I. OF THE DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

1. The President shall see that all the business appertaining to the Conference shall be brought forward and conducted in a proper manner, according to the provisions of the discipline, and the rules of the Conference.

2. He shall preserve order in all the proceedings—and in debate shall keep the speakers to the question, and call them to order when they wander from the point, or from the rules of order, or use any improper language.

3. He shall decide all questions of order; nevertheless, any two members may appeal from his decision to the Conference, and in such case the appeal shall be decided without debate.

4. He shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise directed by the Conference, in which case the appointment shall be made by ballot or nomination, at the discretion of the Conference; no member thereof being permitted to nominate more than one person for the same committee.

5. When two or more members arise and address the President at the same time, he shall decide which of them is entitled to the floor.

II. THE DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

1. The Secretary shall keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings of the Conference, to be read at the commencement of each session thereof, subject to correction by the Conference.

2. He shall carefully preserve the journals and papers of the Conference placed in his custody, and shall not permit any person but a member to examine the same, nor shall he allow a member to make a transcript from either without the permission of the Conference, and he shall also produce the journals and papers at the next annual session of the Conference.

3. He shall also, after the close of the Conference, make an appendix at the end of the journal, in which he shall record all documents which shall be ordered by the Conference to be so recorded, (the motion on which shall be taken without debate,) and the documents so recorded shall be referred to on the Journal of Conference.

III. THE DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS.

1. Every member who would speak shall rise in his place and respectfully address the President, refraining from all personalities or indecorous language; but no member shall speak more than once to the same question (except to explain) until every member choosing shall have spoken, nor longer than fifteen minutes without permission of the Conference.

2. When a member shall be called to order by the President or any member, he shall take his seat until the question be decided by the President; nevertheless he shall be allowed an appeal to the Conference, which shall decide without debate.

3. Any member may call for the division of a question, which shall be granted when in the judgment of the President the sense will admit of it, and every member present shall vote on all questions unless excused by the Conference.

IV. QUESTIONS TO BE TAKEN WITHOUT DEBATE.

- 1. A motion simply to adjourn.
- 2. A motion to lie on the table.

V. PROMISCUOUS RULES.

1. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order.

2. When a question has been decided, any member who may have voted in the majority on said question may move for a reconsideration thereof.

3. When the reading of a paper is called for, and the same is objected to by a member, the question shall be determined by a vote of the Conference.

4. When a motion is made and seconded, and entertained by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Conference, but may be withdrawn at any time by the mover, with the consent of the seconder, before a decision had thereon, or an amendment thereto be entertained by the President.

5. It shall be in order any time during the discussion of a proposition before the Conference (except during the examination of character) to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, and, if sustained by a majority of the members present, it shall be immediately put and decided.

6. No motion shall be entertained unless seconded, and all motions and resolutions shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the President or Secretary, or any member of Conference.

7. No matter of business, other than that which pertains to the ordinary business of the Conference, shall be read by the Secretary, until the subject of it is stated by the introducer.

8. In discussion upon a report of a committee, the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, or such member of the Committee as the committee may agree upon, shall be entitled to the last speech upon the question.

FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Conference assembled in the Hall of the Wilmington Institute, in Wilmington, Del., on Wednesday, March 9, 1864, at 9 o'clock, A.M., Bishop Edward R. Ames in the Chair.

The President opened the session by reading a part of the 119th Psalm and the 13th chapter of 1st Corinthians; after which the 237th Hymn was sung, and Bishop Ames led the Conference in Prayer.

The Roll was then called, when ninety-seven members answered to their names.

The name of T. M. Griffith, transferred from the East Baltimore Conference, was entered on the Roll.

R. H. Pattison was elected Secretary, and G. W. Lybrand and A. M. Wiggins Assistant Secretaries.

Conference determined to meet at 81 A.M., and adjourn at 12 M.

The rules of the last session were adopted for the government of the present Conference.

The President was requested to appoint the usual Standing Committees.

The accounts of the Western Book Concern with the members of this Conference were referred to C. F. Turner for collection.

The Hall not being sufficiently warm for health or comfort, the Conference adjourned, to meet at 2 o'clock, P.M. Benediction by R. H. Pattison.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Religious exercises by Wesley Kenney.

The Conference ordered a draft on the Book Concern for \$400, being the amount of the annual dividend. A draft was also ordered on the Chartered Fund for \$30.

Dr. E. Thomson, Editor of the Christian Advocate and Journal, was introduced to the Conference.

The Chair announced the appointment of the Standing Committees. (See Standing Committees.)

A communication was received from the National Local Preachers' Convention, requesting the publication in the Minutes of the names of the Local Preachers within our bounds.

The report of the Book Committee at New York, and the exhibit of the Book Agents, were presented and filed.

The report of the Book Committee at Cincinnati, and the exhibit of the Western Book Concern, were also presented and filed.

A communication from the Book Agents at New York and Cincinnati, calling the attention of the Conference to the interests of the Quarterly Review, was received and filed, and a committee of two members appointed to solicit subscriptions to the Review. (See Special Committees.)

The Chair presented a communication from the Directors of the Wilmington Institute, tendering to the Conference the use of their Reading Room, which was accepted, and the thanks of the Conference voted in return.

On motion of J. W. Jackson, the Conference directed the appointment of a committee of one from each District on the State of the Country. (See Special Committees.)

J. F. Chaplain and F. Moore offered a preamble and two resolutions, expressive of the opinion of the Conference, respecting the holding of pro-slavery or disloyal opinions by our members and ministers. (See Resolutions.)

The first resolution was adopted by a vote of Yeas, 171; Nays, none.

The second resolution was also adopted, by a vote of Yeas, 168; Nays, 3.

The preamble and resolutions, as a whole, were adopted.

On motion, the Conference required all those members who may be in attendance during the present session to record their votes on the resolutions just adopted.

Papers (referring to the action of the Conference in 1861) on the New Chapter on Slavery, were presented by several members; when, on motion of P. Coombe, it was

Resolved, That a committee of one from each District be appointed to prepare a preamble and resolutions in reference to our action on the New Chapter on Slavery, in 1861.

The papers presented were referred to the above-named Committee.

The Conference proceeded to the election of Stewards, when J. B. McCullough, W. Mullen, W. Cooper, W. E. England, T. W. Simpers, and J. A. Massey, were chosen.

The names of the Lay Stewards were announced, as follows: A. Cummings, T. T. Tasker, J. Lent, J. Parrish, M.D., Thos. Carrow, and W. Cannon.

The Stewards were authorized to receive and distribute the dividend from the Centenary Fund-\$464.

On motion of J. P. Durbin, it was

Resolved, That the Philadelphia Annual Conference assume the claim of the widow of Rev. G. D. Bowen, (formerly a member of this Conference,) and that the Upper Iowa Conference be notified of our action.

The Conference directed that the amounts paid by our several charges for house rent and travelling expenses should not be included in the reports of salary receipts. (See Resolutions.)

A pamphlet, from Rev. E. H. Waring, of the Iowa Conference, proposing changes in the disciplinary questions, was received and referred to a committee of three. (See Special Committees.)

The 7th Question was then taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The name of W. Quinn being called, a letter from him to the Conference was received and read; when, on motion of A. Wallace, it was

- T. J. Quigley moved that Jonathan Turner be requested to locate; which was lost, by a vote of Yeas, 39; Nays, 48.

SECOND DAY. THURSDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by F. Hodgson.

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On motion of J. Mason, the vote by which J. Smith was continued in a superannuated relation was reconsidered. He then requested to be made effective. The Conference declined to grant his request, and continued him in a superannuated relation.

The Chair announced the appointment of the committees ordered yesterday. (See Special Committees.)

Thos. W. Price, Esq., of Philadelphia, presented to the Conference, through T. C. Murphy, a Minute Book, for the use of the Committee on Education, which was accepted, and the thanks of the Conference tendered for the gift.

The Rules of the Conference were directed to be published in the Minutes.

Leave of absence was granted to J. M. Wheeler, for the purpose of attending a funeral.

- J. A. Mellick, of the East Baltimore Conference, and Rev. Geo. F. Wiswell, of the Central Presbyterian Church of this city, were introduced to the Conference.
- C. I. Thompson offered a preamble and resolution instructing our delegates to the General Conference to oppose the introduction of Lay Representation; which was adopted by a vote of Ayes, 110; Nays, 44. (See Resolutions.)

The call of the Stewards was made, and the funds collected for Conference Claimants received.

The Stewards were instructed to allow J. Humphriss the sum of \$150.

J. Neill offered a resolution, dispensing in future with the public call for Conference Claimants, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Report of the Committee on Church Records, appointed at the last session, was read and laid on the table for the present.

Rev. G. Sheldon, D.D., Agent of the American Bible Society for New Jersey and Delaware, was introduced to the Conference.

A committee of six members was appointed to collect the names and post-office address of the Local Preachers within our bounds. (See Special Committees.)

Several corrections were made in the list of Standing Committees. (See Standing Committees.)

H. M. Johnson presented his report as President of Dickinson College, which was referred to the Committee on Education.

Adjourned, with benediction by T. T. Tasker.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by T. J. Thompson.

George W. Lamaster, a Local Preacher from Jonesboro' Circuit, Southern Illinois Conference, who is now engaged in the U. S. Military Service, was recommended by that Quarterly Conference for election to Deacon's orders. He was unanimously elected.

Rev. W. Aikman, of the Hanover St. Presbyterian Church, and W. F. Speake, of the Baltimore Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

J. Mason presented the parchment of Thomas Newman, who has withdrawn from the M. E. Church.

Several brethren, absent when the vote was taken on the resolutions offered by J. F. Chaplain, recorded their votes in favor of the same.

The 3d Question was then taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

J. W. Weston, J. A. Cooper, G. S. Connaway and T. S. Hodson, were continued on trial,—the latter two at their own request.

The Conference proceeded to ballot for delegates to the General Conference. J. D. Curtis, J. B. Quigg, J. Aspril and J. B. Maddux, were appointed Tellers, and allowed to retire in order to count the votes.

G. W. Lybrand and J. W. Paxson were appointed Secretaries to the Tellers.

G. D. Carrow, from the Committee on Education, presented a memorial addressed to the Legislature of Pennsylvania, asking that Dickinson College may receive a portion of the proceeds of the public lands donated by Congress to the State of Pennsylvania for educational purposes, with a resolution instructing the Secretary to sign the same in behalf of the Conference; which was adopted,—Yeas, 154; Nays, none.

One member from each District was added to the Committee on Education.

The 5th Question was then taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions,)

J. Webb was granted a superannuated relation at his own request.

J. Flannery, Tract Agent, presented his report, which was referred to the Committee on the Tract Cause.

Adjourned, with benediction by C. Cooke.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by G. Quigley.

The Tellers reported that 217 votes had been cast for delegates to the General Conference, 109 being necessary to a choice; and that J. Castle had received 134 votes, J. Cunningham 124, and J. P. Durbin 121, no other person having a majority of votes. The Chair declared the above-named brethren elected.

F. Hodgson presented the report of the Treasurer of the Board of Education, which was referred to the Committee on Education.

T. S. Thomas and A. Manship offered resolutions of sympathy with Hon. Thos.

H. Hicks, U. S. Senator from Maryland, now seriously ill; which were adopted by a rising vote. (See Resolutions.)

The report of the Committee on Missions was presented, read and adopted. (See Religious exercises by J. D. Curl

Reports.)

O. Cooke presented the report of the Committee on the Changes in Disciplinary Questions, prepared by Rev. E. H. Waring, and reported that it is not expedient to take any action on the subject; which was adopted.

The Conference proceeded to ballot again for delegates to the General Conference.

On motion of H. Colclazer, a committee of three members was appointed, to consider the practicability of organizing the colored people under our charge into separate circuits, in order to afford them more regular religious services. (See Special Committees.)

The 5th Question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

Sylvanus Townsend was located, at his own request.

T. E. Bell received a superannuated relation.

Several brethren recorded their votes on the resolutions offered by J. F. Chaplain, and adopted, on Wednesday morning last.

Rev. C. P. Lyford, a delegate of the U. S. Christian Commission, was introduced to the Conference.

The Tellers reported the result of the second ballot for delegates, as follows:-Number of votes, 192; necessary to a choice, 97. D. W. Bartine received 109 votes, and was declared elected.

The Conference proceeded to a third ballot.

The 2d Question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

J. P. Durbin received leave of absence, on account of the illness of a grandson.

P. Coombe presented a preamble and two resolutions from the Committee on Conference action on the New Chapter on Slavery. (See Resolutions.)

The resolutions were adopted, -Yeas, 167; Nays, none.

J. F. Chaplain moved to lay the preamble upon the table; pending which the Tellers reported the result of the third ballot for delegates, as follows: Number of of votes cast, 198; necessary to a choice, 100. A. Wallace received 106 and G. Barton 101 votes, and were declared elected.

The Conference proceeded to a fourth ballot.

The Tellers reported the result as follows: Number of votes cast, 192; necessary to a choice, 97. J. Mason received 106, and was declared elected.

The recommendations of Local Preachers for Deacon's orders, and of Local Deacons for Elder's orders, were received and acted upon. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

H. M. Johnson offered resolutions requesting the examining committees to institute a course of lectures to candidates for ordination in the Conference, which were adopted. (See Resolutions.)

Adjourned, with benediction by D. W. Bartine.

SABBATH SERVICES.

Bishop Ames preached at 101 A.M., at St. Paul's Church, and ordained the brethren elected to Deacon's orders. In the afternoon, F. Hodgson preached at Asbury Church, after which Bishop Ames ordained the candidates for Elder's orders. The pulpits in the city of Wilmington and vicinity were generally filled by the members of the Conference.

J. Carlisle and W. Smith asked and received a superannuated relation.

J. Mason announced the death of Joseph N. Magee.

Bishop Scott appeared on the platform.

The effective Elders of the Easton District were examined and passed.

The effective Elders of the Reading District were called, examined and passed.

J. F. Reynolds was located, at his own request.

W. L. Gray announced the decease of J. R. Anderson.

The effective elders of the North Philadelphia District were called, examined and passed.

S. Higgins asked and received a superannuated relation.

J. S. Willis was entered on the minutes as withdrawn.

The effective Elders of the South Philadelphia District were called, examined and passed.

O. W. Landreth asked and received a location.

J. Castle announced the decease of J. W. Mecaskey.

The Conference proceeded to a fifth ballot for delegate to the General Conference. The Tellers reported that no one had received a majority of votes.

A sixth ballot was then taken.

The effective Elders of Snow Hill District were called, examined and passed.

A letter was read from J. T. Gracey, Missionary to India, acknowledging the fraternal letter addressed to him by the last Conference; when T. C. Murphy offered a resolution upon the subject, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

S. Powers received leave of absence.

M. D. Kurtz and B. F. Price offered a preamble and resolution recommending the publication of an Essay on Baptism, read by P. Coombe before the Philadelphia Preachers' Meeting; which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

P. Coombe presented a report from the Committee on the Division of the Confer-

T. J. Thompson presented a minority report on the same subject, both of which were laid on the table for the present.

The Tellers reported that 178 votes had been east on the sixth ballot for delegates, 90 votes being necessary to a choice. W. McCombs received 102 votes, and was declared elected.

The Conference proceeded to ballot for reserve delegates. The Tellers reported that no choice had been made.

The vote being taken on the motion made yesterday to lay on the table the preamble to the resolutions adopted on the New Chapter on Slavery, the motion prevailed by a vote of Yeas, 92; Nays, 45.

Adjourned, with benediction by Bishop Scott.

The Committee on Education presented their report, which was read, and the 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th resolutions adopted.

The Finance Committee was instructed to pay over the money collected for the Bible Cause to the agents of the different State societies.

The 1st Question was taken up, and the recommendations of unmarried men for admission on trial were received and acted upon. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The Chair stated that, on account of the crowded state of the work, no married men can be received.

The 2d Question was postponed.

S. McBurney was discontinued.

Adjourned, with benediction by E. H. Stokes, of the New Jersey Conference.

SEVENTH DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by W. McCombs.

The report of the Treasurer of the Centenary Fund was presented and filed.

On motion of J. B. Maddux and A. Wallace, the following question of law was submitted to the presiding Bishop, and the annexed answer returned:

"Is a minister, in charge of any circuit or station in our church, justifiable in giving certificates of membership to any member or members who are disloyal both to the church and also to the Government; especially when there are strong evidences that said certificates are to be used to organize an independent society hostile to the M. E. Church, and also to the Government of our country?"

Answer .- "That the preacher is not required to give certificates to members

unless they change their residences; particularly when intimations of charges are made against those asking for certificates; but they must investigate the charges or give them certificates if they wish to remove."

T. C. Murphy and S. W. Thomas offered a resolution of condolence with Bishop

Janes on the death of his daughter, which was adopted.

J. F. Chaplain offered three resolutions, vacating the former elections of Trustees of the Ministers Burial Ground at Mount Moriah Cemetery, in order to conform the organization of the Board to the laws of Pennsylvania: which were adopted.

J. Neill, J. F. Chaplain, and S. W. Thomas, ministers, and J. Alcorn, T. T. Tasket, J. B. Townsend and B. J. Kollock, laymen, were elected Trustees of the Minister's Burial Ground.

The report of the Committee on Education was again taken up, and the remaining portion amended and adopted. (See Reports.)

The Presiding Elders were appointed a committee to nominate the Standing Committees, and report on the first day of the next session.

G. W. Lybrand and R. J. Carson offered a resolution directing the time and manner of reporting our statistics hereafter; which was adopted. (See Resolutious.)

G. Quigley and J. Castle offered a preamble and resolutions, providing for collecting statistics of the number of our members engaged in the national military or naval service during the present war; which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Finance Committee presented their report, which was adopted, and the funds in their hands directed to be disposed of as usual.

The Committee on the Religious Interests of our Colored People, presented their report, which was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was read and adopted. (See Reports.)

J. Mason was elected Vice-President of the M. E. Sunday School Union.

C. Cooke and T. C. Murphy offered resolutions recommending the general use of the Church record, just published by our Book Concern, which were adopted.

The Report of the Stewards was read and adopted, and the funds in their hands distributed.

The Bishop was requested to appoint a visiting committee to Williamsport Dickinson Seminary. (See Visiting Committees.)

On motion, the Conference, by vote, requested the General Conference to make it the duties of preachers in charge to keep the records of Baptisms and Marriages. (See Resolutions.)

C. Cooke and T. C. Murphy were elected Trustees of the Wesleyan Female College.

J. Hand offered a resolution respecting General Conference action on keeping church records; which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

J. F. Chaplain and G. D. Carrow offered resolutions, which were adopted, recommending the establishment of a Branch of the Book Concern in Philadelphia. (See Resolutions.)

J. F. Chaplain and J. Mason offered a resolution, favoring the establishment of a Methodist paper in Philadelphia; which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

W. Kenney and R. H. Pattison offered a resolution, which was adopted, recommending the publication, by our Book Agents, of Bro. J. B. McCullough's essay on "Church Financiering."

The Secretary was directed to give T. L. Poulson the certificate necessary for the renewal of his ordination parchments, lost at the battle of Gettysburg.

A. Manship and A. Atwood offered resolutions, providing for the appointment of a committee to consider the subject of Home Missions in the city of Philadelphia; which was adopted. (See Special Committees.)

A resolution was adopted, recommending to notice the book written by J. Lednum, deceased, entitled "The Rise and Progress of Methodism in America."

The reports of the majority and minority of the Committee on the Division of the Conference were taken up.

The minority report, providing for a division by the boundary line between Pennsylvania, and Maryland and Delaware, was laid on the table—108 against 80.

T. J. Thompson offered a substitute for the majority report, providing for a division by a line running through Arch Street, Philadelphia, the Market St. Bridge. and the Lancaster Turnpike to the Susquehanna River; which was laid on the table—116 to 49.

A. Wallace offered a resolution requesting the General Conference to divide this body at its ensuing session; which was laid on the table.

The majority report was adopted. (See Reports.)

On motion of P. Coombe, it was

Resolved, That we earnestly request the General Conference, in view of the peculiar circumstances arising out of the state of the country, not to disturb our boundary lines at its next session.

On motion of G. Quigley, the Presiding Elders were instructed not to employ as supplies, any person who is either disloyal or pro-slavery.

The Conference directed the appointment of a committee of one minister and one layman from each district to report a plan for dividing the Conference at its next session.

Adjourned, until 21, P. M., with benediction by W. L. Gray.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The Chair announced the appointment of several Committees heretofore ordered.

- J. F. Chaplain offered a series of resolutions, explaining the vote of the Conference on the resolutions of instruction. On motion, they were laid on the table.

S. McBurney was discontinued, at his own request.

Union Church, Philadelphia, was fixed upon as the seat of the next Conference. A

G. D. Carrow and W. L. Gray were chosen as reserve delegates to the General Conference.

W. L. Gray and J. Castle offered a preamble and resolution, expressive of the kind feelings of the Conference towards Brother J. F. Reynolds, who is about to return to England: which were adopted by a rising vote.

The memoirs of J. R. Anderson, J. N. Magee, J. Lednum, and J. W. Mecaskey,

were read and adopted.

The resolution of the last session, respecting the preparation of memoirs, was re-adopted.

The time was fixed for taking the Conference collections.

The thanks of the Conference were tendered to the presiding Bishop, the Secretaries, and our kind entertainers, and to the Trustees of St. Paul's Church, who provided our place of meeting.

After religious exercises by D. W. Bartine, the appointments were announced, and the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by Bishop Ames.

REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STEWARDS.

The Stewards, in presenting to the Conference, and through it to the Church within our bounds, their Annual Report, would express their gratitude to God for putting it into the hearts of the people during the past year to contribute so liberally to the fund under their control for the support of our worn-out preachers and the families of those that are deceased.

The collections from many of the appointments are considerably in excess of their apportionments, while the aggregate throughout the Conference is only \$172.33 less than the assessment. South Philadelphia and Wilmington Districts have exceeded the estimates made for them; North Philadelphia and Snow Hill have come nearly up to theirs; and Reading and Easton have not fallen far below.

The exact amount received from the several Districts, as will be seen in the following tables, is \$6,817.67, an amount exceeding the returns of last year, and indeed of

any preceding year by \$758.98.

This, together with the Dividend on the Book Concern at New York, and the interest on the Centenary and Chartered Funds, has placed at the disposal of the Stewards for distribution an aggregate of \$7711.67.

This amount they have distributed among the fifty-three claimants upon the funds in accordance with their respective claims and their comparative necessities, so far as these could be ascertained.

Some may have been awarded too much, others too little; but if so, the error has been the result of imperfect information, rather than any disposition on the part of the Board to act with partiality.

The aggregate assessments of the several appointments for the coming year have been slightly increased, though not in proportion to the increased demands upon the fund.

The Board feared that if the estimates of those who have exceeded their assessment this year should be increased, that they might be tempted to fall below next year, lest a continued advance should be made in our future demands upon them. It is to be hoped, however, that the amounts set down to the different Circuits and Stations will be regarded by all concerned as the least they should raise, while there is ample room for all that the people in their liberality may be disposed to contribute beyond.

The Board in conclusion, after expressing the thanks of the recipients of this fund both to Pastors and people for the noble effort they have made to bring it up to what it should be, would recommend the passage of the following Resolutions, viz:

Resolved, 1st. That we recommend the collection for our Superannuated Preachers and their families, as one having the strongest claims upon the sympathy and benevolence of our people, and that we will use our utmost efforts to raise the amounts apportioned to our respective charges.

Resolved, 2d. That the plan introduced at our last session, and worked so efficiently during the past year, of raising at a single effort in the Public Congregation the entire amount apportioned to our respective charges, meets with our cordial ap-

probation, and shall be continued the coming year.

Resolved, 3d. That Preachers in charge of Circuits and Stations shall be required to report their collections for Conference Claimants on the second day of the next session of our Conference, stating at the time both the amount apportioned, and the amount collected-said Collections to be in United States or other bankable funds, and in notes of as large a denomination as possible.

Resolved, 4th. That the Collections for Conference Claimants, whenever practicable, be taken in the months of October and November.

REV. JOHN LEDNUM.

Rev. John Lednum, the subject of this brief sketch, was born in Sussex county, Delaware, November 15th, 1797, and died in the City of Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 18th, 1863, aged 66 years.

The circumstances of our brother in early life, in a religious view, were comparatively auspicious, but it was not until he had reached his nineteenth year that he gave his heart to God. Some four or five years thereafter he consecrated himself wholly to Jesus, and under a deep and abiding conviction that a dispensation of the Gospel was committed to him, was formally inducted into the Christian Ministry. He entered the itinerant ranks in the Spring of 1823.

From the beginning he was a diligent student, and his proficiency in study was commensurate with his patient and persevering application. His mind was thoroughly disciplined, and richly stored with varied information, so that there were but few subjects with which he was not familiar, and about which he could not freely and intelligently converse.

Though his manner in the pulpit was less attractive than that of some, he was, nevertheless, an interesting, instructive and profitable preacher, bringing out of the gospel treasury things new and old. As a Theologian he stood in the first class, and was regarded by competent judges as an able minister of the New Testament. Wherever he labored during his ministerial life, he was more or less successful, and in several instances was honored with remarkable revivals of religion.

For several years past he sustained, first, a supernumerary, and then a superanulated relation to the Conference, but all the while labored to the extent of his ability, and his labor was not in vain in the Lord. He was the author of a valuable work, entitled "Rise and Progress of Methodism in America from 1766 to 1785."

During the early pait of last October, he was seized with what was then regarded as a slight sickness, and from the effects of which it was expected he would soon recover, but Providence saw fit to order it otherwise. His illness lasted some seven or eight weeks, but his mind was preserved in perfect peace.

His death was singularly triumphant. When his physician informed him that his affection was disease of the heart, and that nothing more could be done for him, he replied, "I am ready." To the writer he said, "The God of my boyhood sustains me now. I am liable to die at any moment, but I am calm. I expect to be numbered with the blest in Heaven. I am at peace with all my brethren." To his wife he said, "Mother, all is bright and calm." He bade his children trust in the Lord, and they would meet in Heaven.

At one period during his sickness he exclaimed, "Oh! such sweet music! Do you not hear it? Such strains I never heard on earth." His mental faculties remained undisturbed to the last, and he contemplated his death with all the deliberation and moral heroism of the Christian philosopher. Being well read in Medical Science, he watched the slow but certain progress of his disease, and informed his friends as to its successive results, and when all would be over.

One of his daughters wished him to tell what he saw of Heaven. He replied,

"All that you read in the Bible." He then cried out, "The swellings of Jordan! The valley and shadow of death is cold and dark, but all is bright beyond."

"Jesus can make a dying bed,
Feel soft as downy pillows are."

"In my hand no price I bring, Simply to the Cross I cling."

At another time, experiencing great difficulty in breathing, he said, "The chariot tarries! I am weary to go." "How sweet," he continued, "to die with loved ones around us."

On the morning of November 18th, he bade his wife and children a last farewell, and made them promise to meet him in Heaven. About half-past 5 o'clock, without a struggle or groan, he breathed his last.

"As one that wraps the drapery of his couch around him, And lies down to pleasant dreams,"

he fell asleep in Jesus.

Appropriate services were held in the Green Street M. E. Church, Philadelphia, and also in the 1st M. E. Church, Lancaster, Pa., whither his mortal remains had been conveyed for interment. His surviving companion and children mourn his departure, but are sustained and solaced by the sweet assurances of the Gospel.

REV. J. RUSH ANDERSON.

From the time of his conversion he was intent on commending the Saviour to others, and felt, as he believed, the moving of the Holy Spirit to devote himself to the work of the ministry; which call was soon recognized by the Church, and he was admitted to minister at her altars. He was conscious of a call to serve God and the Church in the itinerant ministry, and sought, after much prayer and reflection, his father's approval. But he, having designed his son for the medical profession, was reluctant to consent, and did not till he had studied medicine and graduated at the Jefferson Medical College, in Philadelphia. Then, finding his son's convictions of duty unchanged, the father yielded, and J. R. Anderson's name appeared in the minutes of the Philadelphia Conference in 1844 as a probationer.

From that time until August, 1863, he labored with diligence and success in the several charges to which he was assigned. In March, 1863, he was appointed the second time to Ebenezer station, Manayunk. He commenced his work with earnestness and hope; but the disease of which he died (phthisis pulmonalis) rapidly developed itself, and in the early part of the following October both himself and his friends were convinced that his work on earth was done. He lingered in much pain and weariness until the 8th of November, when his spirit ascended to the "palace of angels and God."

During his last sickness he was exceedingly joyful; his faith rested in Christ with the most perfect assurance. He said, "God can put Satan under the feet of a dying man, and through Christ he has given me the victory." He has left a beloved and a loving wife and four children in sadness and tears, who will, we trust, rejoin him in that land where sadness and tears are unknown.

Dr. Anderson possessed a warm heart and genial spirit. He was free from disguise, equivocation, or dissimulation. He was decided in his convictions, frank and fearless in their avowal, and tenacious in maintaining what he believed to be right.

His ability as a preacher was above the ordinary grade. He was faithful and earnest as a laborer in the Lord's vineyard, and often exerted himself beyond his physical strength. His piety was fervent, and his success was cause of great thankfulness. But his work is done, and in glorious triumph he rests from his labors.

"Servant of God, well done!
Rest from thy loved employ;
The battle's fought, the victory won,
Enter thy Master's joy."

REV. JOSEPH N. MAGEE.

Rev. Jos. N. Magee was born in Bridgeville, Delaware, 1824, and died in Newport, Del., Aug. 27, 1863, aged 39 years. He was converted in his youth at a camp-meeting held near Snow Hill, Md. Having an ardent desire to do good, he was employed by the Bible Agent of the State to circulate the Holy Scriptures in Dorchester County. He did great good in placing the word of God in families where it had never been seen. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Church Creek Circuit in 1851. He was employed by the Presiding Elder, and sent to Worcester Mission in 1853. He was received on trial in the Philadelphia Conference, and appointed to Smyrna Circuit in 1854. His subsequent fields of labor were Wye Mission, Felton, Mount Nebo, Enterprise and Newport, where he closed his useful life in the triumph of faith.

Brother Magee was a zealous and successful minister of Christ, plain and practical in his preaching, and being attentive to his pastoral duties, his name will be remembered with pleasure by the most of those with whom he labored, and many will rise in the judgment to call him blessed.

In the last sermon he preached he said, "I asked myself this question, on my way to the church—'Am I prepared to die?' and after a close examination of my heart before God, I could answer I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand.' He was taken ill that night, and lingered for about two weeks. His sufferings were intense, but he endured them without a murmur. Resting his hope in the atonement, he said, "my will is lost in the will of Christ."

Much might be said of this worthy minister, but his "record is on high."

"To him the righteous Judge will say well done, The strife is o'er, the prize by thee is won; Come take a seat close by thy Saviour's side, And in my glory ever more abide."

His remains were interred in the burial ground of the Philadelphia Conference, Mount Moriah Cemetery.

REV. JOHN W. MECASKEY, A. M.

Rev. John W. Mecaskey, A. M., pastor of Asbury M. E. Church, Philadelphia, died Oct. 16, aged 42. He was the son of pious parents, and inherited an honored name, a fine physical form, a vigorous intellect, and an amiable disposition. These were cared for with commendable zeal on the death of his devoted mother, in his twelfth year, in the academy of the Rev. Mr. Andrews, of Doylestown, Pa., where he was placed by his remaining parent, and where he completed his academical course. On leaving school he entered the law office of the late Samuel Chew, Esq., and in October, 1842, was admitted to the Philadelphia bar. He commenced the practice of his profession with more than ordinary promise, having a fine analytical mind, a lively imagination, and great fluency of language, with the grace and bearing of an honest, earnest man. Indeed, few young men of the legal profession had fairer prospects of worldly success; but what things were gain to him he "counted loss for Christ." A dispensation of the Gospel was committed unto him, and he conferred not with flesh and blood, but at once cheerfully abandoned all prospects of wealth and fame in the practice of law and commenced a course of reading preparatory to the ministry. While engaged in his law studies he sought and found the Saviour, and soon after connected himself with the Union M. E. Church. His piety and ability soon commended him to the favorable notice of his brethren, and after rendering good service in the Sunday-school, and as a class-leader and exhorter, he was licensed to preach; and being further proved by one year's travel on the Newtown circuit, he was recommended to the Philadelphia Conference, by whom he was received in 1844 and sent to Radnor circuit, and here he formed the acquaintance of the excellent lady whom some years later he married, and who now mourns her irreparable loss. His subsequent fields of labor were Grove circuit, Mauch Chunk, Stroudsburg, Bustleton, St. John's, the tract agency, and Western, Philadelphia. After this he was stationed in Columbia, Reading, Norristown, and Pottsville. In 1862 he was again brought to the city and stationed in Asbury, West Philadelphia, and here he ceased to work and live. In each field of labor favored with his valuable services he was instant in season and out of season, an able minister of the New Testament, and a faithful steward of the mysteries of God. Purity, dignity, and earnestness, culminating in deep, constant devotion to God and his work, marked and illuminated his whole course, Christ and his cause were always paramount, and consecrated his whole inner and outer life. In the freedom of social intercourse and in the warmth of debate he never forgot that he was a minister of Jesus Christ, or what his brethren had a right to expect from him, and he never disappointed them. The seals to his ministry were many; and though dead, he lives in the grateful remembrance of the Churches he served. His health began to decline when stationed in Norristown, but for years he battled bravely on amid increasing infirmities, doing the work of an evangelist and giving full proof of his ministry. In the summer of 1862 he visited Europe, with the hope that a sea voyage and foreign travel might improve his health and prolong his life, more than ever precious and necessary to his family and friends; but his disease, ossification of the valves of the heart, resulting in general dropsical effusion, baffled the skill of the ablest physicians and blasted the hope of his friends. He came home with health but slightly improved to labor a little while, and theu die as only a good man can die. When the hope of life was abandoned the last great struggle began.

To leave wife and children, and the work in which his soul delighted, in the meridian of his years, was a sore conflict; but he came out of it more than a conqueror. With entire submission he resigned himself, his family, and his work to God. His sufferings were great and long continued, but in patience he possessed his soul; not a murmur escaped his lips, and the Scriptures, the unfailing source of his comfort, ceased to be studied only when his strength failed him to hold and read the book of books. The sweet hymns, "Rock of Ages" and "Jesus, lover of my soul," often repeated, expressed the experience of the dying minister of Jesus Christ. His last pastoral work was a letter addressed to his people, in which he says, after thanking them for their constant kindness, "O my dear flock, cleave, under all circumstances, closely to Christ, for when in immediate prospect of death every season of lukewarmness, every neglect of duty, every lapse into known sin, will rise up with terrible distinctness to distress you. Feel it to be a duty to be more than ever attentive to the means of grace, the attendance upon the preached word, the class-meetings, and all other means calculated to benefit your own souls and lead others to Christ." Thus has passed away another in the van of the sacramental host of God's elect. His life was beautiful in holiness; his sickness and death were full of lessons of moral heroism and of calm Christian triumph. To die thus is gain!

REPORT ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

Believing, as we do, that, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness. That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works. That the Bible is the only and sufficient rule both of our faith and practice." And that "it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth: to the Jew first, and also to the Greek," and having learned, with great satisfaction, that, the American Bible Society has distributed, to the army and navy alone, more than Two Millions of Bibles and Testaments since the war began: One hundred thousand have been given to Rebel prisoners of war: Two hundred thousand have been sent to Rebels beyond the lines, by permission of the government: Bibles are not contraband of war, but like the sunlight of heaven and the breath of life, are and ought to be, untramelled and free to all.

The foreign interests have been liberally provided for, and the missionary work has also been well supplied.

The annual Contributions to the Bible Cause have been steadily advancing, but the demands are vastly greater than ever. Therefore,

Resolved, 1. That we gratefully acknowledge the hand of God in the liberality of his people and the prosperity of this noble enterprise.

Resolved, 2. That we have the utmost confidence in the American Bible Society, and heartily commend it to the continued sympathy and support of our churches.

Resolved, 3. That we will preach in behalf of the Bible Cause, take up a collection at each of our appointments to sustain it, and, in view of the increasing demands for Bibles in the army and navy, we will urge upon our congregations the necessity of very liberal Contributions.

EDUCATIONAL REPORT.

The Committee on Education beg leave to report that Dickinson College is rapidly recovering from the loss of patronage, which, in common with all border institutions of learning, it sustained by the rebellion.

We deem it scarcely necessary to remind the Conference that Dickinson is one of the oldest Colleges in this country, and one of the first in character and reputation, at home and abroad. Throughout that vast region of country, lying between the sea board and the Alleghanies, the borders of New York and the central portions of Virginia, it affords to Methodists unequalled facilities for the education of their sons. If the College were only endowed, as it should be, its influence would, more than ever, tend to elevate the character of our church, and by the talents, culture, and future position of the young men going forth from its halls, it would become one of the controlling powers of our country.

The Members of the Faculty are all known to be men of profound learning in their several departments. They have proved themselves to be admirably adapted to their special work. The most perfect harmony prevails among them, and we have good reason to affirm that the general administration of the College is such as is not surpassed by that of any other in the land.

At no previous period of its history have its students achieved a more excellent reputation for scholarship, or exemplified a higher tone of morals in their collegiste and social relations. And while we regard the intellectual advantages, which the College offers to the student, as equal to those of any other institution, we know of none whose moral discipline is superior, or whose religious influences are more salutary.

Arrangements have been made for the instruction of classes in Biblical Science and Literature, in order to meet the wants of those young brethren who propose to enter the ranks of our itinerant ministry. In view of this excellent and timely provision, we would recommend all such to prayerfully consider whether it would not be best to go first to the College, and afterwards to the great work toward which their hearts are moved by the Holy Spirit.

After a careful consideration of our educational interests, as confided to the patronage and supervision of this Conference, your Committee would recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:—

Resolved, 1. That the cause of Christian education is one of the great benevolent enterprises of the Church, and, with the Missionary and Bible causes, ought to be recognized as an indispensable auxiliary in reclaiming the world from sin, and, as such, should share liberally in the contributions of the Church.

Resolved, 2. That in the judgment of this Conference, the proper endowment of Dickinson College is one of the first wants of our Church for this section of the work, and that the present is the auspicious time to secure that object.

Resolved, 3. That each Pastor is expected to preach in each congregation on Christian Education, and is hereby requested to impress upon the minds of parents, the importance of educating their children, and of encouraging our own literary institutions.

Resolved, 4. That we request from the several Circuits and Stations at least ten cents per member for the educational collection, and that the apportionment to

each charge be inserted in the published Minutes; and that ten per cent. of the amount realized, be applied to the beneficiary fund for the aid of young men

preparing for the ministry.

Resolved, 5. That to secure the interest and the concurrence of our members in raising the educational collection, the Presiding Elders be requested to see that a committee be appointed, at the first Quarterly Conference of each charge, to cooperate with the Pastor in devising such measures as in their judgment will insure success.

Resolved, 6. That we appeal to the Christian conscience of our wealthy members for liberal donations and bequests toward the endowment of our literary institutions, and express the belief that these, under God, will be among the most blessed of all their benevolent appropriations.

Resolved, 7. That we specially recommend to our people the Grammar School, at

Carlisle, as the best place to prepare their sons for college.

Resolved, 8. That we earnestly recommend our people to observe the customary annual concert of prayer for colleges, held on the last Thursday of February.

Resolved, 9. That the Committee on Education for the next Conference shall consist of two members of the Conference, and two Laymen from each district; that the Bishop appoint the Lay Members at the present session, and that the Committee have authority to fill the places of absentees.

Resolved, 10. That the bill of T. K. Collins & Co., for printing the Tract ordered by the Conference at its last session, and the bill of James H. Bryson for printing the circulars, more recently published by the Education Committee, and the expenses of said Committee, at their recent meeting in Philadelphia, be paid out of the educational collection.

Resolved, 11. That after ten per cent, of the educational collection be set apart for the beneficiary fund, as provided in the fourth resolution of this series, and the bills and expenses, named in the previous resolution, be paid, the remainder be divided equally between Dickinson College and the Wesleyan Female College.

Resolved, 12. That the presiding Bishop be requested to appoint the usual Visiting

Committees to Dickinson College and the Wesleyan Female College.

Resolved, 13. That the educational collection shall be taken up in the month of September or October.

Resolved, 14. That the Education Committee be instructed to counsel and act, as may be judged expedient, in concert with the President of the College, during the year, in reference to all its financial interests.

Resolved, 15. That we will co-operate with such agencies as the College may use, in the work of its endowment, and we will faithfully and earnestly endeavor to convince our people of the duty and importance of liberality in this respect.

Resolved, 16. That each Preacher in charge report the amount of the education collection at the same time he reports his Missionary collection.

The following amendment, presented by C. Cooke, was adopted:-

Resolved, That the Wesleyan Female College in this city was never in a state of greater prosperity than at the present time, having about ninety boarding and thirty day scholars, an efficient and harmonious Board of Instruction, and hopeful measures in progress for the payment of \$10,000, the entire amount of its floating

Whereas, As ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ we relinquish no rights as Amer. Whereas, As ministers of the Bott described by the express letter of God's word and by our articles of religion to preach to all, loyalty to the powers that "are ordained of God,"

Resolved, 1.—That, as ministers and members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. within the bounds of the Philadelphia Annual Conference, we re-affirm our past declarations since this war commenced in reference to the rebellion, and our pledged determination to sustain the government in this crisis of our national existence,

Resolved, 2.—That while we acknowledge the war as a great national calamity and lament the untold miseries that by it are entailed upon the land in the loss of precious lives and in its sad demoralizing influences, we believe that the duty of the nation is to prosecute the war with all its resources of men and money, until peace shall be obtained by victory, the rebellion be completely subdued, the legitimate power and authority of the government shall be re-established, and till the flag of the nation, as the emblem of the undisputed sovereignty of the Federal Go. vernment, shall wave over every foot of the territorial domain.

Resolved, 3 .- That as the Constitution of the United States, the supreme law of the land, makes it the duty of the Government to suppress rebellion, and as Government would be a nullity aside from its administration, we maintain that loyalty to the Government is only to be understood, as loyalty to the administration of that Government as duly elected under the Constitution, and that in rendering to "Casar the things that belong to Cæsar," the entire, prompt and unqualified obedience of all under its authority is to be rendered to the administration, not for wrath, but for conscience sake, and that resistance to its authority, either by speech or action, is not only rebellion and treason to the civil Government, but to God.

Resolved, 4.—That while we recognize the right of citizens to discuss the measures and policy of the Government, we yet affirm that it is a religious duty not to speak evil of ministers and magistrates, and that, especially in times like these, when the utmost wisdom is required in the administration of civil affairs, the right of even such discussion is only to be exercised with great caution, prudence and forbest ance.

Resolved, 5.—That so far as our influence may extend, we discountenance and con-

demn the illy concealed treason of those who, influenced by party spirit, or sympademn the my spirit, or sympathy with human bondage, find fault with every warlike measure, under the pretext thy will have been the Constitution as the supreme law of the land and the of a discrimination of the Government as framed by the Constitution. They are the secret foes of the Government, with all the venom, but without the manliness of rebels in open arms.

Resolved, 6.—That we recognize in American Slavery—so justly characterized by the fathers of our church "as contrary to the golden law of God, on which hang all the law and the prophets, and the inalienable rights of mankind, as well as all the law are repetition of the Revolution,"—the root and palpable cause of this most foul and wicked rebellion; and that we rejoice that a system so contrary to the letter and white and spirit of our holy religion, so abhorrent to humanity and to civilization, has, and spirit of the sword of resistance to the Government, secured its own destruction, by taking the Sword of resistance to the Government, secured its own destruction, and that in the Emancipation policy of the Government we recognize the hand of Him who, thus over-ruling the councils of men, has caused a military necessity "to coincide with the principles of everlasting righteousness in the extirpation of Slavery—the prolific mother of wicked legislation in the State and of discussion and bickering in the Church.

Resolved, 7 .- That our brave soldiers and sailors, who, under the influences of patriotism, have sacrificed the comforts of home, and risked their lives in the defence of the great interests that are at stake in the national struggle, are the objects of our sympathy and love, and that we will pray for them, and in all possible ways co-operate with the instrumentalities that are made use of for the promotion of their temporal and spiritual interests; that those who have fallen and those who survive have secured an imperishable monument in the hearts of their countrymen, and that the orphans of those, who for the defence of the Nation have sacrificed their lives, should be the Nation's especial care.

Resolved, 8 .- That the sublimely charitable institutions—the United States Sanitary and Christian Commissions-as out-growths of this war, illustrating as they do the influence of a Christian civilization, in its efforts to alleviate the unavoidable calamities resulting from war, demand and should receive the prayers and donations of all Christian people, as well as the Freedman's Aid Society, in whose efforts to elevate the hitherto down-trodden and oppressed, we recognize the influence of the teachings of Him who went about doing good, and who, in the awards of the judgment, will say "inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

REPORT ON TRACT CAUSE.

- So far as we have been able to investigate, we believe the following to be true:
- 1. The duties of the Conference Tract Agent have been faithfully performed.
- 2. The support of the Agent has been provided by the private contributions of the friends of the Tract Cause, without touching the Tract collections.
- 3. The Tract Depository has been the centre of a purely religious and Methodistic literature.
- 4. The sales of the Depository during the year have been \$13,454.27.
- 5. The gross assets of the Society are \$9,184.38; and its net assets \$2,735,03. which is but a fraction less than \$1000 more than they were one year ago.

 The business of the Depository has been larger during the past year than it has ever been.

7. An arrangement similar to that which has been in successful operation during the past two years is made for the next year, to the effect that the Tract Agent be paid by private contributions outside of the Tract collections.

8. Tracts have been largely and gratuitously distributed, and all proper requests for such grants have been met so far as the means of the Society have allowed.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That we are as much convinced as ever of the importance of disseminating a sound, healthy, religious literature.

Resolved, 2. That we recommend the appointment of a Conference Tract Agent.

Resolved, 3. That we will co-operate with the Agent in the accomplishment of the evangelical work committed to him.

Resolved, 4. That six Laymen—one from each District—be appointed now, to act as part of the Tract committee, which will serve at the next Session of the Conference.

Resolved, 5. That we are convinced of the need of enlarging our Tract literature, and that the best minds of the Church ought to be stimulated into activity in this literary work, by which we shall have gospel utterances better adapted to the arms and the promiscuous public.

Resolved, 6. That instead of our Church being a comparatively small Tract-distributor in the army and the navy, we ought to furnish the means by which we shall be the very largest.

Resolved, 7. That we call the attention of the Presiding Elders to the importance of having a Tract Steward appointed for each charge.

ON TEMPERANCE.

The committee on temperance beg leave to report as follows:-

Whereas, Owing largely to the tumult of the times, and as a bitter fruit of the unholy rebellion now in progress, and approaching its final and effectual suppression, the popular interest in the great practical virtue of temperance is much abated, and intemperance in the use of alcoholic drinks is flooding the land with desolation and death; and, whereas, this Conference recognizes the Church of God as the great conservator of public morals, and furnishing in her organization and authoritative utterances the most enduring basis for the reformation of social evils; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That we reaffirm our unfaltering interest in the cause of temperance, an interest which is expressed in the General Rule of the Methodist Episcopal Church upon the subject.

Resolved, 2. That we will, during the course of the ensuing Conference year, preach to every congregation within the bounds of the Conference, a carefully prepared and earnest sermon on Temperance.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

The committeee appointed on Sunday Schools beg leave to make the following report:

We are as much convinced as ever of the importance of the Sunday School as a great reforming and christianizing agency, and an indispensable auxiliary to the church; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That we, as ministers of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, will use our utmost endeavors to promote the interest of this important institution of the church.

Resolved, 2. That we will continue to recommend the use of our catechism in all our schools, and endeavor to carry out the 16th Article of the 12th Section of the Discipline.

Resolved, 3. That attaching as we do great importance to the circulation of the Sunday School Advocate, and also the Teacher's Journal, we earnestly recommend that they be more widely circulated in our Schools.

Resolved, 4. That we continue to recommend the books published by the Sunday School Union of the M. E. Church over all others for the use of our Schools.

Resolved, 5. That we recommend, whenever practicable, the formation of Pastor's Bible Classes in all our schools, and that we will preach during the year at least one sermon on the subject of Sunday School instruction in each of our appointments.

Resolved, 6. That a collection in behalf of the Sauday School Union be lifted in all our Churches during the year.

ON THE DIVISION OF THE CONFERENCE.

The committee appointed at the last session of the Conference to obtain information on the subject of dividing the Conference, beg leave to report, that they have received communications from only a few charges, and these mostly from the peninsula. No new facts have been obtained, but a majority of the charges, which have expressed a wish on the subject, give preference to a division by the Pennsylvacia State line. Eighteen Quarterly Conferences on the Snow Hill District, out of 19 which took action on the subject, ask for the Pennsylvania line. Three of the charges on Wilmington District ask that there be no division at present.

In the opinion of your Committee, the state of the country has not so far changed since our last session as to justify a different course of action from that then taken, they therefore offer the following resolutions, viz.

1. That it is inexpedient to divide the Conference at its present session.

2. That this Conference respectfully ask the next General Conference to give to us the authority to divide at any session between this and the General Conference of 1868, into two or three Conferences, as may be found necessary.

ON THE RELIGIOUS INTERESTS OF COLORED PEOPLE.

The Committee appointed to consider the religious interests of our Colored population, beg leave to submit the following brief report.

Looking forward to the approaching General Conference as the proper body to make provision, on a comprehensive scale, to meet the religious wants of our Colored population, especially now in their transition state from slavery to freedom, and believing that that body will take some action upon this important question, we deem it important to call the attention of the Conference only to such measures as may favorably influence the condition of the Colored people under our own immediate charge.

The following resolutions are submitted for adoption by your body.

Resolved, 1. That the Presiding Bishop be requested to instruct the presiding Elders of the lower Districts, assisted by the preachers under their charge, to organize

the several societies of our colored people into district Circuits, as far as it may be practicable, with a view of furnishing them with ministerial service by preachers of their own color.

Resolved, 2. That we advise our preachers to organize Sunday Schools for the benefit of the children of our colored people.

Resolved, 3. That as soon as it is practicable, after they are organized into Circuits, our colored people be advised to unite themselves with the Philadelphia Local Colored Annual Conference.

SALARIES ESTIMATED AND PAID.

Whereas, In the columns in the minutes headed "Ministerial Support," some of the reports of "salary estimates and receipts," include house-rent, while others indicate the salary alone; and

Whereas, It is desirab'e to secure uniformity in these reports; therefore,

Resolved, That, it is the understanding of this Conference, that the amounts estimated and paid for house-rent and travelling expenses, are not to be reported in the columns aforesaid.

ANTI-SLAVERY AND LOYALTY.

Whereas, The unvarying testimony of the Methodist Episcopal Church has been against slavery, and in favor of loyalty to the Government of the United States of America; and

Whereas, We have reason to fear that some of our members and ministers have shown themselves in favor of slavery and against the Government of the United States; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That while we make all due allowance for the influence of education, prejudice, and the heat of party strife, as disturbing elements in the conduct of even good men in such times as these; yet we affectionately admonish every member of our Church, who gives proof that he is either pro-slavery or disloyal, that he has fallen into error; and we beseech him, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to return to calm reason, and from his evil way.

Resolved, 2. That, forbearing as we desire to be toward all ministers who have fallen into the error, either of pro-slaveryism or disloyalty, we record it as our solemn judgment that no such man ought to be a religious teacher in our Church, and if there be any such, we do hereby request him to withdraw from among us.

LAY DELEGATION.

Whereas, The General Conference, at its late Session, directed that a vote be taken both in the Annual Conferences and in the charges, to determine whether or not it was the will of the Church that Lay Delegates should be admitted into the General Conference; and whereas, so far as the vote was taken the question was decided in the negative; therefore,

Resolved, That the Delegates of this Conference to the next General Conference be, and they are hereby instructed, to vote against any action in favor of it at this pres-

CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS.

Resolved, That hereafter the calling of the roll in open Conference, to ascertain who are claimants on the necessitous fund, be dispensed with; and that all claimants be required to make known the fact of their being such, to the Board of Stewards, not later than the second day of the Session.

GOVERNOR HICKS.

Resolved, That this Conference has heard with deep regret of the serious illness of Hon. Thomas Holliday Hicks, with whom many members of this body have enjoyed long and intimate friendship, and whose noble firmness in supporting the U. S. Government, while Governor of the State of Maryland, at a most critical period of its history, has secured our profound admiration and lasting gratitude.

Resolved, 2. That as individuals we extend to Senator Hicks our most cordial sympathy in his affliction, and assure him that we will specially commend his case to the Father of Mercies, that his health may be speedily restored, and his valuable life be long spared to serve the country we all so dearly love.

Resolved, 3. That a copy of these Resolutions be transmitted to Senator Hicks, duly certified by the Presiding Bishop and Secretary of the Conference.

NEW CHAPTER ON SLAVERY.

Resolved, 1. That we, the members of the Philadelphia Conference, true to car old anti-slavery principles, do most heartily rejoice in the prospect of the speedy and entire abolition of slavery in this country.

Resolved, 2. That we now withdraw our concurrence with the East Baltimore Conference, in requesting the repeal of the New Chapter on slavery, by the General Conference in 1864.

ON LECTURES, ETC., TO CLASSES.

Resolved, That we advise and request the Examining Committee, of this Conference to institute a system of Lectures, for the benefit of the classes subject to examination, in which some member of the several committees shall, at some convenient hour during the session of the Conference, deliver to the classes under their charge, a Lecture on some topic embraced in the course of studies on which he examines, or on the proper methods of study.

Resolved, That this Conference respectfully ask the attention of the ensuing General Conference to this matter, and recommend that such system of Lectures be made part of the duty of examining committees in all the Conferences; and that our Delegates to the General Conference be charged with the office of presenting the same for the consideration of that body.

REV. J. T. GRACEY'S LETTER AND RESOLUTION THEREON.

Sectapore Oudh, India, January 15th, 1864.

To the Philadelphia Annual Conference, Wilmington, Del., March, 1864.

Dear Reverend Fathers and Brethren,—"Grace and peace be multiplied unto yen, through the knowledge of God and of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Your godly communications addressed to me through a committee appointed for the purpose, at each of the last two sessions of your body, duly reached me. That you showed me this consideration, impressed me with your kindness to me personally, and your deep interest in the work of Christian Missions; and has caused me to "thank my God upon every remembrance of you."

It has not been without deep thoughtfulness we have noted the changes in your midst. "The Fathers, where are they?" Reed and Hargis, we observe, "are not, for God took them." And of the young men, "How have the mighty fallen!" Brisbane, Mecaskey, Anderson and others, have "fallen asleep!" May God give it to your humble representative, on this most distant horizon of his kingdom, to be "meet to be partaker with" these "saints in light!"

You will excuse me that I have preferred not to detain your business proceedings with my personal narrative, but have rather chosen to communicate freely with your Committee, through whom those interested may learn more of our work and our welfare.

Through the vicissitudes of two years, amid, "perils among heathen," and a hostile clime, "the good hand of our God has been upon us," and we are at present in excellent health. Spiritually—"having obtained help of God, we remain unto this present." In our work, we "bate no jot of heart nor hope." Our convictions of the propriety of our course in accepting this field of labor, have deepened, if possible, daily; and we do steadfastly believe, that "the same" Holy Ghost [that] said "Separate me Saul and Barnabas, for the work whereunto I have called them," sent us "far" here "among the Gentiles."

Believe us, however, brethren, in our dearth of spiritual communion, we have a need that few of you may appreciate, that you "pray for us that the word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified." Fathers and brethren, "pray for us."

With thanks for your past sympathy and communications, allow me to be "in the hope of a blessed immortality," and in the best of bonds,

. Whereus, Having heard an essay read before the "M. E. Preacher's Meeting of Philadelphia," by Rev. J. B. McCullough, on the subject of "Church Financier-

ing," embracing three different plans; and believing, from its clear and conclusive treatment of the subject, that it deserves general circulation, and will thereby meet a pressing want of the Church; therefore

Resolved, by this Conference, That Brother McCullough be requested to furnish his essay on "Church Financiering" for immediate publication, in tract form,

by our book agents at New York.

BLANKS FOR STATISTICS.

1. Resolved, That the Secretaries of this Conference be requested to prepare printed blanks containing all the items to be reported by the preachers to the Conference, and that said blanks be distributed to the preachers through the Presiding Elders, so that they may be filled up before coming to our annual session.

2. Resolved, That the preachers be required to hand in their reports on the 2d day of the session, and that delinquents be reported hereafter in open Conference.

RELATION TO SOLDIERS.

Whereas, There now exists a fearful struggle for the maintenance of the Federal government against treason and rebellion; and

Whereas, The history of this great struggle will be written and published to the world; and

Whereas, It is all important that the history of the M. E. Church in its connection with this struggle be correctly and fully written; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That the members of this Conference be requested to furnish to the Secretary at the next session, a correct statement of the numbers of the members of our Churches and congregations who have entered the United States service to put down the wicked rebellion now afflicting our country; and what number of them have held official positions in our army and navy, with their respective rank, and what numbers of them have been wounded, killed, or died in the service of their country.

Resolved, 2. That these returns be printed in the published minutes of the Conference.

Resolved, 3. That the Bishops of the M. E. Church be requested to present the above resolutions to the several Annual Conferences of the Church for their concurrence.

CHURCH RECORD.

Resolved, 1. That we earnestly and heartily recommend to our preachers and people, the Church Record, just brought out by the Book Concern, and that we pledge ourselves, as pastors, hereafter to give greater attention to the keeping of the records of the Church with neatness and fidelity,

Resolved, 2 That we respectfully request the agents of our Book Concern to publish, at their earliest convenience, an additional volume of the Church Record, designed for the record, in chronological order, of the receptions to, and removals from the Church. The same to be furnished with printed headings and proper rulings for the purpose.

MARRIAGE RECORDS, ETC.

Whereas, The Discipline of the Church now requires the Recording Steward of a Charge to keep a record of Marriages and Baptisms, while it is the duty of the preacher in charge to keep other records; and, whereas, one book of record should contain the whole, to be entered and kept by one person, acting for the time being; therefore.—

Resolved, by this Conference, That the next General Conference be respectfully requested to so alter that part of the Discipline as to make it the duty of the preacher in charge to keep the whole record; and that our delegates be requested to bring the subject before the General Conference, and urge its adoption.

BOOK CONCERN.

Resolved, First, That we hereby express our decided conviction that a Branch of the Book Concern of the Methodist Episcopal Church ought to be established in the city of Philadelphia, occupying a prominent business site, and with business capacity and endowment making it worthy of the business demands of the second city on the American continent.

Resolved, Secondly, That a committee of six, consisting of three ministers and three laymen, be appointed to confer with the Book Agents and Book Committee with reference to the most judicious method of accomplishing this result.

Resolved, Thirdly, That our delegates to the General Conference be respectfully requested to press this subject upon the attention of that body, and secure the end herein proposed.

CHURCH PAPER.

Resolved, That the interests of the Church would be promoted, in our judgment, by the establishment of a paper devoted to the interests of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the city of Philadelphia; and we hereby request our delegates to present our wish to the General Conference at its next session, and take such steps as will secure its accomplishment.

HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, There are in the city of Philadelphia teeming thousands for whom there is no pastoral care; and whereas, the Methodist Episcopal Church has always been prompt in "hunting up the lost sheep of the house of Israel;" and whereas, there are now open doors in the shape of churches, school-houses, &c., in the city of Philadelphia, specially inviting to Home Missionary effort; and whereas, (owing to the great and important demand abroad for means to carry forward our Foreign work,) the Missionary Committee of this Conference find it exceedingly difficult to procure appropriations from the general Missionary Fund to meet fully this home exigency; therefore,—

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Conference that the subject is of sufficient magnitude and promise to the Church to call for and justify the appointment of an able and judicious committee to look into this matter fully and fairly, and report to the Conference the result of its investigations, for Conference ction at its next session.

THANKS, ETC.

Resolved, 1. That the thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby tendered to the officers and members of St. Paul's Church, in this city, for placing at our service the commodious Hall of the Wilmington Institute during our session.

Resolved, 2. That we gratefully tender our hearty thanks to the families of this city, who have so kindly entertained us during our temporary sojourn among them; and, in parting from them, we earnestly pray that He, whose blessing maketh rich and addeth no sorrow, may reward them an hundred fold in this life, and in the world to come with life everlasting.

Resolved, 2. That we hereby tender our grateful acknowledgements to the pastors and officers of the churches of sister denominations in this city, for the evidence they have given of Christian fraternity in tendering us the use of their pulpits during our sessions.

MEMOIRS OF DECEASED PREACHERS.

Resolved, That in the event of any Preacher dying during the year, the Presiding Elder be requested to prepare, or appoint some one to prepare, a memoir, to be read at the next Annual Conference.


