. Morris, Bowney Williams, J. E. Barnett, J. E. Chamberlain, L. Y. Thornton, J. R. Keys, Carlos Murray, B. L. Cookson, S. E. Shockley, William Jester, B. K. Green, D. W. Campbell, L. T. Cooper, M. B. Inscoe, A. E. Anstine, R. W. Sudcliff, T. L. Johnson, J. H. Linthicum, G. A. Robinson, G. D. Boggs, and C. E. Taylor.

The part of the report of the Superannuates on apportionments was taken from the table and without change was adopted. The report as a whole was then adopted, (Report G). Because of a part of the report not yet acted upon, the vote was reconsidered on the adoption as a whole.

The report of the Superannuate Fund Steward was adopted and shows: a total of \$9,589.14 received for the Conference year. It was adopted, (See Report G).

A resolution signed by the Conference Steward and the Conference Treasurer making changes in the regulations of the Superannuated Fund Society to conform to the new office of Treasurer was adopted, (Resolution 9).

At 9:30 o'clock the Conference gave way to a meeting of the Church Extension Society, resuming at 9:50.

The Secretary offered a resolution that a committee of three be appointed to consider and report upon the Men's Forward Movement in Religion. It was adopted and the President appointed W. S. Phillips, A. N. Ward and J. H. Baker.

T. O. Crouse announced that the committee to place flowers upon the graves of A. D. Dick and R. L. Lewis would do so at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon.

At 10 o'clock the order was observed, the consideration of the recommendation of the Board of Managers of the Superannuated Fund Society changing the basis of appropriations. J. W. Kirk was requested to read a paper he had written upon the subject. While the matter was pending the Church Extension Society had a short meeting.

After the meeting the address of J. W. Kirk was heard, the item of the report was again read and the recommendation was adopted. The report as a whole was then adopted, (Report G).

The report of the Agent of the Special Collection for the Superannuated Fund Society of last year was read, adopted and the agent discharged.

A resolution by C. P. Nowlin, that the Secretary each year secure a typewriter and adding machine, was adopted, (Resolution 10).

The chair stated that the amount assessed on the Maryland Conference for the preliminary expenses of the Ecumenical Conference had not been fully paid and with the consent of the Conference, J. M. Holmes was designated to secure the amount in a public collection. This was done and \$90. was secured.

A resolution signed by J. M. Gill striking out questions 4 and 5 of the list for Superannuate claimants, stating the business and income, was read and adopted, (Resolution 11).

The Secretary made a motion that the President be requested to read the list of appointments at 9 o'clock and that he appoint some one to hold a service and to read the appointments at the same time in the M. E. Church.

The report of the Committee on Official Relations was read by Louis Randall. The character of all the ministers was passed. The assessment honor roll call shows 95 charges paid in full. B. W. Kindley is continued as a loan to the Maryland S. S. Association and J. R. Horsey goes to the Board of Home Missions. J. D. Smith and G. L. Wolfe are transferred to the unstationed list. G. R. McCready and C. S. Arnett are given supernumerary relation and D. W. Anstine is left without appointment as his own request for one year. The report as a whole was adopted, (Report M).

The question about committees reporting on matters unreferred arose and the chair ruled that in no instance shall committees so report except in the cases of the Faculty of Instruction and the Committee on Church Enterprises.

A request from G. W. Atkins of Milton for the prayers of this Conference for his daughter, who is very ill, was read and at the request of the chair D. L. Greenfield led the Conference in the petition. The benediction at recess time was offered by A. W. Mather.

Afternoon

The President called for order at two o'clock.

The resolution signed by G. A. Morris expressing sympathy to G. W. Atkins was read and adopted, (Resolution 12).

The Church Extension Steward, R. L. Shipley, reported a total of \$5700. received during the year and detail payments made. The report was accepted, (See Report F).

The President announced that J. M. Holmes would lead the service and that W. H. Litsinger would read the appointments in the M. E. Church to-night.

F. T. Little offered a resolution that the pastors be urged to collect assessment for Executive Committee meetings of General Conference as

early after Conference as possible. It was adopted, (Resolution 13).

F. T. Little was called to the chair. There being no business on the table the Conference indulged in a song service. At its conclusion A. N. Ward was given the floor and announced the committee for the Summer Conference, which was decided Saturday afternoon at an informal meeting of the ministers to be held in Westminster in August.

The Secretary read an acknowledgment from Mrs. Alice Dick Davis and Miss Lillian E. Lewis for the thoughtfulness of the Conference in decorating the graves of their fathers.

A letter from the Milford Church requesting the endorsement of the Conference upon their new church enterprise was referred to the Committee on Church Enterprise, (See Report O).

The Committee on Church Extension reported through E. C. Makosky, secretary, (See Report F). It commends the reports of the Baltimore and Washington Societies. Certain boundaries are changed and Milford and Linthicum Heights are recognized as appointments. The appointment of committees to act with pastor of Linthicum Heights and First Church, Wilmington, are recommended. The list of appropriations followed. The report was ordered read by items, during which the President took the chair. All the recommendations were adopted. Hurlock was listed with the appropriations, being unwittingly omitted. R. S. Jett moved that the President appoint one layman in each, the delegate if desirable, to urge contributions to the Milford enterprise. This was adopted. North Baltimore church offered to become responsible for the amount of the discount on the Milford appropriation in order that that church might avail itself of its appropriation immediately. Conference took a recess at 4:30 o'clock with the report still pending.

Evening

The President called for order at 7:30. The unfinished report of the Church Extension Committee was continued. The list of appropriations was adopted and the report as a whole was adopted, (Report F).

The Conference Choir informed the Conference of its organization. E. D. Stone, leader; J. H. Straughn, assistant; F. C. Klein, Business Manager; C. M. Elderdice, Organist, and L. E. Beauchamp, assistant.

J. S. Bowers stated that there were certain reasons to secure \$200.

for the Federalsburg church and at the request of the President, F. T. Little took charge of a collection. The \$200. was secured in cash and subscriptions.

The Conference gave way to a meeting of the Mutual Relief Association and in a short while resumed its business, (See Societies).

The report of the Board of Finance was given. The report of the Agent of the President's Parsonage had been examined and the list of assessments were attached. The report as a whole was adopted, (Report D).

The Committee on Church Enterprises heartily endorses the new building project at Milford. The report was adopted, (Report O).

B. F. Ruley, special collector for Our Church Home, reported \$228. received. The report was adopted.

A supplemental report of the Committee on Official Relations was read expressing the thanks of the Conference to the local church and to the citizens of Federalsburg, and also for all courtesies received, was adopted on the motion of G. Q. Bacchus with a rising vote, (Report M).

The President announced the list of Special Committees which had been ordered by the Conference, (See List).

An additional report of the Faculty of Instruction grants a number of licenses and announces the resignation of S. J. Smith. The report was accepted and the President appointed J. W. Kirk to fill the vacancy, (Report E).

The report of the special committee of the Forward Movement of Men in Religion was read by W. S. Phillips. It recommends the observance of the rally day and conservation day of the Movement among our churches. It was adopted, (Report Y).

A resolution calling for the publication of A. N. Ward's sermon in the Protestant was adopted, (Resolution 14).

The Minutes of the day were read, corrected and approved. At the suggestion of the President the Conference sang a hymn. The appointments were then read.

On motion of F. T. Little, Conference adjourned and sang, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again". The President at 9:30 o'clock pronounced the benediction.

Report A

The President

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Maryland Annual Conference: Dear Brethren:

The close of the Conference year imposes upon me the pleasant duty of presenting to you my Annual Report detailing my official duties, and outlining the conditions of the work throughout the district.

It is with a feeling of profound gratitude to Almighty God for his constant care and manifold blessings that I announce that not one of our ministerial brethren has been called away by death. It is the first time in eighteen years, and the second time in thirty-one years that our ranks have not been thus broken. Two of the widows of our deceased brethren have passed to their eternal home. On June 3d, 1910, Mrs. A. M. McFaden of Harper's Ferry, West Virginia, the widow of the late Rev. J. H. McFaden, fell asleep in Jesus. In Baltimore on December 20th, 1910, Mrs. Arintha S. Ewell, the consort of Rev. J. E. T. Ewell, M. D., entered into the rest which remaineth to the people of God. Obituary committees were promptly appointed, and have prepared suitable memoirs.

It is gratifying to report that the Conference is in a prosperous condition, as a review of the work will show. The brethren of the ministry have been faithful to the trust committed to them, and they have been supported by the membership of their respective churches with an increasing spirit of liberality and devotion to the cause of Christ and our beloved denomination.

Unsupplied Charges

The only charges left to be supplied were Quantico, Wilton Heights and Wilmington. C. W. Sanderson was released from Campbell and appointed to Quantico. Campbell was supplied during the Seminary vacation by W. W. Marcus, since which time the circuit has been without any supply. Rev. T. R. Woodford has cared for Wilton Heights in connection with his duties as Publishing Agent. Following the custom of the two years previous, the Wilmington church has had the services of Rev. G. L. Wolfe.

Changes

On April 15th, 1910, D. L. Custis was released from Grove Circuit, and on the same day C. W. Bates was placed in charge. On May 24th, 1910, P. D. Davis, a Seminarian, resigned and left Montgomery Circuit. Since then Rev. C. P. Nowlin has preached at Ridgeville, and Rev. H. O. Keen at Mt. Lebanon; while brother Eldridge Mullinix, a local preacher on Lisbon Circuit, has given some attention to Shiloh. This circuit has never been able to properly support a pastor, and it is absolutely necessary at this Conference, that some adjustment be made by which these churchesmay have efficient and permanent pastoral supervision. On December 1st, 1910, at the earnest solicitation of the members of our new church at Milford, and with the consent of Harrington charge, Rev. L. A. Bennett was released from the latter charge and appointed to Milford. This was a radical change to make, but we fully realized its necessity. The resultswhich have followed at Milford have justified the wisdom of this action. On the same day Rev. J. R. Horsey was released from Talbot Circuit, and assigned to Harrington. This left Talbot unsupplied for the balance of the year, except the limited service rendered by Rev. W. H. Litsinger. future of the churches of this circuit is a problem. They are not strong enough in their present condition to support a pastor, and the prospectsfor an increase in the membership is not encouraging. Since the death of our beloved and lamented sister. Miss Sallie M. Leonard, who for yearsliberally sustained the Trappe Church, the situation is even more perplexing. In February Rev. E. P. Perry left the pastorate of Georgetown, Delaware, and on the 20th of the same month I gave him a formal release from this Conference. All the papers bearing on the case are in the handsof the Secretary of this Conference, and can be called for if it is so desired. Rev. L. H. Joslin, a local preacher from Milford, has since filled the pulpit of Georgetown church.

On March 6th, 1911, I received a communication from Rev. Geo. E. Bevans, stating that he wished to withdraw from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Protestant Church, and requested his release. It was forwarded to him and I recommend that his name be stricken from the Conference roll.

In October, 1910, brother A. W. Ewell was released from Frederica to return to the Seminary, and Rev. F. S. Cain was placed in charge of Frederica Church for the balance of the year.

Institutions and Societies

Western Maryland College has experienced another year of prosperity. It has continued to maintain its high standing as one of the foremost institutions of learning in the State. The student enrollment is somewhat

larger than previous years. While the College has passed the experimental stage it still needs the fostering care and support of all Methodist Protestants throughout the Conference. This is particularly true in two things; namely, patronizing it by, as far as practicable, educating our children there, and assisting in securing an endowment which will not only make possible the employment of the most efficient corps of instructors, but guard against disaster in the way of an epidemic, fire, or other casualty. The experience of the College during the present year, though not serious, and the burning of two large institutions of learning in the State in recent months clearly prove the necessity of provision against the consequences of such calamities.

Westminster Theological Seminary

There is no institution in the denomination which commands more interest, or is more essential to the entire church than this school in Westminster, where our young men, called to the Christian ministry, receive training for their great work of life. The Seminary, under the supervision of its efficient president, is growing in the number of students in attendance, and the constant raising of the standard of the curriculum. the successful work this institution is doing for the church there is need of more strongly emphasizing the call to the ministry in the Sunday Schools. Christian Endeavor Societies and in the public congregations; and urging. the people to pray that many of our young men may hear and respond to the call to preach the Gospel. I again direct the attention of the Conference, both to the necessity of raising the Seminary collection in full, and the importance of keeping before our people the Scholarship plan, by which those of means or a local church may educate a young man. The present effort to secure a creditable endowment for the institution is to be heartily commended, and I earnestly present its claims to the serious consideration of those disposing of their property by will, as they can make bequests to no worthier object than to aid in permanently establishing and safeguarding our Theological Seminary. The work of the Board of Ministerial Education is to interest young men in the ministry and provide for their education. We trust that the address of Rev. G. R. Brown, the Corresponding Secretary of this Board, will awaken interest and result in the increase of the number of our theological students.

The Church Home

While the Conference has not measured up to its full responsibility in the support given to this worthy institution, it is gratifying to note the increased interest manifested and the larger contributions made. The plac-

ing of this interest in the list of assessments on the pro rata of one-half of the President's salary will increase the annual income and make its support more certain. The efforts put forth by the Board of Managers through Rev. F. T. Tagg, as agent, has not resulted in securing a sufficient sum to cancel the entire debt incurred in the extensive improvements made last year, but it is gratifying to state a creditable amount has been collected.

Deaconess Movement

While this movement is yet in its infancy in our Conference and denomination, I am pleased to state that some progress is being made. Miss Jefferson, a member of our Cambridge church, is now in the Lutheran Training School in Baltimore preparing for this important work. She is a graduate nurse of Johns Hopkins Hospital, and gives promise of great usefulness to the church. She will be in attendance upon this Conference so that you may have the opportunity of knowing this consecrated young woman. The churches in Baltimore are leading in this movement, and are now organizing Deaconess Circles, but the larger churches especially throughout the Conference, should be identified with this department of modern church work.

President's Parsonage Guild

We have in Baltimore a few noble ladies who have assumed the care of the President's Parsonage. They have by annual dues and other means gathered funds for this purpose. The action of the Conference in seeking to enlist all of the Ladies' Aid Societies by an annual donation of one dollar each is bringing satisfactory results.

The Book Concern

.

Our Book Concern, 316 N. Charles St., Baltimore, has just closed another successful fiscal year. The net gain shows an increase over the preceding year. There is also an increase in the circulation of the Sunday School literature. While the "Methodist Protestant" has a larger subscription list, there is still a deficit in the accounts of the paper. The business in the store is constantly improving, and the outlook in this department is flattering. We now have a most creditable book store, one that our church people should patronize. Those living out of Baltimore can purchase by mall orders, and will receive the most courteous and satisfactory attention."

Missions at the state of the st

This great cause in our denomination is divided into two departments. namely, Home and Foreign Missions. The work of the Home Board has in recent years grown in prominence, and is being more generally recognized as a means by which our church may be established in cities and sections in this country where we can advance Evangelical Christianity under the banner of a representative Methodism. After eleven years of personal membership on this Board and close relation with every phase of its work. I have no hesitancy in stating that the importance of this cause should strongly appeal to the Maryland Conference, and elicit from it a very hearty support. The Maryland Conference has received aid from this sourcein planting new churches within its bounds. In the last decade our contributions to this worthy cause have steadily increased, but we have not by any means reached the maximum of responsibility and duty in this re-The present Secretary and Treasurer, Rev. C. H. Beck, will be inattendance at this Conference. He will find a hearty welcome among us, and I am confident his presentation of this important interest will be informing and stimulating, and I bespeak for him the cordial support of our Conference in carrying out the plans of the Board he represents.

John C. Mott in his latest work declares that the present is the decisive hour for Christian Missions. In the history of Christianity there has never been such a remarkable conjunction of opportunities and crises as at the present. He further says, in substance, the greatest question of the present age is the future of the nations of the East. Those nations are passing from the old to the new, and everywhere they are looking to the West for guidance. The christian religion is the most essential thing in. our civilization, but the danger is that those nations may not recognize this. They may accept the results of our religion in industrial, educational, governmental, and social development without applying the basic principle of our greatness and progress; that is, adopting our civilization without accepting our religion. We therefore recognize the absolute necessity of the church awakening to the importance of the hour and putting on her strength for the spread of the Gospel, and for winning the world to our Divine Lord. We all rejoice that never before in the history of the Christian church has there been such an intense and widespread interest in Foreign Missions as at the present time. It is the period when world-wideevangelization is commanding the thought and energies of the church asis manifested by more generous offering and sympathetic study of the conditions and prospects of this great enterprise in the churches of rural sec-". - 2 fd" tions as well as in those of the cities.

In the prosecution of this great cause the Laymen's Missionary Movement is proving itself to be a most successful and efficient agency in arousing the church to a sense of its privileges and responsibilities. This movement was organized in 1906 in New York. It is not a Missionary society to collect or distribute funds. Its aim is to interest laymen, and lead them to recognize and accept their responsibility in promoting Foreign Missions in their own denomination. Recently several prominent laymen of Baltimore have presented this movement to a number of our city churches in each of which a Men's Missionary Committee was appointed to make a thorough canvass of the entire membership for weekly contributions to Foreign Missions. It has been demonstrated that the introduction of this movement in local churches has resulted in increasing the revenue for local needs as well as for general interests. We recommend the prosecution of this work throughout the district in harmony with the action of last Conference.

Rev. F. C. Klein is faithfully applying himself to calling the church to a more complete consecration of itself to this important and far-reaching work. Our Conference, according to the best information secured, for the year now closing has raised, \$2,076.00 more for Foreign Missions than last year. While this is encouraging it should inspire us to do far more in the ensuing year. The Maryland Branch, and the Washington and Alexandria Branch of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society have both been active during the year. The contributions to the Maryland Branch are \$1,000.00 in advance of last year. The amount above named does not include the entire sum for the reason that all the charges have not been heard from. The offerings made by a few of our churches are worthy of special notice. Newark, including a special contribution of \$1,000.00 as a memorial to Mr. Gaven Spence, has given \$1,159.00. The offering from St. Johns is \$750.00, West Baltimore \$744.00, North Baltimore \$927.00, Buckeystown \$501.00, Alnutt Memorial \$300.00, and Rhode Island Avenue \$464.00.

Our Young People's Work

This has been the banner year in our Conference for the great interests committed to the Board of Young People's Work, which deals especially with the young life of the church. The wisdom of the proposed consolidation of the Christian Endeavor Union and the Sunday Schools has been fully proved by the very successful convention which convened at the Hampden church, and the rallies held in other localities in which representatives of both departments participated. While it is more difficult to reach our young people in the country churches than in the centres of population, an earnest and systematic effort should be made to have them actively identified with this great movement. The President, Rev. F. T. Benson, has energetically devoted himself to the duties of his office, and he should have the hearty support of the entire Conference in carrying forward his plans for the further enlargement of these vital interests.

The Board's Corresponding Secretary, Rev. C. H. Hubbel, has rendered valuable service in our midst by his counsel and public addresses, and he will have the sympathy and co-operation of the Conference in his efforts to increase the efficiency of the Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor societies of the church.

Building and Improvements.

. . .

The Conference year has been characterized by the erection of a number of churches and parsonages, and the improvement of properties. following churches have either been completed or are in course of construction: Georgetown, Delaware; Christ Church, Baltimore; Cherrydale; First Church, Newark; Brookeville on Howard Circuit; Parksley and Hunting Creek on Parksley Charge; Selbyville and Williamsville on Selbyville circuit; Mt. Pleasant, and Starr. The new church at Georgetown is a brick structure with three rooms, and cost \$6,000.00. It is a remarkably fine building for that amount, and will meet the needs of the congregation for years to come. Our friends of Christ Church, have challenged the admiration of the entire Conference by their faith, energy, and liberality. have assumed heavy responsibilities in the erection of a large two-story stone church now nearing completion, and costing \$22,000.00. They are a united, enthusiastic company of Christians, and will triumph in their great undertaking. At Cherrydale the main building is now being added and will be finished by June. The outlay will be \$4,000.00. This insures the future of this church in a rapidly growing suburb of Washington, D. C. The beautiful church at Newark, N. J. is being completed by the erection of the audience room at a cost of \$40,000.00. The entire property, including parsonage, will have an actual value of \$85,000.00, and will not only be one of the finest churches in the denomination, but is so eligibly located in a splendid residential section of the city that its future is exceedingly promising. The Brookeville church is an attractive two-room frame building valued at \$4,000.00. The new church at Parksley, which takes the place of the one destroyed by fire eighteen months ago, is nearly ready for occupancy. It is a brick structure, modern in architecture, and complete in all of its appointments. The cost, including pipe organ, will be \$17,250. Hunting Creek, on the same charge, will soon be ready for dedication. It is a frame church with audience and Sunday School rooms, and cost \$5,000. The contract for Greenbush church, on Accomac circuit, has been given and the work begun. The amount needed to complete the building is \$2,400. After overcoming many discouragements the people of Selbyville have the joy of seeing both the Selbyville and the Williamsville churches so near completion that they are now used for worship. The former will cost \$6,000.00 and the latter \$850.00. Mt. Pleasant mission has been permanently established by the purchase of a lot in a growing section of Washingtone. The price paid was \$8,750.00. While this is a large outlay of money, it has a house on one part, the rent of which pays a large portion . of the interest, and later can be used for a parsonage. A \$1,000.00 port-w able church has been placed upon the lot, and already a fine Sunday School and congregation have been gathered. Our people in Washington, familiar with the location, have great confidence in its future development. entire Conference has been interested in the transition taking place in Starr church, by which the restrictions, which for so many years impeded its progress, have been removed. Upon the site purchased last year in Walbrook, one of the beautiful suburbs of Baltimore, where many Methodist Protestants are already located, the congregation has built a commodious. stone charel costing \$15,000.00, exclusive of the ground, which will be : opened in a few weeks. They are also preparing to build a parsonage adjoining. As soon as the old church is sold, the auditorium will be added: This is destined to become one of the strongest and most aggressive churches in the Conference. There is great rejoicing among our people of Laurel, Delaware, at the prospect of having, by another Conference, a new church building the approximate cost of which is not less than \$20,000.00. now have \$9,000.00 in cash and reliable subscriptions, and will begin work at an early date. The church at Salem has been so enlarged, improved, and beautified that it is now a very attractive house of worship. The amount spent on these improvements was \$2,200.00. Federalsburg has improved its property by erecting a Sunday School room at an expense of \$1,500.00, which is a valuable addition to its equipment, and incidentally increases the comfort and convenience of the Conference at this session. The church at Claiborne, purchased from the Methodist Episcopal Church, has been deeded to the trustees of St. Michaels' congregation, and is now an appointment on that charge. The indications are that it may become the centre of a new charge in that part of Talbot County. Grant Memorial church, on Accomac circuit, has been moved to Tasley, a growing railroad town, and thoroughly renovated to the extent of \$1,000.00. St. Lukes has been successful in cancelling its second mortgage, which amounted to \$4,000.00, leaving no indebtedness on this splendid property other than the second mortgage. The improvements made to Sandy Mount, Finksburg circuit, aggregating \$1,165.00, make this now a very comfortable church. Oxford has raised on improvements \$1,100.00. The congregation is planning for the moving of the building with extensive changes during the coming year. Keen Memorial has secured on improvements and debt \$1,500.00. Fawn Grove has completed the payment of its church debt of \$1,166.00, and is now laying plans for a new parsonage. Lynchburg has wined out all debts on the city church, which amounted to \$1,050.00. Hurlock has reduced its debt another \$1,000.00. Delmar has paid on debt and improvements \$1,700.00. The balance of debt on this church is now \$5,500.00. Whatever may be said about the wisdom of the improvements. here made, the debt is there and must be met. I commend this church to the Conference, it needs your sympathy and assistance. The improvements on Pipe Creek amounted to \$700.00, while those on Potoman aggregated \$550.00. Salisbury has reduced its debt \$1,600.00. You will be glad to hear that \$2,000.00 of the debt on Elizabeth property has been paid, and plans are in operation for still further reduction for the ensuing year. Towson, on Baltimore circuit, has paid another \$1,000.00 on its debt while . the circuit elsewhere has made improvements amounting to \$1,500.00. Cambridge reports having raised \$1,000.00 on improvements. has cancelled its debt of \$1,000.00. The balance on improvements on Berea church, New Church circuit, amounting to \$800.00 was recently secured. Cumberland has its first installment of \$800.00 on parsonage debt Improvements made to the church property on New Market circuit amounted to \$700.00. Seaford has in hand \$2,075.00 for improvements which include the installation of a pipe organ. North Carolina Avenue will reduce its debt another \$1,000.00. Buckeystown has built a new sexton's house at an expense of \$2,000.00 and added other improvements amounting to \$250.00, making a total of \$2,250.00. Eutaw has lessened its debt by the payment of \$1,100.00 during the year. First Church, Washington, has begun cancelling its debt by the payment of \$1,000.00. Greenwood has secured on debts and improvements \$625.00. Improvements at Pocomoke City have been made to the extent of \$719.00. The purchasing of the ground of Bethany Church, Baltimore, was an excellent year's work for that church. This achievement has greatly encouraged the congregation. Everything about the church has taken on new life. With the aid of the Conference, and the further support of the city churches a new building can be erected which will give prestige and insure the future of this organization. St. Paul's mission has made some progress during the year. There is a Sunday School of 95 scholars and a church membership of 18. They have raised within the congregation \$500.00 for all purposes. It will need the fostering care of the Conference for several years. earnestly hope that some plans may be adopted by which a permanent building can be secured. Wilton Heights has had a year of success in every department of its work. The Sabbath School has increased in numbers, the church membership has grown, a creditable sum has been raised on debt and the membership has assumed the responsibility of \$300.00 on pastor's salary for the coming year.

The old parsonage at Lisbon has been sold and a very large and substantial house has been erected at Poplar Springs. The pastor's family will now have the advantages of their own church association. The cost of the new parsonage is \$4,780.00. It has water, bath, and steam heat. There are two acres of fertile ground attached. It will in every way be a most desirable home. Conquest has purchased in the town of Hallwood, a very comfortable property for parsonage purposes. The price paid was

\$1,800.00. Violetville has purchased a lot for a new parsonage for \$550.00, and ds preparing to build a house having all modern conveniences. Caroline has changed the location of its parsonage to the town of Hobbs. They have secured a lot and are now building a beautiful home for their pastor. Whaleyville will soon have their parsonage completed. The cost will be \$1,400.00 of which \$880.00 has been raised. St. Michaels raised \$800.00 on debt.

Church Extension

During the four years of incumbency in office I have earnestly endeavored to create sentiment, awaken interest, and to put into active operation plans for the advancement of this department of our church activities. I have therefore, particularly emphasized this important subject in every one of the pulpits I have entered this year, with the result that, to some extent at least, the church has been aroused. The perpetuation of the Conference, and the development of all local and general interests depend upon our entering new fields, organizing new societies and building new churches. The rapid increase in our population, particularly in the towns and cities, creates a demand for men and means with which to project new church enterprises far beyond our ability to supply. In order to still further enlarge our operations, the standard to be attained by the Conference for this assessment should be at least \$20,000.00. That this is not visionary and that it is attainable, I cite you the work of our five Washington churches. They raised \$2,000.00 during the year for Church Extension in the District of Columbia in addition to meeting all their local expenses and Conference assessments. Their Church Extension Society has had the oversight of, and nobly supported the Mt. Pleasant mission. Further proof of this is found in the fact that the Baltimore City Church Extension Society has paid hundreds of dollars to local church extension work, and in addition to this \$2,165.00 was contributed for the purchase of the Bethany church ground, which, while not secured directly by the society's efforts, was nevertheless largely given by our Baltimore churches, and evidences the marked interest in Church Extension which exists among our people in that city. It is clearly evident from this, that with equal interest and liberality on the part of other churches of the Conference, this standard can be attained within a reasonable time. Perhaps the greatest work in the history of this Conference in the way of Church Extension, as far as immediate results are concerned, is that of Milford, Delaware, where in six months there have been more than 600 conversions, nearly four hundred accessions, the organization of a Sunday School of 350 scholars and teachers, the raising of \$3,000.00, the comfortable supporting of a pastor and preparations for at once beginning the erection of a substantial church. I have avoided the use of names in this report but feel fully justified, in this instance, of mentioning Rev. L. A. Bennett who, during this long period, has labored incessantly in revival services with the result that our church is now permanently established in the town of Milford. The church was organized in October last, and has been recognized by the Quarterly Conference of Harrington church. The delegate elect, Mr. Richardson, is in attendance upon this Conference. I recommend that this church be received by and placed upon the list of charges. Fairview Heights at Lynchburg, Virginia, is another result of Church Extension efforts, and here also God has honored the labor of his servants that a hundred souls have been awakened from a sinful life and brought into that new organization. This revival gives this church a bright future. I wish to call the attention of the Conference to the fact that while on the Eastern Shore, including Delaware and Accomac County, Virginia, and in Baltimore and Washington great efforts are being put forth in Church Extension and the denomination is rapidly growing, we are not aggressively prosecuting this work as we should in that section occupied by this Conference west of Baltimore and Washington. This field may not seem at first inviting and hopeful as in parts of the district I have just named, and yet there are growing towns and cities on the great railroads and electric lines leading westward which we should seek to occupy. The railroad towns between Baltimore and Washington are steadily growing while new towns are being projected. It is thought, by those who are well informed, that there is now a favorable opening for a Methodist Protestant church at Tacoma Park, on the Metropolitan Branch of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad. Hagerstown, Maryland, and Martinsburg, West Virginia, are increasing their population by the thousands and are rapidly opening new residential sections. I spent a day in Martinsburg last summer and was convinced that if money had been in hand a lot should have been secured at once as there were several substantial men ready to join the movement. I trust that the emphasizing of this will result in the Conference giving serious consideration to the needs of this large and important territory and that new enterprises may be eventually established therein. What has been accomplished in Cumberland is indicative of what may be done at other points with similar faith, zeal, and perseverance. At the last session of this Conference formal action was taken authorizing the President of the Conference to appoint one of its members as Conference Church Extension Evangelist, if in his judgment such a man was available. While I have been in full sympathy with this new departure, on account of the scarcity of ministers, I have not found it possible to comply with this action without leaving some important charge without a pastor. This I have not felt justified in doing. During the year I received from Mr. T. Pliny Fisher a check for \$250.00, the net proceeds due the Conference from the sale of Ridgely church. In the effort made to secure \$2,165.00 with which to purchase the ground of Bethany church, when the payment had to be made and the amount contributed was conditional that all the money should actually be in hand, I assumed the responsibility of using \$173.18 of this amount for this purpose. It was an emergency which had to be met. I respectfully ask the Conference to approve of my action and I will pay the balance, \$76.82, to Mr. T. Harry Bartlett, the treasurer of the Church Extension Society.

We, as a Conference, have reason to again lift our hearts in grateful praise to God that he has owned and blessed our ministry during the year in the conversion of 2930 persons, 2596 of whom have united with us in church fellowship. The increase in property valuations has been \$155,280.00. The actual amount raised in cash was \$88,195.00. During the year twenty-eight charges have made an advance in pastors' salaries amounting to \$3,116.00 and for the ensuing year fourteen report an increase of \$1.680.00.

The record of the past four years shows, among other gratifying results, the following: Conversions 12010, accessions 10507, increase in pastors' salaries \$16,249.00, and increases in property valuations \$383,943.00. Furthermore, our statistics of the last twenty years show that the church membership has increased more than 10,000 and the property interests have been enhanced \$1,456,613.00, more than half the total value of the property of the Conference. The entire amount raised for General Interests has advanced from \$11,172.00 to \$30,000.00 not including the special offering of \$10,000.00 last year to the Superannuated Fund. While I have made no exact calculations I fully believe that with the actual money invested in property holdings, and the amount expended to carry on the work of the Conference we are doing as much, if not more, per capita and per dollar, than any other denomination engaged in similar work in the same territory.

In view of our origin, our history and our progress as a church, I believe we are called upon to maintain tenaciously and uncompromisingly our cardinal principles, because it is evident that a representative Methodism has still a mission to the people of this great Republic who share incommon the rich heritage of liberty and equality.

Praying that the God of all Grace may direct us in our deliberations and bless us in all our labors for the extension of His Kingdom, I am,

Report F

Church Extension

OF THE COMMITTEE

Your Committee on Church Extension submits the following report:

We recommend that the same assessment, six thousand two hundred dollars, be levied upon the Conference district for Church Extension.

The reports of the Baltimore City and of the District of Columbia Church Extension Societies referred to us have been carefully considered and we are gratified at the marked progress these reports show.

We recommend the adoption of these reports, except such items as relate to the appropriation of money to the various charges mentioned. These requests have been considered in detail in another part of this report.

We have carefully examined the report of the Treasurer of this Society and find it correct.

Boundaries

We recommend:

1st, That the request from Campbell Circuit for the sale of certain church property be granted; and that the President of the Conference be requested to take the matter in charge.

2nd, That Mt. Olivet be detached from Fawn Grove and be attached to Mt. Nebo Circuit.

3rd, That Milford, Delaware, be recognized as a charge in this Conference to be known as Milford, and that Central appointment be detached from Harrington Circuit and attached to Milford, and that the charge be known as Milford Circuit.

4th, That Patapsco, (Carroll Co.), be recognized as an appointment of this Conference.

5th, That Linthicum Heights be recognized as an appointment of this Conference and that it be attached to Nichol's Memorial Circuit.

6th, That Ridgeville appointment of Montgomery Circuit be attached to Lisbon Circuit; and that Mt. Lebanon appointment of Montgomery Circuit be attached to Kemptown Circuit; that Shiloh and Bethel churches of

Montgomery Circuit be placed in the hands of the President of the Conference for disposition.

In reference to the Linthicum Heights Church we recommend that the President of the Conference appoint a committee to advise with the pastor in regard to the building of the church.

We recommend that a Committee be appointed to act with the President of the Conference in the management of the affairs of the First Church, Wilmington, and that the President of the Conference supply the charge if in his judgment it is wise to do so.

We recommend that the President and the pastors of the Conference call attention to the importance of our Church Extension work, with the view to an increase of contribution for this interest.

We recommend that the President of the Conference appoint one layman (the delegate if preferable) on each charge to call the attention of each charge to the great blessing of God upon the people of Milford, Delaware, in the bringing into the Kingdom of God of so many souls, and to ask them to make a contribution towards the building of a new church at that point this Conference year.

Report H

Of the Committee on Literature and Education

I. LITERATURE.

Your Committee takes pleasure in calling attention to the fact that the Baltimore Book Directory reports a net gain for the year of over seventeen hundred dollars, which is the largest gain ever reported for any year's work. We congratulate the efficient Agent, Brother T. R. Woodford, upon the showing made, and we feel sure that the future of our Directory is bright with the promise of even better results. We note with gratification, also, that there has been no falling off in the number of subscribers to the "Methodist Protestant". On the other hand, a small gain over last year is reported. It is the opinion of your committee that some concerted effort should be made to increase the subscription list of the Church paper by at least a thousand new subscribers. An increased patronage of the paper will greatly aid the Editor in his efforts to make the "Protestant" of greater value to the denomination. We also urge upon our people the necessity of a more liberal patronage of the Book Department connected with the Directory.

II. COLLEGE

We have read with great interest the report of the President of Western Maryland College. Dr. Lewis is completing his twenty-fifth year as President of the College. The progress of this institution has been constant from the very beginning, and during President Lewis' administration marvellous results have been achieved. We have a great school at Westminster, and the greatness of that institution is due, in very large measure, to the extrordinary executive and administrative ability of Dr. Lewis. We felicitate the Church upon the grand results of Western Maryland College, and Dr. Lewis upon the fruits of his great labors.

The attendance at the school is larger than last year, but we urge upon the pastors and laymen of this Conference a greater zeal in securing new students for this school. The College has accommodations for a larger student roll, and the superior facilities offered ought to secure, with the more active co-operation of the friends of the College, a larger list of students.

We call attention to the need of a greater endowment for the College. During the past year the need of such increased endowment was emphasized as never before. A slight outbreak of scarlet fever forced the closing of the school for a short while. It is easy to see what a heavy loss would have been entailed upon the College if the epidemic had been more severe than it was. The question of endowment is a pressing question; certainly the need of an endowment commensurate with the standing of the institution, and the work it is doing and hopes to continue to do, must be apparent to every real friend of the College. We congratulate the President and Faculty upon their judicious handling of the situation this year during the weeks of anxiety. The conduct of the College authorities in this critical time met with the heartiest favor among all the friends and patrons of the institution.

III. SEMINARY

The continued prosperity of the Westminster Theological Seminary is a source of gratification to the entire denomination. Under the splendid management of President Elderdice this institution is moving forward with rapid strides, and is doing a great work for the denomination. The question of endowment is receiving attention here also. The work of securing an endowment sufficient for the growing needs of the Seminary is receiving the careful attention of President Elderdice. Plans are being outlined which will meet with the approval and, we trust, the hearty support of the entire Church, and especially of the Maryland Annual Conference.

We recommend that the same assessment as last year be levied upon the district, and H. L. Elderdice be assigned as President for the ensuing year. Respectfully submitted,

OF THE BALTIMORE BOOK DIRECTORY

As shown by our business statement for the fiscal year ending Feb. 28, 1911, there has been a healthy growth in every department of our work.

We fully appreciate the splendid work done in the interest of our church paper and also of our Book Concern, by many of our pastors and laymen.

There were 756 new subscribers to the "Methodist Protestant" secured in various ways during the year. We regret that in the same length of time, 674 discontinued the paper. However, there are 82 more subscribers on our list than there were a year ago, and while our loss on the publication of the paper the past year was \$359.87, that amount is \$319.26 less than it was the preceding year. We appeal to our people not only to continue the effort to secure new subscribers, but also to help us to hold those already secured, since this favorable report anticipates and depends upon our maintaining our present list during the ensuing year.

We regret to have to report \$172.00 charged against our Profit and Loss Account because of customers' accounts which we were unable to collect.

Our statement shows a profit in the Sunday School Department of \$1268.35, and in the Merchandise Department, a profit of \$1514.68, from which after deducting the loss items, we have an actual net gain for the year of \$1743.05, which is the largest gain yet reported for a single year's work at our Book Concern.

Because of the splendid increase in our book and general supply business, we feel that our enlarged store, with its greatly increased and varied stock, has proved to be a wise move; and we feel sure that with the proper attention, this department of our business will soon become a fine source of revenue to our denomination. We trust that our people everywhere both in the ministry and in the laity will ever bear in mind the fact that our Baltimore Book Concern can supply whatever may be needed in the prosecution of church work in every department; even though the supplies may be advertised by other publishers, our own agent can furnish the goods, our people having to pay no more for the same, and the dealer's profits will go to the capital of our Book Concern.

OF THE PRESIDENT OF WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE

April 5th, 1911.

To the Maryland Annual Conference.

Dear Brethren:—I have the pleasure of presenting once more a report of my work as a member of this Conference in connection with Western Maryland College. I have with this report completed a service of twenty-five years, as President of the College so far as my Conference appointment is concerned. It is a time when it would be natural to dwell on what has been accomplished in that long period; but it would not give the Conference any new information, since the work has been reported from year to year; and so much remains to be done that I prefer rather to point out our duty in the immediate future.

We have had an anxious year. For the first time in the history of the College it became necessary to close the school and send the students home on account of an outbreak of scarlet fever. It did not prove to be disastrous to us, for only a few students were affected and none seriously. so that we resumed work and will be able to cover the usual studies notwithstanding the loss of three weeks. But the event brought us with alarming emphasis to the consideration of such situations. And we were forced to confess that we are not provided for such emergencies. We have secured a small endowment fund. It now amounts to \$67,000. But the income of this fund would not pay our teachers' salaries for one month in the lossof other revenue. And the principal of it would not restore one-fifth of the buildings we now possess if they should be destroyed by fire, as twoother Colleges in Maryland have been destroyed this year. It is manifest, therefore, that our immediate duty is to increase this fund to an amount which will protect us in case our next call spells disaster. The ordinary increase of this fund by adding the interest to the principal as we have been doing, and by adding the Conference collection every year, would give us a hundred thousand dollars in about eight more years. But this is far too slow and too small a growth. It certainly would seem to be time for us to be remembered by those who dispose of their fortune by will, and the importance of the interest ought to awaken the generosity of the living, to enable us not only to provide against disaster but to make the College as efficient as it ought to be in the present.

The attendance this year has been larger than last year; and yet our capacity has not been taxed. When it is considered that we have the lowest rate of charges among all the Colleges of the State; and that our facilities both educational and domestic are as good as any, it seems strange that we do not attract a still larger attendance. Size is not to be too eagerly strained after, I know, but we could readily provide for 300 students and we ought to have that many. I earnestly solicit the help of pastors in the important work of bringing the College to the favorable attention of those in their several communities who are about to enter College.

These appear to me the two great beacons to success in the education-There are those here to al work we have undertaken at Westminster. whom this is of more importance than it is to me, for my course is so nearly run that I cannot hope to realize much farther the development of this interest. But it seems to me indisputable that they who will carry it farther must travel this road. But I am not unmindful of the fact that there are other matters of importance in this connection. We have a great property at Westminster. Its value is greater to us than its very considerable cost. It has provided and still provides excellent facilities for College work. But it is also not to be forgotten that we are constantly growng away from this property. It will not be long before other and better and larger buildings will be needed. Indeed even now we feel the need of an adequate recitation building, something much better than we have ever had. We must be prepared to spend money for this and for other purposes of physical improvement as the years go by.

Then we must increase the efficiency of our teaching. More teachers and better paid teachers; a larger equipment of educational apparatus; perhaps the addition of altogether new departments; and certainly the intensive improvement of what we have, must go steadily forward. For a College, a live College is a growth, and not a crystal, and it is always true that.

May the future find us prepared and capable. The great good already accomplished for the Church by this institution is not worthy to be compared to that which awaits those who prove faithful to this great opportunity.

Brother Caleb Freeland, who has been maintaining a \$100 Scholarship for several years, die last December. The vacancy has been filled by Wilbur W. Hubbard, of Chestertown, Md., who has founded a Free Scholarship as a Memorial to his mother, Josephine Hubbard—an elect lady, long and well known as one of our most loyal, liberal, and consecrated Methodist Protestants. St. Paul's Church, Inwood, N. Y., has also entered the list of free scholarships for this year.

In the report of the President of the Conference adopted at the last session, are these words: "While the Seminary has always had the hearty endorsement and support of this Conference the time is upon us when steps should be taken toward securing a creditable endowment. It is to be hoped that the way will soon be opened for some definite steps to be taken in this direction." The Committee on Literature and Education at the same session reported: "We hope that the time has come when our people are willing and ready to concur in the recommendation made by the Board of Governors, urging our people to plan 'for the permanency and higher efficiency of our Theological Seminary by increasing its Endowment Fund, both by immediate gifts and future legacies.'"

In harmony with these deliverances a summer campaign was made in North Carolina to secure three thousand dollars, twenty-five hundred of which was pledged, and the remaining five hundred is expected next vacation. This money will build a house on the campus for one of the professors, and its rent will be income from that much of the invested fund. In view of this work in the South, the President of the Seminary had no time to begin the campaign in Maryland until November 27th, since which time he has been able to visit only thirteen churches, which responded liberally and cheerfully. Plans have been made to continue the campaign until every charge in the district shall have been visited, and as soon as final reports are in shape they will be published in the minutes.

The Board of Governors desires to express its keen appreciation of the readiness and generosity which it has always met at the hands of the Maryland Conference, and its highest ambition is to continue to conduct the Seminary in such a manner as to meet not only the constant approval of its brethren at home, but throughout the entire denomination.

The Board respectfully requests that the same assessment as last year be levied upon the district and that H. L. Elderdice be assigned as President for the ensuing year.

Praying that great grace may be upon you all, and that the blessing of the Great Head of the Church may seal the deliberations of this session,

Report I

OF COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

Your Committee on Young People's Work submits the following report:—

We have received a letter from the Executive Committee of the Young People's Union of Christian Endeavor of the Conference requesting a change in its Constitution so as to include the Sunday Schools in its work. We heartly concur in this request, and recommend that the Conference grant it.

The wisdom of instituting the Board of Young People's Work becomes more and more evident as the purpose of the Board and the scope of the work are more clearly understood and appreciated. Splendid results have already been accomplished in the organization of a hundred or more teacher training classes; in rejuvenating many weak and discouraged Christian Endeavor Societies and Unions—and in promoting a bond of fellowship among the young people of the denomination.

Sunday School Work

The action of the Conference in placing the Sunday Schools under the supervision of the Conference Board of Young People's Work, we believe, will prove a step in the right direction. Not only will the conventions draw a larger number of workers together but a greater degree of cooperation and interdependence will naturally result, producing that unity of sympathy and purpose which will guarantee the largest measure of success.

We urge upon all the Sunday Schools of the district the importance of getting into touch with the Board of Young People's Work immediately, and of giving their methods and plans most earnest consideration. All

needed helps may be obtained for the asking from our Board.

The training our children are receiving in the public schools demands thoroughly equipped teachers in the Sunday School. The children notice the difference between the readiness with which the school teacher meets their inquiries and the confusion of the Sunday School teacher who has not carefully studied the lesson—when questioned concerning some point of interest to the child. Such a teacher embarrasses the situation by evading the question and offends the intelligence of the child. If it is proper that no teacher who has not carefully prepared the lesson should attempt to teach the class—it is also imperative that that teacher should have every help and encouragement in the preparation of the lesson. The pastors are in a position to appreciate the purpose and necessity of the teacher training class—as others cannot be—and upon them must devolve the task of wisely pressing the matter until every teacher sees the need of greater efficiency if they would have larger results.

We emphasize what was said in the report on Young People's Work last year in regard to graded schools. The day of the good-enought Sunday School is past. We must face the fact that the best possible Sunday School is none too good in which to teach and train our children for Christ. His "Suffer them to come to me" has a new significance when we remember that the boy and girl have at last come into their own. It is very important that all teacher training classes be enrolled with the Board of Young People's Work.

The pastor's reports show the following gratifying condition of the Sunday Schools. There are 283 schools, with an enrollment of 30,501 scholars and 3691 officers and teachers. There were 4205 new scholars added during the year.

Christian Endeavor

It ought not to be necessary to call attention again to the C. E. Society as an indispensable adjunct to every up-to-date and progressive church. But the fact that so many churches throughout the district have no Societies demands a reiteration of what was said on this subject last year—"Only can it, the C. E. Society, become a great power as it is made a large factor in our church development." It offers the best opportunity the church has to give its young people, for developing their talents and possibilities. The crowning achievement of the Conference C. E. Union up to this time is the successful effort to maintain our own Missionary in the field, Rev. L. Laymen, known as the Maryland Conference C. E. Missionary. Every Society should feel an interest in this special work and rejoice in the honor and privilege of having a Missionary of their own in the field.

Will not the pastors urge the importance of this work upon the attention of their Societies immediately after their return to their charges?

The next Denominational C. E. Union Convention will be held in Columbus, Ohio, May 25-28. We have three new churches there and everything will be done to make this the best convention ever held by the Union. It is hoped that a large number will go from the Maryland Conference Unions.

The International C. E. Union Convention will be held in Atlantic City, July 6-12, 1911. This will be the greatest gathering of Christian Young People during the year. Many of the leading missionaries, preachers and leaders of the world will be brought together, and we trust many of our ministers and young people may be able to attend.

We have at this time, 131 Societies, with a total of 5363 members. The amount contributed by these Societies to Missions was the splendid sum of \$1,104.00. The spiritual condition of societies can only be rightly estimated by spiritual results. The reports show 284 conversions during the year. There are 75 Jr. C. E. Societies with 3019 members.

We respectfully offer the following recommendations. Most of them were offered last year, but their importance makes it imperative that they be included in this report.

- That the pasters be urged to bring before the teacher's associations
 of the schools on his charge the advantage of the grading of the Schools,
 specially advocating the Beginners' and Adult Departments, and the Teacher training classes.
- 2. That one offering a year from our Sunday Schools be given to the Board; and that whenever possible the program furnished free by the Board be used by our Schools in the Rally Day Service.
- 3. That the pastors urge their Endeavor Societies to contribute at least \$1.00 annually to the support of our Conference Union; and to respond to the request of the Board, which asks for an annual contribution averaging 5 cents per member. For the support of our missionary, Rev. L. Layman, we earnestly urge the pastors to see that their Societies contribute to this cause.

Report K

Of the Committee on Moral Reform

Your Committee on Moral Reform begs leave to report:—
The increasing violations of the sanctity of the Sabbath are justly arousing Christian people to inaugurate measures to preserve and protect it against heartless commercialism and godless pleasure seekers. In our

cities and towns there is a growing tendency to open shops, stores, saloons and places of amusements under all sorts of pretext in utter disregard of the Holy Sabbath day, and this is coming to be a National shame. Hundreds of shops, stores, moving picture shows and theaters are in full blast on the Sabbath day enticing the young, and catering to the pleasure seeking crowd, to the intemperate, the debauched and idle classes and thereby neutralizing the efforts of all moral and religious forces. We therefore heartily endorse the efforts of "The Lord's Day Alliance" to promote the better observance of the Sabbath day, and commend the organization to our people throughout the Conference district.

This organization has chosen Dr. J. W. Hering, one of the delegates to this Conference, as a vice-president, and Mr. W. O. Atwood and W. M. Jett of Baltimore, on its executive committee, and these have agreed to serve. The Alliance asks the President of this Conference to appoint a minister and a layman of our church from each county in Maryland to co-operate in the work of promoting the sanctity of the Sabbath day and we recommend that this be done.

The federal Council of the Churches of America, at its last meeting, unanimously declared "its conviction that war was an evil and that Christian Nations should determine by obligatory arbitration the international differences which cannot be settled by diplomacy. For Christian nations in the twentieth century to refuse to arbitrate and to insist on war will bring reproach on the Christian name." In the providence of God an opportunity has come for the churches to voice this declaration in their united approval of the proposal looking to a general arbitration treaty between the United States, Great Britain and other nations.

We recommend that the efforts of President Taft, his Secretary of State, and the Hon. James Brice, Ambassador from England to this country, to effect such a treaty be commended and endorsed by this Conference and that we hereby earnestly request our representatives in the United States Senate to vote for its ratification after it shall have been brought before them. We also recommend that a committee of three be appointed to present these resolutions to the President of the United States with the assurance that the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, composed of three hundred ministers and delegates, gives its heartiest endorsement and support to the ratification of such a treaty.

We also recommend that copies of these resolutions be sent to each of the United States Senators from Maryland, Delaware, and New Jersey.

Officers of the Federal Council of the Churches of America have organized a local council for Baltimore and the State of Maryland, the object of which is to unite the churches in broad and important current questions, such as temperance, Sabbath observance, the Sunday newspaper, the suppression of vice, the race track gambling, the white slave trade, amicable relations between capital and labor, and other civic virtues, and such

problems as require denominational activity and unity to reform and improve. We recommend the endorsement of this Council in Maryland, and suggest that our ministers and churches work in harmony with it in so far as it can be made to serve great moral and religious ends.

The Temperance question grows in importance with the passing years. It is a question that can never be settled until it is settled right, and it can never be settled right until the traffic is forever abolished. It is perhaps needless to do more than to re-affirm the action of this Conference in previous years, and to put ourselves on record as in hearty cooperation with the Anti-Saloon-League and other organizations whose specific purpose is to prevent the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

And yet we rould be untrue to ourselves if we did not protest against voting for men who work for the liquor interests; and against the methods which are employed by liquor people to break down temperance laws; and against the shipment of liquors into dry territory; and against the organization of clubs whose chief aim is to evade temperance laws; and the iniquity which would entice men, young and old, into liquor saloons and beer gardens for the purpose of political campaigning. Surely no candidate needs to gather crowds into such places to ventilate his political views and doctrines. Clean politics do not need the aid of saloons in promoting their interests.

Benevolent Agencies

OF THE COMMITTEE

The Committee on Benevolent Agencies submits the following:

We have examined the annual reports of the Board of Managers and the Board of Lady Visitors of our Church Home. There are, at this time, fifteen inmates of the Home and, with the Matron and her assistants, seventeen to be provided for. The expenses of conducting the institution for the past year amount to \$1635.40. The affairs have been conducted judiciously and economically. Your Committee is of the opinion that when all the amounts from assessments for this important benevolence are received from this Conference, in addition to special donations, the Home will be adequately supported. We recommend a continuance of the assessment of \$1500.00 for the ensuing year.

An indebtedness on the new building of \$4550.00 was reported at the last Conference. This has been reduced to \$3883.58. The churches and individuals throughout the Conference district should generously respond

to the appeals of the Board and pay this amount in full during the coming year. We most earnestly commend this interest to the generosity of all our people.

We recommend that regulation VII, item 1, be stricken out and the following inserted: Each Charge shall appoint a lady visitor for the benefit of the Church Home, consistent with the charter of the institution.

OF BOARD OF MANAGERS, OUR CHURCH HOME

To the Maryland Annual Conference,

Dear Brethren:—The Board of Managers submits herewith its report of the condition of the Church Home, for the Conference year just closed, showing a balance in the Church Home Treasury, proper, of \$836.54.

We have admitted to the Home 4 persons during the year, and have now in the institution 12 women and 3 men, giving us a regular family of 17 persons, including the Matron and her Assistant.

We ask the careful consideration of the Conference to the report of Mrs. E. O. Grimes, President of the Lady's Board. This report shows the expenses of conducting the Home for the past year amounts to be \$1635.40, which makes an expenditure of about \$96. for the maintenance of each individual for the year.

While the inmates are supplied with everything necessary for their comfort, these figures indicate that the Ladies exercise great care and economy in the management of the affairs of the Home.

The New Building

Last year we reported an indebtedness of \$4550.00 due for this building. The Treasurer's Report will show that this has been reduced, by contributions, received mainly through Rev. F. T. Tagg, D. D., to \$3883.58, as will be seen by reference to this part of the Treasurer's report.

Dr. Tagg was requested by the Board to take up the work of collecting for this debt, and we bespeak for his agency, the help of all those who feel interested in this important branch of our church work. This debt ought to be paid, and we are sure can and will be paid when the matter is brought to the attention of the church. We have a splendid property and are doing a good work.

We commend the maintenance of the Home, and the payment of this remaining debt, to the thoughtful consideration and wise action of the Conference.

The Board respectfully asks for the continuance of the Assessment for the support of the Home.

Report N

Missions

OF THE COMMITTEE

We note with profound interest the great progress being made in missionary work both at home and in the foreign field. The splendid showing made by the Board of Home Missions in all sections of our beloved country is a challenge to the Church to undertake larger things for the glory of God and the good of humanity.

We most heartily commend the work of the Board of Home Missions as outlined in the address by the new Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. C. H. Beck, D. D., which has for its object:—

- (1) The organization of our own people into Methodist Protestant Churches in the cities and towns:
- (2) The rendering of timely financial support to our Pastors at points where we have organized churches;
- (3) The judicious appropriation of money for the development of these new churches which give promise of speedy self-support.

We urge upon all our pastors and Sunday School superintendents to use our own Easter Day program on Easter Sunday and to secure an offering for the Board of Home Missions.

It is very gratifying to note the increased interest in behalf of our foreign missionary work during the past year. While the door of opportunity stands open in Eastern lands the Macedonian cry is emphasized now as never before since the days of the Apostle Paul, and our own church must take her place and assume its share of responsibility for the world's speedy evangelization. The splendid Children's Day Service, appealing as

it does, to the heart, eye, and ear, is well calculated to stimulate the interest of the children and young people in missionary work.

We learn with sincere pleasure of the recovery from a recent illness of Sister Van Dyke, wife of the President of our Japan Conference, and pray that God's richest blessing may rest upon them in their arduous and self sacrificing labors.

We recommend a continuance of the present relations of Rev. E. H. Van Dyke to the Board of Foreign Missions.

We urge upon our Christian Endeavor Societies the necessity of supporting our own C. E. Missionary, Rev. Leigh Layman.

The reports of the Maryland, and the Washington and Alexandria Branches of the Women's Foreign Missionary Societies are most gratifying and show commendable progress. The Maryland Branch, increasing its collection one thousand two hundred and twenty-seven dollars over that of last year, while the Washington and Alexandria Branch sustains three scholarships and has raised in addition two hundred dollars for the new Science Hall at Yokohama.

We most cordially commend Miss Annie Forrest, Field Secretary of the W. F. M. S., to our pastors and people with the request that, whenever possible, she be given the opportunity to present the work of the Women's Board.

We most heartily endorse the laymen's missionary movement and believe it will stimulate a world wide interest in missions in our respective churches.

Recommendations:

First,—That this Conference pledges itself in every reasonable endeavor to raise for Foreign Missions this year the sum of \$5,000 in addition to the assessment of \$3,000, and the Children's Day Offering; that to this end we open wide the doors of our churches to Rev. Fred. C. Klein and the members of this Conference who are Corresponding members of the Board of Foreign Missions; and that these brethren are hereby requested to particularly commend and aid in the inauguration of the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

Second,—The appointment in every church of a Men's Missionary Committee who shall organize and conduct a personal canvass of every member of the church to the end that a systematic contribution to the cause may be made by every one.

Third,—That our Sunday Schools have a monthly or quarterly Missionary rally, and that the interest and offerings of the children be enlisted in behalf of this great work.

Fourth,—That wherever practicable the pastor encourage the formation of Mission Study Classes in connection with the Board of Home and Foreign Missions.

Report R

Of the Deaconess Board

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

The Board of Deaconesses begs leave to report that it has secured a competent young woman in the person of Miss Evelyn M. Jefferson, who is a registered graduate nurse, and needed no further training in that direction. A happy arrangement was made with the Lutheran Deaconess Home in Baltimore, by which she has taken a course in diaconics, at a cost of \$75.00 per year, including board and other expenses. To this has been added a special course of about two months in the same institution, which will enable her to take up the work in the churches about September the first of this year.

Efforts to secure other young women for this work have not, so far, been successful. We think that pastors may aid the board, by suggesting to suitable young Christian women this field of christian activity, and if they appear willing to consider such a call, to put them into correspondence with the Board.

Soon after the last Conference, the Board decided to ask the ladies of the churches in Baltimore, and in contiguous territory, to form a Ladies' Cooperative Board, for the purpose of organizing Deaconess Circles in the churches, that funds may be secured for carrying on the work. This includes the cost of training, deaconess salaries, and incidental expenses. The Cooperative Board selected Miss Estelle Gilligan as its president, an active, intelligent and resourceful lady, who has already given it splendid service. This Board has held three meetings, and is making itself an active and useful agency in the organization of Circles and in the collection of funds. Circles have been organized in Alnutt, North Baltimore, St. Johns, West Baltimore, Starr, South Baltimore and Christ churches, and these have so far collected \$35.45. Miss Gilligan and Miss Jefferson have visited several churches for the organization of Circles and will visit others as they have opportunity, for the same purpose. There is no reason why such Circles should not be formed in Washington, and in other churches throughout the district. The deaconess work is intended to afford help to all the churches, where the deaconess services can be profitably utilized.

The terms of the following members of the Board expire with this Conference: E. C. Makosky, J. M. Gill, A. R. Lewis, H. K. Muller and Miss Estelle Gilligan. We are also requested to present the resignation of Mr. Daniel Baker, who finds it impossible to attend the meetings of the Board. These vacancies the Conference is respectfully requested to fill.

The time is rapidly approaching when the Conference must provide a Deaconess Home, without which it will be impossible to begin the training of future candidates, or to satisfactorily prosecute the work. The Conference

ence must consider this matter seriously, and make provision for the permanent habitation of our deaconesses. The Cooperative Board is carefully considering this part of the work, but at present the ladies are already taxing themselves for the liquidation of bills that are being contracted, and they cannot now undertake the larger work of procuring a Home. We believe there are men and women in all our churches to whom this movement will specially appeal if it is inteligently represented to them, and we ask our pastors to inform themselves on the subject, and give the information to their congregations.

Of Commissioners to Treat with New Jersey Conference on Union

Your Commissioners offer as our report the Minutes of the Joint Commission of the New Jersey and the Maryland Conferences, following:

Baltimore, Md., January 26, 1911.

The Commissions of the New Jersey and the Maryland Annual Conferences, to consider and report upon the advisability of consolidating the two conferences, met this date in the Maryland Conference Room, of the Book Concern, at 1:30 o'clock.

The meetinig was opened with Scripture reading by Dr. Sinkinson and prayer by Dr. Trout. Present, J. M. Holmes, D. D., C. D. Sinkinson, D. D., J. W. Trout, D. D., W. D. Stultz, G. G. Jones, W. S. Phillips, J. W. Hering, E. S. V. Stultz, J. W. Chapman, Jr., G. T. Goff, G. G. Ackerman.

The Joint Commission was organized with the election of J. M. Holmes chairman and W. S. Phillips secretary.

At the suggestion of the chairman, Dr. Sinkinson and other members of the New Jersey Conference made statements as to what was in the mind of that Conference concerning the proposed consolidation. Dr. Trout read a paper embodying his objections to the proposition. A general discussion followed, out of which came this resolution:

"RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this Commission that it is not practicable at the present time to consolidate the Maryland and the New Jersey Annual Conferences of the Methodist Protestant Church.

(Signed) "J. W. CHAPMAN, Jr. (Signed) "W. D. STULTZ."

Which was adopted by a vote of seven (7) to four (4), W. D. Stultz, J. W. Trout, G. G. Jones, W. S. Phillips, J. W. Chapman, Jr., J. W. Hering, and G. G. Ackerman voting in the affirmative; C. D. Sinkinson, J. M. Holmes, E. S. V. Stultz and G. T. Goff voting in the negative.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by W. D. Stultz.

OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ABOVE REPORT

Whereas, by order of the last Conference session of the Maryland Annual Conference a Commission consisting of three ministers and three laymen were appointed to treat with a similar Commission appointed by the New Jersey Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church on the matter of uniting that Conference and this, and

Whereas, the Commissioners of this Conference have reported at this session that at a meeting of the two Commissions held in Baltimore, January 26th, 1911, after a full discussion of the matter in all its bearings the following resolution was adopted by a vote of seven in favor and four against it, viz., "Resolved, that it is the sense of this Commission that it is not practicable at the present time to consolidate the Maryland and the New Jersey Annual Conferences of the Methodist Protestant Church," and

Whereas, this Conference having expressed its dissent from the terms of this resolution by a vote of sixty-six to twenty-four, now therefore

Resolved, That the Maryland Conference hereby accepts the report of the Commissioners from this Conference, and discharges them from the further consideration of this subject, with thanks for their labors and appreciation of their efforts, which we believe were entirely disinterested and sincerely devoted to what they considered the best interests of the Church.

Resolved, That this Conference takes this occasion to express to our brethren of the New Jersey Conference assurances of our sincere esteem and affection. The vote recited above will show that many in this Conference would have welcomed a different report from the Commissioners. But since the action has been thus taken this Conference is willing to accept the judgment of those directly in charge of the matter; especially as the consolidation would involve questions of territory and administration,

which would certainly be difficult and might prove impracticable. Nevertheless we hereby record our emphatic disapproval of any suggestion that a union with our sister Conference would be regarded undesirable in itself considered. And it is only because it is not certain that the union might not hinder rather than help the development of the work in New Jersey that we acquiesce in the action of the Commission.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions signed by the President and Secretary of this Conference be sent to the next session of the New Jersey Conference, by the hands of Rev. A. W. Mather and Dr. M. Bates Stephens who are hereby appointed to bear our fraternal greetings to that body.

Of Special Committee on Thanking Dr. Lewis

D., its grateful appreciation for his most valuable gift of the complete set of twenty volumes of the Constitution and Discipline of the Methodist Protestant Church, which, with the valuable records of our own Conference history and of the General Conventions, already presented to this Conference by him, now places in our hands and at our disposal the complete historical archives of the Methodist Protestant Church from the very beginning.

We greatly appreciate the labor of this quest on the part of Dr. Lewis, and realizing the inestimable value of the entire collection, now consisting of thirty volumes, assure him that these records shall be most carefully preserved.

Dr. Lewis' Address of Presentation

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren:—A purpose of mine entered upon many years ago was partially fulfilled in 1905, when I had the pleasure of presenting to this Conference ten volumes containing the complete records of the General Conferences and General Conventions, and of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, from the beginning.

I had and still have great pride in that collection; occasionally I go to the Maryland Conference Room in Baltimore to show it to someone, always, I fear, less enthusiastic about it than I am; but yet I did not regard my purpose as consummated. I have therefore persisted in my antiquarian researches for another set of volumes which would complete the historical

archives of the Methodist Protestant Church. And I have the great pleasure to-day of announcing my quest ended, of presenting to the Maryland Annual Conference twenty volumes comprising a complete set of the Constitution and Discipline of the Methodist Protestant Church from the beginning to the present.

So with this, the Law of the Church in its entirety, added to the formative and administrative records of the Church, there is nothing left to be desired by the student who would know how we came to be, what we have done and how we have done it.

More than three hundred years ago the great Richard Hooker in his immortal treatise, "Of the Laws of Ecclesiastical Polity", published in 1594, uttered this panegyric. w ich has been quoted in nearly every book on law which has been published since:

"Of Law there can be no less acknowledged than that her seat is the bosom of God, her voice the harmony of the world. All things in heaven and earth do her homage,—the very least as feeling her care, and the greatest as not extmpt from her power."

Notwithstanding the wide celebrity of this description, it has to be said that the Methodist Protestant Church was the first Methodism, if not the first ecclesiasticism, to found itself on a written Constitution, guaranteeing to all its constituent parts the orderly procedure and unfettered harmony of Law. It trusted nothing to tradition or custom or good understanding, but reserved to the whole body all powers not specifically written in the Constitutional grant. Freeing itself at once from all illusions of a ruling class deriving from Divine gifts or exalted piety a right to rule, it made, with an enormous confidence and with a vision beyond its contemporaries, democracy the true Charisma, and "One is your Master, all ye are brethren" the real divine right of ecclesiastical leaders.

The student of to-day who will compare the Constitution printed in the first of these volumes with that printed eighty years later in the last, cannot but be struck with the few changes which time and experience have made necessary. And he will not fail to note that while this instrument has on the whole served efficiently the purpose of its authors in almost its original form; changes have taken place in other Methodisms during the same period so extensive and so vital that the very elements of the organization are different, and the most important of these changes have been in accordance with this Constitution. So that it is not boastful to say that our fathers were, as ecclesiastical lawyers, far in advance of their contemporaries.

However, this is not the place nor the time to expatiate upon the fathers. I will say only one thing more, and that in explanation of my offering this gift to the Maryland Conference.

We are unfortunate as a Church, in my opinion, that we have no recognized ecclesiastical center. There is no official, nor corporation having a local habitation and name, to whom the archives of the Church may be committed. There is no officer nor body from whom one can be certain of securing an absolutely accurate copy of our law or articles of faith. It has been in my mind, although hardly a purpose, to prepare an annotated copy of the Constitution, accompanying the original draft with the changes made by successive General Conferences. Until this is done we must be more or less dependent upon accidental editors and proof readers for the accuracy of our fundamental law.

In the absence of such a center, one who feels the importance of preserving our records must avail himself of one of our Annual Conferences. I have chosen Maryland, not because I have the honor of belonging to it, but because its history is coeval with the Church, and because I believe it will be generally admitted that it has carried out the law of the Church most consistently throughout its history.

Those who know the Church best are constantly pained to note the wide divergence among its annual conferences in the administration of law, and in too many cases the absolute disregard of law. The President of the General Conference is so much an administrative decoration that he cannot, even with the order of the General Conference to support his plea, possess himself of a copy of the minutes of the last session of the annual conferences; and it is notorious that the General Conference has not been able to publish a complete table of the most meager statistics of the whole Church within the memory of any living man. Maryland has stood out among its sister conferences as a conspicuous example of better conceptions of the solidarity of the Church, and of its obligations to law as it is written. It has from the beginning loyally obeyed and scrupulously interpreted the deliverances of recognized authority; and as a consequence, it has grown and prospered as no other conference in the connection. So that I believe no Conference could be found in the whole Church more likely to appreciate such a gift as this; and I have entire confidence that it will be secredly preserved. I give it to you, therefore, with admiring affection for your past and present and steady hope for your future.

Report V

Of the Special Committee on Rule 4 of the Manual

We, your Special Committee, in regard to Rule #4 of the Manual of the Maryland Annual Conference, beg leave to report:—

That we consider The Board of Stewards as constituted at present to consist of too many members for the speedy dispatch of business and the proper handling and checking of the money that is collected for the various interests of the Church; therefore, we recommend—

1st. That sec. 5 Rule 6th be changed to read—"At 2.30 o'clock P. M. on the first day of the session the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot as follows: 1, President; 2, Secretary; 3, Conference Steward; 4, Treasurer—the Stewards elected at one session to serve the following session, and the Steward and the Treasurer to appoint two assistants with approval of the Conference; 5, Standing District Committees, etc.

2nd. That Rule 4th. "Duties of Stewards", be changed to read:-

1. The Conference Steward and the Treasurer shall constitute a Conference Board of Stewards, to whom the Secretary shall hand all reports and collections as received from the pastors; and this Board shall be responsible to the Conference for all money and receipts or vouchers delivered to them.

- The Board of Stewards shall meet on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock and open the Pastors envelopes, containing the reports and the collections, shall deliver the various parts of the reports as designated, shall count the money enclosed in the envelopes, noting its agreement with the statement of the pastor's Financial Report, and prepare a report of the Collections for the Conference. The money in hand shall be passed by the Treasurer, who shall have charge of all the moneys of the Conference for distribution, upon order of the Conference Steward, which order shall be the voucher of the Treasurer, for his transaction, to the persons designated by the Conference to receive them. The Treasurer shall disburse money collected by the Conference for every purpose; in which transactions he shall perform the work as assigned to the Superannuate Fund Steward and the Church Extension Steward as per special rules of each Society, and he shall continue in the office until his successor shall be elected; he shall keep a ledger and an open account with some accepted bank, and his accounts shall be open for inspection at all times to the President of the Conference or one designated by him.
- 3rd. 1. That the form of the Pastor's Report be changed—instead of TEN small envelopes there be TWO envelopes measuring 4x8 inches; one marked for Receipts for the General Interests, and the other for Cash—printed as per sample.

2. On blank under heading "Additional Contributions for General Purposes"—made to read: Total Amt. of money for General Interests:—Receipts ————; Cash ————; Total ————.

(b) Also insert—N. B. One CHECK made to the order of the Treasurer covers the whole money transaction from the pastors to the Conference.

SUPERANNUATED FUND REGULATIONS . . .

- 1. The Committee on Superannuated Claimants shall report to Conference all those nomes which, in its judgment, properly belong to the superannuate list.
- 2. The two interests, the collections for Superannuates and the interest on the Superannuated Fund, are blended, and the Committee is instructed to act accordingly.
- 3. The Committee in making appropriations shall be governed by the ascertained probable resources of the Conference; they shall discriminate according to the comparative claims of the several recipients, taking into consideration: 1. The time of service in the Conference. 2. The value of said service to the Conference. 3. The size of family. 4. The peculiarities of location, etc. 5. Ability to contribute to self-support by business capaity or private income.
- 4. The Conference Treasurer shall disburse all moneys coming from the Superannuated Fund Society, and shall make a quarterly distribution of the funds, provided the Treasurer of said Society can make a payment in the interim of Conference.
- 5. When the Committee shall have completed its report it shall be read to the Conference twenty-four hours before final action thereon, during which time objections to the report must be filed before the committee.
- 6. Every pastor is requested to bring to each session of the Annual Conference at least \$5 in addition to the Superannuate Collection, to assist any person who may be placed on the Superannuate List at that session.
- 7. The Corresponding Secretary of the Superannuated Fund Society shall furnish Superannuate Claimants with blanks containing the following questions, a neglect to answer which shall deprive the claimant of any portion in the distribution of said fund for the year:
 - 1. What is your present place of residence? Post office address?
 - 2. Do you desire a superannuate relation the ensuing year?
- 3. What is the number of your family? Ages of your children, respectively?
 - 4. Do you attend our church? If not, why not?
 - 5. Do your children attend our Sabbath-School? If not, why not?

CHURCH EXTENSION REGULATIONS

- 1. Contributions for church extension shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Church Extension Society, that he may disburse the funds to the missionaries according to their various claims.
- Pastors are instructed to have the Church Extension collections in the hands of the Treasurer by the end of the second quarter of the Conference year.
- The Committee on Church Extension shall ascertain what amount of funds may be regarded as available for church extension purposes the ensuing year.
- 5. The Church Extension Society of this Conference shall elect seven Trustees for each mission, who shall hold all the property on our mission fields in trust of said Society, and yearly thereafter select a new Board of Trustees as long as the mission relation is continued. But whenever the mission shall become a circuit or station, the "qualified members" at a meeting regularly called for the purpose, shall have the power to elect their own Trustees, to whom the Trustees appointed by the Church Extension Society shall surrender the church property, together with the books, papers or other valuables held by them as Trustees.
- 6. When any number of the members of any of our missions shall, through disaffection or from other causes, form themselves into classes, withholding themselves from the means of grace or suffer themselves to be led by those who refuse to attend the official meetings of the church, or shall in any other way walk disorderly, on a charge being brought against such person or persons, the missionary shall see that the accused are tried according to the Discipline for trial of members. But should the class, of which the accused is a member, refuse or neglect to select two of their number to serve on the committee of trial, then the missionary shall fill the committee by having them selected from any other class in the mission, or from an adjoining station or circuit, as he may think proper, and should

the accused be found guilty he, she or they shall be suspended or expelled, as the committee may direct. And should the entire mission become refractory the missionary shall be authorized to select them according to the provision of the Discipline for trial of churches; provided, however, that the person convicted shall in this, and in all cases where the trial is by jury, have an appeal to the Quarterly Conference of the church from which the committee of trial is selected, at the next session ensuing, whose decision shall be final.

- 7. Missions shall hold Quarterly Conferences.
- 8. When a charge is preferred against any member of the church the missionary shall see that the accused is tried in accordance with the regulations of the Discipline for the trial of members.
- 9. Any mission having a missionary shall be entitled to one delegate to the Annual Conference, provided the missionary have a seat, who shall be elected by the qualified members of the mission, at least two weeks preceding the session of the Annual Conference.
- 10. No member of the Methodist Protestant Church shall hold membership in a mission and station at the same time.
- 11. Until a class is formed in a mission the missionary shall have authority to receive probationers into full membership.
- 12. The missionary in charge is invested with authority to receive or reject applicants for membership, as he in his judgment may deem most conducive to the welfare of the mission.
- 13. When a mission becomes a circuit or station, the property must be so transferred to the trustees elected by the qualified members as to secure it to the Methodist Protestant Church.
- 14. The Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society is empowered to appoint or dismiss trustees in missions during the recess of Conference.
- 15. All qualified members shall be entitled to vote for stewards in missions.
- 16. The Society shall pay the traveling expenses of such members of the Board of Managers as do not reside in the city.
- 17. The Board of Managers has full power to act on all matters pertaining to the Church Extension Society in the interim of Conference.
- 18. Hereafter, no money shall be appropriated to any charge where the Board of Trustees refuses to be incorporated.
- 19. The Church Extension Committee of the Conference is hereby made a permanent or continuous committee, its members serving until their successors are appointed. The President of the Conference is hereby requested in naming the members of this committee from time to time, to retain a sufficient number of those familiar with its work to secure best results in the appropriation of the funds of the society.

In addition to the duties heretofore performed by the committee, it shall be the duty of the chairman and secretary thereof, as soon as practicable after the adjournment of each annual session of the Conference, to prepare and have printed lists of questions with blank spaces for answers, similar to those heretofore used by the Board of Managers, and shall mail a copy to the pastor of each charge seeking aid not later than the first week in October and March of each Conference year. The blanks may also contain such explanations as may be deemed necessary to enable charges to properly fill in the answers to the questions, with the request that the said blanks be promptly filled out and returned.

The chairman and secretary shall arrange these blanks in proper order, bring them to Conference and lay them before the committee. The committee, in making appropriations to the respective charges seeking aid, shall be guided by the information contained in the blanks; and the charges are hereby notified in accordance with the above prescribed duties of the committee.

The secretary of the Conference hereby is instructed to pay, out of the Conference funds, the expense of printing, postage, etc., incurred by the committee in the discharge of the duties here referred to.

When appropriations are made conditionally and the conditions are not complied with, it shall be the duty of the committee to so notify the Church Extension Steward, who shall withhold payment of the money until such payment is authorized by the committee.

The action of the Conference of 1907 is hereby reaffirmed as follows, "The Committee on Church Extension shall not report upon any cases not referred to it by the Conference, except such cases recommended by the President to accommodate the plan of appointments."

Dr. John Edward Tyson Ewell, for many years an honored member of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, died at her late residence, No. 1625 North Payson Street, Baltimore, Md., December 20, 1910, aged seventy-four years, eight months and twenty-one days.

THE SERMON

Charles the Control of the State

. . . .

BY REV. GEORGE W. HADDAWAY.

THE GOSPEL OF CHRIST AND ITS UNIVERSAL DIFFUSION.

Brethren: The sermon of this occasion will not be for ministers exclusively, nor altogether for laymen. Our aim will be to preach a Gospet to all persons present, for all People.

The Text: And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to very creature. St. Mark: 16-15.

"He said unto them." The speaker of the hour is not the author of these words, neither are they the expression of a Priest, Bishop, nor a reputed to be infallible Pope of Rome. They are the words of the humble, yet exalted, Divine Jesus Christ.

We might possibly disregard the commands of all human forces in the world without effect upon us in life, death or eternity, but, when Christ speaks "Let all the world keep silent before Him", take heed and do His bidding, for, the doing or not doing what He requires and commands is the key note that sounds the destiny of nations, the salvation or everlasting destruction of every individual. "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the Kingdom of Heaven, but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in Heaven." "I and my Father are one." "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature" is a Divine

command, yea, the Divine command to the Church.

We may forget much that is uttered by our loved ones while in the midst of life, but, of all they say that we do remember, that which adheres most closely and tenaciously to memory is what they disclose to us just before leaving this world-their dying expressions-last requests. These we can never forget. The last words of our Saviour to the Apostles, His final request of and command to them before going to Heaven are embodied in the text of this occasion, and constitute the farewell and imperative command to all of His people of all ages. "He said unto them, Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." This injunction is not to be disregarded but obeyed to the fullest extent.

The followers of Jesus, we fear, have not been quick to comprehend and to fulfill the purpose of Christ as expressed in the Gospel and particularly, as declared in the text—the universal diffusion of the Gospel; missions, domestic and foreign, at home and abroad.

After about two thousand years of professed christian effort in harmony with the spirit of our Lord's command, three-fourths of the world are still unsaved, and two-thirds of the inhabitants of our own beloved country remain outside of church membership; in other words there is only one christian in every four people in the world, and only every third person in the christian United States is really a christian. This condition is more largely attributed to the indifference, prejudice and selfishness of God's people than to any other cause. Five hundred times more money is spent every year for only five different industries in this country—than is contributed by the entire Christian Church for Foreign Missions. Two billions annually for liquors, tobacco, foot-wear, chairs and perfumeries, and less than ten millions for sending the Gospel abroad, and our interest and efforts do not surpass our financial contributions, notwithstanding all that has been done to date by the church.

Thus far, we have only been playing at the Lord's work, and our play is certainly not creditable to the greatest christian nation in the world. It is time we were doing something for the salvation of perishing humanity, and to really fulfill the command of Jesus as expressed in the text. We cannot, we must not, by the help of God, from this age, we will not disregard, nor even slight the Saviour's last and all important request, for the granting of which means the salvation of the world and the Glory of God. "He said unto them, go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

The Gospel.

I. The Meaning:

Gospel is a compound word. In the Greek it is EAATTETION (euanggelion) EA—meaning good, ATTETO2—news, good news, glad tidings. In the English it is God-spell, God, meaning good and spell, story; good story or God's utterance.

The Gospel is designated as an unquestioned and an indisputable truth. Hence, the familiar expressions—"As true as Gospel", "The Gospel truth".

It means, also, fundamental beliefs. A political platform constitutes the Gospel of the said party. The principles of a government are the Gospel of the nation. The creed of a church or of an individual is the Gospel of the said church and individual. The fundamental principles, doctrines and methods of God in dealing with humanity as contained in the whole Bible constitute the Gospel of Christianity. This is what the Apostle Paul declares to be the "Glorious Gospel of the blessed God". Hence, a Divine Gospel from a Divine source.

II. The Purpose:

If all other Gospels were without design and altogether aimless, the same is not true with regard to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It has an all important mission, and without a purpose it would not and could not be the Christian Gospel. God does nothing without a purpose; to declare He does is to admit that He is guilty of trifles, which is beneath the dignity of an infinite Creator.

The supreme purpose of the Gospel:

1st. Is to reveal the plan of Human Redemption. It is an acknowledged fact that humanity is sinful, rebellious and in bondage to iniquity. This condition began with Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, and has continued with increasing wickedness until no Prodigal Son ever went farther from home than humanity has strayed from God and righteousness. incorrigible child has ever been more disrespectful and disobedient to parents than the world has been to our Heavenly Father. No sailor ever thrust the lead deeper into the waters of the ocean than the human race has plunged itself into the fathomless depths of sin and degradation. "God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually", (The Bible) and hopelessly so, so far as man's own power to redeem himself is concerned. "In human nature there is provision for every broken bone to knit; every shattered nerve to be brought back to its normal condition; every lacerated muscle to heal and pain of the body to pass away;" but there is no power in all human life combined to redeem the soul from sin. Our redemption from sin is of God. Although sinful and justly deserving Divine wrath, sympathy, mercy and love have been accorded to us by the Maker of us all. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." "We have redemption through His blood which was shed for the remission of sin." "It is finished." (The Bible). When Jesus gave utterance to this last expression, which was, also, His dying cry can the cross, He meant, nothing more than He meant, that His death was the paid price of redemption. From the sixteenth verse of the third chapter of Genesis to the last of the book of Revelation, on almost every page is revealed the Divine plan of human redemption. The Gospel contains a most explicit account of an efficient redemption. You can read of it in no other system of writings in all the world. Not in nature, philosophy nor astronomy; only in the Bible is disclosed the blessed plan and revealed the glorious news of redemption, and that mankind, might know all about it, God hath given us His Gospel.

2ndly. The Gospel saves from sin. It is one thing to be redeemed, and quite another to be saved. Pythias redeemed Damon from death, imposed upon him by Dyonicius, King of Syracuse, and did so by the substi-

tution of himself. But Damon refused to be saved thereby. This whole world has been redeemed by Christ making Himself an offering for sin, but only a small portion of the world is really saved from sin. Salvation includes redemption but, redemption does not necessarily mean salvation. All nations of the earth might well wish that redemption and salvation were one and the same. A writer who fell overboard while at sea thus writes: "Down, down, fathoms down I sank into the angry ocean. All was darkness around me, and all was terror within me, for I still retained my consciousness in this moment of danger and agony. At length I rose to the surface, and, struggling as a drowning man for life, I struck out for the ship. But, alas! it had already receded so far from me that I had no hope of being able by my own efforts to gain that ark of safety. A boat had been lowered from the vessel, and manned by sturdy sailors, whose brawny arms propelled it swiftly along, it quickly reached me. "One more minute," says he, "of desperate exertion, and I clutch the gunwale of the boat and am saved." "Saved!" Who can ever appreciate the glorious ecstasy of that moment, as, having scrambled on board, I sank panting and utterly exhausted in the stern sheets? Saved! Saved from the gurgling sound of waters closing over me and shutting against me the gates of life and hope. If I live for a thousand years I feel certain that I shall never experience a moment of such bliss." "Saved!"

> "Salvation! O the joyful sound! What pleasure to our ears! A sovereign balm for every wound, A cordial for our fears."

The Gospel not only makes known the fact of redemption, but it is powerful in effecting salvation in human life. Regardless of the extent of sin and vileness in the life, it saves. No less a personage than Saint Paul said, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ; for it is the Power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth." A Gospel that transformed a murderous Saul of Tarsus into a glorious Saint Paul is not to be despised but appreciated, loved and adored by all life.

What the ark was to Noah and his family in the days of the flood, and the Cities of Refuge to the ancient criminal finding himself within their walls, the Gospel of Christ is to every believing, penitent soul today—his salvation. Glorious purpose of the Gospel is this.

3rd. The purpose of the Gospel, after salvation, is to develop the life. Just as the artist develops the painting from the sketch or mere outline. (a). It develops a real human brotherhood. There is no real appreciation of this in the absence of the Gospel. Bond slaves and most cruel task masters; hatred, malice and murder; every one for himself, even, at

the expense of others, is the condition where there is no Gospel of Christ. Equality of rights, universal sympathy, tangible help, mutual friendship and affection are consequent upon the Gospel. Every man or corporation actuated by Gospel principles will be brotherly in feelings and in dealings. The Gospel has a uniting and welding affect upon life. "All ye are brethren" says Jesus to those who practice Gospel precepts. It cannot be otherwise.

(B) The Gospel develops the intellect. There is more food for thought in the Gospel of Christ than in all the literature of the world combined. Nothing develops the mind like thought, and nothing makes us think like religion. Many have been the young men who disliked school and all studies therewith, and as the result could scarcely read or write. After conversion to Christ the Gospel inspired within them a desire for knowledge, to develop the mind, to read and understand God's Word and its mission to them. This desire has induced higher education, which lead to graduation from the leading educational institutions of the land, and they became the brightest intellectual lights of their day. The entire educational system in this country is based upon religion, indeed, it is a system of religious education, inspired by the Gospel of Christ, the greatest of teachers, for "Never man spake like this man spake." We know of only one school in this country in defiance to Christianity and that has never succeeded.

Our high intellectual attainment, superior knowledge, we owe to the Gospel.

(C) Again, the Gospel develops the soul life within man, and this alone can satisfy the cravings of an immortal nature. Millions in money have been offered for the comforts of religion but without avail. The result is usually the opposite. More people have dwarfed and even lost their souls by riches than have ever been helped thereby. Worldly prominence, pleasure, morality, indeed, the world and all it offers cannot develop the spiritual life; but, to the contrary, "To be carnally minded is death." "Be not conformed to this world" is the Divine command.

Nothing short of the Heavenly can either satisfy or develop the soul. This the Gospel will certainly accomplish. As the body lives and grows to maturity by the food eaten, liquids drank and exercise taken, so the soul lives and thrives upon the Gospel of our Saviour, which is the bread of life and drink of life and the inspiration to healthy vigorous religious activity. This is why the psalmist exclaimed, "My soul longeth, yea, even fainteth for the courts of the Lord," and, "As the heart panteth after the water brook, so panteth my soul after thee O God. My soul thirsteth for God, for the living God." The late D. L. Moody was a man with a great soul; the greatest man of his day in the evangelistic world. And, yet, a man of one book—the Bible.

Immediately after the death of our beloved Dr. J. T. Ward—that large hearted man with a gigantic soul—a newspaper published in Westminster,

Md., where the Doctor had lived for many years, stated concerning him that, "Probably there never lived a better man." As tall as he was in physical stature his soul towered far above his body. He attributed all to the Word of God which was ever the lamp to his feet and the light upon his pathway.

The recently deceased detective Todd B. Hall of Baltimore, Md., and noted for his superior religious life, selected as the epitaph to be inscribed on his tomb stone, "John 3-16." The Gospel was the secret of his power and greatness among men.

Ideal brotherhood, highest mental attainment and great spiritual power, therefore, result from the applied principles of the Gospel of Christ.

(D) Notwithstanding all the Gospel does for humanity while on earth it reveals a most blessed future, a glorious eternity and a sweet Heaven as made possible for all human beings. Take the Gospel away and a vision . beyond the present will be impossible. There will be no revealed future. Humanity will know and anticipate nothing beyond death. The Gospel is our only source of a revealed future. Even, heathen nations that believe in a future state of any kind, acquire their belief, either directly or indirectly from the word of God. The infidel claims that there is no hereafter. This is a view in strict accord with his professed faith or, rather lack of faith. He disbelieves the Bible. He, must, therefore, necessarily deny a future state of any character, and advocate the merciless termination of all with death. But, Christians, thank God, do not live under the horrible gloom of such anticipation. The thought of a future state fastens itself upon us. In our dealings with men a personal responsibility and a day of reckoning impress us. In the midst of affliction and death we anticipate a peaceful, delightful and hopeful future. When we deposit into the grave the cold and lifeless bodies of our loved ones we are not hopelessly heart broken, but, await the morning of the general resurrection. Even, while passing through the bitterest experience of human life, we are enabled to say, our "Heavenly home is bright and fair, no pain nor death can enter there." At times the surpassing Glory, grandeur and bliss of the heavenly world dawn upon us in such vast contra-distinction to the unpleasant experiences of this life, we, involuntarily find ourselves singing that wonderfully inspiring hymn of early Methodism:-

> "O Heaven! Sweet Heaven! O Heaven of the blest, How I long to be there, In its glories to share, And to lean on my Saviour's breast".

Why all these soul stirring thoughts? Because we have the blessed Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and believe it's teachings. In this truth, Jesus said to the ancient disciples, "In my Father's house are

many marsions. I go to prepare a place for you, and if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you unto myself, that where I am, there, ye may be also." (John 14-2). He declares the same privilege to every Christian; and, "We know that, if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." (Bible). Glorious revelation of Heaven through the Gospel.

III. The Universal diffusion of the Gospel.

All men need and should earnestly seek a saving knowledge of it. The Saviour's one desire is that His Message should be known to earth's remotest bounds. To "All the world." "Every creature." Jerusalem was not all the world, neither was the entire Holy Land. Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia, separate or together do not constitute the whole world. Our great North American Continent, with Canada on the North, the Gulf of Mexico on the South, the Great Atlantic and Pacific Oceans on the East and West respectively, is not the entire world by any means, even, if many people do think so. "All the world is wherever a human being lives and nothing short of this, to "Every creature"." Christianity means missions, and Foreign Missions at that, or it means nothing, and Foreign Missions means everything in the general spread of the Gospel. And, yet, there has been in years past more prejudice against and opposition to the carrying of the Gospel to distant lands than to all other interests of the church combined. But, Providence has overruled the narrowness and extreme selfishness of men in this particular. When England protested against acquiring territory in India, Divine Providence thrust India into the lap of England, and compelled her to take possession of a land and people that needed the light. Christianity has done much for those people.

The original colonies of our own land laughed at the very idea of going beyond the Alleghany Mountains in conquest of the great South and Southwest, but God forced them out and beyond a contracted view of what was their duty. Behold what we have today, materially and religiously.

Heartless and incorrigible Spain forfeited the respect of the civilized world; even, religious United States lost all patience with her; but God sent us forth; and, what was the meaning of the "cannon boom" off Santiago on the first day of May eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, or across the waters among the Philippines? 'Tis this, God is fulfilling the command of our text in the universal diffusion of the Gospel.

"Where ever sin exists,
Where ever the curse has gone;
Wide is the atonement of God's dear Son.
Where ever the broken image of man is found—
There, the Gospel of our Lord,
Must penetrate and be known."

IV. The Method.

But, what of the method? How is this to be accomplished? The answer is, Through the followers of Christ—Christian People.

As quick as a flash of lightning, God, by His Holy Spirit, could have sent the Gospel as far as mortality goes, to quicken and save, but that was not the Divine plan in sending forth His truth upon its invaluable, imperative mission of world wide evangelism.

Our Lord's command, "Go ye," was to the eleven Apostles. They correspond very closely to ministers of the Gospel of the present day. Upon them the responsibility for Christianizing the world is especially great. The Ministry realizes this by the consecration of talent, energy and life to the work. The laity is not excused, however, but seriously involved in God's scheme of saving the world; and the "Laymen's Missionary Movement" in an effort to send the Gospel to the uttermost parts of the earth in a generation is a recognition of the command in our text. To the ministry and laity, and to every christian, without exception, Jesus says "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

- 1. "Go." If we obey the command of Jesus, we must go, every one of us. More than eight hundred millions of the human race are perishing without the Gospel. A few thousands only in all the world have gone to their rescue. If God calls you in person, "Go." How dare you refuse! If He calls some member of your own family, be sure not to hinder the going, "Let go." If you cannot go in person and you have no relative who feels thus called, some one else must personally engage in the work, "Help Go", by your prayers, conversation, influence and money. In the name of God; for the sake of the agonizing Saviour on the cross, and a lost humanity; for your own sake help go. From this day may God inspire within us all a determination to go as we have never gone.
- 2. "Preach." Primarily, to proclaim, cry aloud, herald fourth. We are not to be silent. Do nothing. If so, we as well not go forth at all. Jesus commands to "Preach" as much as He does to "go," indeed, this is the object of our going.—Preaching is to be engaged in not only by persons regularly ordained for the purpose, but by the laity as well. Both ministry and laity are commissioned to preach. In a manner, every Christian is a preacher, whatever else he may be. He must preach, whatever else he may do. "Go ye and preach," says Christ.
- 3. "The Gospel." The theme of all preaching is to be the Gospel of Christ—not science, phylosophy, ceremony, books, the lives of great men, creeds or any such subjects. Such preaching is powerless to save sinners. There is only one theme of preaching and, that is the Gospel—Christ Crucified. After listening attentively to a long reading from the New Testament, a little boy exclaimed, "That's most all Jesus, aint it?" Our preaching is to be "All Jesus" and unworthy are all who discard this theme. "If any man preach any other Gospel, let him be called accursed." (Bible). The

scriptural method of saving this whole world, is to go, preach and to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ. There can be no legitimate objection to either the method or work as long as this text remains in the Bible. There can be no sincere utterance of the Lord's Prayer and at the same time a repudiation of either the method or work.

The Final Word.

There is much to encourage both ministry and laity to help Christianize the world. A deep interest in this work assures our own salvation and happiness. With no interest in the same, we need not be so certain. Others will doubt us. Unhappiness and misery follow unfaithfulness to duty. We have the most uplifting soul stirring message on earth or in heaven—the message of salvation. The privilege of Divine Power is ours, "Ye shall receive Power." (Bible). We have the men. More than one thousand consecrated and educated men and women in this country this day are waiting and almost begging the Church to send them to foreign fields. We have the money. Eighty per cent. of all our millions belong to members of the Christian Church. The splendid results of present missionary operation by all churches is very gratifying. Last, but by no means least, the world is more willing to be saved than ever before. The doors of all nations swing open and bid Christianity enter.

In view of these statements, it should be easier today, than, at any previous time, for every disciple of Christ to say, honestly, willingly and enthusiastically:

"I'll go where you want me to go dear Lord, Over mountain or vale or sea, I'll say what you want me to say dear Lord, "I'll be what you want me to be." .

Let this be most heartily and universally concurred in, at once, and all "The Kingdoms of this world" will surprisingly soon, "become the Kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ." And the most of us would live to see and rejoice in such a glorious consummation of the dispensation of Grace.

God help the Methodist Protestant Church to measure up to her very bighest possibilities in diligence and liberality, united with the same in all other religious bodies, until God's will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. And in eternity joyfully meet our Saviour in the full assurance of faithfulness to the trust he left us. And, having accomplished the mission upon which we were sent, with this entire world saved from sin, receive Christ's heartily approval—"well done." Then, "He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied."



MANUAL

Rules of Order and Regulations

for the

Government of the Maryland Annual Conference.

Rule I. ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE. 1. Conference shall convene in Annual session on the first Wednesday in April, except in such years as Easter falls on the Sunday immediately following the first Wednesday, when it shall convene on the Wednesday following Easter.

The Pastor shall send to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the certificate of election of the delegate or delegates to the Annual Conference immediately after the election of the same. He shall also send the name to the President of the Conference and to the pastor of the Church

where the Conference is held.

The Secretary shall make a list of the delegates so certified, omitting all contested cases; and this list, together with the list of the ministerial members, shall constitute the roll of Conference upon which the Conference shall organize.

4. The churches shall be assessed in a sum sufficient to meet the incidental expenses of the Conference, including the publication of the Minutes-each church receiving Minutes in proportion to the amount contrib-

uted.

Rule II. OFFICERS OF THE CONFERENCE. Duties of the President:-1. To take the chair precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.

See that the business of the Conference shall proceed according to these Rules of Order and other Rules and Regulations adopted by the Conference.

Shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Con-3. ference.

Preserve the most rigid order, and confine the members to the 4. subject under consideration.

5. Not allow improper personalities nor reflections upon any religious communities.

6. Announce each person rising to speak as soon as he shall have addressed the chair by declaring him "The minister from ----," or "The delegate from _____."

7. State a question sitting, but stand when the question is put and taken; also when he states a point of order, and also when he makes any formal communication to the Conference.

Is not allowed to vote when a question is taken unless there be a

tie, but he may vote in case of ballot.

9. May call any member to the chair when he wishes to participate in debate or for other purposes, but such person shall not be entitled to the chair after adjournment.

10. The office of stationing the ministers and preachers is committed

to the hands of the President of the Conference.

11. It shall be the duty of the President to fill blanks in statistical reports for all charges unsupplied.

In the event of the death of any ministerial member or his wife or widow, the President shall immediately appoint an Obituary Committee from any number of the most intimate acquaintances of the deceased.

The failure of the President to visit any charge does not vitiate

his right to the amount assessed for his salary.

The President shall represent the general interests of the Conference, and shall present their claims in such a manner and at such times as in his judgment may be necessary. And he shall use his utmost efforts with the Quarterly Conferences of the various charges to secure a salary of not less than \$600 for the minister with family, appointed as pastor, who has itinerated five years within the bounds of the Maryland Conference, and he shall urge upon the various charges the prompt payment of the salaries of the pastors, and upon all the churches the importance of being incorporated.

Rule III. Duties of the Secretary:-1. To perform such duties as

are usually required of the Secretary of a deliberative body.

Should the President not be in place at the hour of meeting the Secretary, or in his absence one of his assistants, shall announce the fact, and the Conference shall elect a chairman "pro tempore" and proceed to business.

3. Have charge of all the papers belonging to the Conference and be

accountable for them.

- Be in his place precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjourn-
- Keep an accurate list of members of the Conference, and be the Committee on Credentials.
- Keep correct minutes of the proceedings of the Conference, including all written resolutions, whether adopted or rejected, and the mover and seconder of such written resolutions.

Keep a list of business, on which he shall record all business

brought before the Conference and in the order of its presentation.

Keep a list of committees, on which he shall record: First, the standing committees in the order of their arrangement in these rules, and second, all other committees that may be appointed, and in the order of their appointment.

Keep a correct list of the Circuits and Stations, to be used as oc-

casion may require.

Report to the Conference any unfinished business of the preceding annual session.

Be the Committee on the Publication and distribution of the Min-11. utes.

Supply the pastors with blanks, and send blank personal report blanks to all ministers who are not pastors, on which they are to state the

relation to the Conference they desire for the ensuing year.

13. He shall have a printed record of the Minutes duly certified by himself, which shall be considered the Official Minutes of the Conference, substantially bound every quadrennium, and include in each volume a copy of the General Conference Journal.

Be the Committee on Transportation.

Rule IV. Duties of Steward and Treasurer:-1. The Conference Steward and the Treasurer shall constitute the Board of Stewards, to whom the Secretary shall hand all reports and collections as received from the pastors; and this Board shall be responsible to the Conference for all money and receipts and vouchers delivered to them.

They shall meet on Thursday morning at 10:00 o'clock and open the pastors' envelopes containing the reports and collections; shall deliver the various parts of the reports as designated; shall count the money in the envelopes, noting its agreement with the statement of the Pastor's Financial Report, and prepare the collections for the Conference. The money in hand shall be passed by the Treasurer, who shall have charge of all the moneys of the Conference for distribution, upon order of the Conference Steward, which shall be the voucher of the Treasurer for his transactions, to the persons designated by the Conference to receive them. The Treasurer shall disburse money collected by the Conference for every purpose; in which transactions he shall perform the work assigned heretofore to the Superannuated Fund Steward and of the Church Extension Steward, as per special rules of each Society, and he shall continue in office until his successor shall be elected. He shall keep a ledger and open account with some accepted bank, and his accounts shall be open for inspection at all times to the President of the Conference, or one designated by him.

3. Other duties belonging to the several Stewards shall be performed

and reported upon seperately as now.

Rule V. COMMITTEES. All committees shall be appointed by the President, except when otherwise directed in the Book of Discipline, or by special vote of the Conference.

2. The Standing Committees shall be:—1. Board of Finance—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen, one of each order being members not on the Commit-

tee the previous year.

Itinerancy and Orders-The Faculty of Instruction.

3. Pulpit Service-3 Ministers.

4. Church Extension—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

5. Superannuates—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Literature and Education—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
 Young People's Work—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

8. Moral Reform-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Benevolent Agencies—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
 Official Relations—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

11. Statistics-1 Minister, 1 Layman.

12. Obituaries—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. This Committee not to be appointed until the death of some minister requires it.

13. Missions-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

14. President's Report-2 Ministers, 2 Laymen.

15. Church Enterprises—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.16. Conference Program for the following session—3 Ministers (one

of whom shall be the President), 3 Laymen.

17. Appointees on the Executive Committee of the Conference Christian Endeavor Union—3 Ministers (one of whom shall be the President), 2 Laymen.

3. Any person being a member of two committees shall have the right to decline an appointment to another.

4. When there are present Fraternal Messengers and other visitors to whom the courtesy of formal recognition is due, the Chairman of the Committee on Official Relations shall quietly inform the President, where upon the President may request the visitors to be brought to him, to be by him introduced to the Conference, either at that time or when the state of business may with more propriety be arrested.

5. The Committee on Official Relations shall read as a part of their report an "Honor Roll" of the charges which pay their assessments in full.

Rule VI. ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE ANNUAL SESSION:—
1. At 9 o'clock A. M., on the day to which the Conference adjourned from

the last annual session, the President shall open the Conference by reading

a portion of the Word of God, singing and prayer.

2. Examination of the President. The President shall call another minister to the chair and read his annual report. The chairman shall then address the Conference thus: "Brethren, you have heard the report of the President; shall his character pass?" In case of any charge against the official character of the President, it shall be handed to the Standing District Committee; and the chairman of that committee shall answer the question: "Shall his character pass?"

3. The Roll shall then be called, the Secretary reporting the names of absentees. In the event of the death of any member of the Conference, the chairman, or in his absence some member, of his Obituary Committee shall formally announce the fact to the Conference, and such announcement shall be made when the name of the deceased is reached in the calling of the Conference Roll, and the same shall then, on motion, be trans-

ferred to the Dead Roll by the Secretary.

4. At 10.30 o'clock on the first day of each session of the Annual Conference the President, or his substitute, shall preach a sermon, followed by the Lord's Supper. The President shall appoint some one to preach the Ordination Sermon at 11 A. M. on Sunday. The time for holding Memorial Services for deceased members of the Conference shall be determined by the Conference Program Committee.

5. At 2.30 o'clock P. M. on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot as follows: 1. President. 2. Secretary. 3. Steward. 4. Treasurer. The Steward and Treasurer elected at one session shall serve at the following session, and they shall appoint two assistants with the approval of the Conference. 5. Standing District Committee, consisting of three ministers and three laymen. 6. Committee

on Appeals, three ministers and three laymen.

6. Examination of Official Character. At 10.00 o'clock Thursday morning the roll shall be called and the pastors shall deposit their reports, and the collections prescribed by the Conference, each in a sealed envelope, upon which shall be marked the amount, the name of the collection, the name of the pastor and the name of the charge in the box of the Conference Steward. The reports and charges against official character shall be handed to the Committee on Official Relations.

7. The sessions of Friday and Saturday shall end at noon, that the Committees may have time for their work, and that the President may have

opportunity to interview delegates and ministers.

Rule VII. ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE DAILY SESSIONS:—
1. On each day following the opening session there shall be held a devotional service lasting thirty minutes, beginning at 9:00 o'clock A. M.

2. Reading of Minutes of the preceding day for correction and adop-

tion.

3. Calling of the roll of charges in alphabetical order, for the presentation of any business by delegates or pastors from the churches they represent. When any such, upon recognition of the Chair, shall present any business it shall be recorded without debate on the list of business, or referred to the proper committee without motion.

4. Call for reports from Boards, Institutions and Societies, and communications, which shall be put upon the Secretary's desk to be taken up

in regular order, or made the order of the day.

5. Reports of standing and special committees called for in order, and they shall be handed to the Secretary to be read by him. They shall not report at any other time without special leave.

Miscellaneous business.

7. When any business is laid before the Conference it may be made the order of the day for any other day of the session and at a specific hour.

8. Unfinished business from the last annual session shall have pre-

cedence of all business except the order of the day.

9. Ordinary business shall have precedence in the order in which it

stands on the List of Business.

10. When any business is taken into consideration it shall not be interrupted by any other business except the order of the day or by adjournment.

Rule VIII. DECORUM:—1. When a member desires to present any business, or to speak to any question, he shall arise and address the Chair, "Brother President," and then pause until he is announced to the Conference, after which he may proceed addressing the chair, and restricting his remarks to the subject before the Conference.

2. If two or more members rise at the same time, the President shall

determine which of them is entitled to the floor.

3. No interruption shall be allowed while a member is addressing.

the chair, except a call to order by the President or by a member.

4. When a member is called to order he shall take his seat immediately, and be silent, until the President or member who made the call shall state the rule of order supposed to be infringed; after which the member called to order shall have the right to explain, and the President shall decide.

5. In deciding a question of order the President shall restrict himself to the rules of order, and any member declared to be out of order by the President may, if he obtain a second, appeal to the Conference. The question on such appeal shall be taken without debate, but the appellant may state the ground of his appeal. If the Conference sustains the chair, the member shall be allowed to proceed only in order.

No member shall speak oftener than twice to the same question, without special leave of the Conference, nor longer than fifteen minutes at

any one time, unless by the same special permission.

7. Any member shall have the right to call for the reading of the

subject under consideration.

8. Every member shall report at roll call of the first day's session,

and be present at the daily sessions of Conference.

Rule IX. MOTIONS:—1. Every motion shall be written, signed and read aloud by the mover, handed to the chair and read aloud by the Secretary, before any order can be taken upon it by the Conference; except motions for amendment, to lie on the table, the previous question, or to adjourn.

2. Any motion may be divided, if the sense will admit of the propos-

ed division.

3. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but to adjourn, to lie on the table, for the previous question, to commit, to substitute, to amend, or to make the order of the day; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule; the first three to be taken without debate; and the first always in order. But when the report of a committee has been under discussion, the motion to lay on the table shall not prevail until the chairman of the committee shall have been heard once on the subject, if he desires to speak.

4. It shall be in order to move the previous question, or that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending—except in cases in which character is involved—and if sustained by two-thirds of

members present the question shall be taken. It shall not be in order for a member to move the previous question or to move to lay on the table at the close of his speech in which the pending question has been discussed.

5. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question on reference

to the standing committee shall be first put.

No motion to commit, or to lie on the table, being decided, shall be again allowed, on the same day, at the same stage of the proposition.

7. A motion, after it is seconded, is the property of the Conference, and the mover has no power to withdraw or have it amended, without leave.

8. No amendment shall be in order, further than an amendment to the amendment; but it shall be in order to move a substitute for the main question, and one amendment to the substitute, and if a substitute is accepted it shall replace the original proposition.

9. All motions to fix the place of the meeting of the Annual Confer-

ence shall lie on the table twenty-four hours.

Rule X. VOTING:—1. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is being put shall vote, unless the Conference for a special reason shall excuse him.

2. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question, who is not within the bar at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of Conference, or when such member has been nec-

essarily absent.

- 3. Votes for all Conference officers and the Committees on Appeal and Standing District shall be by ballot. Otherwise, voting shall be by yea and nay; but a division of the house being called a count vote shall be taken, members rising in their places and standing until they shall have been counted.
- 4. A member may change his vote at any time before the chair announces the decision of the question.

5. Blank ballots shall not be counted.

Ayes and nays, and a vote by orders shall be as prescribed in the

Discipline.

Rule XI. AMENDING RULES AND REGULATIONS. All motions or resolutions, whether submitted by committees or individual members, contemplating an amendment to these Rules and Regulations, must so specify. Otherwise, such action shall not be binding upon any other session of the Conference than that at which the same is passed.

REGULATIONS

Regulation I. DUTIES OF PASTORS. 1. The pastor shall seek the co-operation of the Stewards in collecting the assessments made by the Annual Conference, admonishing them of their duty in this matter as contained in the Discipline, under head of "Duties of Stewards", pp. 129, Sec. 7.

2. It is the duty of pastors to examine and see that suitable deeds behad for all churches, so as to secure them to the Methodist Protestant

Church, and, whenever possible, have them incorporated.

3. Pastors are required to apportion the President's salary equitably among the several appointments, and use their utmost endeavors to collect the same before the annual visit of the President.

4. Pastors are required to see that the families belonging to their vespective charges are duly supplied with the Catechism of our Church.

5. Pastors are instructed to ascertain of those received into the Church whether they have been baptized, and if not, to administer the ordinance of baptism without unnecessary delay.

6. Every pastor is required to do his utmost to collect the full amount of the assessments made upon his charge, whatever may be the difficulties

that he may encounter.

7. It is the duty of the pastor to preside on the trial of an accused

unstationed Minister or Preacher.

8. Pastors are required to report to the Annual Conference the amounts contributed to Foreign Missions by the auxiliaries of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, and due credit shall be given the Minutes.

9. Pastors, when changing appointments, shall hand to their succes-

sors a plan of the work of the charge.

10. Station and Circuit Stewards shall furnish the pastor with a sufficient number of Disciplines, that he may be able to present each new member with a copy, in compliance with Disciplinary law.

Regulation II. SUFFRAGE AND ELIGIBILITY. 1. Every minister, preacher and member in full communion and fellowship having attained

the age of twenty-one years shall be entitled to vote in all cases.

- 2. All members in full communion and fellowship shall have the right to vote in the election of their class-leaders; and those who have attained the age of twenty-one years shall be "qualified members" for the purpose indicated in Section 2 of Article IV of the Constitution, and in division 1 and 4 of "General Duties of Trustees," found on pages 114 and 115 of Discipline.
- 3. Every minister, preacher, and lay male member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-five years shall be eligible

as a representative in the General Conference.

4. Every member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible as a Steward, Class-leader and Sunday-school Superintendent; and every male member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible as a Trustee and a Delegate to the Annual Conference.

5. No minister shall be eligible to the office of President of the Annual Conference until he shall have faithfully exercised the office of Elder two

vears.

6. The Conference strongly disapproves the secret ballot for the removal or return of the pastor, and condemns the complimentary vote that asks for the pastor's return in the public meeting and seeks his removal at the Annual Conference.

Regulation III. THE PRESIDENT'S PARSONAGE. 1. The Conference endorses the action of the Committee in the purchase of the proper-

ty, No. 1420 Linden Ave., Baltimore, as the President's parsonage.

2. The assessment of \$3,000 shall be continued under the name of "President's Salary," to be appropriated as follows: Seventy-five per cent. of the amount raised to be paid to the President as his salary and traveling expenses. Twenty-five per cent. of the amount raised to be paid to the Agent of the President's parsonage, who shall pay out of this amount, first, the interest on the purchase money; second, the water rent, insurance and needful repairs of the property; third, the reduction of the principal of the loan.

Regulation IV. RECORDS OF TRIAL CASES. In all cases of the trial of a minister, the Secretary of the Trial Committee shall make a correct record of the proceedings of the trial, and turn the same over to the Secretary

retary of the Conference, together with a copy of the charges, and specifications, a copy of the finding, or verdict of the Committee—and all other documentary evidence used in the trial, to be kept by the Secretary among the records of the Conference.

Regulation V. WITHOUT APPOINTMENT AND SUPERNUMERARY REQUESTS. All requests to be left without an appointment for the ensuing year, or for a supernumerary relation, shall be referred by the Conference to the Committee on Official Relations for consideration and report thereon before such requests shall be granted.

Regulation VI. SABBATH SCHOOLS. 1. As a preparation for more efficient study and teaching of the Word, teachers' meetings should be stat-

edly held under the direction of the pastor or superintendent.

2. Pastors are directed to carry out the Disciplinary regulations concerning the organization of our Sabbath Schools into Foreign Missionary Societies and the taking of a collection every quarter for Foreign Missions.

3. Children's Day shall be faithfully observed by all our Sabbath Schools, and the money received on that day shall be exclusively devoted

to the Children's Day offering for Foreign Missions.

Regulation VII. OUR CHURCH HOME. 1. Every charge shall appoint a lady visitor for the benefit of Our Church Home, consistent with the character of that institution.

The list of charges failing to meet the requirement of the Conference relative to Our Church Home shall be read at each session of the Con-

ference

3. The second Sunday of November of each year shall be known as "Donation Day" for Our Church Home, and all our pastors are instructed to call the attention of their congregations thereto, and an endeavor made to have donations of provisions, groceries, and things needed to conduct the Home, sent to Mrs. E. O. Grimes, Westminster, Md.

Regulation VIII. ADMINISTERING ORDINANCES. No person, in virtue merely of a license to preach, or even election to orders, is empowered to administer or assist in administering the Christian ordinances.

Regulation IX. UNSTATIONED MINISTERS. The Conference will not recognize as a minister of the Methodist Protestant Church any man who does not bring credentials from some other orthodox denomination, or who has not received suitable testimonials of ministerial character from our own Church. In returning the list of ministers and preachers, pastors shall name no person who does not possess the foregoing qualifications.

Regulation X. LOTTERIES. The practice of raising funds for church purposes, by means of lotteries and other games of hazard is disapproved by the Conference, and pastors are enjoined to discountenance their use.

Regulation XI. MORTGAGING CHURCH PROPERTY. The placing of mortgage upon church property, for the purpose, directly or indirectly, of paying the pastor's salary, is, so far as it has authority, disallowed by the Conference.

Regulation XII. OBITUARIES. 1. It shall be the duty of the Committee, appointed in accordance with the Rule of Conference, to prepare an obituary, without delay, containing a notice of the place and date of the birth of the brother, the date of his conversion, receiving license to preach, and his reception into the Conference, together with any other important facts connected with his history which their judgment may dictate, in addition to the particulars of his death, and said obituary shall at once be forwarded to the "Methodist Protestant". for publication, and be reported to the ensuing session of Conference.

2. Every ministerial member of this Conference is hereby requested to make and keep by him a record of his nativity, and of all the prominent acts in his Christian and ministerial history.

The obituaries of wives and widows of the ministerial members of

the Conference shall also be published in the Minutes.

Regulation XIII. MARRIAGES. The Conference cannot encourage any of its members to expect support as married men until they shall have

served at least four years in the itinerancy.

Regulation XIV. TITLES AND DEGREES. Inasmuch as the degree of Doctor of Philosophy is the badge of University work and most rigid examinations-a degree which our better Colleges refuse to confer, and Universities do not confer for honor, but only for merit in advanced special studies-we feel sure no worthy institution would confer such a title for work done by correspondence, and the man who consents to bear a title so conferred subjects himself to the ridicule of scholars and involves the ministry in a charge of vanity and insincerity. Therefore, this Conference expresses its disapproval of this method of obtaining degrees, and declines to recognize in any way a title so obtained.

Regulation XV. UNFERMENTED W

UNFERMENTED WINE. The Conference recommends the use of unfermented wine in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Regulation XVI. DROPPING MEMBERS. Persons whose names are on the church register and cannot be found, or who have ceased to take an interest in the church, may be dropped from the record by a vote of the church; provided further, that in stations these changes may be made by the Quarterly Conference.

Regulation XVII. PASTORS' MOVING EXPENSES. As the Discipline grants the Annual Conference the right to "make such regulations as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the ministers and preachers," it is the judgment of this Conference that the charge to which a minister or preacher is assigned should pay the moving expenses of the incoming

Regulation XVIII. . CAMP-MEETINGS. 1. Camp-meetings shall have the sanction of Conference and receive ministerial aid from it on the fol-

lowing conditions:-

There shall be no traffic on the Lord's Day on the camp-ground or

the adjacent territory protected by the laws of the State.

The managers or other officers of the camp-meeting shall not bargain for or receive any portion of the money paid to railroads, or to the owner or owners of any conveyance or conveyances, as a consideration for conveying persons to the camp-ground, or the vicinity thereof, on the Lord's day.

No advertisement of the running of trains on the Lord's day shall be made by any of the persons referred to in the preceding paragraph, nor shall anything be done by their authority or solicitation to contravene the

foregoing regulations.

Upon receiving from a quarterly conference a request for ministerial supply and a pledge that the above regulations will be faithfully observed, the President of the Annual Conference shall appoint members of this Conference to assist in conducting the camp-meeting.

In the absence of a request and a pledge such as are named above, the President shall not appoint such ministerial supply, nor shall any mem-

ber of this Conference conduct such camp-meeting as pastor.

Appointees to camp-meeting service must be given four weeks' notice of their appointment. If they find it inconvenient to attend they shall promptly present their excuse to the President. If the President declines to revoke their appointment, a failure to attend shall be reported to this Conference by the President.

Regulation XIX. ELECTION OF DELEGATES. This Conference recognizes and emphasizes the Disciplinary law (pages 69-70, 1908 edition) for the election of delegates to the Annual Conferences, which prohibits a pastor presiding at such elections. Further, when the delegate is elected by the qualified members of the several churches of a circuit under the direction of the stewards, the pastor shall sign the certificates as Chairman of the Quarterly Conference.


