

## Conference Examiners and Examinations

- (1) The Conference course of study shall be of four years duration and in five groups of subjects as follows:
  - (a) Practical Theology.
  - (b) Christian Theology.
  - (c) Church History.
  - (d) Homiletics.
  - (c) English Bible.

The students in these courses shall be known as preparatory, first, second and third year students.

- (2) The president, shall not later than one week after the adjournment of Conference, appoint a committee of six to be known as the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders. Of these, one shall be appointed as chairman and one each as examiner in "a," "b," "c," "d" and "e" to examine all classes.
- (3) The Chairman shall serve for one year. At the expiration of that time examiner "a" shall become chairman and the president shall appoint a new examiner "a." So in order "b," "c," "d" and "e" shall become chairman. The president annually appointing an examiner in the place of him who becomes chairman.
- (4) Each examiner may examine students at any time during the Conference year when mutually convenient. Each examiner shall report on each student annually to the committee, who shall thereupon make its recommendations to the Conference.
- (5) The Committee shall submit its recommendation concerning application for admission and ordination on Saturday Morning.

### REPORTS

#### Report A

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

(See Journal, Page 17.)

"Behold, the third time I am ready to come to you." (II Cor. 12:14).

"But I determined this with myself that I would not come again to you in heaviness." (II Cor. 2:1).

"We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed; we are perplexed, but not in despair." (II Cor. 4:8).

A year ago, referring to the close of a Conference year of testing to faith and courage, we declared more or less prophetically that the "fiery trial" did not seem to have spent its force. What blissful ignorance was ours concerning the year of perhaps unprecedented odds, at the close of which we assemble for the one hundred and fourth session of our Arnual Conference!

Our observations and experiences make unnecessary further introductory reference to the serious difficulties encountered by every one of us. The extent of our success or failure as overcomers will be difficult to determine by mere statistics. "Every man's work shall be made manifest: for the day shall declare it, because it shall be revealed by fire; and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is." (I Cor. 3:13).

#### DEPARTED

Two ministers and a minister's widow have gone from us to the "land of pure delight where saints immortal reign." Rev. Frank D. Reynolds, pastor of Evergreen Church, Baltimore, on January 3, Rev. Ellis H. Jones, pastor of East Baltimore Station, on April 28, and Mrs. M. R. Lewis, widow of the late Rev. R. L. Lewis, on January 24.

Among the many faithful laymen who have left our earthly ranks are W. O. Atwood and J. H. Roberts, who have represented this Conference at a number of sessions of the General Conference, and who, at the time of their death, held positions of prominence on Standing Committees of this Conference.

#### ADJUSTMENTS IN PASTORAL APPOINTMENTS

Financial reverses at Payson Street Church, Baltimore, and at First Church, Wilmington, resulted in the voluntary resignations of J. T. Fenby from the former in September, and J. L. Ward from the latter in November, in order to enable the local congregations to meet outstanding obligations against the properties. These pastors were released. The President provided supplies for the pulpit of Payson Street Church until November when Rev. Kenneth Lyons, of the Seminary, was appointed to serve until Con-

ference. First Church, Wilmington, has been under the care of the President, who has been ably assisted by pastors without cost to the church.

March 31, D. A. Stockley, supply pastor of Friendship Charge. having resigned from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was dismissed from this pastorate.

Evergreen Church, following the death of its pastor, Rev. F. D. Reynolds, was cared for by the President, assisted by various ministers, until March 1, when Rev. C. A. Sutton, of the Seminary, was appointed to serve the church until Conference.

#### ITINERARY

The added responsibilities of the church extension department, and the great increase of office work during this most difficult financial year, the conduct of the Liquidation League, the acute problem of the Headquarters Building, and the direct care of churches unable to support pastors, have combined to make it difficult to cover as much of the Conference area as we hoped. Nevertheless, our itinerary has been more extensive than last year. One hundred charges have been visited, one of which ten times, four of which four times, five three times, and eight twice. Your President has preached one hundred and one sermons, conducted forty official meetings and quarterly conferences, twenty-five quarterly district conferences, besides making unnumbered talks and addresses. Besides his regular itinerary, he has striven to represent the denomination in a large number of interdenominational activities, covering the Federation of Churches, Anti-Saloon League, the Lord's Day Alliance, and many other similar agencies. In addition to these he has continued his services as Chairman of the General Conference Commission on Evangelism, as a member of the Board of Missions, and as Secretary of the Commission on Church Union, having attended five sessions of this Commission in Chicago, Pittsburgh, and Washington. He also was in attendance at the General Conference in May.

#### District Conferences

The recommendation adopted by this Conference last year providing for quarterly district conferences in the various areas has been followed strictly and with most encouraging results. These conferences have been held quarterly in eleven of the thirteen districts and one in another, the only area deprived of them being in lower Virginia, where the churches are too widely scattered to assemble their people for this purpose. The pastors have reported regularly at these conferences, and representative laymen numbering over six hundred have been in attendance at each series. The experiment has fully justified the suggestion, and the plan, modified to suit the circumstances involved, should be outlined in the Manual.

#### "BALANCING THE BUDGET"

This expression, made familiar by its frequent use in Congressional discussions describes briefly the incessant efforts of your President, your Board of Finance, the Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society, and other official groups to economize as far as our self-respect and best judgment would allow in every branch of our work.

We have faced the task of taking care of obligations made in times of prosperity now intensely acute because of the impossibility of making further loans to meet increased demands for the rapid reduction and payment in full of quite a few of our notes.

We have reduced to a minimum the various expense items for committee meetings and administrative matters. For the first time in many years our treasurer has found it possible to avoid obtaining a loan to meet the expenses of the superannuate, administrative and other departments. Thereby he has no interest expense this year whatsoever for current loans.

The Board of Finance has rendered most timely and profitable service by frequent conferences studying carefully every problem of finance confronting us. Its report will recommend measures to secure further economies without endangering the interests involved. A special Committee on Audit, composed of a group of our willing ministers, has again examined the accounts of the treasurer, and will make its report through the Board of Finance. This means another considerable item of expense saved without jeopardy.

## LIQUIDATION LEAGUE

This movement begun, we believe, by Providential leading, before the economic crash became acute, has already prevented inevitable bankruptcy. The spirit of loyalty and personal sacrifice manifested by many of our ministers and laymen in raising the amount requested from their churches is the secret of the success. Last year with the help of a generous friend of the church who contributed nearly \$3,000.00, we raised about \$11,000.00 for this cause. This year we have added to it \$12,000.00 more. By this means we have met the demands of our creditors in a way to maintain our good name as a Conference and secure every interest involved.

The combined debts for which our Conference treasury and Church Extension Society are responsible have been reduced in less than two years from about \$147,000.00 to less than \$55,000.00. This was brought about by both direct payments made upon these debts, and the assumption of over \$70,000.00 of it by the Edmondson Avenue and Calvary churches.

Quite a few of our present notes must be paid in full or very materially reduced in the very near future. Definite notice has been served by the creditors. It is impossible to meet these required payments from our regular budget receipts. It is therefore imperative that this plan be continued until our obligations are met and our budget is balanced.

#### NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS

Four of these have been erected this year at the following points: Centerville and Centenary churches on Bedford Charge, providing adequate facilities for worship, religious instruction and recreation, at a cost of about \$34,000.00, approximately covered in cash and subscriptions; Mariners, near Crisfield, at a cost of nearly \$16,000.00, only about \$3,000.00 remaining as a debt; West Baltimore Station at Charing Cross and Greenwich Avenues, at a cost of \$60,000.00, about \$45,000.00 of which remaining to be raised.

These new buildings represent heroic and generous expressions of loyalty and cooperation on the part of their members and friends, and ability in leadership on the part of their pastors and officials.

#### IMPROVEMENTS

It is impossible to give in detail all the property improvements made through the year. Many of our churches have taken advantage of the unemployment situation and reduced cost of material to make needed repairs to church and parsonage properties.

The parsonage of Friendship Church was destroyed by fire last October. A new bungalow was erected on the same site at a cost of about \$1,100.00, and the cost covered by the insurance on the property destroyed plus a few contributions

A new parsonage was purchased at Second Church, Lynchburg.

Extensive repairs were made to the Nichols Memorial Church, Linthicum on Howard, Brookview on Dorchester, First Church (Cumberland), Milford, Wesley Chapel of Kent, Lowe Memorial, Sharptown Church and Parsonage, Bethel on Cecil, a new bathroom added to the parsonage at Greenbackville, a community hall at Libertytown, and a church house at Christ Church (Baltimore).

The following charges have raised \$500 or more on building and improvements: Bedford, \$29,000; R. I. Ave., \$500; Towson, \$550; Wye and Queen Anne, \$600; Crisfield, \$500; Nichols Memorial, \$500; First Church, Cumberland, \$600; Milford, \$550; Wesley Chapel of Kent, \$515; West Baltimore, \$7,847; Mariners, \$1,000; Lowe Memorial, \$1,300; Christ Church, \$1,076; Starr, \$500; Snow Hill, \$500; Sharptown, \$1,175; Dorchester, \$650; Towson, \$525.

Eighty-four charges report a total of \$73,183.00 raised on building and improvements.

#### DEBT REDUCTIONS

Financial conditions have made difficult the desired curtailment of local church debts without seriously interfering with maintenance and benevolence budget receipts. Nevertheless, it is most remarkable and encouraging to note that in spite of poor economic conditions many churches have made progress in reducing debts. Milton Church and Deer Park Church have raised in full their debts.

The following charges have raised \$500 or more on debts: Lewis Memorial, \$700; Milford, \$550; Cherrydale, \$700; St. Lukes, \$600; R. I. Ave., \$500; Edmondson Ave., \$1,700; Wilton Heights, \$800; Howard, \$1,000; Georgetown, \$1,000; Kennedyville, \$600; Hebron, \$865; St. Johns, \$1,200; Crisfield, \$1,000; Milton, \$615; Starr, \$2,000; Lauraville, \$2,500; Salisbury, \$500; Pocomoke, \$1,100; Eutaw, \$500; Second Church, Lynchburg, \$1,000; Peninsula, \$600; Bethesda, \$1,300; Violetville, \$550; Trinity, \$900; First Church, Lynchburg, \$500.

Sixty-six charges report a total of \$31,639.00 raised on debts. Debts remaining, \$747,252.00.

#### BUDGET PERCENTAGES

Belated collections and prospective Children's Day offerings have made it impossible for pastors to give us definite figures as to percentages reached in the Annual and General Conference budget assessments for benevolences. However, we are cheered by the reported expectation of twenty-two charges to be on the Honor Roll, while seventy-seven expect to pay their Annual

Conference assessments in full and a creditable percentage of the General Conference benevolences. Seventeen expect to report increased percentages over last year, while forty-six fear that they will fall short of the percentage reached last year.

The General Conference just held in Columbus, Ohio, fully realizing the difficulty of maintaining the present budget assessment, and confident that our churches everywhere now laboring so faithfully and giving so liberally to meet budget requirements will help in some way to make up the difference, passed several measures looking toward most rigid operating economy, and reduced the total budget assessment from \$500,000.00 to \$375,000.00. Maryland's portion will be reduced from \$110,000.00 to \$88,000.00.

Your President in announcing this good news, desires to follow with a ringing challenge to those charges now on the Honor Roll to enter into the coming year not only to maintain their position on this Roll of Honor, but to go far beyond it in contributing liberal offerings to special benevolent interests, and thereby achieve a more enviable position toward World Service. And next he challenges those charges which have tried in vain to reach the Honor Roll, to prove to their beloved church that they can be depended upon to respond to this cooperative plan by making a renewed determination to get on the Honor Roll next year for the purpose of remaining there from year to year. In order to take full advantage of this opportunity, one of our recommendations suggests a plan to raise without hardship our entire benevolences without deficits at the end of the year.

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE EXPENSE

One hundred charges report having raised in full the special assessment for expenses of representatives to the General Conference, while five have raised them in part, and twenty-seven have raised nothing on this special assessment. It is to be hoped that we will keep faith with the representatives we chose for this quadrennial assembly by providing in full the amount assessed toward the expenses personally involved by their attendance.

#### MISCELLANEOUS BENEVOLENCES

Forty charges report having contributed in free-will offerings to the Maryland Tract Society \$204.00, and to other agencies \$5,462.00. Our churches for the most part cooperate faithfully in the work of the benevolent, moral and religious agencies such as the Tract Society, Pocket Testament League, Federation of Churches, Council of Religious Education, Christian Endeavor Unions, the Red Cross, Golden Rule Foundation, Family Welfare and other community centers of charity.

During this Conference year many of our churches indeed have given unstintingly and most sacrificially to bear the burdens of the unemployed and unfortunate victims of economic distress. Certainly the "law of Christ" has been fulfilled in many ways, and it is impossible for us, even if we were disposed to exploit it, to estimate the good which our generous people have done in this respect, and will continue to do, as long as there is need. This kind of benevolence barely ever finds its way on to questionnaires and Conference reports, but it will linger forever in the memory of Him who is "not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love."

#### PASTORS' SALARIES

Your President has carefully avoided, for obvious reasons, making requests for increased pastoral support this year. On the other hand he has endeavored to caution church officials against making sudden and substantial reductions in pastors' salaries, lest in so doing their pastors be forced to economize in pastoral work to a degree harmful to the best interests of the churches, and in some instances be incapacitated for their best work by having to try in vain to solve certain problems in family budgets and in educational and automobile debts.

Mt. Tabor, Washington, increased pastor's salary \$300; Cecil, \$75; and Evergreen, \$200. Seventy-one charges have set salaries for next year the same as this year, while fifty-one have reduced salaries to the extent of \$13,750.00.

#### FINANCIAL SYSTEMS

Both in his itinerant visits and the district and quarterly conferences, your President has persistently urged improved plans of church finance. He is encouraged to note the improvements in this respect which are beginning to be manifest in many places. Perhaps this partly accounts for the remarkable success which many of our churches have achieved during this most trying year in escaping a hopeless deficit at the end of the year.

Ninety-five charges report regularly elected church treasurers along with their stewards and trustees.

Sixty-seven charges have an annual every-member canvass for the local and general budgets.

Seventy-six charges announce a budget system of finance in their churches, while fifty-seven use the duplex, and sixty-one the single weekly envelopes. Seventy-three make a periodical solicitation for funds, and seventy-three depend in part upon commercialized agencies like suppers, fairs and entertainments to raise current funds. Seventy-two charges have general women's auxiliaries at work for the local and general interests of the church.

It is unquestionably true that we are passing through trying times financially. Yet if the experience results in a more thorough and regular plan of church finance, more sacrificial dedication of tithes and offerings for the Lord's work, more curtailment of personal luxuries, and more regular paying as well as praying, it will be a profitable experience indeed.

#### EVANGELISM

Many of our pastors have utilized the season of economic distress to reemphasize the evangelistic note in their preaching and in the pastoral ministrations. While it is disappointing that more anxious hearts, affected by material conditions, have not seemed yet to follow the example of one of old who said, "This poor man cried and the Lord heard him and saved him out of all his troubles," (Psa. 34:6), yet it is comforting to note that a large number of pastors report increased congregations and fewer than usual are forced to acknowledge that there have been no conversions and accessions on their charges during the entire year.

Rev. W. A. Melvin, Chairman of our Evangelistic Committee, has labored untiringly and contributed most generously of his own private means to

advance the cause of personal evangelism not only in the Maryland Conference but also throughout the denomination. More than three thousand individual pledges to do personal work in evangelism have been procured by him, and about fifteen hundred conversions have been personally registered as a result of the effort.

The recent General Conference, in recognition of his valued service, appointed Brother Melvin as Director of Evangelism for the entire denomination. One of our recommendations is made with the hope that the hearty and prayerful cooperation of this Conference with Brother Melvin will result in a year of unprecedented gains in conversions and membership.

Notable revivals have taken place at Lewes, Wesley Chapel of Kent, and Bedford, resulting in from fifty to eighty conversions and accessions each.

One hundred and sixteen charges report a total of 1726 conversions and 112 charges have received 1836 new members during the year. The questionnaire reports may be altered by subsequent quarterly conference action, but according to the former 81 charges report net gains of 1504 in membership, while twenty-three admit a net loss. Subtracting the latter from the former the questionnaires reveal a net gain for the year of 1203. The more accurate Conference Reports will change these figures of course.

Charges reporting twenty-five or more conversions are as follows: St. Luke's 35; Edmondson Ave. 32; Wilton Heights 48; Lowe Memorial 52; Fawn Grove 29; Georgetown 31; Cumberland 53; Hebron 39; Bedford 78; Crisfield 25; Milford 30; Wesley Chapel of Kent 52; Newmarket 25; Christ Church 29; Lewes 76; 2nd Church, Lynchburg, 45; Peninsula 30; Hampden 82; Texas 35; Grace 25.

Charges reporting twenty-five or more accessions are as follows: Rhode Island Ave. 25; Edmondson Ave. 52; Wilton Heights 44; Lewes 56; Fawn Grove 30; Georgetown 26; Cumberland 35; Bedford 110; Accomac 28; Wesley Chapel of Kent 48; Newmarket 31; Christ Church 32; Lowe Memorial 52; Starr 40; Salisbury 25; 2nd Church, Lynchburg, 63; Peninsula 50; Hampden 82; Texas 36; Trinity 27; 1st Church, Newark, 26.

#### CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

During this annual session the Committee on Moral Reform and Social Service will formulate and present for our approval an expression of the attitude of this Conference toward the current evils of society, and especially those attempts of the enemies of public morality to undermine the confidence of our citizenship in these legislative achievements resulting from years of crusading on the part of the church in behalf of sobriety and temperance. It is necessary at this time to give only a passing comment on these issues.

#### Prohibition

For twelve years our favored land has been free from the offensive curse of the legalized saloon. A growing army of opponents to this benficent law, including former investors, millionaires ambitious to escape higher taxes at the expense of the poor working man, unscrupulous politicians whom the spoils of office have completely bought body and soul, and misled millions of well-meaning citizens, too narrow-minded to discriminate between shrewd propaganda and actual facts, is constantly threatening the

hosts of Christian righteousness, to drive them from the vantage ground of prohibition. So persistent are these attempts to undermine public confidence in the prohibition law that it would be natural to look for a wholesale disrespect for it on the part of the people. However, it is perfectly apparent to anyone who is fair enough to observe without prejudice, that conditions under prohibition in places even where least enforced, are vastly better than those of the old saloon days in places where the liquor regulations were most rigidly enforced.

The militant church has been the target for centuries of those who hurl the charge of hypocrisy at the foes of public evils. Alas, we hail the appearance of a camp containing the most brazen hypocrites our age has ever known. It is that camp of self-appointed temperance reformers who oppose prohibition in order to save our children and young people from the curse of drink. One would think that the millenium was just around the corner to hear such outstanding reformers as Maryland's long-time Governor and favorite son candidate for the Presidency, and Maryland's senior Senator pleading for the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment in order that the States might provide their own remedy for the curse of intemperance, that Maryland's illustrious Governor, the titular head of the controlling political party in this State, might propose and have enacted such liquor laws as will save the young people from drunkenness and debauchery. Picture the scene! Maryland's Governor at the front of an army of reformers marching to the defense of the morals of our young people! Call it comedy or what not; but be it known that if the Eighteenth Amendment is repealed and if the liquor question is handed back to the States, it will be Maryland's present Governor, if he lives, who will have more influence than any other living person in the making of the liquor laws of this State.

The time has arrived for a fresh manifestation of militant faith and courage in our pulpits. There are well meaning laymen who don't want their ministers to speak out on these questions. But these good laymen are misled by propaganda and mistaken in their ideas of the call to the ministry. Let us gird our loins with truth and renew openly the attack which our fathers at great price launched decades ago at this gigantic foe. Let us not be silenced by threats of a reduced stipend or an enforced resignation. Let us carefully enlighten the minds of our growing youth concerning the physical, mental and moral evils of intoxicating beverages, and in the meantime, putting on the whole armor of God, "stand against the wiles of the devil," as he attempts to recover the ground he has lost.

Every woman should be solicited to join that great white ribbon army of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, as a gigantic rebuke to the shocking enlistment of hosts of American women in a compromising army of reactionaries attempting to overthrow prohibition. Our churches should be thrown open to the Anti-Saloon League and our congregations urged to support liberally this agency of the churches in action for the complete overthrow of the liquor traffic.

## "Remember the Sabbath"

During the year the citizens of the great metropolis of this State have been required to express their choice concerning the preservation or desecration of the Lord's Day as it relates to commercialized sports and public amusements such as theatres and moving picture houses. The mandate of the voters was in favor of an open Sunday, there being less than thirty-thousand adults in a city of over half a million inhabitants who were interested enough to "remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy." This is the most solemn warning received in recent years that the unscrupulous seekers of pleasure are determined that neither the laws of God nor the laws of man are going to interfere with their determined quest of pleasure and carnal lust.

There is imperative need of immediately arousing the public conscience against this brazen assault on one of the Ten Commandments. In the meantime our children and youth need, as few other generations have needed, an intensive course of training concerning the uses and abuses of the Sabbath as a day of rest and worship. The recent book entitled "The Day of Worship," edited by Dr. W. W. Davis, Maryland's valiant warrior in defense of the Lord's Day, and containing sixteen chapters written by as many popular authorities on moral, religious and economic questions, including Drs. Forlines and Broomfield, is available for family libraries, Sunday School and Christian Endeavor, and Women's Auxiliary reading courses, and training classes. It is hoped that thousands of copies will find circulation through our congregations.

The familiar voice of Dr. Davis will be heard in this Conference session.

He deserves the heartiest support of every pastor and layman in our churches.

Whether we speak of temperance reform, Sabbath preservation, the curtailment of crime, the suppression of vice, the cure of the economic ills which result in the oppression of the poor, or whatever else is designed to make for improved private and public morals, it is undeniably true that the members and constituents of the Methodist Protestant Church are invariably most conspicuous on the front lines of the hottest battles. Beloved, let us not beat a retreat at the sound of the bellowing boasts and threats of the Philistine giants of wealth and politics and press attempting to turn us backward.

#### GENERAL CHURCH INTERESTS

The President of the General Conference, the executive secretaries of our various boards, the presidents of some of our educational institutions, and some of the representatives to our General Conference will be heard at length at this session concerning the imperative need of immediate relief for and increased support of our various church agencies. Suffice it here to say that our educational and missionary agencies have reached a crisis the successful passing of which will entail the most heroic service and sacrifice that we have been called upon certainly for a generation to give. We must give them careful attention, and then in spite of the needs at home, we must decide, regardless of the cost, to guarantee the continued operation and beneficent activity of these timely agencies of the Kingdom of Christ.

#### SPECIFIC CONFERENCE INTERESTS

Headquarters Building. For seven years we have successfully maintained a five-story office building at 516 N. Charles St., Baltimore. The income from store room and office rentals provided funds sufficient to cover operating expenses, taxes, interest on mortgage and other notes, and reduce

from year to year the large initial debt of about \$145,000.00, until the present economic distress came upon us. Since then our tenants have suffered severely along with other business concerns, with the result that quite a few have been forced out of business or else compelled to vacate and find less expensive locations for their offices. The remaining tenants have demanded a reduction of rent to remain with us. It is needless to say that at present there are scarcely no applicants for new office space anywhere.

The time has come when we are compelled to find immediate sources of income through either additional loans or contributions to supplement our rentals, or else abandon our splendid building, and accept a terrific loss if placed upon the present market. Our former equities derived from the sale of the property at 316 N. Charles St., would probably be sacrificed in such a case, and even if the mortgage debt were satisfied, other loans amounting to over thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) would have to be carried and ultimately paid. Besides, the Maryland Conference would suffer irreparable humiliation by the loss of its headquarters.

It is impossible under present conditions to procure from outside sources further loans to tide us over the present critical period. Therefore, we are compelled to do one of three things,—put on an immediate campaign for contributions to provide funds with which to meet the expenses on the property, provide these funds from some agency within the Conference controlling sufficient funds, or else abandon the property entirely, and still be heavily in debt. The Trustees in their report will present a proposal for the solution of this important problem.

Superannuate Fund, Group Insurance and Mutual Relief. These three interests are designed to afford protection and partial support for the families of our pastors in case of retirement or death within our ministerial ranks. Under no circumstance should any minister in this Conference allow himself to fail to procure for himself this available protection, or to cooperate in all three of these plans of mutual aid in our great ministerial fellowship. The expense is negligible in comparson with the protection involved. If there are cases of obvious inability to participate, this may be overcome by proffered aid if made known.

Therefore, your President urges this Conference to make more obligatory the individual membership and cooperation in these beneficent provisions on the part of its members.

Your attention is called to the fact that the promissory notes of quite a few of our ministers made at the session of 1929, and covering subscriptions to the superannuate invested fund in the year 1921-1922, expire at this time. There are about thirty of these notes, the total amount of which due, is about \$1,900.00. Some disposition must be made of these notes. Besides, at the same session of 1929, this Conference took action requiring each active pastor to contribute to this fund annually, an amount equal to one-fourth of one per cent. of his salary. About two-thirds of the ministers have met this obligation each year. It is unfair to permit one group to observe this rule, and at the same time allow the remainder to ignore it, while everyone is a potential beneficiary.

The income from the present invested fund has been impaired by economic conditions, to the extent that it is now inadequate to maintain the established pro rata of distribution to our superannuates. On the other

hand if we are compelled by this inevitable condition to reduce this pro rata distribution it means a reduction of income at the most unfortunate point in the ranks of our membership. It is possible to provide for the time being a fund sufficient to offset this reduced income without reducing the pro rata distribution, and at the same time without withdrawing anything from the invested fund.

One of our recommendations suggests definite action concerning these matters.

Mr. T. A. Murray has rendered another year of sacrificial service as Treasurer of the fund, and we are grateful to him.

Bequests and Beneficent Agencies. We continue to be favored by a kind Providence who moves upon His benevolent children to remember the church and its institutions in their legacies. While information concerning such matters does not always come to our attention, we are reminded of the legacy of the late Wm. H. Martin of \$2,500 to Rhode Island Avenue Church, Washington, and that of John Messersmith, recently deceased, of \$1,000 to our Church Home at Westminster, and \$1,000 to Christ Church, Baltimore, of which he was a member. Our gratitude is expressed to God for such generosity and thoughtfulness on the part of those who have gone to their eternal reward. We commend the plan to the living as a most timely way of perpetuating their support in life of these great arms of the church reaching out to bless its flocks.

The St. John's Board of Beneficence has aided in a substantial way quite a few of our inadequately supported pastors, and in the education of their children, and in other ways pertinent to the preservation and growth of our Conference. This Conference is profoundly grateful.

Our Church Home. Most efficient management on the part of the good men on the Board of Managers, and of the women of the Lady Managers, residing at Westminster, is responsible not only for the completion of a much needed additional unit of two stories to our property without any serious drain upon the treasury, but also for showing a balance from current funds for maintenance. The family of occupants, filling the Home to its capacity, is most comfortable and happy, and those who are ill and decrepid are tenderly ministered unto in the name of Him who commends such good works. Many of the churches thoughtfully and generously remember the Home with shipments of provisions for the pantry and kitchen.

Church Extension Society. The report of the Board of Managers will contain in detail the items of interest concerning the work of this Society during this most critical year. The section of this report referring to the Liquidation League contains facts relating to the work of this Society in caring for its heavy obligations. No small portion of our time and attention has been required to meet successfully the puzzling situations which have developed. Suffice it here to say simply this: "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." This means much when banks cannot do so. We have kept faith with every creditor, and have no other thought concerning the future, by the help of God.

Your President, acting in the capacity also of Superintendent of Church Extension, has striven to render all possible aid and counsel to the pastors and congregations in the erection of four new church buildings, and one new parsonage, in just as many minor improvements as came to his attention,

has rendered such assistance as he could in all financial efforts in these cases, without allowing such service, though at times strenuous, to interfere with his official, administrative and supervisory duties, or to limit his itinerary in the pulpits, quarterly conferences, district conferences or local official meetings.

This Conference one year ago concurred in a recommendation of the President to make of the new church at Kansas Avenue, Fourth and Hamilton Streets, Washington, a memorial to Dr. Thomas Hamilton Lewis, and the Board of Survey and Extension was authorized to plan for the promotion of the enterprise. Economic conditions known to all are responsible for the postponement to date of this great enterprise. However, the rapid growth of this congregation and the enormous development of the residential community, combined with the compulsory requirement by the District of Columbia authorities that the present portable frame structure be removed before another calendar year, altogether present a case at this time which demands immediate action. To retreat would be an unforgivable injustice to the little flock which has accepted our challenge, and a more costly blunder in church extension than we perhaps have ever made. Therefore, depression or plenty, doubt or faith, opportunity beckons and duty demands that we now go forth to erect the first unit of this structure.

Edmondson Avenue Church, Baltimore, has manifested heroically its courage and ability to maintain its local budget, its budget for benevolences, and assumed nearly \$60,000.00 of its debt without further appropriation from the Conference toward its portion of the debt. The church has made a substantial reduction of this debt since the agreement was reached.

A similar agreement on a smaller scale was made between the society and Calvary Church, Virginia.

The matters pertaining to comity with the Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, have progressed most hopefully, and will be related in detail in the report of the Board of Managers.

Similar proposals by the Baltimore Conference have been sympathetically discussed on several occasions with the proper authorities, and in one large union meeting in Harford County.

Necessity, good sense, and a Christian conscience combine to demand an increased effort to cooperate with other Protestant denominations in our area to the end that every community shall be properly supplied with an adequate Christian ministry without a waste of the resources of the Christian people in our communities. Local prejudice must give way to the higher demands of loyalty to Jesus Christ and His missionary program.

Christian Education. It is unnecessary to make further reference to this increasingly essential department of our work. It is no longer a novelty in our catalogued activities. Its developed leaders are already demonstrating the indispensable necessity of its continuance in feasible form.

Financial conditions, however, seem to compel at least a temporary adjustment of our plan for the promotion of this work in our area. Your President has conferred at length with the Board of Finance and with representatives of the Executive Committee of the Council of Religious Education and is of the opinion that the temporary discontinuance of a Conference Director is expedient in the interest of economy, and that our workers in this sphere will render cheerfully voluntary service to offset the temporary loss of the efficient work of Dr. Forlines in this department.

"And what more shall I say?" "For the time would fail me to tell of" Miss Lillian DeMoss, our efficient Deaconess and her valued service in the churches, of that company of consecrated women in our Maryland and Washington and Virginia Branches, of Mr. J. Frank Brown who has freely served as Agent of the President's Parsonage, and of the many others of honorable mention "who through faith . . . wrought righteousness."

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

Your President submits the following recommendations for your prayerful consideration:

#### 1. Prayer.

- (a) In view of the conditions through which the entire world is passing, economically, socially, morally and religiously at this time, and especially in view of the consequent "fiery trial" which we and our people everywhere are encountering "as though some strange thing happened," that at frequent intervals during our discussion of problems confronting us at this session, we pause in our program to unite in special earnest prayer to God, that we may "rejoice inasmuch as we are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that when His glory shall be revealed we may be glad also with exceeding joy," as a result of our triumphant faith in Him.
  - (b) That following the adjournment of this Conference a Day of Prayer, without any accompanying special financial appeal, be set for Sunday. June 26, at which time our people in all the churches, and in their homes, in groups, in families and individually, be urged to "humble themselves and pray" to God that He might "heal the land," and enable us to follow Him faithfully through this experience to victory for His cause.
  - 2. Evangelism. That we, the first Annual Conference, to assemble in the new quadrennium, enter most heartily into a through-the-year effort to achieve abundant evangelistic results through carefully and prayerfully planned programs of revival services, regular worship services, young people's groups, Women's Auxiliary Circles, Laymen's Fellowship, personal workers classes, visitation evangelistic seasons, and every other effective means to the end if possible that all our members may be made "fishers of men," and that there may be added to our churches a net increase of ten percent of members annually during the quadrennium.
  - 3. Finances. That pastors and delegates at this Conference be instructed to call together the officials of their various churches as soon after adjournment as possible, and immediately begin to prepare plans for the monthly payment in full of all local bills for current expenses, and for the payment on the last day of each month of at least one-twelfth of the entire budget assessments for the Annual Conference and World Service; and that at the Quarterly District Conferences due attention be given to the checking up of the various churches in this respect.
  - 4. Superannuate Fund. That the Committee on Official Relations be authorized and directed to interview the makers of promisory notes to this fund, and to reach an agreement, if possible, with them concerning the payment of these obligations; and that the amounts due from unpaid one-fourth of one percent requirements be considered a definite obligation in every case. That in view of the present shortage in income from the

invested funds, the amounts collected from these notes and other obligations at this session and during the coming Conference year be retained by the Conference Treasurer, and used by him to supplement the income from the invested fund, as necessary, to maintain the present rate of distribution to our superannuates.

5. Thomas Hamilton Lewis Memorial Church. That the plan to begin the erection of this Memorial Church in Washington, D. C., endorsed a year ago and temporarily postponed, be resumed and that the Board of Survey and Extension be requested to propose a plan for the erection of the first unit if possible during this calendar year.

And now lest he be too "burdensome to you," your President desires to record his sincere appreciation of the unceasing attempts of apparently every minister, and the members of the parsonage households, and of thousands of our loyal lay-members and friends to outdo each other in personal favors, hearty cooperation and sacrificial efforts, to make his labors actually a joy.

For a period of three years only once has he been compelled through sickness or accident to cancel an engagement, and happily then it was on the most stormy day in the three years.

"Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

"My God shall supply all your needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus. Now unto God and our Father be glory forever and ever. Amen."

### COMMITTEE ON PRESIDENT'S REPORT

(See Journal, Page 24.)

Your Committee expresses its great appreciation of the President's arduous labors throughout the year, including the work of the Church Extension Superintendency. We are grateful unto the Heavenly Father for His continued watchful care over our leader in his extensive travels.

We have noted with sorrow the passing of two of our ministers, one of the widows of our Conference and a number of prominent laymen. The workmen may fall but the work must go on.

The President and churches of our Conference are to be highly commended for their work in connection with the raising of funds for the Liquidation League and the assuming of responsibilities involved.

We rejoice in the accomplishments of our churches in building and improvement operations in spite of economic difficulties. A great many of the congregations deserve much credit for the substantial reductions made upon their indebtedness during these trying times.

It is a matter of regret that many of our churches have found it necessary to reduce salaries, but we sincerely trust that every effort shall be made to maintain the normal standards, as far as possible, and will consider these present reductions as temporary and emergency measures only.

The President of the Conference has made a thorough study of the finances of the churches and has clearly shown the need of better business methods in many of our churches. We sincerely hope that the delegates and pastors will immediately concern themselves with this matter upon their return to their churches.

Evangelism is the great work of the church. No church is doing its utmost for the Kingdom that is not definitely seeking to win men to Christ. The General Conference has recognized our co-laborer, W. A. Melvin, for his splendid work in the "Win-One" effort and has designated him as the Director of Evangelism for the whole church. Everyone should lend himself to the task of winning men to our Lord and Saviour.

We are in sympathy with the efforts of our President to maintain the honor and integrity of our men and look toward the proper disposition of notes and the meeting of all Conference obligations.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The Committee agrees in feeling the need of stressing "prayer," in the lives of our people, and the setting of June 26th, as a day of prayer to be observed in all of our churches. We recommend further that the Secretary mail a copy of this recommendation to all pastors before June 18th and that due publication be given in The Methodist Protestant-Recorder.
- 2. Believing there is no greater work in our Conference than evangelism, we give the fullest endorsement to the suggested program.
- 3. Conference tabulations clearly indicate the benefit derived by churches meeting obligations up-to-date throughout the year. It should prove a very great help, especially in these days of financial difficulty, for all churches to make payments each month in accord with this plan. We concur in the recommendation and further recommend that the Secretary of the Conference communicate this action to all of our churches.
- · 4. We concur with the President's recommendation for the payment of notes and obligations to the Superannuate Fund Society. Since the payment of one-fourth of one percent of ministers' salaries is obligatory, we further recommend that the names of those who have made the required payments be published each year in the Minutes.
- 5. Conditions warrant the immediate consideration of the Lewis Memorial Church in Washington, D. C. Your Committee, therefore, concurs in the recommendation concerning the erection of a building as required at this time and refer the proposition to the Board of Survey and Extension.

## Report B

## SECRETARY'S REPORT

(See Journal, Pages 16, 28.)

To The Maryland Annual Conference,

Dear Friends:

All credentials have been carefully examined and with the following results:

No credentials have been received from Graceland Park, Fairfax, Harmony, W. Va., Indian River, Lewes, Tyreanna, Emmanuel, First Church—Wilmington. This is the second year that no credentials have been received from Indian River, Lewes, Emmanuel and Tyreanna. Perhaps the pastors can explain the reasons for this apparent neglect of our church law.

All credentials received, show the elections to have been held within the required time—ten days before the sitting of the conference, except Evergreen and Carroll Circuit, Evergreen's was an oversight and due, no doubt to the fact that the church has been without a pastor for several months. I recommend that the credentials be accepted.

The credentials from Greenwood are signed by the pastor as chairman of the meeting which elected the delegate. This is irregular and not according to our manual. Warwick Charge elected no alternate and the credentials do not show the signature of any secretary. Cherrydale's credentials are not signed by anyone as chairman. Though irregular, I recommend the acceptance of these credentials.

The Secretary appreciates the splendid manner in which the committees of last conference co-operated with him in an effort to keep reports in proper shape. May we have the same co-operation again this year. Will the chairman of each committee be sure and have a duplicate of his report—one for himself and one to be held as the property of the Secretary?

The Book Concern has given us fine service and done good work on our Conference Minutes. If all the reports and tabular matters are in hand at the close of this conference session, there need be no delay in the printing or distribution of our minutes.

The Conference of 1925 authorized, at the suggestion of the Secretary, Dr. Shipley, the printing of 2500 copies of the Minutes. The distribution was to be made to the charges at the rate of one copy for every two (\$2.00) dollars of the President's salary. This plan has been faithfully carried out by your present secretary. Besides the one copy for every two dollars of the President's salary, we give two copies to each Superannuate, one copy to each minister's widow, one copy or two if deemed essential to the men in Special Work and to the General Conference Officers. Then a few extra copies for the work of the President, Secretary and Treasurer. The balance left over was placed in our Book Concern for sale. The responsibility for the publication and distribution of these minutes rests upon the Secretary as outlined in his duties in the Manual—Rule 3, Section 11, but the Secretary feels, that in the interest of economy, it is possible to reduce the quantity as now printed. It is true, also, that many of our minutes are

wasted. Some churches receive too many and perhaps others, receive too few, but nevertheless there is waste. Last March I wrote to the President of the Conference and suggested a plan for reduction. In a meeting with the Board of Finance, we agreed upon this plan—that instead of 2500 copies, we have printed 2000 copies and these to be distributed on the basis of one copy to every twenty members.

May I recommend:

- (1) That we print 2000 copies instead of 2500.
- (2) That instead of the Secretary of the Conference assuming the responsibility of giving the contract for printing of the Minutes, that a committee of three, consisting of the Chairman of the Board of Finance. the Secretary of the Conference and the Treasurer of the Conference, be authorized to deal with this phase of the publication.

## Report D

#### TRUSTEES OF THE MARYLAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

(See Journal, Page 20.)

To the Maryland Annual Conference:-

The Board of Trustees of the Maryland Annual Conference reports that it has held its regularly prescribed and many special meetings during this Conference year in order that we might transact the business you have committed to us.

1. At the annual meeting held May 5, 1932, the Board elected the following officers to serve during the year 1932-1933: E. C. Makosky, President; G. W. Haddaway, Vice-President; Rowland Watts, Secretary; and F. Murray Benson, Treasurer and Counsel.

2. The membership of the Board, as required by charter, is now constituted as follows: G. W. Haddaway, W. B. Judefind and F. G. Usilton to serve until 1934; E. C. Makosky, B. F. Ruley, Julian P. Dodge and T. W. Donoho to serve until 1933; and J. H. Straughn, W. A. Melvin, Rowland Watts and F. Murray Benson whose term of office expire with this Conference session, and whose places are to be filled by election of this Conference.

After long and faithful service on this Board Brother James H. Roberts has entered into eternal life; his place on the Board is vacant and must also be filled by the election of a successor to serve until 1934.

3. By your action at last Conference session you placed the active management of the Headquarters Building in our hands. We had been legally responsible for it since the Conference session of 1922. We have given much earnest thought to the consideration of all things involved in the management of the building, and especially the problems involved in caring for our financial obligations.

At an adjourned meeting of our annual session, held June 2, 1932, our Board unanimously authorized the following resolution to be addressed to the Conference:

Whereas, due in large measure to the critical economic conditions existing in the country, the Headquarters Building has had great difficulty in financing itself, both in the matter of administration and of debt reduction, and

Whereas, it has become more and more difficult to make arrangements with banking institutions to carry the necessary obligations to the building, and being reminded that since we have large invested interests of our own from which we might seek the necessary funds, and

Whereas, we must find relief within ourselves or submit to the otherwise certain eventuality of the loss of the building, we, your Board of Trustees by unanimous vote do hereby request

That this Conference authorize and direct the Superannuate Fund Society to make available to the Trustees of the Maryland Conference for the use of the Headquarters Building out of their securities and holdings from their invested or uninvested funds a total loan of \$25,000 either in the form of cash or by the loan of a sufficient amount of securities with which

to borrow needed funds; to be drawn and utilized in periodic payments over an interval of not exceeding five years; the said loan to be secured by demand notes of the Trustees of the Conference and paying at the rate of 5 percent per annum in equal semi-annual installments.

4. Detailed statement of Receipts and Expenditures in the management of the Headquarters Building is submitted herewith for your careful consideration, as is also the Report of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. The latter report has been audited.

## Report E

#### BOARD OF FINANCE

(See Journal, Page 26.)

The Board of Finance has held six meetings during the year without any expense to the Annual Conference. At these meetings every conceivable financial question of the Conference has been considered and where economy and financial gain would accrue to the benefit of the Conference, action has been taken and recommendations formulated to be acted upon by you.

There have been many pressing needs that have come to your Committee's attention, and while we do not consider we are offering a complete panacea for all our financial ills, yet we believe our decisions will prove needful to carry on for the coming year.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. No church shall receive appropriations on supplemental salary or any other appropriation until such church has paid an amount on its assessments that is satisfactory to the Board of Finance.
- 2. In case of superannuates, whenever a beneficiary of the Superannuated Fund is being cared for by the Conference, all appropriations shall be discontinued.
- 3. This Board recommends that all ministers failing to meet all personal financial obligations fixed by this Conference shall be required to satisfactorily explain their failure to the Committee on Official Relations.
- 4. That \$1,976.54 be withdrawn from the accumulated "dividend Fund," leaving an outstanding dividend fund of \$1,862.31. We further instruct the Conference Treasurer to apply collected premiums in hand toward the Conference treasury debt.
- 5. We recommend the suspension of all minimum salary regulations and 25 percent reductions for one year, and that the maximum supplemental salary be \$300, and the minimum salary be \$1,200 to all ordained married members of the Conference.
- 6. We recommend \$14,000 be assessed for Church Extension obligations;—\$9,000.00 shall be the appropriation for Church Extension enterprises and \$5,000 for supplemental salaries.
  - 7. We recommend the following budget for the year:

#### Report G

#### BOARD OF SURVEY AND EXTENSION

(See Journal, Page 32.)

To the Maryland Annual Conference.

#### Dear Brethren:

The Board of Survey and Extension is pleased to report as follows:

1. We have received the report of the Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society and have read it with much interest. Despite all adverse conditions the spirit of new church enterprises is still in operation among us. We note with much satisfaction the building of the new West Baltimore Church, and of Mariners, and the two new churches on Bedford Circuit.

Your Committee concurs in the arrangements which have adjusted the debt obligations on Edmondson Avenue and Calvary, Va., with the assumption on the part of the Board of Managers of certain parts of those obligations. We particularly appreciate the fine spirit of cooperation exhibited at Edmondson Avenue in personally assuming such a large part of the total obligation. Calvary Church continues to thrive and is gradually reducing its debt.

The report of the Treasurer, E. C. Makosky, shows a great deal of labor in handling the large sums of money which have passed through the hands of the Board, and comes properly audited.

#### Boundaries

#### We recommend:

1. That Wye church be detached from Wye and Queen Anne Charge, and be combined with Kent Island. The new charge to be known as Kent Island-Wye. This arrangement is made with the understanding that the

parsonage shall remain at Stevensville, and that Wye church shall have regular Sunday morning service.

- 2. That Ruthsburg and Hayden's, now a part of the Queen Anne Charge, be attached to Centreville Charge.
- 3. That Eldorado Church on Hurlock Charge be made a Detached Church, and served by the pastor of Federalsburg. This arrangement is to obtain for one year and its continuance contingent upon the payment of pastor's salary in full and of all benevolences assessed on the church.
- 4. That Mt. Olivet and Cedar Grove Churches on Felton be declared closed churches.
- 5. That Payson St., Baltimore, be left in the hands of the President of the Conference and Daniel MacLea as a Committee of two.
- 6. That the arrangement now obtaining with our Cumberland Churches be dissolved, and that Melvin Chapel, Mapleside and Fairview Churches return to their former status as a circuit, to be known as Cumberland Circuit.

## Thomas Hamilton Lewis Memorial Church, Washington, D. C.

This project is so familiar to the Conference as to require no preliminary statement. It is enough to say that every consideration leading to the establishment of this enterprise is being increasingly justified. The opportunity for the establishment of a strong church is so obvious and convincing that your Board shares the opinion with all others of the necessity for immediate construction. The Conference has already expressed itself in this regard, but your Board wishes not only to supplement the action taken, but to authorize the President of the Conference at the earliest possible moment following the rise of this Conference to call into special session the Board of Survey and Extension and formulate an organization and procedure that will carry out our determination to build this church at once.

Minimum Salary Interpretation. That Regulation 1, Section 13, of the Manual be amended by including the following paragraph:

That the minimum salary guarantee as outlined above shall be interpreted as meaning that the Annual Conference will be responsible only for the difference between the proposed salary of the church and the \$1,200, not exceeding \$300 in amount, and that no allowance will be made for any deficit that may occur in the salary promised by the church.

## Report I

## COMMITTEE ON LITERATURE AND EDUCATION

Your Committee on Literature and Education has reviewed the work assigned to it and submits the following report:

We believe that our publishing interests and our educational institutions are making an indispensable contribution to the church in particular and to the world in general.

## Westminster Theological Seminary

Your Committee notes with delight the great success of the Seminary in its unparalleled work for our great church. Not only to our own, but to many other denominations has it made an invaluable contribution. impossible to sufficiently evaluate or too highly praise the services rendered to the Seminary, and through the Seminary to the Kingdom, by Dr. Hugh Latimer Elderdice—a man honored by every one who knows him, a man held in highest respect by our own and other churches, who has given his life to our church. He never tired, fretted, nor scolded; always with the keenest sympathy he loved and helped us. It is needless to say we regret that circumstances beyond the control of men made it necessary for him to resign his office as President. But it is without doubt or fear and with the highest confidence and assurance that we endorse and support his worthy successor, Dr. Fred. G. Holloway. As a professor in the Seminary for five years, in the sight of his fellow-workmen there, he has proved his fitness and competency for this his larger task. Though we are now at a time when the world is changing, we are confident that this institution will go on from victory to victory.

We concur in the recommendations of the Board of Governors in the following:

- 1. That the Maryland Conference appoint Fred. G. Holloway to the Presidency of the Westminster Theological Seminary for the ensuing year.
- 2. That the Maryland Conference appoint H. L. Elderdice to the Chair of Practical Theology in the Westminster Theological Seminary for the ensuing year.
- 3. That the Maryland Conference elect Fred. G. Holloway as treasurer of the Maryland Conference contributions to the Endowment Fund of the Westminster Theological Seminary, succeeding H. L. Elderdice, who has resigned from that office.

We pray that God may continue to bless this institution and the faithful souls who with patience and sacrifice have been and still are laboring there. To these faithful servants we express our best wishes and give our warmest allegiance.

#### The Methodist Protestant-Recorder

We are happy to welcome Dr. R. L. Shipley as the new Editor of our only church paper. We feel that this paper should be subscribed to by every Methodist Protestant family within the realm of possibility. It is extremely regrettable that the list of subscriptions today to the Methodist Protestant-Recorder is smaller than that of The Methodist Protestant alone before the merger. This condition can and must be remedied. We must get it into our thinking that the subscription list must grow. It is unthinkable that so important a factor of our church life should decline at the very time when it is most needed. It is not only possible but easy to increase the distribution of this unifying, integrating and illuminating messenger to the whole church. We believe that under the wise and able leadership of Dr. Shipley the subscription list will be largely increased. If Dr. Shipley can say "I want subscriptions," in a way that brings a subscription from the great and noble G. Campbell Morgan and elicits from him the description of the Editor as "virile," certainly the church should so respond.

## Western Maryland College

Western Maryland College continues its splendid work under the vigorous and renowned administration of Dr. A. N. Ward. Dr. Ward has not only led Western Maryland College to a high and well-deserved place but has directed all collegiate thinkers to the purpose and indispensability of the small college. Dr. Ward has brought to the attention of this Conference the financial needs of the college, which we here briefly review with recommendation.

... Fifty students will be unable to return to college in the fall unless financial aid is forthcoming,

Inasmuch as the college gives discounts to ministerial students, and the sons and daughters of ministers, and

Inasmuch as only \$750 was received from the Board of Education during the last quadrennium, we recommend

That the Executive Committee of The Board of Christian Education of the Methodist Protestant Church be requested to grant to Western Maryland College a fair and equitable share from the percentage allotted to Educational Institutions in the General Conference program for World Service.

## COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

(See Journal, Page 29.)

Your Committee appreciates the valuable service rendered the cause of religious education in the Maryland Annual Conference during the past two years by Dr. C. E. Forlines. He has laid an adequate foundation upon which we must build wisely for the years to come.

We note with appreciation the abundant labors of Dr. Forlines and the success that attended his work. His services in the interdenominational and cooperative movements reflected credit for the Methodist Protestant Church as well as helped make more efficient many workers in the Kingdom of our Christ.

The Leadership Training School at Westminster, Md., continues its valuable contributions. We believe that the record of 208 pupils taking 22 courses from 18 instructors, receiving 306 credits, 53 of these young people consecrating themselves to some form of definite Christian service, more than justifies the small investment made by the Maryland Conference for the training of our leaders.

We commend the faculty of the Westminster Theological Seminary for providing enough religious education courses to enable seminarians to receive an International Council diploma upon their graduation from the Seminary. We call attention to the fact that the Seminary students earned 673 standard credits last year.

Dr. Lawrence Little appeared before your Committee and spoke concerning the Religious Education Department of the Summer School at Western Maryland College, beginning July 25, offering four major courses in religious education and church administration. We endorse this school and recommend that our ministers and leaders in the field of religious education avail themselves of this opportunity to fit themselves for larger services.

We regret that financial stringency requires such a drastic cut in the allowance for the Director of Religious Education of the Maryland Annual Conference. Nevertheless, feeling that it is imperative that the work done during past years be conserved, we recommend that the services of Dr. C. E. Forlines be secured to build programs and supervise the projection of the same; that he be paid \$300 and allowed an expense account of \$100 to do this work; and that he continue to be designated as Director of Religious Education of the Maryland Annual Conference.

We note with pride the work done by Mr. Harold Cheyney, as Executive Secretary of the Maryland C. E. Union, and ask that the ministers and members of the churches give Mr. Cheyney their heartiest cooperation.

We reaffirm our belief in the value of cooperative religious education as represented in the work of the Maryland-Delaware Council of Religious Education and urge our constituency to participate in the cooperative movements of this Council.

## DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Your Director of Religious Education respectfully submits the following report:

The work of the Director for the last year was a continuation of that of the preceding year. This includes conferences with pastors, parents and young people. Whenever it was possible he was in some pulpit on Sunday presenting the cause of Religious Education.

During the year he has labored in the dual capacity of Professor in the Westminster Theological Seminary, and of Director of Religious Education in the Maryland Conference.

The Work in the Seminary. There were sixty-four students in the Seminary last year. All of these pursued courses in Religious Education. Nine courses were offered. In these nine courses the students earned 449 Seminary credits. A Seminary credit is equal to one and one-half standard credits of the International Council of Religious Education. Accordingly what the students earned in the Seminary was equal to 673 standard credits.

#### The Work in the Conference.

- 1. Your Director visited and addressed the first series of Quarterly District Conferences.
- 2. He cooperated with the Methodist Episcopal Director of Religious Education, Wilmington Conference, the Presbyterian Director of this area, and the Maryland-Delaware Council of Religious Education in setting up Standard Leadership Training Schools on the Eastern Shore. Thirteen such schools were set up.
- 3. He cooperated, so far as it was possible, in setting up such schools on the Western Shore. Six cooperative schools were conducted within this area.
- 4. A very successful denominational school was conducted in Washington.
  - 5. Your Director taught classes in ten of these schools.
- 6. As many as 353 of our people were registered in these schools and to them were awarded 200 standard credits.
- 7. A successful denominational school was conducted at Westminster during the last week in July. There were 18 instructors and 208 pupils. Twenty-two courses were offered and 306 credits were awarded. Fifty-three young people consecrated themselves to some form of definite Christian service. There were 8 who graduated and received their Christian Worker's Diplomas.
- Arrangements are now about complete for the Denominational Leadership Training School in Westminster, July 25-31.
- 9. Your Director, by virtue of his office, is a member of the Maryland-Delaware Council of Religious Education. As a member of the Committee on Education he with the Directors of Religious Education of the other denominations in the area and the Staff of the Maryland-Delaware Council of Religious Education, have made some progress in co-ordinating the various activities of the area and promoting cooperation among the various agencies of Religious Education.
  - 10. Your Director has met with some open opposition and with more

indifference, but upon the whole there has been very satisfactory responses. He appreciates the fine cooperation that has been given him by a very large number of the ministers, parents and young people.

## Report K

## COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM AND SOCIAL SERVICE

(See Journal, Page 25.)

The Maryland Annual Conference has never hesitated to speak out boldly and fearlessly on all moral questions; and as we are meeting again in annual assembly we must face issues which call for honorable and courageous expression. We must maintain and defend our position on all moral questions in the future as in the past.

There is in our country, and in the territory covered by our Conference, organized and persistent efforts to restrain and intimidate the ministry and membership of our churches relative to any aggressive activity on their part in the great fight for temperance, prohibition and public morals. However, we accept their challenge and move forward bearing our weapons of war. We put our trust in the God of battles and do not fear the foe. An increasing and persistent conflict between right and wrong still goes on with unabated intensity; but the Church of Christ offers no apology for its militant activity all along the line.

Our great Leader and Lord came into this world to destroy the works of the devil, and we would be false to our duty and unfaithful to our trust if we failed to follow Him in this task also.

The unscrupulous politician warns the ministry and the church to keep out of politics and "preach the gospel." But we answer that, though we shall not use our pulpits in the interest of any particular political party, yet we shall insist that the members of our churches shall know the candidates who are on the side of temperance, prohibition and morality in every political campaign. To fail to speak out in the time of danger, even though the minister should be branded as "political parson," would make us as guilty as Saul of Tarsus, who held the coats of those who slew Stephen.

We, therefore, pledge ourselves anew to the support of all officials in the enforcement of all law, and in their efforts to bravely meet the insidious propaganda of the liquor interests.

We call upon our people everywhere to vote only for those candidates for public office who will faithfully promise to stand by our national Constitution and laws, and who will give definite assurance of their willingness to help make the Eighteenth Amendment thoroughly effective.

Our enemies declare that prohibition and law enforcement have driven the liquor traffic from doing business out in the open on our public streets to the back alleys. But we submit that our enforcement officers are not only officers of the public street, but of the alley also. After the tiger has been driven from its lair, let us see to it that both the lair and its occupant are destroyed.

The wet press, in giving a half page to a single man in his changed attitude on the liquor traffic, and the repealing of the Eighteenth Amendment, while it gives but a few inches relative to official action of the General Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, shows that either the editors do not think that the Methodist Protestant Church amounts to much, or that it is not news that this church declares itself to be dry, and in a fighting mood against the liquor interests of this nation. May the moral forces of America work and pray that the time will soon come when our consecrated rich men will use some of their money to publish a Christian newspaper to get the facts to the people. This matter is worthy of thought, especially since millions of dollars are backing wet propaganda, while money is lacking to give even our dry forces the facts that they need to know.

We re-affirm our confidence in the Anti-Saloon League, and fully endorse all the work in which it is engaged, and we, therefore, welcome its representatives to this Conference, and open to them the pulpits of our churches.

Our late General Conference in Columbus, Ohio, voiced the opinion that defeat of the Anti-Saloon League would threaten the life of Prohibition in the United States. A resolution adopted by the General Conference said that it "unequivocally opposes the nomination or election of national or state officers who favor repealing, modifying or nullifying the Eighteenth Amendment."

We renew our allegiance to the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and pledge to this organization our continued support. We still believe that pledge-signing, with proper temperance instruction, is needed in our Sunday Schools and Young People's Organizations.

#### Sabbath Observance

The Lord's Day was instituted that it might meet the deepest needs of humanity. The moral welfare of our people is dependent upon the right use of this Holy Day. Abraham Lincoln was speaking as a prophet when he said: "As we keep or break the Sabbath, we nobly save or meanly lose the last best hope by which man arises." The battle for character and decency must not be relinquished. Maryland has been conspicuous among the states for the official adherence to right observance of the Lord's Day. The vote recently in Baltimore modifying the Sabbath Laws of that city seemed a blow in the face of the Christian Church. However, as God still lives, and while the Lord's Day Alliance and the Christian Church are actively engaged in behalf of the Lord's Day, we can but hope that later good will come as a result of our disappointment.

An insatiable greed is seeking to paganize our twentieth century civilization by triumphing over the higher and holy impulses of our people, but God has always had a way of bringing to His world a revival of true and undefiled religion which has caused His spiritual Kingdom to triumph over wrong. May we consecrate ourselves more fully to Him, and look for the better day!

We recommend that in accordance with the action of our 1932 General Conference, that all our pastors make the Lord's Day Educational Program a part of the regular work of their churches.

We recommend that all our people, churches and Sunday Schools take some of the memberships in the Lord's Day Alliance. We further recommend that the book published by the Lord's Day Alliance, "The Day of Worship," which has been commended so highly by the leaders of all the Protestant churches of our country, be given wide circulation in all our homes and congregations.

## Marriage and Divorce

We more and more view with alarm the increasing lightness and disregard with which the marriage vows are being held.

With many people marriage is not a sacred thing, and for the slightest provocation the marriage relation is dissolved. The many reasons now for which persons are being divorced are making their re-marriage but little better than legalized adultery.

Our pastors are continually being called upon in some of our pastorates to marry divorced persons from distant cities. We, therefore, reaffirming our recommendation of last year, "utter a word of caution to our own pastors that they will discountenance and frown upon the marriage of divorced people, and will scrutinize most diligently the records and conditions of all marriage ceremonies which they may perform."

## Christianizing Industry

The present economic collapse which is so wide-spread throughout the broad land of ours, and beyond, forcibly convinces us that there is something radically wrong with the present economic order. A complete diagnosis is impossible, but your Committee believes that the full remedy may be found in the preaching and living Christ as the center and circumference of all economic righteousness and justice.

We believe that the gospel of Jesus Christ, properly accepted by capital and labor will Christianize industry so that men will be placed above machines and the "right to work" above profits.

We believe that large corporations which provide immense sinking funds in their days of prosperity to protect their stockholders during an economic depression, should also be mindful of the working man, whose labor has provided the wealth of the corporation. And we decry the whole-sale cutting of wages.

With renewed consecration and trusting in God, let us go forth in His name.

Your Committee after giving careful consideration to the communications and reports referred to us reports as follows:

Personal Report Statistics. We note with pleasure that all charges report their churches incorporated with the exception of Warwick.

The Pastors' Reports show a slight decrease in the number of charges reporting new subscriptions to The Methodist Protestant Recorder. Recognizing the importance of a well-informed constituency, we therefore urge all pastors and charges to cooperate with the Editor of the church paper in his effort to increase subscriptions.

Fifteen charges failed to elect Lady Visitors to our Home for the Aged at Westminster. They are as follows: Payson St., Bedford, Carroll Ct., Cecil Ct., Clayton, Mariners, Dagsboro, Dorchester, Greenwood, Laurel Ct., Lewes, First Church (Lynchburg), Second Church (Lynchburg), Tyreanna, and Mt. Tabor.

Thirty-four pastors report that Disciplines have not been furnished the new members received into the church. This is a better showing than last year. However, we call attention to the importance of all pastors and Official Boards to comply with this law of the church.

We have carefully considered the list of ministers who are indebted to the Board of Christian Education, and report that they are making a sincere effort to meet their obligations as they come due. It is important that all such obligations be met promptly in order that this fund may be available to others who may seek financial assistance in their education.

## Report N

## COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

(See Journal, Page 23.)

We still accept the Great Commission as a great challenge for the ages. We still feel that the last words of our Lord on the eve of His ascension were words of wisdom. We still believe the statement, "And I, if I be lifted up will draw all men unto Me," is correct, but we realize He must be lifted up by His followers to produce such results.

Therefore, we see our imperative duty as His disciples in these modern days and rejoice in it. If we are to count it all joy to suffer for Jesus' sake, why should not we gladly do so? What though we are called on to leave loved ones, friends and comforts to do the work of an evangelist for the Lord? What though we do have to bring our tithes and offerings into His storehouse for this purpose? He gave His all—His life—to make this possible for us—Why should we not do likewise, if necessary, for Him?

It was said in the long ago that "Salvation shall be my walls and bulwarks." We believe this is still true and neither individual nor world problems shall be settled satisfactorily until this is realized; and this cannot be realized until the world has the love of God in its heart.

We rejoice in the fact that so many of our noble men and women have given themselves to this task and have succeeded so well in it. We likewise rejoice in the large crowd of witnesses who are spurring them on from victory to victory with their prayers and financial support.

While we lament the reduction in the missionary budget, we still believe the Lord God of Saboath will see us through and that this reduction will only be temporary. Our foreign fields as well as the home field are seemingly feeling the distress of the present age, and from the communications of our brethren therein it is evident that those to whom they minister are with ourselves awaiting a Saviour.

From Kalgan, China, Brother Soderbom reports signs of a spiritual awakening, mentioning in particular a Shantung revival, said to resemble the work recorded as of the early days of the Christian Church. Though this is going on outside the church, there is room for us to praise God for the same, as for the slow but sure growth within the church.

Brother Paul Warner from Nagoya, Japan, emphasizes the doubling up of responsibility upon him in the departure of Brother Layman, and in the disruption of the Orient, thanking God for the health and strength to carry on in the work in which he is engaged. We pray to God that He may continue to gird him with strength and supply the needed daily bread.

From both these countries so sorely stricken in their strained relations comes a plea for understanding, a courage to carry on, and the word that the bitterness is rapidly abating. For this attitude on the part of our brethren, and the presence of the arm of the Lord in protecting and preserving both our missionaries and our missionary interests we are most thankful to our Heavenly Father.

Though it will be with regret that we see him and his good wife depart from us, we are happy in the knowledge

that the devotion of the women of the Maryland Conference area makes possible their early return, for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God in Christ Jesus among their adopted people.

Your Committee is pleased to have the presence of Miss Hodges with us, and would assure both Miss Hodges and Bro. Cassen of the continuance of faith in Christ, and the hearty support of the Church at home.

The home fields have suffered, yet those who work therein press on. Brother Woodford rises with undaunted resourcefulness in the replacement of the building destroyed in April by fire even in the sacrifice of time and of money and of personal convenience. Though prone to lament the loss, we are more given to commend the courageous attitude of Brother Woodford and his co-workers both at Pine Ridge and on the firing line in the churches of the Conferences. His missive to us expresses regret in his enforced absence from this session, and we wish him to know that we are mutually minded in this as in other respects.

Your Committee of a year ago highly commended the work at Avalon Park, Chicago, and of Brother G. E. McDorman of this Conference, administering there as a messenger of God. We regret in this session a year later the changes that have occurred in this work. We welcome the return of Brother McDorman and pray that the spirit of the Master may be furthered better in the new adjustment condition.

Our brethren in Seattle, Washington, sound a note of certainty and optimism that is refreshing as they refer to their fields as, "pleasant and full of promise." Two things are asked of this Conference by Brothers Betschler and Hodges. May we assure them of our prayers and direct them to the Father for the blessing they covet.

Our communication received from Mrs. J. W. Armstrong having been referred by the Conference and explained by Mrs. T. Raymond Matthews, is most enthusiastic and pleasing. It is pointed out therein that for the current year amidst the seeming adversity marked development in the work of the Maryland Branch includes a larger circulation of The Missionary Record; a new consciousness of the value of organization for the work among the churches; the establishment of a Western Shore District Organization; the work of the Girl's Home, especially the services of Mrs. L. B. Smith, in teaching a Monday evening Bible class with a high percentage of attendance voluntarily. Be it noted likewise that the Maryland Branch have met in full their apportionment of \$15,000, with a total of \$17,000 in all. Expressing great appreciation of the untiring interest and cooperation on the part of the President of the Conference several items in the nature of requests and recommendations are included. It needs to be pointed out that there are two branches in the Maryland Conference area, namely, the Maryland Branch and the Washington-Virginia Branch. In the Maryland Branch area there are 245 churches with but 76 auxiliaries. The Washington-Virginia Branch area includes 16 churches with 10 auxiliaries. We note the dual slogan or goal of the Maryland Branch and applying it likewise to the other Branch urge its hearty support by this Conference, as follows: a Women's Auxiliary in every church and every woman in every church a member. Let us here note that it should be understood that every woman in every church is automatically in theory at least a member of this organization. May we but urge that it may be made in practice as in theory. We

concur in the recommendation for request of our ladies asking that the Conference help them to work a more equitable apportionment to the auxiliaries based on Conference assessments granting them authority to apportion churches where there is no organized women's work. We ask of the Washington-Virginia area an annual report henceforth.

Dr. Haddaway has brought to us information both pleasant and unpleasant. Among the unpleasant things mentioned we note the necessary curtailment of our work in the foreign fields including withdrawals from each of them. Be it noted however that our Board in taking such action sees no need for fear of seriously crippling the work already begun and now in operation. These economies and others are the basis for an estimated saving for the quadrennium of \$12,000. Of the indebtedness of four different Boards four years ago such monies have been applied to the payment thereof as to leave on the total an amount of indebtedness now equivalent to that of the Home Board alone at the former General Conference session. Whereas at that time there were but the items of publication there are today 61 new pieces of literature paying for themselves in addition, ranking in a favorable way with that of the other denominations. Our Conference is not well acquainted with the work of Mrs. Hazel Greenwald at Dillonvale, Ohio, among the foreign element largely infidels. We are glad to hear from the Executive Secretary of the remarkable work of Mrs. Greenwald in this field.

Although it is worthy of note that four churches have been erected on home mission fields in the last quadrennium we deem it a credit to note that no losses have occurred in this part of our work. We commend our Board for the policy of stabilizing this work in unstable times. Even if the planting of new works has not been possible holding "fast that which is good."

We note with pleasure the reelection of Dr. G. W. Haddaway as executive Secretary of the Board of Missions and of Mrs. Marie Thompson as Associate-Secretary and pray God's blessings upon them and an ever increasing cooperation with them on the part of our pastors and people.

## MARYLAND BRANCH WOMEN'S MISSIONARY WORK

As President of Maryland Branch Women's Missionary Work I beg to submit the following report:

Our missionary year closed with our annual meeting March 29-30. It was the general opinion that this was the best meeting we had yet had, and that it closed a successful year. Some of the elements of that success may be recorded. (1) The annual report blanks sent out were returned in larger numbers and contained more accurate information than ever before, showing a consciousness of the value of organization is growing among our churches. There is still a great deal to desire along this line, however. (2) The District work has developed steadily, a Western Shore District having been

added to the three already organized on the Eastern Shore. The pastors in that section are seeing the value of quarterly missionary meetings, and their cooperation has been very helpful.

Each of the five districts has appointed an Extension of Work Committee to organize new auxiliaries and strengthen existing organizations. A start has been made and we hope the coming year will see many churches falling into line where now there is no women's work. The pastors can be of great help to these district committees.

- (3) Five hundred and nineteen subscriptions to "The Missionary Record" were reported, a gain of sixty-four over last year. This is a distinct step forward in missionary education. Along this same line it was reported that many auxiliaries are using the Year Book and the monthly material gotten out by the Board of Missions, copies of which are sent at the expense of the Branch to over one hundred auxiliaries and churches throughout the Conference.
- (4) The quarterly meetings have been well attended and programs have been well planned. It was the privilege of the Branch to have as their guest speakers Miss Hodges, Rev. and Mrs. Cassen, and Dr. T. R. Woodford. Miss Hodges and the Cassens have been very generous with their furlough time and have visited many churches throughout the Conference with fine results of increased interest and support.
- (5) The Maryland Branch met in full the apportionment of fifteen thousand dollars given to them by the Board of Missions. Over seventeen thousand dollars was raised for all purposes. This achievement, we believe came as the result of self-denial on the part of many of our women, and we were very happy over it.
- (6) The Girl's Home has met the difficulties of the year with courage and success. The Home, like everything else, is feeling the effects of the times. The number in the Home family has been reduced because girls who have lost their jobs have had to return to their homes. What is coming to be a real institution in the Home is the Monday evening Bible Class taught by Mrs. L. B. Smith. Although it has been purely voluntary there has been an attendance of almost one hundred per cent.

In spite of the progress in the Branch that we are glad to record, we do not lose sight of the many things still to be achieved. Our revised list shows only seventy-six auxiliaries; when we remember that there are about two hundred and forty churches in the Maryland Conference we realize that we have a long way still to go toward our ultimate goal of a woman's auxiliary in every church. It must also be said that we are a long way from that other goal—every woman in every church a member of the women's auxiliary. We wish the Committee on Missions might cooperate with us in holding these two objectives before the mind of every minister in the Conference. We ask the aid of the Conference, also, in helping us to work out a more equitable apportionment to auxiliaries based on Conference assessments, and to give to us the authority to make an apportionment to churches where there is no organized women's work.

We wish, in closing, to express our appreciation of the untiring interest and cooperation of the President of the Conference, Dr. L. B. Smith. To him and to our Maryland Conference we pledge the loyalty of the missionary women.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF LADY SUPERINTEN-DENTS TO THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE HOME FOR THE AGED

March 16, 1932.

The capacity of the Home is now twenty-six. Whenever a vacancy occurs it is filled immediately by the first applicant on the waiting list.

We regret to report the following deaths since our last meeting: Mr. Augustus Watkins, of St. John's Church, entered the Home Feb. 22, 1928, died Dec. 26, 1931, aged 78 years; Miss M. Susan Watson, of Congress St. Church, entered the Home Dec. 1, 1910, died March 3, 1932, aged 90 years. Miss Watson was remarkable for her years. On Jan. 6, she enjoyed very much the celebration of her ninetieth birthday, which was arranged by her loving friends in the Home.

The following applicants were admitted on probation: Miss Capitole C. Hood, of Lowe Memorial; Miss Rosa Belle Wilson and Mr. Samuel S. Holland, of Pocomoke church.

Miss Virginia Fox, aged 84 years, of Congress Street Church, who entered the Home July 1, 1919, developed a bad mental condition and was removed to Springfield State Hospital in September.

A reception was held on July 22 for the young people who were attending the Leadership Training School at Western Maryland College. About sixty-five took advantage of this opportunity to visit the Home and become acquainted with the guests. We hope for a larger attendance next time.

The Annual Visitor's Day was held on Sept. 2. The attendance was very gratifying and we were pleased to welcome a number of Lady Visitors and friends who were visiting the Home for the first time. One Lady Visitor brought a bus-load from her church, which made us very happy as well as the Home family. We hope that others will plan to visit the Home, not only on Visitor's Day, but at any time during the year.

Had it not been for a few generous friends, Santa Claus could not have come to the Home this Christmas, but we are thankful that through their generosity we were able to give each one a suitable gift and all the good things of the season. Many churches sent individual gifts of money which were greatly appreciated by all in the Home. This is a very lovely thing to do, as it gives each one a little spending money and lightens the load which at times is almost too heavy for the Ladies' Board.

Donations were received from 78 churches and organizations, and from many individuals. Seventeen delegations from various churches and societies brought their donations instead of sending them, and spent several hours visiting the Home family. A number of these rendered enjoyable programs and served refreshments to all. Several groups of young people entertained with plays, songs, and humorous readings, which the shut-ins greatly enjoyed.

The purchase of an up-to-date radio was made possible by Mrs. Virginia Baum, a guest in the Home, who solicited about one-half the cost; and by an interested friend through whom we bought it at the wholesale price.

The following repairs and improvements were made: Painting of four bedrooms and third floor hall, floor coverings in several bedrooms, lights in attic, enlargement of reception room, addition of two bedrooms and upper and lower porches, excavation and cementing of cellar under new building, lighting fixtures and furniture for reception room, and Frigidaire. The screens for the windows of the reception room, costing \$17.50, were donated by the matron, Miss Kate Murray.

Realizing that the many friends of the Home who had endured with us the poor facilities for entertaining at the Home would rejoice with us in the completion of the beautiful reception room, 20 ft. by 40 ft., we sent out a letter announcing the good news and appealing for help to pay for this improvement. This letter was sent to each Lady Visitor and to all friends who, in the past few years, had shown their interest in the Home by sending personal donations. It was also published in the Methodist Protestant-Recorder, Feb. 5. Up to date we have received gifts from fifteen individuals and ten organizations, totaling \$264.00.

# THE MARYLAND EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENT SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH OF BALTIMORE CITY

(See Journal, Page 19.)

The Maryland Educational Endowment Society met in the Book Rooms, Baltimore, June 2nd, 1932. After the transaction of the usual business, on recommendation of the President of the Maryland Conference, the Society elected Fred G. Holloway to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of H. L. Elderdice from the Board of Directors. Officers were elected as follows: President, Fred G. Holloway; Treasurer, George K. Mather, and Secretary, N. O. Gibson. The Treasurer reported through H. L. Elderdice that the income from the Henrietta Gibson legacy and the income from the E. J. On motion of Dr. G. W. Haddaway the Secretary was authorized to cast the ballot for the Board of Managers as it now is. Ministers: L. B. Smith, E. D. Stone, P. W. Crosby, R. Y. Nicholson. Laymen: T. A. Myers, W. C. Scott, D. C. MacLea, Henry Gilligan.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION SOCIETY

The President of the Conference acting as Superintendent of Church Extension has rendered what service he could through the year in cooperation with pastors and officials at four points in launching and completing four new churches. He has also encouraged and assisted in financing these new enterprises.

West Baltimore Church. This congregation decided to move the material in the old building at Gilmore St. and Lafayette Ave., and erect a beautiful church building along the same architectural lines, with a number of needed improvements to meet modern needs. The Board of Managers assisted in procuring a mortgage on the property from the Provident Savings Bank. The church expects to meet the entire cost of this new building without direct financial aid from the Conference. The cost is about \$60,000 besides the ground, and the debt is about \$45,000. The pastors, Dr. Gill and Brother Ogg, are greatly encouraged by the loyalty and generous cooperation of their members, and the interest manifested in the community.

Mariners. A new brick building consisting of an auditorium and adult Bible class unit has been erected here on the site of the former church building which was destroyed by fire in December, 1930. The architectural plan was submitted to a committee of the Board of Survey, which urged a further consultation with a church architect. Because of the decision of the local building committee not to accept the advice of the Board of Survey, the plans for the church were carried out without official endorsement. The President, however, dedicated the church and assisted in the financial effort on the occasion. The building is an imposing and creditable structure, and along with the tabernacle in the rear, will afford perhaps adequate

equipment for religious work and worship. The cost was about \$16,000, and covered to within about \$3,000 by the insurance from the former building.

Bedford. In March, 1931, the Fellowship Church on this charge was sold to the Evitts Creek Water Company for \$5,000. At the following session of this Conference this church was legally closed, and an appropriation of \$200 was made toward the support of a pastor to be sent there with the hope that during the years of his service at least two new buildings might be erected on this circuit. Soon after the adjournment of Conference the President visited this charge and arranged for the Quarterly Conference to come into legal possession of the money derived from the sale of Fellowship Church. He was officially requested, acting for the Board of Survey and Extension, to distribute this fund between the two churches contemplating the erection of new buildings. Since then a new frame church building has been erected at Centenary Church at a cost of about \$13,000, including contributed labor and material, and consisting of an auditorium and basement, and five Sunday school rooms. At the same time a new brick structure was erected at the Centerville site consisting of an auditorium and large basement with eleven rooms. The cost, including contributed labor and material, was about \$21,000. The entire cost of these two new buildings has been covered by gifts and subscriptions. It is perhaps the most phenomenal work done within the denomination during these years of finan-

In the meantime at these points and at Rainsburg Church, there were seventy-eight conversions and one hundred and ten membership accessions, and the charge is improving vastly its record on benevolences.

Friendship. The parsonage was destroyed by fire in October, and a new bungalow has replaced it, the cost being practically covered by the insurance and extra gifts.

Second Church, Lynchburg, Va. A new parsonage was purchased at Second Church, Lynchburg, and is occupied by the pastor's family.

Other Property Additions. A community hall fully equipped for social and recreational purposes has been procured at Libertytown, and a new church house, next door to Christ Church, Baltimore, was bought and equipped similarly.

## **Debt Reduction and Adjustments**

As a result of the Liquidation League, continued in the face of great financial odds, the heavy obligations of the Society, incurred during the years of plenty while some of our best church extension work was being accomplished, have been successfully met, and gradually reduced. We have passed some most critical points during the year, when our one resort was prayer. But, the door was opened and our needs have been supplied.

Edmondson Avenue Church. Edmondson Avenue Church has assumed \$60,000 of the former debts of the Society, and is making rapid progress in reducing this amount of debt. The remaining debt incurred by establishing this church amounting to about \$21,000 has been assumed by the Society. and the appropriations to the church conveyed to the Society. The Board of Managers will, of course, continue responsibility for some of the notes assumed by the church, until released by the creditors when the notes are

sufficiently reduced. The church continues to grow in membership and strength.

Calvary Church, Virginia. The officials of this church have consented to assume the mortgage debt of \$12,000 on this property, and the parsonage debt of \$6,000. They have released the appropriation on the church debt to the Board of Managers, but requested the continuance one year longer of the appropriation on the parsonage expense. This church too is making satisfactory progress. Several notes against this property were paid off by the cooperation of the local church and the Liquidation League.

Chesaco Park. This charge has so greatly weakened during the economic depression that it is entirely unable to meet the expenses on the parsonage. The Liquidation League paid \$500 toward this debt during the year.

First Church, Wilmington. At the time the new stone structure at this point was erected two years ago at a cost of \$50,000, the Board of Survey and Extension was consulted and the plans approved, with the understanding that no financial obligations were to be borne by the Conference.

Early this Conference year financial misfortune befell the principal supporter of the church, and for a time seriously threatened its loss. The President arranged to cut the current budget more than half, and accepted the voluntary resignation of the pastor at great personal loss to the latter, in order to try to save the property. For seven months the church has been cared for by the President, who has been ably assisted by a number of pastors and the deaconess, without cost to the local congregation. The latter with a little aid rendered from outside sources have successfully managed the financial problems concerning the property. Twelve new members have been received. The church has a most hopeful outlook in a new and growing community.

A pastor will be assigned at this session at a modest salary, and some financial assistance, if possible, should be rendered. The assistance rendered during the year closing was not at the expense of the Conference or Church Extension Society.

Thomas Hamilton Lewis Memorial. The Conference of 1931 authorized the promotion of a plan to begin the erection of this much needed and most promising church in Washington. Details explaining its postponement to date are found in the President's report. The congregation is self-supporting, and has raised \$700 this year toward the debt on the lot. Some generous laymen have contributed liberally to the immediate payment of the lot mortgage, in order to provide collateral for a part of the first unit of a church building to be erected this calendar year. About \$2,300 more will clear the debt on this valuable lot. The portable structure can serve no longer to provide a house of worship, and we are required to build this year or withdraw from the location. Before this Conference adjourns plans should be made for immediate steps toward a new building.

The President of the Conference, acting in the capacity of Church Extension Superintendent has striven to look after the details of this department without interference with his duties as President, and aside from the expense of a part-time stenographer there has been no expense to the Society in connection with his work during the two years of his service.

# OBITUARIES

#### FRANCIS D. REYNOLDS



Rev. Francis D. Reynolds was born November 26, 1871, in Baltimore, Md. He received his early education in the Public Schools of this city and feeling called of God to preach the gospel was ordained in 1895 in the Mission of Faith of the M. E. Church in Baltimore, Md.

On Feb. 27, 1901 he was received into the United Brethren church at Waynesboro, Pa. (Bishop Ezekial Kephart,) presiding and received ordination as a minister of that church.

At the session of the Maryland Annual Conference held in the Rhode Island Ave. M. P. Church, Wash. D. C. Brother Reynolds on the Recommendation of the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders was received into the fellowship of the Maryland Conference and was assigned to the Lawsonia church in Somerset

County. He served the following charges in the order named: Kennedyville, Dover and Leipsic, Sharptown, Waverly, St. Pauls, Baltimore, Md. and Evergreen, from which he was transplanted to the church of the first born in heaven.

On April 10, 1892, at Baltimore, Md., he was married to Emma J. Rush, by the Rev. Herbert Reed, pastor of Hanover St. M. E. Church. He is survived by his widow, and four children, Mrs. Benson V. Riggen of Crisfield, Md., Mr. Percy Lee Reynolds, of Baltimore, Md., Mrs. Paul R. Dickerson, of Laurel, Del., and Mr. Wheatley R. Reynolds of Baltimore, Md.

Brother Reynolds' illness was of short duration. The week prior to Christmas he was confined to the parsonage by Bronchitis, which very slowly yielded to treatment; however between Christmas and Dec. 30th, he was again devoting himself to the welfare of his people. He held a meeting in his church on Dec. 28th, and the following day preached in his pulpit. Dec. 30th he suffered a relapse which developed Broncho-Pneumonia, and on Jan. 3rd he fell asleep in Christ.

Rev. E. H. Jones, writes, "In the death of my esteemed and beloved Brother Reynolds, I have lost a true friend. Evergreen church has lost a faithful pastor, the Maryland Conference has lost a devoted minister. We have been friends for over thirty years, and we walked and talked together in sweet fellowship, sharing in each others sorrows, and joys.

He was a man of beautiful christian character, and his kindly disposition endeared him to all who knew him. His life was fruitful in good works. As a preacher he was true to the teaching of Jesus Christ, and strictly evangelistic, and was called upon to preach at Camp-meetings, and revival services.

Wherever he labored his people loved him for his genial, wholesome disposition, and regarded him as a true shepherd.

His work was always well done. To his family, friends and the membership of the churches he served, let us find consolation in the fact that our brother had an unfailing belief in immortality. Some sweet day we shall meet again. He had come to the days when things do not grow, but ripen; days when the setting Sun sends out rays of golden light along the downward path of the sloping hill, and lights up the narrow stream we call, death.

When we come to the river that marks the unknown shore may our hearts and hands be filled with deeds of kindness such as was his. Good night! Someday we shall greet each other with Good morning in the land, God calls home."

Rev. Edward T. Kirkley writes, "F. D. Reynolds was a man who lived among men. He did not live above men, but for men. He recognized his own infirmities and was merciful with the shortcomings of other men. He was not an imitator but was as original as it is possible for a man to be. He lived in the world, but was not of the world. He was bold in witnessing for Christ, and energetic in his labors for Christ. He was a friend to man. No favor was too big, no task too hard, no journey too long but that he would prove himself worthy of his heavenly calling as a son of God and a preacher of the Gospel of righteousness.

He was a born preacher. He had little training, and yet he was a great preacher. God called him and trained him for the work of the gospel ministry. He could preach with the tongue of Angels and with the logic of the Holy Spirit. He was a preacher of the Word. He offered no substitute nor did he preach another gospel. He preached "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever". He fulfilled the apostolic injunction "do the work of an evangelist". He welcomed opportunities to preach at revivals, campmeetings, Missions and elsewhere, looking for open doors to carry the everlasting gospel.

He was a true pastor, and like his Master, "went about doing good". He rendered a tender ministry to the sick, unfortunate, and sorrowing. He loved the Methodist Protestant church and worked for its best interests. He found a few men whom God had called to preach the Gospel and helped train them for the work of the Lord. I am in the Methodist Protestant church through the efforts of F. D. Reynolds".

Mr. Lee B. Johnson writes, "seven years ago Brother Reynolds came to us at Evergreen and immediately began his enthusiastic and untiring efforts to make our church work interesting and inspiring. Nothing was too much trouble for him to undertake in the way of preparing interesting programs for all concerned, and through his large circle of friends and acquaintances was always able to secure excellent talent.

Even after affliction impaired his eyesight he was more persistent than ever, and only those who were associated with him personally can appreciate his sincerity and determined efforts to carry on the Masters work for which he was so ably fitted.

Brother Reynolds became one of my very closest friends, and my personal contact with him in the activities of the church work created a friendship which I shall always cherish in my memory".

Brother W. W. Richardson writes, "Rev. Frank D. Reynolds came to our church about 1918. He served this charge faithfully and efficiently for

seven years. He was an excellent preacher, and a successful pastor. He was a man of unquestioned christian character, loved and held in high esteem by the people of St. Paul's church; although he had been away from us for some years his passing caused much sorrow, as his memory is still very near and dear to us all."

Dr. J. W. Urie of Kennedyville, Md., states that Brother Reynolds came to his charge in the spring of 1909. He soon settled down in this pastorate and applied himself with usual diligence to every department of the church, visiting the people in their homes, comforting the sick, baptizing the children, and making himself sincere friends among the membership, and putting the impress of his Godly life upon those who were outside the church.

Brother Reynolds was a spirit filled preacher of the gospel "once delivered unto the saints". He believed the Bible to be the inspired word of God, recognized its authority, and sought to apply its teaching to our every day life.

He only remained with us one year, but his name, and ministry abide in the hearts of those now living."

The funeral service for our deceased brother was held in the South Baltimore, M. P. Church, in charge of the President of the Conference assisted by several of our Baltimore ministers. Interment was made at Mt. Olivet Cemetery, Baltimore, Md.

To the speaker the loss of this good man is almost unspeakable. I had the pleasure of knowing our deceased brother intimately for nearly twenty years. During the latter part of this period there developed a bond of christian fellowship and sympathy that drew our souls together akin to that of David and Jonathan.

The early Christians were accustomed to bid their dying friends Goodnight, so sure were they of their awakening on the Resurrection Morning.

"Sleep on beloved, sleep and take thy rest; Lay down thy head upon the Saviour's breast; We loved thee well, but Jesus loves thee best-Good night! Good night! Good night! Until the shadows from this earth are cast, Until He gathers in His sheaves at last, Until the twilight gloom be overpast-Good night! Good night! Good night! Until the Easter glory lights the skies, Until the dead in Jesus shall arise, And He shall come, but not in lowly guise-Good night! Good night! Good night! Only "Good night" beloved-not-farewell: A little while and all His saints shall dwell In hallowed union indivisible-Good night! Good night! Good night.

### ELLIS HAMILTON JONES



"Brother Jones is dead!" was the message spoken with suppressed sobs on the telephone, by a close friend of the family to the writer at early twilight. Friday, April 29, 1932. The shock of the announcement was terrific. genial friend, so recently mingling with his brethren, apparently in his usual health-dead! Another confirmation of the oft-quoted Scripture, "In the midst of life we are in death." On his return from a call to solemnize the marriage ceremony, he was seized with a heart attack, and sat down on couch where he was given first aid. Very soon two doctors were with him, but they were powerless to detain him. Quietly and peacefully as the dying day, he passed away, leaving his sixty-three year old body in the arms of his devoted life-

partner, as the angel-convoy came from the other side to bear the released spirit "on their snowy wings to the Immortal Home." So imperceptibly was the passing that, supposing him to be resting more comfortably, Mrs. Jones said: "He is better; isn't he, Doctor?" Then came back the solemn attestation: "He is gone!" He was one of nature's noblemen with the instincts of a Christian gentleman. Such as he do not die! Aye, they cannot die! It is hard to realize that he is gone.

Ellis Hamilton Jones was born near Fincastle, Botetourt County, Virginia, October 26, 1869. His father, the Rev. Ellis Harrison Jones, was pastor of Bethel Lutheran Church, near Winchester, Virginia, when he confirmed Ellis at the age of ten. He was baptized while yet an infant, by his incle, the Rev. William Rusmiselle, pastor of the Lutheran Church of Strausburg, Shenandoah County, Virginia.

During his Frederica pastorate he married Miss Anna Barker, of Harrington, Delaware, who, with one daughter, Mrs. Ruth E. Webster, of Delmar, Delaware, and one grandson, Robert Jones Webster, more affectionately known as "Bobby", a sister and brother in Hagerstown, Maryland, another sister in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and another brother in Frostburg, Maryland, survive him.

It has been said that he was never anything but a preacher of the Gospel. In early boyhood he was wont to hold prayer meetings and discuss religious topics with his playmates. He entered the work of the Maryland Conference in 1898, and successfully served as pastor of the following charges, consecutively: Williamsport, Frederica, Grove, Chincoteague, Franklin City, Lawsonia, Clayton, Stewartstown, Delmar, Parksley, and East Baltimore from 1925 until his translation. His zeal for Christ and the Church characterized a tireless ministry in the Maryland Conference of 34 years. His loving spirit and cheerful greeting scattered sunshine and cheer

along the pathway of life, making lighter the burdens of many discouraged and weary ones. He was a true shepherd of "the flock of God." As a preacher he was earnest, evangelistic and eminently acceptable. He was frequently called upon to preach on special occasions, always rising equal to every requirement. His last sermon was preached before a Lodge of the Masonic Fraternity to a capacity audience in his own church. He was most happy and unusually effective in this effort which elicited enthusiastic expressions of hearty appreciation.

On all the charges he served he was held in highest esteem, and his memory is lovingly cherished by those to whom he ministered, as the following beautiful and touching tributes from members of the obituary committee attest:

Rev. H. B. Jester expresses his exalted estimate, "I have known Ellis Hamilton Jones, twenty-six years, during which time he was my trusted friend. I have visited his home many times, and have always been welcomed with a smile. He had many friends, and knew more people than any other man I ever knew. There was not a small or mean thing in his nature. He lived the Life; a life that makes men honest and pure. He was a man of character, and God called him for his own. He was an effective and eloquent preacher of the Gospel. He expressed the truth in an easy way, and directed his flock to look to the Lamb of God, that taketh away the sin of the world. The day he fell asleep, he entered into rest from winds and waves and earth and sky; and his Eternal Summer shall not fade. When his loved ones were fading from his sight, he might have had in his mind the words of Helen Stetson:

'My little House of Plans has tumbled down, All that I built with such devoted care Lies shattered at my feet, and in the midst I stand bewildered, tempted to despair.

These plans have failed, so I shall quickly sweep The scattered fragments in a useless pile, And singing at my work I'll build again A house far better, if I rest awhile.'"

Rev. E. C. Graham submits this tender tribute: "I first came to know Rev. E. H. Jones in 1911. At that time I was connected with the Anti-Saloon League of Delaware, and Brother Jones very graciously opened his church at Clayton that I might present the work of this Godly, loyal and patriotic organization. From the time I became a resident of Clayton in 1913 until his recent translation, we were intimate friends. I shall always cherish the fact that Brother Jones and his wife spent his last evening on earth at my home. I could say many wonderful things about this good man, this worth-while man, this true man, this friendly man, this preacher-man, but time and space will not permit. Nevertheless, the urge is upon me to say this: Brother Jones was a Christian gentlemen; he was loyal to the cause he represented; he was a good Gospel preacher, he was a faithful pastor; he was an enemy to no man, a friend to all. I doubt not that these and many other Christian virtues will clothe his glorified body when he rises from among the dead to meet the Lord in the air."

Doctor E. B. Fenby, of East Baltimore Church, bears this loving testimony: "When Brother Jones was appointed to East Baltimore Church, at my request as delegate, a brother very kindly volunteered this remark to me: 'You are getting a fine preacher, an industrious pastor and a good man; he will do you no harm.' A pastorate covering a period of seven years, demonstrates the accuracy of that friendly appraisal. And I wish to add that Brother Jones not only did us no harm, but his ministry of a positive character was a real, rich benediction to us, and he endeared himself to the hearts and homes of our entire constituency. A good man has gone to his well-earned rest and reward."

Mr. John Hopkins, of Parksley, pays this fine tribute: "I was acquainted with Brother Jones many years before he served our Parksley Charge. To know him was to love him. His was a fine Christian character, always gentle and kind; considerate of others. He had a pleasing manner and made many friends. I cannot say less of him than that he was a conscientious Christian gentleman. He served only a short time our Parksley Charge, but during that time we learned to love him; we believe he was steadfastly trying to walk in the footsteps of the Master. I feel the church has lost a good man."

Mr. Ralph E. Nichols, of Delmar, adds his own word of touching appreciation: "I became acquainted with Rev. E. H. Jones when he began his work as Pastor of our Church at Delmar. His ability to make friends soon won for him the confidence and high esteem of the whole Church and community. This confidence and esteem grew as his work went on during the six years of his pastorate here. As a pastor he was quiet, gentle, loving and kind; he always had a word of greeting or encouragement for those with whom he came in contact. He was ever on the alert to minister to the needs of his people and enjoyed every opportunity to mingle and mix with them. As a preacher he may rightly be classed as an orator. with his flow of words and command of the English language he was able to present his discourses in a most beautiful and inspiring manner, ever proclaiming, however, the fundamental truths of the Scripture. He loved the fellowship of men: His interest and activity in fraternal work has helped to increase the innumerable host of friends which he had at the time of his death. He was widely known, and perhaps, as much loved by those who knew him as any other minister of the Maryland Conference. And, because of his wide acquaintance with and knowledge of men and affairs, and the wonderful memory which he possessed, his advice and counsel was treasured by many who knew him. In his passing we have lost one who will be greatly missed by his friends and associates. He has gone to be with his Father and to receive his Heavenly reward. Our consolation and our faith is that we shall some day meet him in the great Beyond."

Funeral services were held at 10.30 A. M., Monday, May 2nd. Rev. L. B. Smith, D. D., President of the Conference, was in charge and presented an historical and biographical sketch. He was assisted by Rev. E. C. Graham, pastor of St. Paul Church, who read the Scriptures and offered prayer, and Rev. G. M. Clayton, pastor of Bethesda Church, and long-time friend, delivered the eulogy. More than thirty-five ministers of the Maryland Conference were present in token of the high esteem in which he was held by the brethren of the Conference. Several ministers of other Denominations

were also present. The remains were taken to Smyrna, Delaware, and buried on a lovely hillslope in the beautiful Odd Fellows Cemetery. In the obsequies, Brothers Graham and Clayton were joined by Rev. Ziba Adams, pastor of Clayton Charge, and the Federalsburg Lodge of Masons, where the deceased held his membership. A concourse of grief-stricken friends of his former pastorates in Delaware and on the Eastern Shore of Maryland and Virginia, awaited the arrival of the funeral cortege from Baltimore.

We shall miss our brother's cordial greeting and delightful fellowship which we have long enjoyed, but we know that it is well with him. Someday, by the grace of God, we shall see him beyond the Shadows, as he mingles with the company of the great and good men who have gone from our Conference, to join the myriad of the just-made-perfect in Heaven.

#### MRS. MISSOURI LEWIS

Mrs. Missouri Lewis, widow of the late Rev. R. L. Lewis, a member of the Maryland Conference, departed this life after a lingering illness and much suffering January 25, 1932, in her home in Baltimore, Md.

Funeral services were held in Mitchell's funeral parlors, Rev. Dr. L. B. Smith, Rev. Dr. J. M. Gill. Rev. G. A. Ogg, and Rev. W. B. Judefind taking part in the services.

Her body was removed to Federalsburg, where it was buried beside her hunsband. Sister Lewis was a most devout Christian and a most loyal Methodist Protestant. She loved her Lord and her church.

As a minister's wife she was deeply interested in her husband's work, making him an excellent helpmeet. She was kind and sympathetic, discreet and considerate—a model preacher's wife and beloved by the people of her husband's parish. In a quiet and unobtrusive way she wielded a Christ-like influence as she lived a Christ-like life. During the latter years of her husband's life, the years of his invalidism, she was beautiful in her devotion to him and ministered to him tenderly, patiently, and lovingly. To her invalid daughter, who still survives her, she was a most devoted mother.

Rev. Dr. Sexsmith of the Committee pays this worthy tribute to our departed sister:

"It was the privilege of the writer to have known Mrs. Lewis for quite a number of years, during which time there grew up a friendship which shall always be gratefully remembered. Her unassuming manner and kindheartedness won for her many friends who appreciated the influence of her Christian character.

"Among her many noble qualities of life she manifested a keen interest in her denomination and especially in the Maryland Conference in which, with her husband, she served faithfully during his ministry. She felt a personal interest in its membership, sharing in her heart either the joy or sorrow through which they passed.

"Although hindered by physical conditions from participating largely in the activities of her church, her willingness thus to serve was always

manifest. She was never happier than when she could share in some service which might brighten the pathway of another or lift the load they were carrying. Never seeking the glare of publicity, but in her rather reserved quiet manner she revealed the grace of a beautiful christian life. We shall never forget her simple faith in God which led her through many a discouraging hour in life. She lived a good life and has finished her course. It may well be said of her, 'Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them.'"

"It was my privilege to be Mrs. Lewis' pastor when I was stationed at Federalsburg. She and her daughter soon became close friends of the young pastor and his wife. We were often in their home and they were often at the parsonage, and many pleasant hours were spent together in delightful social fellowship as well as in the pastoral relationship. Mrs. Lewis was quiet and gentle in her manner, warm-hearted in her sympathies and steadfast in her loyalties. She was a humble, consecrated Christian, who loved and served her Master in her own unobtrusive way, was devoted to her church at home and deeply interested in the welfare of the church at large. As the former wife of a minister, she could appreciate the experiences and problems of a pastor and his family, and was always ready to help with a word of kindly encouragement. I treasure the memory of her friendship."

Brother M. T. Miller, who as a boy remembers Mrs. Lewis while her husband was paster of Brother Miller's church, gives this brief but beautiful word of testimony: "I remember her as a gentle, kind, and lovable character."

Brother L. W. Hurley, of our Seaford Church, where Rev. R. L. Lewis served years ago, says, "I remember Mrs. Lewis as a sweet tempered woman, loyal to her church, and faithful to all its activities."

Thus all who knew this Christian woman praise her excellence.

She lived a good and useful life, and has gone to her reward, to be with her Lord and her dear husband to whom she was so devoted while they walked together on earth.

Sister Lewis leaves behind her to mourn her departure a daughter, a former deaconess in the Methodist Protestant Church, Mrs. Elma Wilcop; and a sister, Miss Indiana Redhead.

# THE CONFERENCE SERMON

#### REV. E. L. BUNCE

SUBJECT: "How To Become Fishers Of Men."

TEXT: "And He saith unto them, 'Follow Me' and I will make you fishers of Men."

I do not presume to enlighten your minds, but rather to refresh your minds and my own concerning the greatest task that God has committed to men

A greater task than has ever been committed to kings, potentates and rulers. A greater task than balancing the National Budget. A greater task than solving the present Economic Problem. I bring to you a simple message on the "Supreme Task of the Church and Ministry."

In the language of the text, Jesus called Peter and Andrew from the business of catching fish to the sublime task of catching men. He did not call them to be executives and administrators, but, to be fishers of men.

Jesus announced His own mission by declaring, "The Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which is lost." He called twelve men, taught and trained them that they might become proficient and successful in winning men from sin and death to salvation and life. He said to them, "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you."

Christ's mission and our mission is one. He commissions us to go forth and find those who are lost in sin and bring them to Him. Holy Writ is very plain and definite as to the necessity and wisdom of this great work.

"He that winneth souls is wise."

"He that converteth a sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death and shall hide a multitude of sins."

"They that be wise shall shine as the firmament; and they that turn many unto righteousness as the stars forever and forever."

A Church may raise its budget in full, it may make generous response to special appeals, its order of worship may appeal to the aesthetic taste of men, its membership may occupy a place among the elite of earth, but, if it fails to touch and win the unsaved, if it fails to gather fruit from the highways and hedges, if it fails to rescue those who are bruised and broken by sin, it has no excuse for existing.

A minister may clothe his sermons with the beauty of eloquence and power of oratory, he may build attractive and entertaining programs, he may conduct the business affairs of the church with splendid administrative ability, but, if he fails to win men to Christ, he has failed in the supreme purpose of his ministry.

I fear that oft'times we are so busy organizing, so engrossed in raising money, so distracted with multitudinous details, that we fail to do the one supreme thing for which Christ called us into the kingdom.

#### Christ Is Counting On Us

You are familiar with the story of the supposed scene that took place after Jesus went back to Heaven from His earthly ministry. He and Gabriel were walking down the golden street one day and Gabriel said, "Master, you died for the whole world down there, did you not?" "Yes." "And do they all know about it?" "Oh, no! Only a few in Palestine know about it so far." "Well, Master, what's your plan? What have you done about telling the people of the world that you died for them?"

"Well," the Master is supposed to answer, "I asked Peter and James and John and Andrew and some more of them down there just to make it the business of their lives to tell others, and the others are to tell others, and the others others, and yet others, and still others, until the last man in the farthest circle has heard the story and has felt the thrilling and the thralling power of it."

"But, Master, suppose they fail, what then?" "Gabriel, I haven't made any other plans, I Am Counting On Them."

Men of the ministry, men of the churches, Christ is counting on us to carry this message of redeeming grace to those "who sit in darkness and the shadow of death."

What shall we do to become successful fishers of men? How shall we qualify for this sublime task? Jesus laid down a simple rule for the men whom He called in that far off day and the same rule applies now.

#### "Follow Me and I Will Make You to Become Fishers of Men"

Following means fellowship-constant, abiding fellowship.

Following all the way until we "Know Him, and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His suffering, being made conformable unto His death." Abiding in Him as the branch abides in the vine. Learning His will, knowing His ways, receiving His power.

#### (1) We Must Follow Christ in His Passion for Men.

So much has been said and written about this passion until there seems little left to be said. It is the one thing we must have before we can capture men for Christ.

It fires the soul, it sets the heart aglow and drives men on through toil, hardships, peril and danger. It was the dynamic force that drove Paul through scourgings, imprisonments and shipwreck to carry the message of salvation to Pagan Rome.

It wrung the heart-breaking cry from the lips of this matchless Apostle—"For I could wish that myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh."

It takes young men and women from homes of comfort, from loving companionships, from positions of prestige and power and sends them forth into the slums of the city, the isolated mountain districts of the Home Mission field and to the far-off lands that are benighted with superstition and idolatry.

This passion so dominated the soul of John Knox that he cried out "Give me Scotland, or I die."

The modern cry seems to be—Give me the Budget in full or I will be called before the committee on Official Character.

Let us briefly consider the Distinctive Elements of this Passion.

#### (a) Intense Hatred

There can be no burning passion for the souls of men without the element of hate. The heart of the Master was moved with hate. He hated sin, the thing that separates men from God. Sin, that diabolical power that takes man, the Masterpiece of the Infinite God, and turns him into a devil.

Sin that turns the smiling faces of the boys and girls from the sunlit hills to the valleys of shame and death.

Sin, that makes thieves, grafters, murderers, libertines and harlots.

Sin that takes the fairest flowers of manhood and womanhood and tramples them in the filth and slime of vice and iniquity.

If we would be successful in winning men, we must hate the thing that injures and destroys men.

#### (b) Supreme Love

Jesus revealed to the world a new kind and quality of love. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

Jesus laid down His life for His enemies.

He manifested the kind of love that enables a man to love his enemies, to do good to them that hate you and to pray for them that despitefully use you and persecute you.

The love that bears and forbears. Love that gladly goes the second mile, that willingly surrenders the cloak as well as the coat.

Paul possessed and understood this marvelous love and beautifully sets it forth in the thirteenth chapter of first Corinthians. Though I speak with the eloquence of men and the power of angels and have not this flaming power, my life is just a discordant jangle of sounds.

Though I feed the hungry, clothe the naked and burn my body out in humanitarian service and have not love, I am nothing.

Seeketh not her own—Does not seek the easy place or the prominent pastorate. Is not puffed up with pride and egotism. Goes steadily on through suffering and hardship, through evil report as well as good report that it may find and redeem the lost.

Jesus laid His great loving heart against the cold sinful heart of the world that He might warm it into life and purity. He did not wait for men to come to Him, but went out where men labor and toil, where men fight and bleed and die and touched them with sympathy and compassion.

His love encompassed all classes and conditions of humanity. He loved the rich young ruler who represented the highest type in the social and moral world. He loved Nicodemus, who represented the unregenerate class in the church. He loved Matthew and Zacchaeus who represented the selfish, greedy, grafting type in the business world. He loved the scarlet woman who represented the underworld with its

vice and shame. He looked with love and compassion on the great multitude, the laboring class. He shed tears of anguish over the sinful and rebellious city of Jerusalem. His great heart beat in tender sympathy with the bereaved sisters of Bethany.

If we are to win the world for Christ, we must possess this flaming,

dynamic power-THE LOVE OF THE MASTER.

Some churches are so cold, they would make the North Pole seem like the Torrid Zone. Some preachers are so stilted and professional, they would reduce the temperature of a Frigidaire.

Christ wants ministers and churches with warm hearts and compassionate spirits.

#### (c) Infinite Patience

The Master was wonderfully patient. Patient in suffering and persecution. When men misunderstood and reviled Him, when they followed Him for the loaves and fishes, when in their ignorance they misinterpreted His mission, He was patient and gentle with them.

How marvelous in His patience with impetuous, blundering Simou

Peter and doubting Thomas.

Patient with the weak, wayward and fallen.

"Teach me thy patience; still with thee In closer, dearer company, In work that keeps faith sweet and strong, In trust that triumphs over wrong."

In this great work of winning men we need the Passion of Christ which embodies the White Heat of Hate, the Glowing Flame of Love, the Gentle, Winsome Power of Patience.

#### (2) We Must Follow Christ In His Preaching.

There are many who will tell the preacher what to preach and how to preach. The hypocrite in the church and the corrupt politician on the outside unite in advising the preacher as to the kind of message he should deliver.

When the hypocrite is unmasked and the corrupt politician is exposed by the minister's message, they cry out with one accord, "Preach the gospel." That is exactly what they don't want him to preach.

They are described in Isaiah 30, 10: "Which say unto the seers, See not: and to the Prophets, Prophesy not unto us right things, speak unto us smooth things, prophesy deceits."

They would have us preach pleasing platitudes that would neither inspire a saint nor disturb a devil.

Jesus was plain and pointed in His preaching, laying bare the sins of the individual and of society.

"But woe unto you scribes and pharisees, hypocrites! for you shut up the kingdom of heaven against men: for ye neither go in yourselves neither suffer ye them that are entering to go in." "Woe unto you, scribes and pharisees, hyocrites! for ye devour widows' houses and for a pretense make long prayers: therefore, ye shall receive the greater damnation."

"Woe unto you, scribes and pharisees, hypocrites: for ye are like unto whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but are within full of dead men's bones and full of all uncleanness."

Jesus told them in no uncertain language, that they were rotten on the inside.

There was a certain corrupt politician by the name of Herod, who sought to kill Him and when Jesus was so informed He said: "Go tell that fox, Behold I cast out devils and I do cures today and tomorrow." Jesus compared him to a skulking, cruel, destructive animal. Jesus had a virile message that struck fear into the hearts of evil men.

We have Herod's descendants with us today and they would strip the church of her power and silence the voice of the ministry if they could.

Men of God, Let us send the word down the line to the Ritchies, Rascobs, Duponts, Poes, Sabins and their cohorts that we still preach the gospel of righteousness for the individual, the state and the nation.

Tell them in clarion tones that we stand for justice, decency, temperance and sobriety.

#### Repentance and Regeneration

The burden of Christ's message was Repentance and Regeneration. He called upon men everywhere to repent of their sins and turn to God.

Regeneration follows true repentance as the day follows the night. Christ's gospel is the gospel of a new creation. "Ye must be born again."

He declared that His death upon the cross, that through the shedding of His blood, was the way and the only way of cleansing and life.

Some of the modern theologians and preachers tell us that the Blood Atonement is distasteful to the refined and educated. A blasphemous theological professor recently told one of his classes that salvation by the blood of Christ was a slaughterhouse gospel.

A leader of religious education with whom I had a conversation a short time ago said, "Do you believe a pint of blood shed by a man two thousand years ago, can save the world?" Yes, I believe the precious blood of Jesus Christ shed on Calvary's Cross can cleanse the human heart and save the world.

Let us hear the voice of the Great Fisher of men.

"And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me."

"This is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins."

Let us hear the voice of the Apostles:

"Much more then, being now justified by His blood, we shall be saved from wrath through Him."

"How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God."

"For as much as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received from your fathers; but with the precious blood of Christ as of a lamb without blemish and without spot."

"But if we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth us from all sin."

"Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood."

"These are they which came out of great tribulations, and have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."

"There is a fountain filled with blood
Drawn from Immanuel's veins
And sinners, plunged beneath that flood,
Lose all their guilty stains."

"He breaks the power of cancelled sin

He sets the prisoner free

His blood can make the foulest clean

His blood atones for me."

"Without the shedding of blood there is no remission."

Not the blood of bulls or goats, not the blood of heroes and martyrs, not the blood of human carnage on the battlefield, but the blood of the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world.

"God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ."

"Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast,
Save in the death of Christ, my Lord;
All the vain things that charm me most,
I sacrifice them to His blood."

To be successful fishers of men, to be soul winners for the Master, we must follow Him in His passion, in His preaching, in His consecration until His Will becomes our will, His Purpose our purpose, His Mission the dominant passion of our life.

"O Master, let me walk with Thee
In lowly paths of service free;
Tell me Thy secret; help me bear
The strain of toil, the fret of care."

# MANUAL

### RULES OF ORDER AND REGULATIONS

#### For The

### GOVERNMENT OF THE MARYLAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE. 1. Conference shall convene in Annual session on the second Wednesday in June. (The first date for annual session under this rule being Wednesday, June 12, 1929.) The current conference year shall end on May 31st.

2. The Pastor shall send to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the certificate of election of the delegate or delegates to the Annual Conference immediately after the election of the same. He shall also send the name to the President of the Conference and to the pastor of the Church where the Conference is held.

3. The Secretary shall make a list of the delegates so certified, omitting all contested cases; and this list, together with the list of the ministerial members, shall constitute the roll of Conference upon which the Conference shall organize.

4. The churches shall be assessed in a sum sufficient to meet the incidental expenses of the Conference, including the publication of the Minutes—each church shall receive Minutes in the proportion of one copy to every twenty members.

Rule II. OFFICERS OF THE CONFERENCE. Duties of the President:—1. To take the chair precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.

 See that the business of the Conference shall proceed according to these Rules of Order and other Rules and Regulations adopted by the Conference.

3. Shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference.

4. Preserve the most rigid order, and confine the members to the subject under consideration.

5. Not allow improper personalities nor reflections upon any religious communities.

6. Announce each person arising to speak as soon as he shall have addressed the chair by declaring him "The minister from .....," or "The delegate from ......"

7. State a question sitting, but stand when the question is put and taken; also when he states a point of order, and also when he makes any formal communication to the Conference.

 Is not allowed to vote when a question is taken unless there be a tie, but he may vote in case of ballot.

9. May call any member to the chair when he wishes to participate in debate or for other purposes, but such person shall not be entitled to the chair after adjournment.

10. The office of stationing the ministers and preachers is committed to the hands of the President of the Conference.

11. It shall be the duty of the President to fill blanks in statistical reports for all charges unsupplied.

12. In the event of the death of any ministerial member or his wife or widow, the President shall immediately appoint an Obituary Committee from any number of the most intimate acquaintances of the deceased.

13. The President of the Conference is relieved from the usual plan of visitation on the Charges. He is to make survey of the District; assume

general oversight of all church work; he is to use his official leadership in securing the most constructive development for the Charges. And so far as possible, he is to meet the Official Board of each Charge once in the year.

The failure of the President to visit any Charge does not vitiate his

right to the amount assessed on said Charge for his salary.

And each charge shall forward, not later than July 1st of each year, the amount levied thereon for President's salary to the Conference Treas-

urer-who shall pay monthly to the President his salary.

The President shall represent the general interests of the Conference, and shall present their claims in such a manner and at such times as in his judgment may be necessary. And he shall use his utmost efforts with the Quarterly Conferences of the various charges to secure a salary of not less than \$1,200 for the pastor. And he, the President, shall urge upon the various charges the prompt payment of the salaries of the pastors, and upon all the churches the importance of being incorporated

Rule III. Duties of the Secretary:-1. To perform such duties as are

usually required of the Secretary of a deliberative body

Should the President not be in place at the hour of meeting the Secretary, or in his absence one of his assistants, shall announce the fact, and the Conference shall elect a chairman "pro tempore" and proceed to business.

3. Have charge of all the papers belonging to the Conference and be

accountable for them.

Be in his place precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.

Keep an accurate list of members of the Conference, and be the

Committee on Credentials.

6. Keep correct minutes of the proceedings of the Conference, including all written resolutions, whether adopted or rejected, and the mover and seconder of such written resolutions.

Keep a list of business, on which he shall record all business brought

before the Conference and in the order of its presentation.

8. Keep a list of committees, on which he shall record: First, the standing committees in the order of their arrangement in these rules, and second, all other committees that may be appointed, and in the order of their appointment.

Keep a correct list of the Circuits and Stations, to be used as occa-

sion may require.

Report to the Conference any unfinished business of the preceding 10. annual session.

He, with the Treasurer and Steward, shall be the Committee on the Preparation and Printing of the Conference blanks; and he with the Chairman of the Board of Finance and the Conference Treasurer shall be the Committee on the Publication and Distribution of the Minutes.

12. Supply the pastors with blanks, and send blank personal report blanks to all ministers who are not pastors, on which they are to state the

relation to the Conference they desire for the ensuing year.

13. He shall have a printed record of the Minutes duly certified by himself, which shall be considered the Official Minutes of the Conference, substantially bound every quadrennium, and include in each volume a copy of the General Conference Journal.

Duties of Stewards and Treasurer:-1. The Conference Rule IV. Steward and the Treasurer shall constitute the Board of Stewards, to whom the Secretary shall hand all reports and collections as received from the pastors; and this Board shall be responsible to the Conference for all money

and receipts and vouchers delivered to them.

They shall meet on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock and open the pastor's envelopes containing the reports and collections; shall deliver the various parts of the reports as designated; shall note the agreement of the pastors' financial reports with the financial envelope and prepare The financial envelopes shall be passed the reports for the Conference. to the Treasurer, who shall have charge of all the moneys of the Conference for distribution, upon order of the Conference Steward, which shall be the voucher of the Treasurer for his transactions, to the persons designated by the Conference to receive them. The Treasurer shall disburse money collected by the Conference for every purpose; in which transactions he shall perform the work assigned heretofore to the Superannuate Fund Steward and of the Church Extension Steward, as per special rules of each Society, and he shall continue in office until his successor shall be He shall keep a ledger and open account with some accepted bank. and his accounts shall be open for inspection at all times to the President of the Conference, or one designated by him.

Other duties belonging to the several Stewards shall be performed

and reported upon separately as now.

COMMITTEES. 1. All committees shall be appointed by Rule V. the President, except when otherwise directed in the Book of Discipline, or by special vote of the Conference.

The Standing Committees shall be:-1. The Board of Finance-5 Ministers, 5 Laymen. The chairman to be appointed one year in advance.

Itinerancy and Orders-5 Ministers.

Pulpit Service-3 Ministers.

Superannuates-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Literature and Education-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Religious Education-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. 6.

Moral Reform and Social Service—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. Benevolent Agencies—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. 7.

8.

Official Relations-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. 9.

Statistics-1 Minister, 1 Layman. 10.

The Committee not to be Obituaries-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. 11. appointed until the death of some minister requires it.

Missions-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

President's Report-2 Ministers, 2 Laymen. 13. Committee of Audit-2 Ministers, 1 Layman. 14.

Conference Program for the following session-3 Ministers (one 15. of whom shall be the President.)

Appointees on the Executive Committee of Union of Young People's Work-3 Ministers (one of whom shall be the President), 2 Laymen.

17. Home For The Aged-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Conference Arrangements-The President and the Standing District Committee.

Evangelism-3 Ministers and 3 Laymen. The President of the (This an ad-interim Conference a member, ex-officio, with voting power. committee.)

Group Life Insurance-President of Conference, and Treasurer of 20.

Conference.

Any person being a member of two committees shall have the

right to decline an appointment to another.

When there are present Fraternal Messengers and other visitors to whom the courtesy of formal recognition is due, the Chairman of the Committee on Official Relations shall quietly inform the President, where-upon the President may request the visitors be brought to him, to be by him introduced to the Conference, either at that time or when the state of business may with more propriety be arrested.

The Committee on Official Relations shall read as a part of their report an "Honor Roll" of the charges which pay their assessments in full.

Rule VI. ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE ANNUAL SESSION:-At 9 o'clock A. M., on the day to which the Conference adjourned from the last annual session, the President shall open the Conference by reading a portion of the Word of God, singing and prayer.

The Roll shall then be called, the Secretary reporting the names of absentees. In the event of the death of any member of this Conference, the chairman, or in his absence some member, of his Obituary Committee shall formally announce the fact to the Conference, and such announcement shall be made when the name of the deceased is reached in the calling of the Conference Roll, and the same shall then, on motion, be transferred to the Memorial Roll by the Secretary.

Following the Roll Call, the Memorial Roll shall be called. Lord's Supper shall then be served, after which the President, or his substitute, shall preach a sermon. The President shall appoint some one to preach the Ordination Sermon at 11 A. M. on Sunday. The time for holdpreach the Ordination Sermon at 11 A. M. on Sunday. ing Memorial Services for deceased members of the Conference shall be de-termined by the Conference Program Committee. The Conference Sermon shall be published each year in the Conference Minutes.

4. Examination of the President. At 2 P. M. the President shall call another minister to the chair and read his annual report. The chairman shall then address the Conference thus: "Brethren, you have heard the report of the President; shall his character pass?" In case of any charge against the official character of the President, it shall be handed to the Standing District Committee; and the chairman of that committee shall

answer the question: "Shall his character pass?"

5. At 3 P. M. on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot, as follows: 1. President. 2. Secretary.

3. Steward. 4. Treasurer. The Steward and Treasurer elected at one session shall serve at the following session, and they shall appoint two assistants with the approval of the Conference. 5. Standing District Committee, consisting of three ministers and three laymen. 6. Committee on Appeals,

three ministers and three laymen.

6. Examination of Official Character. At 4 P. M. Wednesday the roll shall be called and the pastors shall deposit their reports, and the collections prescribed by the Conference, each in a sealed envelope, upon which shall be marked the amount, the name of the collection, the name of the pastor and the name of the charge in the box of the Conference Steward. reports and charges against official character shall be handed to the Committee on Official Relations.

The sessions of Saturday shall end at noon, that the Committees may have time for their work, and that the President may have opportunity

to interview delegates and ministers.

Rule VII. ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE DAILY SESSIONS:-On each day following the opening session there shall be held a devotional service.

Reading of Minutes of the preceding day for correction and adoption.

Calling of the roll of charges in alphabetical order, for the presentation of any business by delegates or pastors from the churches they When any such, upon recognition of the Chair, shall present represent. any business it shall be recorded without debate on the list of business, or referred to the proper committee without motion.

4. Call for reports from Boards, Institutions and Societies, and communications, which shall be put upon the Secretary's desk to be taken up

in regular order, or made the order of the day.

 Reports of standing and special committees called for in order,
 and they shall be handed to the Secretary to be read by him. They shall not report at any other time without special leave.

6. Miscellaneous business.

7. When any business is laid before the Conference it may be made

the order of the day for any other day of the session and at a specific hour.
8. Unfinished business from the last annual session shall have pre-

cedence of all business except the order of the day.

Ordinary business shall have precedence in the order in which it

stands on the List of Business.

When any business is taken into consideration it shall not be interrupted by any other business except the order of the day or by adjournment.

Rule VIII. DECORUM:—1. When a member desires to present any business, or to speak to any question, he shall arise and address the Chair, "Brother President," and then pause until he is announced to the Conference, after which he may proceed addressing the chair, and restricting his remarks to the subject before the Conference.

If two or more members rise at the same time, the President shall determine which of them is entitled to the floor.

3. No interruption shall be allowed while a member is addressing

the chair, except a call to order by the President or by a member.

4. When a member is called to order he shall take his seat immediately, and be silent, until the President or member who made the call shall state the rule or order supposed to be infringed; after which the member called to order shall have the right to explain, and the President shall decide.

In deciding a question of order the President shall restrict himself to the rules of order, and any member declared to be out of order by the President may, if he obtain a second, appeal to the Conference. The question on such appeal shall be taken without debate, but the appellant may state the ground of his appeal. If the Conference sustains the chair, the member shall be allowed to proceed only in order.

6. No member shall speak oftener than twice to the same question, without special leave of the Conference, nor longer than fifteen minutes at any one time, unless by the same special permission.

7. Any member shall have the right to call for the reading of the

subject under consideration.

8. Every member shall report at roll call of the first day's session, and be present at the daily sessions of Conference.

Rule IX. MOTIONS:-1. Every motion shall be written, signed and read aloud by the mover, handed to the chair and read aloud by the Secretary, before any order can be taken upon it by the Conference; except motions for amendment, to lie on the table, the previous question, or to adjourn.

2. Any motion may be divided, if the sense will admit of the pro-

posed division.

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but to adjourn, to lie on the table, for the previous question, to commit, to substitute, to amend, or to make the order of the day; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule; the first three to be taken without debate; and the first always in order. But when the report of a committee has been under discussion, the motion to lay on the table shall not prevail until the chairman of the committee shall have been heard once on the subject, if he desires to speak.

4. It shall be in order to move the previous question, or that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending-except in cases in which character is involved—and if sustained by two-thirds of members present the question shall be taken. It shall not be in order for a member to move the previous question or to move to lay on the table at the close of his speech in which the pending question has been discussed.

When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question on reference

to the standing committee shall be first put.

6. No motion to commit, or to lie on the table, being decided, shall be again allowed, on the same day, at the same stage of the proposition.

A motion, after it is seconded, is the property of the Conference, and the mover has no power to withdraw or have it amended, without

8. No amendment shall be in order, further than an amendment to the amendment; but it shall be in order to move a substitute for the main question, and one amendment to the substitute, and if a substitute is accepted it shall replace the original proposition.

All motions to fix the place of the meeting of the Annual Con-

ference shall lie on the table twenty-four hours.

Rule X. VOTING .-- 1. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is being put shall vote, unless the Conference for a special reason shall excuse him.

No member shall be allowed to vote on any question, who is not within the bar at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of Conference, or when such member has been nec-

essarily absent.

3. Votes for all Conference Officers, the Committee on Appeals, Standing District Committee, Trustees of the Maryland Annual Conference and all other officers of all other organizations shall be by ballot. Otherwise, voting shall be by yea and nay; but a division of the house being called a count vote shall be taken, members rising in their places and standing until they shall have been counted.

4. A member may change his vote at any time before the chair an-

nounces the decision of the question.

5. Blank ballots shall not be counted.

Ayes and nays, and a vote by orders shall be as prescribed in the

Discipline.

Rule XI. AMENDING RULES AND REGULATIONS. All motions or resolutions, whether submitted by committees or individual members, All motions contemplating an amendment to these Rules and Regulations, must so specify. Otherwise, such action shall not be binding upon any other session of the Conference than that at which the same is passed.

### REGULATIONS.

Regulation I. DUTIEES OF PASTORS. 1. The pastor shall seek the co-operation of the Stewards in collecting the assessments made by the Annual Conference, admonishing them of their duty in this matter as contained in the Discipline, under head of "Duties of Stewards."

It is the duty of pastors to examine and see that suitable deeds be had for all churches, so as to secure them to the Methodist Protestant

Church, and, whenever possible, have them incorporated.

Pastors are required to apportion the President's salary equitably among the several appointments, and use their utmost endeavors to collect the same before the annual visit of the President.

Pastors are required to see that families belonging to their

respective charges are duly supplied with the Catechism of our Church.

Pastors are instructed to ascertain of those received into the Church whether they have been baptized, and if not, to administer the ordinance of baptism without unnecessary delay.

Every pastor is required to do his utmost to collect the full amount of the assessments made upon his charge, whatever may be the

difficulties that he may encounter.

7. It is the duty of the pastor to preside on the trial of an accused unstationed Minister or Preacher.

Pastors, when changing appointments, shall hand to their successors a plan of the work of the charge.

Station and Circuit Stewards shall furnish the pastor with a sufficient number of Disciplines, that he may be able to present each new member with a copy, in compliance with Disciplinary law.

10. That no minister of this Conference shall give his consent or assistance to building a church or parsonage on a lot that is not deeded unconditionally to an incorporated board of Methodist Protestant Trustees.

No minister of this Conference shall go as a loan to any church outside of the Maryland Conference unless said church is willing to con-

tribute to the Superannuate Fund of this Conference.

All pastors are required to submit in detail to the Board of Survey all plans their churches may have for new church buildings and parsonages, remodeling or extensive improvements, locations for buildings, etc., for advice and counsel, before giving their consent to or proceeding with the execution of their plans. This is done that churches may have advantage of the study and experience of the conference in all such matters. Further, no church shall receive any appropriation from Conference Funds until this Board of Survey shall have reviewed their plans and passed favorably upon same.

All married pastors of the Conference shall be guaranteed a minimum salary of \$1,200, and parsonage, and that where the charge either cannot or will not pay the said amount this Conference undertakes to pay out of Conference Funds the difference between the amount the charge pays and \$1,200, except in cases where the pastors agree to serve for less than the minimum salary to accommodate personal situations.

Further, that the minimum salary guarantee as outlined above shall be interpreted as meaning that the Annual Conference will be responsible only for the difference between the proposed salary of the church and the \$1,200, not exceeding \$300 in amount, and that no allowance will be made for any deficit that may occur in the salary promised by the church.

14. All pastors of the Conference shall be required to give at least

two weeks of their time for evangelistic services during the year, if needed, under the direction of the Committee on Evangelism, provided

that pastors shall be given three weeks' notice of their appointment.

15. Pastors, in arranging for their regular Quarterly Conference, shall give the President of the Conference at least two (2) weeks advance notice of date of such meeting, so that the President may be aided in so arranging his itinerancy as to meet the most Quarterly Conference Sessions possible during the year.

Regulation II. SUFFRAGE AND ELIGIBILITY. 1. Every minister,

preacher and member in full communion and fellowship having attained

the age of eighteen years shall be entitled to vote in all cases.

All members in full Communion and fellowship shall have the right to vote in the election of their class-leader; and those who have attained the age of twenty-one years shall be "qualified members" for the purpose indicated in Section 3 of Article IV of the Constitution, and in division 1 and 4 of "General Duties of Trustees," of the Discipline.

3. Every minister, preacher and lay member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-five years shall be eligible

as a representative in the General Conference.

4. Every member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible as a Steward, Class-leader and Sunday-School Superintendent, Trustee and a Delegate to the Annual

No minister shall be eligible to the office of President of the Annual Conference until he shall have faithfully exercised the office of Elder

two years.

The Conference strongly disapproves the secret ballot for the removal or return of the pastor, and condemns the complimentary vote that asks for the pastor's return in the public meeting and seeks his removal at the Annual Conference.

Regulation III. THE PRESIDENT'S PARSONAGE. The Confer-1. ence endorses the actions of the Committee in the purchase of the proper-

ty, 3600 Copley Road, Baltimore, as the President's parsonage.

2. The assessment of \$4,500 shall be continued under the name of "President's Salary," to be appropriated as follows; nine-tenths of the amount raised to be paid to the President as his salary and traveling expenses. One-tenth of the amount raised to be paid to the Agent of the President's parsonage, who shall pay out of this amount, the water rent, insurance and needful repairs of the property.

Regulation IV. RECORDS OF TRIAL CASES. In all cases of the trial of a minister, the Secretary of the Trial Committee shall make a correct record of the proceedings of the trial, and turn the same over to the Secretary of the Conference, together with a copy of the charges, and specification, a copy of the finding, or verdict of the Committee—and all other documentary evidence used in the trial, to be kept by the Secretary

Regulation V. WITHOUT APPOINTMENT AND SUPERNUMERARY REQUESTS. All requests to be left without an appointment for the ensuing year, or for a supernumerary relation, shall be referred by the Conference to the Committee on Official Relations for consideration and report thereon before such requests shall be granted.

Regulation VI. SABBATH SCHOOLS. 1. As a preparation for more efficient study and teaching of the Word, teacher's meetings should be statedly held under the direction of the pastor or superintendent.

2. Pastors are directed to carry out the Discipline regulations concerning the organization of our Sabbath Schools into Foreign Missionary Societies and the taking of a collection every quarter for Foreign Missions.

Children's Day shall be faithfully observed by all our Sabbath Schools, and the money received on that day shall be exclusively devoted

to the Children's Day offering for Foreign Missions.

Regulation VII. HOME FOR THE AGED. 1. Every charge shall elect or appoint a Lady Visitor from each church on the charge, where there is more than one appointment, and that the duties of this representative be defined as follows: "She shall be expected to maintain a sympathetic understanding of the Home in her church; to visit the Home whenever convenient; to co-operate with the Board of Lady Superintendents in securing special donations of money, food and supplies, and so far as possible to promote the interests of the Home in her local church."

2. The list of charges failing to meet the requirement of the Conference relative to Our Church Home shall be read at each session of the

Conference.

3. The second Sunday of November of each year shall be known as "Donation Day" for Our Church Home, and all our pastors are instructed to call the attention of their congregations thereto, and an endeavor made to have donations of provisions, groceries and things needed to conduct the Home, sent to Mrs. Chas. Billingslea, Westminister, Md.

Regulation VIII. ADMINISTERING ORDINANCES. No person, in

Regulation VIII. ADMINISTERING ORDINANCES. No person, in virtue merely of a license to preach, or even election to orders, is empowered to administer or assist in administering the Christian ordinances.

Regulation IX. UNSTATIONED MINISTERS. The Conference will not recognize as a minister of the Methodist Protestant Church any man who does not bring credentials from some other orthodox denomination, or who has not received suitable testimonials of ministerial character from our own Church. In returning the list of ministers and preachers, pastors shall name no person who does not possess the foregoing qualifications.

Regulation X. LOTTERIES. The practice of raising funds for church purposes, by means of lotteries and other games of hazards is disapproved by the Conference, and pastors are enjoined to discountenance their use.

Regulation XI. MORTGAGING CHURCH PROPERTY. The placing

Regulation XI. MORTGAGING CHURCH PROPERTY. The placing of mortgage upon church property for the purpose, directly, or indirectly, of paying the pastor's salary, is, so far as it has authority, disallowed by

the Conference.

Regulation XII. OBITUARIES. 1. It shall be the duty of the Committee, appointed in accordance with the Rule of Conference, to prepare an obituary, without delay, containing a notice of the place and date of the birth of the brother, the date of his conversion, receiving license to preach, and his reception into the Conference together with any other important facts connected with his history which their judgment may dictate, in addition to the particulars of his death, and said obituary shall be reported to the ensuing session of Conference.

Every ministerial member of this Conference is hereby requested to make and keep by him a record of his nativity, and of all the promi-

nent acts in his Christian and ministerial history.

3. The obituaries of wives and widows of the ministerial members of

the Conference shall also be published in the Minutes.

Regulation XIII. MARRIAGES. The Conference cannot encourage any of its members to expect support as married men until they shall have

served at least four years in the itinerancy.

Regulation XIV. TITLES AND DEGREES. Inasmuch as the degree of Doctor of Philosophy is the badge of University work and most rigid examinations—a degree which our better Colleges refuse to confer, and Universities do not confer for honor, but only for merit in advanced special studies—we feel sure no worthy institution would confer such a title for work done by correspondence, and the man who consents to bear a title

so conferred subjects himself to the ridicule of scholars and involves the ministry in a charge of vanity and insincerity. Therefore, this Conference expresses its disapproval of this method of obtaining degrees, and declines to recognize in any way a title so obtained.

to recognize in any way a title so obtained.

Regulation XV. UNFERMENTED WINE. The Conference recommends the use of unfermented wine in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Regulation XVI. DROPPING MEMBERS. Members of the church who remove from the community without taking a certificate shall be given pastoral care through correspondence by the pastor, and if they manifest an interest in the church and desire to be continued as members shall remain on the register. But such members, and members remaining in the community but absenting themselves from the church services and failing to give to the support of the church or to co-operate with the church in Christian work for more than one year, shall be visited by the pastor or written to by him if residing elsewhere and appealed to in loving solicitude for their loyalty to their Lord and to the church and to resume active relations to the church. If after six months, no change is manifest, it shall be the duty of the quarterly conference to address to each of such members a kind and Christian letter calling attention to their loss and the loss to the church of such neglect, and beseeching them not to abandon the hope of their calling in Christ Jesus, and admonishing them that if no change is made by them within six months the church will be compelled to regard their silence to mean that they wish to end their communion with us, and to drop their names from our register. If, after another interval of six months any member thus advised still manifests no interest, it shall be the duty of the pastor to report their names of the church and to show that the requirements of this section have been complied with, and the church shall have authority then to vote whether such members shall be continued or dropped. In the case of stations this action may be taken by the quarterly conference.

Regulation XVII. PASTOR'S MOVING EXPENSES. As the Discipline grants the Annual Conference the right to "make such regulations as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the ministers and preachers," it is the judgment of this Conference that the charge to which a minister or preacher is assigned should pay the moving expenses of the

incoming pastor.'

Regulation XVIII. CAMP-MEETINGS. 1. Camp-meetings shall have the sanction of Conference and receive ministerial aid from it on the following conditions:—

2. There shall be no traffic on the Lord's Day on the camp-ground or

the adjacent territory protected by the laws of the State.

3. The managers or other officers of the camp-meeting shall not bargain for or receive any portion of the money paid to railroads, or to the owner or owners of any conveyance or conveyances, as a consideration for conveying persons to the camp-ground, or the vicinity thereof, on the Lord's Day.

4. No advertisement of the running of trains on the Lord's Day shall be made by any of the persons referred to in the preceding paragraph, nor shall anything be done by their authority or solicitation to contravene

the foregoing regulations.

5. Upon receiving from a quarterly conference a request for ministerial supply and a pledge that the above regulations will be faithfully observed, the President of the Annual Conference shall appoint members of this Conference to assist in conducting the camp-meeting.

6. In the absence of a request and a pledge such as are named above, the President shall not appoint such ministerial supply, nor shall any

member of this Conference conduct such camp-meeting as pastor.

7. Appointees to camp-meeting service must be given four weeks' notice of their appointment. If they find it inconvenient to attend they shall promptly present their excuse to the President. If the President declines to revoke their appointment, a failure to attend shall be reported to this Conference by the President.

Regulation XIX. ELECTION OF DELEGATES. 1st—In Stations. In stations the election of delegates shall be by the qualified members under the direction of the stewards and whose credentials must be signed by the chairman and secretary of the meeting. The pastor shall announce the time and place of such meeting at least one Sunday before it is held, but in

no case shall he preside at the election of delegates.

2nd—In Circuits. In circuits a vote of the qualified members shall be taken by the stewards in each church on the charge, after due announcement by the pastor, for a delegate to the annual conference. The votes shall be brought in separate packages to the quarterly conference where they shall be counted. Anyone receiving a majority of all votes cast shall be declared the delegate elect, but if no one receives a majority the quarterly conference shall proceed at once to the election of a delegate. When it is necessary for the quarterly conference to elect the delegate, someone other than the pastor shall preside during the election, and whose name, with the secretary of the quarterly conference, shall appear on the credentials of the delegate.

3rd. In both stations and circuits and also at the quarterly conference all voting shall be by ballot and the election must be held at least

ten days before the session of the Annual Conference.

### Regulation 20.

### PLAN OF CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

A .- Expense of Travel.

1. The establishment of a pro rata basis of expense in reaching the seat of Conference for each minister and delegate—the said basis shall be determined by the Treasurer of the Conference, who is authorized to obtain the transportation rates from each charge to the seat of Conference from any representative railroad agent—that each charge shall pay its pro rata part of the said basis at a time designated before the sitting of the Conference—that from the amount of the said basis each minister and delegate shall receive the cost of his round-trip ticket to the seat of Conference. The Superannuated Minister's round-trip fare shall be paid out of the Conference fund, provided they attend Conference.

B.—Expense of Entertainment,

1. That each charge shall be assessed an amount equal to one per cent of the assessed salary for pastor. No man is eligible for entertainment unless his church has paid the apportionment.

2. All members of the Conference, including supplies, are eligible.

3. No member of the Conference can make a claim on the Conference if he remains at his own home, or if he is entertained, without

expense to himself, by relatives or friends.

4. In lieu of money for board, a member is permitted to charge his car fare to and from the seat of Conference as the case may be, excluding the first trip. Maximum amount allowed shall be \$2.00 per day. Members are not entitled to the maximum amount if their actual expenses are less.

5. All members of Conference who make their own arrangements to stop at hotels or boarding houses shall be entitled to the maximum

amount of \$2.00 per day.

6. The Superannuated Ministers shall be entertained upon the same basis as other members of the Conference.

C.—Corporation.

1. The Conference shall require that every charge shall co-operate in this plan, and the names of the charges which fail to co-operate shall be reported to the Conference.

## Regulation 21. Plan of Levy For The Budgets.

The Budget System in distribution is of three parts-

The President's Salary and expenses.

Maryland Conference Interests, to-wit: Incidental expenses of conference, Superannuates, Church Extension, Our Church Home and Deaconess Home.

c. General Conference interests, to-wit: Board of Education, Board of Missions, Board of Young People's Work, Superannuates (for the General Church), Children's Home, Old People's Home, W. F. M. S., W. H. M. S., American Bible Society and Contingent Fund of the Executive Committee.

Second: The Board of Finance shall ascertain—

a. The average amount paid by each charge for all purposes, plus unpaid total assessments, after deducting the amounts overpaid on "Assessments," "Rental Value of Parsonage," "Building and Improvements," "Paid on Debt," "Interest on Debt," "Special Campaigns, either of the General or Maryland Conference," for each of the five years immediately proceeding the current way and determine the procedure of the diately preceding the current year and determine the percentage of the same necessary to provide for the total assessment on the district.

b. The total number of full members for the current year, and de-

termine the per capita necessary to provide for the total assessment.

The division to be 40 per cent for membership and 60 per cent for

financial ability.



### Regulation 22. Annual Payments to the Invested Fund.

Every ministerial member of the Conference shall be assessed one-fourth of one per cent of his salary to be paid annually into the Invested Fund of the Superannuate Fund Society. All members admitted to the Conference shall be required to pay into the Invested Fund one per cent of salary for the first year of such membership.
