# CONFERENCE EXAMINERS AND EXAMINATIONS

- 1. Beginning with the Conference of 1923 the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders shall consist of a chairman and four other ministers; the chairman to be appointed for a four year's term and the other ministers annually by the President of the Conference and announced at least three months preceding the meeting of Conference.
- 2. In announcing the appointment of the four ministers as members of this Committee, the President shall designate one of them to examine applicants for admission into the Itinerancy on the English Bible; one on Christian graces and gifts for the ministry; one on Systematic Theology; and one on the Law and Usages of the Methodist Protestant Church. The result of these examinations shall be considered by the whole Committee and reported to the Conference with a recommendation in each case. No person shall be considered by the Conference for admission into the Itinerancy until he has been subjected to this examination, irrespective of previous educational training or ministerial standing, and has been recommended by this Committee.
- 3. The four ministers designated as Examiners shall continue to serve for the First, Second and Third Year classes successively, accompanying the same class through the entire course. During this period they shall not be eligible for appointment as members of the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders. The Examiners of each class shall join in a report to the Conference annually of the results of their examinations, and their report shall, after adoption by the Conference, be sent to the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders. After the Examiners have reported on the Third Year class their office shall terminate. In case of a vacancy prior to the termination of the period the President shall fill it with a new appointment.
- 4. The Examiners of each class may arrange by mutual agreement the assignment of the studies to the Examiners, except in the Preparatory Course. They shall also assign one of the books of the course to be examined during the first week of July, October, January and at Conference respectively. These assignments shall be announced in their report to Conference.

The Course of Study for each year shall be as follows:

#### PREPARATORY COURSE

- (a) The English Bible-New Testament, with the contents of which the applicant will be expected to show a familiarity that will justify his employment in the ministry.
  - (b) Christian graces and gifts for the ministry, which will be an

examination of the applicant's experience. The applicant will also be expected to present and read to this examiner an original sermon, a selection from our Psalter and a hymn.

(d) Lewis' Hand book. The Discipline of the Methodist Protestant Church, including the preface. The applicant must show that he has studied these books and that he is especially familiar with our ministerial

functions and procedure.

All persons applying for admission into the Conference will write to the President of the Conference for official blanks, on which application should be made. All persons seeking license to administer the ordinances must have recommendation from Quarterly Conference and must personally appear before the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders. First year.

#### FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY

Wilmington, Delaware, April 7, 1926.

Resolution (1) by A. N. Ward, that President appoint a committee of two men to call upon W. M. Strayer and express to him the love of the Conference. Motion adopted.

Letter from R. W. Sutcliffe referred to Committee on Official Relations.

Report of tellers on Committee on Appeals was made, showing the election of J. M. Gill, J. W. Kirk, J. H. Straughn, W. E. Sheppard, W. E. Cain, W. O. Atwood.

Report of tellers on Standing District Committee showed the election of F. T. Little, L. F. Warner, J. M. Sheridan, T. P. Fisher, J. H. Baker, T. A. Murray.

The Report of The Maryland Educational Endowment Society (Report R) was read showing that the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. T. W. Mather was now filled by his son, Mr. George K. Mather.

The income of the Henrietta Gibson Fund was used as usual in the education of young men for our ministry. Also, that \$200.00 placed at the disposal of the trustees of the Drinkhouse Trust Estate was used at the Seminary for young ministers. Report was adopted.

The report of the Maryland Conference Trustees was read (Report D). The names of those whose terms expire at this session were read. The income from the legacy of Mrs. A. S. Eversoll has been used for Conference Church Extension Work. The receipts and expenditures were also read. Report adopted.

J. H. Straughn, J. M. Sheridan, Rowland Watts, F. Murray Benson, were elected to fill the vacancies in the Maryland Conference Board of Trustees.

Letter from Mrs. Rena W. Lewis read and referred to Committee on Superannuates.

Resolution (2) that C. R. Strausburg submit his sermon for publication in the Minutes. Resolution was adopted.

Motion that Treasurer of Conference send notices to all pastors insisting that their charges pay their part of the President's salary by July first, according to the rule.

Letter from the Board of Home Missions was read asking for the loan of W. M. Snyder as pastor of University Church, Kansas City. It was referred to Committee on Official Relations.

The report of the Committee on Conference Arrangements (Report Z) was read and report adopted.

The order of the day having come, E A. Sexsmith led the conference in the devotional service. Theme: "Our Church at Home."

F. T. Little was called to the chair.

Dr. T. H. Lewis, president of the General Conference, addressed the Conference relative to the work of our denomination in the south and also regarding the money subscribed for a man to give special service to those conferences.

A motion of J. M. Gill, that we as a Conference wish to ratify the subscriptions given Dr. T. H. Lewis for this special work and also the plan of Dr. Lewis that it might be well to make some modification of the plan, in so far as not requiring the man to live in the area of those Conferences and do the work by visitation and correspondence. We also pledge our moral and financial support for the balance of the quadrennial.

A. N. Ward, President of Western Maryland College, spoke to the motion and agreed to assume the cost of the education at Western Maryland College of five young men from the South, with the understanding that the young men so educated must return to the conferences from which they came and give active service there in the pastorate. Motion was adopted.

Dr. S. W. Rosenberger, member Executive Committee of the General Conference, was introduced to the Conference.

Rev. Wm. Hardesty, of the Wilmington M. E. Conference was also introduced to the Conference.

The order of the day of Friday at 9:45 is to hear the report of Group Life Insurance.

Rev. Francis Stephenson, Secretary of Board of Education, was introduced to the Conference.

Confrence then adjourned.

#### **AFTERNOON**

Conference convened at 2:00 P. M. G. W. Haddaway presided.

Mr. G. W. Crabbe, Superintendent of the Maryland Anti-Saloon League, was introduced to the Conference and made an address.

Louis Randall, Examiner, reports that Wm. Schmeiser has received 100 on Parish's "Program of Religious Education."

F. T. Little, Examiner, reports that Wm. Schmeiser has received 100 in Calkin's "Historical Geography of the Bible."

J. W. Balderston, Examiner, reports that J. Gilbert Lynn has received 100 in Broadus' "Preparation and Delivery of Sermons" and also on the "English Bible."

Rev. J. A. Japhet, an evangelist who has been doing much work among our churches, was introduced to the Conference and made a brief address.

Rev. Dr. Alfred Smith, of the Wilmington M. E. Conference, was introduced to the Conference and made a short address.

- J. W. Kirk, Examiner, reports that Wm. Schmeiser has passed in Fisher's "Church History."
- T. O. Crouse, Examiner, reports that Wm. Schmeiser has received 100 in Curtis' "Christian Faith."

Partial report of the Board of Survey and Extension (Report G) was read and motion made that the office of Church Extension superintendent be continued and that the sum of \$3000.00 additional be assessed on the district for Church Extension. Adopted.

Motion also that the salary of Church Extension Superintendent be \$3000.00. Report was adopted.

Report of the Headquarters Committee (Report V) was read showing that all outstanding obligations against the property have been consolidated in a bond issue of \$20,000.00 secured by a second mortgage over the signature of the Board of Trustees of the Conference, There is now a first mortgage of \$122,500.00 and a second mortgage of \$20,000.00 due in five years. There are no other debts and there is in cash and bills receivable \$5,102.72. The Committee feels it has no further reason for continuance and therefore recommends:

- 1. That the Committee be discharged and that the Conference turn over the building for control and management to the Board of Conference Trustees or to a small Board of Management as the Conference may deem wise, believing that a direct Superintendency of said building ought to be in the hands of some one person for supervision.
- 2. That out of the current income receipts from the building an amount not to exceed \$50.00 per month be available for such renumeration as the judgement of the new management may direct.

A supplemental report of the treasurer is also embodied in this report. On motion of G. I. Humphreys, the report of the Committee was adopted and the President asked to appoint a Committee of three to make recommendations as to the future management of the building and the personnel of the Committee in charge.

Partial report of Committee on Official Relations (Report M) was read endorsing the loan of W. M. Snyder to University Church, at Kansas City. It was accepted.

Conference gave way for the meeting of the Mutual Relief Association. Conference again resumed and then adjourned to meet at the program hour. Rev. G. Q. Bacchus pronounced the benediction.

#### **EVENING**

Denominational Session in charge of F. C. Klein.

Addresses were made by representatives of the Woman's Missionary organizations—Mrs. L. F. Warner, Mrs. E. A. Craig and Mrs. Julian Dodge.

An address was made by Rev. Dr. S. W. Rosenberger, Columbus, Ohio. Benediction was given by J. M. Sheridan.

#### THIRD DAY, FRIDAY

Conference opened at 9:30 A. M. with the President in the chair. The minutes were read and adopted.

The President called W. H. Litsinger to the chair.

Report of the Committee on Stewardship and Tithing (Report X) was read showing that 1500 tithers are enrolled in our conference district, 400 of whom are on file. The committee recommends that a new committee be appointed, which shall work in conjunction with the Church Extension Superintendent in an effort toward a larger emphasis on this vital phase of Christian life.

An amendment to the recommendation was made to strike out that section which reads "shall work in conjunction with the Church Extension Superintendent." Amendment was adopted. The report as amended was

adopted.

The President of the Conference appointed the following committees: To visit W. N. Sherwood—F. T. Little, E. H. Jones; to visit W. M. Strayer—E. T. Read, J. A. Wright; Headquarters Management—J. H. Straughn, J. M. Gill, W. O. Atwood.

The hour of the day having come the Conference heard Mr. Arthur Benson and Mr. Boyd speak to the Conference on Group Life Insurance A motion was made by J. M. Sheridan that a committee of three be appointed to hear these men concerning this insurance proposition. Motion adopted. The chair appointed J. M. Sheridan, E. A. Sexsmith and W. E. Cain.

Dr. W. W. Davis, Rev. Bookmyer, Dr. Goff, Rev. Ostermeyer, Dr. Abner Brown were introduced to the Conference.

Dr. W. W. Davis of the Lord's Day Alliance gave us a brief address on his work.

Mrs. L. F. Warner, President of the Maryland Branch Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was introduced to the Conference.

Rev. Dr. Goff was given the privilege of making a brief address.

Devotional service was led by J. M. Sheridan. Theme: "Our Church in America."

Miss Grace G. Jones, Evangelist, and well known to our Conference, was introduced to this Conference.

F. C. Klein, General Conference Messenger and Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions was introduced and made an address.

Rev. Edwin H. Bookmyer, representative of Business Men's Council of the Pocket Testament League, addressed the Conference.

Report of the Committee on Missions (Report N) was read showing the splendid work done by the Union Board of Foreign Missionary Administration in both Home and Foreign fields. The Committee urges the pastors to emphasize the observance of Children's Day and the securing of as large an offering as possible. The Committee affirmed that in its opinion the time was inopportune for bringing to a successful conclusion the Girl's Home in Baltimore. The Committee recommends:

1. That every dollar raised at the Children's Day offering be devoted to the cause of Forign Missions with the provision that all over and above

the 25 per cent. designated by the General Conference be considered a free-will offering to this cause. On motion this recommendation was stricken out.

2. Demanding that the money so raised for this fund be remitted within thirty days after the observance of the day. Report was adopted.

Edgar T. Read, Examiner, reports that J. G. Lynn has passed in Curtis' "Christian Faith."

P. W. Crosby, Examiner, reports that Leon A. Smith and J. G. Lynn have passed in Gladden's "Christian Pastor."

W. B. Judefind, Examiner, reports that Miss Grace G. Jones has received 100 in Lewis' "Divine Credentials."

J. L. Ward, Examiner, reports that Leon A. Smith and J. G. Lynn have passed in Fisher's "History of the Christian Church."

J. W. Balderston, Examiner, reports that Leon A. Smith has passed in Broadus' "Preparation and Delivery of Sermons" and in English Bible.

The delegate of Salem Charge was excused from attendance until Monday.

Resolution (3) than any ministerial member of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, who shall have served in active relation for forty years in bounds of said Conference and who shall have reached the age of 65 years, shall have the privilege of Superannuation without the vote of said Conference should he so desire. It was referred to the Committee on Superannuates.

Report of the Committee on Pulpit Supply was made, and said report

was adopted.

Benediction by J. F. Farring.

#### **AFTERNOON**

Conference convened at 2:00 P. M. with F. T. Little in the chair.

Report of the Summer Conference of Ministers (Report S) was read telling us of the fine fellowship and also the splendid addresses given.

The Committee asks for a continuance of the appropriation of \$200.00 to this important enterprise. This recommendation was adopted.

Report of the Committee on Young People's Work (Report J) was

read and the following items considered.

- 1. That we express our confidence in Rev. E. A. Sexsmith, General Secretary of the Board of Young People's Work, and recommend that all C. E. Societies adopt his efficiency service chart.
- 2. That we cooperate with L. B. Smith, President of the Union of Young People's Work, in helping to train Christian workers.
- 3. That an entrance examination in the form of a questionaire be required of those seeking admission.
- 4. Noting the success of the Winter Institutes throughout the Peninsula.
- 5. Endorsing the school of Methods as conducted at Grace Church in Baltimore.
- 6. That of supporting Rev. Paul M. Cassen, our missionary in India, be approved.

7. Endorsing Carroll M. Wright as Field Secretary of Maryland and Delaware C. E. Unions.

8. Urging all Sunday School and C. E. Societies to help finance this work.

Report was adopted.

Partial Report of the Committee on Official Relations, (Report M) was read requesting the loan of J. H. Straughn for service as Group Leader. Report was adopted.

Report of the Committee to study the Deaconess Work (Report L) was read indicating that the same conditions exist now as did one year

ago. Order of day having come this report was deferred.

Report of the Committee on Literature and Education (Report I) was read and considered. The facts concerning our church paper indicate our responsibility and opportunity. There are 1600 more homes in the Maryland District that do not get the church paper than there are subscribers to the paper in all the denomination. We are grateful for the splendid service of F. T. Benson, the editor. The committee recommends that the month of March be set aside as a time for special emphasis in securing new subscribers and renewals. Pastors are urged to keep the value of the paper before their people. The Committee also notes with pleasure the improved quality of the Sunday School literature and heartily endorses the Editor, Dr. C. S. Johnson.

It is gratifying to note the steady increase of the volume of business in the Printing Department and the Book Store.

F. T. Benson spoke.

The new home of the President of the Seminary has been completed and is now occupied by Dr. H. L. Elderdice. The total cost of the building was \$25,000.00, all of which has been paid except \$500.00. The committee endorses the recommendation:

1. Of H. L. Elderdice as President for another year.

- 2. Instructing the laymen as to the needs of the various funds of the Seminary.
- 3. Urging young men to consider the claims of the ministry. Dr. H. L. Elderdice, president of the Seminary, made an address in behalf of the Seminary work, and Rev. F. W. Stephenson, Secretary of the Board of Education also made an address.

The Board of Education recommends:

- 1. That pastors put the Secretary of the Board in touch with any young men thinking of the ministry.
- 2. That the second Sunday in December be observed as "Men for the Ministry Sunday."
- 3. That all churches observe the second Sunday in October, or the nearest Sunday thereto as Rally Day.

The Committee has read with care and pleasure the report of the President of Western Maryland College. The enrollment now totals five hundred (500) for this college year. We express our appreciation of Dr. A. N. Ward for his vision and energy and consecration to his task.

Dr. A. N. Ward, President of the College, spoke about the endowment and general work of the college,

To Dr. T. H. Lewis we acknowledge our debt for his splendid book "The Minister and His Own Soul."

The report was adopted as a whole.

J. Franklin Bryan, Examiner, reports that Miss Grace G. Jones has received 100 in Curtis' "Christian Faith."

The order of the day having come, G. I. Humphreys reported concerning the changing of conference date. A resolution (4) was offered changing the date from April 1 to June 1. W. H. Litsinger offered an amendment that the resolution lay over for one year. Amendment was lost. The original motion was then carried by a vote of 78 yeas and 75 nays. L. B. Smith then moved that we reconsider the vote. Motion was adopted. L. B. Smith moved that the question of change be referred to the Quarterly Conferences of the Charges and their action brought to the Conference of 1927. Motion adopted.

Conference then adjourned.

Services in the interest of Young People with L. B. Smith, President of the Union of Young People's Work, presiding.

Addresses were made by R. W. White, Secretary of the Union of Young People's Work; T. C. Mulligan, Treasurer of the Union of Young People's Work, and E. L. Bunce.

Benediction was given by J. W. Townsend.

#### FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY

Conference opened at 9:30 A. M. with the President in the chair.

The minutes were read and adopted.

The President called J. H. Straughn to the chair.

Conference gave way to a meeting of the Superannuate Fund Society.

Conference again resumed.

N. O. Gibson, Examiner, reports that Miss Grace G. Jones has passed in Drinkhouse's "History of Methodist Reform."

W. A. Donaway, collector for the sexton, reports an offering of \$30.00.

M. W. Gaines, delegate from Alexandria, asked to be excused.

E. A. Sexsmith asked to be excused.

Delegate from Harmony, W. Va., was excused from further attendance.

A letter from F. W. Lineberry was read regretting his inability to be present and address the Conference.

A letter from Second Church, Wilmington, Delaware, was read relative to the condition of the building and work. It was referred to the Board of Survey and Extension.

George Hines was excused from further attendance.

Report of Committee on Statistics (See tables) was read and adopted.

Devotional service was conducted by F. C. Klein. Theme: "Our Church Abroad."

Partial report of the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders (Report F) was read and on motion was taken up by items:

- . 1. That Jesse G. Eaton be received into the Conference
  - a. That Edward E. Coleman be received into the Conference.
  - b. That Walter A. Donaway be received into the Conference.
  - c. That Edwin Keehner be received into the Conference.
  - d. That these men be ordained.
  - 2. That C. L. Dawson be ordained.
  - 3 That William Schmeiser be ordained.
  - 4. That D. F. Galloway be received on trial.
  - 5. That C. F. Cummins be received into the Conference.
    - G. I. Humphreys offered an amendment:

That item (5) be amended so as to read "and he be ordained provided he pledge himself to pursue the Conference course of study."

Amendment was adopted.

Report was then adopted as a whole.

On motion these men—Jesse G. Eaton, Edward E. Coleman, Walter A. Donaway, Edwin Keehner, D. F. Galloway and C. F. Cummins were received into the Conference by the President of the Conference.

Partial report (Report K) of the Committee on Moral Reform was read stating "that the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church urges in a letter to Hon. Rice W. Means, Chairman of Senate Judiciary Sub-Committee 'that the Volstead Law be not liberalized, but that your committee may report to the Senate, as a result of its hearings, methods for the proper enforcement of the 18th Amendment and the Volstead Law." It was adopted.

A representative of Prudential Insurance Company addressed the Conference on Group Life Insurance.

Reports of Committee on Superannuate (Report H) was read and according to the rule was laid on the table for twenty-four hours. The item referring to the \$7000.00 on the district was adopted as was also the item authorizing the treasurer to borrow a sufficient amount to meet the deficiency of 1926 and 1927.

E. T. Read, Examiner, reports that Leon A. Smith has passed in Curtis' "Christian Faith."

The delegate from Laurel was excused from further attendance.

K. H. Wareheim was excused from further attendance.

Invitation was received to meet at next session of the Annual Conference at St. Luke's Church, Philadelphia, Pa.

The benediction was pronounced by H. L. Elderdice.

#### **EVENING**

The Conference church choir rendered a very beautiful cantata.

#### FIFTH DAY, SUNDAY

The service opened at 10.30 A. M.

Special music was rendered by the choir of the Conference Church.

Hymn No. 463, "Let Zion's Watchmen All Awake" was sung.

Prayer was offered by J. M. Sheridan, and G. Q. Bacchus led in the Responsive Reading. The Scripture Lesson, Selection from Phillipians third chapter, was read by F. T. Little.

Hymn No. 316, "O Jesus I Have Promised" was then sung.

The Ordination Sermon-"Things Preachers Should Know and Do."

was preached by J. W. Trout.

Following the sermon, Walter Avery Donaway, Charles Francis Cummins, Clarence Leslie Dawson, Jesse Glaison Eaton, William Schmeiser, Edwin Keehner and Edward Ellis Coleman were ordained Elders in the Church of Christ. The President was assisted in this service by G. I. Humphreys, B. F. Ruley, L. F. Warner and R. L. Shipley, Secretary.

The service closed with benediction by President Makosky.

#### **EVENING**

Service opened in the Conference Church at 7.30 P. M. Sermon was preached by C. M. Elderdice, whose theme was "The Still Small Voice."

#### SIXTH DAY, MONDAY

Conference convened a 9.30 A. M. with the President in the chair. The Minutes were read and approved.

The President called J. M. Gill to the chair.

A. J. Williar, delegate from Christ Church, was excused from further attendance.

T. O. Crouse and F. D. Reynolds asked for a Superannuated Relation. Their requests were referred to the Committee on Superannuates.

F. T. Little and E. H. Jones, who were appointed to visit W. N. Sherwood, reported through F. T. Little that they had done so. We were told of the severe affiliction through which this brother was passing. Brother Sherwood is receiving treatment at Farnhurst State Sanatorium. Our prayers and sympathy go out to him. E. D. Stone offered special prayer in Brother Sherwood's behalf.

Report of the Board of Finance (Report E) was read showing the

various budgets apportioned to the charges. Report was adopted.

Report of the Committee on Evangelism (Report V) was read showing the tent meetings had resulted in 157 conversions, 4 reclamations and 100 had joined the church as a result of these meetings. The Committee recommended:

- 1. That the Conference give due consideration to this highly important matter and authorize the committee to conduct a personal evangelism campaign throughout the Conference area.
  - 2. That the month of February be the month for this campaign.

3. That the Conference set aside a Sunday during their evangelistic services to be known as Decision Day. Report was adopted as a whole.

J. M. Gill gave way to J. H. Straughn as presiding officer.

Report of Special Committee on Group Life Insurance (Report W) was read. The order of the day having come the report of Committee on Insurance was deferred.

R. Y. Nicholson conducted the devotional service. His theme was "A Greater Church."

Report of Special Committee on Group Life Insurance was again resumed. After careful consideration the committee found the most satisfactory policy and rates to be in The Prudential Insurance Company of Newark, N. J. On motion the report was taken up by items:

1. That The Maryland Annual Conference accept the proposition of that Prudential Insurance Company provided the required number of

members can be secured.

- 2. That premium be paid as follows: Ten dollars (\$10.00) by each person insured within thirty days, the balance of eleven dollars and thirty-four cents (\$11.34) be paid by The Maryland Conference. On the basis of One hundred and forty-eight men participating the total amount would be Thirteen hundred and thirty-three dollars and twenty-five cents (1333.25).
- 3. That an additional amount of \$1500.00 be added to the assessment for Superannuates. The same to be used for the payment of that portion of the premiums assumed by The Maryland Annual Conference.

On motion it was decided to consider item 2 first. This item was relative to the manner of payment. An amendment was offered to this item that it be referred back to the charges for action. Delegate from North Carolina Avenue Church and William Wheatley, delegate from Chestertown, spoke. Amendment was lost.

A substitute was offered to the Amendment that the premiums be paid by those participating. J. L. Nichols, G. W. Lewis, delegate from Wallace Memorial, and W. G. Monroe, delegate from Cherrydale, spoke. Substitute was lost.

An amendment was offered to the substitute that the charges pay the full amount of the insurance. M. L. Veasey, delegate from Pocomoke City, Henry Gilligan, delegate from Rhode Island Avenue, F. W. Whitaker, delegate from Lynchburg, Va., and W. O. Atwood, delegate from St. John's, spoke. Amendment was lost.

The original item was then considered. J. M. Sheridan, G. W. Haddaway and Fred Evans, delegate from Lauraville, spoke. The original item was then adopted.

Item 1 as per Prudential Insurance Company was then adopted.

Item 3, that \$1500.00 be added to the assessment for Superannuates. An amendment was offered to make it \$3,000.00 The amendment was lost and the original item was adopted.

An amendment was offered to read "that the Conference require those who come into the Conference beginning with session 1926 participate in this insurance. It was adopted. Motion that the President of the Conference be authorized to conclude this matter, or find some means to have it done. An amendment was offered that the whole matter be referred to the President of the Conference and Mr. T. A. Murray to conclude this insurance. Amendment was adopted.

Motion was made that all active men be required to take this insurance. An amendment to the motion was made so as to read "urged" instead of "required." Amendment was adopted.

E. A. Sexsmith and W. E. Cain were appointed a committee to canvass the Conference in the interest of this insurance.

The Board of Finance was granted the privilege to withdraw its report for a correction. It was adopted.

Conference then adjourned.

#### **AFTERNOON**

Conference convened at 2.00 P. M. with G. I. Humphreys presiding. Report of Committee to Study Deaconess Work (Report L) was read stating that the Committee re-affirmed its convictions of last year. In order to know the condition of the work of last year the Secretary read the report of the committee of 1925 (See Conference Minutes 1925—page 95).

Motion was made by W. A. Melvin that we reconsider item of last year relative to training of Deaconesses. Adopted. Motion that any Deaconess, if so desirous, may take training in either of these schools as mentioned in last year's report. J. L. Nichols and G. W. Haddaway spoke. It was moved that the report be re-committed to the Committee for further and more definite action. It was lost.

A substitute was offered that the report be sent back to the Board of Managers with instructions. J. F. Bryan, J. M. Sheridan and J. L. Nichols spoke.

An amendment was offered for the substitute that it be referred to the Board of Managers with instructions that the work go on and that they be trained in either one of the schools mentioned. It was lost.

J. W. Kirk moved to strike out the two schools and insert Westminster Theological Seminary. W. H. Hodges, J. M. Gill and C. C. Day spoke. The question was called and on motion was lost.

It was moved that it be referred to the Board of Managers with instructions that these women be trained in any one of these institutions: Westminster Theological Seminary, Lucy Webb Hayes National Training School, or the Lutheran Mother Home. Adopted.

On motion it was referred to the Committee on Benevolent Agencies to be incorporated in their report. Accepted.

J. H. Straughn was called to the chair.

Report of Committee on Moral and Social Service (Report K) was read calling the attention of our people to be careful in the observance of all law and to be as zealous for the preservation of good laws. It is our conviction that a vigorous campaign of education in the principles underlying these laws should be undertaken. The Committee recommends:

1. That all our ministers prepare themselves with these facts and

in the most effective way possible give them to their people.

2. That a message be sent to the United States Senate Committee, which is now investigating the prohibition situation, urging that the Volstead law be not liberalized, but that methods for its proper enforcement be reported to the Senate.

The committee calls attention to the beauty and sanctity of marriage, and records its disapproval of hasty marriages and the commercialization of the sacred ordinance, and urges the passage of such laws as will

prevent these evils.

The blessing of the Christian Sabbath is realized as the day is kept, one of rest and communion with the Highest. The church is called upon to reveal its blessings, and commend the Lord's Day Alliance for its efforts looking to this end. J. W. Kirk, J. L. Nichols, G. Q. Bacchus, L. B. Smith, Robert Browne, T. O. Crouse and Henry Gilligan spoke.

Amendment by Henry Gilligan that we urge that the Volstead Law be amended so as to make illegal the home manufacture of wines or cider containing more than one-half of one per cent of alcohol by volume.

Amendment was adopted.

Amendment by G. W. Haddaway that this Conference emphasize the importance of Legislation to enforce the Volstead Act and urge upon our ministers and laymen to do their best to have such a law passed at the next state legislature. Adopted.

Report was adopted as a whole.

Partial Report of the Conference Treasurer (See Tables) was read and adopted.

The Special Committee to consider the Headquarters Management (Report V) reports:

- 1. We recommend that the management be placed in the hands of a special Board of Management.
- 2. That this Board be composed of the President of the Conference, T. W. Donoho and J. H. Baker.
- 3. That this Board be empowered to employ an agent of their own selection or to follow any other method for the Management of the Building as their judgment may direct.
- 4. Confidence of the Committee in securing a satisfactory working understanding. An amendment was offered and adopted "that in the event of a vacancy in the Board of Management, the Board of Trustees of the Conference be asked to fill the place." Adopted. Report of Special Committee was then adopted.

Report of Committee on Benevolent Agencies (Report L) was read but action deferred.

Conference then adjourned.

#### **EVENING**

Conference convened at 8.00 P. M. with F. T. Little presiding.
Report of Board of Finance was again taken up and on motion
\$1500.00 added to the assessment to take care of the Group Life Insurance. Report was adopted.

Final Report of Committee on Superannuate was made (Report H) showing the list of claimants and the amounts allotted. An amendment to item 5, relative to pro-rata share of each Superannuate, was made, to strike out \$12.00 for each year's service and insert \$15.00 for each year's service instead of \$10.00 as formerly; also strike out \$6.00 and insert \$7.50 instead of \$5.00 relative to ministers' wives. Amendment adopted. Report was then adopted.

Report of the Committee on Benevolent Agencies (Report L) was read commending the Board of Managers of Deaconess Work for their wise and economical management. The Committee recommends:

- 1. That the Sunday preceding the sessions of the Young People's Institute be set apart as a special day when the interest of the work shall be presented.
- 2. That a place be given on the program of the Young People's Institute for the presentation of this work.
- 3. That the appropriation of \$2500.00 be continued for another year.

The terms of G. W. Haddaway, G. E. Brown, J. H. Roberts, E. J. Paige and Mrs. E. B. Fenby expire at this session. On motion they were re-elected.

The Committee calls attention to the excellent work of The Maryland Tract and Maryland Bible Society. It also expresses its grateful appreciation of the St. John's Board of Beneficence and the Pipe Creek Benevolent Society. The Near East Work was also endorsed. The report was adopted.

The Report of the Committee on Home for the Aged (Report O) was read, showing a very noticeable increase along all lines. The Home Visitation Day has surpassed all previous occasions. The Committee regrets that the Board of Managers had to close the year with a slight deficit. The invested fund now amounts to \$36,382.00. The Committee recommends that the assessment for the Home for the ensuing year be \$6000.00. All Methodist Protestants are urged to visit the Home. The terms of L. F. Warner, E. B. Fenby, J. H. Straughn and O. H. Herr expire at this session. On motion they were re-elected. Report was adopted.

Report of the Agent of President's Parsonage was read. H. K. Muller was re-elected the Agent. The Report was adopted. The Secretary of the Conference was instructed to write Brother Muller expressing the sympathy of this Conference in his illness and also notifying him of his re-election.

Report of the Board of Survey and Extension (Report G) was read by the Chairman. Mr. Fred P. Adkins and Mr. Milton Veasey each made a brief address about the work of Peninsula Church.

J. H. Straughn was asked to take a subscription toward the floating indebtedness of Peninsula Church. The amount raised was \$1890.00.

On motion item 4, relating to sale of Greensboro Parsonage, was taken up separately and adopted.

Report was then adopted as a whole.

Conference gave way to a meeting of the Church Extension Society. Conference again resumed session.

Report of the Treasurer of the Conference (See Table) was submitted showing that amount paid on General Conference Budget was \$71.168.00

Report of Conference Steward (See Statistics) was read and adopted. The Report shows total raised for General Interests was \$146,154.00—an increase of \$14,703.00; total paid for Local Interests was \$691,379.00—an increase of \$50,878.00; total paid for all purposes was \$837,533.00.

Final Report of Committee on Itinerancy and Orders (Report F) was submitted as follows:

- 1. That W. S. Simms be placed in the hands of the President.
- 2. That G. E. Wunder, W. D. Wilson, Leon Smith, H. E. Hudgins, H. C. Burkins, A. W. Betts, J. G. Lynn, C. O. Quillan, D. K. Sturgis, Stephen Galley, H. L. Adams, Edwin Gardner, C. M. Jenkins and C. S. Marshall be placed in the hands of the President and be given license to administer the ordinance provided they be employed by the President.
- 3. That D. F. Galloway and C. M. Jenkins be given license to administer the ordinances.
- 4. That "Parish Program of Religious Education" by Squires be substituted for Athearn's "The Church School."
- 5. That T. H. Lewis' "The Minister and His Own Soul" be substituted for Greenfield's "Jesus, The Preacher."

The Report was adopted.

Report of Special \$100,000 Superannuate Committee (Report T) was read, and shows that approximately \$64,000 has been paid to date. The Committee places the matter squarely before the Conference. J. H. Straughn moved that the report be adopted and two laymen, with the President as Chairman, and that the President be charged as one of his chief duties the collection of these funds. Adopted.

G. W. Haddaway moved that at the end of this Conference year any minister or charge who has not paid his subscription shall answer before this Conference. Lost.

The original motion prevailed and was adopted.

W. H. Hodges, Examiner, reports that Miss Grace G. Jones has passed a satisfactory examination in Greenfield's "Jesus, The Preacher" and Elderdice's "The Preacher's Problems."

W. B. Judefind, Examiner, reports that Miss Grace G. Jones, has received 100 in English Bible.

Telegram was received from C. C. Day saying it would not be possible to entertain Conference next year.

The Committee on Audit (Report P) reports that it has audited the accounts of the Treasurer of Mutual Relief Association, the Secretary of the Maryland Annual Conference, and the Treasurer of the President's Parsonage, and has found them correct. The Committee has also examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Maryland Conference and found them correct. Report adopted.

The Report of the Conference Librarian (Report Y) was read and adopted.

Resolution (5) that the Secretary be instructed to compile a list of Special Days and Seasons provided for in the Conference Program.

Adopted.

Report of the Committee on Official Relations (Report M) was read and adopted. The report shows that forty-four (44) charges and seven (7) churches are on the Honor Roll having paid 100% or more on the entire budget.

Report of Chairman Special Committee on Group Life Insurance reports that one hundred and eleven (111) men have signed the cards.

Committee on Itinerancy and Orders asks that O. F. Betton be licensed to administer the ordinances. It was granted.

Report of the Committee on President's Report (Report A) was read and the report was adopted as a whole.

On motion of G. I. Humphreys, the Committee on Full-time Treasurer asked to be continued for another year. Motion was adopted.

Minutes were read and approved at 12.30 A. M., after which the President made a few remarks and then read the Plan of Appointments. Conference adjourned with benediction by President Makosky.

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

(See Journal, page 21)

THE MARYLAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH.

#### Dear Brethren:

"Grace, Mercy and Peace from God our Father and Jesus Christ our Lord." Our ninety-eight annual session is upon us. Together we have come for the yearly accounting of our stewardship—a time of reckoning for both Pastors and Churches.

Our meeting place for this Conference lends a unique setting to our assembly. For the first time in our history as a Conference we meet in the chief city of Delaware, a state that has within its borders 40 Churches and 4500 members in affiliation with the Maryland Conference. And we meet in this fine edifice, that in a very large sense is a Conference Church. Perhaps no church building in our whole conference district has as many people interested in it. It is because they have some measure of financial investment here. Perhaps not one of our nearly three hundred churches is so distinctly a symbol of Conference vision and a venture of faith and consecration on the part of our laymen as the Peninsula Church. Our united prayer, to-day, is that this church may long symbolize Conference possibilities, and likewise render, here in the city of Wilmington, an incomparable service to the glory of God and the safe pilgrimage of life that senses and seeks the home of the soul.

And now we humbly and sincerely ask of God His wisdom and blessing, as we open the active business of our present assembly.

### "THE SHADOW MEMORIES"

The Rev. John Mather Holmes, D. D., was transferred to the Church triumphant, July 2, 1925. For sixty years as a member of this body, he was honored as a man of God, a soldier of the faith, a fearless preacher of the "glad tidings" of the better way. Fifty-two years he was in active relation; 50 years as a Pastor, and for 2 years as the Superintendent of Church Extension.

Coming out of the Union Army in which he had enlisted as a boy, sixteen years of age, he enlisted as a soldier of Christ in the ranks of our ministry. What better tribute can we pay him to-day than to say of Dr. Holmes-"he fought a good fight."

None other of our Conference members died this year, but shadows have fallen elsewhere.

Mrs. George Q. Bacchus, the wife of our Brother Bacchus, went away suddenly, on Sunday, November 22, 1925. She had walked with our Brother for 47 years as he rendered her service in the pastorates throughout the district. How closely akin we know ourselves to be, as we commune under these shadows. And when the comradeship of many years, like this, is broken, how strange it must seem.

Mrs. E. O. Ewing, widow of the late Rev. E. O. Ewing, passed on, on December 24th, 1925. Thirty years, this sister had shared the lift of an Itinerant Methodist Preacher; then had seen him cease his labors and go away. She was left alone, save for her memories. And so life's ties are broken-so we are reminded that this is not our home, but that we look for a city whose builder and maker is God.

Obituary Committees were duly named for the above persons.

I here mention other deaths: Brother Henry J. Mason, a licensed preacher of the Milford Church, and who has been doing active work in the Conference since 1920, died suddenly on February 7th, 1926. Converted in the great revival at Milford under Rev. L. A. Bennett, he felt the urge to preach, and humbly and earnestly sought thus to serve his Saviour.

Mrs. Emma J. Wilson, wife of Rev. W. D. Wilson, the pastor supplying Lewes, Delaware died Friday, October 30th, 1925. Another

parsonage is in the shadow for one who went away.

Mr. N. T. Meginnie, a layman honored and esteemed; ordained by this Conference, though never in active membership, died March This Brother was prominent in the councils of the whole church for many years. He was a warm friend of the Seminary, at Westminster, and made remembrance of that institution in his will.

Mr. Oscar T. Morris, a lay member of our Church at Salisbury, died suddenly, September 29, 1925. His devotion to his church was attested in a legacy totaling \$40,000; as follows:-\$10,000 to Western Maryland College Endowment Campaign; \$20,000 to the church at Salisbury; \$5,000 to endow the Sunday School Library of that church; still another \$5,000 was left the Church. This, however, they have decided to use as a memorial to Mr. Morris and wife. This memorial will be in the form of a mural for the panel in the rear of the pulpit. Mr. Edwin Howland Blashfield, President of the National Academy of Design,-and the most famous mural painter in America; will paint the picture of "The Good Shepherd." Thus, in this great contribution to the religious art of America, the Salisbury Church will ever memorialize Mr. Morris' devotion to his church, and by the very painting that will make the church notable among lovers of art, will also notably tell the story of one who loved his church.

Other good men and women of our various churches have gone on before, since last we met, and here we pay tribute to their memories.

# "AD INTERIM ACTS"

Unsupplied charges. Just three charge were left unsupplied at

last conference adjourment.

Fairfax Circuit, Va.: Not until July, could I find a supply for the work. At that time, Rev. J. A. Ledbetter, of the North Carolina Conference, took charge. He gave only four months service. Since then, at their request, the charge has been without a pastor.

Patapsco: A small church near Westminster, has been cared for by Mr. Slayton, a Seminary student, for most of the year. He has

given efficient service.

Quantico: I had no supply to offer this charge, and I agreed that if they could supply their services with some local man, it would be

satisfactory to me.

Transfers. My work in this line has not been easy. Much time and thought have been given in and through the changes that have occurred as follows: Eutaw Church; Rev. W. P. Roberts, the pastor, accepted work at Seattle, Washington, under the Board of Home Missions. was released, as of September 1st. Alexandria; Rev. J. A. Dudley, was transferred to Eutaw, as of September 15th,. First Church, Cumberland; Rev. H. L. Schlincke, pastor, was transferred to Alexandria, taking charge as of November 1st. Milford; Rev. C. R. Strausburg, pastor, was appointed pastor at First Church, Cumberland, and began work there the 15th of November. Since that date, Milford has been without a Pastor, simply because neither the church nor I could find a satisfactory adjustment. I have cared for the Sunday services since November 15th, by the grace of ministerial kindness and courtesy. Miss Grace Jones, Evangelist-at my earnest solicitation-conducted special services there for three weeks, ending March 14, resulting in about 90 confessions; about 40 have united with the church. The work there is in splendid condition, spiritually and financially, and the salary has been increased \$200.00 for next year. Smyrna: The Seminary student appointed last Conference gave up the work just after Conference. I have appointed Mr. O. F. Betton, another Seminarian from this Conference. He has given faithful and earnst work there during the year. Mt. Tabor: Rev. C. M. Compher, pastor, at his own request was released by the church and by the President, March 1st. And at his request I gave him his transfer to the North Carolina Conference. Since March 1st, I have furnished supply for the Sunday services.

In October K. K. Haddaway, left without appointment at his own request, asked for a Certificate of Standing from his Conference. He requested this, that he might enter the membership of another Denomination. I issued such a certification. He has affiliated with the Congregational Church.

All releases and transfers were made in due order under disciplinary requirements. I wish here to thank the Brethren who have so kindly responded to my calls as I have cared for the churches without pastors during the periods of adjustment and time of vacancies.

#### "THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE PROGRAM

It is not easy to make the President's Report a short one. Yet brevity is most desirable, and I shall try to condense as far as possible.

(a) Evangelism, I put this at the beginning of the activities. First things first. Whether it is or not, either in our thinking or our activities, our first business is to sound the evangel. The Conference is trying to foster such a program, not alone through the individual efforts of Pastors, but through a Conference plan whereby it is incumbent on Pastors to give at least two weeks of their time to helping their brethren in evangelistic labors. Sometimes it is through tent meetings, sometimes in the churches. But whether it be through protracted meetings, simultaneous campaigns of personal evangelism, or the individual touch—this is the work of the churches and the preachers.

### The Committee on Evangelism will Duly Report

The number of conversions reported to me total about 2500.

Nine charges indicate more than 50 each. Charges indicating 50 or more each, are as follows: Taylor Memorial, Snow Hill, Laurel Circuit, Grace, St. Michaels, Amelia, Hampden, and St. Johns, and Starr.

Fifteen charges indicate between 25 and 50 each. Charges indicating between 25 and 50 are as follows: Franklin City, North Carolina Avenue, St. Pauls, Crisfield, Mt. Nebo, Nichols Memorial, First Church, Newark; Lowe Memorial, Easton, Susquehanna, South Baltimore, Peninsula, Christ Church, Trinity Baltimore; and Salisbury.

An ingathering into the church is the natural result to be expected from all efforts of evangelism. Not all who make confession are always gotten into the church. But thus our efforts should be directed.

The total number of accessions reported on the district is above 2400. The following churches report new members to the number of 50 or more: Taylor Memorial, Edmondson Avenue, Starr, Grace, North Baltimore, St. John's, Trinity, Baltimore; Snow Hill, Rhode Island Ave., Salisbury.

Sixteen churches indicate between 25 and 50 new members. The charges showing between 25 and 50 each are as follows; North Carolina Avenue, St. Paul's, Marley, Laurel Circuit, First Church, Newark; Lowe Memorial, St. Michaels, Hampden, Westminster, Amelia, Linthicum Heights, Easton, Susquehanna, Peninsula, Christ Church, Allnut Mem-

morial, Eutaw, Dorchester, Evergreen, West Baltimore.

(b) Stewardship and Tithing. I believe in the constructive development of Christian life and in the progressive advance of the Church, that the next business of Pastors and Churches, after the evangel is sounded and life has responded and become a part in and of the church, we are to teach the Stewardship of Life and Resources. We are working as a Conference, along these lines. I believe the Committee on Stewardship and Tithing has laid good foundations for future results. It is not a work that can fully mature in a year or several years. We

must ever keep at the process of information and education. It is one of the most important things we are trying to do in this Conference. It is indissolubly linked with the fruits of the christian life. The committee will report on its plans and results.

Last year, 90 charges reported 927 thithers secured; (100 charges

reporting an enrollment of over 1300).

This year, 30 charges report securing 154 new tithers. Our Tither's

Roll should show about 1500.

This continuing special committee, is (c) Survey and Extension: one of the most important committees in the Conference. powers are largely advisory, its cumulative experience is proving and will continue to prove most helpful in the work relative to building new churches, parsonages, relocations, etc. Its work of advising the Conference as to regrouping, must necessarily be more limited each year, but none the less beneficial. This year, the Board has passed on the following: Location and Plans for a new parsonage at Arundel Cove, Marley Charge. Location and plans for a new Mt. Carmel Church, Plans for the following churches: Edmondson on Howard Charge. Avenue, Baltimore; Trinity, Baltimore, Maryland; Trinity, Marion, Maryland; and Glenburnie, Maryland. The question of plans for a new church at Maryland Line, New Market Circuit, is engaging the attention of the Board at this time. One new charge, and six adjustments are in effect this year from the Board's recommendation last Conference, and through the careful work of this Board and the attention of the President, the question of supplemental salaries is becoming less a matter of concern.

It is not amiss to suggest to the Conference that once again we all read the regulation in the Conference Manual, that calls attention to the place and part this Board is created to fill. "See Regulation 1.

Section 12, under "Duties of Pastors."

(d) The Headquarters Committee: The final report of the committee will be before the Conference, and the committee will ask to be discharged. The financing of the enterprise has been completed in such a way that, with the building fully rented, there will be no pressure on the Trustees in assuming control of and managing the same. It is the Maryland Conference Building, of which we all are proud,—and there is in its realization as an achievment, "glory enough for all." A five story building located at the corner of Charles and Hamilton Streets, Baltimore, Maryland, with a conservative value of \$225,000.00

#### THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE INSTITUTIONS

(a) The Church Extension Society. This Society, through its Board of Managers, is doing business in a bigger way than ever before: It is utilizing its total of assets and the intangible asset of the Conference, that moral strength that lies in the unity and loyalty of the whole Conference to the program of its leadership, to give encouragement and impulse and financial backing to our new enterprises. This is the right soit of a program for the Extension Society. It will make possible

the building of churches that otherwise can never be built. May I just note here that it is this sort of program that helped make possible Hampden Church, has made possible this year Edmondson Avenue Church, and the Sunday School Unit of Trinity, Baltimore. And still—other enterprises might be mentioned.

May I say that I know the significance of my above statements, when I recall that I was able, personally, to secure for the Board, two loans for \$5,000.00 each, simply on my presentation of what the Society was and what was back of it. Loans with no endorsement, only the notes of the Society. Indeed, the intangible asset of the Conference is as great as its tangible assets. Let us thank God and take courage.

(b) The Superannuated Fund Society. This is simply a holding body. And all of us know its purpose and its working without further comment. To its Treasurer, Mr. T. A. Murray, an honored layman of the church, its work is a sacred task. We owe much to his painstaking fidelity to this Fund through the years.

But the thing that is of special concern this day, in connection with this Society, is the Unpaid Balance from the Campaign Pledges of three years ago. By this day, all these pledges were supposed to have Out of the total subscribed, there has been paid to date I called special attention to the situation as it existed a year ago, Conference took special action relative thereto; following that action, the special committee and the President worked together; special literature was prepared and sent to the pastors; I called special attention to the fact that May was the month designated by the Conference for a clean-up campaign on these unpaid pledges, did this both by personal letters to the pastors and articles in the Church Paper. No Pastor of this Conference can say that this office did not keep the matter before him. I sent a Special Questionaire on the matter in July, some have not yet been returned. Lamentable as it may seem, out of the Annual Report I asked for in March, many pastors replied on my questions about the Superannuated Fund Pledges "I do not know anything about it." Others made no reply; while the approximated noncollectable amounts totaled about \$8,000.00.

It was unfortunate that Conference, last session, set aside the month of May for two special campaigns—to close up this Superannuated Fund subscription, and also to open the churches to the College Endowment Campaign. In some places, the latter interfered with the former. In other places, it became the excuse to let the former drag along. This present Conference ought to do one of two things,—either close up the Campaign and acknowledge a shrinkage of twenty-five to thirty thousand dollars; an almost unthinkable thing. Or else pass such legislation as will make this a job no Pastor or Church can further neglect without being in disrepute in this Conference.

(c) The Home for the Aged: It was my privilege to attend the meeting of the Board in March. The report of the Managers and Lady Superintendents was most encouraging. The Home is in better situation, financially, to-day, than ever in its history. This is possible because of

the \$10,000.00 added to the Invested Fund by the Conference Campaign last year. The total invested fund is now \$36,382. There is a small current indebted of about \$2,500.00. The Board adopted a plan whereby this indebtedness, and accumulation of several years, will soon be cancelled, while the invested fund will be held intact in accordance with Conference understanding when it made the Campaign for \$10,000.00. The Home is filled to capacity, and there is a waiting list. The resident members of the Board of Managers and Superintendents deserve our appreciation. Mr. J. Pearre Wantz, Treasurer, is specially to be commended for his careful attention to the Home Finances.

(d) The Deaconess Home: I will not anticipate the report of the Board of Managers. I understand that all current expenses have been met this year, and that the \$500.00 indebtedness of the Home will be paid. I do not know what the recommendations of the Board will be, nor yet of the Special Committee raised and continued to study the question. My own conviction is that the same problems that faced the work as reported by the Special Committee last year, and indeed have faced it for the years, still face it,—only further intensified by the experience of another year. We ought to be ready to face the situation and deal justly by it—justly with those who are in the service, and in justice to the Conference as a whole. Let us approach the situation carefully and think it through slowly and dispose of it fairly.

#### SPECIAL ATTENTION

Is called once more to the Summer Conference and the Young Peoples' Institute. These have become institutions within themselves. This Conference contributes to both in Talent, Leadership, Service, and indirectly in a financial way. I believe that for us as Ministers, the Summer Conference meets a great need, spiritually, mentally and in fellowship. The Executive Committee and the Presidents of the College and Seminary are making it even less expensive this year than ever before to attend. Our Ministers ought to attend. Every man who does attend will go home a better workman than when he came.

So far as the Young Peoples' Institute is concerned, our Pastors should keep it before their people and whole-heartedly support it. My own feeling is that a weeding-out process is needed in the Institute attendance. There is needed more than the great attendance that is always there, more of a certain kind of attendance—an attendance of young people. I believe that the Officers, through the Pastors, should concentrate along this line. Better 200 young people that we need to reach for training, than 400 people of all ages. I say this not in a critical spirit, but to be true to the idea, it seems to me, of such an Institute.

# SOCIETIES CO-RELATED TO THE CHURCH

The Bible and Tract Society, the Lord's Day Alliance, and the Anti-Saloon League continue to claim our attention and ask for our support. The Conference has long stood for support of these organizations, but the form of adherence and support is largely a matter for the thinking and action of the individual pastors together with the churches we serve. I took occasion, last year in my report, to say this: "You know their work, their personnel, their fields. We may not always agree with their methods, nor feel sympathetic to their leadership, but that should not make us indifferent to the things that need to be done, and for which these agencies are organized.

However, I do feel to say this with relation to the Anti-Saloon League, We think of this organization as "the Church in action against the Saloon." The saloon is an outlaw by constitutional amendment. The church is no longer in action against the saloon. The business of the Church is along these lines, to uphold the dignity of the Law, to create a respect for law, to inculcate obedience to the law. I wish the Anti-Saloon League more and more would give itself to a program of information and education, that would give an undisputed place of leadership to itself as an agency of moral upbuilding. Not the old place of negations, of ward politics, of invective, but a new sphere of positives that would beget a fresh atmosphere for itself and engender a moral tonic that would be a stimulus for a modern crusade in the appreciation of and contribution to LAW ENFORCEMENT.

# FINANCIAL REPORTS ON LOCAL WORK

(a) Raised and Paid on Building and Improvements: The total amount made known to me on the Questionaire approximates: \$119,000.00. The outstanding results are: Trinity, Maryland, on new Church, \$18,000. Trinity, Baltimore, on new Sunday School Unit, \$8,000.; Edmondson Avenue, on new Church, (by local congregation) \$6,000.; Newark, \$5,121.; Taylor Memorial, on new Pipe Organ, being installed, \$4,000.; Mariners, on remodeling Church, \$4,368; Brooklyn, for new Pipe Organ, \$4,500.; the following churches on General Improvements and Building; Harpers Ferry \$2,775.; Seaford, \$1,000.; Marley, on new Parsonage, \$2,075.; Chestertown, \$1100.; Mardela, \$1000.; Union, \$1032.; East Baltimore, \$1000.; Alnutt Memorial, \$1,300.; North Baltimore, \$1000.; Finksburg, \$1,500.; Lowe Memorial, \$2000.; Cambridge, on new Pipe Organ, \$2100.; St. James \$1000.; Sharptown, \$1450.; Bedford, on new Parsonage, \$2,000.; Tioga Heights, \$1275.; Payson Street \$1000.; Hurlock, \$1032.; Fawn Grove, \$1250.; Dagsboro, \$2300.; Glenburnie \$3000. charges total \$82,181.00.

The Edmondson Avenue Church, Baltimore, was opened Sunday, January 17, 1926. The total cost of ground and building is \$55,000.00. A substantial and attractive building of Falls Road Granite. Two stories. Complete in its furnishings, with a seating capacity in Auditorium of 350.

While begun and fostered by the Extension Society, the local congregation has responded splendidly. The promise of a large membership and constituency in the near future is most helpful. 75 new members have been added this year. The Sunday School enrollment is 250.

The officials have made their Budget, every member canvass, with fine results. This year the church will take an increase of \$800 in salary, which was otherwise provided last year.

Trinity Church, Marion, Maryland, was destroyed by fire a year and a half ago. The new Trinity church was dedicated by the President, on Sunday, March 28, 1926. This is a two story church of Tapestry Brick, Colonial architecture, complete in its furnishings, with a seating capacity of 250. Simplicity and Dignity are combined in both the interior and the exterior appearance. The total cost approximates \$24,000. \$18,000 was pledged and most of it paid at the opening. On the day of the dedication I was able to secure subscriptions totalling \$5,500.00.

Pastors, J. Leas Green, and J. W. Baxley, respectively of the above churches deserve special commendation.

(b) Total amount paid on debt \$83,000.00, Salisbury leads with \$32,500.; Hampden, \$12,140.; Emanuel, \$5,500.; Starr, \$3000.; Peninsula, \$2750.; St. Lukes, \$2000.; Violetville, \$2000.; St. John's, \$1350.; Greenbush and Tasley, \$2000.; Grace, \$1145.; South Baltimore, \$1133.; Bethesda, \$1260.; Eutaw, \$1000.; Rhode Island Ave., \$1500.; Finksburg, \$1050. These are all having paid above \$1000. These fifteen charges total \$70,328.00.

#### SUPPLEMENTAL SALARIES

I reported to you, at last Conference that there were still 30 Charges, with parsonages, below the minimum salary. On my recommendation, two were grouped to be served by one Pastor,—thus eliminating any supplement there.

The re-adjustment of Lisbon and Kemptown charges and the forming of the new Ridgeville Circuit therefrom, made necessary that both Lisbon and Kemptown, as they now consist, should receive supplements. The new Circuit, Ridgeville, on my solicitation at their first Quarterly Conference placed the salary at \$1200.

In making the plan of appointments during the past three years, I have tried so far as possible to keep in mind the question of Supplemental Salaries; in addition, I have tried wherever possible to bring these below-minimum salaries up. Some success has been made. At the Conference three years ago, the total paid in Supplemental Salaries was \$6,830. This year, the total will be about \$4500. A reduction of \$2300 in three years. This policy continued will further decrease the matter of supplements.

I recommended last year, that the Board of Survey designate at that session the amount of Supplemental Salaries for the several charges, after a study of the situation. There was not time or data available to the Board for such report by them. Perhaps the Board can do something along this line this year—certainly there is a question of equitableness involved, beside the necessity of certain charges doing what they are able to do.

#### PASTOR'S SALARIES

My report last year showed that from the adjourment of Conference in 1923 to the opening of the session last year, the total salary increase had been \$19,855. During last session in making the plan of appointments, I secured a further increase of \$1625.00; just after Conference, a further increase of \$530 totalling \$2,155.00; making a grand total of \$22,000.00. And the increases for the coming year show the added amount of \$5,570. This shows an increase in salaries during my administration of \$36,570.00. I am glad for this. Indeed, except for the great increase during the war period, 1917-1920, under the spur of living conditions and the great impulse of the Milliom Dollar Awakening, the increase of these three years, far surpass any period in our history, and it is comparable even to the war-time increase. To have contributed something to this accomplishment has been a pleasure to me.

I wish to say here that this good work must go on. Certainly go on till at least our Churches equal in members and resources with the neighboring churches of other Methodisms, shall be paying salaries commensurate with these churches. It is interesting to note that we have only two churches paying more than \$3000. salary. Only four churches that pay \$3000. One with a salary of \$2700.00. There are two churches with a salary of \$2600.00. One with a salary of \$2500.00. Two with salaries of \$2400.00; and eleven churches paying between \$2100.00 and \$2300.00. This means that beyond the salary of \$2000 there are just twenty-three churches in our Conference thus doing, with only six of that number reaching \$3000. But we are moving forward along this line, and we ought to—and we will.

#### "THE CHURCH PAPER"

I have undertaken to lend my administration to a full and practical support of the "Methodist Protestant." I think it is the first administration that has undertaken to inaugurate and continue yearly a simultaneous Conference-Wide Campaign for new subscribers and renewals. The last two years in such effort, made possible the securing of 1100 subscribers; this year the reports indicate, though not complete, 260 new subscribers, with 1000 renewals. The result of the three years shows more than 1300 new subscriptions, with possibly a total average yearly renewals of more than 800.

I believe this policy of a Conference-Wide Campaign for the paper, should be continued. But also, I think the time has come for an added program to what has been done, and may continue to be done—this—someone to directly represent the paper, should go out on the district during the year, visit the churches—with the "Methodist Protestant" as his sole business, and in these visitations, to proclaim the gospel of a Church Paper for Church People, the "Methodist Protestant" for Methodist Protestants. Pastors have many interests to keep on their heart and in their mind and to bring before their people. Such a representative as I have suggested, would have the one thing on hand and the one thing to do. I suggest that the Directory consider this.

# "Our Denominational Benevolences" AS REPRESENTED BY THE GENERAL CONFERENCE BUDGET

I think this Conference will bear witness that I have been both insistent on, and persistent for these benevolences. From the time I came into this office until this day, I have sought from the pulpits, at Quarterly Conferences, and in Membership and Group Meetings to set forth the meaning of and the imperious challenge of the Budget. Perhaps, some Pastors and some Churches have felt that I was putting undue emphasis here. Brethren, I have no apology to make for my constant attitude that the Whole Budget had the right of way.

It is a matter of regret, and indeed ought to be a matter of much concern, that not all pastors and Churches have yet taken to heart, this big business of the Denomination. In the report of last year, I said this: "It seems to me that the time has come when the Conference should define the relation of the pastor and church to these denominational interests and the measure of responsibility for both Pastor

and Church to the same." This time is here.

But it is likewise true, and this is heartening, that the results are expanding. Steadily, pastor and people are answering the challenge. We must fight it out along this line, no matter how long it takes. So long as the Methodist Protestant Church is, so long must we see to it that she justifies herelf in relation to our responsibilities.

Not all reports are in,-but this is the information, and I give

it for the three years:

Total number of charges above 50 per cent, 1924, 76; 1925, 86; 1926, 95.

Total number of charges above 75 per cent. 1924, 41; 1925, 53; 1926, 65.

Total number of charges reaching 100 per cent, 1924, 29 Charges and 2 Churches; 1925, 41 Charges and 9 Churches; 1926, 50 Charges and 12 Churches.

Charges on the "Honor Roll," last year, dropped out this year: Trinity, Baltimore; Texas, Caroline, West Wilmington, and Congress Street.

Charges on the "Honor Roll" this year for the first time: Salisbury; Sharptown; Snow Hill; Susquehanna; Hurlock; Laurel; Kent Island; Laurel Circuit; Grace; Lauraville; Dorchester; and Parksley and Alnutt Memorial back again after one year.

These Churches are on the "Honor Roll" for the first time. Union Church, served by the Salisbury Pastor; Quinton Church, served by Pastor of Pocomoke City; and Fawn Grove Church of the Fawn Grove Charge.

Most of the Charges and Churches made great gains in percentage in order to reach 100 per cent—Laurel Circuit increased 81 per cent; Snow Hill increased 62 per cent; Dorchester 44 per cent and Sharptown and Susquehanna each 42 per cent; Grace 57 per cent; and Hurlock 26 per cent.

What the total of monies raised for General Interests will be, I cannot tell. In 1924 it was \$60.196., a gain of \$6,033.; in 1925 it was \$64,995., a gain of \$4,799. I am hoping this year it will reach \$75,000.

I am very frank to say that I am proud of this record on the Budget in my three years as President. For I bid you remember that during his three years, there has been paid in \$62,000.00 on the Superannuated Pledges; \$10,250.00 to the Church Home Invested Fund; a total of \$72,250; in addition to the General Conference Budget. A Grand Total of \$270,000. An annual average for each of the three years of \$90,000.00.

This is worth keeping in mind: the total monies raised for the Annual and General Conference interests in the three years now ending, is above \$370,000.00. The only other comparison in the history of the Conference is the total raised when the Million Dollar Drive went through; the total for the Annual Conference and General interests at that time for the three years was \$285,615.00. Our present total is in excess by nearly \$100,00.00. What the years hath wrought. Let us be glad, but humble; thankful, and with hearts to praise.

And yet this is not all, for we must remember that this year marked the great drive of the Western Maryland College for the endowment. To be able to increase the number of charges on the "Honor Roll" each year, and increase the total of monies for these Denominational Interests as much as \$15,000.00 during the three years, in the face of the collections for the Superannuated Fund, Church Home, and the great pressure this year for the College Campaign, I think is no mean accomplishment.

### "THE COLLEGE ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN"

I am in no sense, proposing to report on this. The Campaign was put on by the College Committee. I am in no way related to it. But I have been interested, as President of the Conference, to satisfy my own mind as to how far the Church Membership and constituency of this Conference contributed to the success of the program. My information is not complete, but as far as it goes, it is illuminating. It is this: that Conference has pledged to this cause, at the least figure, the sum of \$160,000.00. I wish it were possible that, as a Conference, we might have for record, the exact figures, as the incomplete figures show that at least \$50,000 has been paid in this year. Add to that the \$25,000. which the Board of Education has pledged to the Campaign, and we have the fact, even though not complete, that the Church is putting nearly \$200,000.00 into the College Endowment.

I am especially glad to make known these figures, for it sometimes is said that the church does not do much for the college. I have also gathered this further information, that the Denomination, since the year 1919, to May 1925 has turned over to Western Maryland College, through the Board of Education, the sum of \$90,000.00.

Let it be said that all may hear and know—that what Western Maryland College is, the Methodist Protestant Church, and the Maryland Conference in particular, made it. She is the child of the Church, and the Church is still mothering her. We are all glad for the success of the Campaign, and congratulate all who helped make it possible; and our only concern is,—that our college shall serve the young life of the Church.

#### "VISITATIONS"

The usual program of the office has been carried on during the year. Aside from the months vacation when I was out of the city, I have preached on an average of twice a Sunday. Held more than 25 Quarterly Conferences, and about one dozen Membership Meetings. There has been no effort to keep record of Committee Meetings, Special Addresses, and numerous Conferences.

On the resignation of Dr. J. M. Sheridan from the office of Church Extension Superintendent last October, to accept the Secretaryship of the Board of Home Missions, I deemed it wise not to make an appointment to that office for the remainder of the year. I requested Mr. T. A. Myers, and Dr. W. H. Litsinger, members of the Board of Managers of the Extension Society, to act with me as a Committee on Supervision for the work. I have given not a little time and thought, and I think some service, to this phase of work.

All in all, I can unhesitatingly, say, I have spared neither time nor money, nor myself, to give supervision to the district, and faithfully uphold the interests of both the Annual and the General Confer-

ences on the charges.

#### SPECIAL GIFTS

I make mention of the fact that the Church at Harrington, Deleware, in March was damaged by fire to the extent of more than \$3,000.00.

When the officials met and were ready to make plans for repairing the damage done, Mrs. Elva Smith Sapp, widow of Ora C. Sapp, and daughter of Robert Henry Smith, made offer to furnish funds to build a new Sunday School to the present building, to cost approximately \$20,000.00. Needless to say the generous offer was accepted with gladness and rejoicing. The work will begin immediately after Conference.

Sure there are many and constantly increasing evidences of the spirit of generosity on the part of the men and women of our Churches over

the Maryland Conference District.

May the Holy Spirit more and more brood over the hearts of our people begetting a wider vision and greater consecration of life and talents to the King.

I would not forget to mention the fact that a generous hearted layman of the Methodist Episcopal Church whose home was here in Wilmington and who died some months ago left a bequest of \$5,000.00 to the Peninsula Church. This Brother was the late Mr. Melville Gambrill.

Mr. N. T. Meginnis, whose death I mentioned earlier in my report, made provision in his will for the Seminary to the amount of \$2,000.

### "COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

I have just a few comments to make as the result of my observations. Made only because of my sincere interest in the continued progress of my Conference Though, so to speak, I am not to the manor-born, yet I practically know no church but the Methodist Protestant; and I am not willing to take second place to anyone in my devotion to and interest in this church. I shall always keep as a great memory the honor given me when by your suffrage you xpressed your confidence in me by electing me to this office. One of the charms about this democracy of ours is that not age, heredity, personal associations or labor, is to count in the final reckoning in our choices. It will always be a charm as long as it stays thus, and when it is not thus, ours will scarcely be a democracy.

Last year, I closed my report with some observations which I wish again to reiterate, and follow them with some recommendations that I believe you will not regard as startling, but rather as necessary.

I feel sure they will commend themselves to your judgement.

(a) Visitation and Correlation. That the intensive idea I spoke of last year may best be realized, the President must have the definite co-operation of the pastors. No effective supervision can so scarcely be attained as through this correlation of the President's itinerary with the business of the churches. More and more we are going to see the purport of "Section 13, Regulation 2,"—"Duties of President"—carried out. No man who occupies this office can but feel that effectiveness in supervision is far from Sunday visitation to pulpits.

Recommendation 1. That pastors, in arranging for their regular Quarterly Conferences, shall give the President of the Conference, at least two weeks advance notice of date of such meeting, so that the President may be aided in so arranging his itinerary as to meet the most Quarterly Conference Sessions possible during the year.

This recommendation, if adopted, to be in the form of an amendment to the Manuel, to be "Section 15, Regulation 1,—Duties of Pastors."

(b) I found it almost impossible this year to put into active working, in any conference-wide manner, my own suggestion made last session looking to Studies in Methods by Groups. Impossible for many reasons—the pressure of many things, not alone on me, but on Pastors and Churches also in the effort to carry out our many programs. But I am no less interested in the idea, no less committed to its need and possibilities. I have thought that we might save time, the use of those whom we feel needful to call upon to teach, and likewise the extra gathering of our men together, especially in the counties of the district. I therefore,

Recommendation 2. That the President of the Conference give further attention to this idea and plan for such Method Studies; and that he request the Young People's Union, in arranging for their Institutes over the district to join with him in a Program for,—Conferences of Pastors on Methods of Church Organization, Finance, Practical Plans, etc.," same to be under the direction of the President.

(c) Intensifying Conference Program. Let us again face the fact that Conference Programs depend for success, not upon their author, nor the enthusiasm out of which they may be born, nor yet upon their worth alone, but largely upon the co-operation of Pastors and the manner which they can and will rally their people. The connectionalism in a Methodist Protestant Conference finds its strength right here and mostly here.

The very local entity and authority of the individual church, with the power residing in the people, both creates the opportunities for the Pastor to be a crusader for the ideals and aims of the denomination, and the necessity of his being just such a leader, if we shall really

function as a Church.

This, perhaps, as in no other Methodism, confers on every Pastor a great privilege and likewise ties him to a great responsibility. I believe as Pastors, we ought to give greater attention to the obligations inherent in the Annual and General Conference Legislation. I therefore,

Recommend 3. That Pastors and Churches be requested to give due consideration to the very evident fact that the Annual and General Conference Programs as duly adopted by each, have precedence over all other interests, however attractive and worthy, that may challenge or claim our attention. And that Pastors are directed to keep this fact before their churches.

(d) Conference Honor Roll. Such a Roll we have had for many years, Such a Roll we ought to have. Before the greatly enlarged program and increased Budget came into existence at the General Conference of 1920, our "Honor Roll" had to do alone with the Annual Conference Interests. Since then it has borne equal relation to both the Annual and General Conference Budgets. It was right that we so decided at our Annual Session in 1921, and made the condition of any charge being 100 per cent charge that both Budgets be raised in full. In no other way, could we have been loyal to the General Conference Action and faithful to the wider vision that had been born in the Church.

But we must bear in mind, that for years we had been honoring charges that paid in full the Annual Conference Budget, thus fostering a respect for the significance of the "Honor Roll" and paying tribute where tribute was due. After 1821, many charges accustomed to being on the "Honor Roll" knew it no more for a while, year by year these Churches are coming back unto their own.

Now that the "Honor Roll" for both Budgets has had its emphasis, there is another thing we must carefully consider and take action, in fairness to the situation that exists.

It is this,—under the existing condition that permits a church to take credit on the Budget for all monies raised,—no matter how much goes to one interest, or how little goes to another, there is presented an inequity that does great injustice to some of the interests in the General Conference Budget.

How can we, as an Annual Conference, help to correct this? Only in one way, this: that we say that a church shall have credit on the General Conference Budget, namely; only if every interest in the

General Conference Budget shall receive the percentage that is due that interest. Now, that is exactly what we say about the Annual Conference Budget. For example,—A Church is assessed \$500.00 for the Maryland Conference Budget, that Church is not declared to be a 100 per cent Church unless that Budget is paid in full; thus, every interest embodied in that Budget gets the percentage due it, or, if the Budget is not paid in full by a church, every interest suffers equally in the shortage.

Ought not we say the same thing to our churches, as to their credits, for raising the General Conference Budget? In other words, the Annual Conference has a right, and I think an obligation, in fairness, not alone to the great interests embodied in that Budget, but to the 285 Churches in our Conference, to say that we shall give credit toward 100 per cent on the Budget just as we do towards a 100 per cent credit on our Annual Conference Budget—that is in proportion as a Church reaches toward paying the amount that each particular interest is due to receive. Therefore:

Recommendation 4. That the Board of Finance prepare and publish in the Conference Minutes, a Table showing the amount of money, for each Denominational Interest that is represented in the percentage in the General Conference Budget, as levied by the Annual Conference on the charges.

Recommendation 5. That the "Honor Roll" for the charges in this Conference, with relation to the Annual and General Conference Budgets be basically the same with reference to the interests involved in each and be thus.

(a) The raising in full of the Annual Conference Budget; likewise the General Conference Budget; but that the raising in full of this latter Budget now means;—that a charge shall have credit for the monies raised for the several interests therein, only to the amount that represents the per centum that each interest is entitled to have in the total of the Budget as levied on this Conference. (Namely \$110,000.00).

(b) That any charge raising the General Conference Budget on this basis of every interest receiving its due share, and shall in addition thereto raise monies for any interest above its due per centum, said charge shall be credited with such extra monies raised, and be placed on the "Honor Roll" as a "Gold Star Charge."

Recommendation 6. The "Honor Roll" shall be composed as follows: Class A—The names of Charges and Pastors who raise 100 per cent of the Budget.

Class B—The names of Charges who shall raise 100 per cent of the Annual Conference Budget, and 80 per cent of the General Conference Budget.

Class C—The names of Charges who shall raise 100 per cent of the Annual Conference Budget and 60 per cent of the General Conference Budget.

I believe that just as we give credit and honorable mention to the Charges and Pastors with relation to this Budget which is the measure of our aims and purposes, as a Conference and Denomination, so

ought we call attention to the Charges and Pastors who are not doing these things. Therefore:

Recommendation 7. Roll of Delinquent Charges. Composed as

follows:

Class A-Charges and Pastors failing to raise the Annual Conference

Budget in full, and 40 per cent of the General Conference Budget.

Class B—Charges and Pastors failing to raise the Annual Conference

Budget in full and 30 per cent of the General Conference Budget.

Class C—Charges failing to raise the Annual Conference Budget in full

and 20 per cent of the General Conference Budget.

And any Charge and Pastor being below "Class C" in the Roll of Delinquent Charges, said Pastor together with his delegate, shall appear before the President and the Committee on Official Relations, that a careful study of the causes for such delinquency may be made with a view to counsel and help for the Pastor and the Charge.

Recommendation 8. That the "Honor Roll" and "Delinquent Roll" shall be read in Open Conference, as a partial report of the Committee on Official Relations, at the opening of the afternoon session of Monday; said "Rolls" to be printed in the Conferences Minutes with a percentage rating in the Statistical Columns; and said Rolls to be published in the "Methodist Protestant" within twenty days (20) of Conference adjournment.

And any Charge raising the Annual Conference Budget in full, and increasing 25 per cent on the General Conference Budget over the previous year shall have Special Mention before the Conference, and be so noted in the published reports, with name of Pastor.

#### "THE CENTENARY CHURCH"

In my review of the situation in Washington City, last year, I made an appeal for the building of a Church in that city, to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the Denomination. That appeal found a response in the thinking of the Conference. Careful consideration of the project must commend itself more and more to the wisdom of all interested in the stability of our work in that city, and in the national aspect of our Denominational Life and History.

On my recommendation you wholeheartedly, committed this Conference to a definite program and delegated that program to the Board of Survey and the President, and upon their doing certain work. You further directed the Church Extension Board of Managers and the

Church Extension Superintendent to carry it on.

I wish to make this report: The President, and the sub-committee of the Board of Survey, have thought much of the things to be done. We wish to see it done. Locations have been gone over several times. At least three great locations right now are ready for a Church. The problem is not location, or opportunity, or a desperate need from the view point of our work in Washington—the problem is money.

During this year, for several months, I had hopes that the problem of money and a nucleus of constituency to begin a church was about to

be solved. The Mother Church of that city, (Congress Street) voluntarily began considering the question of re-location. After several months, it was decided to continue on at the present site. I made no effort to put any pressure on them to re-locate, I said then, I unhesitatingly say now, "Congress Street ought to re-locate." Their problem as a local Church, our problem for a new Church, both could have been solved by such a move. To me, it seems such a great opportunity for this old Mother Church in Washington to perpetuate her splendid history in the Conference Centenary Church in the Capitol City. Maybe it yet may come to pass. But whether it does or not we must go on with the program.

But how can we? Well, how do we do all other things? Only in this way, by getting the money to do them. We got the money for the Peninsula Church; we are completeing a \$100,000.00 drive for the Superannuated Fund. We opened our Churches to the College Endowment Appeal, and a great sum has been subscribed. We can find this money in the same way. There is an appeal that is strong, and not to be denied in memoralizing a century of history both as a Denomination and a Conference. I believe that every Methodist Protestant in the Conference would be glad to put some investment in such a memorial. I believe there are Methodist Protestants throughout our whole area, as a church, that will be glad to help us mark our One Hundred Years of History.

I propose that we give our own constituency, and also our Brothers and Sisters in all the other Conferences, the chance to have a part in such a fitting commemoration of our Centenary. Therefore:

Recommendation 9. That the Conference re-affirm Recommendation 1. (a, b, c, d, e, f) in the President's Report of last year; and I further recommend the following:

Recommendation 10. That this Conference set itself the task of raising \$100,000.00 over a period of three (3) years:

- a.—That we ask each Charge to take as its task an amount equal to the amount assessed for the Maryland Conference Budget; this amount to be its minimum goal each year for three (3) years.
- b.—That Pastors be expected to faithfully present this Program in the Churches and to their people, and seek to reach the Goal for their Charge. That the President be authorized and requested to help the Program wherever he can be of service to the Pastors.
- c.—That the President of the Conference be asked to present the matter to the President of the General Conference and secure his advice and approval as to how to present the matter to the whole Denomination.
- d.—That a Conference-Wide Committee of One Hundred (100) Lay Members of the Church, carefully selected, with a view to the geographical situation of the district, be named by the President, to be known as the "Centenary Committee," which Committee shall be made familiar with the proposed Program, and under the direction of the President shall be asked to stimulate the raising of the \$100,000.00 "Centenary Fund."

e.—That the aim in the mind of the Conference shall be the Financing of this project, and the erection of this Building, so that the 100th Session of the Maryland Annual Conference might be held in the proposed new "Centenary Church."

Believing that we ought to continue as a Conference-Wide program, the presentation of the "Methodist Protestant" to our people, therefore:

Recommendation 11. That the first two weeks in March be the time to be used for such presentation of the Church Paper as may seem wise to the President of the Conference, and the Editor and Publisher. The Goals for such a Campaign, to be determined by them, and announced.

And now, Brethren; my report is with you. I can only say that I have herein tried to cite as accurately as possible the State of the Church, and to bring to you only such Recommendations as I conscientiously believe will work for the advancement of all our interests, both locally and denominationally. I trust these Recommendations will commend themselves to your wisdom, and enlist in earnest, your support.

Once again I express to you my appreciation of the honor given me when you called me to this office three years ago. At each session as the Stationing Committee, in making the plan of appointments, one thing I sought faithfully to do, and that was to go as far as was humanly possible, physically, and mentally, to give all consideration I could to the men who looked to me for their place. This satisfaction I will always have through the years.

And then, in my work of Supervision, to try and challenge the Churches for results. I am willing to leave to your judgement the "State of the Church."

With trepidation I answered your call; with sincerity I have tried to serve; with only the best wishes for my successor and my prayers for my Conference, I am,

#### REPORT OF THE

# COMMITTEE ON PRESIDENT'S REPORT

(See Journal, page 37)

Your committee has given careful and detailed attention to the comprehensive report of the retiring president. It is a most excellent summary of the activities of the year.

We rejoice with the president in the privilege of meeting in the Peninsula Church, a church which is peculiarly an ecclesiastical child of Church Extension. Surely these sessions of Conference in this stately edifice will stimulate charges and individual to a greater interest in and a greater loyalty to the work of Church Extension.

We join the president in paying tribute to the ministers, the ministers' wives and the noble laymen and laywomen who have entered the shadows this year.

We commend the wisdom and tact with which the ad interim changes were made. Many complicated and delicae problems arose and have been satisfactorily solved.

We commend the evangelistic emphasis that resulted in more than 2500 conversions and in accessions to membership that approximate the number of conversions.

We are glad to note a substantial increase in the number of tithers, but regret that the total number of tithers enrolled is still so lamentably small.

We note with interest the activities of the Church Extension Society and of the Board of Survey and Extension and endorse the suggestion that Regulation 1, Section 12, Duties of Pastors, Maryland Conference Manual, be emphasized.

The money pledged and paid to the \$100,000 Superannuated Fund gives cause for rejoicing, but this gladness is tinged with regret when we read that \$8,000 has been reported as "uncollectable." We trust that this Conference will make the collecting of this money a task no church nor pastor can further neglect without being disloyal to this great Conference interest.

We are delighted with the splendid condition of The Home for the Aged and commend the wise leadership of the Board of Managers, the Board of Superintendents and the Treasurer.

We heartily agree with the president that the Summer Conference and Young People's Institute at Westminster fill a vital place in our spiritual life and training and deserve the enthulastic backing of our ministers and laymen.

We are gratified at the large amount of money spent for Building and Improvement during the year, the incomplete returns for this year exceeding last year's record by \$18,000.

The steady increase in Pastor's Salary during the past quadrennium is noteworthy and we feel that in many instances it has been due

to the tactful suggestion of the president. We trust that the increases shall continue.

The hearty support given by the retiring administration to "The Methodist Protestant" has contributed no small part to its increased circulation. We trust that some way will be found for an agent to go out to the district during the year to visit the churches with the sole business of securing subcriptions for "The Methodist Protestant."

The increase in the number of charges paying 100 per cent on the General Conference Budget is indeed most heartening. Every pastor and every charge should determine to raise the "Whole Budget" and never be satisfied until it is done.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

#### 1. Visitation and Correlation:

We concur in the recommendation that pastors, in arranging for their regular Quarterly Conferences, shall give the president at least two weeks advance notice of the date of such meetings to aid the president in preparing his itinerary so as to meet with the largest possible number of Quarterly Conferences and that this recommendation be made an amendment to the Manual.

#### 2. Pastoral Methods Study Groups.

We concur in the recommendation that the president of the Conference co-operate with the Young Peoples' Union in utilizing the Institutes for "Conferences of Pastors on Methods of Church Organization, Finance, Practical Plans, etc."

#### 3. Intensifying the Conference Program.

We concur in the recommendation that Pastor and Churches be requested to give consideration to the very evident fact that the Annual and General Conference Programs, as duly adopted by each, have precedence over all other interests and we suggest that Pastors keep this fact before their Churches.

#### 4. Itemized General Conference Budget Tables.

We concur in the recommendation that the Board of Finance prepare and publish in the Conference Minutes statistical tables showing the amount of money for each Denominational Interest that is represented in the percentages in the General Conference Budget as levied by the Annual Conference on the charges. We believe that the printing of these tables will be a stimulus to the charges that have not yet raised the whole budget.

#### 5. Definition of the Honor Roll.

We concur in the recommendation that the Honor Roll for the charges in this Conference shall be basically the same with reference to the interests involved in both the Annual and General Conference Budgets; that it shall consist in raising in full the Annual Conference Budget, likewise the General Conference Budget, but that the raising in full of this latter Budget now means: that a charge shall have

credit for the monies raised for the several interests therein only to the amount that represents the per centum that each interest is entitled to have in the total of the Budge as levied on this Conference.

We concur in the furuther recommendation that any charge raising the General Conference Budget on this basis of every interest receiving its due share, and shall in addition thereto raise monies for any interests above its due per centum, said charge shall be credited with such extra monies raised and be placed on the Honor Roll as a "Gold Star Charge."

We suggest that each Church appoint a local Budget Committee which will assign a definite interest to each member of the committee; the members of this Local Budget Committee will have special oversight of the interests assigned them, work during the year to raise in full the amount of the interests assigned them and make a report to each Quarterly Conference as to the progress made.

#### 6. Classification of Honor Roll Charges.

We concur in the general plan of the classification of Honor Roll Charges recommended but suggest the following classification:

- Class A. The Gold Star Honor Roll—the names of Charges and Pastors who raise 100 per cent of every interest, Annual Conference and General Conference Budgets, plus any excess on any interest.
- Class B. The Honor Roll—the names of Charges and Pastors who raise 100 per cent of every interest of the Maryland and General Conference Budgets.
- Class C. The Honorable Mention Roll—the names of Charges and Pastors who raise 100 per cent of the Maryland Conference Budget and 75 per cent of the General Conference Budget.

#### 7. Roll of Delinquent Charges.

We concur in the recommendation that a Roll of Delinquent Charges be made with three classes, graded as to the amount of money raised as suggested in the president's report, and that the pastor and delegate of any Charge being below Class C, that is, failing to raise the Annual Conference Budget in full and 20 per cent of the General Conference Budget, shall appear before the president and the committee on Official Relations.

We desire to emphasize the fact that it is not the purpose of this recommendation to humiliate any pastor or charge; rather, to make a careful study of the causes of the delinquency with a view to counsel and help for the pastor and the Charge.

#### 8. Publicity for the Honor and Delinquent Rolls.

We concur in the recommendation that the Honor Roll and the Delinquent Roll shall be read in open Conference, as a partial report of the committee on Official Relations, at the opening of the afternoon session of Monday; said Rolls to be printed in the Conference Minutes with a percentage rating in the Statistical columns and that the Honor Roll be published in the Methodist Protestant.

We concur in the further recommendation that any charge raising the Annual Conference Budget in full and increasing 25 per cent on the General Conference Budget over the previous year shall have special mention before the Conference with the name of the pastor.

We do not concur in the recommendation that the Delinquent Roll be published in "The Methodist Protestant."

#### 9, 10. The Centenary Church.

We concur in the reaffirmation of Recommendation 1 of the President's Report made last year.

We concur in the recommendation that this Conference set itself the task of raising \$100,000, over a period of three years, to be applied to the Centenary Church project, asking each Church to take as a minimum goal an amount equal to its assessment for the Maryland Conference Budget for each of three years; that the president of the General Conference be consulted as to the best way to present the matter to the whole denomination and that a Centenary Committee of 100 laymen be selected to stimulate the raising of the \$100,000 Centenary Fund.

We believe that there is such a powerful appeal in the project of a Methodist Protestant Centenary Church in our national Capitol that the money will be obtained without working hardship on any charge or interest.

#### 11. The Methodist Protestant.

We concur in the recommendation that the first two weeks in March be the time for a campaign for New Subscribers and Renewals for "The Methodist Protestant" and urge the fullest co-operation of pastors and Charges.

#### REPORT G

## BOARD OF SURVEY AND EXTENSION

(See Journal, page 35)

We have reviewed with satisfaction the report of the Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society, and the Peninsula Church Extension Society. We submit the herewith and have incoporated in our report such items as were necessary. We regret that the funds of the Confer-

ence are such that no new appropriations for Church enterprises, building or debt could be made.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- (1) That the Board of Finance in making the Assessments give particular consideration to those Charges which are under the care and supervision of the Church Extension Society.
- (2) That suplemental salaries are intended to apply only to the difference of salary pledged by the Charge, and the minimum salary guarantee, and does not apply to the deficit in the amount pledged by the Charge.

(3) That Mapleside and Fairview Charge be divided. That Mapleside be put under the supervision of the Melvin Chapel, and Fairview under the care of the First Church Quarterly Conference, Cumberland.

- (4) That the parsonage at Greensboro be sold and the proceeds applied to the floating indebtedness of the Peninsula Church, Wilmington. Also that the Conference give a hearing to Messrs, F. P. Adkins and M. L. Veasey of the Peninsula Church Extension Society on behalf of the Peninsula Church.
- (5) We have received a paper from the Second Church, Wilmington, concerning a new Church enterprise. We recommend that the First and Second Churches consider the advisability of uniting their properties and resources in a new location.
- (6) We recommend that in order to avoid complications in the holding of property within the State of Pennsylvania, that the Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society take out articles of incorporation within that State.
- (7) That the request of Lewistown Charge for a consideration of the conditions of that Charge be referred to an ad interim meeting of the Board of Survey and Extension.

(8) We do not concur in the request of the Hallwood Church to be placed under the care of the pastoral supply at Parksley.

- (9) That services at Fanny Lowe Memorial Church on St, Michaels Charge be discontinued with the exception of an annual meeting, with a view of ultimately merging the church with Claiborne, to be known as the Fanny Lowe Memorial.
- (10) That Nassawanga Church on Snow Hill Circuit be detached and made a part of the Powellville Charge.
- (11) We recommend that the Church Extension Assessment be \$14,000.

### COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATES

(See Journal, pages 30, 35)

After prayerful consideration of each individual case, your committee on Superannuate claimants has made the fairest distribution possible of available resources, and submits the following for Conference approval:

#### RECOMENDATIONS

- 1. We recommend that the assessment on the district remain the same as last year, \$7.000.00.
- 2. We recommend that Dorsey Blake and T. O. Crouse be at their own request granted superannuated relation. (The request of F. D. Reynolds for superannuated relation has been withdrawn.)

- 3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to borrow a sufficient amount of money, if necessary, to meet in full the appropriation for 1926 and 1927.
- 4. We approve the first paragraph of the Resolution referred in the paper to our Committee as it relates to Superannuates. (See Resolution 4, page 119).
- 5. We recommend that the last two paragraphs in said paper be stricken out, as they are a repetition of the plan under which the Conference is now operating. (See Resolution 4, page 119)
- 6. We recommend that the pro-rata share of each Superannute upon retirement from active service be \$15.00 for each year's service instead of \$10.00 and the widows of our ministers be \$7.50 instead of \$5.00. The plan to go into effect next Conference.

### REPORT I

## COMMITTEE ON LITERATURE AND EDUCATION

(See Journal, page 28)

### I. THE METHODIST PROTESTANT

The following facts concerning our church paper indicate our responsibility and opportunity in promoting its circulation.

a. As a church paper, protesting against ein, championing high ideals and diffusing information concerning denominational principles and activities, it is equal to the best that the country affords.

b. At a time when the secular press is so largely devoted to the publishing of crime and scandal and the advocacy of lawlessness, at a time when most of our current literature—both books and magazines—have forsaken the paths of righteousness and purity, the need of such a paper as The Methodrist Protestant in the homes of our people is imperative.

c. The fact that there are 1,600 more Methodist Protestant homes in the Maryland District that do not get the church paper than there are subscribers to the paper in all the denomination, and the further fact that while during the past year 1,310 new subscribers were secured 1,457 were discontinued, ought to cover us with shame and fill us with the determination that this condition shall not continue.

We recommend that the policy of the publisher to have all subscriptions expire with the Conference year be heartily supported by the pastors and subscribers. We also recommend that the pastors keep the value of the church paper before their people throughout the year and that the month of March be set aside as a time for special emphasis in securing new subscribers and renewals.

We are sincerely grateful that Rev. F. T. Benson, D. D., Editor, after a protracted illness during the summer months has been able to continue his work with his usual vigor and ability. We pray that God may give him strength to serve his church with his splendid powers of heart and mind for years to come.

#### II. SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE

We note with pleasure the continued improved quality of the literature which the Editor, Dr. Johnson, and the publishers are furnishing to our Sunday Schools. We earnestly urge the use of this literature in all our schools.

Inasmuch as many of our schools are of necessity one room schools we recommend that in addition to the departmental opening exercises in the quarterlies there be published a uniform opening exercise.

#### III. PRINTING DEPARTMENT AND BOOK STORE

While it is gratifying to note that in each of these departments there has been a steady increase in the volume of business, we regret that the necessary increase of the overhead has made the profits less than last year. While this is peculiarly true of the book business, the prining business is making most gratifying progress. This state of affairs makes it most imperative that the entire church give more hearty support to these enterprises. And we should not forget that whatever profits are made are turned back into the treasury of the church. We suggest that the management take into consideration the advisability of giving to ministers some discount on their purchases and thus help them to become even more enthusiastic boosters for Methodist Protestant support of Methodist Protestant enterprises.

#### IV. THE SEMINARY

The new home of the President of the Seminary has been completed and is now occupied by Dr. H. L. Elderdice. The total cost of the home including furniture and landscaping was approximately \$25,000. This has all been met with the exception of about \$500.00.

We heartily endorse the recommendation of the Board of Governors as set forth in their report:

1. That H. L. Elderdice be assigned to the Presidency for another year.

2. That pastors instruct laymen as to the needs of the various funds of the Seminary: the Endowment, the Scholarship, the Library; and request them to make donations now or provide for them in their wills,

3. That our churches call upon their young men to consider the claims of the ministry, and urge their young women to investigate the needs of home and foreign fields, and the opportunities for leadreship in local churches and to urge upon all such of both sexes to take advantage of the various courses of study provided by the Seminary.

We are glad for the great work of the Seminary and the splendid leadership of Dr. Elderdice. We pledge to him and the Seminary our

best co-operation.

#### V. THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

We recommend: 1. That pastors put the Secretary of the Board touch with any young men in their congregations who are thinking of entering the ministry.

2. That the second Sunday of December be observed as Men for the Ministry Sunday at which time the pastors shall present the claims

of the Gospel Ministry upon the life of young men.

3. That all churches be urged to observe the second Sunday in October or the nearest Sunday thereto that is convenient as Rally Day.

We call attention to the fact that the Board has loaned to students of the Maryland Conference over \$18,000.00 of which amount only a little over \$2,500 has been paid. Some of these unpaid loans are of long standing and your Committee feels that something ought to be done looking to their adjustment.

We recommend that a committee be raised by this Conference to consider individually the cases of Maryland men and with them and the Secretary of the Board make a settlement or adjustment of the

claims.

#### VI. WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE

Your Committee has read with care and pleasure the report of the President of Western Maryland College. This child of our Conference still continues to grow in strength and influence. In fact, it seems now as if it were full-grown.

The enrollment which totalled 500 for the college year is the largest in its history and taxes to the limit the resources at its command.

Your Committee marvels at the glorious completion of the Endowment Campaign. This is an achievement which thrills us all.

We wish to express our appreciation of Dr. Ward for his vision energy and consecration to this task. We note that he personally assumed \$7,000.00 to insure the successful completion of the campaign. We hope that this condition will be changed in the near future.

We recommend that the churches which have made no response as yet to the appeal attempt to cover at least this amount.

#### VII. BOOKS

Maryland Conference

Dear Brethren:

Greetings in the Master's name! It is a pleasure to communicate to you the salient features of the year's activities of the Board of Education. We regret to inform you that matters have not gone as well with us this year as they did last. In spite of the fact that the orders for the Rally Day programs increased 10%, the returns to date are 10% less than last year. This is not due to a lack of diligence on the part of our pastors, but rather to inclement weather, especially during October. The returns from the Budget are over \$9,000 less than they were last year, which means that the Board has been compelled to greatly circumscribe it sactivities and service. We have endeavored to carry on the work to the limit of economy, but due to the decreased income we have been able to distribute less than 75% of the proposed appropriations to our colleges and seminary. We, of course, hope that the returns another year will be greater and enable us to do the work to which the church has set us apart.

#### OUR SCHOOLS

Three of our schools, including the seminary, are in a very flourishing condition, while three of them are the cause of no little anxiety. If the income from the Budget were \$30,000 instead of \$10,000 our schools would at least break even financially and the burden of our brave presidents would be much less. We congratulate Western Maryland on the successful completion of the campaign for \$375,000 for their endowment. We appreciate, together with President Ward and his co-laborers, the fine co-operation on the part of the brethren in the Maryland district. We are proud of this great school at Westminster and are glad of the splendid work it is doing. Among the 502 students registered this year, there are 133 Methodist Protestants of which are ministerial students. There is also one missionary student. This is close to the average representation in most denominational schools.

To say that the Seminary at Westminster is continuing its great service to our denomination under the splendid leadership of Dr. Elderdice is only repeating what we all know. Our Board has been able to make but little headway toward its pledge of \$15,000 to the new building, but we are keeping up the interest and hope to make payments sufficient to gradually reduce this obligation. There are 38 Methodist Protestant ministerial students in the seminary this year.

#### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

Reports recently received from our schools indicate that these are at least 84 Methodist Protestant young men studying for the ministery of our church. This is slightly under the number reported last year, but is about the average, I believe. The Board is assisting 38 of these young men through its regular Ministerial Loan Fund. That is three more than we helped last year.

In order to stimulate a greater interest in the question of men for the ministry, we undertook a plan last year which seems to have met with approval and a fair response. We set apart the second Sunday in December as a "Men for the Ministry" Sunday. A number of our Conferences approved this plan and urged their pastors to observe it in a suitable manner. We would appreciate a similar action on the part of this Conference, provided it meets with your judgment.

#### STUDENT LOAN

We are helping the same number of students this year as last. Three of the seventeen are in Western Maryland College. But even this number is more than the resources of the Board are able to provide for, and yet these seventeen young people are among the choicest of any in our colleges. Eight of the seventeen are from the homes of some of our pastors. We are hoping that before long some provision can be made that will place this enterprise on a more solid foundation.

#### RALLY DAY

The response to our Rally Day program last year on the part of the brethren of the Maryland Conference was most gratifying. The large number of orders received indicated a spirit of interest and co-operation that was pleasing indeed. We are sorry to report, however, a serious falling off in the returns. This is doubtless due to the campaign for Western Maryland's endowment. However, the decrease in the income of the Board has placed us in a very embarrassing position. We are hoping that the response to the program this year will be more generous than last.

#### MARYLAND BENEFICIARIES

You will find enclosed herewith a list of the Maryland Conference beneficiaries. Of the number submitted, sixteen are at present in college or seminary. Only eight of the others have made payments during the last year, although they have indicated their intention to forward something during this month. To meet our obligations the return payments should amount to at least \$3,500. So far this year they have come to less than \$1,500.

## REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE

Westminster, Maryland, April 1, 1926

To the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church:

I have the honor of submitting my sixth annual report to the Maryland Annual Conference.

The year just closing has been an eventful one in the history of the college. The student enrollment has exceeded the enrollment of any previous year, with a total enrollment of 502 in all departments. To take care of this large enrollment with our present equipment and endowment is a great tax upon the administration.

The outstanding thing in connection with the year was the Financial Campaign, which was brought to a successful conclusion. Subscriptions amounting to \$375,567.32 were secured, but \$7,000 of this amount was assumed by myself in order to meet the conditions of the campaign, I am hopeful that this amount may come in speedily. Because of the action of the Conference, giving the college authority to appeal to the churches on behalf of the campaign, I feel confident that the churches that have not responded will yet do so, and thus enable the college to meet fully the requirements of the situation. \$250,000 of the amount subscribed must be in hand by July 1, 1927, in order to secure the appropriation of \$125,000 from the State of Maryland. \$125,000 of the amount subscribed has already been paid in, leaving \$125,000 still to be paid in by July 1, 1927 to secure the \$125,000 appropriation from the State. We shall then have from July 1, 1927, on to the end of the year 1928 to secure the Rockefeller appropriation of \$125,000.

When the entire amount subscribed has been paid in, we shall then have added to our present resources the \$125,000 building provided by the State and additional endowment to the amount of \$500,000, making total increased resources to the amount of \$625,000. The total endowment of the college will then be over \$800.00.

It is very important that the entire amount subscribed to the campaign shall be paid in by the time specified by the pledges. There is no margin provided for shrinkage. In order to secure the Rockefeller, \$375,000 must be paid in to the Endowment Fund. I wish to call the attention of all friends of the college and of all subscribers to the importance of having all pledges paid in full.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees of the college and all our friends, I wish to express appreciation of fine loyalty of the churches of the Maryland Annual Conference in this campaign. A number of the churches far exceeded their apportionments, and in several churches where no attempt was made to meet an apportionment members of the churches subscribed in excess of the apportionment. The churches that have not subscribed will be asked to help in securing the \$7,000 assumed by the President of the College. I wish to urge all such churches to come to our assistance.

Following the campaign the next step was a revision of our curriculum to meet the modern demands in education. This has been done, and the results appear in the new catalogue just from the press. Through this revision and the strengthening of our faculty, we are planning to do our work in such a way as to meet the highest standards. The future of Western Maryland College seems very bright indeed.

I am including a report on the campaign as it relates to the apportionments to the charges of the Maryland Annual Conference.

### THE WESTMINSTER THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

The Westminster Theological Seminary, for the forty-fourth time, presents its Annual Report to the Maryland Annual Conference. Though this school of the Prophets is the common property of every Annual Conference in the Methodist Protestant Church, yet the Maryland Conference is the cradle of her birth, and she always has a peculiar delight in annually presenting herself to her Mother for inspection, approval, or rebuke. The report of such inspections has always been favorable and frequently enthusiastic; so that with considerable complacency the Seminary makes another salutation.

ENROLLMENT. During the year to end forty-eight students have pursued the regular or special courses. In addition to the undergraduates there have been in the graduate department twelve students. All of these are pastors in the active work. Eight of them are Methodist Protestant pastors, three of them are of the United Brethren fold, and the remaining one is a Reformed minister. This growing popularity of our graduate department is a two fold tribute to the Seminary: her alumni love her so well that they must, like Oliver Twist, call for "more;" and sister denominations are learning to trust her and are eager to sit at her feet.

THE GRADUATING CLASS. Next Commencement Day, May 4th., the diplomas and degrees of the Seminary will be presented to thirteen One of these is a member of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and two of these have just entered the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The remaining ten are Methodist Protestants. North Carolina, West Virginia, and Indiana Conference are each represented by one graduate; the Eastern Conference by three; and the Maryland Conference by four. They are Edward E. Coleman, of the East Baltimore Church; Walter Avery Donoway, of Whaleyville Circuit; Edwin Keehner, of the South Baltimore Church; and Jesse G. Eaton, of the New Market Circuit. These four are ready to enter our ranks at this session of the Conference. Indiana claims the honor of calling as her own the first woman graduate of The Westminster Theological Seminary-Miss Mabelle Shaffer, of Kendallville. A model student for three years, an inspiring example to her male companions, thoroughly equipped for her task, she goes forth to the Home Field, under the direction of the Woman's Board.

THE NEW HOME FOR THE PRESIDENT. The latest triumph in the field of erecting buildings is the New Home for the President of the Seminary. Four years ago, in the 1922 session of the Maryland Conference, a proposition was made to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Presidency of H. L. Elderdice by erecting a New Parsonage. A Jubilee Fund was started by calling upon the churches to take up a collection during the year and forward to the Seminary the amounts received. But the pastors were so busy with their multitudinous duties that only a few paid attention to the proposition. A year later it was seen that if the work were to be accomplished it must be done by the President of the Seminary. And so, with some assistance by the professors, he succeeded in rearing a building that was dedicated November 17, 1924. It is a beautiful, well equipped structure, following the architecural lines of the New Seminary Building, and its cost-including furniture, cement walks, and shrubbery-was about \$25,000. All of this cost has been met with the exception of about \$500 which has just been called for, and of course will be met. To the Maryland, the West Virginia, the Ohio, the Indiana, the Alabama Conferences belong the credit of this victory. Individuals in other Conferences contributed, and too much praise cannot be given to the poor preachers who out of their poverty delighted to help. Annual Conferences here and there have parsonages for their Presidents, and most churches and circuits have parsonages for their pastors, but this is the only Denominational Parsonage in our beloved Zion.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That H. L. Elderice be assigned to the Presidency for the ensuing year.
- 2. That pastors instruct laymen as to the needs of the various funds of the Seminary; the Endowment, the Scholarship and the Library; and request them to make donations now or provide for them in their wills.
- 3. That our Churches call upon their young men to consider the claims of the ministry, and urge their young women to investigate the needs of Home and Foreign fields, and the opportunities for leadership in local churches, and to urge upon all such of both sexes to take advantake of the various courses of study provided by the Seminary.

### BALTIMORE BOOK DIRECTORY

To the Members of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church:

Dear Brethren:

In presenting the annual report of the Baltimore Book Directory for the fiscal year ending February 27, 1926, we are now able to face our problem as revealed by a year of operations in our new location. While the volume of business done this year was larger than the previous year, we will not show a profit. This is due to fact that our overhead has been too great for the volume of business done. We are now engaged in reducing our overhead to such an extent as to keep within the volume of business we are doing.

#### THE METHODIST PROTESTANT

During the year special campaigns have been put on in the various conferences in our territory. While in some cases the returns have not been ensouraging, on the whole we added to our list 1310 new subscribers during the year. Our problem has been in holding our old subscribers. Working under our present plan to have all subscriptions come due at conference time will help in a large measure to overcome. this difficulty. We were compelled to discontinue during the year 1457 subscribers because of deaths, removals and failure to renew. This leaves us with a subscription list at this time of 6400 subscribers. The lists from the Maryland Conference are not complete, but indications are that they will not be as large as last year. While the paper has never paid expenses in dollars and cents it has been beyond price as an organ of the church, giving information and assisting in the financial growth and cultivating a spirit of brotherhood in all the churches. It is therefore impossible to set forth in any report whether the church paper does or does not pay expenses. We can only make the paper a success by the thorough co-operation of the ministers of the Methodist Protestant Church. There is no other way to circulate it. We are very grateful for the co-operation we have received. However, when we come to know that there are eight thousand families in the Maryland Conference that do not take the paper it make one wonder if we really understand the great position that the paper occupies in the success of the church. So far as its cost is concerned it is negligent. People are spending very much more money on the luxuries and pleasures of life every week than this paper cost in a whole year. Our hope is in you, brethren, and we have had an experience that justifies our continued belief in this respect.

#### PRINTING DEPARTMENT

The printing plant made the best financial showing this year since it was started. We have built up a splendid volume of business which will increase as the years go on. Each year we are becoming better known, and with contracts for publications already secured we are confident this department, in the near future, will show increased profits. We have specialized in church printing and are building up a growing patronage among our own churches as well as those of other denominations. We want to impress upon our ministers and laymen the fact that this is your plant. It needs your support and encouragement. Patronize it whenever possible.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL AND BOOK DEPARTMENTS

Our Sunday School publications are being constantly improved. During the two years of Dr. Johnston's administration as editor the general make up and treatment of the lessons has been revised. The

typographical arrangement has been changed and new cover designs added which makes our publications attractive, and in keeping with those of other denominations. To make such change is an expensive matter. It is the policy of our board to give to our schools the best literature that money can buy. With our improved periodicals covering every grade, there is no need for any of our schools to use other than our own denominational literature. Our periodicals are edited and published with a view to meet the needs and requirements of our own schools. The improved group graded and closely graded lesson help meet the requirements of any school. We want to stress in this report the weekly paper known as the New Guide. This is a splendid story paper for intermediates and adults.

Since the Sunday School Library has gone out of existence in most Sunday Schools a paper of this character will put in the hands of our young people good wholesome reading matter. Sample copies and full particulars will be supplied free to any of our schools interested.

It has been our constant aim to make our store attractive to the public The trend of expansion is in the direction of our location and in four or five years time we should be able to build up a splendid patronage. With a large and varied stock we are in position to furnish anything in Church and Sunday School supplies or any book published. Every member of the Methodist Protestant Church is a stock-holder. Whatever profits accrue are turned over to the denomination to further expand the work. By supporting it, you are helping one of the important branches of our denominational work.

We attach for your information the financial reports covering the work of the past year, in the form of receipts and expenditures statements, also a statements of our assets and liabilities.

Rev. F. T. Benson, D. D., Editor, after several months absence because of illness returned to his desk in the early fall very much improved in health and has taken care of his work since his return with his usual ability and efficiency.

Mr. Charles Reiner, Jr., our industrious and efficient agent has never devoted himself more unreservedly to his duties than during the past year. He is always on the alert watching over the interests of the business.

Mr. C. Levine Price, the Superintendent of the Printing Department is demonstrating every year more and more his ability to take care of the responsible duties devolving upon him.

We hereby express our appreciation of the co-operation of all of our employees.

## COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLES WORK

(See Journal, page 27)

The Committee on Young People's Work has carefully considered matters relative to this branch of the Conference work and herewith submit recommendations as follows;

1. That we follow with greater faithfulness than ever our competent leader Rev. E. A. Sexsmith, General Secretary of the Board of Young Peoples Work, and we especially recommend that all Christian Endeavor Societies adopt his efficiency chart which not only equals but surpasses The United Society Chart.

2. That we enthusiastically co-operate with Rev. L. B. Smith, our President of the Union of Young Peoples Work, as he endeavors to carry out a program that is most beneficial in training Christian workers.

3. That an entrance examination in the form of a questionaire be required of those wishing to attend the Summer Institute, in order that this Institute may continue to be a real training school and not merely a place of recreation.

4. Noting with pleasure the successes the Winter Institutes have made throughout the Peninsula, in that, although a new experience, 507 workers were registered this year, we recommend that the Pastors give their hearty co-operation to them.

5. That the School of Methods conducted at Grace Church, Baltimore, under the direction of the Pastor of that Church be approved and that such a school be conducted by as many churches as find it possible.

6. That the work of the Conference Union, in supporting Rev. Paul M. Cassen, our missionary to India, be approved, and that every Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Society give their financial support to the same.

7. That Bro. Carroll M. Wright, Field Secretary of the Maryland and Delaware C. E. Union, and one of our own denomination, be given our confidence as a leader of our young people and our loyal support in the work he is doing.

8. Realizing the imperative need of funds to finance the great Summer Institute, such as we now have, we urge that all Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies send their dues to the Treasurer promptly, we recommend that all Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Societies pay two cents per member with a minimum rate of two dollars and that Intermediate and Junior Christian Endeavor Societies pay one dollar per year.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNION OF YOUNG PEO-PLE'S WORK

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren-

The Maryland Conference Union of Young People's Work no longer needs to be defined or explained. The present leaders of our Sunday Schools, Christian Endeavor societies, and other working organizations in our churches are being recognized more than ever as the products of the training schools of this Union.

Our annual institutes at Western Maryland College are becoming larger each year in the enrollment of students, and more of our churches throughout the Conference are being represented in the personel of those attending. Scores of young people are offering themselves for full time life work, and many more for special service in the churches to which they belong.

The four-year standard course of instruction prepared by our efficient secretary of the Board of Young People's Work, Rev. E. A. Sexsmith, D. D., is now in full operation. We feel now that the time has come to limit our enrollment to those who agree to take the course of instruction, rather than merely take advantage of our institutes as a summer outing. Our plan this year is to issue a set of rules governing both study and conduct, to which every person desiring to attend must agree before being accepted. In this way we hope to eliminate those who have no purpose whatever in attending other than to enjoy a vacation.

Our union continues to support Rev. Paul Cassen as "our own" missionary in India, and we stand ready to co-operate further with the work in China, whenever additional missionaries are sent.

Recently a series of district institutes were conducted on the Del-Mar-Va Peninsula, with most gratifying results. Over five hundred were enrolled, and one hundred and eighty-four received credits toward a Christian Worker's Certificate. Eight institutes were held at the following places: Parksley, Va., Pocomoke City, Salisbury, Hurlock, and Chestertown, Maryland; and Seaford, Dover, and Georgetown, Delaware,

covering a period of about sixteen days. We believe that they were well worth the effort and hope to see them continued and expanded to other sections of the Conference.

We appeal to the pastors and leaders in our churches to see that the small amount of money requested from our Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor societies is sent in to our treasurer, Rev. T. C. Mulligan, 26 S. Payson St., Baltimore, Md. We cannot maintain the high standard of our institute course of instruction, or continue to enlarge the scope of our work as needed to train our young people as leaders of our churches in the future without the full financial co-operation of our churches.

#### REPORT K

## MORAL REFORM AND SOCIAL SERVICE

(See Journal, page 33)

We express our gratitude for laws the aim and effect of which are the improvement of morals. We call upon our people to be careful in the observance of all law, and to be as zealous for the preservation of good laws as they were of their enactment. We commend all officers of the government who are making an earnest effort to render effective these laws and declare to them our support therein.

It is our conviction that a vigorous campaign of education in the principles underlying these laws should be undertaken, and that it should apply especially to the prohibition laws. Before the passage of the eighteenth amendment to the federal constitution there were years of instruction of both young and old in the facts of the nature and effects of alcohol. This form of education should be revived. We, therefore recommend that all our ministers prepare themselves with these facts and in the most effective way possible give them to their people. We have heard with pleasure the announcement by the Anti-Saloon League that it is engaging in such an educational enterprise. This, in our judgement is the place of emphasis.

We recommend that a message be sent to the United States Senate Committee which is just now investigating the prohibition situation, urging that the Volstead law be not liberalzed but that as a result of its hearing methods for its proper enforcements may be reported to the Senate.

We call attention to the beauty and the sanctity of marriage. It is "not by any to be entered into unadvisedly or lightly but reverently, discreetly and in the fear of God." We, therefore, record our disapproval of hasty marriage, and the commercialization of this sacred ordinance, and urge the passage of such law or laws by the State of Maryland as will prevent these evils.

The blessing of the Christian Sabbath is realized as the day is kept one of rest and communion with the Highest. Tendencies to secularize it and to make it a day of dissipation are prevalent but they may not be yielded to without serious results. We call upon the Church, its best friend, to reveal its blessings and to commend the Lord's Day Alliance for its efforts looking to this end.

That this Conference emphasize the importance of legislation to enforce the Volstead Act, and urge upon our ministers and laymen to do their best to have such a law passed at the next State Legislature.

We urge that the Volstead Law be amended so as to make illegal the home manufacture of wines or cider containing more than one

half of one per cent of alcohol by volume.

In conformity with recommendations of the Board of Managers of the Deaconess Work: we recommend

- 1. That the Sunday preceeding the sessions of the Young People's Institute at Westminster be set apart as a special day when the interest of the Deaconess work shall be laid on the hearts of our people, and that earnest efforts be made to secure recruits for the same, and that the said effort to recruit the Deaconess ranks be headed by the President of this Conference, with power to appoint such help as he may deem wise.
- 2. That a place be given on the program of the Young People's Institute at Westminster for the presentation of the Deaconess Work, and that opportunity be given our young women to make their decision for this line of Christian service.
- 3. That the appropriation of \$2,500.00 be continued for another year.

We report that the terms of Rev. G. W. Haddaway, D. D., G. E. Brown, Messrs. J. H. Roberts, E. J. Paige and Mrs. E. B. Fenby, expire with this Conference, and their successors are to be elected.

Concerning the report of the Special Committee on Deaconess Work we feel that their report has been sufficiently considered and acted upon by this Conference, that we as a Committee deem it unnecessary to make any comment upon it.

Your Committee would again call attention to the excellent work of the Maryland Tract and the Maryland Bible Society, and earnestly commend them to the hearty co-operation of all our churches.

While no papers have been referred to us relative to the aid afforded through appropriations of the St. John's Board of Beneficence and the Pipe Creek Benevolent Society to the different enterprises of our Conference still we desire to express our grateful appreciation of their valued co-operation. We call the attention of all our churches to the appeal of the Near East Relief and urge their generous support as far as possible.

#### REPORT OF THE DEACONESS BOARD

To the Members of The Maryland Conference.

Your Board of Deaconess Work wishes to make the following report. The board has held its meetings monthly and regularly, and with one exception has not failed to have more than a quorum present for the transaction of business.

We feel happy in being able to report to you this year that the board is out of debt, i. e., when the treasurer of the conference shall have turned over to the treasurer of the board the full amount of this year's assessment we will be able to pay off the last \$500.00 of the mortgaged indebtedness against the home and all current expenses are paid up to date. This gives us a splendidly equipped home for our deaconesses which is easily worth \$9,000.00. And no small amount of credit for this situation is due to our very efficient, painstaking and sacrificing treasurer, Rev. W. A. Melvin, and to Miss Lillian Demoss for her economical management of the home.

It is true that we cannot report to you any increase in the number of deaconesses over last year, but we are happy to report that for the first time in many years we do not have to report any decrease. There have been no deaths, resignations or other inroads made upon the rank and file of our very splendid corps of deaconesses. We have four, the same number as reported last year. One of these has not been well during the year, but the other three have been constantly employed and the board could have well used more if we had only had them. With

your board there is absolutely no question of the need of the deaconess work as there is no question in this conference of the need of the ministry. The only question is how can we in this materalistic age get the womanhood of the church to heed the call of the Spirit of this great work? When there is a shortage of ministers in this conference and pulpits are going unsupplied, we have become concerned about the situation, we have made it a matter of prayer and God has sent reapers The fact that we have suffered no reverses nor for the harvest. decreases during the year seems to us to be significant; significant of the fact that we have reached rock bottom. Shall we not begin from here with plendidly equipped home free of all encumbrance, to go here with such a splendid corps of deaconneses as a nucleus and such a spendidly equipped home free of all encumbrance, to go on to the realization and achievement of the ideals in deaconess work as held by that pioneer in the work, Dr. F. T. Tagg, and others who were associated with him.

The terms of Revs. G. W. Haddaway, D. D., G. E. Brown, Messrs. J. H. Roberts, E. J. Paige, and Mrs. E. B. Fenby, expire with this Conference, and their successors are to be elected.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. It seems to us that we can do no better than repeat the first recommendation of last year's report, viz., That the Annual Conference set apart a special day, when the claims of the Deaconess Work shall be laid upon the hearts of our people, and that the said efforts to recruit the Deaconess ranks be headed by the President of this Conference, with power to appoint such help as he may deem wise. In this way we have taken care of the Superannuate Fund the Methodist Protestant, the Home for the Aged and other important interests of this Conference from time to time. Why not in the same fashion consider the Deaconess Work, and thus take hold of the Work with strong hands.
- 2. We recommend that the present assessment of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500.00) be continued for another year. The treasurer's report is herewith attached.

We believe the time has come now for some radical steps one way or the other.

from the Conference Roll.

Through us the Conference hereby expresses appreciation of the many courtesies shown by the pastor and the entertainment committee of this church, as well as the splendid hospitality of the members and friends during the session of this Conference.

Also its thanks to the Baltimore Press, the Philadelphia Press, and the Wilmington Press for granting us such liberal space in their

columns, in reporting the activities of the Conference.

Also its thanks to the Victor Adding Machine for the loan of machines, the Wilmington Furniture Company for the use of tables, and to Mr. Julian Phillips, Vice-President of Goldey College for the

use of typewriters.

The assessments will not be paid unless someone in charge of appointments attends to them, which is primarily the duty of the minister, but is after all an obligation and responsibility resting on the entire membership of the charges, of whom the minister is the head.

# REPORT N COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS

(See Journal, page 26)

Your Committee on Missions having carefully considered the reports of the various Boards and Organizations submitted to it—the reports of the Secretary of the Board, Rev. F. C. Klein, D. D., the W. F. M. S. and the W. H. M. S.,—takes great pleasure in calling attention to the eplendid work being done by the Union Board of Foreign Missionary Administration in both the Foreign and Home fields.

The Church may well congratulate itself on the work being done in the various mission fields by our faithful, self-sacrificing missionaries, who are giving the best of their lives that the banner of King Emmanuel may be unfurled in those far away lands of wonderful possibilities.

We have read with keen interest the report of "The Progress of the Work," as given in the splendid, carefully prepared "Children's Day" program for 1926, which record we wish to embody here as a part of our report to this Conference.

### PROGRESS OF THE WORK

JAPAN. The Union Board has 13 missionaries, 30 Japanese ministers and preachers, several Bible women, 5 theological students, and a good corps of teachers in Japan, and excellent results are being secured.

There are 2,215 church members, 250 probationers, and 245 enquirers, and 3,310 Sunday School scholars enrolled.

The Tokyo Blind School has 31 enrolled, 8 being enquirers.

The Yokohama Primary School building was completed last year,

and has 120 girls enrolled. The Girls' High School has 306 enrolled—7 were baptized last quarter. The six kindergarten schools are flourishing.

The Nagoya College has 1,149 enrolled-16 students baptized last

quarter.

CHINA. Four missionaries, two of whom delayed their furlough last year, 1 Chinese minister and 23 unordained workers, and 1 Bible woman form the working force in China.

54 men, 19 women, and 23 children were baptized. Six Sunday

Schools have 259 enrolled.

The Kalgan Girls' School, and one or two out-station schools, and the Kalgan Boys' School, and 7 others, including a night school, are being conducted, despite the unsettled and menacing conditions caused by civil war, etc. A Y. M. C. A. connected with the Klagan Boy's School contributed \$100 for a library and reading room.

Dr. R. Fleagle has conducted her medical work continuously and successfully. The wife of Marshall Feng, the Christian general, was

her patient, and enhanced her prestige.

A trained male Chinese doctor, a qualified nurse and 3 helpers have

worked in three dispensaries.

INDIA. There are 8 missionaries, 2 Indian ministers, 8 preachers, 7 Bible women and 9 theological students in our India Mission.

The Girls' School has 74 on roll, and 3 in training college, 2 in

High School, and 1 kindergarten training school.

The Boy's School has government recognition, and has 79 enrolled, besides several in higher grade schools being trained for the ministry, teachers, etc.

The medical work has been effectively handled by Miss Perley, registered nurse. There were 60 cases of grippe, besides other ailments. A lady doctor is the crying need, as hospital is finished and largely furnished.

The evangelistic tour of our district was made from November 4 to December 12, and 103 villages were reached, and 7,537 heard the Gospel.

Travel was by ox cart at 2% miles an hour. 100 hours of time for preaching to the heathen would have been saved by a cart and two ponies, and much more time if the Mission had a Ford car.

The crops at the farm, or settlement, where a number of our Indian people are being trained to self-support, were fair, and about 200 fruit trees were planted, and doing well.

This exhibition can but hearten the church to renewed effort for the furtherance of the Master's cause in those lands which today present to the church that opportunity that can but emphasize the church's obligation and responsibility in hastening the coming of the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

It is the opinion of your committee that the Conference, as such, should emphasize in no uncertain tones the pastor's responsibility in fostering and encouraging their charges to put forth every effort in the

observance of the Children's Day program and to secure as large an offering as possible for the cause of Foreign Missions.

The reports that have come to the Committee on the work being done by the various Home Missionary agencies are of an intensely interesting and encouraging nature.

It is with great appreciation and pleasure that we look upon the larger call that has come to our beloved Dr. Sheridan, and the self-sacrificing manner in which he has addressed himself to the greater work of Home Missions, as Secretary of the Board of Home Missions.

While congratulating the ladies of the Home Missionary Society in their efforts to establish a Girl's Home in Baltimore, Md., we can but reiterate the conviction of your Committee of a year ago, namely "Believing that the time is inopportune of bringing this most praiseworthy enterprise of a Girl's Home in Baltimore to a successful conclusion, your Committee with regret is compelled to withhold its endorsement of the proposed Home."

We feel that we cannot speak too strongly against the practice growing in some quarters of holding back the Children's Day funds until a "convenient season," and we recommend that this Conference demand that these funds be remitted to the Conference Treasurer within thirty days after the observance of the day.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME FOR THE AGED

Your committee found real pleasure in considering the contents of the papers referred to it this year.

There has been a very noticeable increase along all lines. The number of visitors, the number and value of gifts, the number of people and churches sending gifts, and the group visitations by C. E. Societies, Sunday School Classes and other organizations has been greater than ever before. We take pleasure in again calling attention to the fact that the number of visitors and donors includes friends who are not Methodist. Protestants and that their number seems to increase.

The Home Visitation Day during Summer Conference surpassed any before reported in every way and resulted in a general increase in value and number of gifts and givers, and many who were not able to be present sent gifts. This indicates an interest that lasts.

We recommend that the same plan be adopted by the Summer Conference and Young People's Institute for this year and that each pastor of the Conference try to plan for the lady visitor from his church or churches to be present at the home on that day.

We regret that the Board of Managers was again compelled to close the year with a slight deficit. It is only by the most efficient managemet that this deficit is not greater and call attendtion to the statement made by the Board of Managers that it has evolved a plan by which the debt now standing may be gradually paid. If the whole assessment could be gotten each year, it, with the income from the invested fund, would make it possible to close the books each year without a deficit. We are glad to call attention to the fact that the invested fund now

amounts to \$36,382.00.

Your committee feels that some expression of appreciation should go from this conference to the Board of Managers and the Board of Lady Superintendents, for the splendid service they are giving to this work.

We recommend that the assessment for the Home for the ensuing

year be \$6,000.00.

We urge all Methodist Protestants visiting near enough to reach the Home make it a point to visit there and that churches near enough plan visitations to it at least once a year if possible.

and three men, which is the capacity of the present building.

Miss Kate Murray, our faithful and remarkable matron, is untiring in her efforts to serve wholesome meals and make the guests comfortable in every way. She has not been very well lately, and we have been not a little disturbed about her condition. She has a splendid cook and assistant, and the ladies who are able, help her with the work whenever it is possible.

Our nurse, Mrs. Elizabeth Stahl, resigned last October and there being no one available at that time to take her place, the Board decided to ask three of the ladies, who are able physically, to share the task of nursing the sick. This they consented to do, and we are pleased to say that these ladies, Mrs. Lockard, Miss Marley and Miss Vial, have been taking care of the sick willingly and to the entire eatisfaction of the guests and the Board. They take turns, each one nursing a week at a time, and the salary formerly paid Mrs. Stahl is divided equally among the three.

In a family of this size, especially of elderly people, it is to be expected that there should be sickness; but there has been no unusual amount of illness during the past year. Mrs. Potter continues to be a great sufferer, but is unusually bright and uncomplaining. Mrs. McDowell is confined to her room on account of heart trouble; also Mrs. Arnold and Mrs. Chaney at times. Mr. Wright suffered a slight stroke last week, but is able to be up and around the house again. Several others have had slight illness this winter, but all are in fairly good health, with the exception of colds.

The Home physician, Dr. L. K. Woodward, is kind and attentive to all, and we feel that their good health is due to his ever watchful care. We wish to express our appreciation of his generosity in donating one half of his bill for services rendered.

November 13, 1925, Mrs. Mary L. Duhurst passed away, at the advanced age of eighty-four years. She was a member of the Home family for twenty-one years; and until a few years ago, had been in wonderful health. However, the past two years had been ones of great suffering for her, and death came as a blessed relief.

There applicants have been admitted: Mr. Elias Ogg, of Deer Park Church; Mrs. Mary Sherwood, of Chestertown; and Mrs. M. Anna

Dale, of Pocomoke City.

The annual Donation and Visitor's day was held July 29, during the Summer Conference at Western Maryland College. A luncheon and reception were held at the Home; and the occasion was a great success in every way, especially in attendance. Many people visited the Home who had never seen nor heard of it before; and from the wonderful donations received this year, we feel sure that the visitors went home and told their Church people and friends all about this splendid work our Church is doing for its old people. There were more lady visitors present than on any other Visitor's Day. brought gifts of every kind, and also their friends. Many who could not attend sent cheering letters, inclosing checks from five to twenty-five dollars. My! How I wish we had a real, live Lady Visitor in every church in the Conference. If you have been following up the lists of donations in The Protestant, you know which Churches have the right Lady Visitor.

Interest in our Old Folks has been increasing all the time. Sunshine Circles, Clubs, Sunday School Classes, College girls, and many individuals visited the Home almost weekly and scattered "sunshine" in the way of songs, plays, music, recitations, illustrated lectures,

etc. The Seminarians held services weekly, which all enjoyed and appreciated, especially those who were unable to attend Church. Our new piano, purchased with the generous gifts of friends of the Home, adds greatly to the success of these entertainments.

Christmas was a happy time for all, including the Ladies Board, who planned the treat and trimmed the tree. So many things were donated, including the tree and the huge turkey, that we no longer doubt that there is a Santa Claus—the spirit of Christmas.

As to repairs and improvements: We have had to have some painting and papering done, new floor coverings, a new mattress, etc; but there remains great room for improvement along this line. The living-room has been renovated; and at housecleaning time this Spring, we plan to make the same improvement in the sitting-room. We will soon make an appeal for funds for this purpose, and feel confident our friends will respond as they always do, when the need is explained.

The donations were numerous and suitable to the needs of the Home. Fifty-five Churches, many organizations, and individuals sent donations. Many Churches sent three and four times during the year: that is. the Sunday School, the Christian Endeavor Society, the Ladies Aid, and other organizations of the Church sent separate donations, which are credited to the Church. ### REPORT U

## COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

(See Journal, page 31)

Your Committee has endeavored to care for its work during the past year, as outlined by the Conference. We beg, therefore, to make the following report of the work done. With our assistance tent meetings were conducted at the following places,—New Church, Franklin City, Carroll Circuit, Susquehanna, Trinity (Baltimore), Girdletree, Lisbon. The following revivals have been held with the co-operation of the Committee,—Moore's Chapel on Leeds Charge, Leeds, two at Wesley Chapel, Wilton Heights, Harper's Ferry, Northumberland, Harbeson, Vienna and Cambridge Circuit. In all twenty-four men responded to the call of the committee to go forth as evangelists. There has been a fine spirit of co-operation, and the committee endeavored to show all consideration to those who, when called to go forth, found it impossible to do so. These meetings resulted in 157 conversions, 4 reclamations, while 100 joined church as a direct result of the meeting.

The small number of conversions noticed in our report is to be regretted. In reply to a questionaire sent out by the committee three replied that their metings were not such as to be characterized as a success. This also has given the committee deep concern. We are, however, in no way discouraged as to the work of the gospel. We beg to call to the attention of the Conference the Personal Evangelistic Campaign conducted in February of this year by the Federation of Churches in Baltimore. The results of that effort were astounding. We commend it as in keeping with the method of Jesus. While certain methods of evangelism may fail, the gospel can never fail. We recommend therefore that the Conference give due consideration to this highly important matter, and that, if it sees fit, to authorize the committee on evangelism to conduct a personal evangelism campaign throughout the conference area. We recommend the month of February for this campaign except where local conditions make another date more advisable.

Your committee likewise feels that a great opportunity is being missed in failing to win the children of the Sunday School to become children of the Church. Much harm can be done in a wholesale gathering of the children into the church, while, on the other hand, we must not overlook our responsibility in bringing the children into the church. In order to create impetus throughout the district, we recommend that the conference urge every charge to set aside a Sunday during their evangelistic services to be known as Decision Day, and that the committee be empowered to prepare and distribute helps toward the effectual consummation of such a day.

We believe that the charge hitherto set for the committee on evangelism should be replaced by the following: A charge of twentyfive dollars for two weeks shall be made for use of tent; a charge of five dollars shall be made to all churches conducting revivals under

direction of the committee.

We wish to thank all those who have co-operated with the committee. This committee is but the evangelistic voice of the Conference. and wishes to testify that all its efforts have been the result of an impartial interest.

## REPORT V

## HEADOUARTERS COMMITTEE

(See Journal, page 25)

To the Maryland Annual Conference, Dear Brethren:

Your committee comes to you with a completed task. Acting on the instructions and authority vested in this committee by the conference, the old headquarters building at 316 N. Charles St. has been disposed of, a large piece of ground at 516 N. Charles St., corner Hamilton, has been purchased and a five story brick and limestone building erected thereon. All of these facts have been amply reported to the 1924 and 1925 annual conference and duly recorded in the conference minutes. During the past year all the unfinished details of construction and of finance have been concluded. All outstanding obligations against the property have been consolidated in a bond issue of \$20,000 secured by a second mortgage, over the signature of the Board of Trustees of the Conference. The present financial condition is set forth in the report of F. Murray Benson, Treasurer, attached.

We now have a first mortgage of \$122,500, formerly reported, (\$2500 having been paid of the original amount) and a second mortgage of \$20,000, due in five years. There are no other obligations. We have

cash in hand and bills receivable of \$5,102.72.

The problem now remaining is one of proper management of the building. Our present rentals will more than meet all overhead expenses on the building and with the occupancy of the present unrented space we have enough with which to meet our payments on principal as they mature.

Your committee feels it has no further reason for continuance and that the time has come for the conference to take full control of the management of the building. To this end we recommend:

1. That the committee be discharged and that the conference turn over the building for management and control to the Board of Trustees of the Conference or to a small board of management, as the conference

may deem wise.

2. Believing that a direct superintendency of said building ought to be in the hands of some one person, we further recommend that out of the current income receipts from the building. an amount not to exceed \$50. per month be available for such remuneration, as the judgment of the new management may direct.

## REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER GROUP LIFE INSURANCE

(See Journal, pages 24, 26, 30, 32, 37)

Your committee has carefully considered the propositions concerning "Group Insurance" presented by several Companies and begs to report that in our judgment The Prudential Insurance Company, of Newark, N. J. offers the most satisfactory policy and rates obtainable, the conditions and rates of which are as follows:

- 1. It will require seventy-five per cent of the active members of this conference to participate in the plan.
- 2. The Company to issue a master policy to the Maryland Annual Conference covering all persons insured and to each individual a certificate covering the amount of his insurance and stating its conditions and options.
- 3. The amount of Insurance will be One Thousand Dollars per members payable upon death, or upon evidence of permanent disability prior to the age of sixty as follows:

A. In lump sum six month after evidence of permanent disability has been given, or

B. In monthly installments of Seventeen Dollars and Ninety-five cents (\$17.95).

4. The premium rate based upon the average premium according to the ages of the active members of this conference (148 perticipating)

will be Eighteen Dollars and Thirty-four cents (\$18.34).

An additional premium of Three Dollars (\$3.00) on each policy said sum to be placed in trust subject to the order of The Maryland Annual Conference and to bear compound interest annually. This amount together with accrued dividends to be used if necessary to offset the possible increase of premium occasioned by an increase of the average age.

This additional premium of \$3.00 added to the \$18.34 above will make a total premium rate per thousand of Twenty-one Dollars and Thirty-four cents (\$21.34).

Your committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Maryland Annual Conference accept the proposition of The Prudential Insurance Company of Newark, N. J. as outlined above, provided the required number of members can be secured.

2. That the premium be paid as follows:

Ten dollars (\$10.00) by each person insured within thirty days, the balance of Eleven Dollars and Thirty-four cents (\$11.34) be paid by The Maryland Annual Conference.

On the basis of One Hundred and Forty-eight men participating the total amount would be Thirteen Hundred and Thirty-three Dollars and Twenty-five cents (\$1,333.25).

An amendment was offered to read "that the conference require those who come into the conference beginning with session 1926 participate in this insurance." And further that the whole matter be referred to the President of the Conference and Mr. T. A. Murray to conclude this insurance.

3. We recommend that an additional amount of Fifteen Hundred Dollars be added to the assessment for Superannuates. The same to be used for the payment of that portion of the premiums assumed by the Maryland Annual Conference.

Your committee recommends that a new committee be appointed which shall work in an effort toward a larger emphasis on this vital phase of Christian life.

# REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION SOCIETY

The Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society submits the following brief summary of its principal activities during the Conference year:

BETHESDA CHURCH.—The progress of this charge has been so satisfactory that at its request, the property has been deeded by this Society to the local church which has assumed all indebtedness. Everything points to the success of the enterprise and the establishing of a strong church.

DELMONT.—The note reported to the last Conference as having been endorsed for this charge, has been reduced to \$600.00 and further curtailments are promised at each maturity.

MARLEY AND ARUNDEL COVE.—The need of a parsonage was so acute that these two churches combined their resources and with the help of the Society's endorsement, a comfortable home for the pastor has been built at a cost of about \$5,000.00. They are reducing the amount of indebtedness at each maturity of the obligation, but it will be necessary for the Society to continue its financial backing for the present.

GRACELAND PARK .- The indebtedness on this church has been

re-financed by a building association loan and it is being paid off in

weekly payments.

TRINITY.—The gratifying progress reported last year has continued and a new Sunday School building has been erected at a cost of approximately \$31,000. This was financed by the local church with the help of this Society, which guaranteed the payment of the first \$5,000.00 of the mortgage loan, the Board to be relieved of this obligation when the building is completed. The Bonding Committee is now ready to do this.

CALVARY, Washington.—We hold title to this property, but our relations are supervisory only. They have started to accumulate a building fund, now amounting to about \$800.00, and when the amount in hand will justify it, they will proceed with the erection of a church

building.

TIOGA HEIGHTS.—The note reported to the Conference of 1925 as \$2,800.00 had been reduced by the Church to \$2,200.00 by January, but the curtailment was unsatisfactory to the lending bank and payment was demanded. The church raised \$100.00 and this Society by advancing an additional \$400.00 secured the agreement of the bank to renew the note for eixty days for \$1,700.00 with the understanding that substantial curtailments should be made at maturity. They have recently contracted for the sale of a parcel of ground which will put them in funds to retire the liability to the bank and to return the amount advanced by us.

EDMONDSON AVENUE .- This enterprise has constituted the chief of our efforts and thought during the year. Without burdening this paper with the detail of the methods and plans, we are pleased to report that the lot on the south side of Edmondson Avenue was exchanged by Mr. Jas. Keelty for a more desirable lot on the north side of the avenue and a most creditable church building has been erected at a cost of approximately \$50,000.00. The financing has been difficult and there still remain many financial problems to be solved, but by the liberal assistance of some of the Baltimore laity, the work has been brought to its present status and we are confident that by judicious management it will soon be self-sustaining. This Society hypothecated the Butler legacy and borrowed \$5,000.00 which was turned over to this church. This loan will be retired when the Butler estate is settled. In this connection we wish to express our appreciation of the liberality of Mr. Jas. Keelty both for substantial cash contributions for the new building and for the use of a parsonage free of all charges since the commencement of the work at Edmondson Avenue.

The properties at Selbyville and Walkersville have been sold and

the proceeds turned over the Peninsula Church at Wilmington.

When the last Conference adjourned there was a balance of \$300.00 unprovided for on pastor's salary at Edmondson Avenue due for this year. It was thought this balance could be raised privately, but appeals for larger sums for this church have prevented doing so; however, the pastor has been paid regularly by our treasurer advancing the money. It was necessary also for our treasurer to pay \$120.00 required to assure a full-time pastor at Chesaco Park. In view of the fact that only one

half of the amount appropriated for the superintendent's salary was required, we ask that Conference reimburse our treasurer for the advance of these sums totalling \$420.00.

On October 1st, 1925, Dr. J. M. Sheridan who has been Superintendent of the Church Extension for the past eight years was called to the Secretaryship of the Board of Home Missions. He was released by this Society, but his wise leadership and consecrated service has been sadly missed. Since this date the management of the Society has been directed by a committee of this Board and it has been demonstrated that such management is an unsatisfactory substitute for a superintendent giving his full time to the Society's interests. For this reason the Board of Managers heartly joined with the Board of Survey in the recommendation that the office of superintendent be continued.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

## MUTUAL RELIEF ASSOCIATION OF THE MARYLAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH

### ARTICLE 1-NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1—This Association shall be known as the Mutual Relief Association of the Maryland Annual Conference, of the Methodist Protestant Church.

Section 2—Its object shall be to provide a fund for the benefit of the surviving relatives of its members, said fund to be provided for and disbursed as hereinafter provided for.

ARTICLE 2-OFFICERS, ELECTIONS AND MEETINGS

This Association shall meet annually on Thursday afternoon of the Conference week, at the Conference church, and shall elect from its members, a President, two Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

### ARTICLE 3-EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Officers of this Association shall constitute an Executive Committee to which all matters of business, ad interim, shall be referred for adjustment.

### ARTICLE 4-Membership

All ministers and preachers of the Maryland Annual Conference, of the Methodist Protestant Church, and their wives, under fifty (50) years of age, if in good health, upon the payment of an entrance fee of \$1.00 shall be eligible to membership in this Association, provided, however, that no member of the Annual Conference who neglects to make application for membership in this Association for more than one year next after his admission into the Conference shall be admitted to membership except on the same conditions as provided for the reinstatement of lapsed members.

#### ARTICLE 5-REINSTATEMENT OF LAPSED MEMBERS

All members having lapsed may be reinstated upon the payment of a reinstatement fee on the following graduated scale:

It being understood that this is an entrance or reinstatement fee and that the mortuary due of \$1.00 per member, payable upon the death of a member, is exclusive of this reinstatement fee.

### ARTICLE 6-BENEFITS

Section 1-Upon the death of a member of this Association, upon

due notice of such death, furnished by the President of the Annual Conference within five (5) days of said death, the President of this Association shall order and the Secretary-Treasurer shall, within thirty (3.,, and days from date of such notice, pay to the legal heirs or assignees of the deceased, a sum of money equal to \$1.00 per member, in good standing, of this Association, as nearly as collections will permit.

Section 2—Receipts of such remittance must be acknowledged by the Secretary-Treasurer by the beneficiaries, within five (5) days from receipt

thereof.

### ARTICLE 7-DUES AND PENALTIES

Section 1—Any member of this Association failing to remit, upon due due notice from the Secretary-Treasurer of the death of a member, within thirty (30) days from said notice, the sum of \$1.00 shall forfeit all claims upon this Association for a period of thirty (30) days, and if he shall fail to comply with the provisions of this Article for sixty (60) days, he shall cease to be a member of this Association, and may be reinstated only upon the conditions provided for by Article 5 of this Constitution.

Section 2—A notice directed and mailed to the Post Office address of a member as recorded in the books of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be deemed a legal notice.

#### ARTICLE 8-EXPENSES

Section 1—Expenses of collections and the disbursement of the mortuary dues shall be provided for from the entrance and reinstatement fees fund, or from such amounts as may be in the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer when each case shall be declared closed at the expiration of Forty (40) days after the notice of the death of a member.

Section 2—When the expense account shall have reached the sum of \$100.00, \$75,00 of said amount shall be transferred to the benefit fund.

Section 3—The dues of the Secretary-Treasurer and his wife shall be remitted as payment for services rendered.

### ARTICLE 9-AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended only by the concurrent vote of three-fourths of all the members present at a regular annual meeting of this Association, providing that all such amendments shall have first been submitted to the Executive Committee for review, sixty (60) days next before the annual meeting of this Association.

### BY-LAWS

#### FIRST-FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of this Association shall be from April 1st to March 31st inclusive.

### SECOND-VACANCIES

Vacancies in office may be filled, ad interim, by the Executive Com-

mittee, and all such officers shall serve until the succeeding annual meeting of this Association.

### THIRD—RESERVE FUND

Section 1—In order to provide a Reserve Fund from which to supplement the amount paid from the Mortuary Dues Fund, each member shall be asked to contribute to the Reserve Fund an additional sum of ten cents (10c) per week, or \$5.20 per year, payable in advance, for a period of five (5) years next after the adoption of this provision, or becoming a member of this Association.

Section 2—Beneficiaries of the Reserve Fund shall be paid such amounts from the Reserve Fund as shall be necessary to supplement the amount paid from the Mortuary Dues Fund up to and including the sum of \$250.00 per member.

Section 3—When the Reserve Fund shall have reached the sum of \$5,000 benefits shall be increased at the rate of 1% of the invested fund, a like increase of ½ of 1% to be so appropriated for every additional increase of \$1,000 until the Association shall pay to beneficiaries the sum of \$500.00 upon the death of a member in good standing at the time of death, provided, however, that only such persons shall participate in the benefits of the Reserve Fund as shall have complied with section 1 of this rule.

Section 4—All monies remaining in the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer at the end of the fiscal year shall be invested in approved securities, interest on the same to be added to the supplemental amounts needed during the ensuing year, upon the death of a member as heretofore provided for.

Unexpended balance of interest at the end of the year shall be turned over to the expense account in the collection and distribution of this fund.

Section 5—Payments of the Reserve Fund, by indivdual members, may be made quarterly, semi-annually, in advance, the desire in each case to be stated at the beginning of such contribution to this fund, or as the exegencies of the case may demand.

Section 6—All payments shall be made to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Mutual Relief Association of the Maryland Annual Conference who shall notify each subscriber, inaccordance with his or her stated convenience of the time of payment.

Section 7—The Treasurer of this Fund shall be bonded to the extent of \$5,000 and shall be paid, from the Reserve Fund, the sum of \$50.00 per annum for services rendered.

### SUPERANNUATED FUND REGULATIONS

The Committee on Superannuated Claimants shall report to Conference all those names which, in their judgment, properly belong to the superannuated list.

2. From the receipts from the invested fund, each superannuated minister be entitled to \$15 for each year of his active service as a member of this Conference, and each widow of a minister of this Conference who is granted a superannuated relation, be entitled to \$7.50 for each year of her active service.

3. The amount received from the collections in the District during the year to be applied to the necessities of the claimants, considering: 1 The time of service in the Conference; 2. The size of family; 3. Peculiarities of condition; 4. Ability to contribute to self-support by business

capacity or by private income.

That when the Committee on Superannuates has information from claimants to the effect that they do not need the amount required by virtue of their years of service, that the committee be governed by the information thus given. (For items 2, 3, 4, see report H. Supernnuates, 1914 Minutes.)

5. The Conference Treasurer shall disburse all moneys coming from the Supernnuated Fund Society, and shall make a quarterly distribution of the funds provided the Treasurer of said Society can make

a payment in the interim of Conference.

6. When the committee shall have completed its report it shall be read to the Conference twenty-four hours before action thereon, during which time objections to report must be filed before the committee.

7. The Corresponding Secretary of the Superannuated Fund Society shall furnish Superannuated Claimants with blanks containing the following questions, a neglect to answer which shall deprive the claimants of any portion in the distribution of the emergency fund for the year::

- 1. What is your present place of residence? Postoffice address?
- 2' Do you desire a superannuate relation the ensuing year?
- 3. What is the number of your family? Age of your children, respectively.
  - 4. Do you attend our church? If not, why not?
  - 5. Do your children attend Sabbath School? If not, why not?
  - 8. What is the amount of your private income?
- 7. If a widow, how long were you in the ministry with your husband?

## **OBITUARIES**

## REV. JOHN MATTHEW HOLMES

Rev. John Matthew Holmes was born in Baltimore, June 22, 1845. He was converted January 18, 1861. Enlisted in the U. S. Army September 18, 1861. Discharged with honor, October 20, 1862. Reinlisted June 23, 1863. Final discharge, with honor, January 26, 1864. He was June 20, 1000. licensed to preach October 27, 1864. Received in the Maryland Conference 1865. He was married three times. Three children who call him blessed, survive: Mrs. Lily Holmes Gurley, High Point, N. C.; Mrs. Lulu Holmes Potter, Harrington, Del.; John M. Holmes, Greenville, S. C. He was superannuated 1917. The historical record shows that he gave fifty-two unbroken years of service to this Conference. served the least and the greatest with equal consideration. He was no respecter of persons. John Blunt was his name, but he was a christian gentleman just the same. John Matthew Holmes judged by any noble standard of greatness, was a great man. It cannot be necessary for me to recount the story of his life. Suffice it to say-during the sad days of his affiliction, the public mind had again and again expressed the career of this illustrious citizen, soldier, and preacher of the Gospel. His story is not a striking or dramatic one, but such a story as American men and women take pride in: and justly so. He was proud of his ancestry, and out of the suffering and hardship and heroism of Godly parentage, came this soldier of the Cross, and follower of the Lamb. He was a man of rare intellect, which lifted him into great places and made him to be illustrious there, not by anyone supreme quality of intellect, but by a splendid balance of intellect and of character, so that he stood forth, and will ever stand forth in our annals as a representative American of the highest type, and among the greatest of preachers. He was a typical American gentleman in a personal dignity of self-respect. His name was never associated with that kind of law making by which men seek to advance their own personal fortunes, but always did he stand four square for equal rights to all, and special privileges to none. No man could ever look John M. Holmes in the face, even after digging out of the grave of the past old animosities and opposition and say, that he was not true to what he believed to be right. His character grew out of a consciousness exercised toward God. He had a conviction that he knew about. His theology was the Christ, and he loved to tell the story of Jesus and His love. He had a wonderful vision, and his descriptive power was unique. He never took stock in opinions, but he stressed convictions. He was a man seated, who had arrived, and he held his seat against indifference and opposition. He was decidedly out of date in higher church circles of today. His admonition and call was-back to the Christ, and learn there the lesson, that only as we save men into that great christian brotherhood, which makes him that is exalted abased, and him that is abased exalted, can we protect our Churches and Society. His faith in Jesus was so great and his convictions so strong that he was willing to die for them. He believed all

things taught in the word of God and they closed questions, not open for reconsideration or revision. It was "Thus saith the Lord," and that ended it. He was not afraid to measure ewords with the devil. He had his eye on an ideal manhood and an ideal world, and for these he labored at whatever cast. The test of his genuineness was his ability to hold on. There is no work so full of encouragement as that which John M. Holmes accomplished, The work of Victory.

Rev. A. W. Mather, a life-long friend, was too ill to write or dictate. He said he felt sure he could subscribe to all that the Committee wrote.

Rev. G. J. Hooker says: Dr. J. M. Holmes was a good man. He was a man of wonderful endowments. Strong in body, somewhat stern of countenance, powerful in preaching, he challenged the church with a Gospel of high and holy living. His abilities and attainments placed him in the front ranks of the men of his Conference. He was a preacher of remarkable ability, a devout student of the Bible and also a student of nature. Those combined abilities made him a great man. Dr. Holmes was a man of decided convictions and wonderful breadth of intellect, but unlike many men of that type, he was exceedingly tender and sympathetic. One could not understand him from a mere casual acquaintanceship, you had to know him, and to know him was to love him. many of us he had his own peculiar characteristics, but his breadth of mind was such that he did not impose them on others, but reserved the right to maintain them for himself. He did his own thinking, but he was not confined to narrow provincialisms. He was liberal in his thought. clear in his interpretations of truth, conscious always of God's will concerning himself, and in the power of God's will with respect to others. He had a keen sense of "seeing Him who is invisible." His life has meant much to me and I loved him unto the end.

T. Irven Rothel, pays tribute thus: Ah! John M. Holmes. How the mention of that name brings back to the older members of West Baltimore Station memories of the days of long ago. He was twice pastor of this charge. He was a stately and dignified representative of the Christ he preached: and was loved and esteemed by the membership and congregation generally. He was powerful in his preaching, and the financial impetus given to the workers and the work is felt to this day. He was a student of the Bible and was always prepared to quote it in answer to the arguments prompted by the adversary. He wrote a booklet, "How to study the Bible" that was instructive and helpful to all During his leisure hours, he was fond of painting and who read it. executed some pictures of Land and Sea that would do credit to a professional artist. He painted in oil a picture of the left hand of Christ, showing the nail driven through the palm, and the blood streaming from it. This was framed in gold and hung on the wall of his study and became an object lesson to all who were privileged to see it, reminding him and the visitors of the suffering and death of the Christ for us. Perhaps his greatest sermon was on "The Great White Throne." Without doubt he was able to give a good account of himself when he appeared there in Glory.

A. R. Crocket says: Dr. John M. Holmes was probably the greatest preacher of the Methodist Protestant Church. His explanation of the Gospel was so plain that children could understand his wonderful sermons. He told me when preaching he seldom used words with two syllables if words of one syllable would answer, because he wanted all children to understand what he said. When lying the corner stone of Mount Pleasnt Church he wrote on a brick, Jesus Christ and placed it in position. On the top of the ball on the steeple he wrote, Jesus Christ, and remarked that, that name was the foundation and top stone of everything he attempted to do. Nothing could change him in the least from the right as he saw it. He left an indelible impression for good wherever he preached.

C. A. Smith says: John M. Holmes became pastor of Harrington Methodist Protestant Church in April 1911. His pastorate here lasted four years, and it proved to be his last. His stay among us during those years was pleasant and successful. As a pastor when you knew him, he was kind, loving and thoughtful. He was not given to much local visiting,, but to those who needed his service, he was not surpassed. As a citizen, no one in town was held in higher esteem. He lived a clean life, in habits, in speech, in person. No unkind or unclean word escaped his lips. As a preacher, he was simply great. He loved to preach, he knew how. The Gospel that he preached was the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He believed the Bible, every bit of it, and nothing could move him from it. A great and good man had gone from us.

A. L. Wix says: I did not have the pleasure of knowing Dr. Holmes until he came to Harrington as our Pastor. He was then called an old man: but he was yet vigorous and active and a great preacher. I esteemed it a great privilege to have so good a preacher for my Pastor, and a great honor to have so good a man for my friend. He was a man often misunderstood by many, and by them misjudged: but to those who knew him well, and had the same conceptions of the Fundamentals of life and of religion: who had the same vision of the Christ life and had the same appreciation of the privileges and the duties of citizenship, to these he was a friend, a counsellor, a teacher and a guide. He was a great preacher: A great Christian and a great citizen.

I esteemed it an honor to be the pastor of John M. Holmes. I knew him well. I saw him from every angle during thirty-two years association. I practically lived with him for three years. I have seen him in strength, I have seen him in weakness and suffering, and the spirit of patience and submission he displayed in the most trying hour, was beautiful.

"He did not murmur nor complain, Beneath the chastening rod, But in the hour of grief and pain He leaned upon His God.

I was with Lulu and George (her husband) in the night when the death angel came, July 2, 1925. That scene I shall never forget. There we nothing left undone for the comfort of Dr. Holmes. Lulu and George gave their all, for him who was theirs.

The funeral service was held in the Harrington Methodist Protestant Church July 5. Dr. G. I. Humphreys, President of the Maryland Conference, paid tribute to the memory of this hero, and expressed the sympathy of the Conference. Rev. G. J. Hooker spoke in tender words and with much feeling concerning his spiritual advisor, at whose feet he sat, gaining deep views of himself, and his Saviour too. There were nine Ministers present. The chairman of this obituary committee preached the sermon. We laid the body of our beloved friend to rest in the Harrington Cemetery, to await the coming of Him who said: I am the resurrection and the Life; he that believeth in me, tho he were dead yet shall he live: and whosover liveth and believeth in me shall never die.

### MRS. GEORGE QUINTON BACCHUS

"We spend our years as a tale that is told," says a writer in the Great Book, and, were the secrets of all hearts disclosed, if now we might be known as also we shall be known, we should find that every life would have its full measure of interest and importance. should find the full range and play of human emotion, the far out-reaches of longing and desire, the whole gamut of joy and sorrow, of hopes attained and bitter loss. To some it is given to occupy large place in the minds of men, whose activities are written that all may read; there are others whose lives are hid away, whose work is barely known. They spend their years in inconspicious manner, their thought is not of themselves, the circle of friends is apparently restricted, the home perhaps is the only geography they know. The courage of the books, the heroism of fabled story, the fiction of great achievement is not for them. Theirs is the courage of the common place, the glory of monotony. And perhaps when the tale is fully told we shall find that to them shall come the largest reward.

This is the lot of most women. Their lives are lost in their husbands and their children; they live for and in them. Men, for the most part, would be unwilling to accept so inconspicuous a place. They have the easier place. And just as the responsibilities of place and position goad or lure them on by so much are they supported and strengthened in their tasks and less indeed is the credit and glory due them.

It does not take long to say that Carrrie Blanche McPherson Bacchus was born in Baltimore, November 14, 1853, and that she died in

Riverdale, Maryland, November 22, 1925, just a few days beyond seventy-two years of age; that her father was John McPherson; that she was educated through the High School of Baltimore; that in 1876 she became a member of the old Washington Street Church, Baltimore, under the pastorate of Rev. R. Scott Norris; that while visiting one wonderful summer at the home of Rev. S. A. Hoblitzell in Harford County, Maryland, she met the young preacher, who was to become her husband; that on May 16, 1878, in her home church she became the wife of George Quinton Bacchus of the Maryland Conference and that on March 19, 1879, she became the happy mother of a beloved daughter, Clara Greenwood, now married to George V. Earnshaw and herself now the mother of three splendid children.

That is the simple record and were that all it would seem to be altogether too short, inadequate. But that is not all, they are but dates which marked the beginnings; they are but ports out of which loving hearts with high hopes went faring forth for high adventure; they were but turns in the road which leading from childhood's home carried one far away, in strange journeys, to strange places, through valley and over hill, a road sometimes uncertain and difficult but leading at last to the sunset home, accompanied by the loving ministrations of those who loved her best of all.

Mrs. Bacchus was a good woman, interested in worthy causes and a loyal supporter of her husband in his ministerial work. She was active in the various departments of church life, teaching in the Sunday School and engaged in all the things which women so devotedly do for a church. Her best work however was in the home which she made happy for her husband and daughter and where she delighted to entertain her friends.

Rev. J. W. Trout, a life long friends of the family, writes this tribute: "Sister Bacchus was a superior woman and possessed many excellent qualities, among them was one that impressed me forcibly, her generous hospitality. She was also remarkable for her resourcefulness which she displayed in making the parsonage comfortable as a home It mattered not whether the and inviting and hospitable to guests. furnishings were elaborate or plain, artistic skill knew how to make them appear to their best advantage. Mrs. Bacchus was an efficient co-laborer with her husband, and much of the success achieved by them was due to her resourcefulness. I think however that the parsonage displayed her greatest efficiency in its immaculate cleanliness its artistic arrangement as the preacher's home. No charge ever had reason to blush or even feel anxious about the condition of the parsonage where Mrs. Bacchus presided as the preacher's wife. As a hostess she was an expert, and not only did she know how to entertain her guests but she did it well. She spared neither labor or expense when the comfort of her gueste was considered. I am not surprised that her husband and daughter feel that they have sustained an irreparable loss and my heart beats in profound sympathy as I pray the Lord to sustain them in their bereavement."

Rev. D. W. Anstine, also a frequent visitor to the home and always

welcome to the family circle sends this word: "Mrs. Bacchus was a splendid woman. During the forty year of our acquaintance our families frequently exchanged visits. In her home she was an ideal hostess, in our home she was a delightful guest. To the poor, the needy, the sick no one was kinder. Many a night she sat by the bedside of the sick soothing, comforting, ministering. Some people did not know Mrs. Bacchus; they knew who she was but did not know what she was—the big, generous heart within her. She may have had her faults, but selfishness was not one of them. She was a good woman and I believe she has gone to her true home.

Judge F. W. Whitaker of Lynchburg, Va., speaking of their residence in that city says: "When they were here Mrs. Bacchus was very much liked by all the members of the church and the people generally who knew her. I believe this was true wherever they lived."

And here is the estimate of a woman, Miss Mollie S. Hammond of St. Michaels, Md.: "What do I know of dear Mrs. Bacchus? Only the true and the beautiful. Brother Bacchus and his wife were strangers to us when they came to St. Michaels but during their stay and ever since we were devoted, loyal friends. She was untiring in the church work, always forgetting self and reaching out to give the cup of cold water to those about her. I love to recall the wonderful talks she and I had together for her beautiful faith always strengthened mine. She was a great worker in the Sunday School, always so enthusiastic and ever finding some new interest for her pupils. As a family we were devoted to Brother and Sister Bacchus and as the years went by we grew nearer and dearer to each other and their visits to the old home were ever hailed with delight. Dear friends, never again may we look upon your sweet face in this life, but in that "House not made with hands, eternal in the heavens," pray God we shall meet.

'In the morn when the day was awaking, When sunlight through darkness and shadow was breaking, Jesus came in the fulness of glory, And took out of the world His own.'"

Suddenly, near, midnight, the angel came and called her away. She had not been well for sometime but no one dreamed the time was so near at hand. Whether it was a cerebral hemorrhage or dilation of the heart was not known; but it was soon over and she was at rest with God.

The services were at the daughter's home, Riverdale, Maryland, conducted by the writer assisted by Rev. T. H. Lewis, president of the General Conference and Rev. A. N. Ward president of Western Maryland College. Pastors of our Washington churches were the pall bearers.

So ends for the time being just one more life story. The pitcher is broken at the fountain, the silver cord is loosed. But there is One

who knows how to reassemble the broken things of earth and He will give them back renewed and glorified.

### CONFERENCE SERMON

#### THE MAJOR EMPHASIS IN CHRISTIANITY

Text:- John 2, 5.

"Whatsoever He sayeth unto you, do it."

Text:- Matthew 28, 20.

"Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

#### C. R. STRAUSBURG

These words of Jesus and by Jesus reveal Him to us as a Master. The former text not only reveals the unbounded faith of Mary in Jesus to remove the embarrassment occasioned by a "wineless wedding" by the expectation of Him performing the miraculous. Not only were the disciples more abundantly of their growing faith in Him as a promised Messiah or as a great Prophet, but they are the first recorded human utterance revealing that an intimate relationship was to exist between Jesus and His followers—that of Master and disciple.

A recent issue of a popular magazine contained an interesting article on the subject "Comparative Religion." The author defines the Christian Religion as being the "Gospel of a Person and the Religion of a Master." That, it was the religion apart from all other religions, because its message and its power center in the Person of its founder, Jesus Christ.

A careful study of the New Testament shows the truth of that statement. It teaches that men are saved to God and bound to God when they yield their lives in obedience to Christ, and recognize Him as their Saviour and Lord; to this end Christ came into the world and established confidence between Himself and His disciples; gathered a little company of men about Him and transformed their lives as He led them toward the cross upon which He was to die for their sins and for the sins of the whole world.

After His death He came from the grave, the old relationship, that of Master and disciple was not disturbed. He was still their Master, and for forty days He tarried and taught them the lesson of faith in God and in Him, exhorting them to "observe all things," to love Him, to follow Him and obey Him just as they had in Galilee, giving them the assurance, "I am with you alway even unto the end of the world."

These words are the keynote of the Gospel of John, presenting Jesus in intimate association with His disciples, governing their thoughts, determining their ideals and controlling every phase of their life. And the secret of their power and influence lay in the fact that they had yielded everything to Him, had abandoned every worldly propect and ambition for Him, and were looking for nothing in this world that did not come through Him.

That is what it meant then to be a disciple, today we cannot alter our understanding of what it meant then. It means the same today. It is the "Original Christianity." It is the Christianity of the New Testament, that of Master and disciple. That conception of christianity is an answer to the need of this hungry hearted age in which we live, for who of us doubt that this age needs a Master? A Master that will take away the veil from our eyes, solve our problems and empower us for service. What a great service is required of us today, herein we have the power for that service an attendant Christ.

As we thoughtfully study the need and desire of the day, we find a wholesome desire to return to Christ for our authority in religion. Not to the philosopher and his vagaries, nor to the credalist and the theologion with their "isms," but to Christ, and that is the only desire we need recognize in religion, and men are more becoming alive to the great fact of Christ. Christianity as understood and taught by Christ and the first Christians. As ministers and teachers we need to know that there is a desire in men to get "back to Christ" and to that end how simple is the relationship that existed between the Master and His disciples.

He did not make their approach to Him difficult nor the things that He wanted them to believe intricate. He laid down one requirement only—Personal attachment and loyal Obedience. No great array of theological and philosophical beliefs to harass and perplex and mystify. I am fearful that we are making it difficult for men, dimming the figure of Christ and His gospel obscure by our men made philosophies and creeds. Jesus did not ask His disciples to believe any thing that reason and heart did not tell them was true.

The religion that Jesus taught was an exceeding simple religion, an intensely practical religion and a believable religion. A religion of the broadest sympathies and wonderfully hopefull. He did not burden their minds and perplex their souls with man made pronouncements which serve only to embarrass. A certain writer was asked to define a certain religious dogma being much discussed and to give reasons for belief in same, proceeded to the task something like this. First, it is improbable. Second it is unintelligible. The Conclusion. It is believeable.

A theological student was asked to define faith. His answer "Faith is the power by which we are able to believe something we know 'aint' true." Jesus did violence to no man's reason nor made any tax of fellowship beyond the matter of personal loyalty. He stood before men and said, "I am the way the truth and the life." Follow Me." He offered Himself to them as a Master who loved them and would love them to the end of their restless flitting days. They were Christ's men. He was their Master, that was all.

My brethern today we cannot alter that understanding of Christianity. The organization and the multiplication and the development of christian institutions make no difference. Mischief is created through the impression that in some way Christianity has been shifted from the old basis of love and devotion to Jesus Christ to faith in a system of

doctrines about Him. In Richmond a few years ago, a Jewish Rabbi, said that it was Paul that doctrinized Christianity, that it was that here of our faith that took Christianity from its natural setting, devotion and love to Jesus Christ and made out of it an intricate philosophy. We find a warrant for no such conclusons in the deliverances of Paul. The Jew, though a Rabbi, is not the best interpreter of Paul, for the Jew cannot interpret him in the light of his spiritual experience. What was that experience? On his way to Damascus his great mind and soul breathing hate, his life was transformed into love and devotion unparalelled in the history of the Christian Church. What occasioned this great change? Was it a simple experience of the intellect? It was an experience of the heart. It was not a creed that turned him about and made him into a mighty apostle of righteousness, it was Jesus Christ. Paul recognized that Presence for he said, "Who art thou Lord?"

When he came to the end of his wonderful life, and from a gloomy prison cell made to a friend a declaration of his faith, he did not say, "I know what I have believeth, but I know whom I have believed."

I suppose the Christian Church needs the restraint of orthodoxy. I suppose it has a right to draw a circle and say to those within "You are orthodox," and to those without, "You are heterodox," but it must not stop short of Jesus Christ Himself.

We have heard men shout about the praises of the "old time religion" and speak in praise of the "good old days." But what do you mean by the "good old days" and the "good old time" and the "old time religion"? The old-time religion is good enough if you go back far enough to get it. When you talk about the "good old days," do you mean the creeds of the past, the shibboleths, the screw, the rack, the torture to mold the minds of men? Do you mean those days in which men passed under the rod of compulsion? The "old time religion" is good enough if we go back far enough to get it, back to the New Testament, back to Jesus Christ. Standards of authority and Scriptural interpretation wrought out by self appointed leaders under theological pressure are not vital standards as long as we have the New Testament to go by, and earnest minds and loving hearts searching after truth are making this Book their standard, and the life of Jesus their model.

There must not only be an acknowledgement of the Authority of Christ in religion, but unity of discipleship must be ours.

Christian Unity. Our Master prayed for that. The modern thinking world is clamorous for that. We are conscious of our lack of power. May it not be in the fact that in the past we have not only emphasized non-essentials, but we have not been united. Has it not been demonstrated again and again that the Christian Church, dominated by isms and creeds. flies off into fragments, and however eloquently we may find words to justify it, presents to the world a pitiable sight in that we have the appearance to the world of a battle between schools of thought. The world is not attracted by such an exhibition of Christianity. It is repelled by such an exhibition. You have probably

heard of the riots that take place every year in Liverpool between the Catholics and the Orangemen. On this particular occasion a general fight was in progress. Windows were being smashed and heads were being cracked. A Chinaman who conducted a laundry in the neighborhood, became uneasy lest he become involved and his property be placed in jeopardy. As they fought and raged about, he ran out and hung this sign on his door, "Me no gotte religion, me washee clothes." The modern mind has no place for the controversy and wrangling in religion, and he cries out "A plague on all your houses."

This old world is desirous of a Master who will not only take the veil from our eyes, solve our problems and ease our heart aches, but a Master that will fuse our hearts into a great holy purpose. It is restless for the absolute and the final, to interpret Christ in the light of the absolute and the final. May that day speedily come.

The unutterable longing of the streets and the common sorrows of men is the old heart cry for the Master.

Deeply do we deplore the worldliness upon every hand, but is it not an evidence that there is a deep spiritual need unsatisfied, and to satisfy this men are rushing after a thousand gods and "isms."

It is not irreligion of the masses that should alarm us, but the unsatisfactory religion of our churches; men putting their hands to the work of God with no God in their hearts that should fill us with alarm and excite our deepest concern.

Christianity has the message for this modern world but it cannot be adequately stated in the terms and shiboleths of credalism. The world will never receive it until it is presented in the Living Personal Christ offered to men as a Master. The immediate question for every minister, for every christian laymen, for every man who is conscious of a world need, is whether his own faith is vital in this sense or not.

The finest contribution the late Hon. William Jennings Bryan gave to his day was his clarion call "Back to God." Within the church there must be first of all a recovery of Christ a personal recovery, not only an acknowledgment of His authority, but an experience of His blessed fellowship.

Whenever we have had the consciousness of His nearness we have been triumphant—whenever we have followed afar we have been discouraged, depressed, appalled. If today the followers of Jesus Christ everywhere would come to one mind of seeking and waiting for the sure presence and word of the Master, the manifestation of christian power would be overwhelming, and it would make us irresistable. Men who now drift outside of our churches would be drawn within, and that great army of our membership loosely held, only christians in a perfunctory sense, sitting in church pews, perfectly satisfied and perfectly useless, would be a blessing to the churches, and the churches themselves broken into fragments and creeds, would find unity and power in Jesus Christ.

An acknowledgment of His authority, unity in discipleship, then comes power for service.

I have read a book "Power for Service." Here it is, "All power is given unto me, Lo! I am with you."

The problem of power for service is the serious concern of our churches. I have two volumes issued by the "Inter Church World Movement," sent I presume to every pastor. They contain a world survey, American and Foreign volume. A survey of the field at home and abroad. Only a casual reading will convince one that we have a field of wonderful opportunities and tragic necessities. We cannot but help conclude that if the church is to do Christ's work in the world, enormous demands must be responded to.

How may it be done? I think it is clear to you that merely giving our money, as essential as that is, will not do it. The formulation of programs and the inauguration of systems, as vital as these may be, will not do it. How may it be done? When Jesus indicated to His disciples what their work was to be, he made plain the difficulties of that work. He hid nothing of the hardships of their task from them. They were bound to suffer and be as sheep among wolves. They were poor and they were weak, and the world was big and harsh and cruel, and how were they to do it. No purse, no scrip. He had but one assurance to give them. He assured them that He would go with them, and of His unfailing presence in every time of need. "All power is given unto me, Lo! I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

Now the difficulties that confront the discipleship of Jesus today and the neccesity to go out and meet them are even more appalling than in the days of Jesus. The age in which Jesus lived was not the "golden age" by any means. Neither is this the "golden age." We have a long way yet to travel. It is an age of "money madness, social rot and mechanical insanity," and to propose that this modern world of our, this world of selfishness, lewdness and looseness; to propose that this world shall be conquered for Christ, and that His kingdom shall be set up everywhere, is a stupendous proposition, and it would be an impudent proposition if there were nothing but human resources to draw on; but we have the same pledge and promise that the first christians had. We are the servants of an attendant Master and we do not work alone.

Here is the neccessity of getting back to Christ, to the power of His directing authority we must go if we would wage a strong battle for God.

The consecration of which every christian is capable of must wait for a leader, a Master to command it. Human courage always springs to the call of a beloved leader. Napoleon on the field of battle "was equivalent to a reinforcement of forty thousand men." Stonewall Jackson died and the strong right arm of the South was paralyzed, but under the leadership of the beloved Lee it "carried on."

Men do not readily die for a Cause. neither are they provoked to the highest heroism by a System: a Grand Enterprise of itself will fail. The source of our enthusiasm is the personal Master: the Master who walks and talks with us and tells us what to do. It is the Christ Himself who inspires, and living close enough to Him to have Him tell us what to do, the abandonment of everything is not beyond us.

The same Master who accepted from the hand of a hesitant, timid woman, the alabaster box and built out of it a monument of enduring fame.

The Master who took Peter's boats and nets and caught multitudes of fishes, and then called him to be a "fisher of men."

The Master who commanded Paul, lifted him out of bigotry and made out of him a mighty "engine of righteousness" and a world figure, can take our lives and the things that we have and out of them build a monument of service that shall stand forever. It is the old old story of Master and disciple we call to you today. It has been demonstrated in a thousand ways and repeated a thousand times, that a man with Jesus Christ and Jesus Christ in a man is capable of all sacrifice, and for the man who walks and talks with Him there is no failure.

Are we called on for a great consecration? Does our task require a great cervice? Is a great passion required of us? There is but one thing to do. Make a full surrender to Jesus Christ. We can never be what we ought to be by a partial obedience and half hearted service.

We need to give Him ourselves. He has give us Himself. He asks not for our things, makes no demand upon our property, lays no claim to our labors until we give Him ourselves.

"Whatsoever He sayeth unto you, do it" and, "Lo! I am with you even unto the end of the world."

### RULES OF ORDER AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE

Government of the Maryland Annual Conference.

Rule I. ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE. 1 Conference shall convene in Annual session on the first Wednesday in April, except in such years as Easter falls on the Sunday immediately following the first Wednesday, when it shall convene on the Wednesday following Easter.

The Pastor shall send to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the certificate of election of the delegate or delgates to the Annual Conference immediately after the election of the same. He shall also send the name to the President of the Conference and to the pastor of the

Church where the Conference is held.

3. The Secretary shall make a list of the delegates so certified, omitting all contested cases; and this list, together with the list of the ministerial members, shall constitute the roll of Conference upon which the Conference shall organize.

The churches shall be assessed in a sum sufficient to meet the incidental expenses of the Conference, including the publication of the Minutes-each church receiving Minutes in proportion to the amount contrib-

Rule II. OFFICERS OF THE CONFERENCE. Duties of the President:—1. To take the chair precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.

- 2. See that the business of the Conference shall proceed according to these Rules of Order and other Rules and Regulations adopted by the Conference.
- 3. Shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference.
- 4. Preserve the most rigid order, and confine the members to the subject under consideration.

Not allow improper personalities nor reflections upon any religious communities.

- Announce each person arising to speak as soon as he shall have addressed the chair by declaring him "The minister from ———," or "The delegate from -
- State a question sitting, but stand when the question is put and taken; also when he states a point of order, and also when he makes any formal communication to the Conference.

Is not allowed to vote when a question is taken unless there be a

tie, but he may vote in case of ballot.

9. May call any member to the chair when he wishes to participate in debate or for other purposes, but such person shall not be entitled to the chair after adjournment.

10. The office of stationing the ministers and preachers is committed to the hands of the President of the Conference.

11. It shall be the duty of the President to fill blanks in statistical reports for all charges unsupplied.

12. In the event of the death of any ministerial member or his wife or widow, the President shall immediately appoint an Obituary Committee from any number of the most intimate acquaintances of the deceased.

The President of the Conference is relieved from the usual plan of visitation on the Charges. He is to make survey of the District; assume general oversight of all church work; he is to use his official leadership in securing the most constructive development for the Charges. And so far as possible, he is to meet the Official Board of each Charge once

The failure of the President to visit any Charge does not vitiate his

right to the amount assessed on said Charge for his salary.

And each charge shall forward, not later than July 1st of each year, the amount levied thereon for President's salary to the Conference Treas-

urer-who shall pay monthly to the President his salary.

14. The President shall represent the general interests of the Conference, and shall present their claims in such a manner and at such times as in his judgment may be necessary. And he shall use his utmost efforts with the Quarterly Conferences of the various charges to secure a salary of not less than \$1,200 for the pastor. And he, the President, shall urge upon the various charges the prompt payment of the salaries of the pastors, and upon all the churches the importance of being incorporated.

Rule III. Duties of the Secretary:-1. To perform such duties as

are usually required of the Secretary of a deliberative body.

2. Should the President not be in place at the hour of meeting the Secretary, or in his absence one of his assistants, shall announce the fact, and the Conference shall elect a chairman "pro tempore" and proceed to business.

3. Have charge of all the papers belonging to the Conference and be

accountable for them.

4. Be in his place precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.

Keep an accurate list of members of the Conference, and be the

Committee on Credentials.

Keep correct minutes of the proceedings of the Conference, including all written resolutions, whether adopted or rejected, and the mover and seconder of such written resolutions.

7. Keep a list of business, on which he shall record all business brought before the Conference and in the order of its presentation.

8. Keep a list of committees, on which he shall record: First, the standing committees in the order of their arrangement in these rules, and second, all other committees that may be appointed, and in the order of their appointment.

Keep a correct list of the Circuits and Stations, to be used as

occasion may require.

Report to the Conference any unfinished business of the preced-

ing annual session.

11. He, with the Treasurer and Steward, shall be the Committee on the Preparation and Printing of the Conference blanks; and shall be the Committee on the Publication and Distribution of the Minutes.

12. Supply the pastors with blanks, and send blank personal report blanks to all ministers who are not pastors, on which they are to state the

relation to the Conference they desire for the ensuing year.

13. He shall have a printed record of the Minutes duly certified by himself, which shall be considered the Official Minutes of the Conference, substantially bound every quadrennium, and include in each volume a copy of the General Conference Journal.

Rule IV. Duties of Stewards and Treasurer:—1. The Conference Steward and the Treasurer shall constitute the Board of Stewards, to whom the Secretary shall hand all reports and collections as received from the pastors; and this Board shall be responsible to the Conference for all money and receipts and vouchers delivered to them.

2. They shall meet on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock and open

the pastor's envelopes containing the reports and collections; shall deliver the various parts of the reports as designated; shall note the agreement of the pastors' financial reports with the financial envelope and prepare the reports for the Conference. The financial envelopes shall be passed to the Treasurer, who shall have charge of all the moneys of the Conference for distribution, upon order of the Conference Steward, which shall be the voucher of the Treasurer for his transactions, to the persons designated by the Conference to receive them. The Treasurer shall disburse money collected by the Conference for every purpose; in which transactions he shall perform the work assigned heretofore to the Superannuated Fund Steward and of the Church Extension Steward, as per special rules of each Society, and he shall continue in office until his successor shall be elected. He shall keep a ledger and open account with some accepted bank, and his accounts shall be open for inspection at all times to the President of the Conference, or one designated by him.

Other duties belonging to the several Stewards shall be performed

and reported upon separately as now.

Rule V. COMMITTEES. All committees shall be appointed by the President, except when otherwise directed in the Book of Discipline, or by special vote of the Conference.

2. The Standing Committees shall be:—1. Board of Finance—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. The chairman to be appointed one year in advance.

Itinerancy and Orders-5 Ministers.

Pulpit Service—3 Ministers.
Superannuates—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
Literature and Education—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
Young People's Work—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Official Relations—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. 9.

- appointed until the death of some minister requires it.

  12. Missions—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

  13. President's Report—2 Ministers, 2 Laymen.

  14. Committee of Audit—2 Ministers, 1 Layman.

  15. Conference Program for the following session—3 Ministers (one of whom shall be the President), 3 Laymen.
- Appointees on the Executive Committee of Union of Young People's Work-3 Ministers (one of whom shall be the President), 2 Laymen.

Home For The Aged—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

- Conference Arrangements-The President and the Standing Dis-18. trict Committee.
- 19. Evangelism—3 Ministers and 3 Laymen. The President of the Conference a member, ex-officio, with voting power. (This an ad-interim committee.)

Any person being a member of two committees shall have the

right to decline an appointment to another.

4. When there are present Fraternal Messengers and other visitors to whom the courtesy of formal recognition is due, the Chairman of the Committee on Official Relations shall quietly inform the President, whereupon the President may request the visitors be brought to him, to be by him introduced to the Conference, either at that time or when the state of business may with more propriety be arrested.

The Committee on Official Relations shall read as a part of their report an "Honor Roll" of the charges which pay their assessments in full. And also the percentage of those charges paying less than 100 per cent.

Rule VI. ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE ANNUAL SESSION:-1. At 9 o'clock A. M., on the day to which the Conference adjourned from the last annual session, the President shall open the Conference by reading a portion of the Word of God, singing and prayer.

The Roll shall then be called, the Secretary reporting the names of absentees. In the event of the death of any member of this Conference, the chairman, or in his absence some member, of his Obituary Committee shall formally announce the fact to the Conference, and such announce-ment shall be made when the name of the deceased is reached in the calling of the Conference Roll, and the same thall then, on motion, be transferred to the Memorial Roll by the Secretary.

3. At 10.30 A. M. of the first day of each session of the Annual Con-

ference the President, or his substitute, shall preach a sermon, followed by the Lord's Supper. The President shall appoint some one to preach the Ordination Sermon at 11 A. M. on Sunday. The time for holding Me-morial Services for deceased members of the Conference shall be deter-

mined by the Conference Program Committee.

4. Examination of the President. At 2 P. M. the President shall call another minister to the chair and read his annual report. The chairman another minister to the chair and read his annual report. The chairman shall then address the Conference thus: "Brethren, you have heard the report of the President; shall his character pass?" In case of any charge against the official character of the President, it shall be handed to the Standing District Committee; and the chairman of that committee shall answer the question: "Shall his character pass?"

5. At 3 P. M. on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot, as follows: 1. President. 2. Secretary. 3. Steward. 4. Treasurer. The Steward and Treasurer elected at one session shall serve at the following session, and they shall appoint

at one session shall serve at the following session, and they shall appoint two assistants with the approval of the Conference. 5. Standing District Committee, consisting of three ministers and three laymen. 6. Committee

on Appeals, three ministers and three laymen.

6. Examination of Official Character. At 4 P. M. Wednesday the roll shall be called and the pastors shall deposit their reports, and the collections prescribed by the Conference, each in a sealed envelope, upon which shall be marked the amount, the name of the collection, the name of the pastor and the name of the charge in the box of the Conference Steward. The reports and charges against official character shall be handed to the Committee on Official Relations.

The sessions of Saturday shall end at noon, that the Committees may have time for their work, and that the President may have oppor-

tunity to interview delegates and ministers.

Rule VII. ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE DAILY SESSIONS:-On each day following the opening session there shall be held a devotional service from 10.45 to 11 A. M.

Reading of Minutes of the preceding day for correction and adoption.

Calling of the roll of charges in alphabetical order, for the presentation of any business by delegates or pastors from the churches they represent. When any such, upon recognition of the Chair, shall present any business it shall be recorded without debate on the list of business, or referred to the proper committee without motion.

4. Call for reports from Boards, Institutions and Societies, and communications, which shall be put upon the Secretary's desk to be taken up

in regular order, or made the order of the day.

5. Reports of standing and special committees called for in order, and they shall be handed to the Secretary to be read by him. They shall not report at any other time without special leave.

Miscellaneous business.

When any business is laid before the Conference it may be made the order of the day for any other day of the session and at a specific hour.

Unfinished business from the last annual session shall have precedence of all business except the order of the day.

9. Ordinary business shall have precedence in the order in which it

stands on the List of Business. 10. When any business is taken into consideration it shall not be interrupted by any other business except the order of the day or by adjournment.

Rule VIII. DECORUM:-1. When a member desires to present any business, or to speak to any question, he shall arise and address the Chair, "Brother President," and then pause until he is announced to the Conference, after which he may proceed addressing the chair, and restrict. ing his remarks to the subject before the Conference.

If two or more members rise at the same time, the President

shall determine which of them is entitled to the floor.

No interruption shall be allowed while a member is addressing

the chair, except a call to order by the President or by a member.

4. When a member is called to order he shall take his seat immediately, and be silent, until the President or member who made the call shall state the rule or order supposed to be infringed; after which the member called to order shall have the right to explain, and the President shall decide.

In deciding a question of order the President shall restrict himself to the rules of order, and any member declared to be out of order by the President may, if he obtain a second, appeal to the Conference. The question on such appeal shall be taken without debate, but the appellant may state the ground of his appeal. If the Conference sustains the chair, the member shall be allowed to proceed only in order.

No member shall speak oftener than twice to the same question, without special leave of the Conference, nor longer than fifteen minutes at any one time, unless by the same special permission.

Any member shall have the right to call for the reading of the

subject under consideration.

Every member shall report at roll call of the first day's session, and be present at the daily sessions of Conference.

Rule IX. MOTIONS:-1. Every motion shall be written, signed and read aloud by the mover, handed to the chair and read aloud by the Secretary, before any order can be taken upon it by the Conference: except motions for amendment, to lie on the table, the previous question, or to adjourn.

Any motion may be divided, if the sense will admit of the pro-

posed division.

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but to adjourn, to lie on the table, for the previous question, to commit, to substitute, to amend, or to make the order of the day; which several mo-tions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule; the first three to be taken without debate; and the first always in order. But when the report of a committee has been under discussion, the motion to lay on the table shall not prevail until the chairman of the committee shall have been heard once on the subject, if he desires to speak.

4. It shall be in order to move the previous question, or that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending—except in cases in which character is involved—and if sustained by two-thirds of members present the question shall be taken. It shall not be in order for a member to move the previous question or to move to lay on the table at the close of his speech in which the pending question has been discussed.

5. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a

select committee, and to a standing committee, the question on reference

to the standing committee shall be first put.

6. No motion to commit, or to lie on the table, being decided, shall be again allowed, on the same day, at the same stage of the proposition.
7. A motion, after it is seconded, is the property of the Conference,

and the mover has no power to withdraw or have it amended, without

leave.

No amendment shall be in order, further than an amendment to the amendment; but it shall be in order to move a substitute for the main question, and one amendment to the substitute, and if a substitute is accepted it shall replace the original proposition.

All motions to fix the place of the meeting of the Annual Con-

ference shall lie on the table twenty-four hours.

Rule X. VOTING .-- 1. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is being put shall vote, unless the Conference for a special reason shall excuse him.

2. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question, who is not within the bar at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of Conference, or when such member has been nec-

essarily absent.

 Votes for all Conference Officers, the Committee on Appeals, Standing District Committee, Trustees of the Maryland Annual Conference and all other officers of all other organizations shall be by ballot. Otherwise, voting shall be by yea and nay; but a division of the house being called a count vote shall be taken, members rising in their places and standing until they shall have been counted.

4. A member may change his vote at any time before the chair announces the decision of the question.
5. Blank ballots shall not be counted.

Ayes and nays, and a vote by orders shall be as prescribed in the Discipline.

Rule XI. AMENDING RULES AND REGULATIONS. All motions or resolutions, whether submitted by committees or individual members, contemplating an amendment to these Rules and Regulations, must so specify. Otherwise, such action shall not be binding upon any other session of the Conference than that at which the same is passed.

#### REGULATIONS.

Regulation I. DUTIES OF PASTORS. 1. The pastor shall seek the co-operation of the Stewards in collecting the assessments made by the Annual Conference, admonishing them of their duty in this matter as contained in the Discipline, under head of "Duties of Stewards."

It is the duty of pastors to examine and see that suitable deed be had for all churches, so as to secure them to the Methodist Protesta Church, and, whenever possible, have them incorporated.

Pastors are required to apportion the President's salary equital among the several appointments, and use their utmost endeavors to colle the same before the annual visit of the President.

4. Pastors are required to see that the families belonging to their respective charges are duly supplied with the Catechism of our Church.

- 5. Pastors are instructed to ascertain of those received into the Church whether they have been baptized, and if not, to administer the ordinance of baptism without unnecessary delay.
- 6. Every pastor is required to do his utmost to collect the full amount of the assessments made upon his charge, whatever may be the difficulties that he may encounter.

7. It is the duty of the pastor to preside on the trial of an accused

unstationed Minister or Preacher.

Pastors, when changing appointments, shall hand to their succes-

sors a plan of the work of the charge.

9. Station and Circuit Stewards shall furnish the pastor with a sufficient number of Disciplines, that he may be able to present each new member with a copy, in compliance with Disciplinary law.

10. That no minister of this Conference shall give his consent or assistance to building a church or parsonage on a lot that is not deeded unconditionally to an incorporated board of Methodist Protestant Trustees.

11. No minister of this Conference shall go as a loan to any church outside of the Maryland Conference unless said church is willing to contribute to the Superannuated Fund of this Conference.

12. All pastors are required to submit in detail to the Board of Survey all plans their churches may have for new church buildings and parsonages, remodeling or extensive improvements, locations for buildings, etc., for advice and counsel, before giving their consent to or proceeding with the execution of their plans. This is done that churches may have advantage of the study and experience of the conference in all such matters. Further, no church shall receive any appropriation from Conference Funds until this Board of Survey shall have reviewed their plans and

passed favorably upon same.

All married pastors of the Conference shall be guaranteed a minimum salary of \$1,200, and parsonage, and that where the charge either cannot or will not pay the said amount this Conference undertakes to pay out of Conference Funds the difference between the amount the charge pays and the \$1,200, except in cases where the pastors agree to serve for less than the minimum salary to accommodate personal situations.

Further, under the Minimum Salary Regulation, it shall be understood that the maximum appropriation shall not exceed \$300, except in

such cases as are specifically recommended by the Board of Survey. See Minutes 1923, page 65, item 16.

14. All pastors of the Conference shall be required to give at least two weeks of their time for evangelistic services during the year, if needed, under the direction of the Committee on Evangelism, provided that pastors shall be given three weeks' notice of their appointment.

15. Pastors, in arranging for their regular Quarterly Conference, shall give the President of the Conference at least two (2) weeks advance notice of date of such meeting, so that the President may be aided in so arranging his itinerancy as to meet the most Quarterly Conference Sessions possible during the year.

Regulation II. SUFFRAGE AND ELIGIBILITY. 1. Every minister,

preacher and member in full communion and fellowship having attained

the age of twenty-one years shall be entitled to vote in all cases.

All members in full Communion and fellowship shall have the right to vote in the election of their class-leader; and those who have attained the age of twenty-one years shall be "qualified members" for the purpose indicated in Section 3 of Article IV of the Constitution, and in division 1 and 4 of "General Duties of Trustees," of the Discipline.

3. Every minister, preacher and lay member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-five years shall be eligible

as a representative in the General Conference.

4. Every member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible as a Steward, Class-leader and Sunday-School Superintendent, Trustee and a Delegate to the Annual Conference.

No minister shall be eligible to the office of President of the Annual Conference until he shall have faithfully exercised the office of Elder two years. And no minister shall be elected to the office of President of the Annual Conference for more than three years in succession.

The Conference strongly disapproves the secret ballot for the removal or return of the pastor, and condemns the complimentary vote that asks for the pastor's return in the public meeting and seeks his removal at the Annual Conference.

Regulation III. THE PRESIDENT'S PARSONAGE. 1. The Conference endorses the actions of the Committee in the purchase of the proper-

ty, 3600 Copley Road, Baltimore, as the President's parsonage.
2. The assessment of \$4,500 shall be continued under the name of "President's Salary," to be appropriated as follows; nine-tenths of the amount raised to be paid to the President as his salary and traveling expenses. One-tenth of the amount raised to be paid to the Agent of the President's parsonage, who shall pay out of this amount, the water rent, insurance and needful repairs of the property.

Regulation IV. RECORDS OF TRIAL CASES. In all cases of the

trial of a minister, the Secretary of the Trial Committee shall make a correct record of the proceedings of the trial, and turn the same over to the Secretary of the Conference, together with a copy of the charges, and specification, a copy of the finding, or verdict of the Committee-and all other documentary evidence used in the trial, to be kept by the Secretary among the records of the Conference.

Regulation V. WITHOUT APPOINTMENT AND SUPERNUMER-ARY REQUESTS. All requests to be left without an appointment for the ensuing year, or for a supernumerary relation, shall be referred by the Conference to the Committee on Official Relations for consideration and report thereon before such requests shall be granted.

Regulation VI. SABBATH SCHOOLS. 1. As a preparation for more efficient study and teaching of the Word, teachers' meetings should be statedly held under the direction of the pastor or superintendent.

2. Pastors are directed to carry out the Discipline regulations concerning the organization of our Sabbath Schools into Foreign Missionary

Societies and the taking of a collection every quarter for Foreign Missions.

3. Children's Day shall be faithfully observed by all our Sabbath Schools, and the money received on that day shall be exclusively devoted to the Children's Day offering for Foreign Missions.

Regulation VII. HOME FOR THE AGED. 1. Every charge shall elect or appoint a Lady Visitor from each church on the charge, where there is more than one appointment, and that the duties of this representative be defined as follows: Shall be attended to the charge. sentative be defined as follows: She shall be expected to maintain a sympathetic understanding of the Home in her church; to visit the Home whenever convenient; to co-operate with the Board of Lady Superintendents in securing special donation of money, food and supplies, and so far as possible to promote the interests of the Home in her local church."

2. The list of charges failing to meet the requirement of the Conference relative to Our Church Home shall be read at each session of the

Conference.

The second Sunday of November of each year shall be known as "Donation Day" for Our Church Home, and all our pastors are instructed to call the attention of their congregations thereto, and an endeavor made to have donations of provisions, groceries and things needed to conduct the Home, sent to Mrs. Chas. Billingslea, Westminster, Md. Regulation VIII. ADMINISTERING ORDINANCES. No person, in

virtue merely of a license to preach, or even election to orders, is empow-

ered to administer or assist in administering the Christian ordinances.

Regulation IX. UNSTATIONED MINISTERS. The Conference will
not recognize as a minister of the Methodist Protestant Church any man who does not bring credentials from some other orthodox denomination, or who has not received suitable testimonials of ministerial character from our own Church. In returning the list of ministers and preachers, pastors

shall name no person who does not possess the foregoing qualifications.

Regulation X. LOTTERIES. The practice of raising funds for church purposes, by means of lotteries and other games of hazards is disapproved by the Conference, and pastors are enjoined to discountenance their use.

Regulation XI. MORTGAGING CHURCH PROPERTY. The placing of morgtage upon church property for the purpose, directly, or indirectly, of paying the pastor's salary, is, so far as it has authority, disallowed by the Conference.

Regulation XII. OBITUARIES. 1. It shall be the duty of the Committee, appointed in accordance with the Rule of Conference, to prepare an obituary, without delay, containing a notice of the place and date of the birth of the brother, the date of his conversion, receiving license to preach, and his reception into the Conference, together with any other important facts connected with his history which their judgment may dictate, in addition to the particulars of his death, and said obituary shall be reported to the ensuing session of Conference.

Every ministerial member of this Conference is hereby requested to make and keep by him a record of his nativity, and of all the promi-

nent acts in his Christian and ministerial history.

The obituaries of wives and widows of the ministerial members of the Conference shall also be published in the Minutes.

Regulation XIII. MARRIAGES. The Conference cannot encourage any of its members to expect support as married men until they shall have served at least four years in the itinerancy.

Regulation XIV. TITLES AND DEGREES. Inasmuch as the degree of Doctor of Philosophy is the badge of University work and most rigid examinations-a degree which our better Colleges refuse to confer, and Universities do not confer for honor, but only for merit in advanced special studies-we feel sure no worthy institution would confer such a title for work done by correspondence, and the man who consents to bear a title so conferred subjects himself to the ridicule of scholars and involves the ministry in a charge of vanity and insincerity. Therefore, this Conference expresses its disapproval of this method of obtaining degrees, and declines

to recognize in any way a title so obtained.

Regulation XV. UNFERMENTED WINE. The Conference recom-

mends the use of unfermented wine in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Regulation XVI. DROPPING MEMBERS. Persons whose names are on the church register and cannot be found, or who have ceased to take an interest in the church, may be dropped from the record by a vote of the church; provided further, that in stations these changes may be made by the Quarterly Conference.

Regulation XVII. PASTORS' MOVING EXPENSES. As the Discipline grants the Annual Conference the right to "make such regultaions as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the ministers and preachers," it is the judgment of this Conference that the charge to which a minister or preacher is assigned should pay the moving expenses of the incoming pastor.

Regulation XVIII. CAMP-MEETINGS. 1. Camp-meetings shall have the sanction of Conference and receive ministerial aid from it on the

following conditions:-

There shall be no traffic on the Lord's Day on the camp-ground or

the adjacent territory protected by the laws of the State.

The managers or other officers of the camp-meeting shall not bargain for or receive any portion of the money paid to railroads, or to the owner or owners of any conveyance or conveyances, as a consideration for conveying persons to the camp-ground, or the vicinity thereof, on the Lord's Day.

4. No advertisement of the running of trains on the Lord's Day shall be made by any of the persons referred to in the preceding paragraph, nor shall anything be done by their authority or solicitation to contravene

the foregoing regulations.

5. Upon receiving from a quarterly conference a request for ministerial supply and a pledge that the above regulations will be faithfully observed, the President of the Annual Conference shall appoint members of this Conference to assist in conducting the camp-meeting.

6. In the absence of a request and a pledge such as are named above, the President shall not appoint such ministerial supply, nor shall any

member of this Conference conduct such camp-meeting as pastor.

7. Appointees to camp-meeting service must be given four weeks' notice of their appointment. If they find it inconvenient to attend they shall promptly present their excuse to the President. If the President declines to revoke their appointment, a failure to attend shall be reported to this Conference by the President.

Regulation XIX. ELECTION OF DELEGATES. 1st-In Stations. In stations the election of delegates shall be by the qualified members under the direction of the stewards and whose credentials must be signed by the chairman and secretary of the meeting. The pastor shall announce the time and place of such meeting at least one Sunday before it is held,

but in no case shall he preside at the election of delegates.

2nd—In Circuits. In circuits a vote of the qualified members shall be taken by the stewards in each church on the charge, after due announcement by the pastor, for a delegate to the annual conference. The votes shall be brought in separate packages to the quarterly conference where they shall be counted. Anyone receiving a majority of all votes cast shall be declared the delegate elect, but if no one receives a majority the quarterly conference shall proceed at once to the election of a delegate. When it is necessary for the quarterly conference to elect the delegate, someone other than the pastor shall preside during the election, and whose name, with the secretary of the quarterly conference, shall appear on the credentials of the delegate.

3rd. In both stations and circuits and also at the quarterly conference all voting shall be by ballot and the election must be held at least ten days before the session of the Annual Conference.

#### Regulation 20.

#### PLAN OF CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

See 1921 Minutes, Pages 116-117.)

A .- Expense of Travel.

1. The establishment of a pro rata basis of expense in reaching the seat of Conference for each minister and delegate—the said basis shall be determined by someone designated—that each minister and delegate shall pay his pro rata part of the said basis at a time designated before the sitting of the Conference—that from the amount of the said basis each minister and delegate shall receive the cost of his round-trip ticket to the seat of Conference. The Superannuated Ministers are invited to attend Conference as guests of the Conference.

B .- Expense of Entertainment.

1. That each charge shall be assessed an amount equal to 1 per cent. of the assessed salary for pastor. No man is eligible for entertainment unless his church has paid the apportionment.

2. All members of the Conference, including supplies, are eligible. No man can make a claim on the Conference if entertained by

friends or remains in his own home.

- 4. In lieu of money for board, a member is permitted to charge for his car fare to and from the seat of Conference as the case may be, excluding the first trip. Maximum amount allowed shall be \$2.00 per day.
  - 5. The Superannuate Ministers are guests of the Conference.

#### Regulation 21. Plan of Levy For The Budgets.

First: The Budget System in distribution is of three parts-

The President's Salary and expenses.

Maryland Conference Interests, to-wit: Incidental expenses of conference, Superannuates, Church Extension, Our Church Home and Deaconess Home.

c. General Conference interests, to-wit: Board of Education, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Board of Young People's Work, Superannuates (for the General Church), Children's Home, Old People's Home, W. F. M. S., W. H. M. S., American Bible Society and Contingent Fund of the Executive Committee.

Second: The Board of Finance shall ascertain-

a. The average amount paid by each charge for all purposes, plus unpaid total assessments, after deducting amounts paid on "Rental Value of Parsonage," "Building and Improvements," "Paid on Debt," "Interest on Debt," "Special Campaigns, either of the General or Maryland Conference," for each of the five years immediately preceding the current year and determine the percentage of the same necessary to provide for the total assessment on the district.

b. The total number of full members for the current year, and de-

termine the per capita necessary to provide for the total assessment.

The division to be 40 per cent for membership and 60 per cent for financial ability.

For the amount levied for the above Budgets, the percentage of Distribution, and for the percentage that each interest shall receive under various Budgets, see Report of Board of Finance as printed in the Minutes for each Conference Session.
