#### DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

#### FIRST DAY.

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Conference convened in the M. E. Union Church, on Wednesday, March 20th, 1861, at 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Edmund S. Janes, D. D., in the Chair.

The session was opened by the President, by reading the Scriptures, singing and prayer; after which the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by the Bishop, assisted by some of the older members of the Conference, and united in by the ministers and members of the church present.

The roll was called, after which R. H. Pattison was re-elected Secretary, and G. W. Lybrand, A. M. Wiggins, and S. L. Gracey, were appointed assistant Secretaries.

The hour of meeting was fixed at 83 A. M., and that of adjournment at 12 M.

The Stewards of the last Conference were re-elected.

The usual Standing Committees were appointed; also, a Committee to prepare the Minutes for publication. (See Committees.)

The Chair was requested to appoint a Committee of thirteen on the State of the Church. (See Committees.)

The Presiding Elders were appointed a Committee on Missions.

The rules of the last Conference were read and adopted.

The 2d question was taken up:—(See Order of Business.)
Thomas L. Jones was discontinued at his own request.

The Stewards' call was made the order for Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

The appeal of W. W. Williams, from the action of the Quarterly Conference of Hedding M. E. Church: also, that of Richard Shields, from the action of Salem M. E. Church, were presented and referred to Committees for trial.

Adjourned, with the benediction by F. Hodgson.

#### WEDNESDAY EVENING.

The Anniversary of the Female Bible Society of the M. E. Church was held in the M. E. Union Church. Addresses by J. F. Chaplain and Rev. Mr. Bowen.

#### SECOND DAY.

#### THURSDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises, by C. Cooke.

The Chair presented a circular from the Sunday School Union of the M. E. Church, which was referred to the Committee on Sunday Schools.

The Chair presented sundry accounts due the Western Book Concern, which were referred to J. L. Houston, for collection.

A draft for \$25 was ordered to be drawn on the Chartered Fund,

Letters from P. Hallowell, M. Sorin, and J. D. Long, superannuated members of the Conference, were received and referred to the Stewards.

The 2d question was taken up. (See order of Business.)

Pursuant to order, the Stewards made their call, and received the monies collected.

The following questions of law were submitted to the Chair, and answered in writing, as follows:—

"1st. Must the estimates, made by the Quarterly Conferences, of the amounts necessary to assist our superannuated preachers, and the widows and children of deceased preachers, provided for in Part II., Chap. I., Sec. 4, Ques. 4, of the Discipline, be acted upon separately by the Conference, or may they be referred to the Board of Stewards, and subsequently adopted as a whole, in connection with their report?"

"2d. Shall the Board of Stewards, at this session of our Conference, have power to make appropriations to those who have heretofore held the relation of supernumeraries, and to such others whose cases have not been acted upon by Quarterly Conference Committees? and if so, out of what monies shall such appropriations be made? the Conference Collection, or the necessitous monies, or both?"

Answer 1st. The Conference can choose its own method of determining the claims to be allowed. The most usual course is for the Stewards to consider the claims and report on them. If the Conference differs in judgment from the Stewards, they can amend the report.

2d. The failure of a Quarterly Conference to make an estimate of the amount necessary for the support of a claimant does not vitiate his claim. He shares the same funds as other like claimants.

Opening religious exercises by R. M. Greenbank.

The Conference examined and passed the characters of the effective elders of the South Philadelphia District.

The 5th question was taken up. (See Order of Business.)

The report of Dickinson College was presented and referred to the Committee on Education.

W. McCombs was appointed to represent the Quarterly Conference of Hedding M. E. Church, in the appeal of W. W. Williams.

A Committee was directed to be appointed to examine candidates for admission on trial. (See Special Committees.)

The Annual Circular of the Parent Tract Society was received, and referred to the Tract Committee.

The report of the Trustees of the Education Fund was referred to the Committee on Education.

J. Hand offered a resolution respecting the apportionment of funds by the Stewards, which was adopted.

The 3d question of the Minutes was taken up. (See Order of Business.)

A. Manship, Tract Agent, presented his Annual Report, which was referred to the Committee on the Tract Cause.

The report of the Visiting Committee to Dickinson College was referred to the Committee on Education.

J. Mason was appointed to represent the church in the appeal case of R. Shields. Adjourned, with the benediction by A. John.

#### FRIDAY EVENING.

The Anniversary of the Home Missionary Society of the M. E. Church, in the city of Philadelphia, was held in the M. E. Union Church. Addresses by W. H. Elliott, J. Allen, J. B. McCullough and A. Cookman.

#### FOURTH DAY.

#### SATURDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by W. Cooper.

The 3d question was taken up (See Order of Business.)

J. T. Van Burkalow and J. Slichter were continued on trial. J. N. Mulford was discontinued, at his own request.

The following Local Preachers were elected to Deacon's orders: T. Hull, G. W. Unkle, J. W. Donnelly, W. Zimmerman, S. H. Willey and J. T. Reed.

At the request of the Board of Stewards, the vote taken yesterday on the adoption

of J. Hand's resolution was reconsidered, when the resolution was amended and, as amended, adopted.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Centenary Fund of the Philadelphia Conference was presented and referred to the Board of Stewards, who were authorized to draw upon the Fund for \$459.

Memorials were presented from Talbot, Centreville, Sudlersville and Hillsborough Circuits, in relation to the New Chapter on Slavery, and referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

A memorial from a Convention of Laymen, held at Cambridge, Md., March 5th, 1861, also the action of the male members of Cambridge Station, upon the subject of the New Chapter on Slavery, were presented and referred to the same Committee.

The Catalogue of Williamsport Dickinson Seminary was presented and referred to the Committee on Education.

A. Manship presented documents, which were referred to the Tract Committee.

The ordination of Descens and Elders was made the order for Monday morning. 3

The ordination of Deacons and Elders was made the order for Monday morning, at 10 o'clock.

Adjourned, with the benediction by E. Reed.

#### SABBATH SERVICES.

The pulpits of the M. E. Churches of the city and vicinity, as well as many of our sister churches, were supplied by the members of the Conference.

#### FIFTH DAY.

#### MONDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by J. Lednum.

The thanks of the Conference were returned to T. W. Price, for blank books presented to the Conference.

A memorial from Kent Circuit, on the subject of slavery, was presented and referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

The Conference examined and passed the characters of the effective elders of the Reading, Easton and Snow Hill Districts.

H. Colclazer moved that a superannuated relation be granted to R. W. Todd, which was laid on the table for the present.

The Board of Stewards reported that the amount received by them for distribution is \$925 less than was raised last year; when a collection and subscription was taken in the Conference and audience present, towards supplying the deficiency.

J. Mason presented documents, which were referred to the Committee on the Tract Cause.

The hour appointed for the ordination services having arrived, and the church being densely crowded, A. K. Street, of the New Jersey Conference, was requested, by a vote of the Conference, to preach in the lecture-room of the church.

Bishop Janes then proceeded, after singing, and prayer by J. Cunningham, to

which Bishop Simpson c rdained thirty-one Deacons. Those elected to Elder's orders were then ordained by Bishop Janes, assisted by J. B. Ayars, J. Edwards, J. Hargis, G. Quigley and J. Hand,

The Conference resolved to meet at 3 o'clock, to hear the Missionary sermon. J.

Cunningham was appointed to preside in the afternoon session.

J. T. Gracey presented papers from Seaford and Dorchester Circuits, relating to the New Chapter on Slavery, which were referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

Adjourned, with the benediction by Bishop Simpson.

#### MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Conference met at 3 o'clock, J. Cunningham in the Chair.

The 995th Hymn was sung, and W. L. Gray led in prayer. The 999th Hymn was then sung, after which H.F. Hurn preached the Annual Missionary Sermon, from Malachi, 1st chapter, 11th verse. At the close of which, part of the 973d Hymn was sung, and the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by T. Sovereign, of the New Jersey Conference.

#### MONDAY EVENING.

The Missionary Anniversary was held at Concert Hall, and was attended by an immense audience. The Treasurer's Report was read, and addresses delivered by Dr. Durbin, Bishop Simpson and Rev. J. Chambers.

#### SIXTH DAY.

#### TUESDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by E. Osborn, of the New York Conference.

The report of S. Higgins, Sunday School Agent, was presented and referred to the Committee on Sabbath Schools.

The parchment of J. O. Jones, a Local Deacon, who had withdrawn from the M. E. Church, was presented and placed on file.

The characters of several effective Elders, absent when their names were called were examined and passed.

A superannuated relation was granted to R. W. Todd.

J. Neill and A. Atwood offered a resolution, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Trustees of the Education Fund, having nominated A Cookman and F. Hodgson, to fill a vacancy in said Board, the Conference elected F. Hodgson by ballot.

The exhibit of the Book Concern and the report of the Book Committee at New York, were presented, showing the following results: Net capital, \$571,624.88; indebtedness, \$58,204.48; net profits, \$43,491.90. R. W. Todd presented a communication from Cambridge Station, in reference to a division of the Conference, which was referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

Adjourned, with the benediction by J. Ruth.

#### TUESDAY EVENING.

The Anniversary of the Conference Tract Society was held in Union Church. Rev. T. T. Tasker in the Chair. The Annual Report was read, officers elected, and addresses were made by G. R. Crooks, J. Porter, Z. Bowen and B. C. Criesher; the last two colporteurs in the employ of the Society.

#### SEVENTH DAY.

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by W. H. Elliott.

The report of the Committee on the Bible cause was presented, and adopted.

The report of the Visiting Committee to the Pennsylvania Female College, at Harrisburg, was presented and referred to the Committee on Education.

The Conference examined and passed the characters of the effective Elders of the Wilmington District.

The report, in part, of the Committee on Education was presented, and adopted.

The Committee on Temperance presented their report, which was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was presented, and adopted.

The Stewards' report was made the order for Thursday morning, at 10, A. M.

The Special Committee on J. Neill's resolution, reported certain resolutions, which were adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Committee on Memoirs reported a memoir of G. Wiltshire, which was adopted.

The Committee on the appeal of W. W. Williams presented their report, sustaining the action of the Quarterly Conference of Hedding M. E. Church; which was placed on file.

The 2d question was taken up. W. Wheaton was discontinued at his own request. V. Smith was granted a superannuated relation.

C. I. Thompson presented a resolution, which was adopted, requesting the publication of the Missionary Sermon preached by H. F. Hurn, on Monday afternoon.

Adjourned, with the benediction by H. M. Johnson.

#### EIGHTH DAY.

#### THURSDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by S. M. Cooper.

The 7th question was taken up. (See Order of Business.)

A. C. McDonald, of the Missouri Conference, by invitation, addressed the Conference, with respect to the necessities of the church under his care, at St. Louis.

The Stewards' report was read and adopted, and the monies in their hands distributed.

C. Karsner, on behalf of the Board of Stewards, offered certain resolutions, which were adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The publication of the report of amounts received for Preachers' salaries was deferred until next year; and J. B. McCullough, G. W. Lybrand and J. Dickerson were appointed a Committee to prepare a plan for reporting the same.

The report of the Tract Committee was received, amended and adopted.

The Committee on Education presented their final report, which was taken up, debated, and laid on the table for the present.

The appointment of the usual examining Committees was ordered.

The Committee on the appeal of R. Shields presented their report, remanding the case for a new trial.

T. A. Fernley offered a resolution of thanks to the Lay Members, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Finance Committee made their report, which was adopted, and the monies in their hands ordered to be appropriated as usual.

The Conference ordered a Committee of five to be appointed to nominate suitable persons for election as Trustees of the Ministers' Burial Ground, at Mt. Moriah Cemetery. J. B. McCullough, J. Neill, T. J. Thompson, S. Higgins and C. Karsner were appointed.

H. Colclazer and E. J. Way offered a resolution, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

Adjourned, with the benediction by Bishop Scott.

#### NINTH DAY.

#### FRIDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by J. Pastorfield.

A superannuated relation was granted to J. H. Wythes.

The Committee to estimate the salary of the resident Bishop, reported the sum of \$1,800 as necessary for his support.

W. Cooper and W. H. Brisbane were elected Ministerial, and W. Rhoads and J. Long, Lay Trustees of the Ministerial Burial Ground at Mount Moriah Cemetery.

The report of the Committee on Education was considered, amended and adopted.

T. J. Quigley offered a resolution in regard to the vote of our Lay members on Lay

T. J. Quigley offered a resolution in regard to the vote of our Lay members on Lay Delegation, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

P. Coombe and S. G. Hare offered a resolution respecting the needy state of the M. E. Church at Catasauqua, Pa., which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

J. Hough offered a similar resolution with respect to an M. E. Church on George-

town Circuit, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Report of the Committee on the State of the Church was presented, when W. Cooper moved to adopt the first part of the Report, and called for the previous question; which was ordered by a vote of 99 to 72. The resolution having been divided, the yeas and nays were ordered on the first part of the resolution, requesting the General Conference to repeal the New Chapter on Slavery; which was adopted, by a vote of Yeas 174, Nays 35.

The second part of the resolution was adopted by a vote of 151 in favor to 32 against. The second part of the Report, being an address to our Churches on the Peninsula, was adopted, by a vote of 148 in favor to 29 against.

The third part of the Report, respecting the Division of the Conference, was adopted, by a vote of 181 in favor to 5 against.

The report was adopted as a whole.

W. Bishop and W. Cooper offered a resolution of condolence with the family of Rev. B. R. Waugh, deceased, which was adopted.

A communication was received from the Baltimore Conference, and referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

Adjourned to meet at 71 o'clock this evening.

Opening religious exercises by J. A. Brindle.

J. R. Anderson and J. W. Arthur offered a resolution relative to the Berks County Mission, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Report of the Committee on Missionary Statistics was presented and adopted.
Mr. John Whiteman, Treasurer of the Philadelphia Conference Missionary Society
read to the Conference his Annual Report.

The Committee on the State of the Church presented their further and final report, which was adopted.

A resolution was adopted with reference to a book written by T. B. Miller. (See Resolutions.)

The Committee on Post Offices presented their final report.

The Conference determined to hold its next session at Union Church, Philadelphia.

The Committee on plan for reporting salaries of preachers, presented their report, which was adopted.

The Conference directed the printing in tract form of 5,000 copies of the report of the Committee on the State of the Church; also, its publication in the Christian Advocate and Journal, Methodist, and Baltimore Christian Advocate.

H. M. Johnson offered certain resolutions, which were adopted. (See Resolutions.)

J. Mason was elected Vice President of the Sunday School Union of the M. E. Church.

Subscriptions were received for a loan to the Wesleyan Female College, at Wilmington, to the amount of \$1,050.

W. H. Brisbane, F. Hodgson, and T. C. Murphy were elected Trustees of the Wesleyan Female College.

W. Bishop and W. McCombs offered a resolution respecting the studies of candidates for admission, which was adopted.

A superannuated relation was granted to R. E. Kemp and C. J. Crouch.

The Stewards of the Conference were re-elected.

Resolutions offered by T. J. Quigley, J. R. Anderson and W. McCombs, respecting the reception of preachers on trial, were adopted.

Adjourned to meet to-morrow, at 8 A.M. Benediction by A. Cookman.

#### TENTH DAY.

#### SATURDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by C. Cooke.

The relation of S. Higgins was changed to effective.

F. Hodgson presented a resolution in reference to Wilmington Female College, which was adopted.

The Bishop appointed the Examining Committees.

T. J. Thompson offered a resolution relating to De Kalb Street Church, Norristown, which was adopted.

The Conference returned thanks, by a unanimous vote, to the Pastor and Trustees of the M. E. Union Church, and families entertaining its members; also to the Secretaries of the Conference.

T. S. Childs received a superannuated relation.

A resolution was adopted, recommending the missionary field in Lancaster County to the favorable notice of the Presiding Elders.

Bishop Janes announced that J. T. Gracey was appointed a missionary to India. Bro. Gracey briefly and feelingly bade the Conference farewell: after which the 175th Hymn was sung, and F. Hodgson led in prayer.

Conference ordered a draft on the Kelly legacy, for Hummelstown Mission.

The thanks of the Conference were returned to Railroad Companies who have reduced their fares to our Preachers.

The thanks of the Conference were unanimously voted to the Presiding Bishop, Rev. E. S. Janes, D. D.

After reading the Scriptures, by Bishop Janes, singing, and prayer by A. Cookman, the appointments were announced by Bishop Janes, and the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by Bishop Ames.

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#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STEWARDS.

From the following tables it will be seen, that while the number of claimants on the Conference funds is larger this year than at any previous period, the receipts, owing doubtless to the pressure of the times, are more than five hundred dollars less than last year.

The whole number of claimants on the list is 54. The estimate made for these by the Quarterly Conference Committees amount in the aggregate to \$9,768, showing a deficit on the estimates of \$3,559.32.

While we have cause for gratitude that this deficit is not greater than it is, under the circumstances, yet we have also abundant cause to regret that so many of our worthy claimants can receive from this fund but a scanty support. The Board would sincerely hope that the coming Conference year may yield a larger return for the benefit of this worthy class of beneficiaries, and would therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions, viz.:

- 1. Resolved, That we commend the collection for our superannuated preachers, and their families, as one having the strongest claims upon the sympathy and benevolence of our people; and that we will use our utmost efforts to raise the amounts apportioned to our respective charges.
- 2. Resolved, That Pastors in charge of circuits and stations be required to report the Conference and necessitous collections on the second day of the next session of our Conference.
- 3. Resolved, That our brethren failing to report their Conference and necessitous collections to the Board of Stewards, by the first Saturday of the Conference, shall be required to give an explanation to the Conference.

#### MEMOIR.

#### Rev. GEORGE WILTSHIRE.

Rev. Geo. Wiltshire, the subject of this brief sketch, was born in the town of Frome Somersetshire, England, on the 9th day of October, 1784. His parents were poor and at an early age he was placed in a situation to learn a trade, by which to make his living, and from the testimony he bears to his employer, he must have fallen into good hands for his moral and spiritual advantage. At the age of 19 years he became convinced of the necessity of religion, and joined the "Wesleyan Society." The following year, at a love-feast, he experienced the blessed "liberty of the children of God." He immediately devoted himself to the pursuit of knowledge, and took great interest in reading the scripture and the writings of John Wesley.

Brother Wiltshire continued a private member for several years, during which he exercised himself in leading class and conducting prayer meetings, and occasionally officiating as an exhorter, and his name soon appeared on the "Exhorter's and Local Preachers' plan."

Nov. 21st, 1816, our brother embarked for America, having made it a subject of devout reflection and prayer and of serious consultation with his friends. He was sixty-three days crossing the ocean which afforded him good opportunity to see the wonders of the Lord upon the deep. A few days after his arrival in this country he united with the M. E. Church in Milton, Sussex, Co., Del., where he found in Hon. David Hazzard a timely and steady friend, to whom he felt under obligations all his life.

In 1818 license was given brother Wiltshire to exhort, by Rev. James Bateman of precious memory, preacher in charge at the time of Lewistown Circuit, Del. The next year he obtained license as a Local Preacher; his mind soon became exercised about preaching the gospel more extensively, and in 1824 he was admitted on trial in the Philadelphia Conference, and appointed to Hamburg Circuit, N. J. In 1825 to Lancaster Circuit, Pa., in 1826 to Accomac Circuit, Va.; the most of this year he suffered severe sickness. At the conference of 1827 he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Hedding, and appointed to Lewistown Circuit; in 1828 to Dorchester Circuit, in 1829 Snow Hill Circuit. This year he was ordained Elder by Bishop McKendree, in 1830 he was appointed to Milford Circuit, in 1831 to Salisbury, in 1832 and 1833 to Annamessex, in 1834 to Cambridge, in 1835 he received a supernumerary relation, and was appointed to Dorchester Circuit, in 1836 he was made effective and appointed to Salisbury Circuit, in 1837 to Northampton Circuit, in 1838 to Melody, Phila., in 1839 to Tamaqua, in 1840, '41, '42, he was stationed at Zoar, Phila., a church of colored people, among whom he labored faithfully. In 1843 he again became supernumerary, in which relation he continued to the close of life.

As a supernumerary he travelled at his pleasure and labored as much as his feeble and declining strength would allow, till on the 11th of Feb. 1861, at the residence of Mr. John Naudine, New Castle Co., Del., (without a home of his own, having never married,) he departed this life in the 77th year of his age.

In looking over some brief records made by brother Wiltshire of the events and experience of his own life, we are impressed with the sincerity of his motives, the purity of his feelings, the singleness of his faith, and the ardour of his zeal for the glory of God.

He gave evidence of a steady reliance upon the atoning merits of Christ, recognized the necessity of a personal call by the Holy Ghost to the work of the ministry, and in that ministry his thoughts, words and actions seemed imbued with the spirit of grace, and to mingle in beautiful simplicity and harmony around the cross. He was a man of faith and consecration.

After a long life of useful toil in his Master's service, our brother rests from his labors. He endured much physical suffering as he approached his end, but that end was peace; he died in the faith in which he had lived, and doubtless "an abundant entrance was ministered unto him into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

Rev. T. J. Quigly preached his funeral discourse from the expressive words, "To die is gain." May all of us share with our departed brother the glory these words import. Amen.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

#### TRACT REPORT.

Resolved 1st. That we regard the circulation of Religious Tracts and books as one of the most important instrumentalities for the evangelization of the world.

Resolved 2d. That the managers of our Conference Tract Society continue to deserve our entire confidence and hearty thanks for their unwearied efforts to secure to the Church within the bounds of the Philadelphia Conference, a pure religious literature.

Resolved 3d. That our Agent, A. Manship, has shown, during the past year, his usual diligence in the prosecution of this noble enterprise, and that we unite with the managers of the Tract Society in recommending to the Bishop his re-appointment for the ensuing year.

Resolved 4th. That we regard the employment of Colporteurs as an indispensable means of circulating our tracts and books in dark and desolate places; and that we consider the success of our Colporteurs, during the past year as very encouraging.

Resolved 5th. That we recommend the Annual Tract Collection, to be taken in all our charges, and co-operation with the Agent, as far as practicable.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Resolved 1st. That the Sunday School is an indispensable auxiliary to the Church, and should constantly secure our best services.

Resolved 2d. That we earnestly recommend the books published by the Sunday School Union of the Methodist E. Church, as being of all publications, the best suited to the wants of youth.

Resolved 3d. That we regret that our Sunday School Advocate should have been in any way perverted from the prosecution of its appropriate object, to issues upon which there is not unanimity of sentiment in the Church; and with this exception we commend it to the patronage of our people.

Resolved 4th. That the gratuitous services of our brother, Solomon Higgins, on behalf of Sunday Schools, merit our highest approval; and that the Bishop be, and is hereby requested, to re-appoint him Sunday School Agent, with the assurance that his travelling expenses shall be paid out of the collections.

Resolved 5th. That collections on behalf of the Sunday School Union be lifted in all our Churches during the year.

#### BIBLE REPORT.

Resolved, I.—That as the basis of preaching and teaching is the printed word of God, we feel an abiding interest in that agency in our land whose function is its diffusion. We reproduce, as showing its confidence, and suggesting our duty, the language of the last General Conference. "This Conference cherishes the most

cordial and undiminished confidence in the American Bible Society, and hereby recommends the ministers and members of the Methodist Episcopal Church to co-operate with it, and exert themselves to carry out its noble and benevolent designs."

Resolved, II.—That we are rejoiced to learn, that for the first time since the Bible has been printed as the Book of the people, Italy with her twenty-two millions is accessible, and that there the Society has a large corps of colporteurs in the field. In Bulgaria, and lands verging on the more distant East, they hunger for the Bread of life. In the supply of those millions abroad, and the work at home, we deeply sympathize, and pledge ourselves to continued exertions in this holy cause.

Resolved, III.—That we will co-operate with the American Bible Society, and its accredited agents who may visit our fields of labor; preach on the Bible cause, and take up a collection at each of our appointments, and as far as circumstances permit, in addition to collections, will have subscriptions made to increase the aggregate contributions of our people.

#### ON EDUCATION.

Resolved, That the Conference Educational Collection be equally divided between Dickinson College and the Wesleyan Female College.

Resolved, That a Committee consisting of two laymen and two preachers le appointed to act in concert with the Financial Committee of Dickinson College in seeking to secure Legislative aid for the College.

Resolved, That the Committee on Education for the next session of our Conference, shall consist of seven members of the Conference, and seven lay members; that the Bishop appoint one from each district, and that the remaining member be appointed at the session at which they are to act, and that the places of absentees be filled in the same way.

Resolved, That the collection for Educational purposes be taken for the coming year.

#### WESLEYAN FEMALE COLLEGE.

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint an Agent, whose duty it shall be to sell Certificates of Loan, and Scholarships, to secure an increase of pupils. and promote by all proper means the interests of the College.

Resolved, That we have unabated confidence in the Wesleyan Female College, at Wilmington, and the efficiency of the excellent President and his faculty, and that we commend it most fully to the patronage of our people and friends as an institution of superior excellence.

#### TEMPERANCE.

Whereas, the evils of intemperance have fearfully increased within the few past years, ruining numbers of our young men, and seriously affecting those more advanced; therefore.

Resolved 1st. That we believe the most efficient course for us to pursue as a Church to arrest these evils in community, is the practical adoption, and earnest recommendation, of the principle of total abstinence from all intoxicating liquors as a beverage.

Resolved 2d. That we will preach on this subject, at each of our appointments, during the year.

Resolved 3d. That we will encourage the formation of Temperance societies upon the original plan; and assist in holding public meetings for the advancement of the cause.

#### LAY DELEGATION.

Resolved, That the vote of the members of our Church on the question of Lay Delegation, be taken in October and November of the present year.

#### SUPERNUMERARY RELATION.

Whereas, the action of the last General Conference, in removing the Supernumerary relation from the Discipline, except in the sixth restrictive rule, was in our judgment both hasty and uncalled for, and can effect no good purpose; and whereas, we can regard it in no other light than as afflictive to our Supernumerary Brethren:

Therefore Resolved, 1st. That we request them to submit to the present arrangement until the next General Conference.

Resolved 24. That we memorialize the next General Conference to restore the Supernumerary relation to the Discipline.

#### NEW CHURCH IN GEORGETOWN CIRCUIT.

Resolved, That all the Pastors of our churches, in their several charges, be requested to take a collection to the amount of five dollars, and send the same to the preacher in charge of Georgetown Circuit, for the purpose of relieving the debt now hanging over the new church edifice which is in the course of erection.

#### CATASAUQUA M. E. CHURCH.

Whereas, the infant Society of the M. E. Church at Catasauqua, Lehigh Co., Pa., in the erection of a new church building, have been placed by circumstances, over which they have had no control, in such embarrassment as to render it certain that the new Church there will be lost to our denomination unless some special effort be made by this Conference for its redemption; and whereas, it is of the utmost importance to the interests of the Society there, and to the cause of religion in general, that the building now erected and occupied, shall be secured; therefore,

Resolved 1st. That the preachers be requested to take a collection in each of their charges, for the M. E. Church at Catasauqua, Lehigh Co., Pa., amounting at least to five dollars; and forward the proceeds to the pastor at Allentown, Pa.

Resolved 2d. That we most earnestly commend this case to the friends of religion everywhere, as one not only of great necessity, but also one peculiarly deserving of their support.

#### DE KALB STREET, NORRISTOWN.

Whereas, The new church in DeKalb street, Norristown, is very much embarrased with a debt, and greatly needs the sympathy and aid of our friends, therefore,

Resolved, By the Philadelphia Annual Conference, that the Pastor of said Church be earnestly recommended to the liberality of all the churches and individuals within the bounds of this Conference to whom he may apply for aid.

### RECOMMENDATIONS AND REQUESTS.

Resolved, That we earnestly request the Presiding Elders and our people to discourage the increase of single men's appointments.

Resolved, That the recommendations for admission on trial in this Conference be presented to the Conference on the third day of its next session, and that the names of such candidates be first called, as they shall be, in the estimation of the Committee of Examination, best entitled to admission, and that the number to be received be fixed by the Presiding Bishop at his earliest convenience.

Resolved, That in the judgment of this Conference in view of the crowded state of the work, we cannot receive any men on trial this year.

Resolved, That the Conference expects the single men received on trial, to take single men's appointments for four years.

Whereas, Many of our young men enter the Conference without habits of study: and whereas, the Presiding Elders are directed by the Discipline to superintend the studies of candidates for admission; therefore,

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders be, and are hereby requested, as far as practicable, to examine the preachers on trial quarterly, on their Conference studies.

Whereas, the Rev. A. Wallace has collected material for, and published, a Biography of Rev. Joshua Thomas in a volume entitled "The Parson of the Islands," and thereby aided in the presentation of interesting historical matter connected with Methodism within the bounds of this Conference; therefore,

Resolved, That we cordially recommend the aforesaid biography to the notice of our people.

Resolved, That we listened with great pleasure and profit to the missionary sermon delivered by our brother, the Rev. H. F. Hurn, before the Philadelphia Annual Conference, on Monday, March 25th, and we respectfully request a copy of said discourse for publication.

Resolved, That we commend a tribute, by our brother, the Rev. T. B. Miller, to the memory of the Rev. Thomas Miller, who for forty years was a member of this body, to the attention of our ministers and friends.

Resolved, That this Conference extend its sympathy to the successful effort which has been made to plant the gospel in the north of Lancaster County, and request that the Presiding Elders of Wilmington, South Philadelphia and Reading Districts use their influence to supply the vast missionary field which is now open between Lancaster, Harrisburg, Lebanon and Reading.

Resolved, That the Rev. J. P. Durbin, D. D., be requested o publish in tract form, for general distribution, the interesting facts connected with the history of our missions delivered by him at the anniversary of our Conference Missionary Society, held March 25th, 1861.

### DAY OF PRAYER FOR COLLEGES.

Resolved, That we commend earnestly to all our people, to observe the annual concert of prayer for Colleges, on the last Thursday in February.

### THANKS.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby presented to our brethren, the Lay Stewards, for the valuable services they have so kindly rendered the Conference.



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
