RESOLUTIONS OF THE CONFERENCE.

BIBLE CAUSE.

Resolved, That the Preachers be, and are hereby requested to take un a collection in each of their congregations, in behalf of the Bible cause in the first half of the conference year, and in every possible way co-operate with the accredited agents of the societies, and that the collections shall be returned to the treasurers of those auxiliaries within whose bounds they are made; and if no auxiliary be within their bounds. then the collections shall be returned to conference and paid over to the parent society.

Resolved, That the amount of each collection be reported at conference to the credit of the circuit or station on which it is made, and printed in our minutes.

EDUCATION.

Resolved, That the loss to the college of the appropriation by the state of \$1000, is an additional reason for continuing the collection for the college in all our Sabbath appointments, and that it be made by each preacher in charge in each Sunday appointment, about the month of October next, and further, that we strongly recommend the collection to the people.

Resolved, That we will continue our patronage to the Pennington Male Seminary, and recommend it to the members and friends of our church, as an Institution highly deserving of their favor.

Resolved, That the hopes entertained by this conference at the organization of the Wesleyan Female Collegiate Institute, that it would meet the wants of our people, by furnishing a female seminary of the first character, have been fully realised; and the success thus far attending the experiment, justifies this conference in calling upon our friends, to extend to this institution their best support.

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint a Committee of two to visit the Belle-Vue Female Seminary, of which Bro. Gilder is Principal, and report to our next session.

He was accordingly advanced to more responsible stations in the Church of God; and in each he magnified his office, made full proof of his ministry, and showed himself approved of God -a workman that need not be ashained-rightly dividing the word of truth. In the twenty-first year of his age, he entered the itinerant ministry under the direction of the presiding elder, and was appointed to the Strasburg circuit; and, in the spring of the following year, 1828, he was received on trial in the Philadelphia Annual Conference, and returned to the same charge. In 1829, he was stationed in West Philadelphia; in 1830, on the Cambridge circuit; in 1831, in Lancaster city; in 1832, in Germantown; and in 1833, on Bristol circuit. In 1834, he was appointed to the Bergen Neck Mission; in 1835, to Rahway; and in 1836 and '37, he was stationed in Newark, New Jersey. In 1838, he was transferred from the New Jersey to the Philadelphia Conference, and the four following years was stationed in this city: in 1838, at St. John's; in 1839 and '40, at the Nazareth; and in 1841, at the Eighth street Church. In 1842 and '43, he was stationed in West Chester, where, on Sunday evening, August 6th, 1843, he preached his last sermon, from Psalms xxiii. 4: "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me: thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me." For some time after retiring that evening from the sacred desk, the joys of God's salvation filled his soul unutterably full, and banished sleep from his eyes; his text was prophetic of his near triumph. God kept his faithful servant in perfect peace; and through his whole sickness, even when his mind wandered, all his expressions indicated the habitual religions tendencies of his soul.

The amiable and christian deportment of our excellent brother Nicholson, in his various relations and intercourse with men, won for him a high place in the confidence and esteem of his brethren; and his constant piety, ministerial ability, and intelligent and holy zeal for the honor of God and the prosperity of his cause, were crowned, especially in his later years, with glorious success. Many, many, are the gems of immortal beauty, that will deck his unfading crown.

Brother Nicholson was a man of study, of method and of prayer. He gave all diligence to make his calling and election sure; and kept under his body, and brought it into subjection, lest that by any means, when he had preached to others, he himself should be a cast away; and as he endeavoured to imitate the Apostle, so he obeyed his instructions, and gave attendance to reading, to exhortation, and to doctrine. His piety was never questioned and his qualifications for the work of the ministry were beyond dispute. His literary acquirements were respectable, and his talents, though not showy, were real, solid, compact and available. He was indeed an amiable man, a christian gentleman, an able minister of the New-Testament, a faithful pastor, an affectionate husband, a kind parent and a true friend. He lived to honor his divine Master, and he fell asleep in Jesus, as a christian warrior, fresh from the battle-field, with his laurels green upon him.

He has gone-fallen in the prime of his life, and in the midst of his nsefulness, beloved and lamented. He has left an afflicted widow, three ornhan children, and a large circle of brethren and friends to mourn his early and unexpected removal from them; but they mourn not without hope. We shall see our Nicholson again! He has gained the crown

before us-may we also be faithful unto death.

REV. ISAAC R. WILLETT was born in Accomac county, on the eastern shore of Virginia. The precise time of his birth we have not been able to ascertain, but presume he was between forty and forty-five years of age at the time of his decease. The greater part of his life was spent in his native county, and the adjoining one of Northampton. In his second year he had so severe an attack of rheumatism as to be deprived, to a great extent, of the use of both his arms. He was early bereft of his father, and, in consequence of this affliction, his temporal circumstances were greatly reduced; but, through the kindness of a gentleman whose sympathy was excited by his helpless condition, he was sent to school until he obtained a tolerably good English education. Before he was twenty-one, he commenced teaching school, and continued in this employment for a number of years. His diligence and success were such that he not only contributed to the support of his mother in her later years, and several younger members of her family, but secured a considerable amount of money. Although raised among the Calvinistic Baptists, he was indebted to the Methodist ministry for his awakening and conversion. It is not known at what time he began to exhort, but some time prior to 1829, he was licensed as a local preacher. In 1834 he supplied, for a few months, a vacancy in Dorchester circuit, and in 1836, having been recommended from Accomac circuit, he was elected and ordained a local deacon. Before the close of that year, a vacancy having occurred on Berlin circuit, the presiding elder called out Brother Willett, who, having satisfied himself that he could endure the toil of an itinerant life, was recommended to the next session of the Philadelphia Annual Conference, for admission on trial. His first appointment was to Lewes station, where he was well received, and had considerable success in his ministry. His next was to Salisbury circuit. In 1839 he was statio ed at Haddington, Pa. In 1840 in Accomac circuit, and in 1841 and 1842 he was placed in charge of the Indian town mission. In all these appointments Brother Willett conducted himself in an exemplary manner, and, in his pulpit performances, gave evidence of con-
