DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

THE Conference convened in the M. E. Union Church, on Wednesday, March 19th, 1862, at 9 A.M., Bishop Thomas A. Morris in the Chair.

The President, Thomas A. Morris, D. D., senior Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, opened the Conference by reading the 10th chapter of the Gospel according to St. Matthew; after which he announced the 205th hymn, which being sung, he led in prayer.

The roll was called by the Secretary of the last Conference, 151 members answering to their names.

R. H. Pattison was re-elected Secretary, and G. W. Lybrand, A. M. Wiggins and S. L. Gracey were appointed assistants.

Half past eight A. M. was fixed as the hour for opening the daily sessions and 12 M. as the time of adjournment.

The rules of the last session were read and adopted.

The Chair was requested to appoint the Standing Committees. (See Committees.)

A Committee was appointed to collect statistics. (See Committees.)

A draft was ordered on the Chartered Fund for \$25.

The Ministerial Stewards were elected, and the names of the Lay Stewards announced. (See Officers of Conference.)

The call of the Stewards was made the order for Thursday, at 10 A. M.

The 7th question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

C. J. Crouch was granted an effective relation.

J. Mason announced the decease of John Talley. (See Memoir.)

On motion of J. Neill, a Committee of five on the State of the Country was appointed. (See Committees.)

A Committee on Public Worship was appointed. (See Committees.)

At the suggestion of the Bishop the Conference resolved to celebrate the sacrament of the Lord's Supper on Friday, at 10 A. M., and hold an experience meeting.

The Chair introduced the representative of the Book Concern at New York,—Charles H. Simpson.

Adjourned at 12 M., with prayer by G. D. Carrow.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY MORNING.

After a half hour spent in religious exercises, Conference business was resumed at 81 A. M.

The Bishop announced the Standing Committees. (See Committees.)

The Circular of the Parent Tract Society was presented, and referred to the Committee on Tract Cause.

The Circular of the Sunday-School Union of the M. E. Church was presented, and referred to the Committee on Sunday-Schools.

The Report of the N. Y. Book Committee, and exhibit of the Book Concern at New York were presented by the Chair.

A Circular from the Missionary Society of the M. E. Church was presented, read, and referred to the Committee on Missionary Statistics.

Conference ordered the appointment of a Committee of one from each district on our Church Periodicals.

J. Hand, J. E. Meredith and S. W. Kurtz were appointed to collect the vote of the lay members on Lay Representation.

A communication was received from the Preachers' Association of Wilmington District relative to the date of the origin of the Conference, which was referred to a Committee. (See Committees.)

A Committee of six was appointed to prepare the Minutes for publication. (See Committees.)

A Certificate from J. McK. Riley, a P. E. of East Baltimore Conference, respecting the character of J. Turner, was received and filed.

The Quarterly Conference estimates of the claims of superannuated preachers were referred to the Stewards, and the Board of Stewards was authorized to estimate the claims where no estimates have been made.

Question 7th was resumed. (See Disciplinary Question.)

The Report of the Visiting Committee to Dickinson College was presented and referred to Committee on Education.

Question 4th was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

J. Welch, absent on duty as Chaplain in the U. S. Army, and T. E. Skinner, detained by sickness, were granted the privilege of passing the third and fourth years' examination at the next Conference.

F. Hodgson presented the written withdrawal of T. W. Martin from the ministry and membership of our Church, which was accepted.

Question 5th was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

A charge against H. S. Thompson was presented and referred to a select Committee for trial of maladministration.

The Report of the President of Dickinson College was presented and referred to the Committee on Education.

Ten o'clock having arrived, the Stewards made their call and received the amounts collected for Conference claimants.

Question 5th was resumed. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

Question 7th was resumed. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

F. Hodgson presented the appeal of T. Stewart from the action of the Quarterly

Conference of Union M. E. Church, which was referred to a select Committee for trial.

N. M. Brown was appointed to assist C. H. Simpson, representing the N. Y. Book Concern.

Adjourned, with benediction by J. A. Massey.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by J. A. Massey.

The class of the second year was called up by the Bishop, and the usual Disciplinary questions asked and answered.

By the direction of the Conference the following question was then proposed to the Class, and answered by each in the affirmative:—

"Are you in favor of sustaining the Union, the Government and the Constitution of the United States against the present rebellion?"

Question 3d was then taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

R. Craige and J. Wilson were discontinued at their own request.

The recommendations of candidates for admission on trial were presented by the Presiding Elders of the several districts.

At ten A. M. the Conference and congregation united in receiving the Lord's Supper, which was administered by the Bishop, assisted by some of the older members of the Conference.

The Sacramental service being over, the time was employed until the hour of adjournment in the relation of religious experience by ministers present.

Adjourned, with benediction by Bishop Morris.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Opening Religious Exercises, by J. Humphriss.

' A communication respecting the Methodist Episcopal Sunday-School Association of Philadelphia, was referred to Committee on Sunday-Schools.

The recommendations of Local Preachers for Deacons and Elders Orders, were presented and acted upon. (See Disciplinary Questions 4 and 5.)

The Report of the Visiting Committee to Wilmington Female College, was presented and referred to the Committee on Education.

Leave of absence was granted to A. T. Scott, until the close of the session.

A committee was appointed to collect the Statistics of Circuit and Station Contributions. (See Committees.)

The Board of Stewards presented to the Conference for its decision, the claim of I. T. Cooper, when, on motion of T. J. Quigley, he was allowed \$60.

The decision of the Stewards, disallowing the claim of T. S. Thomas, was confirmed.

The report of the Treasurer of the Education Fund was referred to the Committee on Education.

The Trustees of the Education Fund presented the names of M. D. Kurtz and A. W. Milby, to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of M. D. Kurtz.

The committee on the charge against H. S. Thompson, reported that the charge is not sustained.

- A. Wallace presented a written request for the appointment of a preacher to an institution of learning not under our patronage, which was referred to the Committee on Education.
- C. Cooke presented the reports of the majority and minority of the Committee on the state of the country, which were made the order for Tuesday, at 10 A. M.
- P. Coombe offered a substitute for both reports, which was made the order for the same day and hour.

The Committee on the Appeal of T. Stewart, reported that the appeal be not entertained, and the case remanded for a new trial.

A communication was received from J. Swahlen, German Missionary in this city. C. Karsner offered a resolution respecting the same, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Conference resolved to take up a collection in aid of the German Mission, on Tuesday morning next.

J. B. Wakely, of New York Conference, was introduced.

Leave of absence was granted to T. C. Murphy, for the remainder of the session. Adjourned, to meet on Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

Benediction by J. B. Wakely.

FIFTH DAY.

MONDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises, by J. Ruth.

A communication from J. Turner was received and filed.

The Chair presented the official certificate of the ordination of elders and deacons, on Sabbath morning and afternoon.

A communication from the Health Office, of this city, respecting the registration of marriages, etc., was received, and referred to the Presiding Elders of North and South Philadelphia, Reading, and Wilmington Districts.

A sealed letter, addressed to the "Committee on Seminaries," was received, and referred to the Committee on Education.

The report of the Trustees of the Centenary Fund was received, and a draft ordered on the Treasurer of the Fund for \$460 13 in favor of the Stewards.

The report of the Western Book Committee, and the Exhibit of the Western Book Concern, were presented and filed.

H. H. Bodine was appointed to collect sundry accounts due to the Western Book Concern.

The report of S. Higgins, Sunday School Agent, was presented, and referred to the Committee on Sunday Schools.

The examination of character of effective Elders was taken up, and the preachers of North and South Philadelphia Districts were passed.

A charge of mal-administration, signed by Thomas Stewart, was presented; when on motion of P. Coombe, the charge was not entertained.

The written withdrawal of J. P. Du Hamel, from the ministry and member-

ship of the Church, was received and filed.

A communication from the Philadelphia Conference Tract Society and the Annual Report of the Tract Agent, were presented, and referred to the Committee on the Tract Cause.

The examination of the characters of the effective Elders of Reading District was commenced.

The report of the Committee on the Bible Cause was presented, and made the order for Tuesday morning, at 9 o'clock.

A. Manship presented documents relating to the Tract Cause, which were referred to the Tract Committee.

The Conference resolved to meet at 3 o'clock this afternoon, to hear the Missionary Sermon. P. Coombe was appointed to preside.

Adjourned, with benediction by J. H. McFarland.

MONDAY AFTERNOON.

The Conference met at 3 o'clock, P. Coombe in the Chair. The 999th hymn was sung, and J. W. Mecaskey led in prayer. The 994th hymn was sung, after which W. Bishop preached the Annual Missionary Sermon from Heb. iii. 2: "O Lord, revive thy work." The 588th hymn was sung.

W. Bishop was requested to furnish a copy of his sermon for publication.

Adjourned, with benediction, by W. Kenney.

SIXTH DAY.

TUESDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by E. J. Way.

The examination of effective Elders was resumed.

A communication was received from J. M. McCarter, stating that he has entered the military service of the United States, as Colonel of the 93d Pennsylvania Regiment, and requesting to be left without an appointment. The Chair deciding this to be contrary to the discipline, he was located.

The report of the Committee on the Bible Cause was taken up, and, after an address by J. Holdich, one of the Secretaries of the American Bible Society, was adopted.

A collection was taken in the Conference and audience, for the German M. E. Church, in Philadelphia, amounting to \$226.

The reports from the Committee on the state of the country, with the substitute offered by P. Coombe, were taken up. P. Coombe moved the adoption of his substitute, which motion was laid on the table.

The first resolution of the majority report was taken up, amended and adopted by a vote, taken by yeas and nays; of yeas, 226; nays, none.

J. B. Merritt and Sylvanus Townsend asked to be excused from voting, but were not excused.

Adjourned, with benediction, by J. Hand.

SEVENTH DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises, by C. Cooke.

The Conference directed the appointment of a committee to estimate the salary of the resident Bishop. (See Committees.)

Leave was granted to those members who were absent when the Conference voted on the adoption of the report of the Committee on the State of the Country to record their votes on the same.

The vote of the members of the Conference on Lay Representation, was ordered to be taken on Thursday, at 11 A. M.

The examination of the character of effective elders was resumed, and the Reading District concluded.

The Wilmington District being under consideration, the case of T. Newman, who has ceased to travel during the year, was referred to the Presiding Elder of the District, and it was directed that he be left without an appointment.

The Easton District being called, a paper was presented, signed by W. H. West and G. H. West, charging W. Bishop with unministerial and unchristian conduct. The charge was not entertained.

The examination of character of effective elders was concluded.

A deeply interesting letter, addressed to the Conference, was received from J. T. Gracey, our missionary to India; and R. H. Pattison, J. F. Chaplain, and G. W. Lybrand, were appointed to address a fraternal letter to Brother Gracey.

The 7th question was taken up. (See Order of Business.)

V. Smith was made effective.

The Board of Stewards requesting the decision of the Conference on the claim of T. Newman; the claim was not allowed.

An effective relation was granted to J. H. McFarland.

The report of the Visiting Committee to Williamsport Dickinson Seminary was received, and referred to the Committee on Education.

Nellas McNamee and James Carroll, local preachers, were elected to Deacons' Orders.

The Committee on Memoirs presented a memoir of J. Talley, which was adopted. (See page .)

The report of the Finance Committee was presented and adopted, and the funds in their hands ordered to be paid over as follows:—The Sunday School Collection to the Book Agents at New York; the Bible Collection to I. H. Torrence, for the several State Bible Societies; and the Education Collection, to the Treasurer of the Education Fund, to be divided equally between Dickinson College and the Wesleyan Female College.

The report of the Committee to estimate the salary of the resident Bishop was presented and adopted.

Adjourned, with benediction by J. S. Porter, of Newark Conference.

EIGHTH DAY.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Religious services by J. B. Ayars.

That portion of the report of the Committee on the State of the Country, not yet acted upon, was re-committed, at the request of the Committee.

The report of the Committee on Missions was adopted.

The 1st Question was taken up. (See Order of Business.)

Rev. W. A. P. Martin, of the Presbyterian Church, Missionary to China, was introduced, and briefly addressed the Conference.

T. J. Thompson offered a resolution, recommending our young men, desiring to enter the ministry, to avail themselves of the advantages offered by Dickinson College, which was adopted.

The vote of the members of the Conference, on the subject of Lay Representation in the General Conference was taken by ballot, with the following result:—For Lay Representation, 109; Against, 102.

The Stewards' report was read and adopted, and the funds in their hands distributed.

The Conference determined to hold an afternoon session, to consider the reports of Committees, at $2\frac{1}{2}$ P. M.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Country, was made the order for 10 o'clock on Friday morning.

The report of the Committee on Education was made the order for Friday, at 9 A. M.

Adjourned, with benediction, by W. L. Gray.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

C. Cooke in the Chair.

The report of the Committee on the Tract Cause was presented, read, and adopted. The report of the Committee on Temperance was presented, read, and adopted.

J. E. Meredith asked and obtained leave of absence for the remainder of the session.

The report of the Committee on Church Periodicals was presented, and the first resolution adopted. The second resolution was laid on the table.

J. R. Anderson offered a resolution, pledging the Conference to aid in the circulation of all literature in accordance with our doctrines and discipline; which, after discussion, was withdrawn.

The vote on the second resolution was reconsidered, when it was withdrawn. The report, as amended, was adopted.

The report of the Committee on the date of the origin of the Conference was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was presented and adopted.

Joseph Cox and Dr. Wm. Armstrong were elected Trustees of the Centenary Fund.

A. W. Milby was elected a Trustee of the Education Fund.

J. Whiteman, Treasurer of the Philadelphia Conference Missionary Society, was introduced, and read his Annual Report—showing the whole receipts for the year to be \$29,190 46—an increase of \$3,071 42 over last year.

The Conference and audience joined in singing the Doxology—"Praise God, from whom all blessings flow," &c., and adjourned with the benediction by W. McCombs.

NINTH DAY. FRIDAY MORNING.

Opening religious exercises by A. Atwood and G. Barton.

The Chair announced the appointment of the Examining Committees, etc. (See Committees.)

On motion of D. W. Bartine, the Conference recognized the ordination as Elder, of James Moore, a local preacher, now connected with St. George's M. E. Church, ordained in another denomination. Brother Moore appeared before the Conference, and assumed the usual ordination vows.

A bill was presented for printing the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, (ordered by the last Conference.) H. H. Bodine and W. H. Fries were appointed to collect the amount from the members of the Conference.

The report of the Committee on Education was presented, discussed, and adopted.

Messrs. E. Wilmer and W. Bright, Lay Trustees of the Wesleyan Female College, by invitation, addressed the Conference on the interests of that institution.

The Committee of Laymen, on our Educational Interests, ordered by the Conference, was announced. (See Resolutions.)

It was determined to hold an afternoon session at 3 P. M.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Country was taken up and adopted. The yeas and nays being called on the 5th resolution, resulted as follows: Yeas, 210; nays, none.

Adjourned, with benediction, by I. R. Merrill.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Religious exercises by E. Reed.

The Secretary announced the statistics of membership, &c., for the past year.

The report of the Trustees of the Ministerial Burial Ground, at Mount Moriah Cemetery, was received and filed.

The following were elected Trustees of the Burial Ground:—Ministers J. F. Chaplain, W. Kenney; Laymen, E. S. Yard, Wm. Divine.

D. W. Bartine and S. G. Hare offered a resolution respecting the M. E. Church at Catasauqua, Pa., which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Conference nominated J. Cunningham and P. Coombe for election, by the Board of Trustees, as Trustees of the Wesleyan Female College.

C. Cooke offered a resolution, recommending the observance of the second Friday in May as a fast day, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Committee on the vote of the laity on Lay Representation, report the whole number of votes cast to be 4683; of which 2659 were for, and 2024 against Lay Representation.

C. Cooke offered a resolution, reprehending the ordination of Local preachers connected with our Church, by ministers of other denominations, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Conference resolved to hold its next session at West Chester, Pa., by an unanimous vote.

Resolutions were adopted, recommending to the sympathy and aid of our people the following M. E. Churches:—De Kalb Street, Norristown; Oxford, Pa.; Brandywine and Georgetown, Del., and Berks County Mission. (See Resolutions.)

J. Mason was elected Conference Vice President of the S. S. Union of the M. B. Church.

The Visiting Committees to our literary institutions were announced by the Chair.

A collection was taken up for the benefit of the Sexton, amounting to \$54 70.

The Conference collections were ordered to be taken at the time fixed in the Minutes.

Resolutions of thanks to the Trustees of Union Church, the families entertaining us, and the Railroad Companies reducing their fare to the preachers, were adopted. (See Resolutions.)

A resolution of thanks to the Trustees and Members of Union M. E. Church, for their uniform kindness to the members of this Conference, was adopted by a rising vote.

The Journal was read and approved, when, after religious services, by S.Y. Monroe, of New Jersey Conference, the appointments were announced by T. J. Thompson, President pro tem., (Bishop Morris having been obliged to leave before the close of the session,) and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by T. J. Thompson.

Monday Evening, March 17th.—The Anniversary of the Female Bible Society of the M. E. Church was held in Trinity M. E. Church.

Tuesday Evening, March 18th.—The Annual Meeting and Festival of the Philadelphia City Home Mission was held in Sansom Street Hall.

The Annual Report was read, and addresses delivered by Rev. J. Chambers and A. Atwood.

Thursday Evening, March 20th.—The Anniversary Tea Meeting of the Young Men's Central Home Mission was held in Sansom Street Hall. The Annual Report was read, and interesting addresses delivered by A. Cookman, and others.

Friday Evening, March 21st.—The Anniversary Meeting of the Philadelphia Conference Tract Society was held in the M. E. Union Church, Rev. T. T. Tasker in the chair. The Annual Report was read; addresses delivered by J. Dickerson, T. L. Poulson, J. B. Wakeley of the N. Y. E. Conference, and Z. Bowen, a Colporteur in the employ of the society; and officers elected for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STEWARDS.

From the following tables, it will be seen that the total receipts for Conference claimants the past year, have been \$5897.73, or \$300.95 less than those of the previous year. The estimates made by Quarterly Conference Committees, and by the action of the Annual Conference, amounts, in the aggregate, to \$9440, or \$3542.27 more the receipts.

The moneys received have been carefully and impartially distributed among the fifty claimants now on the list. The Board, of course, make no claim to infallibility, and hence are free to confess that in some cases they may have awarded too much, and in others too little. But this much they can conscientiously affirm, that they labored to do justice to all as far as they had information; and if, in any instance, they have failed to do so, it has been unintentional and unavoidable under the circumstances. Their greatest difficulty has arisen from the fact that the Church has not supplied them with sufficient means to make all our needy claimants comfortable. And yet, under the circumstances, they have it not in their hearts to complain; nay, they feel that we have abundant cause for gratitude to God that the collections during the past year have come up to what they have. Many of our Circuits and Stations have done nobly, and deserve our highest commendation. But others, we regret to state, while they have brought up their other collections even beyond the maximum of former years, have failed in this. There may have been good and sufficient reasons for this; but we fear that, in too many instances, it has resulted from the too prevalent practice of crowding this collection into the close of the year, after the pockets of the people have been drained by other collections. The Board sincerely hope that this practice may be discontinued, and that special efforts will be made in all our charges to make this fund in the future, equal to the wants of our numerous claimants.

The Board recommend the passage of the following resolutions:-

Resolved, 1st. That we commend the collection for our superannuated preachers and their families, as one having the strongest claims upon the sympathy and benevolence of our people; and that we will use our utmost efforts to raise the amounts apportioned to our respective charges.

Resolved, 2d. That Pastors in charge of Circuits and Stations be required to report the Conference and necessitous collections on the second day of the next session of our Conference.

Resolved, 3d. That when the call of the Stewards is made at our next Conference, each preacher in charge shall be required to state the amount apportioned to his charge, and the amount collected.

Resolved, 4th. That we earnestly request those in charge of Circuits and Stations to raise their apportionments by collection and subscription, in the public congregation, whenever practicable.

Resolved, 5th. That the collection for Conference claimants, wherever applicable, be taken in the months of October and November.

MEMOIR.

Rev. JOHN TALLY,

Rev. John Talley was born in Brandywine Hundred, New Castle Co., Delaware, September 25th, 1791. He was converted to God when about eighteen years of age, on his way home from a Camp meeting. He then joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which he was a member and minister for about fifty-two years.

Immediately after his conversion he began to labor for the salvation of his neighbors, and held meetings in the school-houses round about, where many of them were converted to God. After serving the Church as a Local Preacher for several years, he joined the Philadelphia Annual Conference in 1819, being then a married man, and was ordained a Deacon in 1821, and an Elder in 1823. He travelled the following Circuits, viz:—Lancaster in 1819; Annamessex in 1820; Cambridge in 1821; Chester in 1822; Milford in 1823; Caroline in 1824; Cecil in 1825. In 1825 he was made Superannuared, and continued in that relation until 1861, when he was made Superannuated. He served the Church with great efficiency after he ceased to travel, and until about three years before his death he preached much in the neighborhood of his birth-place. He was then attacked with paralysis, which enfeebled his mind, and greatly impaired his memory. He finally sank under this disease, and died at the residence of his son, Henderson Talley, Esq., in East Goshen Township, Chester Co., Pennsylvania, on Saturday, July 6th, 1861.

He was buried at Mt. Lebanon Church, near his birth-place, and his funeral sermon was preached by Rev. Samuel Hance, (whom he had previously selected for that purpose,) from 2 Tim. iv. 7, 8.

As a Man, Brother Tally was cheerful and amiable in his disposition, mild and kind in his deportment; had many friends, but few enemies.

As a Christian, he was earnest, consistent, laborious, and thus secured the confidence of the people.

As a Minister, he was simple, practical, powerful, and many souls were saved through his ministry.

Four days before his death another stroke of paralysis deprived him of both speech and reason, and he was thus prevented from giving, in his last hours, that clear testimony of unshaken confidence in God, which his life of piety and devotion would certainly have secured; but as he lived right, so he died right, and now sleeps in Jesus, to be like him in the morning of the resurrection.

RESOLUTIONS AND REPORTS.

ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Resolved, That we are as much as ever impressed with the importance and necessity of the Sabbath School, as an indispensable auxiliary to the Church.

Resolved, That we highly approve of the "Teachers' Journal," and the "Sunday School Advocate," as calculated to promote this great interest, and that we pledge ourselves to renewed exertions for their circulation.

Resolve 1, That we will use our best endeavors to introduce the Catechism into all our Sabbath Schools, and that we will as far as practicable carry out the 16th article of the 12th section in the Discipline, which makes it the duty of all the preachers to catechise the Sabbath School children under their pastoral care.

Resolved, That we renew our recommendation of the books published by the Sunday School Union of the M. E. Church in preference to all others for the use of our Sabbath Schools.

Resolved, That we recommend the formation of Pastors' Bible Classes in all our Schools wherever the same is practicable, and that whenever it is expedient, a sermon be preached by the Pastor on the duties and responsibilities of Sabbath School Teachers.

Resolved, That we highly appreciate the services of our Sabbath School Agent, the Rev. Solomon Higgins, and recommend his re-appointment for the ensuing year, and that his expenses be paid out of the collections.

ON TEMPERANCE.

Whereas, the use of intoxicating liquors has been fearfully on the increase for a few years past, spreading moral desolation around and hurrying many to a premature grave; therefore,

Resolved 1. That the best course for us to pursue as a Church, for the purpose

out the various avocations in life. It is difficult to see how an intelligent Christian can act on a different principle.

2. As Christian efficiency, in the various departments of Christian effort, is largely dependent on Christian intelligence, the general circulation of Christian periodical literature is necessary to the proper working of the various Church enterprises.

Facts will show this in the Missionary, Sunday School, Tract, Bible, and other enterprises of the Church, with reference to their pecuniary support. It, doubtless, affects them all in every respect.

3. As there is a great diversity of literary taste, and of local demand, a periodical literature that would be wide-spread must be diversified.

The Church has provided for this diversity of want to a large extent; but no one will certainly say that it has been provided adequately.

In view of these things, therefore,

Resolved 1. That we will use earnest effort to secure as large a circulation as practicable to every branch of our periodical literature; and if the official statements made to the General Conference be correct, that a loss of \$46,529 occurred to the Book Concern, between the years 1852 and 1860, by the publication of our Church periodicals, diverting from their legitimate and only lawful use the proceeds of the Book Concern, (namely from the worn-out Preacher's Fund in the Annual Conferences,) therefore,

Resolved 2. That, in our judgment, there should be a speedy and effectual remedy.

GERMAN M. E. CHURCH.

Whereas, The German Methodist Episcopal Church of this city, is now laboring under very great pecuniary embarrassment, which they are unable to control, and if not removed must subject them to great loss, if not to a sale of the Church; therefore

Resolved, That the Philadelphia Conference do hereby commend the German M. E. Church of Philadelphia to the sympathy and liberality of the members and friends of the Church; also, that the Pastor of said Church be authorized to travel through the Conference and solicit contributions and collections.

ON DATE OF THE ORIGIN OF THE CONFERENCE.

The first yearly or annual Conference held in America, by the religious denomination called Methodist, was held in Philadelphia 1773. A. D. The second Conference was held in the same city in 1774, also the third Conference in 1775, which undoubtedly makes Philadelphia as a Conference seat older than any other city or place in America, nor does it seem to us an assumption to regard and call the Philadelphia Conference the Mother of Conferences.

From 1773 to 1775 the understanding with the preachers of that period was that there was but one Conference held annually, the Conference sometimes beginning its business in one place and adjourning to another place where it finished its business.

In 1785 there were three Conferences held, and ever since there have been several Conferences held annually; some years there was a Conference held for almost every Elder's district. In 1788 Philadelphia was again made the seat of Conference and

ever since there has been one or more Conferences held annually on the territory embraced in the present Philadelphia Conference.

We regard the year 1788 as a safe and truthful date of this Conference, from 1788 to 1862 inclusive makes the number 75 which we regard as the correct number of the present session.

CATASAUQUA M. E. CHURCH,

Whereas, the infant society of the M. E. Church at Catasauqua, Lehigh Co., Pa., has been placed by circumstances over which they have had no control, in extreme financial embarrassment, judgment having having been obtained against their property, rendering it certain that it will be lost to our denomination unless some special effort be made for its redemption; and whereas, it is of the utmost importance to the interests of our Society there, and to the cause of religion in general, that the building now erected and occupied shall be secured; and whereas, the creditors have lately made a generous offer to discount twenty per cent of their claims on condition of payment by the 1st of October next; and whereas, the resolution of last Conference requesting the Preachers to take up a collection in behalf of said Church has not been complied with, except in a very few instances; therefore,

Resolved, 1.—That in all the charges where no collection has yet been taken up for the Catasauqua M. E. Church, we most earnestly request the Preachers to take up the collection for said Church during the ensuing six months, amounting to at least five dollars, and to forward the proceeds to the Pastor at Allentown, Pa.

Resolved, 2.—We earnestly commend this case to the friends of religion everywhere as one of great necessity, and peculiarly deserving their support, and we recommend the Pastor of the Church to the liberality of all the churches and individuals to whom he may apply for aid.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

Whereas, A most unjust and wicked rebellion has arisen in the Southern States, against the government of these United States, with the avowed purpose of its overthrow and the establishment of a separate and independent confederacy on principles subversive of human liberty, and

Whereas, The Federal Government has been compelled to use force of arms, and is now engaged in a fearful war to suppress said rebellion and to maintain its supremacy, and

Whereas, It is the duty of the ministry and membership of the Church to employ every appropriate means for the maintenance and perpetuity of good government and to sustain the powers that be in this great struggle; therefore

Resolved, 1.—That, while we disclaim all connection with political parties, yet, as Loyal Ministers in Conference assembled, we do hereby express our utter abhorrence and opposition to the present rebellion, as being treason, and designed for the destruction of the best government in the world.

Resolved, 2.—That the Government, the Army and Navy, have our deepest sympathy and prayers; and that we pledge our influence to encourage and assist them in their noble and righteous deeds to protect the honor of our flag, the integrity of the Constitution, and the maintenance of our glorious Union.

Resolved, 3.—That we will cheerfully bear our portion of any tax or taxes that may be required by the Government, to defray the expenses of the war.

Resolved, 4.—That while we confess our sins and humbly prostrate ourselves before the face of Almighty God, we thankfully receive the many victories which have crowned our arms, as tokens of his favor, and with gratitude and hope we lift our hearts to Him, "by whom kings reign and princes decree justice," that victories may continue to bless us until our brethren, North and South, East and West, again united, may "learn war no more."

Resolved, 5.—That we not only declare our loyalty to the Constitution and Government of these United States in the presence of Almighty God and these witnesses, but that we declare our willingness to swear or affirm the same whenever it shall be required by those who have the rule over us.

Resolved, 6.—That a copy of the foregoing Preamble and Resolutions be transmitted to the President of the United States, signed by the Presiding Bishop, and countersigned by the Secretary of the Conference.

ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

Whereas, The Bible is the revelation of God's will to man, the only and sufficient rule of faith and practice, and, whereas, The American Bible Society and kindred associations are devoted, irrespective of sect or party, to the publishing of God's Holy Word, and its universal dissemination throughout the world,

Therefore, Resolved, 1. That we have undiminished confidence in the American Bible Society and its auxiliaries, within our bounds, and that we will cordially co-operate with their agents who may visit our respective charges.

Resolved, 2. That the very liberal appropriation recently made by the American Bible Society to the Missionary Board of the Methodist Episcopal Church for Foreign Missions, is gratefully acknowledged, and is additional cause for confidence in, and increased liberality to, that nob'e institution.

Resolved, 3. That we are gratified to know that special attention has been given to the army, by the Agents of the Bible Society, and a liberal supply of copies of the Word of God furnished to the noble men who have responded to the call of their country, thereby giving them an unerring guide amid the dangers and temptations of the soldier's life.

Resolved, 4. That we will preach in behalf of the Bible cause; take up a collection at each of our appointments for its benefit, and, as far as practicable, attend the meetings of County and State societies.

ON EDUCATION, I.

Resolved 1. That each Pastor is expected to preach in each congregation a sermon on Christian Education; and that he be requested to impress upon the minds of parents the importance of educating their children, and of encouraging our own institutions.

Resolved 2. That we request from our several Circuits and Stations at least five cents per member for the Educational Collection, and that amount be apportioned and published in the Minutes; and that ten per cent. of the amount thus raised be applied to a fund for the benefit of indigent young men preparing for the ministry.

Resolved 3. That to secure the interest and the concurrence of our members in raising the Educational Collection we recommend each Pastor, early in the year, or the first Quarterly Conference, to appoint a Committee; and that they mutually

devise such measures as, in their judgment, will ensure success, and that the Presiding Elders be requested to see this resolution observed.

Resolved 4. That the cause of Christian Education is one of the great benevolent enterprises of the Church, and ought to be recognised as an indispensable auxiliary in reclaiming the world from sin, and as such it should share with the Missionary and the Bible Causes in the contributions of the Church.

Resolved 5. That we hereby disabuse the minds of our people of the opinion that our Educational Collection will be discontinued, and express our confidence that they will sustain this indispensable interest.

Resolved 6. That we specially recommend to our people the Grammar School, in connection with Dickinson College, as the best place for preparing their sons for entering college.

Resolved 7. That the Committee on Education for the next Conference shall consist of two members of the Conference, and two lay members from each District; that the Bishop appoint the lay members at the present Session, and that the Committee have authority to fill the place of absentees.

Resolved 8. That we earnestly recommend our people to observe the annual concert of prayer for Colleges on the last Thursday of February.

Resolved 9. That the Committee on Education be instructed to issue a circular for distribution, in furtherance of the objects embraced in their report.

Whereas, the Trustees of Dickinson College have proposed to make a loan of \$12,000 from the Trustees of the Education Funds of the Philadelphia and Baltimore Annual Conferences, and to secure the same, together with all previous loans to the College, by mortgage on the College property,

Resolved, This Conference will, and do hereby approve the action of the Board of Trustees of the Education Funds of the Philadelphia Conference, in responding to the proposition of the Trustees of the College, according to the terms and conditions contained in said proposition.

ON EDUCATION, II

Whereas, the Wesleyan Female College at Wilmington has been, and is now, greatly embarassed by a floating debt of Ten Thousand Dollars, and

Whereas, creditors to the amount of about \$7000 are willing to donate fifty per cent. of their claim, provided the balance be speedily paid, and,

Whereas, suits have been instituted and judgments obtained, and executions levied, which, if pressed, will cause a loss to the Church of the entire institution, Therefore,

Resolved 1. That it is necessary, and it is hereby directed, that a special collection for the Wesleyan Female College be made by each preacher in charge, in the month of May and June.

Resolved 2. That we recommend to the Trustees of the College to give a Certificate of Scholarship for one year to each Preacher who shall raise the sum of fifty dollars.

Resolved 3. That the Presiding Elders be requested to see that a Committee be appointed at the first Quarterly Conference of each Circuit or Station to co-operate with the Preacher in raising money for our Educational interests.
